A press release informs that Ms Niraula's name has been approved in a meeting of the Dr Shova Kanti Thegim [Lepcha] Memorial Trust held on 08 Jun in Gangtok as recommended by the Selection Committee of the Trust

It may be mentioned here, Dr Shova Kanti Thegim Smriti Purashkar is presented annually on 04 Jul on the birth anniversary of Late Dr Thegim and carries a cash award, a Tamra Patra and a certificate.

During the Trust's meet on 08 Jun, resolution to enhance the existing cash award of Rs 20,002 to Rs 25,001 from this year was also passed unanimously by the House.

1st batch of Kailash Manasarovar Yatra flagged off, around 1500 pilgrims this year

NEW DELHI, JUNE 11 (PTI): The first batch of Kailash Manasarovar Yatra-2018 was today flagged off here by Union minister of state for External Affairs VK Singh, who hoped the pilgrimage passing through difficult terrain of the Himalayas concludes smoothly.

Singh also counselled pilgrims to remain physically fit and establish communion with nature to come out rewarded from the Yatra.

The first batch comprising 60 pilgrims will reach Kailash Manasarovar via Lipulekh. There are two routes for Yatra-through Lipulekh pass (Uttarakhand) and through Nathu La pass(Sikkim).

"This year 3,734 applications were received. After draw of lots, around 1500 were selected for the Yatra," the minister said.

Pilgrims will reach Kailash Manasarovar via Lipulekh in eighteen RPT eighteen batches of 60 pilgrims each. Ten batches of 50 pilgrims each will reach there via Nathu La, he said.

The duration of the Yatra via Lipulekh is 24 days for each batch including three days in Delhi for preparatory work. This route passes through important sites like Narayan Ashram and Patal Bhuvaneshwar among others

The route through Nathu La pass is motorable and suitable for senior citizens unable to undertake arduous trekking. From Gangtok the route passes through scenic places like Hangu lake, and through the vast landscape of the Tibetan plateau. Duration of this route is 21 days including three days in Delhi turn to pg02

PAPERS today regarding allegations that the Sherpa community was betrayed again over the land transfer rule. I had given clarifications in the Assembly on this and I repeat it again. Land Revenue Order No 1 says that land of BL communities cannot be sold to others. It is an Old Law of Sikkim and protected by the Constitution. The Sherpas were not included in BL list when Revenue Or-der No. 1 was promulgated. Given that reality, the State Government can make new laws stating that Sherpa land can be sold and purchased only within Sherpa community but cannot include it in Revenue Order No. 1. I am only following the written order," said Chief Minister Pawan Cham-ling while addressing the public of Upper Burtuk constituency today.

Further countering allegations thrown at Sikkim Democratic Front of dividing the Sikkimese society in the name of caste and community, Mr Chamling said that the opposition, in an attempt to bring a bad name to

his party and the State Government, has still failed to come up with a solution to unite the "divided" society. "The State BJP has

"The State BJP has also made such allegations. Their Central party is running the Union Government. Why can't their government at the Centre give tribal status to the 11 left-out communities of Sikkim? This will solve many issues of the State," he added.

Ms Niraula became a regular child artist of AIR Kurseong at the tender age of 06-07 years with age of 06-07 years with her landing platform be-ing the Radio's children's programme, "Baal Mela". She was also crowned Miss Kurseong in a beauty contest conducted by AIR Kurseong for girls upto the age of 15 years in the 60s.

Having pursued her higher education from Loreto College in Dar-jeeling and B.Ed. from Ramkrishna College, Darjeeling, Ms Niraula has also rendered ser-vices in Tashi Namgyal Higher Secondary School and later in Law Depart-ment, Government of Sikkim as translator. She resigned from the State Government and joined AIR Gangtok in 1989 as a newsreader under regular establishment where

she served till her super annuation in Aug 2017.

Over her assigned duties in AIR, her assistance was sought for by different organizers of literary. cultural and musical pro-grammes for hosting the shows. One of her memorable roles include her anchor role in musical show, "Geet ani Geetangay", hosted by Cultural, Arts & Dramatist Organisation of Sikkim [CADOS] Gangtok from the 90s.

She also produced a 55-minute documentary film on PM 20 Point Programme in 1986 thus becoming the first woman documentary film pro-ducer in Sikkim.

m he}$ summer break for government schools is round the corner. Since this is also when the skies will open up in earnest, most of the students will be stuck indoors even when they step out (yes, that happens too). When the weather grows inclement, net connectivity drops as well and in that situation, the smartphones are not very smart either. Boredom then becomes a real condition. Also, the fact that Sikkim has an addiction problem is no secret. The daily march of "drug" hauls and arrests under the Sikkim Anti-Drugs Act make that more than amply clear. For those who don't waste their time with newspapers, a visit to any of the schools in the State, and an honest conversation with the heads of the institutions will bring home the reality of how desperate the situation with alcohol and contraband substances has become here. Agreed there are earnest interventions like the SAATHI (Sikkim Against Addiction Towards Healthy India) programme underway and the clutch of people working with detoxification and rehabilitation now qualify for a medal for the service they are rendering the State. The problem, however, is neither showing any signs of abating, nor is the State anywhere close to figuring out a proper rehabilitation model under which sobriety, in the very least, is reciprocated with proper assimilation back into society.

Speak to students involved in outreach programmes

and those who have counseled friends and peers away from addiction, and it becomes clear that ennui is among the leading causes of addiction. The amount of boredom we put our young through is criminal. They rarely go to exciting schools, only occasionally have inspiring classes and are rarely offered challenging tasks. Yes, problems at home, peer pressure and ease of access are also factors, but these play supporting roles in the drama of substance abuse which has te-dious monotony as the main villain. And this boredom is not only distracting the young towards substances that make their "leisure" hours "fun", but is also making more of them disinterested and lacking in passion.
A worrying trend noticeable among the young is their increasing resistance to get excited about anything. This, in an age-group which was until recently accused of being easily excitable, is a big worry. And the only way to wean them away from the stupor of their times is to give them engagements which get them excited, which encourage them to share and feel proud about their progress. Yes, sports delivers on this account as well, but a more inclusive exercise would be giving them hobbies because that demands only passion and interest, is accessible to all, at all times. A group of passionate hobbyists held a mega event in Singtam at around this time last year to celebrate their collections with a wider audience. Students had turned up in large numbers, and one could sense awe in their eyes and excitement in their voices as they took in the wonder of what, let's accept it, are old fashioned hobbies, like philately and numismatics. The brought a similar exhibition to TNA in Gangtok recently to much the same

response from students. They were excited.

Now, let's look around – what are the hobbies of the new generation?

Returning to the problem of addiction and the rehabilitation of those who have gone clean, a common refrain from all of them was that the challenge of staying clean and helping their peers stay clean say them through the most difficult earlier days and made completion of their rehab courses possible. Things fall apart for them the moment they return to the "normal" settings of their everyday lives without the armour of whatever drug or addiction it is that reinforced them earlier. Their self-confidence wobbles and they find themselves somehow inadequate. Yes, giving them skills will help them, but giving them a hobby they are passionate about and keep growing in will give them confidence, provide them the self-esteem boost they need to assimilate back into society. Ditto for schools Give the young real hobbies, photography for instance or real training in painting or pottery and even carpentry, support them, see them use their time better, and then watch a generation stay away from drugs. Yes, it could be as simple as that...

U.S. President Donald Trump is a serial liar who appears to exult, if not take pride, in every petty deceit, particularly if it casts him into the glare of publicity.

With Trump preparing to meet with North Korea's Kim Jong Un in Singapore in a highly anticipated summit this week, it's worth a reminder: Not unlike Kim, Trump lies to hide the brutally of his cruel policies. He lies to discredit reliable sources of information and to discredit those public institutions that educate a public to create informed citizens who are able to distinguish between the truth and falsehoods.

He will lie about the summit. He can't help himself.

The Washington Post reports that in his first 466 days in office, Trump has made more than "3,001 false or misleading statements," "about nine claims a day." averaging

Trump has lied, along with a tsunami of oth-er fabrications, about former president Barack Obama's place, he's made false claims about why he did not win the popular vote, he's stated he knew nothing about payments prior to his elec-

tion to the porn star Stormy Daniels, and he's wrongly declared that the U.S. is the highest taxed nation in the world.

Most recently, the New York Times reported that Trump's lawyers have admitted that the president drafted a misleading statement about a meeting his son had with a lawyer associed with the Kremlin in Trump Tower, though for months he denied it.

He has falsely claimed 72 times that he passed the biggest tax cut in history; incorrectly states that he has eliminated Obamacare; and fallaciously argues that the Democrats were responsible for eliminating DACA (the Deferred Action for Child arrivals that he terminated).

THE TRUTH IS DANGÉROUS

In Trump's Orwellian world, the truth is dangerous, thinking is a liability, and the sanctity of free speech is treated with disdain, if not the threat of censorship.

Trump uses an endless stream of tweets in which the truth is distorted for ideological, political or commercial reasons. Under the Trump administration, lying and the spectacle of fakery have become an industry

and tool of power.

All administrations and governments lie at times, but under Trump, lying has become normalized, a calling card for corruption and lawlessness that provides the foundation for authoritarianism.

As in any dictatorship, the Trump regime dismisses words, concepts and news sources that address crucial social problems such as climate change, police violence and corporate malfeasance.

In Trump's dystopian world, words such as a "nation of immigrants," "transgender," "fetus," "diversity," "entitlement," "climate change," "democratic," "peaceful," "just" and "vulnerable" disappear into a "memovabalo". Indoor the Trump regime language. ry hole." Under the Trump regime, lan-guage has become a political tool and operates in the service of violence, unchecked power and lawlessness.

For Trump, lying has become a toxic policy for legitimizing ignorance and civic illiteracy. Not only does he

relish lying repeatedly, he has also

attacked the critical media, claimed journalists are enemies of the Ameri-

can people and argued that the media

is the opposition party. His rallying cry, "fake news," is used to dismiss any critic or criticism of his policies,

however misleading, wrong or dan-

REMINISCENT OF BOOK-BURNING

Trump's politics of erasure is more than a page out of the dystopian novels of George Orwell or Ray Bradbury, it is also echoes an earlier historical period when censorship and book burning was the currency of fascist regimes. As American historian Karen J. Greenberg warns, the suppression of language opens the doorway to fascism.

The president's fabricating Twit-ter machine is about more than lying, it is also about using all of the tools and resources to create a dystopia in

which authoritarianism emerges through the raw power of ignorance, control and police-state repression. Of

course, Trump does not lie in isolation. He is encouraged by a right-wing di-simagination machine that Amer-

ican sociologist
Todd Gitlin rightly calls "an interlocking ecology of falsification that has driven the country around the bend" and into the abyss of authoritarianism.

Trump's endless fabrications echo the propaganda machines made famous in the fascist regimes of the 1930s. He values loyalty over integri-ty, and he lies in part to test the loyal-ty of those who both follow him and align themselves with his power.

Trump's lying must be under-

stood within a broader attack on the fundamentals of education and democracy itself. This is especially important at a time when the U.S. is no longer a functioning democracy and is in the presence of what sociologists Leonidas Donskis and the late Zygmunt Bauman referred to as a form "of modern barbarity."

'CIVIC ILLITERACY'

Trump's lying undermines the public's grip on language, evidence, facts and informed judgement, and in doing so promotes a form of civic illiteracy in which words and meaning no longer matter. Depriving the public of the capacity for critical analysis and discerning the truth from lies does more than empty politics of any meaning, it also undermines democracy.

As ethics wither, people become risoners of their own experiences, indifferent to an ignorance and brutish-

ness in which they become complicit.

As the theatre of lies, insults, and childish petulance triumphs over measured arguments, a world emerg-es in which the only real choices are among competing fictions — a world in which nothing is true and everything begins to look like a lie.

If the spirit and promise of a sustainable democracy is to survive, it's crucial to make truth-telling virtuous again. If we are going to fight for and with the powerless, we have to understand their needs, speak to and with them in a language that is mutu-ally understandable as well as honest.

There is also a need to reinvent politics through alternative narra-tives in which the American public can both identify themselves and the conditions through which power and oppression bear down on their lives.

This is not an easy task, but nothing less than justice, democracy and the planet itself are at risk.

Authoritarianism creates a predatory class of unethical zombies who produce dead zones of the imagination that even Orwell could not have envisioned, while using an un-checked language of lying to wage a fierce fight against the possibilities of

a democratic future.

The time has come for progressives and others to develop a political language in which civic values, social responsibility and the institutions that support them become central to invigorating and fortifying a new era of civic imagination.

There must be a renewed sense of social agency, and an impassioned international social movement with a vision, organization and set of strate-gies to challenge the dystopian night-mare engulfing the United States, and a growing number of illiberal democracies all over the globe.

Pablo Neruda, the great Chilean poet, wrote after Franco destroyed the Spanish Republic: "I swear to defend until my death what has been mur-

dered in Spain: The right to happiness."
This tribute to justice, the public imagination, dignity and the right to be free from the curse of those who use their power to lie and malign the crucial institutions of democracy must once again be defended in the spirit of urgency and the "right to happiness" not to mention the right to truth.

The world's economic crisis-fighting mechanisms are dangerously inadequate

It was only in January that the International Monetary Fund (IMF) was celebrating the strength of the global economy, her-alding "the broadest synchronised global growth upsurge since 2010".

How quickly things

The "global financial safety net" refers to the mishmash of global, regional and bilateral institu-tions and mechanisms designed to help countries facing economic and financial crises and to prevent

these problems from spreading.

The most well-known institution is the IMF, which has around US\$1 trillion in crisis-fighting resources. The World Bank, with around US\$263 billion, has provided assistance in previous crises.

There is also a range of regional mechanisms, such as Asia's Chiang Mai Initiative Multilateralisation agreement (with US\$240 billion) and the European Stability Mechanism (with US\$600 billion). Bilateral currency swap arrangements, under which one country's central bank can exchange its currency for that of another, are also an important

part of the safety net.

Make no mistake, the safety net is big. In total it has about US\$4.6 trillion in crisis-fighting firepower, seven times what it was in 1980. But this large number can be misleading and, as I argue in a recent working paper at Brookings, is both inadequate and

Curfew extended in Shillong for a few more days: Top official

SHILLONG, JUNE 11 (PTI): The Meghalaya government today decid-ed to extend night curfew in the violence-hit Meghalaya capital by "a few more days" and prom-ised to review its decision to suspend Internet services after 24 hours, a top district official said here today.

Curfew would be en-

forced from 6 pm today to 7 am tomorrow in the 14 "vulnerable" areas and 9 nm to 5 am in other parts of Shillong, he said.

"The government does not want to take chances. The home department today reviewed the situation in the state capital and decided to extend night curfew for a few more days," East Khasi Hills Denuty Commissioner P S Dkhar said.

The internet facilities would also remain sus-pended for at least another 24 hours, he said.

A home department official said security forces would continue to keep vigil on the city un-til the situation returns to normal.

At present, 15 com-panies of central armed police forces, six companies of state's special riot police and two battalions of the state police are de-ployed across the city to prevent any untoward situation, he added.

Shillong came in the grip of violence on May 31 following clashes be-tween the Khasis and the Sikhs in the city's Puniabi Lane area, also known as the Sweeper Colony.

Tension soon spread to other areas of the city, forcing the administration to impose curfew as a security measure.

Assam lynching: 19 arrests, search operation continues

GUWAHATI, IUN (PTI): With three more arrests, the police have so far taken 19 persons in custody in connection with the lynching of two men in Assam's Karbi Anglong district, a police spokesman said today.

Additional Director General of Police (Law and Order) Mukesh Agarwala is monitoring the situation on the spot and also search operations by security forces, he said.

Besides the 19 in custody, 13 other persons have been arrested for posting hate messages and objectionable posts on social media in different districts of the state.



While two persons nave been arrested in Bishwanath Chariali. each have been arersted in Nagaon and Sonitpur districts, two in Darrang and one each in

Dibrugarh, Kamrup (Metro), Dibrugarh, he said.

The DGP had also appealed to the people not to get swayed by rumours on social media and immediately inform police if they come across such posts.

Lopetegui successfully blended emerging talent with the experience provided by veterans to qualify for an 11th straight World Cup.

Lopetegui was chosen as Vicente Del Bosque's successor in 2016 after winning trophies of his own with Spain - at the under-19 and under-21 editions of the European Championships.

Team India showed character and resilience: Constantine

Mumbai, Jun 11 (PTI): The Indian football team showed a lot of character and resilience in its title-winning Intercontinental Cup campaign and the attitude would be crucial to ensuring that the country doesn't just make up the numbers in next year's AFC Asian Cup, feels national coach Stephane Constantine.

"We know we have a huge task going to the Asian Cup. (We are) not going to make up the numbers, we believe that if we do the right things between now and then, we believe that we have a chance to qualify from the group and that will be our target," Constantine said after India beat Kenya 2-0 in the final last night.

The Asian Cup will be played

Lavishing praise on talis manic skipper Sunil Chhetri, who scored both of India's goals last night, and goalkeeper Gur-preet Singh Sandhu, Constantine said the two players hardly ever need to be told what the situation demands of them.

"Sunil and Gurpreet (Singh Sandhu) are two (members) of the squad, they will tell you



themselves, they can tell what they do. Sunil is unbelievably fit, looks after himself, completely professional on and off the pitch, and that is why he is able to maintain the level of fitness that

he has," Constantine explained.

Throwing some light on Chhetri's level of dedication, Constantine said the tournament's highest goal-scorer is dismissive of any suggestion of taking rest.

Chhetri achieved a mas-sive career milestone with last night's brace as he equalled Argentine superstar Lionel Messi's tally of international goals.

"It is not easy, but he is looking after himself and as long as he is able to do that, he is able to do the work. We need him in the

'I can't protect him from club football, but I didn't want to play him in the third game. But he starts mourning, so ok (I played him)," Constantine said.

Suarez promises he is a reformed character and will be better behaved in Russia than in Brazil, where he scored twice before being banned.

"It was my mistake," Suarez said. "So I have a debt to repay to my-self and Uruguay, to try to show a good image." Things were already starting to look brighter for two-time World Cup champion Uruguay, based on qualifying at least.

After enduring four consecutive World Cup playoffs and only reaching three of the tournaments Uruguay secured an automatic place in Russia by finishing second behind

Football referees watching slow motion videos flash more red cards: Study

LONDON, JUN 11 (PTI): Football referees penalise players more severely when watching the action in slow motion com pared to real time, according to a study.

This is the first time that the impact of slow motion video on decision making has been studied in sports referees and it is timely given the current debate on video

assistant refereeing (VAR), which will be used in the World Cup in Russia. Researchers from the University of Leuven in Belgium studied the response of 88 elite football referees to video clips of a

foul warranting a yellow card. They found no significant difference in the accuracy of a referee's decision about whether a foul had occurred or not, with slow-motion videos (63 per cent accurate) compared to the real-time videos (61 per cent accurate).

However, the judgement of intention or force behind a foul differed. More red cards were given by referees watching in slow motion compared to those watching

real time video playbacks.
"Our results suggest that slow motion can increase the severity of a judgement of intention, making the difference between perceiving an action as careless (no card), reckless (yellow card) or with excessive



force (red card)," said Jochim Spitz, a pro-

or at the University of Leuven.
"The finding that referees were more likely to make more severe decisions fol-

lowing slow motion replays, is an important consideration for developing guide-lines for the implementation of VAR in football leagues worldwide," Spitz said

The study, published in the journal Cognitive Research: Principles and Implications, concluded that although slow motion playback could be a useful tool

in assessing some decisions, such as offside and determining the exact impact of a contact, it may not be the best tool for decisions that involve judging human behaviour and intention.

"Slow motion video may make it clearer who initiated a foul, whether there actually was contact and whether a foul occurred either inside or outside the penalty

"However, judging human emotion, like intentionality is quite another story. It is also the reason why slow motion footage cannot be used anymore in the court room as it increases the perceived intent," he said.

To investigate the impact of viewing

speeds on decisions made by referees the researchers showed 88 elite football referees from five European countries 60 video clips of foul situations from football matches in real time or slow motion.

Two independent ex-international referees that are currently acting as refereeing experts determined the correct decisions as a point of reference and then the referees who took part in the study categorised the fouls as they would in a real match by awarding a yellow card, a red card or no card.

Modi, Xi agreed to cherish, implement Wuhan consensus: China

day presented an upbeat picture of the talks between Prime Minister Narendra Modi and President Xi Jinping at Qingdao, saying they agreed to "cherish" the "pos-itive momentum" generated by their Wuhan meeting and implement the "important consensus reached at the summit.

Modi and Xi on June 9 held talks on the sidelines of the Shanghai Cooperation Organisation (SCO) summit in the port city of Qingdao. The meeting covered key aspects of the bilateral engagement, reflecting the resolve by the two countries to reset relations and bring back trust in their ties, hit by the Dokalam standoff and several other thorny issues.

Foreign Ministry spokesman Geng Shuang during a media briefing here today said,



"The two leaders exchanged views on bilateral relations and issues of mutual interests. They also reached important consensus.

"Both leaders believe that their informal summit in Wuhan played a positive role in moving forward the bilateral cooperation," he said, responding a question on Modi-Xi

meeting on the sidelines of the just-concluded Qingdao summit of the SCO.

"They agreed that that the positive momentum should be cher-ished and they should implement the consensus reached in Wuhan." Geng said.

They agreed to implement the

communication and expanding people to people cooperation and move forward bilateral ties, he

The meeting was held in cordial atmosphere just like the Wu-han informal summit and it will surely contribute to the sound development of bilateral ties, he said.

The two sides also agreed to have high-level exchanges, formulate new trade goals and estab-lish high-level people to people exchanges led by the two foreign ministries, he said.

Geng highlighted India's decision to expedite approval procedures for the Bank of China's request to set up a branch in Mumbai and agreements on exporting India's rice to China and sharing of hydrological data by Beijing with New Delhi.

During the meeting, Xi and Modi agreed to hold the next infor-mal summit in India next year besides resolving to continue efforts to ensure peace and tranquillity along the border.

On the outcome of the SCO summit, Geng said it "breathed new life to the Shanghai sprit, which is mutual respect which is mutual benefit, equality consultation, respect for diverse civilisations and

pursuit of common development."

In the past 17 years the SCO has been growing. This is attributed in the final analysis to the fact that the Shanghai spirit transcended the outdated concepts of clash of civilisations, cold war the mind-set. SCO pursues no isolated and exclusive clubs," he said.

The summit has established new action plan. The Leaders signed and approved 17 docu-

ments, six cooperation documents more than any previous summits of the SCO, Geng said.

The summit also achieved concrete outcomes and made plans for promoting good neighbourliness and friendship, combating three evil forces of separatism, extremism and terrorism, he said.

"To implement this consensus is our priority task for the next phase. As founding member China regards SCO as a priority of its diplomacy. We will work with all member states to implement this consensus and make the SCO more efficient and more stronger and with brighter prospects," he said.

The SCO was founded at a summit in Shanghai in 2001 by the presidents of Russia, China, Kyrgyz Republic, Kazakhstan, Tajikistan and Uzbekistan. India and Pakistan became its members last year.

Trump accuses India of charging 100 per cent tariff on some *imports*

WASHINGTON, JUN (PTI): President Donald Trump has taken a swipe at India along with the world's other top economies and accused New Delhi of charging 100 per cent tariff on some of the US' goods, as he threat-ened to cut trade ties with countries who are robbing America.

Trump made the re

marks in Canada's Que-bec City where he was attending the G7 summit that ended in farce after he abruptly rejected the text of a consensus state ment and bitterly insult-

ed the host.

"We're like the piggybank that everybody is robbing," Trump said while addressing a press

conference on Saturday.

He also made a reference to India, indicating that his grievances on tariffs was not restricted to the developed econo-

mies alone.
"This isn't just G7. I mean, we have India, where some of the tar-iffs are 100 per cent. A hundred per cent. And we charge nothing. We can't do that. And so we are talking to many coun-

tries," Trump said.

Trump has repeated ly raked up the issue of India imposing high import duty on the iconic Harley-Davidson motorcycles and threatened to increase the import tariff on "thousands and thousands" of Indian motor cycles to the US.

"We're talking to all countries. And it's going to stop. Or we'll stop trading with them. And that's a very profitable answer, if we have to do it," Trump warned be-fore leaving Canada for Singapore where he is scheduled to hold a much publicised summit with North Korean Leader

Kim Jong Un tomorrow. His remarks came a a time when the India-US relationship has been on a positive trajectory for years. For example, bilateral trade expanded by USD 11 billion last year to more than USD 125 billion, a new record. Trump called for a tariff-free G-7. "That's the way it should be. No tariffs, no barriers. That's the way it should be," he said, "And no subsidies. I even said no tariffs," he said.



US offers 'unique' security guarantees to N Korea if it accepts complete denuclearisation

SINGAPORE, JUN 11 (PTI): The US today offered "unique" security guarantees to North Korea if it accepts a "complete, verifiable and irreversible" denuclearisation as the two sides made progress in their talks ahead of a much-publicised historic summit between President Donald Trump and Chairman Kim

On the eve of the summit at the Capella Hotel on Sentosa island, Trump hoped that a "nice" outcome could be reached from what he said would be a "very interesting meet-ing" with Kim tomorrow. Later, Secretary of State Mike Pompeo

said that the preparatory talks were "moving quite rapidly" and he expected them to reach what he called "a logical conclusion" even earlier than the US anticipated.

"A complete, verifiable, and irreversible de-nuclearisation of North Korea is the only outcome that the US will accept at the summit," Pompeo told reporters at a press conference.

He said the US is willing to offer North Korea "unique" security guarantees that are "fundamentally different from before" to achieve denuclearisation.

"We will take actions to provide them sufficient certainty that they can be comfortable that denuclearisation is not something

that ends badly for them," Pompeo said.

However, sanctions on North Korea will remain until that has been achieved, he said,

"President Trump believes that Kim has an unprecedented opportunity to change the trajectory of our relationship and bring peace and prosperity to his country,"

"The fact that our two leaders are sitting down face-to-face is a sign of the enormous potential to accomplish something that will immensely benefit both of our peoples and the entire world," he said.

He said previous American administrations have been duped by North Korea but the Trump Administration has got experts on non-proliferation and Weapons of Mass Destruction on the ground to verify Pyong-yang's willingness to denuclearise.

Pompeo said President Trump is fully

prepared for the meeting with Kim.

National Security Council spokesman Robert Palladino said President Trump in-



tends to meet one on one with Kim. "We can expect a one on one at the beginning," Palla-

The diplomats from the two sides are engaged in hectic parleys behind closed doors to narrow their differences.

Sung Kim, a former US amba Korea who has been leading the US in talks with North Korean Vice-Foreign Minister Choe Son Hui since last month, is said to be continuing the discussions with his counterpart.

The summit could lay the groundwork for ending a nuclear stand-off between the two countries and see Pyongyang dismantle its arsenal in return for economic help and security guarantees.

A peace treaty ending the 1950-53 Korean War may also be on the table. North and South Koreas remain technically at war as the conflict ended with an armistice, not a

'Wide-ranging and profound views on the issue of establishing new DPRK-US re-lations, the issue of building a permanent and durable peace-keeping mechanism on the Korean peninsula, the issue of realising denuclearisation of the Korean penin sula and other issues of mutual concern, as required by the changed era, will be exchanged at the DPRK-US summit talks," the state-run Korean Central News Agency

(KCNA) reported in English.

Both Trump and Kim separately met Singapore Prime Minister Lee Hsien Loong and thanked him for hosting the summit as if it was "their own family affair".

"If the summit produces positive out-

comes, then the Singaporean government's effort will be recorded in history forever,"

summit - the first between a sitting US president and the North Korean leader - will mark a turnaround of relations between Trump and Kim after a long-running exchange of furious threats and in-

The two leaders have had an extraordinary up-and-down relation-ship over the past 18 months. Trump had called Kim "Little

Rocket Man" and threatened to unleash "fire and fury like the world has never seen" on North Korea as it conducted several ballistic missile tests in defiance of internation

But last month, Trump abruptly can-celled the Singapore summit, citing the "tremendous anger and open hostility" by Pyongyang. However, he took a U-turn soon and said the White House was proceeding with the preparations for the summit.

Ahead of his much-anticipated meeting with Kim, the US president sounded optimistic and said the meeting would be a "onetime shot" at peace.

"I feel that Kim Jong Un wants to do

something great for his people. And he has that opportunity, and he won't have that opportunity again," Trump said.

Singapore will spend about 20 million dollars to host the historic summit between Trump and Kim, which is being covered by 3,000 journalists from across the

Singapore is one of the few countries that have diplomatic relations with both the US and North Korea. It has been used before for high-profile diplomatic occasions. In 2015, the leaders of China and Taiwan held historic talks in the city-state - their first in more than 60 years.

Nirav Modi flees to UK claiming political asylum: Report



London, Jun 11 (PTI): Modi, who is at the cen-tre of a money laundering case linked to over USD 2 billion Punjab National Bank fraud, has fled to the UK where the absconding diamantaire sought asylum claiming "political persecution" back home, according to a media report today.

Nirav Modi and his

uncle Mehul Choksi are being investigated by the Enforcement Directorate for allegedly cheating the PNB, the country's second largest lender, to the tune of more than USD 2 billion.

The duo and others are also being probed by other central agencies after the fraud came to light this year follow-ing a complaint by the PNB that they allegedly cheated the nationalised bank to the tune of over Rs 13,000 crore, with the purported involvement of a few employees of the

Both Nirav Modi and Choski are said to have left the country before criminal cases were

lodged against them.
"Officials in India and the UK say he (Nirav Modi) is in London. where his company has one store, and is trying to claim asylum from what he said was political per-secution," The Financial Times reported

"There are always a number of complicated cases that add a little tension and spice to our relationship with India. But there is also an appreciation from both sides that we have a legal pro-cess that has to be gone through and that we are of course governed by human rights legislation," a senior UK Foreign Office official was quoted as saying by the report.

When contacted by PTI, the Home Office said that "we are not commenting on individual

The CBI had in May filed two charge sheets in the case before a Mumbai court. The ED has also filed its charge sheet in the case involving Nirav Modi, who is in his late 40s, and his associates, officials in New Delhi said.
