Ancient monastery renovated in Nepal

KATHMANDU, OCT 24 (PTI): A 1,250 years old Buddhist monastery in Nepal's famous tourist destination Muktinath has been renovated at a cost of Rs 2.85 crore.

The ancient monastery. Narsing Gumba, built from stone and mud, although repaired few years back, had started leaking and its walls had become wobbly. Buddhist preacher

Rimpochhe is credited for constructing this monas tery at Muktinath, a fa mous pilgrim site which thousands Buddhist and Hindu pil-grims annually.

The monastery has been renovated at a cost of Rs 2.85 crore, said Muk-tinath Area Development Committee president Hira

Bahadur Thakuri.

The grant assistance for the renovation of the monastery was provided by the Department of Archae-ology; Ministry of Culture and Tourism; then District Development Committee, Mustang; the Muktinath Kshetra Development Committee: the local con servation committee and the Water-induced Disaster Management Committee.

devotees have placed the idols of various gods and goddesses in-side the monastery.

India's first engine-less train set to hit tracks on Oct 29 CHENNAI, OCT 24 (PTI): Train 18, the country's first engine-less train which is being regarded as

a successor to the 30-yearold Shatabdi Express, is set to hit the tracks for trials on October 29.

Driven by a self-propulsion module sans a separate locomotive, the train, capable of running at a speed of up to 160 kmph, comes with technical features for enhanced quick acceleration.

The swanky 16-coach prototype without a locomotive (engine) will cut

travel time by 15 per cent compared to the Shatabdi. Developed by the city-based Integral Coach tory in 18 months, the full AC train is designed in such a way that passen-

gers can have a look at the driver's cabin. ICF General Manager Sudhanshu Mani told PTI that it cost nearly Rs 100 crore to build the prototype and subsequent production would bring down the cost.

It has a potential to travel up to the speed at 160 kmph as against 130 kmph of Shatabdi and would result in the travel time being reduced by around 15 per cent once the tracks are fit to suit Train 18's speed. Train 18 has diffused

Now, 'King' Kohli is fastest to 10,000 ODI runs



ABHISHEK HORE VISAKHAPATNAM, OCT 24 (PTI): Virat Kohli

Wednesday became the fastest to score 10,000 runs in One-day Internationals, rewriting, fittingly enough, the iconic Sachin Tendulkar's record and compounding the cricket community's conundrum to find the right superlatives for his henomenal batting.

'King' Kohli comfort-

ably bettered the record set by the man who was to Indian cricket for over two decades what the 29-year-old has been for the past few years.

Tendulkar took 259 innings to get there, while Kohli has so far batted in 205 innings. Fortune, too, was on Kohli's side as West Indies skipper Jason Hold-er dropped his Indian counterpart on 44.

Seventeen summers ago, Tendulkar had ven-tured into what was then an unchartered territory. during a match against Australia. On Wednesday, Kohli became the 13th batsman to reach the milestone.

Not long ago, while the cricket world strug-gled to look for words to aptly describe Kohli's phenomenal batting, his coach Ravi Shastri thought it would be wise to visit the bookstore, buy the latest edition of the Oxford dictionary and look for the adjectives that befit the captain and

his superhuman feats. "If I were you, I would visit the bookstore and pick up the Oxford dictio nary," Shastri had said af-ter a Kohli century guided India to victory over South Africa in February.

Some years ago, Tendulkar, after scoring his 100th international century, said he would love to see an Indian -- someone like Kohli or Rohit Shar-ma -- break his records.

At a venue set amidst picturesque hills, Kohli reached the mark when he played Ashley Nurse for a single in the 37th over of the second ODI

over of the second UDI against the West Indies. Having an enviable record at the Dr YSR ACA-VDCA Cricket Stadium with scores of 118, 117, 99 and 65, Kohli began his latest innings with a boundary through the off-side.

Entering the game 81 short of 10,000, with this achievement the run machine added another feather to his illustrious cap.

Kohli has been in sublime form across formats this year and has scored over 900 runs in ODIs alone. He is currently the world's No.1 batsman in both the Test and one-

day formats.

Kohli's journey has been awe-inspiring, from his first-class debut, win-ning the U-19 World Cup, captaining the Indian team, to rewriting batting records at will.

With his unbeatable performances, Kohli has won several accolades including the Arjuna award, ICC World Cricketer of the year and multiple BCCI international Cricketer of

the Year awards.
"It's an incredible achievement by Virat to complete 10,000 runs ODI before he is even 30 years old. It's only expected that Virat will reach many more batting milestones in future. BCCI acting president CK Khanna said.

In the first match against the Caribbean side, Kohli notched up his 36th ODI hundred as he stroked his way to a breezy 140, helping the home team take a 1-0 lead in the five-match series.

Besides Tendulkar Besides Tendulkar and Kohli, Sourav Gan-guly, Mahendra Singh Dhoni and Rahul Dravid are the other Indian cricketers to cross 10000 runs in the format.

The purple tea, produced by Donyio Polo Tea Estate of Arunachal Pradesh, was sold to Dugar Consumer Products Pvt Ltd here, the source said.

This is the first time purple tea is being manufactured in India. The tea was sold by Contemporary Tea Brokers Pvt Ltd here at the highest price," Guwahati Tea Auction Buyers Association secretary Dinesh Bihani told PTI.

The Guwahati Tea

Auction Center, which has recently added purple tea in its basket, sells various types such as golden tips silver needles and other speciality teas.

Bihani said Dugar Consumer Product Pvt Ltd sells tea under the brand name 'Uphaar', one of the "largest tea packet sellers in the North East region".

Around 10,000 purple tea leaves are required to make a kg of purple tea, another industry source said.

Donyi Polo had in August sold the golden needles tea variety at a record Rs 40,000 per kg consisting of a 1.1 kg lot, the source added.

Women devotees move HC for police security to worship at Sabarimala

Косні, Ост 24 (РТІ): Four women in the men strual age group have ap-proached the Kerala High Court seeking a direction to the state government to provide them security to offer prayers at Lord Ayyappa temple in Sabarimala.

When the petition filed by AK Maya Krishnan (37), Rekha S (45), Jalajamol PS (35), and Jayamol PS (28) came up Wednesday, a division bench of justices P R Ramachandra Menon and Devan Ramachandran directed the state government to spell out its stand on the matter.

The bench then post-ed the plea for hearing to Monday.

In their petition, the women, including two lawyers, submitted that

despite a judgement of the Supreme Court per-mitting entry of all women into the hill shrine, the hopes of the female devotees of Lord Ayyappa are still in limbo.

The petitioners alleged that the thanthris (priests) and Pandalam royal family who are bound to act under the directions of the TDB were committing contempt of court by protesting in support of those challenging the fundamental rights declared by the Supreme Court in favour of woman of all ages.

The very act of protest to prevent the women of all ages from en-joying their fundamental right is a challenge of the established law of the county, they alleged.

Preventing women from exercising the religious right of worship was punishable with imprisonment of three years under Sec 295A of The Indian Penal Code (IPC), they added.

The Sabarimala temple, which opened for the monthly pooja on October 17 after the Su-preme Court order, had witnessed a stand-off over the issue with angry devotees preventing at least a dozen women in the "barred" age group from entering the shrine.

On September 28, a five-judge Constitution bench of the Supreme Court, headed by then chief justice Dipak Mis-ra had lifted the centuries-old ban on the entry of women of menstrual age into the shrine.

Cancer more than doubled in India over last 26 yrs, breast cancer most common: Report

New Delhi. Oct 24 ty cancers -- breast cancer. (PTI): Cancer burden in India has more than doubled over the last 26 years, the highest increase amongst all therapy areas, with breast cancer being the most common among Indian women, according

to a recent report.

The Breast Cancer Landscape in India, a white paper by the Con-federation of Indian Industry (CII), which aims to provide insights regarding status and challenges in breast cancer care will be released Thursday by Minister of State for

Health Anupriya Patel.

As per the ICMR data, India had 14 lakh cancer patients in 2016 and this number is expected to increase. The government has laid down four priori-

cervical cancer, oral cancer and lung cancer which together constitute 41 per cent of cancer burden, the report mentioned.

"Breast cancer is currently the most common among Indian women, both in terms of incidence as well as mortality, with proportional preva-lence in younger age-groups being higher than the global average. Age standardised rate is approximately 25.8 per one lakh women and is expected to rise to 35 per one lakh women in 2026," the report stated.

However, this number, the report stated, could be an underestimate as at present only 15 per cent of the population is covered by can-

"As per interviews with key stakeholders, there could be an under-reporting of nearly 50-100 per cent varying with every state," it said.

Nearly 60 per cent patients with breast cancers are diagnosed in advanced stages. Breast cancer bur-den is not only limited to disease burden and mortality, but also leads to economic loss for the nation. India, lost nearly USD

6.7 Billion in 2012 due to cancer, amounting to 0.36 per cent of the total GDP. Indian breast cancer

patients are younger females with a median age of diagnosis being 46.2 years and nearly 48 per cent being diagnosed in pre-menopausal age, which implies a more aggressive disease.

allegations against them.
An SIT will look into the charges and both officers will "sit out" the duration of the probe, Jaitley told reporters after a cabinet briefing, adding that they have been sent on leave as an interim measure.

He said it is absolutely essential to restore the agency's institutional integrity and credibility

The allegations by the top two officers of the country's premier inves tigation agency had led to a "bizarre and unfortunate" situation, he said.

In a lengthy statement issued later in the day, the government claimed that Verma was not cooperating with the CVC.

It defended its decision to send him on leave, saying an "extraordinary and unprecedented" situation had arisen due to "grave allegations of corruption" against senior functionaries of the agency.

Govt, opp engage in verbal duel on removal of CBI director

DELHI, OCT 24 (PTI): Opposition parties Wednesday launched a blistering attack on the government over the renoval of the CBI director with the Congress describing the decision as the "last nail" in the inde-pendence of the agency but the Centre defended its move as "absolutely es sential" to maintain CBI's

institutional integrity.
Finance Minister Arun Jaitley also asserted that the government's decision to send Alok Verma and his deputy Rakesh Asthana was based on the recommendations of the Central Vigilance Commissioner.

A late night order on Tuesday from the Ap-

pointments Committee of the Cabinet led by Prime Minister Naren-dra Modi sent Verma and Asthana, who were at loggerheads, on leave

Leading the attack against the government on the issue, Congress president Rahul Gandhi alleged that Verma was forcibly sent on leave as he was collecting documents relating to the Rafale 'scam', adding the country and its Constitution were in danger under the ruling dispensation.

"Modi govt buries the 'last nail' into the independence of CBI. Systematic dismantling and denigrating of CBI is now complete. Once a premier investigating

agency, PM ensures that CBI's integrity, credibility and reliability is buried and dead," Congress chief spokesperson Randeep urjewala said.

Jaitley dismissed as "rubbish" allegations that Verma was removed because he was collecting documents on the Rafale fighter jet deal.

In a tweet, Gandhi

said, "CBI Chief Alok Verma was collecting documents relating to the Rafale scam. He was forcibly sent on leave".

"The Prime Minister's

message is very clear that whoever comes near Rafale (issue) will be removed,

wiped out," he charged.

A number of opposition leaders including TMC's Mamata Baner-jee, CPI(M)'s Sitaram Yechury, BSP's Mayawati, AAP chief Arvind Keiriwal and CPI's D Raia were among those who attacked the government over removal of Verma.

"CBI has now become so called BBI (BJP Bureau of Investigation) - very unfortunate!" Banerjee tweeted.

Mayawati also at-

tacked the government on the issue, alleging that the Centre's "vindictive, casteist and communal policies" have put not only the CBI, but other agencies as well under similar problem. DMK president M K

Stalin too slammed the government for removing Verma, alleging that institutional freedom was facing serious threat under the Modi government.

"Director Alok Verma being sent on leave at a crucial time appears mo-tivated with #RafaleScam under the scanner. The appointment of a corrupt officer as interim head of #CBI is equally question-able," he tweeted. In his reaction, Ye-

chury alleged that the gov-ernment removed Verma to protect its 'handpicked' officer Asthana.

"The illegal removal of CBI chief by Modi government to protect their own handpicked officer, against whom serious charges of corruption are being investigated, points to attempts at a serious cover-up to pro-tect his direct links to the BJP's top political leadership", tweeted Yechury

'To ensure that the CBI is not a 'caged parrot', the Supreme Court had granted protection to its chief from govt's whims and fancies by giving him a two-year tenure. What is Modi govt trying to hide by its panic move?" he asked.

Delhi Chief Minister and AAP leader Kejriwal echoed him.

"What are the reasons for sending CBI director on leave? Under which law did the Modi govt get the authority to initiate action against the chief of an investigating agen-cy appointed as per the Lokpal Act? What is Modi govt trying to hide?" he asked on Twitter.



Accident Care

More needs to be done in response to accidents and mishaps

 $m{I}$ magine a scenario in which a road mishap, say in remote West Sikkim, leaves a group of people injured and in immediate need of medical attention ranging from the routine first-aid to specialist interventions You do not even have to stretch your imagination if you have been following news on a regular basis and are aware of such accidents in different parts of Sikkim. While accidents cannot be averted with certainty, what can be assured is that accident victims receive the required medical attention sans the red tape and without having to bounce through a circuitous route to medical attention. But that is invariably what happens.

Continuing with the scenario outlined earlier, the injured will first be rushed to the nearest PHC if they are far from the district hospitals. There can be no qualms with this since trained medical attention is necessary in the early hours to establish the nature of injuries. Of course, it would be ideal if the first re sponder teams to accident sites included doctors and paramedics so that such diagnosis could be made the spot. After this, the injured will be taken to the nearest district hospital where they will be checked again and then, if required, referred on to STNM Hospital in Gangtok and chances are that from here they will be driven onwards to CRH down in Tadong. The more complicated cases will then be referred out of the State to Siliguri or Delhi.

From the time of the accident to their eventual discharge from hospital, the victims (the less injured ones) of a road mishap end up spending more time on the road, moving from one 'referral' to the next, than they spend recuperating or coming to grips with their trauma and grief. Sikkim's roads are a punishment for even able-bodied passengers, the trauma that injured bodies suffer careening from one medical inspection to the other should not be wished on anyone. The doctor with referral powers at the final end of the state is just as capable as the doctor who must have attended to the accident victims first. Why then, should the power to refer patients out of the State not rest with the first doctor itself depending on her prognosis. That would cut down on travel time substantially, and time is of essence in such cases, all will agree.

There is still more that needs to be done when it comes to handling accident trauma cases. Accidents, as mentioned, cannot be avoided, but what defeats all explanation is the scenario which definitely confounds everyone - the level of medical assistance available for accident victims in Sikkim. This basic facility remains unattained even though by now, speciality wings should have been added to district hospitals and even Primary Health Centres here at least on paper. Given the hilly terrain, poor driving etiquette and unreliable roads, every PHC in Sikkim should have reasonably advanced infrastructure and manpower to attend to accident cases. Tourist destinations in high altitudes [like Nathula and Gurudongmar] should have personnel and equipment to attend to visitors with high altitude sickness symptoms. This facility, one may add here, need not necessarily be provided and maintained by the Government and could even be sponsored by tourism stakeholders; after all, it is tourists who develop complications there, with the residents mostly acclimatized. Agreed the army assists in times of emergencies, but this should still be a service that is more accessible and specifically dedicated to tourist emergencies. These should already have been in place, and yet, one stares at a reality where in the event of a medical emergency, a victim's fate depends on the presence of mind of the people around, the speed at which the referral can be typed out and the road worthiness of the ambulance which zips the victim from one referral pit-stop to the other. Unfortunate

Saudi Arabia is a repressive regime - and so are a lot of US allies

he murder of Saudi journalist Jamal Khashoggi at Saudi Arabia's consulate in Istanbul has put the United States' relationship with the wealthy Gulf power under intense scrutiny.

After weeks of denying any knowledge about Khashoggi's fate, Saudi Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman now says that Saudi agents strangled Khashoggi after a fistfight. Eighteen men have been

The Khashoggi affair highlights a persistent oddity in American foreign policy, one I observed in many years working at the State Department and Department of Defense: selective morality in dealing with repressive regim

A PANOPLY OF DICTATORS

The Trump administration is revoking the visas of some Saudi officials implicated in the death of Khashoggi, a Washington Post columnist who lived in the U.S., Secretary of State Mike Pompeo announced at an Oct. 23 State Department news conference.

Turkey claims to have audio and video evidence that the Saudis tortured, assassinated and dismembered Khashoggi. Many of those arrested have close links to Salman.

But Trump has been reluc-tant to confront Saudi Arabia over the killing of Khashoggi. For weeks, he and other White House officials reminded critics that Saudi Arabia buys billions of dollars in weapons from the U.S. and is a crucial partner in the American pressure campaign on Iran.

Their defense highlights why the U.S. has for decades maintained close ties with some of the world's worst human rights abusers.

Ever since the country emerged from the Cold War as the world's dominant military and economic power, consecutive American presidents have en financial and geopolitical benefit in overlook-the bad deeds of brutal regimes.

CHANGING ALLEGIANCES IN THE MIDDLE EAST Before the Islamic revolution in 1979, Iran was a close U.S. ally. Shah Reza Pahlavi ruled harshly, using his secret police to torture and murder political dissidents.

But the shah was also a secular, anti-communist eader in a Muslim-dominated region. President Nixon hoped that Iran would be the "Western po-

liceman in the Persian Gulf."

After the Shah's overthrow, the Reagan administration in the 1980s became friendly with Iraqi dictator Saddam Hussein. The U.S. supported him with intelligence during Iraq's war with Iran and looked the other way at his use of chemical weapons

And before Syria's intense, bloody civil war -

which has killed an estimated 400,000 people and featured grisly chemical weapon attacks by the vernment – its authoritarian regime enjoyed relatively friendly relations with the U.S.

Syria has been on the State Department's list of state sponsors of terrorism since 1979. But presidents Nixon, Jimmy Carter, George H.W. Bush and Bill Clinton all visited President Bashar al-Assad's father, who ruled from 1971 until his death in 2000.

WHY SAUDI ARABIA MATTERS

That's the language former President Barack Obama used in September to criticize Trump's embrace of Russia's authoritarian president, Vlad-imir Putin, citing America's "commitment to certain values and principles like the rule of law and human rights

and democracy."
But Trump defended his relationship with Russia, tac-

itly invoking American realpolitik. "You think our country's so innocent?" he asked on Fox News.

I can't say he's wrong.

The U.S. maintains close ties to numerous regimes whose values and policies conflict with America's constitutional guarantees of democracy, freedom of speech, the right to due process and many others. It has for decades.

Saudi Arabia's brutal treatment of journalist Ja-mal Khashoggi is causing international outcry and some light retaliation by the U.S. government

But American realpolitik suggests the tight U.S.-Saudi relationship will continue.

Cartoonists can be an important voice of dissent: but they can also be divisive

wanda has introduced legislation miliation or insult - through gestures, writings or cartoons - of national authorities, public service officials or foreign state and international organisation representatives. This is a clear restriction to the freedom of political and editorial cartoonists.

Political cartoons are power-ful spaces in which negotiations of power and resistance are expressed. They provide insights into power relations, key social issues and events. By mocking or ridiculing the excesses nd failings of elites, cartoonists can hold leaders accountable.

While the intent - and reception of cartoons can mobilise critiques of leaders and excesses of power, they can also be divisive and regressive. This is particularly true when cartoons fail to consider local history, cultural norms, and cultural or religious difference. Recent years have witnessed many of these controversies. These include the publication of editorial cartoons of the Prophet Muhammad in the Danish newspaper Jyllands-Posten which eventually led to protests around the world, including violent demonstrations and riots in some Muslim countries. Or the reaction by women's groups to South African cartoonist Zapiro's depictions of former South African President Jacob Zuma "preparing to rape" the 'Lady of Justice". They said it was insensitive in a country where rape is a

daily occurrence.
Rwanda has huge sensitivities when it comes to political cartoons. Prior to the 1994 genocide, when an estimated 800,000 Rwandans were killed in the space of 100 days, a cartoon strip in the Kangura newspaper was seen as a propaganda tool to promote division and hostility. This has meant that in recent years, cartoonists remain cautious of crossing official and unofficial lines when covering political issues

While all journalists try to balance tensions between free speech and causing division, this is particularly fraught for cartoonists. Their work can challenge us to question ourselves, provoke empathy for others and often relies on an emotional reaction – one not always intended to elicit laughter - to convey their argu-

ROLE OF POLITICAL CARTOONS

Political and editorial cartoons are a key indicator of the democratic health of a country. They are the "canary in the coal mine", providing a public display of opposition and dis-sent. They use a unique art to raise questions and speak a truth to power in ways denied to others. In this role, political cartoonists highlight abuses and excesses of power, and hold governments and leaders accountable.
Witness, for instance, South Afri-

can cartoonist Zapiro's many depictions of former President Zuma with a shower faucet attached to his head. These were drawn in the aftermath

of Zuma's rape acquittal. During his ered after having unprotected sex as a means to prevent the spread of HIV. Long after the trial, the cartoon continued to act as constant reminder of the rape case, a motif the cartoonist used to question the legitimacy of Zuma's leadership.

Elsewhere, we see heads of state being ridiculed by being compared to animals: US President George W Bush as an ape, ex-British Prime Minister Tony Blair as a poodle, former Zimbabwean elites as snakes. All these images raised questions about the credibility of powerful office-holders. CONTROL

Restricting and intimidating politi-cal cartoonists is often a key part of broader efforts to curtail press freeoms and free speech.

As elites seek to maintain control,

political cartoonists face threats and intimidation for their work. In re-cent years, we have seen court cas-es against cartoonists all over the world, including in Malaysia, South Africa, Turkey, and Serbia. In the US contracts have been terminated amid suspicions of political influence.

In the case of Rwanda, the media landscape is marked by restrictions on press freedoms and various forms of censorship. It is classified by the Freedom in the World report as "not free", alongside countries including Ethiopia, Kazakhstan, and Venezue la. Reporters without Borders ranks Rwanda as 156th in the world for Press Freedoms, comparable with the Democratic Republic of Congo

But the country's context is im portant, the memory of the 1994 genocide remains strong and is ingrained in the national psyche.

Prior to and during the genocide, sections of the print and broadcast media were pivotal in promoting and deepening ethnic division and hostility. Central to such divisive tactics was the presentation of sections of the population as sub-human - as cockroaches – who needed to be exterminated.

It is therefore understandable that, as the country rebuilds, sensitivities remain around representation of individuals or groups which humiliate or degrade them.

FINE LINE

The critical voice of the political cartoonist can provide a vital safety valve for a society. They can give expression to frustrations, grievances and opposition. But cartoonists need to remain sensitive to local political and social histories.

It's a fine line between balancing the need to protect free speech and these concerns. Political cartoonists need to continue to speak truth to power, but in so doing must ensure they do not cause division and hostil-ity which may threaten the most fundamental of rights - the right to life.

The system installed by the GSI in select villages, mostly in Kurseong block, has already started

working, the director said.
"After the immense loss of life and property in these three villages since 2003 mainly because of landslides, we decided to install the system here first," he said.

Studying the Kurseong area utilising the modern InSAR technology by placing five corner reflectors and rainfall threshold analysis for landslide initiation resulted in the development of the people-centric L-EWS, he said.

Earlier, in case of landslides triggered by rainfall, the GSI used to alert the administration and then it used to be passed on to the local population.

"But we felt there must be a change and we should alert the possible victims as soon as there is a trigger. We believe, this will help us in saving more lives," he said.

Eighteen such zones vulnerable to landslides and the three Darjeeling villages, where the warning system has been installed were on top of the chart, he stated.

Elaborating about the system, he said that it is ideal for warning landslides as spatio-temporal forecasting is extreme-ly difficult, particularly from a remote area.

The prediction of the occurrences of landslides both in space and time does not happen because most of the key elements

monitoring, analysis warning generation, dissemination and communication of warning and preparedness for timely response do not work in

sync, Nath said.
"The difficulties are coupled with the variability in the intensity of trigger thus making forecasting quite difficult for the purpose of alerting the community at risk. So the need of putting

nmunity-based landslide warning system was felt," he said.

Incidentally, in 2016, the Landslide Studies Di-

vision of Geohazards Research and Management (GHRM) Centre, GSI, Kolkata had studied this landslide zone in order to develop an early warning system.

In fact, before the deployment of the system, a few rounds of community landslide awareness programme, including mock-drills, were also conducted, Nath said.

"As on March 2018, NBFC's NBFC's exposure to-wards real estate is 7.5 per cent accounting for Rs 1.65 lakh crore," real estate consultant Anarock Capital MD & CEO Shobhit Agarwal told PTI.

"Post the banking systems freeze on real estate funding due to rising non-performing assets, NBFCs and HFCs are the sole source of funds for the cash-strapped developers," he said.

The NBFC crisis needs to be resolved as soon as possible or the real esate sector's much-anticipated recovery will be postponed by a couple of quarters, Agarwal said. Now, NBFCs are

struggling and their loan disbursals to developers have slowed down significantly, he said.

The repayment bur-

den is about 1.2 lakh crore (USD 16.3 billion) of commercial paper in October-December, near a record 1.46 lakh crore in August-October, according to available data.

The consultant quoting Credit Suisse report said NBFCs and Housing Finance Companies (HFCs) have played a major role in credit supply in recent years, accounting for near-ly 25-35 per cent of incremental overall credit.

While bank credit growth in the last two

years averaged at a mere seven per cent, a strong 20 per cent-plus growth in NBFC credit aided overall credit expansion beyond 10 per cent. "Despite residential

sales gradually picking up q-o-q, they are nowhere near their peak levels. With substantial number of residential projects running behind schedule, the crisis could further cerbate liquidity woes and impact project delivery time lines even more," Agarwal said.

As per Anarock data, more than 5.75 lakh residential units are running behind schedule across the top 7 cities since their launch in 2013 or before. Many listed realty

developers such as Puravankara, DLF, Prestige Oberoi Group, Realty and Godrei Properties well-diversified portfolios and many of these have also reduced their debts and ventured into affordable housing where growth is current

Delhi's air quality slips to 'very poor', firefighting continues at Bhalswa landfill

NEW DELHI, OCT 24 (PTI): Delhi's air quality Wednesday dipped to 'very poor' barely two days after staying in the 'poor' category, even as firefighting operations continued at the Bhalswa landfill site.
The Central Pollution

Control Board (CPCB) recorded the overall Air Quality Index (AQI) of Delhi at 312 at 11 am.

An AQI between 0 and 50 is considered 'good', 51 and 100 'satisfactory'. 101 and 200 'moderate 201 and 300 'poor', 301 and 400 'very poor', and 401 and 500 'severe'.

The air quality in the capital had shown signs of improvement Monday as it moved from 'very poor' to 'poor' category, but experts said it could days due to toxic air coming out of the blazing fire at Bhalaswa landfill site.

A Delhi Fire Service

official said firefighting was still on at the garbage dump site.

"Due to continuous discharge of methane gas from the landfill, fire erupts randomly. Two fire tenders are currently working on containing the fire at the site." he said.

Fire has been raging at the massive dump site since October 20.

However, by Tuesday evening, the flames were somewhat brought under control and parts of the landfill smouldered, DFS officials had said

The Centre-run tem of Air Quality Forecasting and Research (SAFAR) also reported an AQI in the 'very poor' category. On Sunday, the AQI

had oscillated between 'poor' and 'very poor' categories.

On Saturday, a haze had engulfed the national capital and the worst air quality of this season was recorded at 324.

North Delhi Mayor Adesh Gupta and NDMC Madh-Commissioner Madh-up Vyas had visited the landfill site on Tuesday and the civic body had announced a slew of measures, both long-term and short-term for remediation of the site.

Anumita Roychowd-hury of CSE Monday said, toxic air emanating out of such landfill fires is likely to affect the air quality.

"If the wind speed is lower and the tem-perature dips, the pol-

luted air coming out of the landfill fires will get trapped, which would severely affect the air quality," she said.

Supreme Court-appointed ronment Protection ConFriday had held a meeting with officials of Punjab Haryana and the Delhi governments to discuss the pollution situation in the national capital.



No Bharat Stage IV vehicle shall be sold across the country from April 1, 2020: SC

NEW DELHI, OCT 24 (PTI): The Supreme Court Wednesday said that no Bharat Stage IV vehicle shall be sold across the country with effect from April 1, 2020.

The Bharat stage emission standards are standards instituted by the government to regulate output of air pollutants from motor vehicles.

The Bharat Stage VI (or BS-VI) emission norm would come into force from April 1, 2020 across the country.

A three judge bench headed by Justice Madan B Lokur made it clear that only BS VI compli-ant vehicle shall be sold in the country from April 1st, 2020.

The bench said the need of the hour was to move to a cleaner fuel.

The BS IV norms have

been enforced across the country since April 2017. In 2016, the Centre

had announced that the country would skip the BS-V norms altogether and adopt BS-VI norms by 2020.

The apex court was deciding whether grace period should be given to automobile manufacturers for the sale of BS-VI non-compliant vehicles after April 1, 2020.

At a previous hearing

advocate Aparajita Singh, assisting the top court as an amicus curiae in the air pollution matter, had opposed the government's move to give time till June 30, 2020 to automobile their BS-VI non-compliant four-wheelers manufactured till March 31, 2020.

The amicus had also opposed the govern-ment's proposal to give grace period till Septemher 30, 2020 for the sale of BS-VI non-compliant heavy transport vehicles.

The automobile man ufacturers had justified the grace period to sell their vehicles contending that India was leapfrogging from BS-IV emission norms to BS-VI within a short span of time.

manufacturers The had argued that they were allowed to manufacture BS-IV vehicles till March 31, 2020 and they should be granted reasonable time to sell their stock.

Additional Solicitor General A N S Nadkarni, who had appeared for the Centre, had told the apex court that the government considered it fit to give three and six months to the manufacturers to sell their stock of BS-IV vehicles after April 1, 2020.

Biles, 21, will become the first woman in history to win four world all-around titles if she takes gold in that discipline in Doha.

Her main competition is likely to come from teenage compatriot Morgan Hurd, the 2017

champion.

Biles could also take gold in the vault, floor ex-

ercise and beam competitions. She is a member of an exceptionally strong US team looking for its fourth consecutive straight world title, but their prepara-tions have been anything but smooth. Since Biles performed

in the 2016 Olympics, it has been a tumultuous time for US gymnastics.

In July 2017, former

team doctor Larry Nassar was sentenced to up to 175 years in prison on charges of sexual assault. In January this year, Biles revealed herself to be one of his victims.

In the fallout, US gymnastics chief executive Kerry Perry resigned because of her handling of the scandal.

And just this month, interim CEO Mary Bono resigned after just five error-strewn days in charge after posting a critical tweet alluding to Nike and its support for NFL star Colin Kaepernick, who triggered a political firestorm after kneeling during the US national anthem to protest racial injustice.

Biles was hugely critical of Bono, taking to Twitter to say "it's not like we needed a smarter usa gymnastics president or any sponsors or anything".

RIYADH, OCT 24 (AP): The Saudi crown prince is to make his first international speech since the killing of Washington Post columnist Jamal Khashoggi at the Saudi Consulate in Istanbul.

The list included physicians, scientists, business and political leaders, whose work is transforming healthcare.

At not even 30, Nag is leading Apple's special projects focusing on health. Nag's team developed ResearchKit, an open-source app developer for doctors and researchers to share patient results and clinical data, and this fall it an-

nounced groundbreaking new tools for the Apple Watch: the Series 4 includes an emergency response system, in case the wearer falls and doesn't respond, and a medical-grade EKG heart-rate monitor.

A Harvard Medical School professor who came to the US as a refugee from Liberia, Panjabi co-founded Last Mile Health to recruit and train community health workers in areas that lack local health services. Last Mile's efforts were crucial in fighting Ebola from 2014 to 2016, and now Panjabi is building Community Health Academy, a mobile platform for training health care workers remotely through video and audio instruction

Gawande was tapped to lead a new nonprofit health care venture that will cover the more than 1 million employees of Amazon, Berkshire Hathaway and JPMorgan Chase. Though few details are public, it's said to focus on transpar-

ent, low-cost corporate health care.

"The American health care system has been plagued for decades by major problems, from lack of access to uncontrolled costs to unacceptable rates of medical errors," the Time editors wrote in a report unveiling the list.

"And yet, real as those issues remain, the field has also given rise to extraordinary innovation," the editors added.

Trump calls Khashoggi murder 'worst cover-up in history' as US revokes visas of some Saudi officials

WASHINGTON, OCT 24 (PTI): Saudi authorities staged the "worst cover-up ever" in the killing of prominent journalist Jamal Khashoggi, President Donald Trump has said as the US announced its first punitive action in the case by revoking the visas of some of the senior Saudi officials involved.

officials involved.

Khashoggi, a columnist for The Washington Post, disappeared after he entered the Saudi consulate in Turkey on October 2 to collect a document for his upcoming marriage to a Turkish woman.

The Saudi govern-

ment initially said he left the consulate through the back door.

Following a global outrage, Riyadh on Friday in a statement acknowl-

edged that Khashoggi was killed in a fistfight inside the consulate after an interrogation went wrong.

Trump offered his most stinging indictment yet of a Saudi effort to silence a dissident journalist, calling the series of events that led to Khashoggi's death "the worst cover up ever."

"They (the Saudis) had a very bad original

"They (the Saudis) had a very bad original concept. It was carried out poorly. And the cover-up was one of the worst in the history of cover-ups. Very simple. Bad deal. Should have never been thought of. Somebody really messed up. And they had the worst cover-up ever," Trump told reporters in

the Oval Office Tuesday. Khashoggi's death has severely dented the international reputation of Saudi Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman.

Secretary of State Mike Pompeo said Tuesday that the US had "identified at least some" of the Saudi officials involved in the killing of Khashoggi and was revoking their visas.

"These penalties will not be the last word on this matter from the United States. We will continue to explore additional measures to hold those accountable," Pompeo said. "We're making very clear that the United States does not tolerate this kind of ruthless action to silence Mr Khashoggi, a journalist, through violence."

The US will continue to seek all relevant facts, consult the Congress, and work with other nations, to hold accountable those responsible for the killing of Khashoggi, Pompeo told reporters.

Given the information, currently, available with the United States, the administration is taking appropriate actions, he said.

The visa revocation is the first punitive action the US has taken against Saudi Arabia since the death of Khashoggi, 60.

Responding to a question on the probe into the death of Khashoggi, Trump said, "And where it should have stopped is at the deal standpoint, what they thought about it. Because whoever thought of that idea, I think, is in big trouble. And they should be in big trouble.

Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan has said the "savage murder" of the journalist was meticulously planned, and demanded that all those linked to the killing face punishment.

He, however, acknowledged Turkey was still searching for answers to key questions, including who gave the order.

Trump told reporters that Erdogan was pretty tough on Saudi Arabia.

He was pretty rough on Saudi Arabia, I would say. I haven't gotten a full recap, as you know. I have people in Turkey and I have people in Saudi Arabia and other places, and they're all coming back as we speak, they're heading back, he said.

The Trump administration has sent CIA

Turkey and she is expected to be back soon in the US with details of the ongoing probe.

"I'll know, I think, everything in a very short period of time. It's a bad situation. But certainly, president Erdogan was not complimentary of what happened. That was a terrible thing that happened." Trump said.

Trump reiterated that he does not want to scrap the USD 110 billion mega arms deal with Saudi Arabia and the total investment of USD450 billion from that country, but did not rule out not taking any action against the Saudis.

I want to see the facts first. Look, Saudi Arabia's been a really great ally. They've been one of the biggest investors, maybe the biggest investor, in our country.

"They are doing hundreds of billions of dollar's worth of investments. And, you know, so many jobs. So many jobs. Thousands and thousands of jobs," he said.

During his visit to

During his visit to Saudi Arabia in May 2017, Trump signed an agreement with the Saudis for them to purchase USD 110 billion of US weapons, although so far only USD 43 billion of that has been detailed.

The ultimate number

is around USD450 billion. I think that's over a million jobs. A million to over a million jobs. So we do that, we're just hurting ourselves. We're just hurting ourselves," Trump said.

Indian in Singapore given 'stern warning' by police for posting image of torn flag

who lost his job at Singapore's DBS Bank over the incident, on August 14 posted the picture on the Facebook page of the Singapore Indians and Expats group, showing the Singapore flag on a T-shirt being ripped up to reveal the Indian flag underneath.

"Following investigations, the police, in consultation with the Attorney-General's Chambers, has administered a stern warning," Channel News Asia quoted the police as



saying. He

He was investigated under the Singapore Arms and Flag and National Anthem Rules which state that "no person shall treat the flag with disrespect", the police said.

The warning was given on October 3, about two months after a police report was made for his Facebook post, according to the report.

Patnaik has been a

Singapore permanent resident for nine years.

Some netizens commented that the post was offensive and insulting to Singapore. It was then taken down.
Patnaik, who lives

Patnaik, who lives here with his wife and two children, remains unemployed as the incident resulted in him losing the job at the DBS Bank following internal probe and disciplinary action.

Gold hits year's high of Rs 32,500 on festive buying, global cues

NEW DELHI, OCT 24 (PTI): Gold prices spurted by Rs 150 to trade at this year's high of Rs 32,500 per 10 grams at the bullion market Wednesday on persistent buying by local jewellers amid a firm trend overseas.

Silver, however, shed Rs 20 to Rs 39,730 per kg owing to reduced offtake by industrial units.

Traders said increased buying by local jewellers to meet festive and wedding season demand and a firm trend overseas mainly lifted gold prices to this year's highest level.

Gold prices in overseas markets rose 0.11 per cent to USD 1,232.20 an ounce in Singpore. It touched USD 1,239.68 an ounce Tuesday, highest since July 17 as geopolitical and economic uncertainty raised demand for the precious metals as a safe-haven.

Silver also moved up by 0.17 per cent to USD 14.83 an ounce.


In the national capital, gold of 99.9 per cent and 99.5 per cent purity advanced by Rs 150 each to Rs 32,500 and Rs 32,350 per 10 grams, respectively, its highest level this year. The yellow metal had gained Rs 130 on Tuesday.

The precious metal had traded at Rs 32,450 per 10 gram on May 15.

Sovereign too traded higher by Rs 100 at Rs 24,800 per piece of eight grams.

On the other hand, silver ready eased by Rs 20 to Rs 39,730 per kg and weekly-based delivery by Rs 50 to Rs 39,010 per kg.

Having authored and co-edited books set in the Valley, he believes love between the two countries India and Pakistan seems unimaginable, given the history, the political environment and the decades-long strife over Kashmir.

"But love between two people living on the two sides of the border is inevitable. Such love might write the future history of the two countries. Who knows what people are capable of when they are in love?" he says, adding maybe love's triumph over hate will unite the ordinary people of the subcontinent.

If that happens, future generations will be saved from ruin, he remarks.

Mehr took four years for Gigoo to complete. "Novels must take time. The novel is set

time. The novel is set partly in Karachi and partly in the no-man's-land along the India-Pakistan border. I had never been to these places until four years ago when I started writing. The characters dragged me there, he says.

Gigoo calls writing a "lonesome affair" and a battle against the "emptiness within".

"It calls for a desperate urge to explore the world around us and to understand people and their complex relationships with one another. Writing leads to stunning discoveries. But the void remains. It mustn't go because it gives purpose to the quest, he says.

Asked about his future projects, Gigoo says he does not know what's in store. But it seems there are more stories that must be told. I keep saying to myself: One more novel. One more story.


