The chief minister as-sured them that he will take up the matter with appropriate authority.

He said, "In view of the Act East Policy of Government of India, it is only appropriate that the North East is showcased in right earnest to the rest of the country and the world."

13 dead, 81,000 hit in TN, Puducherry due to cyclonic storm 'Gaja'

NEW DELHI, Nov 16 (PTI): At least 13 people have lost their lives and over 81,000 others were affected after Cyclone 'Gaja' hit the Tamil Nadu coast early Friday, the National Emergency Re-

sponse Centre (NERC) said. Six districts of Tam-Nadu and two Puducherry were hit by the cyclonic storm which also brought heavy rains in the southern state and the union territory. Altogether 81,948

Altogether 81,948 people were affected by the cyclone in which so far 13 people have lost their lives, the NERC said in a statement.

after Gaja's landfall, Home Minister Ra-jnath Singh called up Tamil Nadu Chief Minister K Palaniswami and assured him of all assistance to deal with the situation arising out of the cyclonic storm.

The home minister also directed Home Sec

retary Rajiv Gauba to monitor the situation in Tamil Nadu and provide all help to the state administration.

"Spoke to CM Shri K Palaniswami regarding the situation in the cyclone affected areas of Tamil Nadu. Assured all possible assistance from the Centre in mitigating the situation arising due to cyclone. Asked the HS to mon itor the situation & provide all help to the state admin

(sic)." Singh tweeted. A release issued in Chennai by the Tamil Nadu government said a "detailed report" will be sent to the Centre on the damage caused by the severe cyclonic storm

"Chief Minister Palaniswami explained in de-tail the measures taken by the state government, the damage caused by 'Gaja', and the relief measures being taken up on a war-footing," it said.

Chhetri-less India take on Jordan in Asian Cup tune-up

AMMAN, Nov 16 (PTI): India, despite missing their talismanic striker Sunil Chhetri. will fancy their chances when they take on hosts Jordan in an international football friendly

here on Saturday.

The match at the Jordan capital is in preparation for the AFC Asian Cup, scheduled to be held in January-February next year.

India are ranked 97th while Jordan are placed 112th in the

FIFA rankings. Even though they will be without Chhetri, the country's all-time leading scorer, Stephen Constantine's men will take confidence from their goalless stalemate in their previous friendly against high-er-ranked China, managed by World Cup-winning coach Mar-

Chhetri's absence has been dubbed a "big blow" by coach Constantine, under whom In-dia enjoyed a dream 14-match unbeaten run till it was broken by Kyrgyzstan in Bishkek.

With only about two months to go for the Asian Cup, the upcoming friendly provides Constantine among the last opportunities to analyse his squad and ready his backup plans.

Goalkeeper Gurpreet Singh Sandhu will lead the backline which will have Pritam Kotal, Sandesh Jhingan, Narayan Das and probably Subhasish Bose. India's defence impressed against Lippi's China but Constantine will be banking on his midfield and attack to have an influence in the match against a Jordan side whose form has been patchy.

Jordan, who are ranked 15 spots below India in the rankings, last won a match in May n they defeated Cyprus 3-0. In their last four games, they have had two draws and two defeats, capping with a 1-2 loss to Croatia in October.

For India, mid-fielder Jack-ichand Singh and left back Nishu Kumar were on Thursday included in the 22-member squad for the away international FIFA fixture.

The likes of Udanta Singh Pronay Halder, Halicharan Narzary and Anirudh Thana are likely to control possession in the midfield against a Jordan side that will look to hit on the counter in the absence of a few attacking players.

In the absence of Chhetri, experienced men like Jeje Lalpekhlua and Balwant Singh will need to take up the mantle up front. While the former has struggled in front of goal, the latter's form is encouraging.

TMC's 'purification' rally to follow BJP 'rath yatra': Mamata

KOLKATA, NOV 16 (PTI): West Bengal Chief Minis ter Mamata Banerjee Friday ridiculed the sched-uled 'rath yatra' of the BJP as 'ravan yatra' and called for cleansing of areas through which the saffron party's chariots would pass. The Trinamool Congress (TMC) supremo also urged people to "ignore the event as just another political gimmick".

"I have asked my party workers to conduct 'purification and unity yatra' to cleanse the areas through which the chariots pass. I wonder what sort of yatra it would be with chariots equipped with five-star facilities. It is 'ravan ya-tra', not 'rath yatra'," she quipped.

The state BJP leadership was quick to hit back, claiming that Ba-nerjee was suffering from "fear psychosis" as it dreads losing to the BJP in the next Lok Sabha polls. "It seems Mamata

Baneriee and the TMC is suffering from fear psy-chosis. They are feeling threatened by the 'rath yatra' as it is aimed at restoring democracy in the state," BJP state president Dilip Ghosh said.

Amit Shah, the national president of the saffror party, is set to kick off three 'rath vatras' - which will cover all 42 Lok Sabha constituencies in Bengal on December 5, 7 and 9. At the conclusion of the 'yatra', the party plans to hold a massive rally in Kolkata, like-ly to be addressed by Prime Minister Narendra Modi.

"They asked us to deposit Rs 57,000 but gave us a date for surgery in February 2024, citing long waiting period. We cannot wait for so long as our daughter is in lot of pain," Kumar alleged.

UP district adopts unique way for primary education

BAHRAICH (UP), Nov 16 (PTI): The Bahraich administration in Uttar Pradesh has embarked on a campaign to give a new dimension to imparting primary education, roping in people across different fields to interact with the children for almost one hour a week.

Elaborating about campaign, 'Vidyaa the campaign, Daan, Ek Aadarsh Daan' (Imparting Education, An Ideal Donation), District Magistrate Mala Srivastava said: "Intel-lectuals of the society, be it the government officials, retired employees, teachers in schools and colleges, educated housewives or youngsters, were urged to join the campaign (which was started in September).

'Today, in more than 400 government prima-ry schools, the campaign has started giving posi-tive results and people themselves are taking out time to teach the chil-

dren."

She added that concrete efforts were being made to provide quality education in the govern-

ment primary schools.

Plans are also on to build 10 'aadarsh vidy-

alaya' (model schools) in each of the development blocks of the district. These schools will be known by the school structure, creative re-search by the teachers, hold children parliament and children cabinet, and give meritorious results, the official said.

The district mag-istrate said the model schools would not only impart education to its students, but also become a demonstration schools for rest of the 3,400 government primary schools in the district. Primary schools are from Class I to Class V.

When contacted, state Basic Education Minister Anupama Jaiswal told PTI, "Almost four months back, I was chairing the review meeting of the district, along with the district magistrate, and I wanted that such system (where the intellectuals teach the kids) should evolve. Until and unless the society forges a direct relationship with government schools, people will continue to remain indifferent towards it."

She said it was not necessary to go and teach the children, suggesting

they could share their experience, interact with the children, even narrate a story and inquire the well being of the kids.

"I want that such campaigns should be gradually replicated across the state. And, for the first time, it seems the first time, it seems that people have started to realise that they will change the perception and picture of education system in the government schools," the minister said, adding that "basic shikshaa, buniyaadi shikshaa hai" (basic education is underlying education).

"We have named this unique initiative as 'shik-shaa ki door, Bahraich ki oar' (thread of education towards Bahraich)," she added.

Last week, the Niti Aayog tweeted, "#Ed-ucationForChange: In the #AspirationalDistrict Bahraich, over 700 youth, doctors, retired teachers & government officials volunteered for 'Vidyadaan Campaign' last month. @ DMBahraich Mala Srivastava is looking forward to developing 200 demonstration schools

West Bengal assembly session begins

KOLKATA, NOV 16 (PTI): The West Bengal Assembly was adjourned Friday after obituary references were made to several prominent personalities including former Lok Sabha speaker Somnath Chatterjee and former Leader of opposition of state assembly Pankaj Bandyopadhyay.

Speaker Biman Banerjee read out obituary references of Somnath Chatterjee, Pankaj Bandyopadhyay and others

who passed away during the past few months.

Chatterjee, 10-time Lok Sabha MP, was the first communist leader to become the Lok Sabha Speaker in 2004. He passed away in August.

A founding member of the ruling Trinamool Congress, Bandyopadhyay passed away in October. He was also former leader of the opposition in the assembly from 2001-2006.

The session will continue till November 29.

The session further deliberated that this will further aggravate traffic congestion and cause higher pollution levels in Gangtok city.

In comparison to this, it was noted that loans and

of Sikkim has not invested enough in conserving traditions and cultural heritage and it is important for locals to benefit from the tourism sector and that traditional handicraft sector has to be revived.

In the second session, discussions were focused on solid waste management in Sikkim. Many participants highlighted the urgency to deal with the issue beyond just collection and transportation of waste to

It was mentioned that the newly built sanitary landfill that was supposed to be of use for 17 years is now likely to be filled up in just 07 years. Segregation of waste at source was an area which had seen little success in spite of distribution of separate dustbin and required renewed effort as was implementing the plastic bag ban which had become diluted over the years and also because of the rampant use of the cloth like PP Bag, another form of plastic. Food waste from hospitality sector was considered of high concern and an opportunity for preventing human-wildlife conflict if managed with responsibility.

It was further added that multilayered plastic such as seen in chips packets, shampoo sachets and instant noodles was the most rampantly seen plastic waste and there was an urgent need to make the manufacturers responsible for setting up take back mechanisms for the waste created from the use of their products. Behavioral change was mentioned as the major bottleneck in waste management in Sikkim. The consultation also identified some critical

steps including education and capacity building for proper sensitization and hand-holding of communities. Decentralization of waste management, specifically organic compostable waste through community engagement and ownership is considered to be the most instrumental need for zero-waste management

Further, it was felt that government needs to engage with hotel associations and find ways and mandates for hotels to practice minimal use of single-use plastics and waste management at source by the hotels. Alternative green packaging materials and a sense of pride in managing waste were some other points mentioned at the consultation.

The consultation led to an enriching discussion amongst CSOs, Governments and Entrepreneurs.

Representatives from the Department of Tourism

and Aviation concluded by mentioning that they will engage more with tourism stakeholders on implementation of State Tourism Policy 2018 in Sikkim for the interest of State and its youth.

People protesting Citizenship Bill stopped from proceeding towards Assam secretariat

GUWAHATI, Nov 16 (PTI): Thousands of people attempted to march towards the Assam Sec-retariat here Friday against the proposed Citizenship (Amendment) Bill, 2016, but were halted by the security forces.

People from 70 or-

ganisations were part of the march held as part of their 'Janata Bhawan Gherao' programme.

On not being stopped security personnel, the protestors squatted on the Last Gate Road, behind the secretariat, blocking traffic on the busy thor-oughfare for several hours, police said.

Members and sup-porters of the organisations, led by the Krishak Mukti Sangram Samiti (KMSS) and Assam Jatiyatabadi Yuba Chhatra Parishad (AJYCP), had congregated here Friday morning to gherao the secretariat. Barricades had been

placed around the gov-ernment building and personnel from the Assam Police and the CRPF were deployed in large numbers to prevent the protestors from staging their 'Sankalpa Shikha

Jatra' against the Bill.

The demonstrators held a massive rally on the road with leaders of the organisations speaking against the BJP-led governments at the state and the Centre for "imposing the bill on Assam", despite prohibitory or-ders under Section 144 Cr P C imposed here since Thursday.

They also criticised Chief Minister Sarbanan da Sonowal for "remaining silent on the issue despite repeated protests against the bill".

On Guwahati Police Commissioner Pradip Chandra Saloi's request to the demonstrators to withdraw their protest, the agitators demanded that he carry their message to the government for holding talks with them on the Bill, within seven days. When Saloi assured

them that he would convey their message to the government, the demonstrators cleared the road.

KMSS chief Akh-il Gogoi, however, said, "Our agitation programmes will continue against the Bill".

He also accused the government

"working against the interest of the indigenous people of the state by imposing the bill threatening the identity, language, culture of the indigenous people and unity of Assam". The Citizenship (Amendment) Bill, 2016 was introduced in the Lok Sabha to amend the Citizenship Act, 1955 to grant Indian citizenship to Hindus, Sikhs, Buddhists, Jains, Parsis and Christians who fled religious perse-cution in Bangladesh, Paki-stan and Afghanistan and

Speaking on the occasion, All Minority Students Union (AAMSU) president Aiiiur Rahman said, as per the Assam Accord of 1985, Hindus or Muslims from Bangladesh and Pakistan who came to the state after March 24, 1971 would have to leave. Large sections of people, organ-isations in the northeast and leading political party AGP, which is an ally of the ruling BJP, are opposed to

SC to hear plea challenging constitutional validity of Article 370 in April NEW DELHI, Nov 16 (PTI): The Supreme Court Friday said it will hear in April a plea challenging the validity of Article 370 of the Constitution, which gives special status to Jammu and Kashmir, following a request by the state and the Centre. A bench of Justices D Y Chandrachud and M R Shah said it will hear the matter in the first week of April 2019 after Attorney General K K Venugopal, appearing for the Centre, sought ad journment on the ground that the current situation is very sensitive.

"The political situa-tion in the state is such that the matter should not be heard at this time, he said. Senior advocate Rakesh Dwivedi and advocate Shoeb Alam, appear-ing for Jammu and Kashmir said that a letter has been circulated seeking adjournment due to the ongoing nine-phase Panchayat polls in the state. that it can tag the mat-ter along with a batch of pending petitions chal-lenging Article 35A of the Constitution, under which special rights and privileges are granted to the "permanent residents" of the state.

The suggestion of the bench was opposed by the counsels for the state saying that the two issues are different entirely and the plea should not be tagged along with Article 35A pending petitions. The bench then posted the matter for fur-ther hearing in first week of April. 2019.

On April 3, the apex court had said that Article 370 of the Constitution is not a temporary provision. The top court had said that in its earlier verdict of 2017 in the SARFESI case, it has been already held that Article 370 was "not a temporary provision".

"The issue concerned is covered by the judgement of this court in the 2017 SARFAESI matter. where we have held that despite the headnote of Article 370, it is not a temporary provision," the court had said.

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Chaos prevails in Lankan Parliament as leaders hurl chilli power, furniture

Colombo, Nov 16 (РТІ): Sri Lanka's Parliament witnessed complete chaos on Friday as rival lawmakers threw chilli powder and furniture at each other, disrupting the proceedings for the second day, forcing the Speaker to summon police inside the House and adjourn

the session until Monday.
The brawl occurred a day after Speaker Karu Jayasuriya announced Jayasuriya announced there is no prime minister or government fol-lowing a no-confidence motion against disputed prime minister Mahinda Rajapaksa. Friday's proceedings were to repeat the floor test which was disrupted on Thursday.

Ousted prime minister and United National Party (UNP) leader Ranil Wickremesinghe warned of anarchy if the situation in the country was not resolved.

The status quo must return to what it was before October 26, he was quoted as saying by Co-lombo Gazette.

President Maithripa-

la Sirisena, who installed Rajapaksa as prime minister last month in a controversial move, had agreed to a floor test with the leaders of ousted prime minister Ranil Wickremesinghe's coalition during crisis talks last night.
The MPs support-

ing Rajapaksa took over the seat of the Speaker, delaying the proceed-ings, officials said. They shouted slogans against Jayasuriya and broke furniture. Some Rajapakse lovalists were also seen throwing chilli powder at rival legislators and police, the report said.

The Speaker called police inside Parliament chamber after 45 minutes of disruption. One of the rioting MPs Arundika Fernando occupied the seat of the Speaker with more MPs surrounding it. Gamini Jayawickrema Perera, a senior parliamentarian, was injured in the melee as he was attacked with chili powder.

Janatha Vimukthi Peramuna MP Vijitha Herath had also come un der a chili powder attack, Daily Mirror reported.

The rioting United People's Freedom Alliance (UPFA) members demanded the arrest of two legislators of the Wickremesinghe's UNP.
They charged that

They charged that two UNP legislators, Palitha Thewarapperuma and Ranjan Ramanayake were carrying knives during the brawl on Tursday in which UPFA MP Dilum Amunugama was injured.

Police protected Jayasuriya from the rioting MPs as he called the Tamil National Alliance lawmaker MA Sumanthiran to propose the suspension of the standing orders.

Jayasuriya on the basis of a voice vote announced that the motion against Rajapaksa was defeated as physical voting could not take place due to the brawl.

The rioting MPs threw books at the po-

lice. Jayasuriya immediately suspended the sittings until November 19 and left the House in police protection. President

Sirisena

said that he would not prorogue the Parliament under any cir-cumstances". "I urge all Parliamen-

tarians to uphold princi-ples of democracy parliamentary traditions at all times. I will not prorogue Parliament under any circumstances," the president tweeted.

The trouble began in

Parliament on Thursday when the Speaker agreed to a request from Wickremesinghe's UNP that a vote be taken on a statement made by Rajapaksa

demanding fresh polls.

Jayasuriya allowed
Rajapaksa to make a statement as a lawmaker after stating that he does not recognise the claim of the Sri Lanka Freedom Party (SLFP) leader who lost a no-confidence motion on Wednesday. Rajapaksa's side has

disputed the no-trust motion, saying proper proce-dure was not followed and accused Jayasuriya of bias towards his party.

Parliament Wednesday passed the no-confidence motion against Rajapaksa after the Supreme Court overthe presidential decree to dissolve the House and hold snap polls on January 5.

Amid raucous scenes, Parliament on Wednessince October 26, when Sirisena sacked pre-mier Wickremesinghe, installed Rajapaksa in his place and suspended the House, plunging the island nation into an unprecedented Constitutional crisis. The vote of no confi-

dence against Rajapaksa has further complicated the political crisis. It is not yet clear whether Rajapaksa will resign Wickremesinghe, who has the support of 122 lawmakers in the

Sikkim Deserves More **Professional Promotion**

Just word of mouth will not suffice any more

quaint tourist festival concluded recently at Temi Tea Estate, Except The invited guests, their respective entourages and the handful who caught the news in local rags, it is unlikely that too many others knew of it or made the time to visit. Admittedly, there was a more handsome attendance this year, but nothing close to what a Tea & Cherry fest has potential for. There used to be a music fest of huge potential hosted in Mangan for some years until that too fell silent. The Maghe Mela attraction has lost its sheen even before it was leveraged for the tourism prospects it carried. The winter fest in Gangtok is so erratic that no one appears to even bother to promote it even among locals. Sikkim is now an Organic State for all intents and purposes, but this USP has still not been dovetailed into its introduction as a tourist destination. It should be obvious by now that left to the babus, Sikkim will continue to move from event to event, lacking the coherence and cohesion required to launch a collaborative promotion.

Tourism is all about promotion, which, in today's information-age, translates as advertisements. Without promotion in the right places, conveying the right message, tourism potential will remain but a tantalising prospect of the boom that could have been. Of course word of mouth plays a role in promoting a destination and flawless services go a long way in establishing tourism credentials, but for these factors to kick in, one needs the right promotion. More tourists land in Malaysia than the flights bring into India. We obviously offer a much more varied experience, and yet, even tiny Malaysia beats us with the "Truly Asia" slogan [of much older vintage than the Incredible India tag line]. Tourism is booming in Malaysia, and if anything, the destination's increasing popularity has triggered even more aggressive advertising across all mediums, from television channels to websites to newspapers to magazines to Facebook to wherever it is that a prospective visitor might look. They have obviously recognised the importance of promotion.

Promotion and planning have however been consistently ignored by Sikkim, most noticeable so in the tourism sector. Yes, brand ambassadors have been roped in, but that is not enough in itself. When was the last time you saw a slick spot on TV, or a captivating spread in a magazine or newspaper or a sponsored message popping up on your Facebook feed tempting a prospective audience with a holiday in Sikkim? The State is lucky that enough people are smitten by the land and its peo-ple to keep arrivals high, save the hiccup of neighbourhood troubles.

Tourism has grown in the State despite a shoddy and extremely unprofessional approach to promotion. An increasing number of Sikkimese are investing in the hospitality industry, a huge number converting residential buildings into hotels. The number of destinations has not increased by much in the recent past, so one is essentially looking at selling the same "points". What this means is that repeat-visitors will soon start tiring out and to ensure that businesses do not fail and the target numbers are achieved, Sikkim will need to promote itself much better, much more.

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Why covering the environment is one of the most dangerous beats in journalism

From the murder of Saudi journalist Jamal Kashoggi by Saudi agents to President Trump's clashes with the White House press corps, attacks on re-porters are in the news. This problem extends far beyond the politics beat, and world leaders aren't the only threats. At Michigan State University's Knight Center for

Environmental Journalism, we train students and professional journalists to report on what we view as the world's most important beat. One hard fact is that those who cover it are at heightened risk of murder, arrest, assault, threats, self-exile, lawsuits and harassment.

In a recent study, I explored this problem through in-depth interviews with journalists on five continents, including impacts on their mental health and careers. I found that some of them were driven away from journalism by these experiences, while others became even more committed to their

IN THE CROSS-HAIRS

Covering the environment is one of the most hazardous beats in journalism. According to one estimate, 40 reporters around the world died between 2005 and September 2016 because of their environmental reporting – more than were killed covering the U.S. war in Afghanistan.

Environmental controversies often involve influential business and economic interests, political battles, criminal activities, anti-government insurgents or corruption. Other factors include ambigu-ous distinctions between "journalist" and "activist" in many countries, as well as struggles over indigenous rights to land and natural resources.

In both wealthy and developing countries, jour nalists covering these issues find themselves in the cross-hairs. Most survive, but many undergo severe trauma, with profound effects on their careers.

As one example, in 2013 Rodney Sieh, an independent journalist in Liberia, disclosed a former agriculture minister's involvement in a corrupt scheme that misused funds earmarked to fight the parasitic, infectious Guinea worm disease. Sieh was sentenced to 5,000 years in prison and fined US\$1.6 million for defamation. He served three months in Liberia's most notorious prison before an international outcry pressured the government into releasing him.

In the same year, Canadian reporter Miles Howe vas assigned to cover protests by the Elsipotog First Nation in New Brunswick against hydraulic fracturing for natural gas. Howe worked for an in-dependent online news organization that sought to

spotlight unreported and underreported stories.

"Many times I was the only accredited journalist witnessing rather violent arrests, third-trimester pregnant women being locked up, guys tack-led to the ground," he recalls. Howe was arrested multiple times, and during one protest a member of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police pointed him out and shouted, "He's with them!" His equipment was seized, and police searched his home. They also offered to pay him for providing information about upcoming "events" – in other words, spying



on the protesters

PSYCHOLOGICAL IMPACTS

The relatively few studies that have examined attacks on reporters show that such treatment can have lingering impacts, including post-traumation stress disorder and depressive and substance use disorders. While some journalists are able to cope and recover, others live in a state of fear of future incidents, or suffer survivor guilt if they escape and

leave relatives and colleagues behind.
"Overall, journalists are a pretty resilient tribe," Bruce Shapiro, executive director of the Dart Center for Journalism and Trauma at Columbia Universi-ty, told me. "Their rates of PTSD and depression are about 13 to 15 percent, which is comparable to rates among first responders. Environmental or social jus-tice reporters often have a higher-than-average sense of mission and purpose and a higher level of skill," beyond that of some of their peers on other beats.

But this attitude can translate into reluctance

to seek help. Most journalists I interviewed didn't seek therapy, usually because no services were available or because of the profession's machismo factor, Gowri Ananthan, a lecturer at the Institute of Mental Health in Sri Lanka, calls journalism "a pro-fession in denial," even as some victims acknowledge the price they've paid.

For example, Miles Howe suffered serious psy-logical problems following his arrests. "What did it do to me? It made me upset, angry," he says. Howe didn't seek therapy until he left journalism more than two years later, but in hindsight regrets

Others told me their experiences recommitted them to their missions as journalists. Rodney Sieh says his stint in prison "really elevated our work to an international level that we would never have had if I weren't arrested. It made us stronger, big-

INDIGENOUS RIGHTS VERSUS PROFESSIONAL ETHICS

Environmental controversies often involve indigenous rights. In South America, for example, indig-enous journalists and "ethno-communicators" are playing an increasingly vital role in uncovering vast xploitation of natural resources, forests and land.

Despite professional codes calling for balanced,

impartial coverage, some reporters can feel compelled to take sides on these stories. "We saw that clearly at Standing Rock," says Tristan Ahtone, a board member of the Native American Journalists Association, referring to protests on the Standing Rock Indian Reservation in North Dakota against the Dakota Access Pipeline.

"NAJA had to put out ethical guidelines for jour-

nalists. We saw it mostly with young Native reporters who were happy to blow the ethical line," Ahtone says. "A lot of it is having a different world view."

One such reporter, freelance journalist Jenni onet – a tribal member of the Pueblo of Laguna in New Mexico - was arrested while covering the protests but acquitted of trespassing at trial. She also has covered deforestation and logging in a tribal area in Brazil's Amazon region. "Most times I'm with indigenous people (on such stories), and I see things through their eyes," she told me. BETTER TRAINING AND LEGAL PROTECTION

Many of these issues need further research. From a craft perspective, how do these experiences affect journalists' approach to reporting? How do they deal with sources afterwards, especially if those people are also at risk? How do editors and news directors subsequently treat reporters in terms of assignments, story placement and salaries?

These findings also raise questions about how press rights groups can successfully protect and advocate for environmental reporters. In my view, more environmental journalists need the type of safety training that many war and foreign correspondents now receive.

Pollution and natural resource damage affect everyone, especially the poorest and most vulner-able members of society. The fact that journalists who report on these issues are so vulnerable is deeply disturbing. And their abusers often operate with impunity.

For example, there have been no convictions in the 2017 murder of Colombian radio journalist Efi-genia Vásquez Astudillo, who was shot while covering an indigenous movement to take back ancestral land that had been converted to farms, resorts and sugar plantations. As the Committee to Protect Journalists observes, "Murder is the ultimate form

Survivors of sexual violence in South Africa are finally finding their voices

The story of Cheryl Zondi, the brave young woman who took the stand in a South African court to testify against Nigerian pastor and rape accused Timothy Omotoso has recently dominated news headlines. The televangelist and senior pastor of the Jesus Dominion International Church faces multiple charges. These include rape, human trafficking and racketeering.
Under harsh, degrading, cross exam-

ination, Zondi, a 22-year old university student, courageously faced her alleged abuser and his jeering congregants to tell her story of alleged sexual assault that started when she was 14. In coming forward to testify in open court – despite death threats and attempts to silence her – she was not just another faceless victim of sexual violence.

There are many such faceless victims. According to the Crime against Women in South Africa 2018 report, there has been a 53% increase in sexual offences against omen in a short period - from 31 665 in 2015/16 to 70 813 in 2016/17. And the real numbers are probably higher; as is the case across the globe, many incidents statistics don't paint a full picture.

Based on the available data, the num-

ber of women raped in South Africa is 138 for 100 000 women. These numbers

are among the highest in the world.

So, why don't girls and women come forward to tell their stories of sexual assault? Research shows that the reasons are complex and influenced by a web of inter-related, social-psychological factors. These include feelings of shame and humiliation, self-blame, fear and even denial. These are influenced by the prevailing patriarchal and cultural norms of societies and communities that sup-press, silence and shame these girls and

In a highly gender unequal and patri-archal country like South Africa, violent and entrenched masculinities legitimise men's power over women. This exacerbates sexual violence. Naturally, women her during the trial as did the Women's League of the governing African National Congress (ANC), among others.

Contrast this with another high profile sexual assault trial in 2006, which took a very different turn. A young wom-an named Fezekile Ntsukela Kuzwayo, then known only as Khwezi accused ANC deputy president Jacob Zuma of rape

have severe anxieties about the reper-

cussions and backlash if they speak out.

Another factor is that South Africa's intractable history of political and gender-based violence has resulted in deep distrust of the justice system. According to Statistics SA, satisfaction in the police and the courts has continued to fall since 2013/14.

But there are indications that the tide is turning in South Africa: not only in the ray women are coming forward but how eople rallied around Cheryl Zondi.

THE TIDE IS TURNING

Zondi's courage garnered the respect and overwhelming support of ordinary South Africans, the government, civil society and women's groups. The Minister for Women in the Presidency supported

She was vilified, marginalised and threatened by Zuma's supporters and the ANC Women's League turned their back on her. She was denigrated and slutshamed by the patriarchal court system shunned, and fled the country after the trial. Zuma was acquitted and went on to become the country's president.

A great deal has changed in the ensu-

ing 12 years.

Women at the country's universities have been at the forefront of speaking out about a culture of rape on campuses, "naming and shaming" the perpetrators. This has gained momentum in the wake of the #FeesMustFall mass student that swept the country in 2015, demanding deep change at universities

Survivors of campus rape want to tell their stories on their own terms. One such event was the Rape Textile, which used performance art, monologues dance and poetry to narrate the trauma of a violent campus rape of two Nelson Mandela University students.

Higher Education and Training Minister, Naledi Pandor recently informed Parliament that 47 students had been raped on campuses in 2017 and named the institutions involved. There is an urgent need for universities to discuss the ways in which to address sexual assault

and rape on campuses. FIGHTING GENDER-BASED VIOLENCE

Strategies to fight gender-based violence must educate society about why and in what ways sexual violence affects everyone. Men's voices are critical in the right and, here, role models are especially important. South African campaigns should also look at holding the public accountable for preventing gen-

lic accountable for preventing gen-der-based violence.

Technology is a game changer in fighting gender-based violence in the 21st century – think of the powerful #MetToo and #WhylDidn'tReport and other social media campaigns. But technologies like safety apps and glob-al hashtags that include shared text messages, pictures and videos in private groups must be made more accessible to all South African women.

The availability of economical lightweight mobile technologies could empower South African girls and wom-en to share their stories and name their perpetrators. It is not only prevention but prosecution that is pivotal in get-ting justice for the country's women. [the writer is Professor and Head of Department of Political and Conflict

HC orders appointment of counsellors in all WB schools

Justice Patherya directed that the report placed by amicus curiae Phiroze Edulji be kept on record and steps be taken to implement its sugges-tions. She directed the state and the Centre to file a progress report after six months.

Upon placing the report before the court, additional advocate general Abhratosh Majumdar, who was representing the state, submitted that it would not be able to implement the recommendation regarding appointment of counsellors to every educational institution as the state has around one lakh schools.

He claimed that it will be difficult to find so many trained counsellors.

The guideline proposed by the amicus curiae said, "Every school must appoint a person, who is an expert in child psychology, psychiatry or sociology and who has been actively involved in child welfare activities for a period of at least two years, as a counsellor for children in school"

judge, however, said though the AAG has sought a relaxation in appointment of counsellors, a direction for the appointments was required to passed in the interest of the children.

Justice Patherya had Wednesday asked the Centre and the West Bengal Govern-ment to convey their views on proposed guidelines to prevent sexual offences against pupils in educational institutions affiliated to central and state boards in West Bengal.

The judge, while hearing a case relating to alleged sexual misconduct against two physi-cal education teachers of a citybased school, had appointed lawyer Edulji as amicus curiae tionists for suggestions.

The panel included educanists from six leading schools in the city, the chairperson of West Bengal State Commission for Protection of Child Rights (SCPCR) and representatives of UNICEF and National University of Juridical Sciences.

The amicus curiae submitted a 100-page report to the court on Monday suggesting formation of a nodal body under the SCPCR, which would work for spreading awareness among school staff, sensitise parents and set up a syllabus for awareness of staff, students and parents.

It also suggested stringent background check of a person before appointing him or her to any position in a school.



Khmer Rouge leaders found guilty of genocide in landmark ruling

PHNOM PENH, Nov 16 (AFP): Two top leaders of Cambodia's Khmer Rouge regime were found guilty of genocide on Friday, in a landmark ruling almost 40 years after the fall of a brutal regime that presided over the deaths of a quarter of the population.

The Khmer Rouge's former head of state Khieu Samphan, 87, and "Brother Number 2" Nuon Chea, 92, are the two most senior living members of the ultra-Maoist group that seized control of Cambodia from 1975-1979.

The reign of terror led by "Brother Number 1" Pol Pot left some two million Cambodians dead from overwork, starvation and mass executions but Fri-day's ruling was the first to acknowledge a genocide.

The defendants were previ-ously handed life sentences in 2014 over the violent and forced evacuation of Phnom Penh in April 1975.

But the judgement at the Extraordinary Chambers in the Courts of Cambodia (ECCC) also found Nuon Chea guilty of genocide against the ethnic Vietnamese and Cham Muslim minority group, among a litany of other crimes. "The chamber finds that

Nuon Chea exercised ultimate decision-making power with Pol Pot and... therefore finds Nuon Chea is responsible as a superior for all the crimes," presiding judge Nil Nonn said.

This includes the crime of genocide by killing mem bers of Cham ethnic and reli-

gious group."

Khieu Samphan was also found guilty of genocide against ethnic Vietnamese, though not against the Cham, he added.

The revolutionaries tried to recreate Buddhist-ma-jority Cambodia in line with their vision of an agrarian Marxist utopia attempted to abolish class and religious distinctions by force.

The verdict read out by Nil Nonn presented a society where minorities were targeted and killed. Buddhist monks forcibly defrocked and groups of people executed, while men and women were coerced into marriages and forced to have sex to pro-

duce children for the regime The atrocities fell under the additional list of charges, which the two men were found guilty

Los Sat, a 72-year-old Cham Muslim man who attended the verdict hearing with his wife, said he had lost "too many" family members under the regime. "I am really satisfied with the

sentences," he said, beaming as he left the court, "They brought suffering to my relatives." Youk Chhang, head of the Documentation Center of Cambodia -- a earch organisation that provided the court with evidence -- said the verdict will "affirm the collective humanity of the victims and give recognition to

the horrible suffering".

"It can provide a sense of closure to a horrible chapter in Cambodian history," he said.

The hybrid court, which uses

a mix of Cambodian and international law, was created with UN backing in 2006 to try senior

more than USD 300 million.

Former Khmer Rouge for-eign minister Ieng Sary and his wife died without facing justice, while Pol Pot passed away in 1998.

The number of allegations against Nuon Chea and Khieu Samphan was so vast the court split the trials into a series of smaller hearings in 2011.

Many believe Friday's decision will be the last for the tribunal, which has been marred by allegations of political interference

Prime Minister Hun Sen -himself a former Khmer Rouge cadre -- has repeatedly warned he would not allow more investigations to proceed, citing

vague threats to stability.

Clair Duffy, a senior teaching fellow at Australia's Bond University who monitored the tri-bunal for years, said the court's 'excessively high" bill compared to other tribunals was due to "persistent political barriers to justice erected by the Hun Sen

government".

The court has launched investigations into four more Khmer Rouge cadres, though one was dismissed in February 2017, highlighting the difficulties of bringing lower level members of the brutal regime to justice.

Craig Etcheson, who previously served as an investigator in the tribunal, said that despite the "expensive, slow, complex" process of the tribunal, the ECCC has provided some form of symbolic justice to the victims.

"It is not enough, perhaps, but some justice is better than no justice," he said.

California Fire death toll hits 63; sheriff says hundreds still missing



(US), Nov 16 Снісо (AP): At least 63 are now dead from a Northern California wildfire, and officials say they have a missing persons list with 631 names on it in an ever-evolving accounting of the missing after the na-tion's deadliest wildfire

in a century.

The high number of missing people probably includes some who fled the blaze and didn't realise they had been reported missing, Butte County Sheriff Kory Honea said. He added that he was making the list public so people could see if they were on it and let authorities know they were safe.

"The chaos that we were dealing with was extraordinary," Honea said of the early crisis hours last week.

"Now we're trying to go back out and make sure that we're accounting for everyone."

Some 52,000 people

were displaced to shel-ters, the homes of friends and relatives, to motels and to a Walmart parking lot and an adjacent field in Chico, a dozen miles away from the ashes.

At vast shelter park-

ing lot, evacuees from California's deadliest fire wonder if they still have homes, if their neighbours are still alive and where they will go when their place of refuge shuts down in a matter of days.

"It's cold and scary." said Lilly Batres, 13, one of the few children there, who fled with her family from the forested town of Magalia and didn't know whether her home sur-

vived. "I feel like people are going to come into our tent." The Northern California fire that began a week earlier obliterated the town of Paradise and caused such carnage that searchers contin-ued to pull bodies out of incinerated homes and cremated cars. The toll

had reached 63 dead and 9,800 homes destroyed.

The fire was 40 per

cent contained, but there was no timeline for allow ing evacuees to return because of the danger. Power lines are still down, roads closed, and firefighters are still dousing embers, authorities said.
On Thursday, Anna

Goodnight of Paradise tried to make the best of it, sitting on an overturned shopping car in the parking lot and eat-ing scrambled eggs and tater tots while her husband drank a Budweiser.

But then William Goodnight d began to cry.

"We're grateful. We're better off than some. I've been holding it together for her," he said, gesturing toward his wife.

"I'm just breaking down finally." More than 75 tents had popped up in the space since Mat-thew Flanagan arrived thew Flan last Friday.

"We call it Wally World," Flanagan said, a riff off the store name.

"When I first got here, there was nobody here. And now it's just getting worse and worse and worse. There are more evacuees, more people running out of money for hotels."

Word began to spread Thursday that efforts were being made to phase out the camp by Sunday by gradually removing donated clothing, food and toilets.

"The ultimate goal is to get these people out of tents out of their cars and into warm shelter, into homes," said Jessica Busick, who was among the first volunteers when she and her husband started serving free food from their Truckaroni food truck last week.

"We've always known this isn't a long-term solution." A Sunday closure "gives us enough time to maybe figure something out," said Mike Robertson, an evacuee who arrived there on Monday with his wife and two daughters. It's unclear what will be done if people don't leave Sunday, but city officials don't plan to kick them out, said Betsy Totten, a Chico spokeswoman.

Totten said volunteers not the city had decided to shut down the camp. Walmart has added security to the location and is concerned about safety there, but it is not asking people leave, spokeswoman LeMia Ienkins said.

Some, like Batres' family, had arrived after running out of money for hotel. Others couldn't find a room or weren't allowed to stay at shel-ters with their dogs or, in the case of Suzanne Kaksonen, her two cockatoos. Kaksonen couldn't remember how long she had been there, but she said it felt like forever

"I just want to go home," she said.

"I don't even care if there's no home. I just want to go back to my dirt, you know, and put a trailer up and clean it up and get going. Soon-er the better. I don't want to wait six months. That petrifies me." Some evacuees helped sort immense piles of donations that have poured in.
Racks of used clothes

from sweaters to plaid flannel shirts and tables covered with neatly organised pairs of boots, sneakers and shoes competed for space with shopping carts full of clothes, garbage bags stuffed with other donations, boxes of books, purple and green teddy bears and a menagerie of other fuzzy critters sit-

ting on the pavement.
Food trucks offered free meals and a cook flipped burgers on a grill. There were portable toilets, and some people used the Walmart restrooms.

Tajikistan launches giant dam to end power shortage

Rogun, Nov 16 (AFP): Tajikistan on Friday inaugurates a USD 3.9 billion hydro-electric power plant, a mega project that will enable the impoverished country to eliminate domestic energy shortages and export electricity to Afghanistan and Pakistan.

Built on the Vakhsh River in southern Tajik-istan, the plant championed by President Emomali Rakhmon is expect-ed to reach a height of 335 metres (1,099 feet) in a decade, becoming the world's tallest hydro-electric dam.

The first of six tur-bines in the Rogun hydroelectric dam goes online on Friday, with the power plant expected to reach capacity of 3,600 megawatts -- the equivalent of three nuclear power plants -- when completed.

At present, Rogun still resembles a vast construction site, with rocky earth covering the territory from which the powerful Vakhsh flowing through the Pamir mountains was diverted.
In 2016, Rakhmon,

who is a former collective farm boss, climbed into a bulldozer at a ground-breaking for the dam, in a sign of the president's personal attachment to the project.

It will double energy production in the country of nearly nine million people, alleviating a long-lasting, debilitating national energy deficit. Surplus energy will be sold to neighbours such as Afghanistan, Pakistan and Uzbekistan.
Plans to build a dam

in southern Tajikistan date back to the Soviet

era, but the project was scaled up following the

breakup of the Soviet Union in 1991. In 2017, Tajikistan raised USD 500 million from an inaugural inter-national bond to help finance the construction.

Authorities hope that

once the dam goes online it will generate money to finance further construction. Observers say the project is hugely significant for a country that lost tens of thousands of people in a civil war in the 1990s when rebel groups including Islamists rose up against the govern-ment. Rogun has become "a concept for national consolidation," political analyst Abdugani Mamadazimov told AFP There have been calls

by public figures to rename the dam after Rakhmon. Saidjafar Usmonzoda, chairman of the ruling People's Demo-cratic Party of Tajikistan, told AFP such a tribute would only be fitting giv-en Rakhmon's "heroic ac-complishment" making

Rogun a reality.

If it ever reaches the planned height of 335 metres, the dam will be 30 metres taller than the recently-built Jinping-I Dam in China and 35 metres taller than Tajikistan's own Soviet-era Nurek dam, also on the Vakhsh River. The project overseen by the Italian company Salini Impregilo has a number of risks.

Observers warn that the Tajik authorities do not appear to concern themselves with the environmental sensitivities of Rogun, given Rakhmon's close involvement. Ro-gun is located "in a highly seismic area, and several geological studies have warned about the risks of building such a large dam in this setting," Filip-po Menga, a lecturer in human geography at the University of Reading in the United Kingdom, told AFP.

Modi-Xi summit in Wuhan removed several misconceptions between India and China: Indian envoy

BEIJING, Nov 16 (PTI): The Wuhan summit between Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Chinese President Xi Jinping has removed several "misconceptions" between the two countries which would enable them to work to-gether on many issues like globalisa-

tion, India's envoy here has said. In Wuhan, Modi and Xi spoke to each other for almost 10 hours, which is characterised as a strategic communication by both sides, Ambassador Gau-tam Bambawale said. "Both leaders were very keen to have this kind of (informal) meeting. The reason why we did an informal summit was that we wanted the two leaders to talk to each other for the rimum amount of time," he said on the April 27-28 summit. "We removed several misconceptions

may have about each other. I think a lot of things bring India and China can do together. There are only few things where we differ with each other," Bambawale told the state-run China Global Television Network on Thursday. He said both the countries are beneficiaries of multilateralism and India is a votary for globalisation like China.

The two countries agree that they



are developing countries who are focused on improving the living standards of about 2.4 billion people.

"India and China have similar view points on global issues. We both want to have an open system where multilateral system vorks," he said, adding that both the countries vork on many issues like globalisation.

He said the issue that divides the two countries is the unresolved bound-ary question. "But even as we work for the resolution of the boundary problem between us, we have agreed that we

will maintain peace and tranquillity at our borders and for the last 30 years we have succeeded in that," he said.

The India-China border dispute covers the 3,488 km long Line of Actual Control (LAC). While China claims Arunachal Pradesh as Southern Tibet, In-dia asserts that the dispute covered Aksai Chin area which was occupied by China

during the 1962 war.

Bambawale is retiring later this month and will be succeeded by India's current Ambassador to Myanmar, Vikram Misri.

To a question about Japan and China deciding to undertake a joint project in third countries. Bambawale said New Delhi and Beijing are also trying out such a cooperation and pointed to the recent decision to jointly train Afghan diplomats.

"At the Wuhan summit, Xi and Modi have agreed that India and China will do a joint project in Afghanistan. Here is yet another example of two Asian countries working together to help another Asian country. So, I think the future is bright as far as this aspect is concerned," he said.

To a question about India-China trade and investment moving to a fast lane, he said, "Yes, I agree, not just trade but also investments increasing beween India and China".

"We are seeing more Chinese companies interested in investing in India and beginning to invest in India," he said and pointed to big strides made by

Chinese companies like Xiaomi.
Huawei too has a research base in India
employing about 6,000 Indian engineers.

He also spoke about Indian films like Dangal making big inroads in China. He said filmstar Aamir Khan has be-

come a "super star" in China.
