CM and Cabinet take oath of office afresh in Delhi

SUMMIT REPORT GANGTOK, 01 DEC:

hief Minister PS Tamang [Golay] took oath of office and secrecy afresh at a ceremony held at Sikkim House, New Delhi, late on Saturday evening. A day later, on Sunday morning, the Cabinet followed suit and was sworn in again, also at

Sikkim House in New Delhi.

The ceremony had to be held in New Delhi because the Governor is indisposed and recuperating there and could not return to Sikkim. The swearing-in, it may be recalled, was originally announced for 26 November but was rescheduled, without any public announcement, because the Governor was unable to return in time for the ceremony.

An official press communiqué from Raj Bhawan informs that fresh appointment and subsequent swearing -In was necessitated following the completion of Mr Tamang's six month term in office as Chief Minister during which he was elected to the SIkkim Legislative Assembly in the Assembly by-election in October.

Mr Tamang's six-month term ended on 27 November and the original scheduled date for his fresh swearing



was a day ahead of this date. Mr Tamang and the SKM MLAs flew to Delhi on Saturday, a day after the two-day Assembly session.

The press release informs that earlier on Saturday, the Legislative Party of Sikkim Krantikari Morcha submitted a formal resolution to Governor Ganga Prasad reposing their continued faith in Mr Tamang as their leader and unanimously electing him the Leader of the SKM Legislative Party.

Given the lack of official comment on this development until the swearing in ceremony was held, there was much speculation in Sikkim about what was afoot. It did not help matters that the SKM, in its only official comment on the Delhi visit, insisted that the entire SKM legislature was in Delhi on official business and to pursue Sikkim's long-pending demands with the Central Government. This statement made no mention of the swearing-in cer-

emony scheduled for Delhi or offered any explanations on why this was nec-

Following Mr Tamang's late Saturday evening swearing in, the SKM Govt's Cabinet, unchanged since it was first constituted, was also administered oath of office and secrecy by the Governor at Sikkim House on Sunday morning.

explains that the swearing-in ceremony was necessitated at Sikkim House, New Delhi, due to travel restrictions on Governor Ganga Prasad on account of his health concerns.

Voda Idea to raise mobile call, data charges from Dec 3 by up to 50%

New Delhi, Dec 1 (PTI): In a first mobile tariff hike in past four years, telecom operator Vodafone Idea on Sunday announced new plans under which call and data charges will be dearer for its prepaid customers by up to 50 per cent from December 3.

Besides this, Vodafone Idea will also charge 6 paise per minute for every outgoing call made by customers on to the network of other operators.

"Vodafone Idea Limited (VIL), India's leading telecom service provider, today announced new tariffs/plans for its prepaid products and services. New plans will be available across India starting 00:00 hours of 3 December 2019," the company said in a statement.

The company will increase its entry level unlimited plan with a year-long validity by about 50 per cent to Rs 1,499 from with 24 GB of data instead of Rs 999 plan, which comes with 12 GB data usage limit.

The price of plan with 365 days offering of 1.5 Gb per day with 84 validity in the same category with daily data usage limit of 1.5 GB per day will cost 41.2 per cent more at Rs 2,399 from December 3 as against 1,699 at present.

Vodafone Idea has only revised rates of plan promising unlimited mobile and data services and also introduced some new plans.

A company official explained all the existing plans in unlimited category will be replaced by the new plans from December 3 and new plans will be introduced or revised based on market response.

Though the company classifies a set of plans in 'unlimited' category, these actually come with usage limit for data at a promised speed and 100 SMS per day limit.

The highest rate of increase of 41.2 per cent has been announced by the company in annual unlimited category plan which will cost Rs 2,399 instead of 1,699 at present.

days validity in "unlimited" category will cost around 31 per cent more at Rs 599 compared to Rs 458 at present. The company will raise the price of Rs 199 unlimited plan, which offers 1.5 Gb data per day, by about 25 per cent to Rs 249.

Vodafone Idea which is reeling under massive debt of around Rs 1.17 lakh crore had earlier cited acute financial stress on the company behind the decision to raise mobile call and data charges.

Vodafone Idea last month reported a consolidated loss of Rs 50,921 crore -- the highest ever loss posted by any Indian corporate -- for the September quarter on account of liability arising out of the Supreme Court's order in the adjusted gross revenue (AGR) case. The company has estimated liability of Rs 44,150 crore post the apex court order, and made provisioning of Rs 25,680 crore in the second quarter this fiscal.

Police have said they nabbed the four accused who have confessed to their crime. Why is the Chief Minister not ensuring quick iustice?.

Why is the same treatment not

being meted out to them (accused) for what they have done to the girl?" she asked

Another woman asked why the Prime Minister has not yet tweeted on the incident.

"Looking at the changed political scenario in state, there is a need to think and decide the way ahead. I need time for some 8-10 days to communicate with myself. Our future journey need to be decided against the backdrop of current political changes.

"What to do next? Which path to be taken? What can we give to people? What is our strength? What are expectations of people? I will think about all these aspects and come before you on December 12," Pankaja wrote in her post, which is in Marathi.

In the assembly elections held on October 21, Pankaja lost to her cousin and NCP rival Dhananjay Munde in a bitter contest from Parli seat in Beed dis-

Pankaja wrote that she had accepted her defeat in the polls and

"I had attended the meetings of the party (BJP)," the former Parli MLA wrote.

Maharashtra spokesperson Shirish Boralkar told PTI on Pankaja, who had Sunday that Pankaja will continue her work to make the BJP stronger in the state.

"I have read the Facebook post of Pankaja Munde. This post nowhere conveys that Pankaja is not happy with the BJP.

She attended the core committee meetings of the BJP. She is a daughter of Gopinath Munde who had contributed immensely in building the BJP in the state," he said.

Boralkar said Pankaja is with the BJP.

Pankaja could not be contacted despite repeated attempts.

Maharashtra politics witnessed many a twists and turns after the assembly poll results were declared on October 24.

Scripting a new political chapter in the state, the Shiv Sena ditched its old ally BJP, which had won maximum 105 seats, and joined hands with former rivals NCP and Congress to form a Maharashtra Vikas Aghadi (MVA) government.

Sena president Uddhav Thackeray took oath of the new MVA government on Thursday. The alliance government won floor test on Saturday comfortably with the support of 169 MLAs in the 288-member Assembly.

Former Maharashtra chief minister Devendra Fadnavis was on Sunday named Leader of Opposition in the state Assembly, while Congress MLA Nana Patole was elected

Speaker of the House.

Patole, 57, who was earlier in the day elected unopposed as the speaker after BJP's Kisan Kathore withdrew from the fray, announced that Fadnavis is the new Leader of Opposition in the Assembly.

"It is poetic justice that those who wanted non- existence of the opposition will now have to work as an effective opposition," Patole said. The Uddhav Thacker-

ay-led Maha Vikas Aghadi government passed the floor test in the state Assembly on Saturday. Altogether 169 MLAs

voted in favour of the motion of confidence after the BJP, which has 105 MLAs, staged a walkout before the head count began in the 288-mem-

For Fadnavis, 49, this is his fifth term as an MLA, while it is the fourth one for Patole.

NCP minister lavant Patil appreciated the "spirit of understanding" shown by the BJP in withdrawing its candidate and ensuring that Patole was elected unopposed.

Speaking in the Assembly after Patole announced the appointment of Fadnavis, Uddhav Thackeray taunted the former CM over the latter's impassioned pre-poll "Me punha yein" (I will return) assertion which had evoked many social media

"I never said I will come back, but I came in this House," Thackeray said. "I can assure this House and people of Maharashtra that I will not do anything at midnight. I will be working for the interests of the people," he

Thackeray's swipe was apparently about the early morning hush hush as CM on November 3, along with NCP leader Ajit Pawar as deputy chief minister, after night-long dramatic political developments in Mumbai and Delhi.

Patil also targeted Fadnavis.

"He (Fadnavis) said he would return, but didn't say where he will sit (in the House)," Patil said.

"Now he has returned and is occupying this top post (of Leader of Opposition) which is of the same level as CM post," Patil

The NCP leader expressed confidence that Fadnavis won't be part of any efforts to dislodge the Thackeray-led government of the Sena-NCP-Congress com-

Responding to the barbs over his ""Me punha yein" remarks, Fadnavis said he forgot to announce a time table about his return (as CM).

"Mera paani utarte dekh kinare par ghar mat dar hoon, laut kar vapis aaoonga ((Thinking the tide has ebbed, don't you dare build your house on the coast, for I am the sea, and I will come back)," he said, quoting a famous sher (couplet).

Thackeray said he wont call Fadnavis an 'opposition leader', but a 'responsible leader'. "If you would have been good to us then, all this (BJP-Shiv Sena split) would have not happened," he added.

"I have learnt a lot of things from Fadvanis and I will always be friends with him. I am still with the ideology of 'Hindutva' and won't ever leave it. In the past five years, I never betrayed the (BJP-Sena) government," he said.

The BJP could not come to power in Maharashtra despite emerging as the single largest party as "political arithmetic prevailed over merit, Fadnavis said in the Assembly after a resolution was moved to congratulate him on being opposition.

The resolution was moved by Thackeray and supported by members of other parties.

"The BJP got people's mandate as ours is the single largest party. Our strike rate was 70 per cent in the October 21 Assembly polls, but political arithmetic prevailed over merit. Those who got around 40 per cent marks in the election have formed the government," Fadnavis said.

"We are accepting it as part of democracy," he

"I did say 'I will come back', but forgot to give you the time-table for it. But I can assure you one thing, you need to wait for some time."

"I not only announced several projects in the last five years, but started work on them as well. You never know, I may come back to inaugurate them," he said.

Fadnavis also assured

"My opposition to the government will be on some of the principles, and without any personal agenda," he said.

RBI may cut interest rates again to support growth NEW DELHI, DEC 1 (PTI): beginning December 3, a ber-December) may not growth could be further

The Reserve Bank may identified, said. cut interest rates for the

sixth straight time on December 5 to support growth that has continued to slip to more than six-year low on slump in manufacturing, bankers and experts said.

RBI has cut interest rates on every single occasion the multi-member monetary policy committee (MPC) has met since Shaktikanta Das took over as the Governor of RBI in last December.

In five reductions so far in 2019, interest rates have been lowered by a total of 135 basis points over concerns that growth momentum is slowing down and also to try to boost liquidity in the financial system.

GDP growth slowed sharply to a pace of 4.5 per cent in the July-September, hit by a slump in manufacturing output, which contracted by 1.0 per cent. The pace of GDP growth has moderated from the 5 per cent rate in April-June and 7 per cent in July-September quarter of 2018.

Das had previously stated that interest rates will reduce until growth revives and this gives confidence that interest rates may be reduced at the end of three-day monetary policy review banker, wishing not to be

"With the RBI Monetary Policy Committee having decided to retain an accommodative stance following its October rate cut, further rate cuts are possible if economic conditions remain weak," said Rajiv Biswas, Asia Pacific Chief Economist at IHS Markit.

The fall in GDP growth rate was despite a slew of new fiscal policy measures including a large reduction in the base corporate tax rate in a bid to boost private sector investment.

Rumki Majumdar, Economist, Deloitte India said inflation is low and is expected to remain so because of the excess capacity in the economy. "This gives the RBI the elbow room to cut rates, which is highly anticipated in the upcoming December meeting."

In doing so, RBI may look past the recent uptick in inflation last month, largely attributed to vegetables such as onions. But importantly, there has been a slide in core infla-

Motilal Oswal Financial Services Ltd chief economist Nikhil Gupta said: "We are afraid that expectations of better growth in 3QFY20 (Octopan out. Leading indicators suggest that October (festival month) was the worst in the current cycle. We believe that growth could weaken further to around 4 per cent in 3QFY20, which will mark the trough."

"Our full-year growth forecast, thus, is revised down from 5.7 per cent earlier to 4.5 per cent for FY20," he said.

Ranen Banerjee, Leader Public Finance and Economics, PwC India, said the second quarter GDP numbers made it more imperative for a fiscal led priming as the monetary policy interventions clearlv are not transmitting. "Thus, just to de-

pend on another rate cut by RBI in the upcoming MPC meeting may not be sufficient. The situation demands a coordinated fiscal priming on areas with higher multipliers and where spends could be immediate combined with a monetary policy push to address the effective transmission of rate cuts to the NBFCs. Effect of rural demand uptick on Q3 numbers will be crucial to avert a sub 5 per cent annual growth rate," Banerjee said.

Sreejith Balasubramanian, Economist - Fund Management, IDFC AMC bottoming-out of

growth could be further down the road and recovery is unlikely to be V-shaped as consumer demand, credit supply and risk appetite remain lacklustre.

"This and the falling core-CPI should allow the RBI focus more on growth, while a major fiscal stimulus is hindered by the lack of available household financial savings," he said.

Rajni Thakur, Economist, RBL Bank said the growth in the second half of the year could remain evasive unless government pumps in more stimulus and continues to heavy lift growth push through the fiscal year.

"The grind up is going to be slow and heavily dependent on fiscal support to come out of current growth recession."

Majumdar said aggressive asset sales and privatisation reforms will give the government some fiscal space to incur counter-cyclical fiscal policies to boost growth without widening the fiscal deficit. "Confronted with the

sharp slowdown in economic growth momentum, the Indian government should give a high priority to implementing additional measures to bolster manufacturing output and kick-start an upturn in the investment cvcle.



Honey-trap case: Raid at local bizman's home, media firm

INDORE, DEC 1 (PTI): local organisations of Madhya Pradesh Police along with the Indore district authorities raided the home, media firm and three other establishments of a local businessman in connection with the honey-trap case, an official said on Sunday.

The raids were conducted at businessman Jitendra Soni's home, hotel, restaurant and night club here late Saturday night, he said.

"Soni also owns a local eveninger. The investigators also went to his newspaper's office," the official said.

The authorities have so far not shared any details of the searches conducted at Soni's premises.

His media firm was of late publishing news about some audio-video clips allegedly linked to

the honey-trap case. Meanwhile,

journalists condemned the raid on Soni's media firm, saying the exercise was aimed at "intimidating" the fourth pillar of democracy.

Five women and a man were arrested from Indore and Bhopal in September for allegedly running the honey-trap and blackmailing racket.

The racket was busted after an engineer of the Indore Municipal Corporation approached the police, claiming he was being blackmailed over some objectionable video clips by the accused who were trying to extort about Rs 3 crore from him.

The accused - Aarti Dayal (29), Monika Yadav (18), Shweta Vijay Jain (39), Shweta Swapnil Jain (48), Barkha Soni (34) and Omprakash Kori (45) - are currently in judicial custody.

TEHRAN, 01 DEC [AP]: "What are vou scared of?" the woman in the black coat shouts. "Help me to understand." She marches up to a man in uniform guarding the petrol station. "You're ruining us," she screams, as the man walks away.

The exchange comes from footage taken around 1am on Friday 15 November in the south-central Iranian city of Shiraz. Hours earlier, in a surprise announcement, Iran's government had said it was raising the price of fuel by up to three times, adding to the strain on a population already struggling with an economy suffocated by US sanctions.

petrol-price The hike would trigger what may have been the largest-scale unrest in the 40-year history of the Islamic Republic. Iranian officials this week estimated 200,000 people were involved in the protests and riots which led to 7,000 arrests and, by some estimates, the regime's deadliest-ever response to demonstrations. Amnesty International have confirmed 15 deaths in Shiraz; those on the ground say the toll is much higher.

Like the rest of Iran, Shiraz was cut off from the world by an unprecedented five-day internet blackout. Precisely what transpired in the heartland of Persian culture known as the City of Ros-

side Shiraz, as well as analysis of social media posts, give a glimpse of what is thought to have been one of the largest protest outbreaks in the country, incurring one of the highest known death

Before the woman in the black coat leaves the petrol station, she turns to the other drivers in line, exhorting them to park their cars in the middle of the roads to protest the price increase. "On Saturday, whoever is a real man will park their car in the middle of the street," she declares from the door. By Saturday morn-

ing, people were heeding the woman and others calling for mass civil disobedience. At least one major road in Shiraz had become a parking lot. "People are protesting and have blocked the streets completely," says a voice, surveying the sea of cars in both directions in an industrial area of the city. Drivers gather in groups outside their cars, chatting. The vehicles curve along the palmlined road to the edge of the frame.

As the day went on, protesters were pouring into the streets of outer-lying areas across the city, according to activists. Social media footage shows significant unrest

The rallies were peaceful, and at first, so was the state response. Footage shows demonstrators applauding as police in riot gear are handed flowers. Protesters say they sat in groups on the road, chanting and playing cards.

Later, a protester would record a voice message to the US-based Iranian activist Masih Alinejad, reflecting on the morning. "Everything was going well and people were all smiling and happy," he said. "I saw people giving roses to the police, the first days was very peaceful and it was all good. Even the police were fine."

It did not last. Footage that activists believe was shot on Maliabad Boulevard the same day appears to show security personnel charging through crowds, sending people fleeing. Clouds of what appears to be tear gas can be seen forming.

There also appears to have been rioting: a video said to have been shot in the city shows fires burning in several spots, a handful of shops gutted, and the road scattered with paper and debris.

"The youth has no future in this country with these thieves in power," a protester tells Alinejad in a voice recording heard by the Guardian. "They couldn't take it anymore and they were full of rage. They took

The protesters, including many from working-class neighbourhoods, brawled with security personnel in some areas, using nails pushed through bottle caps as makeshift spikes to puncture the tyres of police motorcycles and At some point that

afternoon, the police started shooting. Activists have posted footage from Saturday that shows gunshots going off near a Maliabad Boulevard police station.

"This is Shiraz and the armed forces are firing at the people," says a man filming outside the police station in another clip. He pushes his way through a chanting crowd, who surround a bloodied man on the ground. It is Mehdi Nekouyee, 20, the first person confirmed to have been killed in Shiraz's protests.

Because the inter-

net was cut, Nekouvee's family overseas first learned of his death when someone inside Iran wished them condolences on social media. "[Mehdi] was quiet, very open minded," his uncle remembers. "He wanted freedom, free-

dom of speech." Nekouyee's killing enraged the demonstrators. Activists say the protesters began to hurl rocks at the police station, tearing at its fence. By Saturday evening, the building was said to be alight.

"They were firing live rounds and tear gas, but people were really courageous and did whatever it took," a man's voice said in another recorded message sent to Alinejad. "We asked the people who were burning things [to stop], we don't know who they are, but people are full of rage and no one could stop them.

"It is really bad and everyone is running for their lives, and the from the same home-

land ... It was a violence that I've never seen before."

Throughout Saturday and the next day, demonstrations were erupting in different parts of the city. Golshan, a suburb in Shiraz's north-west that is home to many members of the Qashqai minority group, became "a war zone", one activist with contacts in the city said. "Security forces entered with heavy weapons and helicopters." All roads into the area were closed from Saturday until the following Tuesday, he said.

Protesters appear to have remained in control of Sadra for most of the weekend. On Sunday 17 November, demonstrators appear to have set fire to the office of the senior imam in the area, a direct attack on the country's clerical establishment.

Reservations – Promoting Lethargy or Improving Access

Before the bouquet is increased, revisit why quotas were need

This section has discussed the issue of quotas **I** and reservations often, but given the near obsessive pursuit with which such "protection" is chased after, discussing this theme is perhaps never too much. So here goes one more. But a qualifier first - this publication believes that protection by way of reservations is still required in our country where gross inequality forced by accidents of birth and offensive prejudice directed against communities and regions still prevail. If anything, such extreme and irrationally hostile mindsets have seen a resurgence in recent years, reinforcing stereotypes and foisting easy partisanship. That is the reality we live with, but occasionally, as citizens of a free and secular nation, we can occasionally also aspire for more ideal scenarios to eventually arrive into.

This then, is as good a time as ever to delve into the near passionate ambition of all communities to get included in some category or the other. We have in our country, quite a wide range of categories to choose from – there is the Scheduled Tribes list, the Schedule Caste recognition, the OBC, now even MBC and some years ago, Bihar introduced us to the EBC grouping – and one can rest assured that more such segregations will be dreamed up in the coming years as privileged communities which still dominate have someone made political currency out of their imagined persecution. It is that situation where the traditionally privileged, get frightened and feel threatened as more of the underdogs rise above the conditions of their birth through hard work and some hand-holding. To them, growing equality feels like oppression. Unfortunately, no one tells them otherwise because "reservation" has now become an aspiration that every citizen feels a right to aspire towards and has become an easy springboard to launch political careers from.

So, why the categorizations?

Given the history that India had emerged from in 1947, where caste alienation was extreme and tribals genuinely under-privileged and oppressed, a policy was required to overcome a legacy of injustice and to provide everyone in this country with a broad measure of equal opportunities. Since equal opportunities would not have been willingly granted and communities with centuries of oppression behind them could not be expected to benefit from an equal footing, reservations were eked out. Over the years, the reservations were extended to include more communities and even women. The idea was to provide these communities with the first stepping stone to equality - access. Access to education, to jobs, to positions of power and access to exposure. This target has been met relatively well and as far as access is concerned, a wide sweep has been achieved.

The obvious next step would have been to pull communities which have benefited enough out of the reserved categories and make more room for those communities which still lag behind. This is easier said than done. For one, there is no easily quantifiable way to decide when a community has "developed" enough to make it on its own steam sans reservation, and for the other, there is the vote-bank politics in which saner decisions in genuine public good would be political hara-kiri. So, the nation is left with an ever overflowing baggage of reserved sections and shrinking opportunities.

This is where the whole policy has failed. Instead of making people competitive with improved access, it has made them lazy with increased quotas. Little wonder then that more and more communities want to fit into some category or the other. In fact, in the present times, when jobs are rare and competition even for education tough, it would be foolish for community leaders not to work for a quota for their people. And so the demands keep pouring in.

This is not to belittle the aspirations of any community to find a new grouping for itself, but just a suggestion that maybe it is time the country and Sikkim paused to re-read the principles why reservations and special categories were first drafted, whether its expressed aims are being met or not, and also whether the people who genuinely deserve reservations are actually getting it or not in the first place.

Your big brain makes you human - count your neurons when you count your blessings

Here's something new to consider being thankful for at the dinner table: the long evolutionary journey that gave you your big brain and your long life.

Courtesy of our primate ancestors that invented cooking over a million years ago, you are a member of the one species able to afford so many cortical neurons in its brain. With them come the extended childhood and the pushing century-long lifespan that together make human beings unique.

All these bequests of your bigger brain cortex mean you can gather four generations around a meal to exchange banter and gossip, turn information into knowledge and even practice the art of what-not-to-say-when.

You may even want to be thankful for another achievement of our neuron-crammed human cortices: all the technology that allows people spread over the globe to come together in person, on screens, or through words whispered directly into your ears long distance.

I know I am thankful. But then, I'm the one proposing that we humans revise the way we tell the story of how our species came to be.

BRAINS MADE OF CELLS, BUT HOW MANY?

Back when I had just received my freshly minted Ph.D. in neuroscience and started working in science communication, I found out that 6 in 10 college-educated people believed they only used 10% of their brains. I'm glad to say that they're wrong: We use all of it, just in different ways at dif-

The myth seemed to be supported by statements in serious textbooks and scientific articles that "the human brain is made of 100 billion neurons and 10 times as many supporting glial cells." I wondered if those numbers were facts or guesses. Did anyone actually know that those were the numbers of cells in the human brain?

No, they didn't.

Neuroscientists did have a rough idea. Some estimates suggested 10 to 20 billion neurons for the human cerebral cortex, others some 60 to 80 billion in another region called the cerebellum. With the rest of the brain known to be fairly sparse in comparison, the number of neurons in the whole human brain was definitely closer to 100 billion than to just 10 billion (far too little) or 1 trillion (way too many).

But there we were, neuroscientists armed with fancy tools to modify genes and light up parts of the brain, still in the dark about what different brains were made of and how the human brain compared to others.

COUNTING UP NEURONS IN BRAIN SOUP So I devised a way to easily and rapidly count

how many cells a brain is made of. I spent 15 years collecting brains and then turning them into soup

that I examined under the microscope. That's how

I got the hard numbers. As it turned out, there are many ways to put brains together: Primates like us have more neurons in the cerebral cortex than most other mammals, no matter the size of the brain. A brain can be large but made of relatively few neurons if those neurons are huge, like in an elephant; primate neurons are small, and bird neurons are even tinier, so even the smallest bird brains can hide lots of neurons. But never as many as the largest primate

When comparing brains, we care about numbers of neurons in the cortex because it's the area of the brain that lets us go beyond the simple detection and response to stimuli, allowing us to learn from the past and make plans for the future.

Because neurons are the Lego pieces that build brains and process information, the more cortical neurons a species has, the more flexible and complex that species' cognition can be, regardless of size. And not just that: I recently found that the more cortical neurons, the longer the species takes to develop into adulthood, just like it takes longer to assemble a truckload of Legos into a mansion than a handful into a little house. And for as yet unknown reasons, along with more cortical neurons comes a longer life.

Getting more cortical neurons thus seems to be a two-for-one bargain: Buy more mental capabilities, and along comes more lifetime to learn to use them.

POWERING ALL THOSE NEURONS

Lots more neurons cost lots more energy,

If people had kept exclusively eating raw foods,

like all other primates do, they would need to spend over nine hours every single day searching, collecting, picking and eating to feed their 16 billion cortical neurons. Forget about discovering electricity or building airplanes. There would be no time for looking at the stars and wondering about what could be. Our great ape cousins, ever the raw foodies, still have at most half as many cortical neurons as we do – and they eat over eight hours per day.

But our ancestors figured out how to cheat nature to get more from less, first with stone tools and later with fire. They invented cooking and changed human history. Eating is faster and much more efficient, not to say delicious, when food is pre-processed and transformed with fire.

With plenty of calories available in much less time, new generations gained bigger and bigger brains. And the more cortical neurons they had, the longer kids remained kids, the longer their parents lived, and the more the former could learn from the latter, then from grandparents, and even great-grandparents. Cultures soon flourished. Technology bloomed and lived on through schooling and science, becoming ever more complex.

With so much culture to share, what makes us modern humans has become about much more than our human biology. Being born with lots of neurons gives us the potential for a long and slow life, one where each of our brains gets a chance to be educated by what the generations before us have learned, and to educate the next ones. We will remain modern humans so long as we are willing to convene around dinner tables to celebrate our differences and to share our hard-earned knowledge, stories of success and failure, our hopes and dreams.

As a physician, I have helped to care for many patients and families whose lives have been turned upside down by serious illnesses and injuries. In the throes of such catastrophes, it can be difficult to find cause for anything but lament. Yet Thanksgiving presents us with an opportunity to develop one of the healthiest, most life-affirming and convivial of all habits - that of counting and rejoicing in our blessings.

GRATITUDE'S BENEFITS

Research shows that grateful people tend to be healthy and happy. They exhibit lower levels of stress and depression, cope better with adversity and sleep better. They tend to be happier and more satisfied with life. Even their partners tend to be more content with their relationships.

Perhaps when we are more focused on the good things we enjoy in life, we have more to live for and tend to take better care of ourselves and each oth-

When researchers asked people to reflect on the past week and write about things that either irritated them or about which they felt grateful, those tasked with recalling good things were more optimistic, felt better about their lives and actually visited their physicians less.

It is no surprise that receiving thanks makes people happier, but so does expressing gratitude. An experiment that asked participants to write and deliver thank-you notes found large increases in reported levels of happiness, a benefit that lasted for an entire month.

PHILOSOPHICAL ROOTS

One of the greatest minds in Western history, the Greek philosopher Aristotle, argued that we become what we habitually do. By changing our habits, we can become more thankful human be-

If we spend our days ruminating on all that has gone poorly and how dark the prospects for the future appear, we can think ourselves into misery and resentment.

But we can also mold ourselves into the kind of people who seek out, recognize and celebrate all that we have to be grateful for.

This is not to say that anyone should become a Pollyanna, ceaselessly reciting the mantra from Voltaire's "Candide," "All is for the best in this, the best of all possible worlds." There are injustices to be righted and wounds to be healed, and ignoring them would represent a lapse of moral responsi-



bility.

But reasons to make the world a better place should never blind us to the many good things it already affords. How can we be compassionate and generous if we are fixated on deficiency? This explains why the great Roman statesman Cicero called gratitude not only the greatest of virtues but the "parent" of them all.

RELIGIOUS ROOTS

Gratitude is deeply embedded in many religious traditions. In Judaism, the first words of the morning prayer could be translated, "I thank you." Another saying addresses the question, "Who is rich?" with this answer: "Those who rejoice in what they have."

From a Christian perspective, too, gratitude and thanksgiving are vital. Before Jesus shares his last meal with his disciples, he gives thanks. So vital a part of Christian life is gratitude that author and critic G.K. Chesterton calls it "the highest form of thought."

Gratitude also plays an essential role in Islam. The 55th chapter of the Quran enumerates all the things human beings have to be grateful for - the Sun, Moon, clouds, rain, air, grass, animals, plants, rivers and oceans – and then asks, "How can a sensible person be anything but thankful to God?'

Other traditions also stress the importance of thankfulness. Hindu festivals celebrate blessings and offer thanks for them. In Buddhism, gratitude develops patience and serves as an antidote to greed, the corrosive sense that we never have enough.

In his 1994 book, "A Whole New Life," the Duke

and more alive, than ever. PRACTICING GRATITUDE

When it comes to practicing gratitude, one trap to avoid is locating happiness in things that make us feel better off - or simply better - than others. In my view, such thinking can foster envy and jealousy.

There are marvelous respects in which we are equally blessed – the same Sun shines down upon each of us, we all begin each day with the same 24 hours, and each of us enjoys the free use of one of the most complex and powerful resources in the universe, the human brain.

Much in our culture seems aimed to cultivate an attitude of deficiency - for example, most ads aim to make us think that to find happiness we must buy something. Yet most of the best things in life - the beauty of nature, conversation and love - are free.

There are many ways to cultivate a disposition of thankfulness. One is to make a habit of giving thanks regularly - at the beginning of the day, at meals and the like, and at day's end.

Likewise, holidays, weeks, seasons and years can be punctuated with thanks - grateful prayer or meditation, writing thank-you notes, keeping a gratitude journal and consciously seeking out the blessings in situations as they arise.

Gratitude can become a way of life, and by developing the simple habit of counting our blessings, we can enhance the degree to which we are truly blessed.



Messi and Rapinoe *expected to* take Ballon d'Or honours

PARIS, DEC 1 (AFP): The biggest names in world football will descend on Paris on Monday for the 2019 Ballon d'Or ceremony, with Lionel Messi and USA women's World Cup superstar Megan Rapinoe tipped to leave with the honours.

It would be an enormous shock if Rapinoe did not depart the Chatelet Theatre with the women's prize as she returns to the country where she was the driving force on and off the field for the United States as they retained their ti-

The suspense surrounds the identity of the men's winner, 12 months after Croatia's Luka Modric claimed the crown thanks to his exploits in dragging his country to the World Cup final and winning the Champions League with Real Madrid.

That ended a decade in which Messi and Cristiano Ronaldo had won the Ballon d'Or five times each, but the smart money now is on the Barcelona man claiming number

There are 30 nominees in total for the prize, organised by France Football magazine and voted for by 180 journalists from around the world.

- THE CASE FOR VAN DIJK -

Among the names is Ronaldo, as well as several of the stars of the Liverpool side who won the Champions League, chief among them Dutch defender Virgil van Dijk.

At one point he looked like the favourite, but Messi already pipped him to FIFA's The Best title in Sep-

32-year-old top-scored in La Liga last season with 36 goals as Barcelona won the title. He did not have a great Copa America with Argentina, but his genius is undeniable.

"If you give the Ballon d'Or to the best player of this generation then you should give it always to Lionel Messi. That's how it is," admitted Liverpool manager Jurgen Klopp.

"But if you give it to the best player of last season, then it was Virgil van Dijk. I don't know exactly how it will work but that is how I see it."

The value of individual honours in football is debatable, and the timing unsatisfactory, coming midway through the European club season.

Yet surely nobody could suggest Rapinoe would not be a deserving winner of just the second women's Ballon d'Or, an award voted for by a panel of 48 journalists.

Norway's Ada Hegerberg won it in 2018 but will not retain her title after missing the World Cup.

Among the stars of that tournament to be nominated are England's Lucy Bronze, Netherlands striker Vivianne Miedema, Australia's Sam Kerr and the USA trio of Alex Morgan, Rose Lavelle and Tobin Heath.

Hansi Flick lost for the first time in five games as Bayern's interim coach after Jamaica winger Bailey scored first-half goals for Leverkusen.

Anthony Joshua the businessman determined to regain his belts wisdom. "I respect Rob a

"You hear all the stories," says Anthony Joshua, whispering slowly and painfully, as if each word is bruised with scar tissue. "Larry Holmes having to get a bus home after a title fight. Mike Tyson losing a lot of his money. Evander Holyfield ..." He pauses. "And these are the greatest."

There are at least 60 million reasons why Joshua is putting his gold-plated reputation on the line in a heavyweight title rematch against Andy Ruiz Jr in Saudi Arabia next Saturday. Ultimately, though, it boils down to this. Too many fighters have made the turbulent journey from glory to penury. He does not want to be one of them. So the biggest purse of his career trumps whatever criticisms are fired his way from human rights groups.

"Honestly, one of my main objectives in this sport was to not be owned, not be taken advantage of," he says. "That's why the decisions I've made have been as a professional man, not a professional boxer. When I decided to become a man, I just knew in boxing I was going to conduct myself like a busi-

"You pay a lot to the tax man," he says, warming to his theme. "A lot to the trainer. And before you know it you're left with, in reality, 30 or 40%. So it's not all what it really seems. You have to manage yourself and not get flustered about what you



think is yours, because 50 or 60 or 70% isn't."

Suddenly he turns to his promoter, Eddie Hearn. "Don't you remember when I met you, Eddie?" he says, laughing. "I was: 'You're not like Don King, are you?"

Ioshua has always been sharp and engaging company. But six months on from his shock defeat by Ruiz, blinking and stumbling like a man in a waking nightmare before being stopped in the seventh, that sharpness now possesses a more jagged edge.

"After I took the loss, I started hearing what people really thought of me," he says, bristling. "But this is fighting. One loss doesn't take the spots off a cheetah. I've been world champion, I've been Olympic champion, I've been world silver medallist."

Still the words keep tumbling out. "It was clear to see that I was the man on the table with four of the rings out of the five and people were still debating where my position was in the heavyweight division," he says, although now he sounds more astonished than angry.

All of a sudden, though, Joshua's aggression strays into outright crassness when talking about the "hustle" of being the WBA, IBF and WBO heavyweight champion. "It's like killing, isn't it?" he says. "Bang; next one. Bang; next one. Bang; next one."

It is a horribly illjudged line, especially given the deaths in the ring in recent years and certainly not one to expect from someone regarded as one of the sport's more eloquent participants.

Joshua, who is expected to come in lighter and faster for the rematch, also takes exception to claims he took Ruiz too lightly after the Mexican-American replaced his original opponent, Jarrell Miller, after he failed a drugs test six weeks before they were due to meet.

"People don't really know what went into my last training camp," Josh-

ua says. "I hear what peo-

ple say about me and it's

like: 'Put some respect by our name.' We don't play games when it comes to boxing, we're serious and now after the loss I've had time to reflect, it's like: 'I took this shit seriously."

So why did people underestimate him? "Because we make it look easy."

Those close to Joshua say he has always been dedicated but this dedication has now become an obsession. Another difference is that he is regularly in contact with Wladimir Klitschko, the fighter he vanquished in 2017, absorbing his advice on how to make it back to the summit. "He's helped me with loads of stuff, including diet and training," Joshua says. "Maybe that's why - because I've adapted some of his teachings - that my weight may fluctuate. Wlad was definitely ahead of the game." Joshua insists his

trainer, Robert McCracken, remains a vital part of his entourage: a prime dispenser not only of boxing knowledge but of life

'Laziness has won': **Apostrophe** society admits its defeat

LONDON, 01 DEC [AP]: A society dedicated to preserving the "muchabused" apostrophe is to be shut down as its chairman said "ignorance and laziness" had won.

John Richards, who worked in journalism for much of his career, started the Apostrophe Protection Society in 2001 after he retired.

Now 96, Richards is calling time on the society, which lists the three simple rules for correct use of the punctuation

Writing on the society's website, he said: "Fewer organisations and individuals are now caring about the correct use of the apostrophe in the English language.

"We, and our many supporters worldwide, have done our best but the ignorance and laziness present in modern times have won!"

Richards started the society after seeing the "same mistakes over and over again" and hoped he would find half a dozen people who felt the same

He said: "I didn't find half a dozen people.

"Instead, within a month of my plaint appearing in a national newspaper, I received over 500 letters of support, not only from all corners of the United Kingdom, but also from America, Australia, France, Sweden, Hong Kong and Canada."

K-pop stars jailed for gangrape in South Korea

SEOUL, 01 DEC [AP]: A South Korean court has sentenced two K-pop stars to six and five years in prison for gang-rape and additionally convicted one of them for distributing videos of the assaults and other sexual encounters.

Jung Joon-young, a singer-songwriter, and Choi Jong-hoon, a former member of the boy band FT Island, were found guilty of gang-raping two different women in two incidents in 2016.

Separately, 30-yearold Jung was convicted of filming himself having sex with other women without their knowledge and sharing the footage without their consent.

It is the highest-profile example of an epidemic of spycam crimes in South Korea, which have prompted widespread anger and led to women demonstrating in Seoul chanting: "My life is not your porn."

Jung distributed his videos in mobile chatrooms with recipients including a fellow K-pop star, Seungri of BigBang, who has been accused of illegal gambling in con-



nection with a sex and drugs scandal.

Jung was jailed for six years and Choi, 29, for five. Seoul central district court rejected the defendants' claim that the sex was consensual.

"Jung and Choi took part in gang-rape of victims who were intoxicated and unable to resist," the verdict said, according to Yonhap news agency. "It is hard to fathom the extent of suffering the victims must have gone through."

The court said the country's largest portal

two singers had seen the victims as "sexual objects" to be exploited, adding: "They should assume social responsibility in proportion to their fame and wealth." Both men wept when the sen-

tences were announced.

While the minimum sentence for rape in South Korea is three years, most online commentators said the penalties were too lenient. "The victims have to live in agony for the next 60 years, not just six," one poster wrote on the site. Naver. Another added: "I hear they burst into tears at sentencing. The victims will live in tears for the rest of their lives."

Jung rose to fame in 2014 when he came third in an audition show, Super Star K, and he had a number of solo hits before the video scandal broke in March, when he announced his retire-

At that time the rape accusations had yet to emerge, and he said he had "committed crimes that cannot be forgiven".

There was no imme-

diate statement from his lawyers or his record company on Friday.

Known as molka, South Korean spycam videos are largely made by men secretly filming women in schools, toilets and elsewhere, although the term can also be applied to clandestinely shot footage of consensual sex.

Last weekend Goo Hara, a former member of the girl group Kara, died in an apparent suicide a year after she was blackmailed over revenge porn.

ex-boyfriend Goo's threatened to "end her entertainment career' by leaking the footage, and a CCTV clip showed her kneeling before him apparently begging him not to. He was convicted of blackmail.

In conservative South Korea, women who appear in such videos often feel deep shame despite being the victims, and face the threat of ostracism and social isolation. Around 5,500 people were arrested for molka offences last year, 97% of them men, according to police data.

China's accuses UN rights chief of 'inappropriate' interference

GENEVA, DEC 1 (AFP): China has accused UN human rights chief Michelle Bachelet of "inappropriate" interference in the country's affairs after she called for investigations into alleged excessive use of force by police in Hong Kong.

China's mission to the UN in Geneva said on Saturday an op-ed written by Bachelet in the South China Morning Post was "erroneous" and "violates the purposes and principles of the Charter of the United Nations."

The article contains "inappropriate comments on the situation of the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region ... (and) interferes in China's internal affairs," said the Chinese mission's statement.

It added that China had "lodged strong representations" with the UN rights office in Geneva.



Some people have argued that the film's story could have played in a mini-series format or developed over two seasons.


But Scorsese never envisioned "The Irishman" as a series. since he wanted to tell the story in one go.
