NHM nurses request State Govt for regularization

CLARIFY THAT NO NHM NURSES **TOOK PART IN DEMONSTRATION** OUTSIDE **MINTOKGANG**

 $\mathbf{F}^{\mathrm{orty} ext{-}\mathrm{four}}$ staff nurses who have been working under the National Health Mission in different government hospitals and health centres of the State for more than five years now have requested the State Government to recruit them as reg-ular government employees.

While a group of nurses had

demonstrated outside the Chief Minister's official residence, Mintokgang, on Friday demanding that they be recruited as regular government employees, the group of 44 nurses today addressed a press conference stating that they were not part of the demonstration.

Both the groups have de-manded that they be recruited along with 261 candidates who been recently appointed as staff nurses after written examination and interview conducted by Sikkim Public Service Commission.

Addressing a press conference here today, the second group of nurses stated that it would be an injustice to senior

nurses if they are not absorbed in the department as they have been working under NHM for many years now. They mentioned that some nurses have been working for more than 12 years and many of them have crossed the age bar and are not eligible to appear in any inter-

views.

They mentioned that they have also submitted many memorandums to the concerned authorities regarding their regularization.

"During his recent 32-day State tour, the CM has also repeatedly assured to regularise us so we have full faith in him. In a recent meeting on 28 August, the Minister and Secretary of Health Department have also assured us verbally," they in-

On the same, they urged the government for immediate absorption of staff nurses working under NHM for more than 5 years in the department along with the recent 261 staff nurses appointed by the SPSC.

The nurses in the press con-

ference today said that no staff nurses working under NHM were present in the demonstration staged in front of Mintok-

gang.

They also congratulated the CM for being the longest serving CM of the country and for leading the State towards development and prosperity.

SC refuses to extend Sept 1 deadline on third party insurance cover for vehicles

NEW DELHI, AUG 31 (PTI): From tomorrow, it would become mandatory for new cars and two-wheel-ers to have third-party insurance cover of three and five years respectively, with the Supreme Court to

day refusing to extend the September 1 deadline. A bench of Justices Madan B Lokur and S Abdul Nazeer dismissed an application filed by General Insurance Council (GIC), constituted under provision of the Insurance Act 1938 by Insurance Regu-latory and Development Authority (IRDA), seeking extension of the deadline fixed by the top court.

The apex court had on July 20 this year said that third-party insurance cover for new cars should mandatorily be for a period of three years and for two wheelers, it should be for five years. Currently, the insurance cover period is one year.

Patel has sat on fast at his house on the outskirts of the city since August 25 to press the demand of quota for the Patidar (Patel) community and a loan waiver for Gujarat farmers. Narmada Bachao Andolan leader

However, workers of the Patidar Ananmat Andolan Samiti (or PAAS, which Hardik leads) did not allow her to meet him.

"Patkar has consistently been anti-Gujarat, especially as she protested against Narmada Dam which stopped farmers from accessing water for irrigation for several years. This is the



reason the PAAS youth opposed her visit," said PAAS convener and Hardik Patel's close aide Geeta Patel

Patkar later told media that she was not anti-farmer

"Even today people do not have proper understanding of the Narmada dam issue...we are raising voice in fa-vour of farmers. But those who do not know this...(are opposing me).

Thousands of Patidar farmers are fighting alongwith us because they have not got the full rehabilitation package,"

the environmental activist said.

"I do not think Hardik will oppose my visit, because I had talked to him

yesterday over phone and he had no problem meeting me," she said. The 25-year-old quota agitation leader had declared yesterday that he was not going to drink even water from now on, However, a religious leader today offered him a glass of water today, and Patel sipped some water.

A Support System for Quality Education

Help teachers make learning relevant and fun

 $\mathbf{E}^{ ext{ducation}}$ is reasonably universal now, so access to classrooms is no longer an issue. And this Wednesday is also Teacher's Day, which makes it even more apt to speak some about the profession which arguably has the deepest impact on our lives. More than the details of lessons learnt from textbooks, the memories that stay longer with most people are of the teachers who taught them. Every person invariably has a teacher who either inspired the entire class to chase their dreams or toed the other end of the spectrum and actively engaged in stifling imaginations, enforcing norms and dictating conduct. This Teacher's Day, let's go over what role teachers can play in preparing students for life.

The pressure of examinations and competition, and the tendency to prioritise rote over comprehension has handicapped the teaching fraternity into becoming problem solvers, handing out answers and solutions for students to mug-up instead of assisting students find their own answers and expressions, encouraging them to enquire more and develop faculties that question more often instead of accepting things as dished out. Several attempts have been made to correct this approach and at least in the Indian context, all efforts have failed thus far. Because students look up to teachers, it is important for teachers to offer themselves as role models, but it would be even better if teachers could introduce their wards to personalities worth emulating and inspiring students to excellence. Teachers should ideally motivate and inspire students towards learning, not hand-hold them through the syl-labus till the exams and then pick up another batch to repeat the same.

If one agrees that these are the qualities one seeks in teachers, the obvious question that follows is, can one be trained for such a role? And do the existing models of 'training' focus enough on these aspects of teaching? Only trained teachers will be able to answer these questions, but fact remains that these should not even be issues that distract from more important policy interventions. Teachers, ever since modern education was introduced, were required to be qualified. For how long have B. Ed. courses, for example, been offered? For a very, very long time. And yet, it is only now that precious resources and attention is being invested in getting even already appointed teachers with impressive on-job experience to acquire these degrees. If the teacher appointment process had not been blatantly usurped by enthusiastic proponents of nepotism, India and Sikkim would have been deliberating weightier issues of education by now. Appointment of deserving and qualified teachers should always have been a given, and then one could engage in more meaningful discussions on how to retain the better teachers, appoint better facilities in schools and update syllabus and teaching methods.

Sikkim's pursuit of quality education is welcome, but for it to get anywhere, the ennui that HRD Department has become will have to be shaken off first. Ironically, this is the one aspect that remains missing from all discussions on the delivery of quality education. The ideal teachers and the perfect students, will after all, need the support of at least a reasonably functional Human Resource Development Department which is as motivated to appoint better facilities in schools [by way of libraries, laboratories and even basics like electricity, toilets and running water] as it is excited by the opportunity to conduct trainings, order books or organize workshops. Sikkim is lucky to have a substantially big pool of new teachers who are motivated and genuinely interested in making a difference in the lives of students under their care. It is important that the school management committees and local communities support them in efforts to make classrooms more vibrant and learning more fun and relevant. It is important for people to find ways to get more involved with their neighbourhood schools (to begin with) even if their wards are not enrolled there and offer assistance and support to these institutions to be able to deliver quality education.

Honouring Annan, McCain and others: why eulogies have blind spots

As an old adage says: "beauty is Ain the eye of the beholder". So it should not come as a surprise that prominent people are sometimes re-membered selectively when they are

Perspectives have blind spots We often appreciate or dislike others because of how we relate to them through our spectacles, coloured by the values we treasure. There is a wide zone between fact and fiction. The truth is that the interpretation of others' legacies often reveals a great deal about us and our values. And is often less about the complexity of the lives of those with whom we engage.

I have experienced such a balancing act in my engagements with Dag Hammarskjöld, the second Secretary-General of the United Nations, before he met his untimely death in a plane crash at Ndola, in then Northern Rhodesia (today Zambia), in

As the world's highest international civil servant, Hammarskjöld provoked divided opinions. Some saw him as a tool of Western imperialism for the assassination of the Congolese leader Patrice Lumumba; others praised him as being close to

Kofi Annan, the UN secretary general who recently passed away, said that Hammarskjöld was his role model. The obituaries that followed Annan's death led me to reflect on the two men, the legacies they left, and how imperfectly high profile people are remembered after they're gone

Politicians and diplomats are a special breed. We owe it to them and to us, to find an adequate way of engaging with their legacies in a format that avoids the superficial praise song and highlights the contradic-tions when entering the power games of policy.

KOFI ANNAN

There wasn't much of a balancing act when it came to remembering Annan. Many eulogies had few critical undertones for "a man who cared for humanity".

Some managed to address his complicated legacy while others were courageous enough to emphasise his shortcomings as Secretary-General, including his refusal "to acknowledge any meaningful sense of personal or institutional responsibility" for some

But these remained the odd ones out. Others were quick to list his mer-its, which outweighed the shortcom-

Many obituaries conceded the impact of his influence on the global stage. But acknowledgements missed mentioning at least two other Africans, who during Annan's terms played an important role in the agenda-setting he is praised for Lakhdar Brahimi was crucial in promoting more effective peacekeeping operations; Francis Deng made major con-tributions towards the UN's "Respon-

sibility to Protect" agenda. Like others – think of former US-President Jimmy Carter's track record as human rights advocate and his modest lifestyle – Annan's merits lie more in his time after office. Most prominently in his role as one of the Elders.

He was a noteworthy mediator, most spectacularly in Kenya. Commendable is also his recent commitment towards a solution for the plight of the Rohingya in Myanmar.

What might explain the overtly ositive eulogies to Annan is that there were moments of human dignity and decency, in which the op-portunity was seized to set a morally acceptable example. This seems to have also been the case when it comes to John McCain, American

JOHN MCCAIN

McCain was widely celebrated in the established media as war hero and maverick. He was also deemed an American hero, whose "principles ınd belief in bi-partisanship" made him unique.

But moments of personal integrity were at times deeply ambiguous. His defending Barack Obama as "a decent man" and "family father", was far from dismissing racism. It only exon-erated his contender and should not make up for McCain being willing to compromise his declared principles in his bid for presidential power.

The conservative values praised as a sign of integrity, elevating him into "a class of his own" should not distract from McCain's role as a war monger who did not care for human

WEIGH RIGHT AND WRONG

All too often – and Annan has been a particularly prominent example - those praising a person highlight their own involvement. They cannot resist focusing on the impact the person had on them or when and where the person left a lasting impression through a personal encounter. Often, such eulogies reproduce a photo of the praised person, shown together with the one who applauds her or his merits - almost as if these were their

This leaves me wondering what kind of memory will be paid to Obama. As the first black president of the US there were a number of things deserving positive recogni-tion, mainly in domestic policy. But they should not prevent a condemnation of his massive failures. But then, in the shadow of Obama's through and through immoral successor in office, it already makes a difference to display some degree of ethics, moral

consciousness and decency.

Maybe this is also a valid explanation why so many failed in their tributes to Annan or McCain. It might be difficult to enter the necessary investigations of what is right and what is wrong in times when reactionary populism requires a desperate search for alternatives. But, it is in support of such alternatives that we shouldn't shy away from the challenge.

We have eyes on the front of our heads so we can see where we are going, but birds' eyes are on the side so how do they see where they're going? – Thomas and Luke, age six, Sussex, UK

Dear Thomas and Luke,

Thanks for your question. First of all, I should mention that not all birds have their eves on the sides of their heads. Pigeons and parrots do, but other birds, such as owls, have large eves placed close together at the front of their heads – a bit like ours.

Whether they have eyes at the front or on the sides of their heads, all birds can still see straight ahead. But that doesn't mean all birds see things in the same way. In fact, where a bird's eyes are on its head can tell us a lot about how it sees the world.

Having two eyes means animals can see a three di-mensional image of what's around them. So they can per-ceive the height, width and depth of an object, as well as how far away it is.

Where a bird's eyes are

on its head affects its field of vision – that's how much it can see in front and to the side at any one time. Think

about how far you can see to either side without turning vour head: these are the lim its of your own field of vision.

Because owls have eyes at the front of their heads, they have a smaller field of vision – around 150 degrees for a barn owl (though they can turn their heads very far to look around).

Parrots, pigeons and other birds with eyes on the sides of their heads have a much bigger field of vision, of about 300 degrees. Amazingly, this means that they can

see in front and a long way to the side, at the same time.

Where the eyes are placed decides how a bird views its surroundings using different types of vision. Binocular vision means both eyes focus on the same object at the same time, and eye movement is coordinated – this is the kind of vision that predatory birds such as owls rely on most.

Monocular vision mean

each eye is focused on a different object at any particu-lar moment, and this is normal for parrots and pigeons.

Having different kinds of vision helps different kinds of birds survive in the wild.

For parrots and pigeons, having eyes on the sides of their heads is a huge advantage. Having a wider field of vision with only a small blind spot behind them lets these birds see where they are go-ing, while also keeping an eye out for predators which might be trying to sneak up on them.

For predatory raptors such as barn owls, having forward-facing eyes helps

them to see depth and distance much more clearly, since both eyes can focus on the same object at the same time. This is perfect for spotting and catching small prey such as field mice.

So though it might seem like birds with eyes on the side of their heads can't see where they are going, they can see forward and sideways at the same time, and in fact can see much more than those with

eyes facing forwards.

Singphan wildlife sanctuary declared 30th elephant reserve of the country

New Delhi, Aug 31 (PTI): The Nagaland government has de-clared the Singphan Wildlife Sanctuary as an elephant reserve making it the 30th reserve for jumbos in the country.

An important reserve in North Eastern States, Singphan Elephant Reserve has huge tracts of forest, strategically located in contiguity with the Abhaypur Reserve Forest of Assam which is frequented by the moving herds of elephants, an official statement said.

"The Government of Nagaland has declared Singphan Wildlife Sanctuary as 'Singphan Elephant Reserve' with the approval of Government of India on 16th August 2018," it said.

Elephant distribution habitat in Nagaland is a continuous stretch starting from Peren district running all along the foothills north westerly until Tirap district of Arunachal Pradesh. "This stretch which is a tradi-

tional elephant bearing area got broken at various points as a result of which only few elephants are found isolated pockets without having permanent corridor.

"The creation of reserve will give better protection and conservation of elephants in the state," the statement said.
Union Environment Minister

Harsh Vardhan tweeted, "Nagaland's #SingphanWildlifeSanctu-ary made India's 30th #Elephant-Reserve. Nagaland govt notified the Reserve with the approval of @moefcc. It is a key reserve in the NE states, strategically located in contiguity with Abhaypur Reserve Forest of Assam. @CmoNagland."

The Singphan Elephant Re-erve is located in Mon district of Nagaland and spreads over an area of 5825 acres (2357 hac).

The Singphan Elephant Re-serve is located at about 65 km from Mon, the district capital town of the state. "The declaration of the Sing-

phan Elephant Reserve in Naga-land will boost the elephant conservation in the country especially north eastern region.

'As per recent census report (2017), Nagaland has population of around 446 elephants," it said.

The creation of new reserve will also result in protection and conservation of the elephant population and also ensure that this population remains healthy and viable, it added.

Stars, politicians mourn **Aretha Franklin** at funeral

DETROIT, AUG 31 (AFP): Political dignitaries and music royalty led the tributes to Aretha Franklin at her star-studded funeral on Friday, joining her family and members of the public in bidding goodbye to America's 'Queen of Soul".

The service, a celebration of the life and legacy of the music icon, was full of song, uplifting eulogies and humorous anecdotes at the Greater Grace Temple in her

metown Detroit.
The 76-year-old singer, beloved by millions around the world, died of cancer on August 16, closing the curtain on a glittering six-decade career that spanned Gospel, R&B, Jazz, Blues and

even classical music.
Former US president Bill Clinton was among the guests, while letters were read out from his successors George W. Bush and Barack Obama extolling her contribution to America and her cultural importance.

Franklin's golden casket was flanked by enor-mous blooms of lavender, cream and pink roses, while the church packed with smartly dressed mourners.

It was an upbeat and jubilant service celebrating Franklin, uplifting her family in their time of grief and celebrating her gospel legacy. Worship-pers were even urged dance at one point.

Smokey Robinson spoke movingly of the childhood friend he would miss for the rest of his life and broke briefly into acappella song.

"I miss you my bud-dy, I miss you my friend, I know that my love for you will never end, will never end," he sang. "I'm going to love you forever," he finished, blowing a kiss toward her coffin.

Ariana Grande pow-ered through Franklin's 1968 hit "Natural Woman" supported by gospel backing singers with further tributes expected from Stevie Wonder and Jennifer Hudson.

"I'm so proud of you, I know you'll be watching me from the windows of heaven and I promise to carry our family legacy with pride," said Franklin's very emotional grandson Jordan, tearing "Long live the Queen." up. "Long live the Quest While television stars and politicians mingled inside, fans queued overnight in their funeral finery or Aretha T-shirts, desperate to be among the 1,000 members of the public allowed into the service.

"Aretha is my icon. She's everything to me, like my mother," said Ugochi Queen, a 46-yearold Franklin tribute artist dressed in black ruffles from Gary, Indiana, who got in line at 4:00 am.

Franklin influenced generations of singers from the late Whitney Houston to Beyonce, with unforgettable hits including "Respect" (1967) and "I Say a Little Prayer" (1968). She won 18 Grammy

awards and was feted for her civil rights work, raising money for the cause and inspiring activists with her anthems. Franklin was voted

the greatest singer of all time by Rolling Stone time by Rolling Stone magazine and for African American women in particular was a role model and a benchmark for success, feminism and empowerment. Detroit

considers Franklin royalty. For three days she lay re-splendent in a different outfit each day, and visited by thousands. On

Friday, she wore a golden sparkling dress for her funeral.

Thousands thousands of people lined up in the past days to see the late singer one last time -- first at the Charles H. Wright Museum for African-American History, then at her father's New

Bethel Baptist Church.
Pink Cadillacs -some having been driven across the country --parked en masse outside the church, expected to follow her cortege to the cemetery where she is to be buried alongside her

father and siblings.




Aamir Khan to return with Satyamev Jayate after SRK's TED Talks goes off air?
