#### Banks will have to 'abort' lending to infra sector, esp power companies, warns SBI

Mumbai, Aug 31 (PTI): The nation's largest lender State Bank today said banks will have to "abort" lending to infrastructure projects, especially to the power sector, because of the harrowing experience of the past decade as most such loans have turned sour.

The power sector loans are facing a slew of problems due to a changes in non-performing assets recognition after the February 12 RBI circular, which was upheld by the Allahabad High Court last week.

Following the end of the RBI dead-line on August 27, as many as 30 power projects with a cumulative exposure of Rs 1.7 trillion are now facing bankrupt-cy proceedings. Banks have under a fortnight to resolve them, else will have

to be sent to NCLTs.

"Somehow, the kind of problems which all banks are now faced with, may be they will have to abort their fi-nancing to the infra projects," SBI managing director Dinesh Kumar Khara told reporters on the sidelines of an event.

When asked if the infra sector funding, critical for economic progress, is "untouchable for banks now", he singled out the power sector saying, "nobody wants to touch that".

Making it clear that banks are open

to lending to all the sectors till the risks are hedged properly, he said there are problems relating to the fuel supply pacts and power purchase agreements.

Khara said bankers are open to funding road projects, and credited to the National Highways Authority which structures these projects.
Fellow managing director PK Gup-

ta said in the case of the power sector, the February 12 circular revamping the NPA recognition norms, has made the going difficult for banks because of the stipulation of quicker recognition of an asset as an NPA and its immediate referral to insolvency courts.

Gupta also said a referral to NCLT vill naturally lead to the annulment of PPAs, which unnerves bankers.

SBI, which has around Rs 27,000 crore exposure to these troubled accounts, has assessed 11 power assets and has found four of them not resolvable, while the rest seven can be resolved, he said.

Gupta further said banks have 15 days after the 180- day deadline to resolve them ended August 27. If banks are not able to iron out resolution plans, some of the seven may also have to go to the NCLTs.

He, however, said the February 12 circular will not have a significant impact on SBI as it has already recognised a majority of these are NPAs and has provided accordingly.

"The amount of incremental pro-visioning that we may have to make is not very substantial as most of these assets are anyways NPAs and adequately provided for," he said. Also, the full and immediate provisioning does not cover these accounts, which means that banks can stagger the loss coverage over a vear.

According to a recent Icra report, after the August 27 deadline, banks will have to set aside around Rs 1 trillion in additional provisions for around 70

"There were some issues during the time but those issues have been resolved. It is impossi-





sector now. He said retail continues to drive the loan demand and has been growing at 14-15 per cent for the bank. He also exuded confidence that the bank will be able to meet the 10 per cent credit growth target for the fiscal.

On the travails in the infra sector, Khara said generally, over 25 years are required for a project to mature and SBI's experience in the sector is only 10-years old.

It can be noted that a bulk of the 11.6 per cent NPAs for the system have come from the infrastructure sector.

This agreement also comes years after a sense of mistrust had prevailed when certain sections in Nepal blamed India for the 135-day blockade in 2015 2016 that had crippled Nepal's econ

#### 2 Indians among Ramon Magsaysay Award winners

MANILA, Aug 31 (PTI): Two Indians - one a psy-chiatrist who works for the mentally-ill street persons and another whose initiative to harness sci-ence and culture creatively for economic progress improved the lives of Ladakhi youth - today re-ceived this year's Ramon Magsaysay Award.

Bharat Vatwani and Sonam Wangchuk are among six individuals who received the award, regarded as the Asian ver-

sion of the Nobel Prize.

Vatwani was recognised for "his tremendous courage and healing compassion in embracing India's mentally-afflicted destitute, and his stead-fast and magnanimous dedication to the work of restoring and affirming the human dignity of even the most ostracized," the Ramon Magsaysay Award Foundation said in its cita-tion for the winner.

Vatwani, who is based in Mumbai, and his wife started an informal op-eration of bringing mentally-ill street persons to their private clinic for treatment, leading them to establish Shraddha Rehabilitation Foundation in 1988, aimed at rescuing mentally-ill persons living on the streets; providing free shelter, food, and psychiatric treatment reuniting them with their families.

Wangchuk, 51, was recognised for "his uniquely systematic, collaborative and community-driven reform of learn-ing systems in remote northern India, thus improving the life opportuni-ties of Ladakhi youth, and his constructive engagement of all sectors in local society to harness science and culture creatively for economic progress, thus setting an example for minority peoples in the world," the citation said.

Wangchuk was a 19-year-old engineering student at the National Institute of Technology in Srinagar, when he went into tutoring to finance his schooling and help woefully unpre-pared students pass the national college matricu-

#### Bully at Your Own Risk

Democracy allows dissent and disagreement. The authorities should respect that

friend narrated an interesting episode recently. Afriend natraced an interconnection of the Mass on board an evening flight out of Kolkata. In these days of slow economies when airlines are not even maintaining their fleets properly, it comes as no surprise that they are also cutting back on housekeep ing expenses. As a result, this plane was infested with mosquitoes. Everyone was swatting around until one of the passengers called in the stewards and requested them to do something about the machchars. The host-ess said they could do nothing about it and pointed out that even they had to deal with the pesky insects. This happened recently, so there was the worry of dengue and malaria as well. This passenger kept complaining. All anyone wanted was for something to be done. Even a polite excuse might have worked. The plane had not yet taken off. A few minutes later, the captain radioed the air traffic controllers "reporting" that one of the passengers had become a dangerous nuisance and needed to be disembarked. This person was being persistent, may be even obnoxious at worst, not a dangerous nuisance and the only potentially dangerous presence in the plane was the swarm of mosquitoes and the officials would not even tortoise-coil away.
The Captain, as the friend put it, did what the Indian state invariably does when it cannot or does not want to reason with someone - brand them a nuisance/ spoilsport/ antinational etc and get rid of them.

In another incident, the other day a cabbie was

pulled over by a traffic cop who had received a wireless alert claiming that the vehicle had stopped at an unauthorized spot to pick up a passenger. The driver insisted that he had allowed in a passenger at a traffic jam (not of his making) and the passenger attested to as much. The cop was gruff and insisted he had to do his job. The cabbie had two choices - cough up the fine then and there or go to court, fight it, waste time and pay double if he loses.

If you are in the airline business, you will see nothing wrong in what the air crew in the first instance did. If you are taxi driver, vehicle owner or even a regular commuter, you will empathise with the challaned taxi driver because we have witnessed too many instances when traffic rules and driving etiquette are applied exclusively on the lay citizens and don't exist for anyone in khaki (and also the two shades of blue in Sikkim's case). We also see such attitudes manifest from positions of authority every time they even suspect a hint of emancipation rising in the cattle class (the mango people, as we like to call them nowadays). Sample what happened with the govt-student clash in 2014 Officials at HRDD were stereotypically pompous in addressing the concerns raised by the students, the college management was typically spineless in discussing the issue and the cops played to role when they went at the kids with rolls instead of some more patience just because the kids were not being quickly obedient enough. That day, however, the kids had had enough. They pushed back. Hard. Even though we have done everything to infantilize them by dictating their syllabus and routines and putting them into uncomfortable uniforms, they had shuffled through enough humiliation for the day. Later, the authorities continued to talk down to them during negotiations. Soon, the issue spilled out of the campus and everyone with an axe to grind against the government, the administration and all its other manifestations took to the streets and even slapped down the students when they said they wanted out.

There are lessons to be learned from all this, and the first one is for the authorities to realize that India is not a colony anymore. The cops maintain law & order for the benefit of the people and are not given uniforms and authority to keep the people in line. Air crews were given the power to deplane passengers because an out of control passenger midair posed a safety risk. They cannot throw off people for being ob-noxious just as cops cannot be allowed a free run to interpret rules as they want and enforce them as they please. One understands the difficulties of allowing freedoms while enforcing order, but come on, we had seven decades to figure that one out. Democracy allows us safe releases for pent up frustrations, dissents and disagreements, but we plug those every time we allow authority to play the bully and impose indignities on the people. Then, occasionally the people explode. There is no need to suffer those when it could have been avoided and healthier democracy created in its lieu. But we are not allowing it, are we? Not with the latest round of arrest of free thinkers and intellectuals on the argument that they are Naxal collaborators. Sympathizers of the denied and marginalised may be, but that is not the same as collaborators

### Social media mobilisation is a bright spot in Uganda's dark Bobi Wine saga

President Yoweri Musev-eni has ruled Uganda with authoritarian firmness for the last 32 years. But even his most ardent supporters were shocked by the ferocity with which his security forces recently meted out violence on jour nalists and supporters of Robert Kyagulanyi, a musician-turned-politician pop-ularly known as Bobi Wine. Wine, an opposition MP,

has emerged as a threat to Uganda's old political order. Against many odds, including systematic state intimidation, in 2017 he won the

Kyaddondo East constituency seat at a canter. He got nearly 80% of the vote and beating the ruling party and the main opposition's candidates. In subsequent by-elections, the candidates he has backed have all won.

But the weight of this success is becoming painful for Wine. He and 11 others have been charged with treason after one of the vehicles in Museveni's convoy was pelted with stones at a campaign rally. Wine was initially charged in a military court with illegally possessing a firearm.
When the military dropped that charge, he was released - then imme diately rearrested and charged with treason in a criminal court.

This shows how desperate authorities are to deal with the threat Wine poses. And the way Museveni's overnment has moved to keep a lid on how the case is being reported is raising fears that Uganda's democrat-

ic regression is deepening.

In full view of the public, jourin tull view of the public, jour-nalists covering protests in Kampa-la calling for Wine's release were brutally assaulted. Their recording equipment was either confiscated or destroyed by security forces. This has sparked a national and international



Museveni's grip on power remains exceptionally strong. His control of the country's civic and political institutions is nearly complete after 32 years in power. But there are pockets of dissent emerging from digital platforms whose practical political consequences are being slowly

Museveni runs a brutal regime. The control of information seems key to eliminating public dissent. A number of newspapers as well as radio and TV stations have been shut down over the years, always at the whim of the president.

Individual journalists have also borne the brunt of the state's violence. Arrests, kidnapping and torture are common. Some of Uganda's best jour-nalists have fled the country over the years of Museveni's rule to seek refuge in neighbouring countries.

The Ugandan government's tight grip on the flow of information can also be seen in its various attempts to control the use of social media. It has obviously recognised this as a new platform for political expression. In 2016 the government shut down social media during the country's elec-tions. Museveni defended the move, calling it a security measure to avert

lies intended to incite violence and illegal declaration of results.

In July this year, Uganda intro-duced an unprecedented tax on the use of social media services such as Facebook, Twitter and WhatsApp. Critics see the 200 shilling tax as being specifically targeted at the youth and intended to discourage their use of social media for communication.

Despite these measures, social edia has become an important form of political participation - especially for young Ugandans who are insti tutionally excluded from meaningful participation in the country's ecomic and political processe

#### NEW POLITICAL PLATFORMS

Museveni has previously dismissed social media as a platform used particularly by young people for gossip.

But that "gossip" has become an

important form of political partici-pation and protest vernacular. What cannot be published in the newspapers or broadcast on radio or televi-sion finds expression in tweets, memes or other forms of social media.

In fact, social media is becoming formal political platform in its own right. Following Wine's arrest social media users in Uganda and across the continent popularised the hashtag #Freebobiwine to focus attention on him and his co-accused hashtag quickly attracted significant interest, and led to peaceful protests in Kenya, South Africa and at Ugandan embassies around the world.

It's on the back of this kind of attention that more than 80 world-famous human rights activists and artists – including Angel-ique Kidjo, Chris Martin, Wole Soyinka and Damon Albarn – expressed their support for Wine. They've also called for internation-Museveni.

This international attention prompted an un-usual climbdown from Uganda's government. The military has apologised for its brutal handling of journalists. And Wine has been given bail on the treason charges.

Other repressive governments are no doubt watching this story unfold, and are worried. Such transcontinen-tal alliances forged and popularised through social media are undermining many governments' attempts to control information and invalidate legitimate dissent. More importantly, the conversations enabled by hashtags like #FreeBobiWine borrow from international norms of conduct. This invests local campaigns with agency as well as legitimacy.

#### LOOKING TO THE FUTURE

Bobi Wine's story of political intimidation by powerful government forces, detention and alleged torture, is a dark one. Social media's potential to organise and mobilise is a bright light in that darkness. This case may very well reveal how Uganda could look once Museveni's iron grip on traditional media is loosened and citizens have more space to debate, discuss and dissent.

### Memory loss isn't just an old person's problemhere's how young people can stay mentally fit

When I give talks, I am often approached by people who are worried about their memory. Maybe they are studying for an exam and don't feel that they learn as well as their peers. Maybe they keep forgetting to close the window when they leave the house. Or maybe they struggle to remem-ber an event that happened a few weeks ago but which everyone else can describe in vivid detail.

To feel that your memory may not be up to scratch can be unsettling or even downright frightening. And that's hardly surprising -- memory makes us who we are. Being able to reflect on and share the past is fundamental to our sense of identity, our relationships, and our capacity to imagine

To lose any part of this ability not only causes problems in our daily routine, it threatens the very notion of who we are. By far the biggest health fear in people over the age of 50 is Alzheimer's disease and the catastrophic loss of personal memory it

Go to any big concert these days, and your view of the performer will frequently be obscured by a sea of smartphones, each committing the sights and sounds to a safe permanent digital record.

found ways to preserve knowledge and experienc-es, but has the modern lifestyle taken it a step too far? Could an over-reliance on technology make our memory systems lazier and less efficient?

Some studies have found that using an in

ternet search engine can lead to poorer recall of information, although another study recently published failed to replicate this effect. And most researchers agree that in these situations it is not that memory becomes less effective, just that we use it differently.

How about recording events on a smartphone? A recent study showed that a group pausing to take photos at regular intervals had poorer recall of the event than those who were immersed in the experience. And an earlier piece of research suggested that photos helped people remember what they saw, but reduced their memory of what was said. It seems that the key factor in these situation is at-tention – actively taking photos may distract and distance someone from aspects of an experience, meaning that less is remembered.

However, there are novel ways around this

problem if you insist on taking pictures. Our own work has shown that distraction can be countered if photos are taken automatically using a wearable

#### TECHNOLOGY AND MEMORY

While it may be true that technology is changing the way we use our memory at times, there is no scientific reason to believe that it reduces the in-

Nevertheless, in today's fast-paced and de-manding society, there are other factors that may have a negative impact, for example poor quality sleep, stress, distractions, depression and alcohol consumption. The good news is that these effects are generally regarded as temporary unless they continue over very long periods of time.

There are a small number of people who may

experience memory problems over and above everyday forgetfulness. Head injuries, strokes, epilepsy, brain infections such as encephalitis, or congenital conditions such as hydrocephalus, a build up of fluid in the brain, can all lead to a significant loss in our ability to retain and recall information. And recently, a new condition has been identified -- severely deficient autobi-ographical memory -- which describes a small percentage of the population who report a specific but marked impairment in the ability to recall their past.

These people are the exception though, and most people who worry about their memory have no real cause for concern. When it comes to remembering, we all have our own strengths and weaknesses. The friend who gets top marks in every pub quiz may be the same one who always forgets where they left their wallet. And the partner who can describe last year's holiday in incredible detail may take forever to learn a new language. In fact, even world memory champions report every-day forgetfulness, like losing their keys. By and large, where our memory fails us, it is

because we are tired, not paying attention, or try-ing to do too much at once. Using lists, diaries and smartphone reminders does not make memory less efficient – rather, it frees the brain up to do other things. And instead of making us lazy, looking comething up on the internet can help to reinforce or enrich our knowledge base.

But there may be occasions when technology

gets in the way - by distracting us from a poten tially special moment, or luring us into surfing the web instead of getting much-needed sleep. Most everyday memory lapses can be fixed simply by being more mindful and less busy. So, if you want to remember time with friends, my advice is to enjoy the moment, chat about it afterwards and enjoy a

### As Siang swells, 19 airlifted from marooned areas in Arunachal, 200 rescued in Assam

ITANAGAR/GUWAHATI, (PTI): As many as 19 people were today airlifted by the Air Force from a flooded Arunachal Pradesh island, while over 200 others were rescued by disaster response teams from As-sam's Dhemaji district as the Siang river, originating from China, contin-

ued to swell due to heavy rains.
Siang river, known as Tsangpo in China, flows downstream upon entering India to join the Brahmaputra.

The 19 rescued people - cat-tle-herders from Assam - were stranded for over 24 hours in East Siang district of Arunachal. The IAF operation followed a request by the district administration, East Siang DC Tamiyo Tatak said.

Arunachal Chief Minister Pema Khandu personally monitored the evacuation operation from Itanagar, the DC said, adding Lok Sabha MP Ninong Ering and Pasighat West MLA Tatung Jamoh along with police and



locals helped in rescuing the cattle. The other 200, who were rescued by personnel of National Disaster Response Force (NDRF) and State Disaster Response Force (SDRF), had gone to Dhemaji, near East Siang, for farming activities

All of them, including children, have been brought to safety, sources in the Dhemaii administration said.

According to a Chinese government report, Tsangpo was in spate

because of heavy rains. The various GD (gauge and discharge) stations on the Tsangpo had observed a dis-charge of 9,020 cumec water on Wednesday, officials there said.

The administrations of East Siang and bordering Dhemaji, Lakhimpur and Dibrugarh in Assam had sounded alerts yesterday following rise in water level in Siang.

Over 1.000 families living along the river have been affected at Mebo area in East Siang, Arunachal MLA Lombo Tayeng said. Informing that 15 families of Seram-Ramku village lost their homes as the flood water came gushing in, he said most of the inhabitants on the left bank had been rescued to safe places.

Tayeng said Rs 1 lakh each will be

provided for their rehabilitation.

He also sent a report to Union Minister Kiren Rijiju for needful action, besides requesting him to facilitate visit of an inter-ministerial central team to assess the situation

In a circular, the East Siang DC cautioned people against venturing into Siang River for fishing and swimming. According to sources in the Central Water Commission (CWC), the Siang river has become turbid.

In Lakhimpur and Dibrugarh districts of Assam, the administrations have taken precautionary measures in view of a CWC warning, which predicted an "unprecedented" rise in the water level of Brahmaputra, official sources said.

The Inland Waterways department has been asked to keep boats ready for rescuing people from riv-erine and other vulnerable areas, if need be, they said.

The administration has also instructed its officials to keep the army, paramilitary forces ready to reach out to the marooned people and stock food and medicine supplies for emergency situations.



### **BIMSTEC** calls for holding accountable states that encourage terrorism

KATHMANDU, AUG 31 (PTI): Describing terrorism as a "great threat" to international peace and security, India and six other BIMSTEC nations today called for identifying and holding accountable States and non-State entities that encourage, support or finance terrorism, provide sanctuaries to terrorists and falsely extol their

The Kathmandu Declaration issued at the end of the two-day 4th BIMSTEC summit, which was attended by Prime Minister Narendra Modi among others, deplored terror attacks in all parts of the world including in BIMSTEC countries and stressed that there can be no justification whatsoever for any act of terrorism.

"Today's proceedings at the BIMSTEC Summit were extremely productive. We built on the ground covered vesterday and reiterated our commitment to further strengthen multilateral cooperation in diverse areas," Modi said.

"Terrorism and transnational organised crimes continue to pose a great threat to international peace and security including in the BIMSTEC countries," the Kathmandu declaration said as it strongly condemned terrorism in all its forms and manifestations wherever and by whomsoever committed.

The declaration, which was unanimously adopted by all the member states, said the "fight against terrorism should target not only terrorists, terror organisations and networks but also identify and hold accountable States and non-State entities that encourage, support or finance terrorism, provide sanctuaries to terrorists and terror groups and

falsely extol their virtues."

The declaration did not name any specific country, but Pakistan is often accused by its neighbours, including India, of providing safe havens to terrorists

comprehensive approach which should include preventing financing of terrorists and terrorist actions from territories under their control, blocking recruitment and cross-border movement of ter-rorists, countering radicalisation, countering misuse of internet for purposes of terrorism and dismantling terrorist safe havens.

It said that combating terrorism and transnational organised crimes require sustained efforts and cooperation and comprehen-sive approach involving active participation and collaboration of the

Member States.

The declaration called for strengthening cooperation and coordination among the law en-forcement, intelligence and security agencies of the member states, holding meetings at the level of BIMSTEC Home Ministers and the BIMSTEC National Security Chiefs.

The BIMSTEC is a regional grouping comprising India, Bangladesh, Myanmar, Sri Lanka, Thailand, Bhutan and Nepal. The grouping accounts for 22 per cent of the global population, and has a combined gross domestic product of USD 2.8 trillion.

The declaration also underlined the importance of multi-dimensional connectivity, which promotes synergy among connectivity frameworks in the region, as a key enabler to economic integra-

tion for shared prosperity.

It stressed the need for a fair, just, rule-based, equitable and transparent international order and reaffirming faith in the multi-lateralism with the United Nations at the centre and the rule-based international trading system.

In the declaration, the member states reiterated their pledged to work collectively towards making BIMSTEC a stronger, more effective and result-oriented organi-sation for achieving a peaceful, prosperous and sustainable Bay of

Bengal Region.

They have also resolved to achieve, leveraging on BIMSTEC's position as a bridge linking South and Southeast Asia, an enhanced level of economic and social development in the region, and remain fully committed to consolidate and deepen cooperation among Mem-ber States towards transforming the organisation into an effective platform to promote peace, pros-perity and sustainability.

The member states have also stressed on the need to accelerate progress in the core areas of cooperation and to review, restructure and rationalise the existing areas of BIMSTEC cooperation and streamline the operational modalities for activities, implementation of pro-grammes and projects under BIMS-TEC for bringing out tangible results.

The declaration also recognised that eradication of poverty is the greatest regional challenge in realising development objectives and expressed firm commitment to work together for implementing the Agenda 2030 for sustainable development.

At the end of the summit. Nepal Prime Minister K P Sharma Oli handed over the chairmanship of the grouping to Sri Lankan President Maithripala Sirisena.
Oli congratulated Sri Lanka for

assuming the role as new host for BIMSTEC and extended thanks to the heads of states/governments of member states for their support in materialising the summit with

A Memorandum of Understanding was also signed on establishment of the BIMSTEC Grid Interconnection to enhance energy cooperation among the member states.

"The MoU provides for optimisation of using energy resources in the region & promotion of efficient & secure operation of power system, among other things," Ministry of External Affairs spokesperson Raveesh Kumar tweeted.

### Post-docu theft, Bru body for fresh revision of electoral rolls

AIZAWL, AUG 31 (PTI): The new ly-formed Mizoram Bru Displaced People's Coordination Commit-tee (MBDPCC) has appealed to the Election Commission and the Mizoram government to conduct revision of electoral rolls in the six relief camps in Tripura again.
The request followed a burglary

at the election office of Mizoram's Mamit district following which en-listment forms duly filled in by the displaced Bru people in the relief camps of the neighbouring Tripura

have gone missing.

The August 23 burglary took place two days before the final phase of repatriation of Bru families from Tripura to Mizoram started on August 25.

In a statement issued yesterday evening, MBDPCC president T Laldingliana asked the poll panel and the Mizoram government officials to conduct revision of voters list expeditiously and hand over the electoral photo identity cards to the voters personally.



Mizoram, the last remaining is due for polls this December.

The MNDPCC president con-demned the theft of filled in election forms and praised the EC and the Mizoram government for conducting revision of voters lists in the relief camps earlier.

The Mizoram election depart-ment has conducted revision of voters lists of Bru refugees in their Tripura camps before the repatriation, despite opposition from the

The 20-year-old Indi-

an, who was competing in the season's Diamond League Series Finale just three days after winning Asian Games gold in Ja karta, sent the spear to a best distance of 85.73m to end at fourth position in the eight-man event here last night.

Chopra, a Commonwealth Games gold medallist, was at the third position till the fifth and penultimate round but the reigning Olympic champion Thomas Rohler of Germany came up with a 85.76m effort in his last attempt to pip the Indian by a mere 0.03 meter.

The star Indian could not repeat his national record shattering throw of 88.06m in Jakarta but his effort here earned him USD 6000 besides the enormous amount of experience he got by rubbing shoulders with the best in the business.

Meanwhile, a third-

round monster throw of 91.44m from Germany's Andreas Hofmann earned him his first big international javelin prize as he claimed one of the 16 Diamond Trophies on offer in the first of the Diamond League Finals here The second Final will be held in Brussels today which will see competition in another 16 sets of events.

In the absence of champion Jo-Vetter (who world pulled out of the event). Rohler was the favour-ite to win the gold here but Hoffman, Germany's 'Third Man' (after Vettel and Roeler), upstaged his more illustrious compa-triot to win gold.

Roehler had beaten Hofmann to the Europe-an title in Berlin earlier this season.

Estonia's Magnus Kirt took second place with 87.57m.

Chopra had quali-fied for the Final as sixth best in terms of points. He took part in three Diamond League Series legs. He finished fourth in Doha, sixth in Eugene and fifth in Rabat. He missed the Birmingham eg on August 18 due to the Asian Games.

The match against Nicol went down to the wire and was full of long gruelling rallies. Joshna had a match ball on 10-9 in the fourth game but the Malaysian fought back to take the next three points, levelling the opening singles at 2-2.

The Indian's brute power vas too much to handle for Wee Wern, who is on a comeback trail after a 20-month injury lay-off. The scoreline may not suggest but it was a tricky match for Pallikal, who

eventually pulled through 11-2, 11-9, 11-7.

"The plan was definitely to rattle her with my power. Wee Wern has been a top player and has already won three tournaments after her comeback. Also, I had to do it for Joshna. She played such a great match to get us on the brink of a win," said Pallikal.

### India, Pak agree on IWT mandated tours to both sides of Indus basin

(PTI): India and Pakistan have agreed to undertake the Indus Waters Treaty mandated tours by their Commissioners in the Indus basin on both sides to resolve issues on the various hydroelectric projects, including the Pakal Dul and Lower Kalnai in Jammu and Kashmir.

After the conclusion of the two-day high-level bilateral talks on the Indus Waters Treaty here, the first official engagement between India and Pakistan since Imran Khan became Prime Minister on August 18, the External Affairs Ministry said deliberations were held on further strengthening the role of the Permanent Indus Commission (PIC) for matters under the 1960 Treaty.

As per the provisions of the treaty, technical discussions were held on implementation of various hydroelectric projects under the provisions of Indus Waters Treaty including Pakal Dul (1000 MW) and Lower Kalnai(48 MW) in the state of Jammu and Kashmir.

Both the countries agreed to undertake the Treaty mandated tours of both the Indus Commissioners in the Indus basin on both sides, the ministry said in a state ment in New Delhi.



It was agreed to hold the next meeting of the PIC in India on mu-

tually convenient dates.

According to news reports in Pakistan, India has invited Paki-

the Pakal Dul and Lower Kalnai hydropower projects on the Chenab river next month to address Islamabad's concerns over the construction of the projects

During the talks India rejected Pakistan's objections to the con-struction work, Dawn newspaper reported.

"India has hinted at continuation of the work on both the hydro-power projects," an official said.

Earlier, both delegations reiterated their stance over the con-struction of the projects. The Indian Water Commission led by Commissioner P K Saxena reviewed Pakistan's objections minutely. It also presented its point of view,

the report said.

The Pakistani side was led by Commissioner for Indus Waters Syed Meher Ali Shah.

According to the paper, Pakistan's demands included reduction of the height of Pakal Dul's reservoir up to five metres, maintenance of 40-metre height above sea level while making spillways' gates of the Pakal Dul project, besides clarifying the pattern and mechanism for the water storage and releases and some technical concerns over design of the Lower Kalnai hydropower project.

India and Pakistan signed the Indus Waters Treaty in 1960 after nine years of negotiations, with

the World Bank being a signatory.

The water commissioners of Pakistan and India are required to meet twice a year and arrange technical visits to projects' sites Pakistan had been facing a lot of problems in timely meetings and

The last meeting of the Pakistan-India Permanent Indus Commission was held in New Delhi in March during which both the sides had shared details of the water flow and the quantum of water being used under the 1960 treaty.

The treaty sets out a mechanism for cooperation and information exchange between the two countries regarding their use of the rivers. However, there have been disagreements and differences between India and Pakistan

over the treaty.

The water commissioners of Pakistan and India were required to meet twice a year and arrange technical visits to projects' sites and critical river head works, but Pakistan had been facing a lot of problems in timely meetings and

Under the provisions of the Indus Water Treaty 1960, waters of the eastern rivers Sutlej, Beas and Ravi had been allocated to India and the western rivers the Indus, Jhelum and Chenab to Pakistan, except for certain non-consump tive uses for India.

Smaller game developers also lost ground in Shenzhen. Youzu Interactive Co plunged nearly eight percent and Sichuan Xun You Network Technology lost more than eight per cent. Ourpalm Co was own nearly six percent.

"In the last year, we're

starting to win a lot," he said. "You know why? Be-

cause they know if we don't, I'm out of there." China, which is currently embroiled in a trade war with the US, joined the WTO in 2001 -- a move which US Trade Representative Robert Ligh-thizer has described as a mistake.

Miramax, which owns the TV distri-bution rights to the film, told Bank Leumi that no payment was due as result of 'significant problems with the produc-tion' that 'have significantly devalued' the motion picture, the bank said in

court docs.

One of those factors was Depp's 'highly publicized alleged off-screen conduct' in addition to 'a lawsuit filed against Mr. Depp and the production because he allegedly physically attacked a crew member on the set.'

Bank Leumi told the court 'the real reason' the film was pulled was because Glob-al Road is 'in financial distress and decided not to pay' in excess of \$10 million toward 'marketing and distribution expenses' that were assured in previous pacts. Global Road Entertainment earlier

this week laid off about 45 people in its film division, according to The Hollywood Reporter, after it was overtaken by its bank lenders.

Earlier this month, the movie's Sep-



tember 7 release was pulled back. It was not immediately clear when the Brad Furman-directed film would be released.

The Hollywood veteran last month was at a receiving end of the aforementioned suit over his alleged actions on the set of the movie, as location manager Gregg 'Rocky' Brooks claimed in his suit that the Edward Scissorhands actor struck him on multiple occasions amid a dispute during filming, TMZ reported.

Brooks said that during production the evening of April 13, 2017, he told Depp and Furman they needed to wrap things up based on their schedule. He said a boozy Depp hit him two times in his ribs, then told him, "I will give you \$100,000 to punch me in the face right now," before the star's guards guided

In the movie which examines the aftermath of law enforcement examining The Notorious B.I.G.'s March 1997 mur der in the wake of Tupac Shakur's October 1996 killing, Depp, 55, plays Det.

Depp, who denied the allegations of physical abuse against Heard, issued a statement saying that 'there was never any intent of physical or emotional harm' in the marriage upon agreeing on a settlement two years ago.
