India conveyed to Karmapa its readiness to issue him visa; he is yet to apply: sources

New DELHI, DEC 27 (PTI): India has conveyed to Karmapa Ogyen Trinley Dorje, considered the most influential Tibetan religious leader after the Dalai Lama, on multiple occasions that it was ready to give him a visa on his newly acquired passport of Commonwealth of Dominica, sources said Thursday.

However, the Karmapa, who is understood to be in the US, is yet to approach the Indian authorities for visa. Sources strongly rejected reports that he was not being able to come to India as he was not given a visa. [Interesting though that this is not being confirmed on record.]

The influential Buddhist religious leader came to India in 2000 after his dramatic escape from Tibet. He was

around 14 years old then.
The Karmapa has not approached India for a visa though he has been saying that he wants to come to India, the sourc-

The religious leader of the Karma Kagyu sect, who was living in India as a Tibetan refugee, picked up a passport of the Commonwealth of Dominica in March, a

He had reportedly left India in May last year on a three-month visa.

The sources said he has not yet conveyed to India about his Dominica passport and that it was time and again communicated to him that India was ready to issue him visa.

They said India never refused his request for travelling abroad and that every time he wished to go to any coun-

try, he was allowed.

Sources said there was no issue relating to the identity certificate as the condition for the issuance of the docu-

They said "explicit instructions" were issued to Indian consulates in the US about grant of visa to the Karmapa.

At present, around 1.8 lakh Tibetan refugees are living in India.

Asked whether India was ready to give him multiple-entry visa, the sources evaded a direct reply.

Now, after receiving the NOC from MoEF, after five years since applying for the same, work has progressed on a fast clip.

Chit fund company managing director sentenced to 5 yrs RI

BERHAMPUR (ODISHA), DEC 27 (PTI): The managing director of a chit fund company in Odisha's Ganjam district was sentenced to rigorous imprisonment for five years by a special court here Thursday for duping investors.

The judge of the designated court handling chit fund cases, Dipti Ranjan Kanunngo also convicted six others associated with the company -- SS Credit Cooperative Private Limited -- and pronounced two years jail term for each of them.

The court also slapped a fine of Rs 11.5 lakh on the company's managing director Santosh Kumar Tiwadi and Rs 2 lakh each on six others.

The convicted in the case included the company's directors Soudamini Tripathy, Sekhar Suman Tripathy, partners P Sanjeev Patra and T Rajiv Patra and two agents - Sushant Satapathy and Kuna Behera.

The court sentenced all the seven accused persons holding them guilty under the Odisha Protection of Interest of Depositors (OPID) Act after examining at least 24 witnesses, special public prosecutor Bijay Kumar Pradhan said.

Tiwadi had collected around Rs 50 lakh from at least 43 people in the area with assurances of giving them double the amount of their deposits, police said.

As the ponzi scheme company did not refund the money to the depositors, one of them had lodged an FIR with police at Buguda on December 5, 2014, police added.

"We have started



Lok Sabha passes Triple Talaq bill, Opposition walks out

NEW DELHI, DEC 27 (PTI): Lok Sabha Thursday passed the bill which criminalises the practice of instant triple talaq, with the government rejecting the contention that it was aimed at targeting a particular source.

The opposition, which had been demanding that the bill be referred to a 'joint select committee' staged a walkout when its demand was rejected by the government.

The Muslim Women (Protection of Rights on Marriage) Bill 2018 was passed by the Lower House with 245 voting in favour and 11 opposing the legislation.

The bill will now go to

Rajya Sabha for approval.
Piloting the bill, Law
Minister Ravi Shankar
Prasad said that there

should be no politics on the bill, stressing that it was not against any particular community.

"Don't weigh the bill on the scales of politics.

He regretted that opposition parties were creating hurdles in its passage due to "vote bank politics".

The Bill to make the practice of triple talaq among Muslims a penal offence was introduced in Lok Sabha on December 17 to replace an ordinance issued in September.

Under the proposed law, giving instant triple talaq will be illegal and void, and will attract a

jail term of three year for the husband.

In view of the opposition by some parties in the upper house, the government had then cleared some amendments, including introduction of a provision of bail, to make it more acceptable.

Congress, TMC, AIAD-

Congress, TMC, AIAD-MK and RJD staged walkout soon after Prasad concluded his reply. Several amendments moved by opposition were negated by a division that was insisted by opposition members.

Responding to demand of opposition parties, including the Congress and the Trinamool Congress, that the bill be sent to a select committee for study, Prasad said the government has already taken note of concerns expressed by members earlier and amended the bill accordingly.

Prasad said the bill has made the offence compoundable, meaning that the case can be withdrawn if the man and his estranged wife reach a compromise, and that only the wife and her close relatives can file an FIR, ruling out the law's misuse.

He said as many as 477 cases of triple talaq have been reported since January 2017 and cited a case where a professor gave talaq to his wife over Whatsapp.

Whereas another muslim man gave talaq to his wife for attending the Prime Minister Narendra Modi's rally, the Union Law minister said, urging if the House unitedly can pass a bill for capital punishment for rape of girls below age of 12 years, then why not this legislation.

Party in Lok Sabha, Mal-

likarjun Kharge said that bill was against the spirit of the Constitution and has violated several articles dealing with the rights of individuals.

Congress MP Sushmita Dev said the real purpose of the bill was not to empower Muslim women but to "penalise" Muslim men.

Demanding that the bill be referred to the joint select committee of Parliament, Dev said criminalisation of triple talaq goes against the Supreme Court verdict.

AIADMK leader

Venugopal, TMC's Sudip Bandhopadhyay, AIMIM's Assaduddin Owaisi and Supriya Sule (NCP) also made similar demands. Union minister Smriti

Union minister Smritt Irani said if Parliament can enact laws to ban dowry and the practice of sati, it can also approve the bill to ban instant triple talaq.

Defending the penal provisions in the bill, Union Minister Mukhtar Abbas Naqvi said it was important to instil fear in the minds of those still practising it and rejected suggestions that it was against any religion.



Empowered Women

Since they vote more, shouldn't they be listened to more as well?

The 50/50 power-sharing arrangement between the sexes has been instituted in Sikkim at the panchayat and urban local body levels, with even the top posts being equally apportioned between the men and women. Just as the 50% seat reservation for women in Sikkim panchayats marked a new milestone for rural empowerment in Sikkim, so does their equal representation at the top panchayat level. While the verdict is still awaited on how effectively this mandated by law empowerment has been leveraged, what is significant is that women in Sikkim have consistently embraced their stake in Sikkim, an involvement they have proven with how enthusiastically they have turned out to vote.

By turning out to vote in larger proportions than men, Sikkim's ladies have displayed that they are keen to have a larger stake in governance and policy-making. Election 2014 was for the second consecutive election that women voters outperformed men in Sikkim. In 2009, against an 81.46% male voter turnout, Sikkim's women posted 82.77%. In 2014, 81.40% of the women voters exercised their franchise to help decide the government for the current term against 80.57% male voters.

This is one statistic that should make every Sikkimese sit up and take notice because make no mis-take, stepping out, braving the heat and the rain later in the evening to vote, is a sign of empowerment. What is more, this is no flash in the pan episode, but appears to be a process which has sustained and grown over the past decade and a half. In Elections 1999, wom-en voter turnout was five percentage points lower than men [79.10% versus 84.36%], and as women's empowerment efforts progressed in earnest [and the SDF government deserves credit for it], in Elections 2004, male and female voter turnout were almost lev-- 77.01% against 77.99%. As already mentioned, the women turned the tables on male voters in 2009. and have retained the bragging rights for the last election as well. Even as the women voters rank higher in percentage turn-out, they are not very far behind when it comes to absolute numbers either. Against a total of 1.53.425 men who voted in Sikkim in 2014. slightly over 1.46 lakh ladies pressed the EVM but-

The numbers prove the heightened involvement with which women in Sikkim have taken to participatory democracy.

Generalisations, admittedly, are by nature inaccurate and unscientific tools to draw conclusions, but if one were to surmise on what factors led to more women voting in Sikkim, there would be a multitude of factors, but one of the most substantial motivators must have been the increased attention being paid to women in Sikkim which convinced them that they had a stake in governance and the need to sustain it. Factors such as improving literacy, increased representation [in panchayat and urban bodies] and a slew of other women-centric interventions contribute to this increased voter turn-out, and even as one frowns at sops and quotas, these must be working towards empowerment because that is what the data is posting. This is perhaps also a trend whose time has come, and one which would automatically require political planners to position there stands with improved consideration of women interests. Because women's participation in voting is on the rise, their mandate will require delivery more than rhetoric. There are however still many politicians, who, even if they have shed overt male chauvinism, remain insensitive to-wards women's issues and some have even displayed boorish poor taste in the recent past. For anyone with any serious political ambitions, gender sensitivity will be a good investment to make. While this used to be consciously included in the activities of most political outfits till a few years back, it has all but vanished from political deliberations in post-election Sikkim. The sooner the wannabe leaders recognise the due rights and aspirations of women, the better it will be for their political futures.

Sikkimese women have established that henceforth, their endorsement will be required by every aspirant and every candidate, in every constituency in Sikkim. This power cannot be ignored because while women voters are in majority in five assembly constituencies, in actual turnout [not just percentage points] they outnumbered male voters in as many as nine Assembly constituencies in 2014. Even the most basic political calculation will thus recommend that political parties in Sikkim allow more women into representative politics roles, in positions which are more than just token. The parties, for their own survival, need to appreciate the power that women now wield in Sikkim and this means that women's issues can no longer be sidestepped. Political power is no longer possible without catering to the women voters, and given the centuries of prejudice and offensively male-centric system that has been imposed on women, one hopes that this vote-bank stands separate from the caste and community divisions that short-sighted politicians tend to carve out.



From the ashes of shame arises an Australian men's cricket team to make us proud

2018 has been miserable in so many respects, yet it ends with hope, and from the least expected quarter: the Australian cricket team.

Australian cricket and Australian public life have declined in tandem over the past few years, dragged down by the same bogies. Their tempers became foul, the mindset and rhetoric malign, and winning at all costs, driven by a voracious hunger

for money, became everything.

People with decent values had their stomachs turned. We turned off the cricket, and turned away from the Liberal and National parties, which have been, and look set to continue, getting the electoral hidings of their lives.

Then summer arrived and with it, the touring Indian Test team. The Adelaide Test was engaging. Γhe unexpectedly tight, clean contest kept us – and this felt surprising – watching just another over, and then another, until we surprised ourselves even more by watching the whole match.

Who were these batsmen? Most of the surnames were barely known. Some looked barely old enough to shave. They were fresh-faced, unpocked by the pestilence that marked the big, old and now ugly names of Australian cricket tarnished by a toxic sledging culture and, in the case of former captain Steve Smith and former vice-captain David Warner, outright cheating that shamed the nation.

Travis Head from the little South Australian country town of Gawler, north of Adelaide, embodied this new moment in Australian cricket. The young left-hander walked onto Adelaide Oval with boyish hope quietly written on his face that he

could make a century for his country playing on his home ground for the first time in only his third Test match ever. He top-scored in the first innings with a fighting 72. When he walked from the field, one felt like giving him a hug and telling him not to drop his head – to keep it high. He had done well, played

cleanly, made the country proud.

Some of the reportage around Head created what seemed like a wormhole into a previous Australia. His family and friends were concerned about the train timetable between Gawler and Adelaide, and whether it meant they would have to stay overnight in Adelaide so as not to miss any play. Could they afford it if they had to? That Australia still ex-ists, and to hear it discussed in the context of the glittering, money-soaked world of international cricket was just the sort of philosophical corrective of which it needs more.

The Australian fightback to nearly win the Ad-elaide Test from an apparently hopeless position was another surprise, the kind that brought us back to the second Test at the new Perth Stadium. The Perth wicket was an enigma: playing up then quietening down in an unpredictable pattern, keeping bowlers and batsmen on their mettle and interest high. As commentator and former England cricketer Isa Guha said, the Perth wicket had its own entire narrative in the game.

And that was another pleasant surprise, the

normalisation of women commentators mixed in with the usual wall of men: Isa Guha on Foxtel, and presenter Mel McLaughlin, former Australian Test player Lisa Sthalekar and regular BBC cricket com-

mentator Alison Mitchell on the Seven Network.

Tone really matters. Australian captain Tim
Paine is the man of the hour. While the male cricket commentators gush over Virat Kohli, Paine is the

one showing outstanding leadership in the best Australian tradition rather than the ugly one. He is getting little recognition for it.

The fact is, Paine is a better captain than Steve Smith ever was. The team is in good psychological shape and his pleasant, matter-of-fact persona doesn't detract from an unequivocal competitiveness that delivered a convincing Australian win in the second Test.

Kohli looked ridiculous with his machismo-driven attempted chest bump when India couldn't overwhelm the Australian batting line-up at Perth. Paine was magnificent, refusing to take the bait and instead just getting on with an emphatic win.

Compare and contrast with Prime Minister

Scott Morrison's embarrassing performance on his visit to Australian troops in Iraq just before Christmas. "So how good's the 7th Brigade?" he posed, both thumbs up Trump-style, to 7th Brigade ADF troops assembled uncomfortably for a prime ministerial picture opportunity.

Reluctant to be revved up, US-style, in Morri-son's political interest, they gave him a delayed and barely audible murmur in reply. "That wasn't a very enthusiastic response!" he boomed back, rais-ing his thumbs and his volume higher to demand again, forcefully: "How good is the 7th Brigade?"

Australians don't like forced rah-rah. We don't like cheats and clowns either. If the Australian cricket team can unexpectedly regenerate, after public revulsion made the wrongdoers pay a prop-er price and forced a clean-out of the administration that pushed them down the wrong path, maybe there is hope for Australian politics too. When you look up, how far back in time do you see?

ur senses are stuck in the past. There's a flash of lightning, and then seconds pass until we hear the rumble of distant thunder. We hear

We are seeing into the past too While sound travels about a kilometre every three seconds, light travels 300,000 kilometres every second. When ve see a flash of lighting three kilome happened a hundredth of a millisecond ago. That's not exactly the distant past.

But as we look further afield, we ran neer further back. We can see sec nds, minutes, hours and years into the past with our own eyes. Looking through a telescope, we can look even

further into the past. A SECOND BACK IN TIME

If you really want to look back in time,

you need to look up.

The Moon is our nearest celestial neighbour - a world with valleys, mountains and craters.

It's also about 380,000km away, so it takes 1.3 seconds for light to travel from the Moon to us. We see the Moon not as it is, but as it was 1,3 seconds ago

The Moon doesn't change much from instant to instant, but this 1.3-second delay is perceptible when nission control talks to astronauts on the Moon. Radio waves travel at the speed of light, so a message from mission control takes 1.3 seconds to get to the Moon, and even the quickest of replies takes another 1.3 seconds to come back.

MINUTES AND HOURS



It's not hard to look beyond the Moon and further back in time. The Sun is about 150 million km away, so we see it as it was about 8 minutes ago

Even our nearest planetary neighbours, Venus and Mars, are tens of millions of kilometres away, so we see them as they were minutes ago. When Mars is very close to Earth, we are seeing it as it was about three minutes ago, but at other times light takes more than

20 minutes to travel from Mars to Earth.
This presents some problems if you're on Earth controlling a Rover on Mars. If you're driving the Rover at 1km per hour then the lag, due to the finite speed of light, means the rover could be 200 metres ahead of where you see it, and it could travel another 200 metres after you command it to hit the brakes.

Not surprisingly, Martian Rovers

aren't breaking any speed records, travelling at 5cm per second (0.18kph or 0.11mph), and on-board computers help with driving, to prevent rover wrecks

Let's go a bit further out in space. At its closest to Earth, Saturn is still more than a billion kilometres away, so we see it as it was more than an hour ago.

When the world tuned into the Cas-

sini spacecraft's plunge into Saturn's atmosphere in 2017, we were hearing echos from a spacecraft that had already been destroyed more than an

The night sky is full of stars, and those stars are incredibly distant. The distances are measured in light years, which corresponds to the distance

travelled by light in one year. That's about 9 trillion km.

Alpha Centauri, the nearest star visible to the unaided eye, is at a distance 270.000 times the distance between Earth and the Sun. That's 4 light years, so we see Alpha Centauri as it was 4 years ago.

Some bright stars are much more distant still. Betelgeuse, in the constellation Orion, is about 640 light years away. If Betelgeuse exploded tomor row (and it will explode one day), we wouldn't know about it for centuries.

Even without a telescope we can see

much much further. The Andromeda galaxy and the Magellanic Clouds are relatively nearby galaxies that are bright enough to be seen with the unaided eye.

The Large Magellanic cloud is a

mere 160,000 light years away, while Andromeda is 2.5 million light years away. For comparison, modern humans have only walked the Earth for about 300,000 years.

BILLIONS

With the unaided eye you can look millions of years into the past, but how about billions? Well, you can do that at the eyepiece of an amateur telescope

Quasar 3C 273 is an incredibly lu-nous object, which is brighter than individual galaxies, and powered by a

huge black hole.

But it's 1,000 times fainter than what the unaided eye can see because it's 2.5 billion light years away. That said, you can spot it with a 20cm aperture telescope.

A bigger telescope allows you to

peer even further into space, and I once had the pleasure of using an eyepiece on a 1.5-metre diameter telescope. Quasar APM 08279+5255 was just a faint dot, which isn't surprising as it's 12 billion light years away. Earth is just 4.5 billion years old, and even the universe itself is 13.8 bil-

lion years old. Relatively few people have seen APM 08279+5255 with their own eyes, and in doing so they (and I) have looked back across almost the en

tire history of our universe.

So when you look up, remember you aren't seeing things as they are now;

you're seeing things as they were.
Without really trying, you can see
years into the past. And with the aid of a telescope you can see millions or even billions of years into the past with your very own eyes.

No chicken or pork, Kumarikata village in Assam sells rat meat

(PTI): A weekly rural market in Assam's Baksa district exclusively sells rat meat as the finished rat, cooked as a spicy gravy dish or nicely browned, is considered a

Sunday delicacy.

A traditional food item among some ethnic communities in the northeastern region, rat meat is sold at the same price as broiler chicken at Rs 200 per kg, the sellers said.

Buyers throng the Sunday market at Kumarikata village, along the Indo-Bhutan border, about 90 km from Guwahati, to buy their favourite meat of freshly trapped rat. Rat is more popular than chicken and pork with the customers at the Sunday market.

A rat vendor said that the meat is mainly sourced from neighbour ing Nalbari and Barpeta districts of Assam

Local farmers hunt the rats, weighing more than a kg each, at night during the harvesting season with traps made of bamboo, to prevent their fields from being damaged by the rodents that eat paddy and other

The farmers claimed that the trapping of the rats was helping them to curb the growing men-ace of rodents in recent od of trapping the rats a seller said the rodents are hunted at night when they come out of their holes and walk straight into the traps placed by the farmers at the entrance of the rat-holes

Rat meat is usually sold by the economically challenged people of the Adivasi community to augment their income earned from working in tea gardens, where plucking of tea leaves reduces during the winter season, the sellers said.

"Business is good as we can trap rats weigh-ing 10kg to 20kg a night for selling it in the mar-



UN chief calls on stakeholders to ensure peaceful general elections in Bangladesh

UNITED NATIONS, DEC 27 (PTI): UN chief Antonio Guterres has asked all stakeholders in Bangladesh to ensure that the upcoming general elections are held in an environment free of violence and intimidation, amid reports of arrests and targeted attacks carried out by the ruling party activists.

General elections will be held in Bangladesh on December 30. It will be the 11th election held in

the country.

In the run-up to the general elections. UN Secretary General Guterres reiterated the continued commitment of the United Nations for a peaceful and democratic

"All Bangladeshi citizens, including minori-ties and women, must feel safe and confident in exercising their right to vote. Civil society and electoral observers should be fully supported to play their role in the process," a statement issued Wednesday by the Secre-tary General's spokesman Stephane Dujarric said.

He "calls on all stakeholders to ensure an environment free of violence, intimidation and

coercion before, during and after the elections, so as to enable a peaceful, credible and inclusive poll," it said.

Last week, Dujarric said the UN was con-cerned by incidents of electoral violence and arrests of opposition mem-bers in Bangladesh just days ahead of the general elections and had called on all stakeholders to ensure the election is inclu-

sive and transparent.
"We are all following these developments very closely and we're concerned by the reports of incidents of electoral violence and arrests

of opposition members and we call on all stake holders to do their part to make sure that the election is inclusive and transparent," Dujarric

had said Friday.

He said it is very important that the security forces act to ensure free and unhindered campaigning by all candidates.

At least six people have been killed and several hundred injured in election-related violence since December 10 when the campaigning began for the polls. Both opposi-tion and the ruling Awami League blame each other for the attacks.

According to media reports, most attacks were carried out by the ruling party activists who were often backed by the police.

The opposition allege that police have arrest-ed some 10,500 of their activists in a crackdown ahead of elections with an intention to create a "climate of fear"

The police, however, said no one has been arrested without specific charge and warrant.

Rights group Human Rights Watch has said a repressive political environment in Bangladesh ahead of the national elections

UAIPF demands Arunachal govt withdraw recent announcement to grant PRC to non-tribals

ITANAGAR, DEC 27 (PTI): Hundreds of activists under the banner of United Indigenous Peoples Forum (UAIPF) Thursday staged a pro-test rally here demanding the state government to withdraw its recent announcement to grant PRC to non-tribal communities in Namsai and Changlang districts.

The Arunachal Pradesh governments decision to grant permanent residency certificate (PRC) to six non-tribal communities along with people from Gorkha community residing in both the districts had evoked strong resentments among various commu-nity based organisations (CBOs) including students bodies of the state

The activists de-manded that the state government withdraw the statements made by Chief Minister Pema Khandu and Deputy Chief Minister Chowna Mein for granting PRC to non-Arunachalees residing at Lekang in Namsai district and Vijoynagar in Changlang district.

The forum also demanded the state govern-ment to strengthen the Bengal Eastern Frontier Regulation Act 1873 for better and stronger protective measures for the welfare of the indigenous people of the state.

It also demanded for maintaining transpar-ency in the Joint High Powered Committee by including more members from community based organisations.

The state government had constituted the committee under Environment and Forest Minister Nabam Rebia to study the issue and to submit its report to the government for further action.

Shelter home scandal, political volatility sum up Bihar this year

PATNA, DEC 27 (PTI): The Muzaffarpur sex scandal cast a long shadow over Bihar in a year in which the state lived up to its reputation for political volatility as many smaller players made unexpected moves the heavyweights strove for consolidation.

Not known for achieve ments in the field of sports, Bihar was nonetheless done proud by shooter Shreyasi Singh winning singh winning gold at the Commonwealth Games while cricket lovers felt gratified with the Bihan team playing Ranji Trophy after nearly two decades.

The NDA's hopes of emerging stronger following the return of Chief Minister and JD(U) president Nitish Kumar last year took a beating as Hindustani Awam Morcha founder Jitan Ram Man-jhi walked out and joined the opposition Grand Alliance which was followed. months later, by a similar but much more publicised and bitter exit of Rashtriya Lok Samata Party chief and former Union minister Up

endra Kushwaha.

Although all RLSP members in the state's bi-cameral legislature have re-volted against Kushwaha's decision and asserted that they would remain in the NDA, the BJP has nevertheless been jolted by his exit which came at a time when the party is smarting under the loss of power in Mad-hya Pradesh, Rajasthan and Chhattisgarh besides relentless opposition attacks over the Rafale deal.

Ending suspense over seat-sharing, BJP president Amit Shah along with Nit-ish Kumar and Ram Vilas Paswan appeared before media in New Delhi to make the world know on December 23 that while the first two will field can-didates on 17 seats each in Bihar and Paswan's party on the rest six.

The Grand Alliance,
which now has many re-

gional players on board and is exploring an electoral un-derstanding with the Left to augment its striking power, however has been beset with its own problems.

Its largest constituent

the RJD, remains crisis-ridden on account of impris-onment and illness of its chief Lalu Prasad, who is serving sentences in a number of fodder scam cases.

Prasad's younger son and heir apparent Tejashwi Yadav led the party to some spectacular by-poll victories and showed the ability to marshal resources by stag-ing an impressive demon-stration at Jantar Mantar over the Muzaffarpur scandal wherein bigwigs like Ra-hul Gandhi, Arvind Kejriwal and Sitaram Yechury took part burying their ideological differences.

The scion, whom LIP heir apparent Chirag Paswan recently called a "younger brother" - to the chagrin of alliance part-ners in the NDA, has his own share of woes which includes cases lodged by the CBI and the Enforcement Directorate.

His family, which controls the RJD, is also under strain as rumours of his elder brother Tej Pratap Ya-day and eldest sister Misa Bharti feeling uneasy under his leadership keep afloat.

Tej Pratap Yadav's decision to seek divorce from his wife of six months, his sudden and frequent sojourns in places of pilgrimage and a petulant refusal to visit the home of his mother Rabri Devi over her coming out in support of his spouse have only made matters worse for the family, triggering fears of tur-moil within the party.

Conviction of two sitting MLAs - Ilyas Hussain in a corruption case and Raj Ballabh Yadav in a rape case - did not make mat-ters better for a party that has often been accused of patronising people with criminal antecedents. The world woke up to a

horror story in a state-run short stay home at Muzaffarpur where over 30 minor girls were subjected to untold sexual abuse in the hands of the owner of the NGO Brajesh Thakur.

Jolted by the Muzaffarpur home episode, the Bihar government took corrective measures like doing away

with outsourcing of shelter

homes' upkeep to NGOs.

Complaints of misuse of draconian provisions of the prohibition law were addressed to some extent through amendments in the same. Liquor ban law was brought in by Nit-ish Kumar government in 2015 and the year saw many arrests and seizure of huge quantity of illegal alcohol from outside.



Pujara's classy hundred puts India in command in third Test

MELBOURNE, DEC 27 (PTI): The redoubtable Cheteshwar Pujara pro-duced yet another classy hundred and combined with captain Virat Kohli (82) to put India in command on the second day of the third Test against Australia here Thursday.

MELBOURNE, DEC 27 (PTI): Australian opener Aaron Finch Thursday said the MCG pitch is deteriorating quicker than anticipated and all three results are possible in the third Test despite a slow Indian first innings that finished at 443 for seven.

The hosts were eight for no loss at stumps in response.

"It's not your traditional Australian wicket where you have three slips and a gully all day and you bang away, and the ball seams and carries like we saw in Perth. There, a lot of dismissals were behind the wicket," Finch said.

At the end of day's play, he added, "On such pitches, I think you've just got to adapt vour gameplan and regardless of what the wicket is you've got to be good enough to adapt and change your

"I think all three results are still on the table, 100 per cent, India (victory), Australia (victory) and a draw."

DAMASCUS, DEC 27 (AFP): The United Arab Emirates will reopen its embassy in Damascus Thursday, an official said, seven years after it severed ties with Syria over the violent repression that triggered the war.

An official at the information ministry invited journalists "to cover the reopening of the Emirati embassy in Damascus today".

The move is seen as another step in efforts to bring the regime of President Bashar al-Assad back into the Arab fold after years of diplomatic isolation. A visit to Damascus by Sudanese President Omar al-Bashir earlier this month had been interpreted by some observers as a sign of that trend.

Rumours of the Emi-

rati embassy reopening have circulated in recent days as renovation work was spotted getting underway at the building.

The UAE broke ties with Syria in February 2012, as the repression of nationwide protests demanding regime change was escalating into a war which has now killed more than 360,000 people.

Indonesia hikes danger level for deadly tsunami volcano

CARITA, DEC 27 (AFP): Indonesia on Thursday raised the danger alert level for an erupting vol-cano that sparked a killer tsunami at the weekend. after previously warning that fresh activity at the crater threatened to trigger another deadly wave.

Authorities also widened a no-go zone around rumbling Anak Krakatoa to five kilometres (three miles) -- up from a previous two kilometres -- and warned shell-shocked residents to stay away from the coast, after more than 400 were killed by Saturday night's killer wave.

Plumes of ash burst into the sky as pyroclastic flows -- hot gas and other volcanic material -- flowed down the crater, threatening anyone too close to the volcano and raising the risk of rough seas for boats in the vicinity.

"There is a danger of more eruptions," said national disaster agency spokesman Sutopo Pur-wo Nugroho.

"People (near the volcano) could be hit by hot rocks, pyroclastic flows and thick ash." Author-

ities raised the crater's status to high alert, the second-highest warning the country's four point danger scale, while aviation officials ordered flights to be redirected away from the area.

"We've raised the status of (the volcano) since this morning because there's been a change in the eruption pattern," Kus Hendratno, a senior official at the Krakatoa observatory, told AFP Thursday.

The new flows posed no immediate danger to area towns as the volcano sits in the middle of the Sunda Strait between Java and Sumatra islands.

But the status change sparked new fears with many residents already scared and refusing to return to their communities over fears of another tsunami.

"This worries me," said Ugi Sugiarti, a cook at the Augusta Hotel in hard-hit Carita.

"I've already left." Sukma, a security guard at the shattered Mutiara Carita Cottages, added: "Just please pray for us and that everything will be okay." A section of the

crater -- which emerged at the site of the Krakatoa volcano, whose massive 1883 eruption killed at least 36,000 people -collapsed after an erup-tion and slid into the ocean, triggering Saturday night's killer wave.

At least 430 people were killed, with 1,495 people injured and another 159 were missing.

Nearly 22,000 people have been evacuated and are living in shelters.

On Wednesday evening, the disaster agency said that wind was blowing "ash and sand" from

the volcano to the near-by towns of Cilegon and Serang on Java, and advised residents to wear masks and glasses if they had to venture outdoors

Torrential rains have sparked flooding in some areas, hampering the re-lief effort and heaping more misery on the stricken region, as thousands cram emergency shelters.

Medical workers have warned that clean water and medicine supplies were running low -- stoking fears of a public health crisis.

Indonesia, a vast Southeast Asian archi-

disaster-hit nations on Earth due to its position straddling the so-called Pacific Ring of Fire, where

tectonic plates collide.

The tsunami was Indonesia's third major natural disaster in six months, following a series of powerful earthquakes on the island of Lombok in July and August and a quake-tsunami in September that killed around 2,200 people in Palu on Sulawesi . island. with thousands more missing and presumed dead.

Russia: Israeli strike on Syria threatened civilian flights

The Russian military on Wednesday criticized an alleged Israeli airstrike near the Syrian capital, saying it has endangered civilian flights.

Russian Defense Minspokesman Maj. Igor Konashenkov said that six Israeli F-16 jets launched a "provocative" raid at the moment when two civilian airliners were preparing to land in Damascus and Beirut, creating a "direct threat" to the aircraft.

acting Lebanon's Minister Transport Youssef Fenianos later on Wednesday confirmed Konashenkov's account, saying the two airplanes in Lebanese airspace "narrowly" escaped Is-raeli warplanes, averting a "human catastrophe."

Fenianos didn't pro-vide details, but said he reported the incident to the prime minister-des-ignate. He said the Lebanese government will present a complaint to the UN Security Council.



The Syrian military didn't fully engage its air defense assets to avoid accidentally hitting the passenger jets, Konashenkov said. He added that Syrian air traffic controllers redirected the Damascus-bound plane to the Russian air base in Hemei meem in Syria's coastal province of Latakia.

Konashenkov said the Syrian air defense forces shot down 14 of the 16 precision-guided bombs dropped by the Israeli jets, while the remaining two hit a Syrian military depot 7 ki-lometers (about 4.3 miles) west of Damascus, injuring three Syrian soldiers.

It wasn't clear if the Syrian military used any of the advanced S-300 air defense missile sys-tems that Russia deliv-ered in October to beef up its air defenses. The ove followed the Sept. 17 downing of a Russian reconnaissance plane by Syrian forces responding to an Israeli air raid, an incident that strained previously warm ties between Russia and Israel.

The Syrian Foreign Ministry in a statement Wednesday accused Israel of exacerbating the crisis in the country and standing in the way of the government's war on terrorism.

In messages sent to the U.N. secretary-gen-eral and the president of the Security Council. the ministry said the Israeli airstrike wouldn't have been launched if it wasn't for what it called "unlimited" U.S. support for Israel

Israel has carried out dozens of airstrikes in Syria, most of them believed to have been aimed at Iranian arms

shipments to the Hezbollah militant group. Both Iran and Hezbollah have been fighting alongside the forces of Syrian President Bashar Assad.

Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu has repeatedly warned that he will not allow archenemy Iran to establish a permanent military presence in postwar Syria.

Speaking at a military ceremony Wednesday, Netanyahu did not directly mention the alleged airstrike. But he repeated his position that he will not allow archenemy Iran to establish a perm military presence in Syria, and said Israel's air force has unmatched capabilities and can reach arenas "near and far, very far."
"We are not prepared to accept the Iranian military entrenchment in Syria, which is directed against us. We will act against it vigorously and continu-ously, including during the current period," he told a graduation ceremony of new air force pilots.

This is his first visit to Iraq as the US President.

Trump said he is planning on "going to the wall" on the Southwest

Border of the US early next year for a "ground-breaking". Trump made these

remarks while taking questions from reporters during a briefing with US military leaders shortly after landing in Iraq. Trump indicated that

he will not budge from his position on border wall. With the opposition Democrats refusing to approve the neces sary funds, the federal government has been under a partial government shutdown for four

days now.
"Whatever it takes.
We need a wall. We need safety for our country. Even from this standpoint. We have terrorists coming in through the southern border," Trump said when asked how long this shutdown would last.

China successfully tests Russia's S-400 missile air defence system

KJM VARMA Beijing, Dec 27 (PTI): China has successfully tested the advanced S-400 air defence system imported from Russia for which India also signed-up recently despite con-cerns over threat of sanctions from the US.

It was the first time the People's Liberation Army (PLA) tested the system since it received the last shipments of the weaponry from Russia in July under a USD 3 billion

contract signed in 2015. China's People's Liberation Army Rocket Force last month tested the S-400 Triumf air defence sys-tem successfully shooting down a "simulated ballistic target" almost 250 kilometre away and moving at the supersonic speed of 3 kilometre per second, Hong-Kong based South China Morning Post reported on Thursday, quoting Russian media reports.

Details of the location

of the test have not been disclosed.

India signed a USD 5 billion deal with Russia to buy the same system in October this year despite concerns over threat of sanctions under the Countering America's Adversaries Through Sanctions Act (CAATSA) instituted by the US Congress on arms pur-chases from Russia.

India wants the longrange missile systems to tighten its air defence mechanism, particularly along the 3488 km-long

o-India border. S-400 is known as Russia's most advanced



long-range surface-to-air missile defence system.

China was the first foreign buyer to seal a gov-ernment-to-government deal with Russia in 2014 to procure the lethal missystem. Moscow has already started delivery of an undisclosed number of the S-400 missile systems to Beijing.
Russia says the S-400 is

a cutting-edge air defence system that can detect and shoot down targets includ-ing ballistic missiles, enemy jets and drones up to 600 kilometre away at an altitude between 10 metres and 27 kilometres.

The system can simultaneously shell 36 targets moving at a speed of up to 4,800 metres per second with 72 ground-toair missiles

Commenting on the China's first test, Beijing-based military ex-pert Li Jie said the reports showed that Moscow wanted to underscore the relationship at a time when the US was at loggerheads with both Russia and China.

"Despite pressure from the US, the Russian military will increase its

operation with the PLA in areas such as miss shipbuilding and of other sectors," he said.

China and Russia have significantly boosted their military ties in the past decade as both the countries compete with the US for re-gional and global influence.

Song Zhongping, a Hong Kong-based military expert with a focus on the PLA, told the Post that the test was an "advertisement" by the Russian military to promote its S-400 system.


"But it's also clear that

the PLA's Rocket Force is proficient in using the S-400 air defence system because they are already familiar with its predecessor, the S-300, which China has used since the '90s." Song said.


