UN releases first of its kind report on rights status in Kashmir, PoK, India reacts sharply

GENEVA/NEW DELHI, JUN 14 (PTI): The UN today released the first-ever report on alleged human rights violation in Kashmir and Pakistan-occupied Kashmir (PoK) and demanded an international probe into it, evoking a sharp reaction from India which termed the document as "fallacious and motivated".

New Delhi also lodged a strong protest with the United Nations, saying the government is "deeply concerned that individual prejudices are being allowed to undermine the credibility of a UN institution."

"The report violates India's sovereignty and territorial integrity. The entire state of Jammu and Kashmir is an integral part of India. Pakistan is in illegal and forcible occupation of a part of the Indian state through aggression," the Ministry of External Affairs said in a strong-

ly-worded statement.
In its 49-page report, the
UN's Office of the High Commissioner for Human Rights fo-

cused on both Jammu and Kashmir (consisting of the Kashmir Valley, the Jammu and Ladakh regions) and Pakistan-Administered Kashmir (Azad Jammu and Kashmir and Gilgit-Baltistan).

Taking objection to the UN using terms like "Azad Jammu and Kashmir and Gilgit-Baltistan" for PoK, the MEA said "The incorrect description of Indian territory in the report is mischievous, misleading and unacceptable. There are no entities such as 'Azad Jammu and Kash-

mir' and 'Gilgit-Baltistan."

"We are deeply concerned

that individual prejudices are being allowed to undermine the credibility of a UN institution," the ministry added. The UN also asked Pakistan to end its "misuse" of anti-terror legislation to persecute peaceful activists and quash dissent.

Social Welfare Secy directed by MoTA to take action on land protection of L-T's

The Ministry of Tribal Affairs [MoTA] has directed the Commissioner/ Secretary of Social Justice Empowerment & Welfare Department, Government of Sikkim, to take appropriate action regarding land protec-tion of the Limboo and Tamang communities in the State. This by virtue of their being Scheduled Tribes now and coming under the protection accorded to STs against alienation of their land.

A press release issued by Limboo-Tamang Vol-

fied in a MoTA letter dated 06 June received by LTVC president, Yehang Tshong. This was in reply to the follow-up letter of LTVC dated 01 May, 2018 subof LTVC mitted to MSJ&E, Union Minister, Thhawarchand Gehlot, by LTVC team at his office in Shastri Bhawan, New Delhi.
The release adds that

an LTVC team had visited New Delhi last month and visited various Central Ministries. Union Ministers and bureaucrats with regard to L-T seat reservation issue in Sikkim.

The LTVC had also highlighted issues for protection of L-T land in Sikkim and had also sub-mitted a 3-point agenda memorandum seeking Indigenous Primitive Status for Limbu community under historical background.

The LTVC has alleged Chief Minister Pawan Chamling's decision to raise L-Ts' land issue after 16 years to be "hasty and aimed" at gaining credit as the State Government knew that LTVC had raised the L-T land protection issue at Centre soon and that orders would come from the Centre to the State Gov-ernment to implement land protection law for LT unities in Sikkim.

"If State Government was sincere towards L-T communities then they would have implemented L-T lands' protection law in Sikkim in 2003 itself when LT were declared ST as this falls under State subject and would not have kept it pending like L-T seat reservation in Sikkim Legislative Assembly for 16 years. Till now none had raised or even had thought of this LT land protection and now everyone seems to be busy giving the credit to someone who had never initiated it," the release adds

The LTVC has extended gratitude to MoTA and MSJ&E for taking positive steps for the welfare of L-T communities in Sikkim.

It is further informs that the LTVC will soon visit the Commissioner-cum-Secretary, State SJE&WD and submit a letter requesting him to follow MOTA's directions and take necessary steps and issue a new notification proclaiming protection of LT lands in Sikkim at the earliest.

UN High Commissionfor Human Rights Zeid Ra'ad Al Hussein said he will urge the UN Human Rights Council to consider establishing a commission of inquiry to conduct a "comprehensive independent international investigation" into allegations of human rights violations in Kashmir.

The report has given a detailed account of protests and incidents of alleged excesses by the se-curity forces since 2016. The UN body said

based on the findings in its report, a commission of inquiry should be established to conduct a comprehensive independent international investigation into allegations of human rights violations in Kashmir.

It also asked India to set up an "independent, impartial and credible investigations to probe all civilian killings which have occurred since July 2016 and incidents of excessive use of force by security forces including serious injuries caused by the use of the pellet-firing shotguns".

The UN body asked

Pakistan to fully respect international human rights law obligations in Pakistan-Administered Kashmir.

It also asked Islamabad to end the misuse of anti-terror legislation to persecute those engaging in peaceful political and civil activities and expressions of dissent, and amend the anti-ter-rorism act to bring it in line with international human rights standards.

The External Affairs Ministry called the report a selective compilation of largely unverified information and that it is "overtly prejudiced" and seeks to build a false narrative.

The MEA said terrorism was the most "egregious violation" of human rights and yet the authors of the report have conveniently ignored the pattern of cross-border terrorism emanating from Pakistan and territories under its illegal control.

"Cross-border terror and incitement is aimed at suppressing the will of the people of Jammu and Kashmir, disrupting its political and social fabric and undermining India's integrity," it said.

The MEA said it was

disturbing that those behind the report have chosen to describe internationally designated and UN-proscribed ter-rorist entities as "armed groups" and terrorists as "leaders".

"This undermines the UN-led consensus on zero tolerance to terrorism.

"The motivated report deliberately ignores that fundamental rights and freedoms guaranteed under the Consti-tution to every Indian citizen, including in the state of Jammu and Kash-mir, are protected also by an independent judiciary, human rights commis-sions, free and vibrant media and an active civil society," it said.
The MEA said India's

protest and views in the matter have been conveyed unequivocally to the Office of the High Commissioner for Hu man Rights.

Hussein said the political dimensions of the "dispute" between India "dispute" perween and Pakistan have long been centre-stage, this is not a "conflict fro-zen in time".

"Any resolution of the political situation in Kashmir must entail a commitment to end the cycles of violence and ensure accountability for past and current violations and abuses by all parties," Hussein added.

Terrorism, she said, has hit a new low with Bukhari's killing, 'that too on the eve of Eid".

"We must unite against forces seeking to undermine our at-tempts to restore peace. Justice will be done," Mehbooba said.

It was not immediately clear how many gunmen attacked Bukhari, who earlier worked with The Hindu newspaper as its Kashmir correspondent.

Bukhari was instrumental in

organising several conferences for peace in the Kashmir Valley. He was also part of the Track II process with Pakistan.

Petrol, diesel price hit pause button

New Delhi, Jun 14 (PTI): After declining for a fortnight, petrol and diesel prices have hit a pause button with rates remaining unchanged for the second consecutive day today.

Petrol and diesel

price were last revised on June 12 when they were cut by 15 paise and 10 paisa a litre, respective-ly. Rates have remained unchanged since then, according to a review of price notifications issued by state fuel retailers.

Petrol costs Rs 76.43 per litre in Delhi and diesel is priced at Rs 67.85 a litre. Prices in Delhi are the lowest among all metro cities and most state capitals due to low er sales tax or VAT.

After hitting an all-time high of Rs 78.43 a litre for petrol and Rs 69.31 for diesel on May 29, rates have been cut on 14 occasions thereas international oil prices softened and the rupee strengthened against the US dollar.

Petrol price has dropped by Rs 2 a litre and diesel by Rs 1.46. This compares to Rs 3.8 a litre hike in petrol and Rs 3.38 a litre hike in diesel rates in Delhi in the fortnight beginning May 14 when state-owned oil firms ended a 19-day pre-Karnataka poll hia-tus to resume daily price revision.

Retail prices are still higher than the peak touched during the pre-vious UPA regime. Petrol had touched Rs 76.06 on September 14, 2013 The peak price for diesel during previous UPA gov-ernment was hit on May 13, 2014, when rates touched Rs 56.71 a litre

Since January 1, 2018, petrol prices have risen by Rs 6.46 a litre and diesel by Rs 8.21. Petrol price in Delhi was Rs 71.41 a litre and diesel was priced at Rs 56.71 when the present BJP-government took office.

The government had deregulated or freed petrol pricing from its control in June 2010 and diesel in October 2014. It allowed revision of prices on a daily basis since mid-June last year to reflect changes in cost instantly.

The government at the centre had raised excise duty on petrol by Rs 11.77 a litre and that on diesel by Rs 13.47 a litre in nine instalments November between 2014 and January 2016 to shore up finances as global oil prices fell, but then cut the tax just once in October last year by Rs 2 a litre.

Only four states -Maharashtra, Gujarat, Madhya Pradesh and Himachal Pradesh -- re-duced VAT following the October 3, 2017 cut in excise duty. This month, Kerala cut VAT by Re 1 a

istry of Rural Development [MoRD]. tainable Promotion of sus-livelihoods for the rural poor is the top priority of the Mission. In Sikkim, the

mission was implemented in 2015-16

The mission seeks to organize all the rural women into SHGs and their federations

which in turn are expected to facilitate institutional credit and services for diversifying the livelihoods of the poor.

The DAY-NRLM has insti-

tuted a sub-scheme of "National awards to Best Per-forming SHGs and Village Organisations [Federation] to encourage and motivate SHGs to improve their performance. The awards conferred on outstanding SHGs and Village Organisa-tions annually. The SHGs are selected on the basis of key

performance indicators. For the year 2017-18, 34 outstanding SHGs were selected from 20 states with Ekta SHG from Sikkim securing the National Award for the Best Performing SHGs and Village Organisations [Federation].

It is to be informed that the mission is being implemented in North and East Districts of Sikkim by State Rural Livelihood Mission [SRLM], under Rural Management Development Department [RMDD] in a phased manner since 201516 and up to 2017-18, all the 14 blocks have been covered for implementation.

The total number of SHGs in these 14 blocks organised under SRLM stands at 1675 SHGs as of now out of which 525 SHGs have been formed in 07 new blocks and the process of formation is still in progress. SHGs in the old 07 blocks have been supported with Revolving Fund at Rs 15,000 per SHG and Commu-nity Fund at Rs 50,000 per SHG for taking up various livelihoods initiatives.
The various

training and capacity training programmes that SRLM continues to give by engaging resource persons from both within and outside have also helped them understand how to build a strong institution for themselves, earning them a National Award, the release mentions.

book is based on the re-cent hike in the price of petrol and diesel.

in the region, with floods leaving thou sands homeless in Tripura, Manipur, Mizoram and Assam.

Two people were swept away by strong river currents in Tripura yes-terday, while over 14,000 families lost their homes as heavy downpour sub-

Passenger Safety Look under the bonnet also, and also check the tyres and brakes

Aperson driving to Siliguri recently was flagged down by road labourers to stop while the dozers cleared monsoon debris from NH10. As the person waited, a mainline taxi bumped into his vehicle from behind. When the person got out to check the damage and find the cause, the apologetic taxi driver explained that his vehicle's brakes were not in top shape. The vehicle had bumped itself to a stop! The damage was not much, but the real worry was the utter disregard for human lives.

The taxi-jeep was loaded to full capacity with $10\,$ passengers on board. And no brakes! It soon transpired that all that the driver could present by way of documents was a year-old General Diary police complaint recording that the documents of the vehicle were lost. As for a driving licence, the driver claimed that he had applied for one in Siliguri and was yet to receive it. What is more, he was not even the actual driver of the said vehicle and was filling in for the regular driver who had decided to take a day off and requisitioned his services for the day! Just about every prescribed rule for passenger vehicles was being flouted in this case. What is frightening is that it was not even a rare aberration as is being discovered by the ongoing checking by the Motor Vehicles Division of the Transport Department.

Little surprise then that in the past year, 2017, there were 198 accidents reported on Sikkim's roads which claimed 68 lives and left 471 injured. This number is lower than the number of accidents reported in 2016, but only marginally so and given the comparatively small pool of vehicles and limited road length, even one accident less can reflect high percentage differential.

Suffice to say that it is time that more earnest ef-

forts to be initiated to address road safety - the point-lessness of the road safety week tokenism [observed in the first week of May] will just not do any more.

It is important to bear in mind that very few of the

198 accidents last year can be attributed to bad roads or landslides. All the remaining accidents and fatalities were caused by driver error. Here, one may add that the blame for even mechanical failures leading to accidents has to rest with the drivers for having ignored the warning signs or delayed servicing and repairs. One should not be surprised if it transpires that most of the accidents involved vehicles which were not road-worthy, either because of faulty brakes or ineffectually traction due to bald tyres or inept hands on the wheels [a poor driver, after all, makes even the best maintained rides dangerous]. The reason why the opening anecdote was shared is because it is a copybook illustration of all that is wrong with passenger/ road safety in Sikkim. Unfortunately, none of real reasons which are making travelling unsafe for people who opt for jeeps and taxis is being addressed.

This section has often spoken of the need for traffic regulators to focus more on the road worthiness and driving skills than documents and licences. But this aspect continues to remain ignored. Here is a checklist of what could be considered. For one, the State Government needs to ensure that the "T" [Taxi] driving licenses are issued only after proper verification of the applicant's driving skills. If this is done conscientiously, then the government can return more strictly to its policy decision of allowing on people with taxi driving licences issued in Sikkim to drive passenger vehicles here. Each time Motor Vehicle Inspectors or Traffic personnel stop a vehicle for 'document check' they should also inspect the road worthiness of the vehicle [at least the tyres and brakes] and pull the vehicles off the roads until the vehicles in question are brought back to health. A rule, mandatory in all metros now, that all passenger vehicles prominently display the ownership and driver details for all pas-sengers to see clearly should also be considered [This board should also include contact details of agencies to contact in case of rash driving or rude behaviour by drivers]. This will ensure that the regular drivers do not play truant and put the lives of passengers in the hands of unauthorised and potentially unsafe drivers and will also encourage more passengers to complain against dangerous driving. This is important because with the increase in the number of passenger vehicles, too many people with scant respect for traffic rules or human lives are being let loose on the highways.

Antarctica has lost 3 trillion tonnes of ice in 25 years. Time is running out for the frozen continent

Antarctica lost 3 trillion tonnes of ice between 1992 and 2017, according to a new analysis of satellite observations. In vulnerable West Antarctica, the annual rate of ice loss has tripled during that period, reaching 159 billion tonnes a year. Overall, enough ice has been lost from Antarctica over the past quarter-century to raise global seas by 8 millimetres.

What will Antarctica look like in

the year 2070, and how will changes in Antarctica impact the rest of the globe? The answer to these questions depends on choices we make in the next decade, as outlined in our accompanying paper, also published today in Nature

Our research contrasts two potential narratives for Antarctica over the coming half-century – a story that will play out within the lifetimes of today's children and young adults.

While the two scenarios are nec-essarily speculative, two things are certain. The first is that once significant changes occur in Antarctica, we are committed to centuries of further, irreversible change on global scales The second is that we don't have much time – the narrative that eventually plays out will depend on choices made in the coming decade.

CHANGE IN ANTARCTICA

HAS GLOBAL IMPACTS

Despite being the most remote region on Earth, changes in Antarctica and the Southern Ocean will have global consequences for the planet and humanity.


For example, the rate of sea-level

rise depends on the response of the Antarctic ice sheet to warming of the atmosphere and ocean, while the speed of climate change depends on how much heat and carbon dioxide is taken up by the Southern Ocean. What's more, marine ecosystems all over the world are sustained by the nutrients exported from the Southern Ocean to lower latitudes.

From a political perspective, Antarctica and the Southern Ocean are among the largest shared spaces on Earth, regulated by a unique governance regime known as the Antarctic Treaty System. So far this regime has been successful at managing the environment and avoiding discord. However, just as the physical and biological systems of Antarctica face challenges from rapid environmental change driven by human activities, so too does the management of the continent.

ANTARCTICA IN 2070

We considered two narratives of the next 50 years for Antarctica, each describing a plausible future based on



the latest science.

In the first scenario, global greenhouse gas emissions remain un-checked, the climate continues to warm, and little policy action is taken to respond to environmental factors and human activities that affect the Antarctic.

Under this scenario, Antarctica and the Southern Ocean undergo widespread and rapid change, with global consequences. Warming of the ocean and atmosphere result in dra-matic loss of major ice shelves. This causes increased loss of ice from the Antarctic ice sheet and acceleration of sea-level rise to rates not seen since the end of the last glacial period

more than 10,000 years ago.

Warming, sea-ice retreat and ocean acidification significantly change marine ecosystems. And un-

restricted growth in human use of Antarctica degrades the environment and results in the establishment of invasive species.

In the second scenario, ambitious action is taken to limit greenhouse gas emissions and to establish policies that reduce human pressure Antarctica's environment.

Under this scenario. Antarctica in 2070 looks much like it does today. The ice shelves remain largely intact, reducing loss of ice from the Antarc-tic ice sheet and therefore limiting sea-level rise.

An increasingly collaborative and effective governance regime helps to alleviate human pressures on Antarctica and the Southern Ocean Marine ecosystems remain largely intact warming and acidification are held in check. On land, biological invasions remain rare. Antarctica's unique invertebrates and microbes continue to

.. THE CHOICE IS OURS

We can choose which of these trajectories we follow over the coming half-century. But the window of opportunity is closing fast.

Global warming is determined by global greenhouse emissions, which continue to grow. This will commit us to further unavoidable climate impacts, some of which will take decades or centuries to play out. Green-house gas emissions must peak and start falling within the coming decade if our second narrative is to stand a

chance of coming true.

If our more optimistic scenario for Antarctica plays out, there is a good chance that the continent's buttressing ice shelves will survive and that Antarctica's contribution to sea-level rise will remain below 1 metre. A rise of 1m or more would displace millions of people and cause substantial economic hardship.

Under the more damaging of our potential scenarios, many Antarctic ice shelves will likely be lost and the Antarctic ice sheet will contribute as much as 3m of sea level rise by 2300, with an irreversible commitment of 5-15m in the coming millennia.

While challenging, we can take action now to prevent Antarctica and the world from suffering out-ofcontrol climate consequences. Success will demonstrate the power of peaceful international collaboration and show that, when it comes to the crunch, we can use scientific evidence to take decisions that are in our longterm best interest.

From outsized dinosaurs to outrunning hot lava in Jurassic World: Fallen Kingdom

What happens when you combine genetically engineered discours engineered dinosaurs, greedy capitalists, and an erupting volcano? A lot of thrills, as experienced in the most recent dinosaur movie Jurassic World: Fallen Kingdom. It's a different tale to the Jurassic movies we've been used to: a little darker, and updated for a modern world.

Chris Pratt and Bryce Dallas Howard are back as Owen (the velociraptor-taming rogue) and a wiser Claire, alongside faces from the original Jurassic Park movie in Dr Henry Wu (B.D. Wong) and Dr Ian Malcolm (Jeff Goldblum).

But bringing back dinosaurs from the dead and then genetically engineering them necessarily in-volves a serve of scientific magic. In this review, we dive into the scientific concepts behind some of the scenes to check whether they are dinosaur dung or movie magic.

Be warned: some modest spoilers lie ahead!

TESTING T-REX'S TALLNESS

Monster and dinosaur movies are notorious for getting the size of (real) creatures wrong, having inconsistent sizes through-

out the movie, or even defying the laws of mass conservation.

So how does the T-Rex portrayal in Jurassic World: Fallen Kingdom stack up? Well, the largest T-Rex skeleton found to date is named "Sue" (although we don't know if it was a male or female dinosaur).
Sue measures 3.66 me-

tres tall at the hips.

imates vary but is around 1.88 metres tall (he's a bit closer to the camera than Rexy but let's assume

they're the same distance for simplicity).

T-rex hip height = screen height ratio × Chris Pratt Height

(10.55cm / 4.88cm) × 1.88m

4.06m

So that's about 10% oversized. Factoring in the likelihood of there being T-Rexes larger than Sue (we have only found a small number of T-Rex skeletons, so it's unlikely we've found the largest ones), and the extra skin and muscle, this looks like the film-makers have got the size spot on

Verdict: Rexy is right.

The giant prehistoric aquatic lizard Mosasaurus is also back, mixing it up with surfers this time. Mosasaurus length = screen length ratio × hu-

= 28.08cm / 2.36cm × 1.8m

= 21 4m

The largest species of Mosasaurus reached lengths of 17m: so this is pushing the limits a bit more, at 25% oversized, but acceptable I think for

storytelling purposes. I guess prehistoric creatures were sufficiently huge and crazy that even Hollywood didn't feel the need to make them "larger

PTERANODON PORTAGE?

In one scene, a Pteranodon flies in, picks up a fully armed man, and flies off fairly effortlessly.

Now, we don't have them around anymore, but we do have large birds of flight such as the bald ea-gle. The best estimates and observations of a bald

eagle put its lifting power at around one-third to one-half of its body weight.

Pteranodon weight is apparently very difficult to estimate, with a range of 25-50kg: making it unlikely they could lift a 90kg male.

But the largest pterosaurs (bigger than in this movie scene) may have weighed as much as 180-250kg - making it plausible that they could, in full flight, pick up and carry an adult man.

Verdict: Struggling to fly. MOSASAURUS MANEUVERS?

Mosasaurus jumps well out the water as well in this memorable scene. This might seem an incred-ible feat, but modern humpback whales are only a little bit smaller and can get much of their body out

Verdict: Plausib

CRACKING CHAINS

When the T-Rex wakes up, it snaps a chain connector rather effortlessly. Now the Rex is a massive (around 8 tonnes), powerful creature, but is this realistic, assuming the connector isn't faulty?

It looks like the connector is held in place by

a threaded screw - in which case we can examine the "thread stripping strength" of screws at which point the thread shears off and the connector fails.

Using a thread length of 50mm (estimate), an M8 bolt, and steel with a shear strength of 270MPa, we can calculate the required shear force using this calculator

We get a force of 144.82kN - or a static force equivalent to holding up a weight of 14.77 tonnes

Now this weight is heavier than the T-Rex, but the T-Rex isn't just hanging off the chain. It can exert a dynamic load which is a multiple of its weight: so it shearing the bolt and breaking the connector is quite possible.

Verdict: Off the chain action but

plausible.

LAUGHING OFF LAVA

There's a volcano at the core of the plot in the movie, and the main characters are regularly weaving their way in and out of lava flows while dodging dinosaurs. They're often almost touching the lava, seemingly without any adverse consequences.

Calculating whether this is realistic is difficult: it depends on the size of the lava flow (which varies a lot in the movie), how close the person is, their clothing type, air flow, the angle of exposure, and a range of other factors.

But we can get a back of the enve-

lope idea by looking at what people have done in real life, as shown here and here.

Given that the characters are spending extended periods of time seemingly only a few centimetres from the exposed molten lava, it seems unlikely they would have emerged unscathed like they do in the movie.

Verdict: No lava burn is a little bogus THE FINAL VERDICT

Jurassic World: Fallen Kingdom is nothing if not entertaining, and a spectacle to be viewed on the big screen. Some of the character development is a little frustrating and the plot has its usual share of holes, but if you sit back and enjoy the ride it's a great blockbuster to take in this holidays. There are new dinosaurs to marvel at, and one or two plot twists that you might not see coming.

On the general science front, I was pleasantly surprised – the dinosaur sizes were often about right, as was the physics of the dinosaurs' interaction with their environments (as best we can determine using modern science and animals).



India need to play top-10 teams in Asia before Asian Cup: Chhetri

New Delhi, Jun 14 (PTI): Talismanic national football team captain Sunil Chhetri feels India should play against top-10 ranked sides of the continent in the next few months if the coundesires to do well in next year's Asian Cup.

Chhetri said it would be difficult to play against the top-five countries -- Australia, Iran, Korea, Japan and Saudi Arabia --which are playing in the World Cup starting tomorrow in Russia but they can for other teams which are above India.

"I definitely feel so (play against top-10 ranked teams in Asia). It will be difficult to play against the top five as they are playing in the World Cup. But we need to play against teams better than us and that also away matches," Chhetri

told PTI in an interaction.

"At home we are doing better but in away matches, if I may say so, our record is poor," said Chhetri, who is a brand ambassador of online fantasy sports platform StarPick which yesterday announced the launch of the football World Cup 2018 platform offering prizes worth

Before Dhawan, the previous record for best score for India in the first session was held by Virender Sehwag, who had scored 99 runs in St Lucia against West Indies in 2006

It was Dhawan's 7th Test century in 30 matches. India are playing the historic match without the services of skipper Virat Kohli.

day of the one-off Test.

Dhawan bludgeoned the rookie Afghan bowlers into submission with a pow-er-packed 96-ball-107 while Murali Vijay grinded the opposition with a solid un-beaten 94 off 128 as the duo set the platform for a mammoth first innings total with a stand of 168 in only 28.4

Incidentally Dhawan be-came the first ever Indian batsman to score a century in the first session of a Test match joining the illustrious ranks of Sir Don Bradman. Victor Trumper, Majid Khan, David Warner.

The third specialist openin the side KL Rahul (33 off 48 balls) played some attractive strokes before the stoppage of play.

Afghanistan coach Phil Simmons' statement about not knowing what it's all about till you get there seemed prophetic as the talented bunch of cricketers got their introductory lessons in red ball cricket from two openers, who have played 85 Test matches between

four sixes hit in 45 odd overs was a testimony that there is a long road that Afghanistan need to travel.

The hapless bowlers

struggled with the Test match length', especially spinners who are used to ball flat and quick.

The moment Rashid or Mujeeb (0/46 in 7 overs) tried to flight, Dhawan would step out, if they upped the pace of the deliveries, they were cut forcefully.

The UN agency noted that around the world, momentum for family-friendly policies was growing. It cited the example of India, where officials are proposing a Paternity Benefit Bill for consideration in the next session of Parliament which would allow fathers up to three months of paid pater-

nity leave. Noting that much work remains to be done, UNICEF said in eight countries across the world, including the United States which is home to nearly four million infants, there was no paid maternity or paternity leave policy.

Other countries with high infant populations, including Brazil and Congo, all have national paid paternity leave pol-

icies, although offering relatively short-term entitlements.

"Positive and meaningful interaction with mothers and fathers from the very beginning helps shape children's brain growth and development for life, making them healthier and happier, and increasing their ability to learn. It's all of our responsibility to enable them to fill this role," UNICEF Executive Director Henrietta Fore said.

Evidence suggests that when fathers bond with their babies from the beginning of life, they are more likely to play a more active role in the child's development.

The research also suggests that when children positively interact with their fathers,

they have better psychological health, self-esteem and life-satisfaction in term, UNICEF said. in the long-

UNICEF urged govern-ents to implement national family-friendly policies that support early childhood development, including paid pater-nity leave, to help provide parents with the time, resources and information they need to care for their children.

Earlier this year, UNICEF modernised its approach to parental leave provisions, with up to 16 weeks of paid leave for paternity across all of its offices worldwide the first United Nations agency to extend such leave beyond the standard four weeks. "We cannot be 'For Every

Child', if we are not also 'For

of governments and more of employers if we're go-ing to give fathers and mothers the time and resources they need to nurture their children, particularly during the earliest vears of a child's life." Fore said.

The new analysis forms part of UNICEF's 'Super Dads' campaign, now in its second year, which aims to break down barriers preventing fathers from playing an active role in their young children's development.

The campaign celebrates Father's Day recognised in more than 80 countries in June and focuses on the importance of love, play, protection and good nutrition for the healthy development of young children's brains.



Pak rejects Indian opposition to 'AJK Constitution'

ISLAMABAD, JUN 14 (PTI): Pakistan today rejected India's protest against its move to alter the status of territories occupied by Islamabad in Kashmir, saying New Delhi's claim over the region has no legal basis.

India this week had lodged strong protest with Pakistan over the Azad Jammu and Kashmir Interim Constitution (13th Amendment) Act, 2018, which abolished occupied Kashmir's Councils's administrative and financial powers, re-ducing it to an advisory

body.

The Foreign Office (FO) said in a statement that Pakistan categorically rejects India's pro-test and its "fallacious and baseless claim" over Kashmir as an integral part of India.

The Indian claim has no legal basis and contin-ues to be contradicted by the situation on ground since the last seven de-cades .The entire state of Jammu & Kashmir is a 'disputed' territory, it said.

The FO said that the disputed status of Kashmir was enshrined in the relevant United Nations Security Council resolutions, which stipulated that the final status of Jammu and Kashmir will be determined through the democratic method of a transparent, free and fair plebiscite under the auspices of the United Nations to ascertain the wishes of the Kashmiris.

These resolutions, pledging the right to self-determination to the people of Kashmir, are accepted by India, Pakistan and the international community, it said.

"Instead of making frivolous protests and issuing legally untenable and uncalled for statements, India should take steps to...fulfil its international obligations and expedite resolution of the Jammu and Kashmir dispute in line with the UN Security Council Res-olutions," said the FO.

Donald Trump has been nominated for the Nobel Peace Prize by two Norwegian politicians after his historic meeting with Kim Jong Un. Christian Tybring-Gjedde, an MP, and former justice minister Per-Willy Amundsen said Mr Trump "had taken a huge and important step in the direction of the disarmament, peace and reconciliation between North and South Korea". Both men are politicians with the anti-establishment Progress Party. A group of US Republican politicians nominated Mr Trump for the prize in May. The process of considering can didates for the honour is carried out in Norway, and nominations must be sent to the Nobel committee before February. Mr Trump's recent backing from Norwegian and US politicians therefore serve as nominations for the 2019 prize. Each year the winner is announced on the Friday of the first full week of October.

North Korea's Kim knows denuclearisation must be 'quick': Pompeo

SEOUL, JUN 14 (AFP): Kim Jong Un understands that denuclearisation must hap-pen "quickly", US Secretary of State Mike Pompeo said today, warning there will be no sanctions relief for Pyongyang until the process is complete.

Washington remained committed to the "complete, verifiable and irreversible" de-nuclearisation of North Korea, Pompeo added, after the historic US-North Korea summit in Singapore drew criticism for its vague wording on plans for Pyongyang to give up its nuclear weapons.
"We believe that Kim Jong Un under

stands the urgency... that we must do this quickly," he said of the effort to have North Korea abandon its nuclear weapons.

Washington's top diplomat was in Seoul to brief his South Korean and Japanese coun-terparts after President Donald Trump's post-summit comments sparked confusion and concern in Tokyo and Seoul.

But Pompeo insisted at a joint press

conference with the two countries' foreign ministers that there was no daylight among the allies on how to achieve the denuclearisation of North Korea.

Contrasting the Trump policy with pre-vious US administrations, Pompeo said: "In the past, they were providing economic and financial relief before... complete denuclearisation had taken place."

"That is not going to happen, President Trump made that clear." Pompeo's com-ments came after North Korean state media reported Wednesday that Trump had not only offered to stop military exercises during dialogue, but also lift sanctions im-

posed on Pyongyang.

Trump said after his meeting with Kim -- the first between sitting US and North Korean leaders -- that Washington would halt its joint military exercises with South Korea, an announcement that caught Seoul -- and

apparently the Pentagon -- by surprise.

The US and South Korea conduct several large drills every year to maintain readiness



for operations on the peninsula, a source of irritation for Pyongyang, which considers them preparations for an invasion.

Kang Kyung-wha, the South Korean foreign minister appeared to sidestep the issue at the joint press conference, saying the matter would be left to military authorities to discuss, and that the US-South Korea alliance remained "as robust as ever".

Earlier, South Korean President Moon Jae-in acknowledged that "there may be very conflicting views" about the summit, but it had still helped mitigate fears of a nu-

So in this way I believe it was very successful." While it is not directly involved. Iapan also considers the drills vital.

The "deterrence based on them (plays) an essential role for security in northeast Asia", Japanese Foreign Minister Taro Kono said after the "frank" trilateral talks today.

"The US will advance the discussion on provision of security guarantees while carefully monitoring whether North Korea takes concrete steps to fulfil its commitment to denuclearisation," Kono added.

"No security guarantees have been given yet." Pompeo said the suspension of the drills depended on productive negotiations in "good faith".

Trump had raised eyebrows on Tuesday by describing his own country's drills on the Korean peninsula as "provocative", a term

used by the North for the exercises

Pyongyang describes its nuclear weap-ons and long-range missiles as a shield against US aggression, and has in the past linked denuclearisation to the removal of US forces from the peninsula.

After his meetings in Seoul, Pompeo left for Beijing, where he was expected to meet Chinese President Xi Jinping and Foreign Minister Wang Yi.

Despite some concerns among allies and analysts, the Trump administration continues to tout the summit as a success, and Pompeo said earlier that he hopes to see "major disarmament" of North Korea by

A bullish Trump declared the nuclear threat from North Korea no longer exists, and tweeted Wednesday that people "can now feel much safer than the day I took office" and can "sleep well tonight!"

The US leader also defended his decion on the military drills with South Korea: "We save a fortune by not doing war games as long as we are negotiating in good faith
-- which both sides are!" The president's latest comments are in stark contrast to his threats to unleash "fire and fury" last year in response to Pyongyang's nuclear and longrange missile tests

The North retaliated by boasting it could annihilate the US.

After months of tensions which saw Trump and Kim trade personal insults, whirlwind diplomatic efforts were launched earlier this year, catalysed by the Winter Olympics in South Korea.

The remarkable de-escalation saw Kim reach out to Trump, conduct a historic summit with South Korean President Moon Jae-in, and visit Xi in Beijing -- his first trip

abroad as leader of the North.

The reclusive regime in Pyongyang has long craved international legitimacy, and has played up the summit as a major victory for Kim, with state media calling it the "meeting of the century".
