Construction delay in Bhaichung Stadium continues to dismay

BIKASH CHETTRI NAMCHI, 31 JUL:

It has been six years in the making, but Bhaichung Stadium here, which should have flaunted a pitch of artificial turf by now, continues to be overgrown with weeds instead. The project has seen many delays, but now, the Sports & Youth Affairs Department, the executing body for the project, has again reaf-firmed that construction work on the stadium is in progress and assured to complete the stadium by

March next year.
The deadline appears uncertain because there continue to be differences between what the department claims and what the contractor has



It may be recalled that the new stadium was sanctioned by the State government in the years 2012 at a project cost of Rs 33 crore.

Karmapa dispels rumours, says he will return to India

GANGTOK, 31 JUL:

Karmapa Orgyen Trin-ley Dorje has clar-ified that unlike being speculated in some circles, he has no doubts that he will be returning "pretty soon".

The Karmapa, it may be recalled, has been on a lecture tour of USA and while earlier scheduled to return to India latest by end-June, when he ex-tended his stay in the US, it led to speculations that he did not have any plans to returning.

The Karmapa cleared the air on the issue in a recent interview with Radio Free Asia's Tibet News segment. He did let on that

there were some matters that required to be clarified with the Government of India and that talks were currently underway on that front.

The interview quotes

the Karmapa as saying, "Generally, on the issue of whether I would go back to India or not, personally, I have no special doubts or confusion. That's why, earlier it was planned to go back by the end of June.

"Prior to going back to India and that too pretty soon, I thought of having talks with Gov-ernment of India and issue clarifications. It is important because there were a lot of rumours being spread about my stay here in USA. There were even some spreading rumours of me going to Chi-na. Therefore, these were matters requiring clarifications and it was imper

New antigraft law comes into force; bribe givers to get

7-year jail NEW DELHI, JUL 31 (PTI): Bribe givers can now be punished with a jail term of maximum of seven years under a new anti-corruption law that has got assent from President Ram Nath Kovind.

Besides, public ser-vants -- politicians, bureaucrats and bankers among others -- have also been given a 'shield' from prosecution in the legislation that makes it mandatory for investigating agencies such as the CBI to take prior approval from a competent authority before conducting any enquiry against them.

The president gave approval to the Prevention of Corruption (Amendment) Act, 1988, recently, an official order

The central govern ment has decided July 26, 2018, as the date on which the provisions of the Act shall come into force, it said.

"No police officer shall conduct any enquiry or investigation into any offence alleged to have been committed by a public servant under this Act, where the alleged offence is relatable to any recommendation made or decision taken by such public servant in discharge of his official functions or duties, without the previous approv-

al," the order said.

The Act, however, states that such permission shall not be necesfor cases involving on the spot arrest of a person on the charge of accepting or attempting to accept any undue ad-

New Delhi, Jul 31 (PTI): The Lok Sabha today extended the time for the Joint Parliamentary Committee to submit its report on the Citizenship

Amendment Bill.
The committee was been given time till the first day of the last week of the Winter Session to submit its report.

Generally, the Winter Session of Parliament begins in November. The Degins in November. The Citizenship (Amendment) Bill, 2016 was introduced in the Lok Sabha to amend the Citizenship Act, 1955.

The bill seeks to the grant citizenship to people of minority communities such as Hindus, Sikhs Buddhists, Jains, Parsis and Christians, from Af-Bangladesh and Pakistan after six years of residence in India, instead of 12 years even if they do not possess any proper document.

The Lower House today approved a motion seeking extension of the time for presentation of the panel's report up to the "first day of the last week of the Winter Session, 2018".

Theatre & the Distractions of Mass Entertainment

Seeking an audience for the performing arts

The National School of Drama has had a Sikkim campus for some years now. The State now has a handsome repertoire of graduates who boast of some refined skills in all aspects of stage craft. In fact, they now even have a collective which has staged some excellent productions. The theatre artists, those in training and the graduates occasionally put up new plays, entry for which is free. And still, the Mannan Kendra is thinly visited even when the productions are excellent. One would have thought that a people whose only exposure to the arts for a very long time were government-sponsored drab cultural shows would have lapped up the entertainment and joie de vivre that a professionally staged play guarantees. That, unfortunately, did not happen. It is easy to dismiss theatre as a waste of time in these days of instant gratification and 24-hour entertainment channels on TV and dolby digital bollywood experiences in town. But that would be too simplistic.

Theatre has to be seen as an art form, an expression/response of local talent to local issues for the local audience, something that the regular mediums of mass entertainment or information cannot deliver. So, why is that theatre remains near nascent in Sikkim?

The problem is not in the lack of topics or even practitioners, it is the absence of the third aspect cited above that keeps theatre down in Sikkim – the audience; there does not seem to be enough of them. Going by the experience of the several festivals and stand-alone shows held of late in Gangtok, the attendance, save on the inaugural and closing functions, have remained slim and disinterested. Here, one needs to also accept that theatre does not have a history as a cultural activity in Sikkim due to which the audience does not feel a connection to it. This can easily be overcome by staging good theatre and winning over new converts. But that has already been attempted with very limited success.

But this again is the chicken and egg situation – what should come first? It will have to be for the handful of theatre enthusiasts to figure out how Sikkim can be introduced to theatre. This is necessary as much for the creativity it sparks as for the sense of community that a unanimous celebration of the arts and craft can instill. And this is something that theatre, because of its immediacy, has always been synonymous with.

Sikkim has been looked down upon for far too long for its preference of consumerist mores over artistic subtleties, theatre should provide an entertaining way out of this stereotype.

Stuck in Lebanon: a Syrian refugee family's life in limbo

don't remember exactly how Reham and I came to meet on Facebook but do recall how articulate she was, her love for her younger sister Fatima and her quiet desperation for a new life.

Reham is just nine years old, a Syrian refugee living in a small town in the north of Lebanon with her parents and three siblings, the youngest of whom is just eight months old. Her father Abdul told me that the family moved to Lebanon in 2012 when Reham was three and her sister less than one, fleeing the war in Syria that had ripped their world

Until then he had been a construction worker, one of hundreds of thousands of Syrian workers travelling back and forth across the border filling gaps in the Lebanese labour market during the period of reconstruction that followed the end of the civil war in 1990. Six years later, they are still in Lebanon, waiting for the war

to end and a chance to rebuild their lives. He told

"We had a house in Syria. There was a garden where there were friends and a school. Now the war has destroyed everything. Everything was ru ined and our dreams and the dreams of many children were destroyed."

Reham and her family are among an estimated

1.5m Syrian refugees living in Lebanon, around a third of whom are not registered with UNHCR and most of whom have few if any rights. Research that my colleagues and I undertook with Syrians who risked everything, including the lives of their chil-dren, to reach Europe in 2015 shows clearly that the decision to move from Lebanon was often the esult of a deteriorating situation and lack of hope

Three years on and there is evidence from UN-HCR and the World Food Programme that Syrian refugees in Lebanon are more vulnerable than ever, with more than half now living in extreme poverty. As the level of humanitarian aid to support Syrians living in Lebanon has declined, so too has their quality of life, with regular reports of fires ripping through the makeshift tents and a lack of basic ser-vices including water supplies, latrines and drains. Those who are able to find work report low wages and persistent racism and discrimination. In October 2017, the food rations on which Abdul and his family depended were cut off due to a lack of

funding.

But it is the situation for the children, and in particular the lack of access to education for Re-

ham and Fatima, that the family finds most intolerable. An estimated 280,000 Syrian children are out of school in Lebanon and some have never set foot in a classroom. Some families need children to work to supplement the household's very limited income. Others, almost always girls, are forced into early marriages to secure the child's economic future. For Abdul it is the costs of transportation that are the biggest problem:

"We have big issues with transport for school

every day. The school is very far away from our house and it costs a lot of money. I do not have enough money to send them to school."

STUCK IN LIMBO

Like thousands of other Syrians, Abdul and his family are stuck in limbo, unable to rebuild their lives in Lebanon or return to Syria, and with few options for the future.

While some Lebanese have shown solidarity with refugees, there are growing tensions over re-sources and jobs. Even as the conflict in Syria continues, Lebanese politicians have become increasingly vocal since 2017 in calling for the refugees to go home. Since 2016, some municipalities have forcibly evicted Syrian refugees from their homes. Growing numbers of those living in Lebanon worry that they will be forced to return to a war zone.

Meanwhile, EU efforts to prevent Syrian refugees travelling onward to Europe have been in-creasingly effective. The EU-Turkey deal in March 2016, together with the closure of the Macedonian border, made it increasingly difficult for Syrians and others to seek international protection in the EU, effectively trapping tens of thousands of people in Greece. Despite efforts to increase legal routes and reduce the dangers of onward migration across the sea, UNHCR estimates for the number of Syrian refugees in need of re-settlement vastly exceed the number of places available.

Abdul's efforts to find a long-term solution to his family's situation have been fruitless to date. Reham's grandparents lived with the family in Syria and again in Lebanon before they were resettled to Norway in 2015. Reham's uncle lives in the Netherlands. Neither consti-tute sufficiently close family connections to make them eligible for family reunification. Abdul says he went to the refugee commission in Lebanon many times, but is still waiting for an answer on whether the family can be resettled. **LIMITED OPTIONS**

Abdul's messages to me are full of frustration and despair. He pleads with me to find an organisation that can help

him to get out of Lebanon with his family.
"I love my children, I just want to provide
a decent life for them," he says. "I just want them
to be safe." His fear of what might happen to his
children in Lebanon drives his thoughts about the
future. He tells me that he is prepared to go to any country and hints that he will do whatever it takes to achieve this objective.

But Abdul's options are limited.

Even as the situation deteriorates in Lebanon there's a lack of safe and legal routes to enable Syri ans and other refugees to access the rights to which they and their children are entitled under interna-tional law. There are, however, some new and potentially significant initiatives which could change all that, providing a lifeline for children such as Re ham and her sister.

Most notable among these is the Humanitarian Corridors initiative. Launched in 2016 and operating with full cooperation from the Italian government without being state funded, it offers vulnerable refugees the possibility of safe and legal access to protection in Italy and in so doing both widens and deepens the concept of protection. To date, the numbers benefiting have been relatively small, around 1,000 people in total, but for Abdul it

remains a possibility worth pursuing. Reham is less sure. "I don't want to go to Italy," she says. "I want to go to Norway so I can be with my grandparents. I miss them so much. I just want to see them and be in their arms."

It's hard to know what will happen next for this family or thousands like them. The world, it seems, has long stopped caring.

Surrogacy may have become a popular way for many couples in the limelight to have children – notably Kim and Kanye, Elton John and David Furnish, as well as Sarah Jessica Parker and her husband Matthew Broderick. But it isn't just a ser-

vice for the rich and famous.

People may choose to use a surrogate for all sorts of reasons – fertility issues being the obvious one – but people with health problems or complications with previous pregnancies as well as same-sex couples or single people looking to start a family, are all also common clients.

In the UK, altruistic (unpaid) surrogacy is legal, but commercial (paid) surrogacy is not. At present, however, Britons are

ty is not. At present, however, British are the largest consumers of the Indian com-mercial surrogacy industry. Surrogacy is reported to bring in US\$400m every year to the Indian econo-my. But the Indian market has come under fire for being exploitative. Indian surrogate mothers are typically poor, and are paid around £4,500 to carry a foetus to

The industry is also unregulated. This gives surrogacy clinics a large amount of power and control over the process. Many surrogates are required to live in surroga-cy hostels, run by clinics, for the duration of their pregnancy – away from friends and family members.

A CHANGE IN THE LAW

India is in the process of outlawing commercial surrogacy in favour of an altruistic model, available to Indian nationals only. And surrogacy laws in the UK may also be set to change.

The Law Commissions of England and Wales, and Scotland, recently commenced a three-year project to review and recommend improvements to surrogacy arrangements in the UK. One key area targeted for reform is the way in which uncertainty in the law may be encouraging UK women to look overseas for surrogates.

It may not be enough for countries to amend their laws in isolation. Improvements of national laws are of course welcome, but a collective international re-

sponse is preferable. This is because, even if the Indian bill passes – and the UK maintains its altruistic approach - this does not fix the problem.

Surrogacy agencies in India and elsewhere could make use of loopholes that exist in the law. Eggs, sperm, embryos, surrogates and intended parents could simply be moved across borders to countries where commercial surrogacy is not banned. What's more, when one industry closes, another one can easily open else

where. This is the case in Ukraine, which is fast becoming a surrogacy hot spot now that other countries have banned the

DEFINING INFERTILITY

Another factor to consider in all of this, is the World Health Organisation's proposal to change the definition of infertility. This would move it away from a clinical disease-based definition – where it is viewed as a disability - to a view that includes a

more social definition, recognising it as a "right to reproduce".

Under the new definition, infertility would no longer be seen as "the failure to achieve a clinical pregnancy after 12 months or more of regular unprotected sexual intercourse". Rather, it would also be considered to include cases when "single men and women without medical isdo not have children but want to become a parent'

As yet, the proposed definition has not

been officially adopted by the WHO. In fact, the WHO has stated that it will retain a clinical focus and refrain from making recommendations about fertility service provision – even if there were to be a change to its definition.

Hypothetically, the result of this change

would mean that those who fall under the would mean that those who fall under the new social account of infertility could also receive access to reproductive services. On the one hand, this is a progressive move—why shouldn't single men and women and same-sex couples receive help to become parents?

But on the other hand, there are con-cerns that the expanded definition ignores the gender dynamics inherent to the provision of reproductive services.

A RIGHT TO A WOMB

Any change in the law needs to recognise that it is women's bodies alone that can perform this "service". In the case of male gay couples, who cannot carry a foetus themselves, women's bodies will be necessarily in order to treat a couple's infertility. This could be either through international paid surrogacy, or the domestic altruistic

If this definition does take hold, there may well be an increase in the demand for surrogacy services and the further liberalisation of surrogacy laws to cater for this demand. Expanding access to reproduc-tive services could lead to an increase in exploitation, health risks and the further commodification of women's bodies. And without proper acknowledgement that it is women who will carry out the labour involved in gestating a child, a key ethical concern is neglected.

This is why there needs to be an inter-

national consensus on surrogacy – and a joined-up approach to the law. There may well be difficulties in getting people from different places, cultures or backgrounds to agree the demand for and effects of current surrogacy practices, but surrogacy deserves a global conversation.

(PTI): A major insurance by Nepal's trekking and mountaineering agencies has been un earthed after a govern-ment probe found that they were involved in fake helicopter rescues were involved in and hospital treatment of foreign tourists, according to a media report.

A government fact-finding committee in its 700-page probe report to Tourism Minister Rabindra Adhikari said that unscrupulous operators have been pocketing thousands of dollars from insurance companies by making multiple claims for a single chopper ride or pushing trekkers to agree to airlifts for minor illnesses, the Kathmandu Post reported.

There were widespread complaints that Nepal's trekking and mountaineering agencies had been making claims against their customers' tourist insurance policies for fake helicopter rescues.

They have been accused of presenting fake bills for wide-ranging medical examinations for simple altitude-related

As many helicopter operators do not duct rescue operations directly, "middlemen" or trekking and mountaineering agencies arrange helicopter rescues and make fake private clinic bills on which they get a hefty commission, the daily quoted a member of the fact-finding panel as saying.

Making false trav-

Insurance scam by Nepal's trekking,

insurance sickness claims when you are not ill is fraud, and there are many agencies involved in the illegal business in Nepal, the unnamed official was quoted as saying.

Trekking companies get hefty kickbacks when hikers are evacuated from the mountains.

The committee said

in its report that there have been widespread complaints of dishonest companies serving adul-terated food to make tourists sick so that they can be evacuated by he licopter, and they can receive commissions from helicopter and hospitals and clinics.

The probe committee recommended that from the next tourist season in September-November all rescue activities be entrusted to the Nepal Police to stop the insurance scam that has damaged the country's reputation.

'We are concerned by the bogus helicopter res-cues and false medical insurance claims. In order to stop such offences, we have decided to entrust all tourist rescue-related tasks to the Nepal Police, Tourism Krishna Prasad Devkota.

We will prepare a working guideline related to the rescue operation and implement it from the autumn season, he said.

The fact-finding committee said that it had formed its recommendations after studying res-cue operations in France, Switzerland. Scotland and Canada

Photographic history of a place cannot be rewritten: Raghu Rai

KOLKATA, JUL 31 (PTI): History can be written and re-written but 'photo his-tory' of a city or its people cannot ever be re-written, eminent photographer Raghu Rai has said.

Inaugurating an exhibition featuring digital reproductions of 96 gelatin silver photographic prints from the collection of the Victoria Memorial Hall, Rai said, "...history is written and it is being re-written now. We all know that.

"But this photo history cannot be re-written. These images left by our great masters are like our culture and heritage."

The exhibition titled 'Frozen in Time: Late 19th and Early 20th Century Photographs of Cal-cutta and its Neighbouring Areas' will continue

till September 1.
Ninety-six digitally restored photographs taken from the collection of Bourne and Shepherd and Johnston and Hoffmann and later in the possession of Victoria Memorial are on display at the exhibition.

Bourne and Shepherd

was the largest commercial studio in the city during British rule while



Johnston and Hoffmann was the second largest commercial studio.

"They are exhibiting something so precious.

Photography today is the art of tomorrow. It is something very unique for us." Rai said.

The digitally repro-duced black and white photographs were taken from negatives of pic-tures clicked between 1860 and 1930.

The photographs offer glimpses of the Esplanade Mansion, the old Howrah bridge, a view near Kalighat temple, Durga Puja procession, view of Gov-ernment Place East with Great Eastern Hotel seen from a distance in the early 1880s, a view of Chowringhee Road from the then Ochterlony Monument.

After viewing the exhibits, Rai said, "The photos show how things were and how crowded and chaotic things have

and chaotic things have become today."

Differentiating be-tween paintings of old Kolkata and photographs of that time, Rai said if one imagines a mood shot of Chowringhee Square by great painters such as Hussein, Satish Gujral or Jamini Roy, it is described as good or wonderful.

"But when you see se old photographs taken 150-160 years ago,

the response is totally different. The first thing that comes to your mind is -- Oh my God' that's the way it used to be.'

Ibrahimovic joins Ronaldo in skipping MLS All-Star Game

ATLANTA, JUL 31 (AP): The MLS All-Star Game will feature one of the world's most storied clubs.

Unfortunately for the more than 70.000 fans expected at Mercedes-Benz Stadium, Cristiano Ronaldo is not along for the ride.

After Portugal's

elimination from the World Cup and his transfer from Real Madrid, the five-time FIFA Player of the Year took time off rather than accompany Juventus on its American preseason tour, which includes tomorrow's night's game against top players from Major League Soccer.

The decision will surely be a disappointment to the big crowd that had hoped Ronaldo would make his unofficial debut while touring the United States with the Italian club that has won seven straight Serie A championships.

Juventus acquired the 33-year-old from Real Ma-drid on July 10 in a deal his new club said was worth USD 131.5 million the largest for a player older than 30.

Also sitting out the US tour, which includes three



other exhibitions, is Argentine striker Gonzalo Higuain. He is coming off a scoreless World Cup in which he didn't start in the round of 16 loss to eventual champion France.

"Obviously these guys are world-class players," said Atgoalkeeper for the MLS team.

"With or without them, it

will be a difficult game. But their names alone bring a lot of attention. It's a shame for everybody on the outside. For me, personally, hopefully it makes for an easier night."

Most players take three weeks off after the World Cup. Juventus opens its Serie A schedule at Chievo Verona the weekend of Aug. 18-20.

"We are sorry not to have the Ronaldo, and Higuain as well," Juventus coach Massi-miliano Allegri said through a translator.

"Unfortunately, they played in the World Cup. They needed some days to rest." Ronaldo and Higuain won't be the only big names missing from the game

One of MLS' top new stars, LA Galaxy forward Zlayesterday that he's skipping the All-Star match rather than make a cross-country trip to Atlanta.

The 36-year-old Swede cited the grind of playing three matches in an eightday span, including Sunday night's 4-3 victory over Orlando City in which he scored his first MLS hat trick.

Ibrahimovic ranks sec-ond in MLS with 15 goals. He played with Juventus from 2004-06.

"I am disappointed to miss the 2018 All-Star game against Juventus, one of my former clubs," Ibrahimovic said in a statement.

"I want to thank the fans for voting me to the team. My main focus is to score goals and help the LA Galaxy to the

The Galaxy (10-7-5) are unbeaten in nine games and have climbed to third place in the Western Conference.

Per MLS rules, Ibrahimov ic will also have to sit out LA's next match Saturday against Colorado, one of the league's

orst teams. New York City forward David Villa also will skip the All-Star Game after missing six matches with a knee in-

jury.
Ibrahimovic and Villa were replaced on the MLS roster by Minnesota forward Darwin Quintero and New York Red Bulls midfielder Tyler Adams.

Atlanta United coach Gerardo Martino, who will be guiding the MLS team, said the timing of the game does pose problems.

"In reality, I recognise it's a little bit of a challenge for coaches who have players participating," Martino said through an interpreter.

"Some players are coming from teams where they've played three games (in the last week). Some had a long trip to get here, like from Vancouver. I understand it's a very beautiful spectacle for the league and the United States. But I think what we have to look at in the future is to have it at a different time, either before or after the sea-

"We have to make sure

the players arriving here in good condition are also returning to their teams in good condition."

But MLS is eager to show off its most compelling suc-

cess story.
Atlanta shattered the MLS attendance record in its debut season, averaging 48,200 per game, and is on pace to break that mark this year at nearly 52,000 per game. The club already has the five biggest stand-alone crowds in MLS history each more than 70,000 at Mercedes-Benz Stadium.

Neymar under fire after World Cup 'mea culpa' advert

Neymar's decision to use a sponsored advert to admit he sometimes over-react-ed to fouls at the World Cup has backfired, with Brazilian marketing experts saying it had made the Paris Saint-Germain striker's image even worse.

Under the title 'A New Man Every Day, Sunday's video was backed by personal care products maker Gillette and broadcast on several Brazilian TV networks. "You

ou may exaggerate. sometimes I do exaggerate. But the truth is I suffer on the pitch," Neymar said in the advert, referring to the constant fouls he received at the World Cup.

"I took long to accept your criticism. I took long to look at $myself in \ the \ mirror \ and \ become$ a new man."

Brazil was knocked out by Belgium in the World Cup quarterfinals earlier this month.

Marketing specialists said the advert damaged the 26-yearold player's brand as much as his histrionics did in Russia.

"The whole market waited 15 days since the end of the World Cup to hear from him," Amir Somoggi, a partner at marketing company Sports Value, told The Associated Press.

"He gave some interviews,



but did not admit his exaggerations then. Now he has hidden behind a TV commercial to do that. This was great for the sponsor, after all we are talking about the brand. But it was not good for Nevmar, who now has an even bigger image crisis to handle

Sports marketing consultant Erich Beting believes the timing of the advert was a mistake.

"Neymar's problems happened on the pitch, and he will not play tomorrow to show he has changed, as the ad says. That fact, and his decision to pick an ad to do it, will make it all sound empty. It will be weeks until he has a chance to show any real improvement," Beting said.

Colagrossi, another

sports marketing

"It would be different if he really meant it, in a live press conference, looking eye to eye and not in a sponsored video," he said. It is not the first time handle an image crisis.

In 2011, he was criticised constant misbehavior and he used an advert sponsored by phone carrier Nextel to address

"You cursed at me when I made mistakes, you screamed when I didn't listen," he said in the ad. "You know who I am. Only another happy boy playing

Now, some of the criticism

for the image crisis is aimed at Neymar da Silva Santos, his father and the man who manages his ca reer.

Ricardo Fort, who heads global sponsorship deals at Coca-Cola, said the Brazil striker needs to take control of his career.

"After this World Cup,

who thinks of Neymar thinks of theatrics, faking. These are attributes that no brand wants to get associ-ated with," Fort wrote in an open letter to the player in Monday's edition of magazine Meio & Mensagem.

"It is time for you to hire a professional to take care of your career. You are too valuable to be treated like that"

Asked to comment on the negativity, Neymar's staff di-rected the Associated Press to Procter & Gamble, owners of Gillette. The company did not discuss the criticism of the player, or the ad.

"Like many others, Neymar Jr. faces challenges, injuries and defeats, and the objective of Gillette is to encourage every man, with no distinction, to reflect on the opportunity of becoming a new man every day," the company said in a statement. The firm also denied a report by newspaper O Globo saying the striker was paid about USD 250,000 for the ad.

India eye perfect start to English summer in home team's 1000th Test

BIRMINGHAM, JUL 31 (PTI): India would be driven by the desire to shed the poor travellers' tag, while England would be desperate to arrest the recent slide at home when the two teams clash in a five-match Test series, starting here tomorrow.

The English side will be celebrating its 1000th Test at Edgbaston, and it will be up to world No.1 India to spoil the home party.

India last won a Test series in England in 2007 under Rahul Dravid, and it will be no easy task ahead of the Virat Kohliled side to duplicate that feat. Under

Mahendra Singh Dhoni, India failed in 2011 and 2014, losing by heavy 4-0 and 3-1 margins, respectively. In fact, India have only won six out of the 57 matches on English soil.

England's Test form coming into this series is also a cause of concern. Since September 2017, England have only won one out of nine Tests against Australia, New Zealand and Pakistan.

They have been beathome Tests by West In-

dies and Pakistan, with both sides' pace attack exploiting the weaknesses in a batting line-up heavily dependent on Root, Jonny Bairstow and seasoned opener Alastair Cook.

The visitors, meanwhile, will be buoyed by the fact that three out of their six wins here have come since 2002. India's assistant coach Sanjay Bangar was part of the Test squad as Sourav Ganguly's team won at

Leeds.
Wicket keeper Dinesh Karthik was part of the 2007 series-winning squad. Skipper Virat Kohli and Ishant Sharma toured here in 2011 and 2014 and seven other players in the current side have also featured during that last trip.

But India's record at Edgbaston is exception-ally poor with five losses in six Tests here stretching back to 1967.

The visitors pick an optimal playing eleven and avoid the mistakes made on their previous overseas trip to South Africa. There, the team management had backed an in-form Rohit Sharma over Ajinkya Ra-

Teams which get the first three positions in each venue of the league, would be entitled to cash prizes of Rs 5 lakh, 3 lakh and one lakh

Besides, each of the teams that qualify for

the league would be entitled for a bonus of Rs The CBL champion would get a prize mon-

ev of Rs 25 lakh, while the Runner up would get Rs 15 lakh and the second runner up Rs 10 lakh.

The league would commence with the Nehru Boat Trophy on Punnamada Lake in Alappuzha on August 11.

It would be followed by Pulinkunnu (Aug 18), Karuvatta (August 28), Kottapuram (September 1), Thazhathangadi (September 8), Poothotta (September 15), Piravom (September 22), Kainakari (September 29), Kavanattinkara (October 6), Mavelikkara (October 13), Kayamkulam (October 20), Kallada (October

27), and Kollam (November 1).

The tourism department is hoping that at least 5000 to 1000 people would visit each of the 13 races during the three month period. "The rainy season is a lean period. We

wanted a product to sustain tourism for threemonths and whoever visits the state should get an opportunity to see at least one boat race," Tourism director, P Bala Kiran, told

India welcomes US' move to ease export controls for high-tech product sales to it

New Delhi, Jul 31 (PTI): India today welcomed the US' decision to ease export controls for high technology product sales to it, saying the move will further boost collaboration between the two countries in defence and certain other areas.

The Trump administration announced yesterday granting India the status of Strategic Trade Authorization-1 (STA-1) country, the only South Asian nation to be given the designation along with the US' NATO allies like South Korea, Australia and Japan.



Spokesperson in the Ministry of External Affairs Raveesh Kumar called Washington's decision a logical culmination to India's designation as a major defence partner of the US and a "reaffirmation" of its "impeccable record" as a re-

sponsible member of the concerned multilateral export control regimes.

The STA-1 status will help India getting critical technology from the US in the defence and certain other key areas.

"We welcome the announcement made by US Secretary of Commerce Wilbur Ross in the Indo-Pacific Business Forum on July 30 about the US government's decision to move India into Tier-1 of the Department of Commerce's Strategic Trade Authorisation license exception," Kumar said.

He said the step will further facilitate India-US trade and technology collaboration in defence and high technology areas adding."We look forward to the US side operationalising the decision at an early date."

In June 2016, the US had designated India as

"Major Defence Partner" intending to elevate defence trade and technology sharing with India to a level commensurate with that of its closest allies and partners.

Announcing the decision to granting India STA-1 status, Ross yesterday said it was "a very important change" in India's status in the export control regime.

The designation authorises the export, re-export and transfer (in-country) of specified items on the Commerce Control List (CCL) to destinations posing a low

risk of unauthorised or impermissible uses.

Currently there are 36 countries on the STA-1 list. Till recently India was designated as STA-2 countries, along with seven others. The STA-1 status, Ross said, provides India with greater supply chain conditions for defence and other high-tech products.

The decision by the US comes over a month before the talks between India's foreign and defence ministers with their US counterparts here under the framework of the '2+2' dialogue.



Former Trump campaign chief goes on trial for bank and tax fraud

WASHINGTON, JUL 31 (AFP): Donald Trump's former campaign chief Paul Manafort today becomes the first member of the president's election team to face trial on charges stemming from the probe into Russian interference in the 2016

vote.

Manafort, 69, has pleaded not guilty to 18 counts of bank and tax fraud related to his lobbying activities on behalf of the former Russian-backed government of Ukraine.

The indictment was

brought by special counsel Robert Mueller, the former FBI director who is looking into Russian meddling in the presidential election, but the charges are not connected to Manafort's time as Trump's campaign chairman.

Selection of a 12-member jury for "USA vs Manafort" begins at 10:00 am (1400 GMT) on Tuesday before US District Court Judge T.S. Ellis in Alexandria, Virginia. The trial is expected to last about three weeks.

Manafort, a veteran Republican political consultant, served as chairman of Trump's presidential election campaign for three months in 2016 before being forced to step down amid questions about his lobbying work in Ukraine.

He is charged with five counts of filing false tax returns for not reporting bank accounts he held in Cyprus and other countries in a bid to hide millions of dollars in income from activities on behalf of Ukraine's former pro-Russian leader Viktor Yanukovych.

Viktor Yanukovych.

Manafort is charged with failing to report the existence of foreign bank accounts to the Internal Revenue Service and bank fraud related to several multi-million-dollar loans he obtained from various banks.

Prosecutors plan to produce nearly three dozen witnesses during the trial, including Manafort's former associate Richard Gates, who is cooperating with the government after pleading guilty to lesser charges in February.

Five witnesses have been granted immunity from prosecution to testify against Manafort.

Mueller has indicted a total of 32 people so far in connection with his probe into whether any members of Trump's election campaign colluded with Russia to help get the New York real estate tycoon into the White House.



Malaysia's civil aviation chief quits over Flight 370 lapses

KUALA LUMPUR, JUL 31 (AP): Malaysia's civil aviation chief said today he has resigned to take responsibility after an independent investigative report highlighted shortcomings in the air traffic control center during Flight 370's disappearance four years ago.

The report released yesterday raised the possibility that the jet may have been hijacked even though there was no conclusive evidence of why the plane went off course and flew for over seven hours after severing communications.

Azharuddin Abdul
Rahman said the report
didn't blame the civil aviation department for the
plane's loss but found
that the Kuala Lumpur
air traffic control center
failed to comply with operating procedures.

"Therefore, it is with

"Therefore, it is with regret and after much thought and contemplation that I have decided to resign as Chairman of Civil Aviation Authority of Malaysia," he said in his statement, adding he has served his resignation and will step down in two weeks.

The jet carrying 239 people from Kuala Lumpur to Beijing vanished March 8, 2014, and is presumed to have crashed in the far southern Indian Ocean. The investigative report, prepared by a 19-member international team, said the cause of the disappearance cannot be determined until the wreckage and the plane's black boxes are found.

However, the report said the investigation showed lapses by air traffic control, including a failure to swiftly initiate an emergency response and monitor radar continuously, relying too much on information from Malaysia Airlines and not getting in touch

with the military for help.

More than 500 hikers evacuated from Indonesian volcano

MATARAM, JUL 31 (AFP): More than 500 hikers and their guides have been successfully evacuated from an Indonesian volcano after a deadly earthquake triggered landslides that trapped them on the mountain, officials said today.

Tonnes of rock and mud were dislodged on Mount Rinjani in the 6.4-magnitude quake, which struck early Sunday and was followed by scores of aftershocks, blocking the hiking routes that crisscross the mountain.

An estimated 560 stranded trekkers were thought to have included citizens from the United States, France, the Netherlands, Thailand and Germany, as well as many other countries, according to search and rescue officials.

"543 hikers have been evacuated -- they arrived last night," national disaster agency spokesman Sutopo Purwo Nugroho



"There are now six people left... They are all healthy and safe." Hikers were able to start descending the mountain Monday after guides discovered an alternate route that was unaffected by the landslides.

Most of the trekkers reached the base of the mountain by late Monday evening, according to I Gusti Lanang Wiswananda, a spokesman for Mataram search and rescue agency.

"They were all tired, but in good condition and were checked by our medical teams on the ground upon arrival," he told AFP.

Hundreds of other hikers managed to get off the mountain on Sunday, according to officials.

on Sunday, according to officials.
At least 16 people were killed in the earthquake across affected areas of Lombok,

while hundreds of buildings were destroyed including a health clinic.

The quake created panic on the holiday island and sent locals and tourists running outside their homes and hotels.

Helicopters and search teams were deployed to scour the volcano's slopes and drop food supplies for those stranded on the mountain.

Imran Khan's PTI considering inviting Modi for his oath ceremony

LAHORE, JUL 31 (PTI): Imran Khan's Pakistan Tehreek-i-Insaf is considering inviting the leaders of the SAARC countries including Prime Minister Narendra Modi to his oath taking ceremony as the premier next month, a party official said today.

The PTI, led by 65-year-old Khan, has emerged as the single largest party in the National Assembly after the July 25 elections, but it is still short of numbers to form the government on its own. Khan yesterday said that he would take oath as prime minister on August 11.

"The core committee of Tehreek-i-Insaf is considering inviting the South Asian Association for Regional Cooperation (SAARC) heads including Mr Modi and a decision on this is expected shortly," a leader of Khan's party told PTI.

He also termed Modi's telephone call to Khan on his victory in the 2018 polls a welcoming sign to begin a new chapter in relations between the two countries.

Spokesperson for Khan's party

Fawad Chaudhry also did not rule out inviting Modi to the swearing in ceremony.

"A decision about it will be taken by the party in consultation with the foreign ministry in coming days," he said.

Modi yesterday telephoned Khan to congratulate him on his party's victory in the general elections and hoped that "Pakistan and India will work to open a new chapter in bilateral ties".

Khan thanked Modi for his wishes and emphasised that disputes should be resolved through dialogue.



"Wars and bloodshed instead of resolving disputes lead to tragedies," Khan had said.

Khan in his victory speech had also said that better relations between Pakistan and India would be "good for all of us".


"If India's leadership is ready, we are ready to improve ties with India. If you take on step forward we will take two steps forward," he had said.

I am doing it for my co-actors, unless it is something like 'Trapped'. Acting for me is giving to your co-actors," Rao told PTI in an interview.

Not insecurities, but nervousness does trouble the 33-year-old actor at times

There are times when I do feel very nervous when I start a film. And I feel very nervous before the release. I do get stuck in some scenes but that's very natural and human. It happens to all the artistes in the world," he

Rao believes the change in the definition of a "hero" in Hindi cinema has opened a lot of avenues for actors like him and he credits writers, new age directors and audiences for this shift.

"They are the ones who are writing such characters and audiences are interested in watching them. People are falling in love with characters now and that is why writers are creating such stories. I am really happy that such stories are getting prominence.



"That is the reason why actors like me are getting the chances to portray great characters on-screen. I think it's the relatability factor which works between me and the audiences. I am one of them. They connect with me as they see a part of them

in me," he says.

The actor is currently one of the busiest stars in the film industry with films like "Fan-ney Khan", "Stree", "5 Wed-dings", "Ek Ladki Ko Dekha Toh Aisa Laga" in his kitty, but he does not mind switching from one set to the other.

"It is hectic. But as long as am enjoying what I am doing and I am getting different parts to play I have no com-plains. It is definitely manageable and practically possible. I am getting the chance to work on some amazing stories and I will keep doing it.

"People like Anil sir (Anil Kapoor), Amit ji (Amitabh Bachchan) inspire me to keep moving forward and apart from that, the fact that I love my job as an actor keeps

pushing me ahead. I never had a plan B. I honestly want-ed to be an actor and dedicate

my life to movies," Rao says. The actor is excited about his upcoming film, "Fanney Khan", which also features Kapoor, Aishwarya Rai Bach-chan, Pihu Sand and Divya

Rao says the film, directed by debutant Atul Manjrekar, is an important story which needs to be told.

"It is a great story and I loved my part. It was very exciting to work with Anil sir and Aishwarva. It was a fascinating experience.
"My whole romantic side

with Aishwarva was really fun. It was great. My character is in awe of her in the film. And I am in awe of her in real-life. It was a very weird combination.
