Hashimpura massacre: Court issues NBW against 12 convicted ex-policemen after they fail to surrender

NEW DELHI, NOV 22 (PTI): A Delhi court on Thursday issued non-bailable warrants (NBW) against 12 ex-policemen of Uttar Pradesh after they failed to surrender before it to serve life term awarded to them for the killing 42 people of a minority community in Hashimpura lo-cality of Meerut in 1987.

The Delhi High Court had awarded life imprisonment to 16 ex-policemen, all of whom have retired, and had directed them to surrender on or before November 22.

Additional Sessions Judge Smita Garg sent the remaining four convicts to Tihar central iail after they surrendered before the court as per October 31 directions of the High Court. The convicts -- Jaipal Singh,

Mahesh Pratap Singh, Sami Ullal Khan and Niranjan Lal -were taken into custody after they surrendered before the

"Since the remaining 12 convicts have failed to surren-der in compliance of the order dated October 31, passed by the High Court, let NBW (non-bailable warrant) be issued against them and notice to their respective sureties," the court said.

The HC had on October 31 sentenced the 16 former Provincial Armed Constabulary (PAC) personnel to life imprisent in the case, reversing a trial court's verdict which had Chidambaram in the case. acquitted the accused.

They were convicted for murder, kidnapping, criminal conspiracy and destruction of evidence under the Indian Penal Code.

The high court had on Sep-

tember 6 reserved its verdict on the appeals filed by Uttar Pradesh, the National Human Rights Commission (NHRC) and some private parties including a survivor of the mas-

sacre, Zulfiqar Nasir.

It had also reserved its judgement on BJP leader Subramanian Swamy's plea seek-ing further probe to ascertain the alleged role of the then Minister of State for Home P

The court had on February 17, 2016, tagged Swamy's plea with the other petitions in the matter. On March 21, 2015, a trial court here had acquitted the 16 former PAC personnel giving them benefit of doubt, saying their identification could not established due to lack of evidence.

Nineteen people were named as accused and charges were framed against 17 of them for offences of murder, attempt to murder, tampering with evidence and conspiracy by the court here in 2006. The case was transferred to Delhi on a Supreme Court direction in September 2002 following a petition by the families of the massacre victims and survi-

Of the 17 accused, the trial court had acquitted 16, while

one died during the trial.

The NHRC had intervened in the matter seeking further probe into the massacre in the Hashimpura locality of Meerut in Uttar Pradesh.

A trial court had on March 2013, dismissed Swamy's plea for further probe to as-certain the role of Chidam-baram, saying he has no locus standi and it is only the police which can move an application for further probe. Thereafter, Swamy had approached the high court with the appeal.

SDF conducts Block level meet in Chungthang

People must choose between 'shanti and kranti': TW Lepcha

MANGAN, 22 Nov:
Cikkim Democratic Sikkim Front Front organized a Block level coordination meeting at Panchayat Ghar in Chungthang, North Sikkim, today in the pres-ence of Minister for Forest, Mines & Geology cum Area MLA, Tshering Wangdi Lep cha, as chief guest.

Mr Lepcha was accompanied by Panchayat president, Chung Chung Lepcha. Zilla member. Tshering Ongmu Lepcha, Panchayat president, Singhik, PT Lepcha, Ward Pan-chayats, senior citizens and the general public.

The Panchayat president, in his address, informed that 90% of the public of Chungthang Block support SDF and representatives from every house are attending the meet.

"There is no doubt that Chungthang people are in support of SDF and its party president. The public here have been provided several schemes development funds and grants and all must be thankful towards the government and its policies which is why full support should go to SDF instead of any other political party," he added.

He also informed that SDF government has provided government jobs to 21 people from the area.

The Singhik Panchavat president spoke about de-velopmental works initiated by the SDF government in his GPU.

In an open interaction, public representative, Kalzang Ongdi Bhutia, thanked and congratulated the Chief Minister of the State who is also the SDF president for starting an organic revolution.

He also informed

that Chungthang and areas above it are rich in Trout fish which is why net fishing should not be allowed.

"Angling should be promoted for tourism and permission should be granted for this purpose," he added.

He further placed

demands including deployment of one safai karmachari and one night guard for Chungthang, provision of street light between Pegong and Chungthang, extension of unmarried certificate validity to at least five months, extension of fire extinguisher renewal process to at least three years and awareness programmes on alcohol and sub-stance abuse.

The chief guest, in his address, stressed on hoisting of SDF flags in

every house without fear.
"It is up to the public to decide whether they want 'shanti governance or kranti governance' in the coming days," he stated.

He further informed that the long pending land acquisition compensation amounting to Rs 230 crore has been sanctioned. For tourism development infrastructure of Rs 80 crore has also been sanctioned by the State Government including construction of ihora, protection of wall at Theng and Mani Lakhang, Toong Ward.

He also requested all Ward Panchayats to pre-pare proper and genuine lists of beneficiaries for CMRHM scheme, Janta Mela and One family-One job scheme.

He also announced provision of garbage vehicle for Chungthang and Mangan.

and control over resources such as land and water. They are also demanding an increase in the minimum support price and a judicial system to ensure its implementation. The farmers, struggling to cope with the agrarian crisis, are demanding proper implemen-tation of the loan waiver package announced by the BIP-led government in the state last year, land rights

for farmers and compensation for farm labourers.

"We have been consistently asking the state gov ernment to fulfil our long-standing demands, but the response has been lukewarm. We are forced to launch this agitation," said Pratibha Shinde, general secretary of Lok Sangharsh Morcha, which is organising the protest.

In March, thousands of farmers, led by the Left-af-filiated All India Kisan Sabha, took out a 180-km long march from Nashik to Mumbai in March to press for their demands. That protest saw a sea of red, formed by farmers in red caps, converge in Mumbai from across Maharashtra

80-feet Buddha statue planned in Gujarat

AHMEDABAD, NOV 22 (PTI): After the 182-meter tall 'Statue of Unity' of Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel, Gujarat may get a gigan-

tic Buddha statue. Sanghakaya Founda tion, a non-profit Bud-dhist organisation, said Thursday that it has demanded land from the government for in-stalling an 80-feet high statue of Lord Buddha in Gandhinagar district. It has roped in Ram Sutar, the sculptor behind the Statue of Unity, for the project, it said.

"We are expecting to get land soon," president of the foundation Bhante Prashil Ratna told re-porters here. The Statue of Unity, inaugurated in Narmada district of the state on October 31, is the tallest statue in the world. Bhante Prashil Ratna also said that the foundation is planning to set up a Buddhist University in Gujarat.

"Contrary to the belief that ancient Buddhist sites exist only in Bihar, Uttar Pradesh and further to the north, Guja-rat too has been blessed with such sites," he said.

"Like Nalanda and Takshashila, records of Chinese traveller Xuanzang mention that there was a big Buddhist university called Vallabhi at Bhavnagar in Gujarat," he said. "As (ancient) Nalanda university has been revived, we wish to revive Vallabhi university here" he said "The state government has given us land in Gandhinagar where we are planning to start a university on Buddhism." he said.

The foundation also plans to build a grand monument at Dev Ni Mori, a Buddhist archae-ological site in Sabar-kantha district of north Gujarat, he said. "During the excavation at Dev Ni Mori, two km from temple town of Shamlaji, they found ashes of Lord Buddha.

Contemplating Suicide We notice the problem, but are not addressing it

 $S^{\mathrm{i}\mathrm{k}\mathrm{k}\mathrm{i}\mathrm{m}}$ is no stranger to suicides; and neither is this section. How could it be, given that Sikkim, apart from several positives, is also among the leaders when it comes to suicide rates in the country. The latest official data available on suicide rates is for 2014, and on that list, Sikkim ranks second with a suicide rate of 38.4. This figure, compiled by the National Crime Records Bureau, means that Sikkim recorded 38.4 suicides per lakh of its population in 2014, second only to Puducherry which had the highest suicide rate in the country at 40.4. The national average for the year was 10.6 suicides per lakh people. Although the suicide rate in Sikkim for 2014 was higher than the 29.1 it recorded in 2012 to become, for the second time, that nation-topper in suicide rate, it is also thankfully much lower than the suicide rate of 48.2 it had notched in $2010\, to\, dislodge\, Kerala$ as the suicide capital of the country for the first time.

A study of data over ten years, 20014 to 2014, showed that out of 1,604 suicide cases recorded through these ten years, 65.5% were males and 34.5% females. As per this data, suicide was found to be common among the age group of 21-30 years (24.4%) and that 94.8% of the suicides were by hanging. Over these ten years, the number of suicides increased nearly 16%.

None of this is new news. And the worry for Sikkim is that this news and such data are already becoming stale news without any real efforts deployed to either address the challenge or even understand the problem. These attitudes notwithstanding, suicides remain a worry.

Suicides have been a worrying social challenge for a while now in Sikkim and the ignominy of becoming the State with the second-highest suicide rate should now reinforce the resolve to approach the problem from two sides – understanding and prevention. It is unfortunate that despite having such a high suicide rate, there is still no scientifically established explanation for it. Previous NCRB reports have informed that no one committed suicide in Sikkim due to either poverty or bankruptcy. Illness, drug abuse and family problems were some of the main reasons recorded for suicides in Sikkim. These of course are based on police reports on the suicide cases and would be superficial. All that is available by way of any reliable explanation is that suicide cases result from untreated psychiatric conditions. Even this is too simplistic and attracts the immediate deduction that the way to contain this is to make mental healthcare more accessible. Of course there are also the politically-laced insinuations, which, apart from being irrational, are also extremely insensitive towards the memory of lives lost to suicide, to be even discussed with any seriousness beyond the coteries in which they are voiced.

Meanwhile, what is missing in Sikkim's approach towards tackling suicides thus far is any genuine effort to understand the triggers which are spiking mental illnesses to a level where the State reports almost two suicides every three days on average [and many suicides are not even reported]. Access to mental healthcare is undoubtedly necessary, but for long-term solutions, the State needs to first unravel what is compromising the psychiatric health of the people so extensively. This is important, because only then can adequate solutions be fashioned. It is obvious that the State Government would be keen to implement policy decisions if they help prevent suicides; but that would require the experts to first explain the reasons behind suicides in Sikkim.

While on the topic, one wonders what happened of the State Government initiative of 2010 when a conference of the leading minds from the fields of Science & Spirituality was held in Gangtok. Inaugurated by the Dalai Lama, the conference was projected to lay the foundations for a more complete education of the young, ensuring a more stable rooting in morality and ethics which will also imbibe them with a more positive outlook and reinforce them better against the complications and vicissitudes of modern lifestyles; something which present day classrooms, with the pressure of completing syllabuses and recommending tuitions, cannot ensure.

The young, if introduced through a scientif-

ic and structured curriculum to the strength of moral and ethical virtues and how these reinforce each other, will stand a better chance of growing up with better emotional regulation, improved attention, increased calm and resilience, better stress management and coping skills and with refined compassion and empathy. Won't these have been welcome attributes in these disquieting times of runaway addiction, suicides and other social maladjustment issues among the young?

We need to learn from the men who rape

pproximately five times more women than men are victims of sexual accurations and adults are at especially high risk. men are victims of sexual assault and young

The impact on young people's psychological and physical health can be devastating, especially given that this developmental period is when young people should be developing and refining intimacy skills in close relationships.

What is striking about sexual assault is that, despite decades of research and public health in-terventions, there has been little change in rates since we first began studying it in earnest during the 1980s and 1990s.

This is a time when the discourse around sexual harassment and assault is garnering more headlines and dominating more dinner table con-versations than ever before —spurred in no small part by sexual assault charges against high profile figures such as Harvey Weinstein and Bill Cosby, the misogyny spewed by the U.S. President Donald Trump and the unleashed fury of so many women (and men) who want real accountability at long last for these crimes.

As a researcher, my instincts are to turn again to the scientific literature and assess what we to look for solutions or at least a clear

ENOUGH FOCUS ON THE FEMALE VICTIM

Here's a thumbnail sketch. An extraordinary amount of research on sexual violence — a concept that encompasses sexual harassment, assault and coercion — focuses on victims' experiences. It asks how many have experienced violence, what factors put them at risk and how they adjusted afterwards.

This focus on female victims leaves one with the strong impression that they are the protagonists in this story, as I have long argued.

The lessons that these studies propagate are: omen should avoid alcohol and drugs at parties, women should never wear tight or revealing clothes, women should essentially live a life avoiding young men because, well, young men.

What is staggering to me is how little we know about the men who knowingly assault. What little we do know comes mostly from studies of incarcerated men. But, given how few incidents of sexual violence are even reported to the police and how few of those even make it to a conviction, these crimes and the men who perpetrate them are likely very different beasts altogether from most crimes of sexual assault.

Other studies have examined perpetration indirectly. We have studies of "proclivity" to commit assault and these usually measure responses to questions such as: "How likely would you be to commit ential that gives them licence to do what they want.

But the consent education perpetuates to some degree a view that women (as gatekeepers) give consent and men (as agents) secure it, and that if communication of consent is clear, assault will like



rape if you know you would not be caught?

We also have delved deeply into rape myth acceptance and related constructs, such as sympathy for a rape victim and the perceived guilt of a rape

What we need are studies of non-incarcerated men who knowingly rape. These are the men who work to inebriate and isolate women, for example, often soliciting the help of friends.

There are certainly studies that have assessed behaviours among undetected perpetrators but most of these have relied on university samples receiving course credit for participating

Who really are the men who will divulge how they plan and enact a crime that is in the news each day, without some assurance that they won't be identified?
TIME TO STUDY MEN WHO ASSAULT

I am certainly encouraged by the work on consent and efforts to ensure that young people learn to distinguish whether a potential sexual partner has given clear and free consent to proceed

I am even more heartened by the accounts

To date, we have a situation in which one of our most effective approaches to the prevention of assault relies on the willingness of bystanders to intervene on a target's behalf.

This writing constitutes a call for researchers to dig deeper. We need to hear from the men who assault. Yes, we can reach them. No, we should not assume that they are vested in helping eliminate sexual assault.

However, one feature that emerges from the few studies that we do have in hand is that men who knowingly assault tend to do so repeatedly. They often have well-formulated strategies and, with the vanity of the con artist and bully com-bined, can be induced in some contexts to tell all. Or tell alot. And we need that information in order to make a difference.

Let's stop surveying women about their expe riences as victims: it's time to really zero in on the men who perpetrate these crimes at long last.

Study sheds light on scourge of "fake" news in Africa

oncerns about "fake news" have dominated discussions about

the relationship between the media and politics in the developed world in recent years. The extraor-dinary amount of attention paid in scholarship and in public debates to questions around truth, veracity and deception can be connected to the role of "fake news" in the 2016 US presidential election, and US President Donald Trump's use of the term

to dismiss his critics.

The term "fake news" itself is controversial because it's poorly defined.

The panic created by the spread of misinformation in general has led to introspection by journalists and a reassertion of professional values and

The rise of false information has complex cultural and social reasons.
Until now, though, the phenomenon has been studied mostly as it happens in the US and Europe, with rel-atively little attention to the situation in African countries.

This is despite the fact that disin-formation on the continent has often taken the form of extreme speech inciting violence or has spread racist, misogynous, xenophobic messages, often on mobile phone platforms such as WhatsApp.

To fill the gap in information about "fake news" in sub-Saharan Africa, we conducted an online survey in Kenya, Nigeria and South Africa earlier this year. Our study had three goals: to measure the prevalence of disinformation, to learn who people believe is responsible for stopping fake news, and to understand the relationship between disinformation and

Our survey, in which 755 people took part, reused questions from an-other study on the topic conducted in 2016 by the US-based Pew Research Centre. In this way we are able to compare our results with those in the US.

Our findings suggest that African audiences have low levels of trust in the media, experience a high degree of exposure to misinformation, and contribite – often knowingly – to its spread.

REBUILDING TRUST IN MEDIA

Educating audiences about the dangers of fake news is not enough. Media literacy should form part of a larger, multi-pronged approach to re-store trust in the media. The findings suggest that media organisations would have to work hard at rebuilding relationships with audiences.

US adventure sports enthusiast killed in Andamans violated laws; not a preacher: MHA officials

New Delhi, Nov 22 (PTI): An American national who killed allegedly by members of a protected tribe in the Andamans, appeared to be more of an adventure sports enthusiast rather than an evangelist and violated local laws to reach the highly- restricted island, officials said Thursday.

John Allen Chau, 27, neither informed the police as is required under the law nor did he take permission from the forest depart-ment and the local administration before reaching the North Sentinel Island, where two fishermen were also killed in 2006 by the Sentinelese tribals who are fiercely against any contact with outsiders, they said.

"We even cannot carry out proper census in the island. We can only make an assessment

of the number of people living in the island through aerial survey," a senior home ministry official said.

Interestingly, the North Sentinel Island is one of 29 islands in Andamans where till June foreigners had to take special permission -- the Restricted Area Permit (RAP) -- before being al-

lowed to visit them.
"Even though one filter (RAP) was withdrawn, any foreigner is required to take per-mission from the forest department and the administration of the island is protected under two other acts -- protection of aboriginal people and forest acts," the official said.

Asked whether the government may consider to reimpose the RAP in the North Sentinel Island in the wake of this incident, the official said as of now there is no such plan and any decision can be taken only after "due diligence". In a press release issued late Wednesday evening, Anda-man and Nicobar Police chief Dependra Pathak said Chau had enlisted the help of local elec-tronics engineer Alexander and a water sports service provider and hired five fishermen to evade the patrolling teams of police, Coast Guard and Navy to

approach the island.
For this, the local fishermen were paid around Rs 25,000 by Chau.

"They started on November 14 around 8 PM for the North Sentinel Island and reached there by midnight. The next day, Chau moved to shore using his kavak which he got towed with the fishing boat. After dropping him the fishermen fixed their timings and place to meet each other between the shoreline and their high sea fishing area

"In the morning of November 17, they saw a dead person being buried at the shore which from the silhouette of the body, clothing and circumstances ap-peared to be the body of Chau," the release said clearly defining the circumstances leading to Chau's death, almost five days after the incident.

Subsequently, they returned to Port Blair and narrated the incident to Alexander and handed him the 13 pages of the journal written by Chau.

Alexander informed Bobby Parks, a friend of Chau in the US who in turn informed his mother. His mother informed the US Consulate which in turn alerted the police on November 19.

WB Assembly passes bill to enable non-elected person to be appointed Mayor The Amendment to

KOLKATA, NOV 22 (PTI): The West Bengal Assembly Thursday approved a bill which paved the way for appointment of a person as Mayor of Kolkata Municipal Corporation along with the existing provision that only elected person could occupy the chair.

The person, however, after being appointed as Mayor has to get elected as a councillor of KMC within six months of the nom-ination. The Kolkata Municipal Corporation (Second Amendment) Bill, 2018 was intro-duced in the state Assembly by Municipal Affairs minister Firhad Hakim. BJP extended support to the Bill which was passed by the voice vote. The Left Front and Congress MLAs were not present in the House as they had earlier decided to boycott the Assembly.

The existing law allowed only elected members of the Municipal council to occupy the post of the Mayor.

6th Brahmaputra Valley | Make disaster expenses public, MNF leader asks Cong govt

AIZAWL, NOV 22 (PTI): A senior leader of the opposition Mizo National front (MNF) today demanded that the Congress government in the state provide details of expenses to help the people affected by the natural disaster last year.

At least 13 people were killed, 172 domestic animals perished and over 3.000 houses destroyed in the landslides and flood between May and July 2017, Lalhming Liana, a former Rajya Sabha member, said.

Liana also accused Chief Minister Lalthanhawla of ignoring disaster affected people of his own state while sending Rs 2 crore for the flood-hit population of Kerala.

The 14-year-old girl had been sent by her family to work as a help at Bhattacharyya's home owing to abject poverty, Sharma said. Bhattacharyya was charged under the Protection of Children from Sexual Offences (POCSO) Act, 2012.

New Delhi, Nov 22 (PTI): Tamil Nadu Chief Minister K Palaniswami Thursday met Prime Minister Narendra Modi and sought about Rs 15,000 crore as central assistance towards relief and rehabilitation activities in cyclone Gaja-hit districts of the state.

The Prime Minister,

responding to his request, later deputed a central team to assess the cyclone damage and it would arrive in Chennai tomorrow, Palaniswami said.

The chief Minister. who met Modi a week after the cyclone crossed the state coast leaving a trail of destruction in over 10 southern districts, put the toll at 63. "I have submitted a memorandum to the Prime Minister detailing the extent of the damage caused by the cyclone," he told reporters here, adding the state has sought about Rs 15,000 crore.

Palaniswami said he urged the Prime Minister of about Rs 1,500 crore towards "temporary reno-vation" activities.

The Central team will be on a three-day visit to the affected areas and its itinerary will be decided on its arrival in Chennai tomorrow, he added.

To a question on state

said the common objec-tive of all was to ensure people got relief. "It will benefit the peo-

ple if they get it through the Governor," he said.

According to the ab-

stract of the memorandum, the state govern-ment has sought sum of Rs 14,910 crore towards permanent renovation activities, including in the power sector whose infrastructure has been badly hit by the cyclone.

Over one lakh electric poles had been uprooted and a significant number of power sub-stations damaged resulting in disruption of electricity supply in several areas.

The cyclone crossed the state coast early on

November 16 between Nagapattinam and Vedaranyam, about 300 km from Chennai, and later caused damage in several other districts as it moved over interior Tamil Nadu.

The state government has already released Rs 1000 crore for immediate relief and rehabilitation efforts in the affected areas. Palaniswami said a were damaged, while 1.04 lakh heads of cattle and birds perished in the cyclone. Noting that as many as 11.32 lakh trees had been uprooted, he said 7.27 lakh of them have been cleared.
Around 3.78 lakh peo-

ple were lodged in 556 relief camps, even as relief and renovation work was on, he said.

Over 1.03 lakh electric poles were either uprooted or mangled and 40 per cent of them have been repaired.

Supply of electricity and drinking water was being gradually restored, he added.

Recalling the compensation provided to fami eased (Rs 10 lakh each), he said it was more than what the earlier DMK government had given during cyclones in 2008 and 2010. The given DMK had given Rs two lakh, he claimed.

Justice PN Prakash allowed two petitions filed by the management of India Today Tamil Magazine challenging the prosecution proceedings initiated against it before the Principal Sessions Court, Chennai.

reputation of Jayalalithaa, the then Chief Minister."

The judge refused to accept the arguments of public prosecutor A Natarajan that on reading of the entire article, the public could draw an inference that Sengottaiyan was removed from ministership only at the instance of Sasikala and this would amount "Nobody is invited with platters for coming into public life. Therefore, after voluntarily coming into public life, one cannot be heard to feign sensitiveness and trample the press for no good reason.

"This constitutional court

will be failing in its duty if such attempts by the mighty state are not resisted," the judge said in his order last week.

Justice Prakash said even on a reading of the entire article, "the court is not able to draw such an inference as argued by the public prosecutor.

"Further, it is not open to this court to strain the language employed in the article or to read between the lines, for arriving at such an inference.

"That apart, for maintaining a complaint of defamation via section 199 (2) to (4) CrPC, the imputation should be in respect of the conduct of the public servant in the discharge of his public functions.

"The impugned paragraphs extracted from the article only refer to the gaining of influence by Sasikala in the party affairs after a brief period of hibernation and coming back into the party fold," the judge said.

The hosts took a 1-0 lead in the three-match series, which comprise three back-to-back matches in a short span of five days.

Having won seven consecutive bi-lateral T20 series, Kohli and his men will certainly want to make it eight in a row and for that they may be forced to rejig both their batting and bowling combinations.

Bidding for an eighth victory on the bounce now doesn't seem as straightforward a proposition as it looked earlier with the hosts ready to come all guns blazing after their all-round show in the

The Indian batting line-up could see some rejigging in light of KL Rahul's patchy form. Since scoring 101 not out in the first T20I against England at Manchester, Rahul hasn't been able to cross the 30-run mark in next six matches.

The team management has persisted with him at number three, benched Manish Pandey and the skipper demot-ing himself to number four. Consistency is need of the hour from

Rahul, especially considering that he is also set to be a part of India's top-order in the ensuing Test series. The team management could also be tempted to have a re-look at the

bowling attack.

On a grassy surface, Krunal Pandya was plundered for 55 runs in his four wicketless overs and was hit for as many as half a dozen sixes. If the MCG is also of Gabba's nature,

Kohli might be tempted to bring in leg spinner Yuzvendra Chahal, who boasts of a brilliant wicket-taking record in T20Is. Even then, it remains to be seen if the team management rings in any changes after such a close defeat, espe cially when the balance is disturbed. Leaving Pandya out would leave

In the lead-up to the first match, skipper Kohli had spoken about the need to cut down on mistakes and regaining an upper hand at crucial junctures of a game.

At Brisbane, the 'Men in Blue' were found slacking in the field and it proved to be the ultimate difference in a seesawing game.

Even Kohli himself was guilty of

poor effort on the field on at least two ccasions, dropping counterpart Aaron Finch in the fourth over and later involved in a misfielding from the deep. Australia boasts of bigger grounds

than in India, with bigger boundaries of course, and the MCG will prove to be another humongous challenge in that regard. The task is cut out in front of

Trump spars with chief justice over their views of judges

WASHINGTON, Nov 22 (AP): President Donald Trump and Chief Justice John Roberts clashed in an extraordinary public dispute over the independence of America's judi-ciary, with Roberts bluntly rebuking the president for denouncing a judge who rejected his migrant asylum policy as an "Obama judge."

There's no such thing, Roberts declared Wednesday in a strongly worded statement contradicting Trump and defending judi-

cial independence.

Never silent for long,
Trump defended his own comment, tweeting defi-antly, "Sorry Justice Roberts." The pre-Thanksgiving dustup was the first time that Roberts, the Republican-appointed leader of the federal judiciary, has of-fered even a hint of criticism of Trump, who has several times blasted federal judg-es who have ruled against him. Before now, it has been highly unusual for a president to single out judges for personal criticism. And a chief justice's challenge to a president's comments is downright unprecedented in modern times. It seemed a fight that Trump would relish but one that Roberts has taken pains to avoid.

But with Roberts' court feeling the heat over the president's appointment of Justice Brett Kavanaugh, Roberts and several of his colleagues have gone out of their way to rebut perceptions of the court as a political institution divided between five conservative Republicans and four lib-eral Democrats. Trump's appointments to the Supreme Court and lower fed-eral courts have themselves spurred charges that the courts are becoming more politicised. As the justice widely seen as closest to the court's middle, Roberts could determine the outcome of high-profile cases that split the court.

The new drama began with remarks Trump made Tuesday in which he went after a judge who ruled against his migrant asylum order. The president claimed, not for the first time, that the federal appeals court based in San Francisco was biased against him. Roberts had refused to comment on Trump's earlier attacks on judges, including the chief justice himself. But on Wednesday, after a query by The Associated Press, he spoke up for the independence of the federal judiciary and rejected the notion that judges are loyal to the presidents who appoint them. "We do not have Obama judges or Trump judges. Bush judges or Clinton judges. What we have is an extraordinary group of dedicated judges doing their level best to do equal right to those appearing before them," Roberts said.
On the day before

Thanksgiving, he concluded, "The independent judiciary is something we should all be thankful for." Trump hit back from his resort home in Florida, questioning the indepen-dence of federal judges appointed by his predecessor and confirmed by the U.S. Senate. He especially criticized judges on California's 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals.

Greenhouse gas levels in atmosphere hit new high: UN

GENEVA, NOV 22 (AFP): The levels of greenhouse gases in the atmosphere, the main driver of climate change, have hit a new record high, the UN said Thursday, warning that the time to act was running out.

Ahead of the COP 24

climate summit in Poland next month, top United Nations officials are again trying to raise the pressure on govern-ments to meet the pledge of limiting warming to the less than two degrees Celsius, enshrined in the 2015 Paris accord.

"Without rapid cuts in CO2 and other greenhouse gases, climate change will have increasingly destructive and irreversible impacts on life on Earth," the head of the World Meteorological Organisation Petteri Taalas said in a statement.

"The window of opportunity for action is almost closed."

The Greenhouse Gas Bulletin, the UN weather agency's annual flagship report, tracks the content of dangerous gases in the atmosphere since 1750.

This year's report, which covers data for 2017, puts the concentration of CO2 in the atmosphere at 405.5 parts per million (ppm).

That is up from 403.3 ppm in 2016 and 400.1 ppm in 2015. "The last time the

Earth experienced a comparable concentration of CO2 was 3-5 mil-

temperature was 2-3C warmer." Taalas said.

Researchers have re-liable estimates of CO2 concentrations rates going back 800,000 years using air bubbles preserved in ice in Greenland and Antarctica.

But by studying fossilised material the WMO also has rough CO2 estimates going back up to five million years.

In addition to CO2,

the UN agency also highlighted rising levels of methane, nitrous oxide and another power-ful ozone depleting gas known as CFC-11.

Emissions are the main factor that deter-mines the amount of greenhouse gas lev-

rates are a measure of what remains after a series of complex interactions between atmosphere, biosphere, lithosphere, cryosphere and the oceans.

Roughly 25 per cent of all emissions are currently absorbed by the oceans and biosphere -- a term that accounts for all ecosystems on Earth.

The UN's Intergov-ernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) has said that in order to keep warming below 1.5 degrees Celsius, net CO2 emissions must be at net zero, meaning the amount being pumped into the atmosphere must equal the amount being removed, either

Saudi Foreign Minister Adel al-Jubeir said on Wednesday that calls for the crown prince to be held accountable for the grisly killing of Jamal Khashoggi would not be tolerated.

His comments came as the US president praised Saudi Arabia for keeping oil prices low -- one strand of his argument against punishing Riyadh even though the CIA reportedly found strong evidence that the crown prince, the de facto Saudi leader, was involved in the murder.
"In Saudi Arabia our

leadership is a red line. The custodian of the two holy mosques (King Salman) and the crown prince are a red line," Jubeir told the BBC.

But Trump, on holi-day at his Florida Mar-a-Lago Club on Wednes-day, doubled down on a statement from Tuesday that he was essentially ignoring the killing of Khashoggi because of what he said were more important US strategic and commercial interest "Oil prices


