GANGTOK, 21 MAY (IPR): SUVIDHA is one of the various IT applications introduced by the Election Commission of India for smooth conduct of elections. This application is a single window system for candidate registration, voter turnout and counting management system with provision to generate reports for various purposes particularly on the day of Counting and declaration of result.

Today a dry run was conducted wherein the actual simulation of the Counting process was performed for the Assembly Constituencies and Parliamentary Constituency at the Counting Centre of Biraspati Parsai SSS, Ranipool.

The dry-run was successful and various reports required by ECI were generated through the online SUVIDHA application system. This online application system is used for both Assem-Constituencies Parliamentary

Come June, Sikkim could lose it sole flight out Number of counting

Spicejet tells AAI it won't fly to Pakyong unless navigational equipment is installed

SUMMIT REPORT GANGTOK, 21 MAY:

If media reports are to be believed, Spice-Lifet, the only carrier operating flights out of Sikkim, has decided not to service the Pakyong Airport unless the Airport Authority of India installs navigational equipment at the airport.

A news-report datelined Calcutta and published in The Telegraph today quotes the Regional Sales Manager, East, of Spicejet, Debjit Ghosh, as informing that the airline has decided to withdraw flights to and from Pakyong from 01 June onwards.

The reason cited is the high number of cancellations from Pakyong owing to poor visibility conditions. As per the Regional Sales Manager, the airline was averaging a staggering 20 cancellations per month from Pakyong. The carrier was operation a daily Kolkata-Pakyong-Kolkata flight, a route serviced by a 78-seater Bombardier Q-400 series aircraft.

Ever since the airport was inaugurated by the Prime Minister in September last year, it has been hounded by frequent cancellations which required booked passengers to take a last-minute drive down to Bagdogra as an alternative. Several VIPs, including the Vice President of India during his recent visit to Sikkim, had to opt for Bagdogra against the planned itinerary of flying direct into Sikkim.

The report in question goes on to explain that in the absence of navigational equipment, the minimum visibility required to land at Pakyong was 5KMs. In comparison, the Calcutta airport, which has the required equipment, can have planes landing when visibility is as low as 50metres.

The report then goes on to quote an unnamed AAI official as explaining that installing the required equipment would require the runway to be at least 150 metres wide. The runway at Pakyong is currently only 80 metres wide.

The unnamed official goes on to explain that the runway cannot be widened because landowners are not agreeing to give land. The land acquisition for the airport has remained a vexed issue for a while now, it may be recalled.

Be that as it may, what begs question is why none of the planners realized the need for navigational equipment when the airport was being designed. That should be standard equipment for any airport in any hilly region, especially so in a Sikkim with its record of rainy days and foggy winters. Had this been factored in at the beginning itself, adequate land would have been acquired before land acquisition became stuck in the current environment of allegations and counter claims.

Questions probably also need to be asked on whether Pakyong was the best suited location to develop an airport or whether there were better options which

These questions will probably never be asked or answered in earnest. Meanwhile, what Sikkim stands to lose is the claim that it enjoys air-connectivity. And yes, it was always only a claim because on ground, this connectivity was always too erratic to be of any consequence.

Dissent in model code violation cases won't be made public: EC

NEW DELHI, MAY 21 (PTI): Rejecting the demand of Election Commissioner Ashok Lavasa, the 'full commission' Tuesday ruled that dissents and minority views in EC orders in cases of model code violations would not be made public.

The dissent notes and minority views would remain part of records as it is the case now, the Election Commission (EC) said in a statement.

"In the meeting of the Election Commission held today regarding the issue of MCC (Model Code of Conduct), it was interalia decided that proceedings of the commission's meetings would be drawn, including the views of all the commission members.

"Thereafter, formal instructions to this effect would be issued in consonance with extant laws/

Lavasa has recused himself from MCC violation cases, saying his dissent was not being made part of

He had given his dissent in some of the commission's clean chits to Prime Minister Narendra Modi and BJP president Amit Shah in complaints of MCC violations.

The EC had maintained that since the poll code violation cases are not quasi judicial in nature, they are not signed by the chief election commissioner (CEC) and fellow commissioners, and thus, the dissent cannot be made part of the order.

"Status quo will be maintained. Dissent will not be made public but would form part of EC records," explained an official. As per the law govern-

ing the functioning of the EC, efforts should have an unanimity, but in the case of a dissent, a majority (2:1) view prevails.

The full commission comprises CEC Sunil Arora and fellow commissioners Lavasa and Sushil Chandra.

East holds final briefing for counting day Number of counting halls doubled to speed up process



GANGTOK, 21 MAY (IPR): The final meeting for discussion on arrangements for the counting of votes with the candidates and political representatives was conducted at the Conference Hall of DAC Sichey today. The meeting was chaired by DC-cum-DEO East, Kapil Meena in presence of Observers, Kumar Rajeev and Ameyah Abhyankar, SP (East), Hemraj Rai, ADC (East), Bharani Kumar, SDMs and other officials.

The DEO East said that the number of Counting Halls have been increased from 4 to 8 halls at the Biraspati Parsai SSS in order to make the process of counting swift and error free. He also mentioned about the various instructions of Election Commission of India including timely completion and other important guidelines which the attendees need to follow during the process of counting.

The DEO also briefed them extensively on the arrangements of the counting halls and explained at length about the counting of Postal Ballots, Counting of Electronically Transmitted Postal Ballots, Counting of Votes recorded in EVMs, Counting of VVPAT slips and Compilation of data. He also spoke in depth about the filling of different forms, compilation of data and other necessary procedures to be followed.

While speaking further, the DEO informed that mobile phones and electronic items will be totally prohibited inside the counting halls, however, a separate collection room has been identified for storing of the electronic gadgets. The DC informed that the candidates' election agents and counting agents will not be allowed to enter the counting halls without valid identity cards issued by the authority.

Similarly, a Media Centre, a Medical Unit Room and a reserve Counting staff room has also been set up inside the complex.

The DEO also informed that the Strong room will be opened on 23 May, 2019 at 7:00am in the presence of Observer, candidates and their election agents and Counting will commence from 8 am sharp. Counting will start with Postal Ballot counting first followed by EVM Counting thereafter.

He also stated that the round wise and final results will be announced via loudspeaker which will be placed in all corners of the ground. It was also informed that the results can be accessed at the ECI website and it will also be updated simultaneously on the Government of Sikkim Facebook page as well as DM Gangtok East Sikkim Facebook page.

SP(East) in his address briefed about the

security and traffic arrangements for Counting day and requested everyone present to cooperate with the security personnel. He urged the political representatives to maintain self-discipline and quorum during the counting period and stated that Section 144 CrPc is still imposed in the whole state and thus to refrain from any kind of unethical activity and no major rallies/procession can be carried out without prior permission from the District Admin-

istration. DEO East informed that only the designated Counting Agents must come and enter those Counting Halls where counting of their respective Constituencies is taking place. For Sangha AC and 01-Sikkim PC the results will be compiled by East District and the Returning Officer/DM East who shall announce the final results.

Urban Woes Someone please take the lead on urban planning

The municipal experiment in Sikkim is now of reasonable maturity to move beyond cleanliness drives and attempt some intelligent urban planning. Elected representatives, even if they have mostly arrived unopposed and did not need to campaign for votes, have a responsibility towards their constituents which should expand beyond the routine chief guest duties. Most of them have even been sponsored on study tours and must have completed several awareness sessions and workshops on urban planning. What is more, since they belong to the places they have elected from, they also know what is required, what the people want and what is possible. Now, what remains is to see them invest this knowledge and responsibility into urban planning. People's representatives in the urban local bodies need to be allowed a more involved role in this aspect because they would be able to table the best advice and speak the people's expectations. Of course, it is another matter that there appears to be no inclination towards urban planning anywhere. But let's let that be for now and focus on what the State requires for its urban

Since the municipal councils and nagar panchayats are new to the concept of urban identities, they will have to take Gangtok's lead. So where is Gangtok by way of planning? For whatever the officers might claim, the capital town is not really headed in any particular direction except getting crowded around already stressed clusters. Some years ago, an exhibition was held in town detailing a slew of what were presented as "urban infrastructural facilities" proposed for Gangtok. These, however, were essentially civil-engineering obsessed constructions and did not extend to explain how they would be serviced. There can be no protest against more pedestrian paths and foot over-bridges, or for that matter more parking lots and improved marketing avenues for produce from rural Sikkim. Several of these proposal are in various stages of suspended animation, and some have been completed and sit now as examples of slack planning and poor follow-up. If the finances allow, even the extravagance of a Fashion Street or a Gangtok Tower hugged by two bewildered red pandas and a revolving restaurant on top can be suffered, or enjoyed by the aesthetically challenged, as the case might be.

When one looks at all the facilities being proposed in the capital though, two things stick out as worries one, almost all projects are huddled in the MG Marg to Deorali stretch, and two, there is nothing for the children (and no, cement pandas don't count). Till a few years back, the urban spread of Gangtok was limited to the stretch from MG Marg to Deorali, but this has now expanded almost right down till Ranipool on one end and up to Bojoghari at the other extremity. Traffic into and out of town is already jammed, and inserting more parking lots, office buildings and shopping complexes to this huddle will only create a series of bottlenecks which the present road, with no scope of expansion, will not be able to handle. Spreading these facilities across the GMC area should be an option that the planners seriously consider. Planning needs to look into the future requirements and while the need for parking space is acute around the main town area, it is only a matter of very few years before the rest of the GMC feels the stress as well.

It will be in everyone's interest if better coordination is incorporated into planning and parking concerns addressed along with the creation of new infrastructure. In this regard, one needs to look at the absence of such planning in the relocation of the District Administrative Centre to Sichey from the heart of town. Parking is now a major concern there, but would not have been so if it had been factored into the project at the design and proposal stage itself. The capital will also breathe much easier with the relocation of some, if not all, of the mega smart city type projects.

Move around Gangtok, and concrete monsters with names like "Old Children's Park Taxi Stand" and "Old West Point School Private Bus Stand" [now, just Private Bus Stand and another, still unnamed or inaugurated, parking lot on what was a glade which could have been developed into a good park, reveal what we have stolen shamelessly from the young. Their spaces have been appropriated to accommodate excesses the elders indulge in, and what is worse, no compensatory allocation has been made out to them. MG Marg was developed as a tourist amenity and it is only by default that it has also become a safe place for kids to play. The planners need to be specifically directed by the policy-makers to start looking out for the young now. What the GMC can also consider is setting aside a special fund to help with the upkeep of grounds and campuses of schools, even private schools, in the GMC area on the condition that the school authorities keep them open for kids after school.

The role that elected representatives in urban local bodies can most effectively play is that of a link between residents, urban planners and professional architects. This connection should be sustained to keep goading planning to work in sync with aspirations and felt-needs of the people and the necessary collaborations nurtured to ensure that the limited opportunities are harnessed to the best. The urban bodies elsewhere in the State should look at Gangtok first to avoid the mistakes that the capital made, and second, hope that Gangtok takes the lead for the rest

The Earth's magnetic north pole is shifting rapidly – so what will happen to the northern lights?

Like most planets in our solar system, the Earth has its own magnetic field. Thanks to its largely molten iron core, our planet is in fact a bit like a bar magnet. It has a north and south magnetic pole, separate from the geographic poles, with a field connecting the two. This field protects our planet from radiation and is responsible for creating the northern and southern lights – spectacular events that are only visible near the magnetic poles.

However, with reports that the magnetic north pole has started moving swiftly at 50km per year – and may soon be over Siberia – it has long been unclear whether the northern lights will move too. Now a new study, published in Geophysical Research Letters, has come up with an answer.

Our planetary magnetic field has many advantages. For over 2,000 years, travellers have been able to use it to navigate across the globe. Some animals even seem to be able to find their way thanks to the magnetic field. But, more importantly than that, our geomagnetic field helps protect all life on Earth.

Earth's magnetic field extends hundreds of thousands of kilometres out from the centre of our planet stretching right out into interplanetary space, forming what scientists call a "magnetosphere". This magnetosphere helps to deflect solar radiation and cosmic rays, preventing the destruction of our atmosphere. This protective magnetic bubble isn't perfect though, and some solar matter and energy can transfer into our magnetosphere. As it is then funnelled into the poles by the field, it results in the spectacular displays of the northern lights.

A WANDERING POLE

Since Earth's magnetic field is created by its moving, molten iron core, its poles aren't stationary and they wander independently of one another. In fact, since its first formal discovery in 1831, the north magnetic pole has travelled over 2,000km from the



Boothia Peninsula in the far north of Canada to high in the Arctic Sea. This wandering has generally been quite slow, around 9km a year, allowing scientists to easily keep track of its position. But since the turn of the century, this speed has increased to 50km a year. The south magnetic pole is also moving, though at a much slower rate (10-15km a year).

This rapid wandering of the north magnetic pole has caused some problems for scientists and navigators alike. Computer models of where the north magnetic pole might be in the future have become seriously outdated, making accurate compass-based navigation difficult. Although GPS does work, it can sometimes be unreliable in the polar regions. In fact, the pole is moving so quickly that scientists responsible for mapping the Earth's magnetic field were recently forced to update their model much earlier than expected.

WILL THE AURORA MOVE?

The aurora generally form in an oval about the magnetic poles, and so if those poles move, it stands to reason that the aurora might too. With predictions suggesting that the north pole will soon be approaching northern Siberia, what effect might that have on the aurora?

The northern lights are currently mostly visible from northern Europe,

Canada and the northern US. If, however, they shifted north, across the geographic pole, following the north magnetic pole, then that could well change. Instead, the northern lights would become more visible from Siberia and northern Russia and less visible from the much more densely populated US/Canadian border.

Fortunately, for those aurora hunters in the northern hemisphere, it seems as though this might not actually be the case. A recent study made a computer model of the aurora and the Earth's magnetic poles based on data dating back to 1965. It showed that rather than following the magnetic poles, the aurora follows the "geomagnetic poles" instead. There's only a small difference between these two types of poles—but it's an important one.

The magnetic poles are the points on the Earth's surface where a compass needle points downwards or upwards, vertically. They aren't necessarily connected and drawing a line between these points, through the Earth, would not necessarily cross its centre. Therefore, to make better models over time, scientists assume that the Earth is like a bar magnet at its centre, creating poles that are exactly opposite each other – "antipodal". This means that if we drew a line between these points, the line would

cross directly through the Earth's centre. At the points where that line crosses the Earth's surface, we have the geomagnetic poles.

The geomagnetic poles are a kind of reliable, averaged out version of the magnetic poles, which move erratically all the time. Because of that, it turns out they aren't moving anywhere near as fast as the magnetic north pole is. And since the aurora seems to follow the more averaged version of the magnetic field, it means that the northern lights aren't moving that fast either. It seems as though the aurora are staying where they are – at least for now.

We already know that the magnetic pole moves. Both poles have wandered ever since the Earth existed. In fact, the poles even flip over, with north becoming south and south becoming north. These magnetic reversals have occurred throughout history, every 450,000 years or so on average. The last reversal occurred 780,000 years ago meaning we could be due a reversal soon.

So rest assured that a wandering pole, even a fast one, shouldn't cause too many problems – except for those scientists whose job it is to model it.

Political cartoonists are out of touch – it's time to make way for memes

The New York Times came under fire after a political cartoon appeared in print on April 25, 2019. In it, a blind President Donald Trump, wearing sunglasses and a yarmulke, leads, with a leash, Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu, who's depicted as a dog with a Star of David around his neck.

The Times later issued an apology, called the cartoon "anti-Semitic," and announced that it would discipline the editor and enhance its bias training. The newspaper also indicated that it will no longer use the syndication service that supplied the cartoon.

To some, this might appear to be a significant move. But it fails to address larger problems with editorial cartooning – namely, the ranks of cartoonists are too white, too old and too male.

As a scholar who studies social media and memetics, I wonder if political cartoons are the best way to connect with today's diverse readership. Many crave searing, cutting political commentary – and they're finding it in internet

What if internet memes were elevated – not only as a serious art form but also as an important form of editorializing that's worthy of appearing alongside the traditional cartoon?

BEHIND THE TIMES

Newspapers and magazine editors still rely on political cartoons to capture readers' attention and to deliver some lighter material alongside heavier news stories. The need for this content isn't going away, nor is the need for forms of communication that challenge governments and open up important public discussions – a role the political cartoonist has long held.

But in many ways, political cartooning can seem like a relic of a bygone era.

A 2015 Washington Post report also underscored the lack of diversity among political cartoonists in newsrooms, noting how not a single black individual was employed as one.

Then there's journalism's top prize, the Pulitzer.

An extensive 2016 study by the Columbia Journalism Review unveiled how the ranks of editorial cartoon Pulitzer winners have been largely dominated by white men. Since 1922, only two wom-

en have received a Pulitzer in this category, and it wasn't awarded to an African American until this year, when syndicated cartoonist Darrin Bell became the first to receive the award.

A MORE DEMOCRATIC FORM

Given the important function of the political cartoon, simply discontinuing their use serves no one, including publishers.

But the field's high barrier to entry – not to mention the time it takes to actually produce a cartoon – clearly poses a problem. A new, quicker and more inclusive solution to political commentary is needed.

The political cartoon is technically a meme, which is simply any piece of culture that can be copied or replicated.

A different sort of political cartoon, the internet meme, dominates on social media. Often crudely constructed, they're far easier to create than, say, your typical New Yorker political cartoon. Many simply appear as a photo with text overlay, something that can be made within a few minutes via an online meme generator or mobile app. But the lack of technical skill needed means that they're democratic in nature – and those that resonate the best will get shared the most and rise to the top.

A new common meme format simply entails brief, humorous, text-based commentary. Words are memes, after all, and they can be used to communicate ideas very quickly and clearly, which avoids some of the issues with visual rhetoric such as misinterpretation or misrepresentation – the exact sort of thing that happened with The New York Times cartoon.

MEMERS OF THE WORLD, UNITE!

Cartooning is undoubtedly a skilled art form. But in 2019, an ugly internet meme that uses a screen grab from "The Office" and quippy text overlay can have just as much clout – if not more –

than a conhictigated political cartoon

Internet memes increasingly play a role in politics and even have the power to influence elections. Facebook groups with hundreds of thousands of followers are dedicated entirely to propagating and spreading political internet memes, such as the Bernie Sanders Dank Meme Stash and God Emperor Trump.

Politics has become, in many ways – as campaign strategist Doyle Canning put it – "a battle of the memes"

Some publishers and media outlets understand the value of user-generated content in political discourse and news gathering. For example, BuzzFeed occasionally posts lighthearted political internet memes on its social media platforms that speak to a younger audience. The Associated Press employs user-generated content editors who comb social media platforms for important images associated with news events.

Memers, meanwhile, are beginning to see their role in driving internet traffic – and ad revenue – and are beginning to formalize their work and employment as content creators. They're even beginning to organize, with some groups seeking union status. It's possible that new syndication services may develop for political memes out of these efforts.

But there have been few signs of anyone printing a meme in a physical newspaper or magazine unless it's controversial enough to become the topic of a news story. To serve print needs, what if publishers hired staff memers or freelance memers – individuals with a pulse for viral content and an understanding of what resonates with younger readers, who could construct stylized, more professional-looking memes that could appear in print and on the weh?

Again, this isn't to say that traditional political cartoons no longer have a role. But it's time for publishers to anoint the internet meme as worthy of publication.

After all, the best political commentary is just as likely to be found on Tumblr as the pages of the Times.

Arunachal MLA, ten others gunned down by militants

ITANAGAR, MAY 21 (PTI): Suspected NSCN militants Tuesday gunned down sitting MLA and NPP assembly poll candidate Tirong Aboh and ten others, including his son and security personnel, in Tirap district of Arunachal Pradesh, a top police officer said.

Aboh (41), who represented the Khonsa West constituency, was seeking a re-election from the seat.

Initial reports suggested that seven people were killed in the attack, but Director General of Police (DGP) S B K Singh put the death toll at 11 later in the day.

Aboh was on his way to his constituency from Assam, along with family members, three police personnel and a poll agent, when the suspected NSCN rebels opened fire at their ve-



hicles near 12 Mile area in the district at around 11.30 am, Singh told PTI.

One security officer, who sustained injuries in the incident, has been admitted to a hospital in Dibrugarh, Assam, the DGP said, adding that the MLA and ten others were killed on the spot.

Expressing his shock over the incident, Chief Minister Pema Khandu said the perpetrators will be hunted down.

"Action will be initiated to hunt down the perpetrators. My heartfelt condolences. May the departed souls rest in peace," he said.

Condemning the attack, NPP president and Meghalaya Chief Minister Conrad K Sangma sought the intervention of the Prime Minister's Office and Union Home Minister Rajnath Singh.

"The NPP is extremelv shocked and saddened by the news of the death of its MLA Shri Tirong Aboh (Arunachal

Pradesh) and his family. We condemn the brutal attack and urge @rajnathsingh and @PMOIndia to take action against those responsible for such attack," Sangma tweeted.

Meanwhile, the Arunachal Pradesh Con-

gress Committee blamed the ruling Bharatiya Janata Party for the "prevailing lawlessness and chaos" in the state.

"If elected representatives of the state are not safe under the present dispensations at the Centre and the state, how can common people feel secure," the party said in a statement.

Demanding high-level judicial inquiry into the incident, it also said, "Chief Minister Pema Khandu and his BIP government are solely responsible for lawlessness and all chaos in the state."

Aboh was elected from the Khonsa West seat in 2014 on a Peoples' Party of Arunachal (PPA) ticket.

Assembly polls were held concurrently with Lok Sabha elections in Arunachal Pradesh.

TMC meets EC against BJP demand for deployment of central forces in West Bengal till May 25

NEW DELHI, MAY 21 (PTI): Questioning the BJP demand for deployment of central forces in West Bengal till the Model Code of Conduct is in place, a miffed Trinamool Congress on Tuesday asked the Election Commission "if Emergency has been declared" in the state, sources said.

A delegation of opposition leaders met the EC and demanded verification of VVPAT slips randomly-selected polling stations before the counting of the votes polled in the just-concluded Lok Sabha elec-

Nepal bans Alipay, WeChat Pay

KATHMANDU, MAY 21 (AFP): Nepal's central bank has banned popular Chinese digital wallets Alipay and WeChat, an official said Tuesday, fearing loss of foreign currency earnings from thousands of Chinese tourists that visit the country.

Nepal Rastra Bank issued a notice on Monday, banning the use of the Chinese digital payment platforms popularly used in hotels, restaurants and shops in tourist areas, especially in Chinese-run businesses.

Laxmi Prapanna Niroula, spokesman for Nepal's central bank said that using the platforms in the country was illegal without the bank's authorisation.

"We have enforced a ban on Alipay and WeChat Pay because the country is losing





foreign currency earnings through its usage. Action will be taken if anyone is found using the platforms," Niroula told AFP.

Niroula said currently there is no record of how many transactions have taken place through the platforms as they are not recorded in Nepal.

Alipay, started by e-commerce giant Alibaba and owned by its affiliate Ant Financial, and WeChat Pay, built into Tencent's popular messaging service, have hundreds of millions of users between them and

are China's dominant payment platforms.

Over 150,000 Chinese tourists visited Nepal last year, helping it reach a landmark of welcoming over a million tourists for the first

Bangladesh halts visas for Pakistani nationals amid diplomatic impasse

BY ANISUR RAHMAN DHAKA/ISLAMABAD, MAY 21 (PTI): Bangladesh high commission in Islamabad has stopped issuing visas to Pakistani nationals for one week over a fresh diplomatic row, a Bangladeshi official said Tuesday, amid strained bilateral ties since 2013 when Dhaka decided to hang several of the 1971 war criminals.

The diplomatic row Bangladesh between and Pakistan is on the rise since last year when Dhaka denied a visa to the Pakistan high commissioner.

"You can call it a sign of protest against the Pakistani gesture," a Bangladeshi foreign ministry official familiar with the development told PTI.

The foreign office in Dhaka, however, is yet to make any formal confirmation and no official notification has been issued on the halting of visas to the Pakistani nationals.

But the official, who preferred anonymity, said the Bangladeshi diplomat in charge of issuing visas refrained from processing the application by Pakistanis as Pakistani authorities had been sitting on his own official visa renewal application for the past four months.

Pakistani high commission in Dhaka is not processing his family members' visa applications, barring Bangladesh high commission's press and visa affairs councillor Iqbal Hossain from meeting his family, the official said.

"Issuance of any visa



to Pakistani nationals remains suspended as the visa counter in Bangladesh High Commission in Islamabad has been closed since last Monday [May 13]," Dhaka Tribune quoted Hossain as

Bangladeshi councillor said they had informed the South Asia wing of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs in Paki-

According to the officials, Hossain is living in Islamabad with his daughter while his wife and son were in Dhaka.

No official in the Pakistani high commission was immediately available for comments over the impasse.

Pakistan apparently has delayed the renewal of the visa after Dhaka refused to accept the nomination of the new high commissioner of Pakistan to Bangladesh for over a year.

In March 2018, Pakistan Foreign Ministry proposed Saglain Syedah as its new high commissioner to Bangladesh.

Bangladesh fused to accept Syedah's "agreement" (documents related to proposal of nomination) as Pakistan high Commissioner.

Six months later, Bangladesh verbally notified Pakistan that it cannot accept Syedah's nomination, and asked for an alternative nomination. Pakistan has not come up with any alternative nominations yet.

The row over the 1971 war criminals' trials visibly prompted Bangladesh not to clear the credentials of the proposed Pakistani high commissioner to Dhaka.

Syedah is now appointed as high commissioner to Kenya, according to an announcement by Pakistan Foreign Minister Shah Mahmood Qureshi on Monday.

According to a report in Pakistani media, the foreign ministry made a suggestion to Prime Minister Imran Khan to downgrade Bangladeshi mission in Islamabad as Pakistani mission in Dhaka was being run by a consular level officer.

Pakistan's national and provincial assemblies in recent years passed several resolutions while several of their ministers too issued statements protesting

trial of the top 1971 collaborators of Pakistani troops in Bangladesh.

The move prompted the foreign office in Dhaka to summon repeatedly Islamabad's envoy to be handed down protest

Five top collaborators of the Pakistani army, four being leaders of fundamentalist Jamaat-e-Islami which opposed the country's 1971 independence from Pakistan, have so far been executed after their trial in Bangladesh's International Crimes Tribunal.

The strained bilateral relations worsened in 2016 when Bangladesh forced Islamabad to take back three of its officials, including a woman diplomat, alleging their links to Islamist militants.

Diplomatic negotiations between the two countries are at a standstill for a few years now over Dhaka alleging Pakistani high commission of financing terrorist activities in the country.



Crisis-hit Sri Lanka far from subcontinent force this World Cup

TAPAN MOHANTA GUWAHATI, MAY (PTI): From leadership crisis to infighting in team to poor results to administrative mess, Sri Lanka cricket has endured all in run up to the World Cup and the former champions require no less than a miracle to emerge a worthy challenger this time.

Always a dark horse in this showpiece event, Sri Lanka have an impressive World Cup record with one title, two runner-up finish and one semifinal appearance but this time they will start as the weakest opponent.

With selectors axing some big names including Dinesh Chandimal and Niroshan Dickwella, it will be Dimuth Karunaratne, who last played an ODI in the 2015 World Cup, will lead the side.

Chandimal and Dickwella both led the side in different formats till early this year before handing the baton to Lasith Malinga under whom they lost 12 games on the trot.

That Sri Lanka have seen nine captains in two years across the formats, speaks volumes about the leadership crisis that has struck them.

There are also cracks

within the team with Angelo Mathews having differences with head coach Chandika Hathurusing-

Left with little choice, the Ashantha De Melled selection committee was forced to bring in Karunaratne, who had led them to a historic 2-0 Tests win in South Africa in February this year, for skipper's role.

For coach Hathurusingha however Chandimal was the preferred choice for captaincy. He had never kept Karunaratne in ODI scheme of things because of his inability to keep pace with the pace of the ODI format.

So it remains to be seen how the duo would work in tandem.

Add the recent corruption charges against legendary Sanath Jayasuriya among others, and the Sri Lankan cricket is in desperate times as they never looked so unsettled and in disarray.

It has reflected in their poor performances as they have lost 55 of the 84 ODIs they played since 2015 World Cup and have not won a single bilateral series since May 2016, while their last ODI win had come way back in October last year.

Removed from cap-

taincy, Malinga would look to prove a point being the best bowler of the country as he will be their key man in the bowling.

By delivering a clinical last over to win the IPL for Mumbai Indians recently, the 35-yearold showed why he still ranks among the best in business as far as death bowling is concerned.

Two of his three hattricks have come in the World Cup and Malinga would once again look to make an impact if they are to make the semifinals.

Former captain Mathews will hope that he remains injury-free and play the role of a finisher besides providing breakthroughs with his medium pace bowling.

Sri Lanka will expect Thisara Perera to shine with his all-round ability. He is their highest run-getter in ODIs and only second to Malinga in terms of wickets,

Apart from these players, Sri Lanka lack experience. Lahiru Thirimanne, Milinda Siriwardana, Ieevan Mendis and Jeffrey Vandersay have not played ODI for long.

Behind the stumps too Sri Lanka appear depleted with their Kusal Perera and Kusal Mendis earmarked for duty when both players don't even keep wickets at domestic level.

Sri Lanka have made the knockouts every time since 2003 but looking at the present scenario it will be a miracle of sorts if they make the last-four stage this time.

The Karunaratneled side will begin their campaign against New Zealand on June 1.

NEW DELHI, MAY 21 ing watchdog on time. (PTI): Gomathi Marimuthu, who won the 800 metres gold at the Asian Championships last month, was Tuesday handed a provisional suspension after being tested positive for a banned substance.

The 'A' sample of the 30-year-old runner from Tamil Nadu, who clocked 2 minute and 2.70 seconds to win the gold on April 22, has returned positive for a steroid in the test conducted during the Asian Athletics Championships in Doha.

If her 'B' sample also tests positive, she faces a maximum ban of four years -- as this will be her first doping offence -- while India will lose a gold medal from the Asian Championships. India had won three gold, seven silver and as many bronze medals in the Asian Championships.

"Yes, Gomathi has tested positive for a steroid and she has been placed under provisional suspension," a top source told PTI on condition of anonymity.

It is learnt that Gomathi had earlier tested positive for a banned substance in the sample the National Anti-Doping Agency collected in Patiala during the March 15-18 Federation Cup but was not communicated by the national anti-dop-

"We have learnt that Gomathi also tested positive in the sample taken during the Federation Cup which was held in mid March. But that report is yet to reach us even now, after more than two months. That report is on the way, we have told.

"If the report was handed to us on time, she would have been stopped from taking part in the Asian Championships and the country would have been saved from this humiliation.

"We have no idea why the NADA did not inform us on Gomathi's dope positive result to us before the Asian Championships. There was more than one month's time in between," the AFI official said.

Gomathi has been on the national circuit for some time but her timing has been mediocre. Not a national camper, Gomathi's 2:03.21 performance that gave her a gold in the Federation Cup in March raised questions over her sudden improvement.

"She was not in the national camp and that is why we have been emphasising on the requirement that athletes who have to take part in the international events should be from the national camp," the official

OECD cuts global growth forecast as US-China tensions rise

PARIS. MAY 21 (AFP): The OECD on Tuesday cut its forecast for the world economy, urging governments to resolve their trade disputes as the latest flare-up in the China-US trade war threatens to crimp global growth.

"Governments must act urgently to reinvigorate growth that benefits all," the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development said as it pared back its forecast for global growth to 3.2 percent this year from 3.3 percent earlier.

"Resolve trade disputes through increased international cooperation while fixing the international rules-based system," the OECD said.

"Invest in infrastructure, digital transformation and skills to meet tomorrow's challenges. In the euro area, combine structural with fiscal policies to stimulate activity."

The OECD's updated forecasts did not take directly into account the latest flare-up in the long-running trade war between Washington and Beijing, "insofar that



length of time (tariffs) will remain in place and the future evolution of the trade relationship between the two countries," an OECD source told AFP.

Nevertheless, projections did "incorporate" the increased uncertainty generated by the trade tensions, the source said.

As both Washington and Beijing slap trade tariffs on more and more of each other's goods, President Donald Trump has barred US companies from engaging in telecommunications trade with foreign companies said to threaten American national security.

US internet giant Google, whose Android mobile operating system powers most of the world's smartphones, then announced that it was beginning to cut ties with China's Huawei, which Washington considers a national security threat.

While the OECD pared back its global growth forecast for the current year, it predicted a pick-up in activity to 3.4 percent next year.

It notched up its forecast for US growth this year by 0.2 percentage point to 2.8 percent, but predicted a slowdown to 2.3 percent next year.

Chinese growth was projected to slow to 6.2 percent this year and 6.0 percent next year.

The outlook for the euro area growth was unchanged at 1.2 percent this year.

Malawi votes in tight three-way election

LILONGWE, MAY (AFP): Malawi goes to the polls on Tuesday after a closely-fought election campaign, with President Peter Mutharika battling to hold off two serious rivals in a race that focused on corruption allegations and economic development.

Mutharika, who has been in power since 2014, will face opposition from his own deputy Saulos Chilima and former baptist preacher Lazarus Chakwera.

"We have set Malawi on the path of progress," Mutharika, 78, told several thousand cheering supporters of his ruling Democratic Progressive Party (DPP) in Blantyre at his final campaign rally at the weekend.

His bid for a second term has focused on the economy and his record of improving road and electricity infrastructure across the southeastern African country.

Under Mutharika, inflation has fallen from 23 percent to below nine per cent, but still only 11 percent of the population has access to electricity.

The election is the first since a new law forced parties to declare large donations and banned the once-common practice by candidates of giving

cash handouts. Polling starts at 06:00am (0400 GMT)

on Tuesday. Food shortages,

power outages and ballooning external debt have hurt Mutharika's popularity ahead of the vote.

He faces a strong challenge from Chakwera, leader of the main opposition Malawi Congress Party (MCP), who came a narrow second in the 2014 election.

Ahead of the vote, Chakwera told AFP that he expected "nothing less than victory -- we are winning." Mutharika's other opponent, Chilima, quit the ruling party last year to form the youth-focused United Transformation Movement, while staying on as vice president.

Under Malawi law, the president cannot fire the vice president.

Chilima, 46, emphasised his youth credentials by doing push-ups on stage during the campaign.

More than half of the 6.8-million registered voters are under 35.

Dan Banik, a politics professor at the University of Malawi, told AFP that the election posed many questions.

"What will happen when a winner is declared by a narrow margin?" he said.

"How will losing presidential candidates take defeat? Will supporters of the incumbent DPP peacefully accept losing?" he asked.

Banik said that the election commission and the courts could be severely tested by counting complaints after polling day on Tuesday, when voters will also choose lawmakers and local councillors.

In Malawi's "winner takes all" system, Mutharika won in 2014 with just 36 per cent of the vote.

He came to power in the aid-dependent country vowing to tackle corruption after the "Cashgate" scandal erupted a year earlier, revealing massive looting from state coffers.

But his government has been dogged by several high-profile cases of corruption and nepotism.

Last November, Mutharika himself was forced to return a 200,000 donation from a businessman facing a corruption case in a 3-million contract to supply food to the Malawi police.

"It will even be more uncertain and tight than last time. It could undermine the legitimacy of the winning candidate," said Michael Jana, a Malawi politics specialist at Johannesburg's University of the Witwatersrand.

Malawi won independence from Britain in 1964, and was then ruled by Hastings Banda as a one-party state until the first multi-party elections in 1994.

The country, which has a population of 18 million people, has one million adults living with HIV -- one of the highest HIV prevalence rates in the world.

Christchurch attacker charged with terrorism: police

WELLINGTON, MAY 21 (AFP): The man accused of shooting dead 51 Muslim worshippers in the Christchurch mosque attacks was formally charged with terrorism for the first time on Tuesday, New Zealand police said.

In addition to the terror charge, Brenton Tarrant also faces 51 charges of murder and 40 of attempted murder over the March 15 attacks that rocked the South Pacific nation.

"The charge will allege that a terrorist act was carried out in Christchurch," police said in a statement.

New Zealand Prime Minister Jacinda Ardern has characterised the mosque killings as "a well-planned terrorist attack" since the day Tarrant, a self-described white supremacist, allegedly carried them out.

But until now the charges against him were less expansive, as New Zealand's Terrorism Suppression Act was only introduced in 2002 and is untested in the courts.

Police said the decision to lay the terror charge more than two months after the attack was made following consultation with prosecutors and government legal experts.

Tarrant, a 28-yearold Australian, is currently in a high-security prison undergoing tests to determine if he is mentally fit to stand trial for the worst massacre in modern New Zealand history.

His next court appearance is scheduled for June 14.

US delays Huawei ban for 90 days

WASHINGTON. MAY 21 (AFP): US officials have delayed a ban on American technology exports to Chinese tech giant Huawei until mid-August, saying the time was needed to allow for software

updates and other contractual obligations.

A Commerce Department filing Monday said the delay does not change the ban imposed by President Donald Trump on national security grounds, an action with major implications for US and Chinese technology firms.

The document said authorities would not enforce the ban for 90 days to give Huawei and its partners time

"to maintain and support existing and currently fully operational networks and equipment, including software updates and patches, subject to legally binding contracts and agreements... on or before May 16, 2019.

second term as president JAKARTA, MAY 21 (AFP): Indonesia's Joko Widodo has been re-elected as president of the world's third-biggest democracy, the elections commission said early Tuesday, beating rival Prabowo Subianto, a retired general who has vowed to challenge any victory for the incumbent leader.

The commission was expected to announce the official results of the April 17 poll on Wednesday in the Southeast Asian nation of 260 million.

But amid fears about unrest and street demonstrations in response to the final count, the final tally was released early with little advance notice.

Widodo and his vice-presidential running mate Ma'ruf Amin won the election by a 55.5 per cent to 44.5 per cent margin over Subianto and Sandiaga Uno, the elections commission said.

"This ruling was announced on May 21... and will be effectively immediately," the commission's chair Arief



Budiman said in a live streamed announcement that was broadcast on major media.

Widodo, 57, had been widely predicted to win according to unofficial results.

His challenger Subianto, 67, has vowed to challenge any victory for Widodo, alleging widespread voter fraud, and warned that it could spark street protests across the world's biggest Muslim majority nation.

Some 32,000 security personnel were being deployed across the capital Jakarta, including in front of the General Elections Commission's downtown office which has been bar-

ricaded with razor wire. Tensions have also been heightened after police said Friday that they have arrested dozens of Islamic-State linked terror suspects, including some who planned to detonate bombs at political demonstrations when election results were to be announced.
