Rain wrecks Mangan-Sintam road connectivity

The Mangan-Singtam road has been blocked at several spots this evening owing to the continuous downpour. The road was blocked by landslides at Samdong near Panchayat Bhawan, Aapdara near NHPC Gate in East Sikkim.

The road has also been blocked at Tintek Khola where the river is in spate and vehicles have not been able to cross this stretch. The water level in Marchak Khola rose this evening which has caused panic in 9th Mile village of Kambal ward as the water has been diverted towards roadside.

The public of 9th Mile somehow managed to divert the water and save several houses from danger. Many commuters plying to Mangan were stranded at Samdong expected to be restored by Friday.

One-man committee submits report on re-verification of SSC and CoI

GANGTOK, 27 SEPT:

The One Man Committee set up to examine the re-verification and digitalisation of Sikkim Subject Certificate and Certificate of Identification submitted its report to the Government on 01 Sept, earlier this month and is awaiting the government's response on the report.

Justice (Rtd) Maloy Sen-gupta, former judge, High Court of Sikkim, was appointed by the government to exam-ine the 31,180 doubtful cases of falsification of Sikkim Subject Certificate and Certifica-tion of Identification as well as issuance of Certificate of Identification in the smart card for-mat which would contain all necessary details for instant verification.

The state government had issued a notification on 04 Sept last year constituting a Committee headed by Justice Maloi Sengupta, Tsegyal Tashi [Secretary, Land Revenue and Disaster Management [Secretary, Land Revenue and Disaster Management Department], Jagat Bahadur

Rai [SSIS, the then Law Remembrance cum Secretary, Law Department] as Member Secretary of the seven-member committee, along with former Secretaries, Dup Tshering Lepcha, LM Pradhan, TN Kazi, and MB Gurung.

The committee was directed to examine the issue of falsification of CoI and Sikkim Subject Certificate and to make recommendations on issuance and digitalisation of COI in smart card format containing

smart card format containing the relevant information.

The court, on various occasions, had observed that there should be a clear identification in digitalisation to identify the descendants of Sikkim Subject holders having CoI, CoI made from the land records, issues related to 72000 citizenship issued in 1989 with concurrence of Government of India and people residing in Sikkim after 1975 for specific purposes.

Biraj Adhikari, the then president of Sikkim National People's party [SNPP], filed a Public Interest Litigation seeking court direction for investigation of doubtful cases of 31,181 falsification of CoI in 2015

The State Government in its report in Sept 2017 had said that out of 31,188 cases, 15,788 cases were reported 'Minor' & "Not Obtained" which requires no verification adding that the Department has not received 11.152 cases from the district offices which says that 'Record not Received from the District Offices' [East-7019, West-1172, South-2695 and North-266].

The Land Revenue and Disaster Management Depart-ment had issued an Appeal in the year 2010 that Pink Cards were to be issued to genuine Sikkim Subject Holders, because it was in the knowledge of Government that 31,180 cases of falsely acquired citizenship documents had been

petitioner, Adhikari, had alleged that even after knowing about the 31,180 reported false cases of Sikkim Subject Certificates

and Certificate of Identification, the Government did nothing and the persons holding such certificates are taking illegal benefits thereof. The Division Bench also directed the netitioner to submit the list of benefits taken by Sikkim Sub-ject holders and Certificate of Identification holders and other people who do not possess such certificate.

It may be mentioned here that Biraj Adhikari and his party workers had filed a complaint in the Sadar Thana in Gangtok in 2010 on the issue. The police had said in their RTI response, that only the District Collector is competent to register such complaints. Later they also filed complaints with the District Collector but got no response, according to Mr

PLUS AND MINUS FROM PM SPEECH

PM's Pakyong address: Reading between the lines

Sikkim's opportunity to hear two Speeches from Prime Minis-ter Modi in about three years is a privilege which is rare and there-fore historic. Both the visits by the Prime Minister were to mark major milestones in Sikkim's civilizational journey – the first to declare the state as India's first and only organic state and the second to inaugurate the state's first airport. Both times, Sikkim showed an unusually intense eagerness to listen to Nar-endra Modi, arguably the best ora-tor in Hindi amongst all the Indian PMs. But it was not hard to see that there was a marked difference in the two speeches given in January

2016 and September 2018.

Unlike his 2016 speech, this time he was very discreet in his commendation of the state government. He started with a poetic description of how impressed he was with the beauty of Sikkim. But he was quite chary of wholeheartedly complimenting the state government for Sikkim's achievement in sanitation and organic farming. And then he dwelt much on a de scription of how the new airport was going to bring comfort to highlanders living

a hard life in difficult terrain.

The 14 thousand crore rupees that he talked about was not a part of the central released by the BJP gov-ernment but was rather money in-

vested in hydro-power development by developers. Then he talked about the Rs 1500 crore given by the national Energy Grid of India for the transmission of electricity. Then he talked about Sikkim's share of over 350 crore for the National River Conservation Plan. He chose not to



give the disclaimer that it has not yet been released. But this part of his speech did trigger a knee jerk reaction among a section of people in the state.

He attributed a major chunk of his speech to highlighting the special emphasis his government is putting on the development of the NE. He talked about road construction, railway connections, airports and big bridges. He has been a very lucky Prime Minister to have come to the government when several mega projects started by previous governments were ripe for inaugura-

> er plant started in 2002 were a few other projects which he got the op-portunity to inaugurate. He did not share the credit with the previous governments that started the projects. But then, why would he? In a real sense, Prime Minis-

ter Modi was treading on thin ice when he talked about how the BJP government changed its approach to the development of NE. The Pa-kyong airport was also approved by the UPA government in 2008. The foundation stone of the railway link to Sikkim was laid in 2009. He could not name a single mega project that his government started in Sikkim. He made a subtle attempt to woo public support by saying what the BJP government was doing for the state. Those lines were so insubstantial that he could not name a single achievement that he could take credit for. It was too conceited of him to shamelessly take the entire credit for the airport.

Understandably, he crafted his

speech tactfully, in a way, to keep the state BJP happy by not mentioning the state government in any way. The change in the tone and turn to pg02

ENERGY CONSERVATION: WAY TO ENERGY SECURED NATION

Special Outreach Program on Poshan Abhiyaan

GANGTOK, 27 SEPT [PIB]: A spe cial outreach program (SOP) on Poshan Abhiyaan was conducted at the Angawadi Workers Training Centre (AWTC), Syari, Thursday, with the aim to sensi tize the anganwadi trainees and panchayat members of the latest initiatives undertaken by the government across the country war footing to accelerate high-impact nutrition programs.

The mission looks at improving the nutrition outcomes through effective monitoring

and timely intervention.

Speaking at the program,
Dr Melozina Lepcha, additional director, National Rural Health Mission, made an engaging power point presentation on the causes of malnutrition among Indians of various age groups and how emphasis on proper nutrition among infants, chil-dren and adolescents can help leverage the mental and physi-

symptoms, and treatment of Anemia, Dr Lepcha explained how proper nutrition helps in alleviating the condition that is seen in almost 50% of India's population currently.

"Lack of hemoglobin in our blood reduces oxygen supply to our organs, thus making us feel weak. It not only hampers our physical wellbeing but also makes out brain lethargic. If students are lethargic, they tend to skip school and college, which in turn will affect their education. If the workforce is lethargic, it will affect their output, thus hampering the performance of our services and industries. There-fore, for a nation to become



prosperous, it is imperative that the citizens are healthy," she remarked.

GM Subba, Nodal Officer, AWTC, spoke on the importance of nutrition among adolescents, especially the girls and the chal-lenge of stunting among adoles-

"Teens are becoming more independent and making many food decisions on their own Teens tend to eat more meals away from home than younger children. They are also heavily influenced by their peers. They may be eating too much of the wrong types of food, like fastfood, or processed foods. This result is stunting which has become a major public health chal-lenge in India," he opined. Mr Subba spoke in detail on

the prevalence and factors associated with stunting and how under nutrition worsens the

In her address, Ms Lepcha underscored the need for ori-enting the environment towards the initiative, exchange ideas and to explore avenues of co-operation and partnerships for support, as well as, reaching-out to the beneficiaries for effective behavioural change to accelerate a stronger mission for Mal-

nutrition-Free India. Sanjit Tamang, Panchayat Head, Syari, present as the guest of honor, informed the gathering of the various challenges being faced at the panchavat level in sensitizing the people on the dangers of malnutrition.

Parakram Parv to mark surgical strikes anniversary on 28 Sept

GANGTOK, 27 SEPT [PIB]: The Indian Armed Forces are observing "Parakram Parv" from 28 Sept to mark the second anniversary of the Surgical Strikes on terrorist camps across the Line of Control and to showcase the courage, valour and sacrifice of the Armed Forces. The event in Sikkim will be organized at West Point School, Gangtok on 28 and 29 Sept and at the OBC School, Kamrang, Namchi on 29 Sept. The event will include weapons display, selfie corner, screening of movie on surgical strikes, motivational lecture and career counselling and information kiosks, and band display.

In the aftermath of the attack on Indian Army's Jammu and Kashmir based Uri Brigade Headquarters in September 2016, numerous civil and military response measures were initiated by the Indian government against Pakistan. Of these, the step that became widely popular and resonated with the nation was the 'Surgical Strikes', a series of near simultaneous raids on a number of launch pads across the Line of Control.

Undeniably, the murderous attack on the Uri base was a watershed event following which India's approach underwent a discernible shift, as demonstrated with a hardening of posture along the LoC and the way it dealt with ceasefire violations (CFVs). While surgical strikes were not a novelty in them-selves, India for the first time acknowledged having carried the cross border raids, with the larger message intended at signaling the adversary of the change in India's approach to respond to ter-rorism. The strikes were a nationally coordinated move, followed by a public acknowledgement by the armed forces and the government with the greater message of strikes seemingly being a major paradigm shift in the way India responded to provocations by the Pakistani army.

Seen as demonstrating India's willingness and capability to use force for responding to cross-border aggression, the surgical strikes were a huge suc-

For Pakistan, it was necessary to use the dent created by the shock nature of the public declaration of the surgical strike and follow it up with a diplomatic onslaught that also signaled some demands and requirements that India sought such as reduction in ceasefire violations or reduction in infiltration, with the promise of more strikes or similar punitive action if those demands were not met.

The Centre must know that Sikkim needs budgetary help for developmental projects as this young state has an infrastructural gap to grapple with but that does not fulfil the core need of this Himalayan state. The Prime Minister choosing

ot to address the demands put forward by the state government offended the general public. If he thought that the allusion to crores of rupees, which largely consists

of investment by developers, was sweeter than his mention of these issues, he was terribly wrong. Delhi must change its tactics with NE states. Ramachandra Guha in Democrats and Dissenters writes, "As with China and Tibet, here too an anxious Centre has unsuccessfully

sought to buy social peace and politi-

cal compliance by bribery". This he wrote about some NE states which aspire to independent ethnic homelands, distinct from the Indian republic. This, therefore, does not directly apply to Sikkim. But any attempt to sidetrack the core issue of Sikkim is an anathema. One of the biggest legacies from the last Chogyal is his unwavering

stance on shunning bribery. When he was pushed to the wall by the Congress government during his last days, facing the worst possible financial crisis, he did not budge an inch and refused to give his assent to the merger. The Sikkimese people in general have accepted the merger but Sikkim's civil liberties can never be compromised with mon-ey. The current government has never clubbed the demand for budgetary

aids with the core agenda during both the visits by PM Modi. This is no mean gesture.

A young local journalist once told me that the new generation of Sikkimese people

more worried about jobs than seat reservations. We tend to miss the actual construct and complexities of Sikkimese society when making such an assess-ment. In the post-merger era, nothing is more sig-

nificant to Sikkim than the preservation of the distinct identity of the Sikkimese people. How else can Sikkim survive in an aggressive diverse, multi-ethnic, many-layered, multi-lingual India with the fastest growing population? Therefore, anything that augments a sense of Sikkimese distinctiveness in India is vitally significant. The relevance of seat reservations in the State Assembly will become increasingly strong with passing years. More so in the contemporary political dispensation where advocacy for a Uniform Civil Code (One India, One Nation, One Law) is gaining unprecedented currency. The ramifications of the UCC on Article 371 F, in particularly clause (k) could be far reaching.



The distinct identity of the Sikkimese also has a special significance with the Nepali communities which face an "immigrant' tag time and time again. Chief Minister Chamling's argumentation about the distinctive historical roots

of Sikkimese Nepalis must be understood in this context. The constitutional recognition of the remaining Sikkimese communities as Scheduled Tribes, therefore, is a cornerstone political agenda in Sikkim politics but Prime Minister Modi did not even utter a word on this. The exemption of income tax for Sikkimese people has a tremendous significance in the same context which is therefore one of the biggest accomplishments of the present state government. These emotional and symbolic aspects have such significance that Sikkim may never choose to live without them.

No Excuses

A privileged few are foisting insularity in the name of nationalism

 $\mathbf{T}^{ ext{he}}$ nation needs to accept that what is being passed off as a majoritarian right-wing government is actually a minority, regressively upper caste insularity disguised in shallow nationalism. Evidence of this sliver-sized representation unloading its of-fensive version of what defines India is manifesting in the gau-rakshak lynch mobs, the normalization of misogyny and spite through state-endorsed fictions like love-jihad and the easy mindlessness with which lives can be snuffed because long-demolished (at least officially) caste barriers are being erected again. And now, perhaps because the rabid intolerance could not be explained to mass sentiment, experiments are being tried out to excite what are clearly hate crimes as ill-informed attacks - people from minority groups being lynched on suspicions of being child lifters or thieves. The results remain the same. At times, trouble is instigated and then victimization is claimed.

Thanks to a mass media which has capitulated on its responsibility to inform and explain, being liberal and rational is now being painted as a character flaw and sycophancy and iconoclasm being sold as nationalism. India, however, is more enduring than the acting chops or decibel range of those who want to scream and hate the country into the dark ages when everything was worked around the petty sensitivities of a privileged few. And while the idea that India will reclaim its tolerance is reassuring, it should not be taken as a cue to remain uninvolved. The citizens need to stay engaged, inform themselves better and consciously tune out the propaganda so that they can hear the concerns of the real India. And places on the margins, places like Sikkim also have a role to play, if not for anything else, then to hold on to its sanity and not get caught in the vortex that is sucking too many institutions and places and mindsets to their nadir.

One of the horrors revisiting the country at present is the violent enforcement of the caste structures. Sikkim, which appears to be sipping the kool-aid of saf-fron chauvinism with abandon, needs to be especially wary of this since it has still not completely erased this scar from its society. That the caste system exists comes as no surprise, but the fact that it continues to be enforced should have everyone hanging their heads in collective shame. The caste system, and let us have no one claiming in Sikkim that it is a solely Hindu construct because it's observance has infiltrated every other community, is one battle that the nation has lost; not for want of laws or quotas, but because the mindsets continue to remain insular. Here, the caste system is not observed as strictly in the towns because it is a practical impossibility in the cheek by jowl existence in such places, but in the rural belts, where human interaction and social exchanges underline survival itself, the system still holds out. It is all very fine for the townsfolk to turn up their noses in disgust and feign embarrassment, but fact remains that the system remains rooted because of the pseudo posturing and ill-informed intellects directing efforts at social reforms from the comfort of city sitting rooms. Reality checks were not taken as often and tokenism continued to stand in for grassroots initiatives. What failed in Sikkim, failed the country as well.

Barely a decade ago, Sikkim was confronted with a situation where a village on the shoulder of the capital would not allow members from the scheduled castes access to a place of worship. This, despite specific laws in place which ban such regressive practices. When ordered to open their doors for all castes, the people concerned decided instead to shut their doors to everyone on the pretext of repairs. The only agencies engaged in the reform were cops and courts. The rest of Sikkim watched from the sidelines. What is also disturbing is that victims shy away from making a more forceful enough protest and appear to have learned to live with it. It would, however, be wrong to believe that they suffer the insults willingly. They are forced to; not because the caste system is enforced, but because they are unsure of the support mechanism that can help them take on this system. They know of the laws, but what they also know is that they will have to battle these forces on their own. They have not seen enough commitment, either in their leaders or associations or in the society at large, to add a battle for self-respect to their daily grind for survival. It takes more than laws to demolish centuries-old practices, and as we are now learning as a nation, it only takes a few regressive minds to wrest some control for these demons to climb back into our lives.

Gone are the times when one could excuse those who enforce the caste system as not being necessarily evil or villainous, but just generations groomed on a different set of sensibilities. They need to be called out for their refusal to change because in our inability to do so, we are freeing the hands of fascist agencies to unleash a violence which also leaves blood on our hands. It is not okay to kow-tow to Delhi with Sawa chehta Abhiyans in the name of the Mahatma if his more important message of tolerance and amity are ignored or his position against untouchability ignored.

Memories of trauma are unique because of how brains and bodies respond to threat

M ost of what you experience leaves no trace in your memory. Learning new information often re quires a lot of effort and repetition - picture studying for a tough exam or mastering the tasks of a new job. It's easy to forget what you've learned, and recalling details of the past can sometimes be chal-

lenging.
But some past experiences can keep haunting you for years. Life-threat-ening events – things like

getting mugged or escaping from a fire – can be impossible to forget, even if you make every possible effort. Recent developments in the Supreme Court nomination hearings and the associated #WhylDidntReport action on social media have rattled the public and raised questions about the ture, role and impact of these kinds of

traumatic memories.

Leaving politics aside, what do psychiatrists and neuroscientists like me understand about how past traumas can remain present and persistent in our lives through memories?

BODIES RESPOND AUTO-MATICALLY TO THREAT

Imagine facing extreme danger, such as being held at gunpoint. Right away, your heart rate increases. Your arteries constrict, directing more blood to your muscles, which tense up in preparation for a possible life-ordeath struggle, Perspiration increases, to cool you down and improve gripping capability on palms and feet for added traction for escape. In some situations, when the threat is overwhelming, you may freeze and be unable to move.

Threat responses are often accompanied by a range of sensations and feelings. Senses may sharpen, contributing to amplified detection and response to threat. You may experience tingling or numbness in your limbs, as well as shortness of breath, chest pain, feelings of weakness, fainting or dizziness. Your thoughts may be racing or, conversely, you may experience a lack of thoughts and feel detached from reality. Terror, panic, helplessness, lack of control or chaos may take over.

These reactions are automatic and cannot be stopped once they're initiated, regardless of later feelings of guilt or shame about a lack of fight

BRAINS HAVE TWO ROUTES TO RESPOND TO DANGER

decades has made significant progress in understanding how the brain responds to threat. Defense responses are controlled by neural systems that human beings have inherited from our distant evolutionary ancestors

One of the key players is the amygdala, a structure located deep in the medial temporal lobe, one on each side of the brain. It processes sensory threat information and sends out-puts to other brain sites, such as the hypothalamus, which is responsible for the release of stress hormones, or brain stem areas, which control levels of alertness and automatic behaviors, including immobility or freezing.

Research in animals and more re-

cently in people suggests the existence of two possible routes by which the amygdala receives sensory information. The first route, called the low road. provides the amygdala with a rapid, but imprecise, signal from the sensory thalamus. This circuit is believed to be responsible for the immediate, unconscious responses to threat.

The high road is routed through the cortical sensory areas and delivers more complex and detailed representations of threat to the amygdala. Researchers believe the high road is involved in processing the aspects of threats of which a person is consciously aware.

The two-roads model explains how responses to a threat can be initiated even before you become con-sciously aware of it. The amygdala is interconnected with a network of brain areas, including the hippocampus, the prefrontal cortex and others, all of which process different aspects of defense behaviors. For example, you hear a loud, sharp bang and you momentarily freeze – this would be a low road-initiated response. You notice somebody with a gun, immediately scan your surroundings to locate a hiding spot and escape route these actions wouldn't be possible

Traumatic memories are intensely owerful and come in two varieties.

When people talk about memories, most of the time we refer to conscious or explicit memories. How-ever, the brain is capable of encoding distinct memories in parallel for the same event - some of them explicit and some implicit or unconscious.

An experimental example of implicit memories is threat condi-tioning. In the lab, a harmful stimulus such as an electric shock, which triggers innate threat responses, is paired with a neutral stimulus, such as an image, sound or smell. The brain forms a strong association be-tween the neutral stimulus and the threat response. Now this image. ound or smell acquires the ability to initiate automatic unconscious threat reactions - in the absence of the elec-

It's like Pavlov's dogs salivating when they hear the dinner bell, but these conditioned threat responses are typically formed after a single pairing between the actual threatening or harmful stimulus and a neutral stimulus, and last for life. Not surprisingly, they support survival. For example, after getting burned on a hot stove, a child will likely steer clear of the stove in order to avoid the harmful heat and pain.

Studies show that the amygdala is critical for encoding and storing associations between a harmful and neutral stimuli, and that stress hormones and mediators – such as cortisol and nor-epinephrine – play an important role in the formation of threat associations.

Researchers believe traumatic memories are a kind of conditioned threat response. For the survivor of a bike accident, the sight of a fast ap-proaching truck resembling the one that crashed into them may cause the heart to race and skin to sweat. For the survivor of a sexual assault, the sight of the perpetrator or someone who looks similar may cause trem-bling, a feeling of hopelessness and

or fight. These responses are initiated regardless of whether they come with conscious recollections of

Conscious of trauma are encoded by various sites in the brain which process different aspects of experience. Excit memories of trauma reflect the terror of the original experience may be less organized than memories acquired under less stressful conditions. Typically they're more vivid, more intense and more

persistent

AFTER THE MEMORIES ARE MADE Memories are biological pheno

and as such are dynamic. Exposure to cues that trigger the recall or retriev al of traumatic memories activates the neural systems that are storing the memories. This includes electrical activation of the neural circuits, as well as underlying intracellular

Reactivated memories are susceptible to modification. The character and direction of this modification depends on the circumstances of the person recalling the memory. Retriev-al of implicit or explicit traumatic memories is usually associated with high levels of stress. Stress horm act on the activated brain circuits and may strengthen the original memory for trauma through a phenomenon known as memory reconsolidation.

There are clinical strategies to help people heal from emotional trauma. One critical factor is the sense of safety. Retrieval of traumatic memories under safe conditions when levels of stress are relatively low and under control enables the individual to update or reorganize the trauma experience. It's possible to link the trauma to other experiences and diminish its destructive impact. Psychologists call this post-traumatic growth.

It is an ethical imperative to con sider the circumstances under which traumatic memories are recalled, whether in the course of therapy, during police investigations, court hearings or public testimonies. Re-calling trauma may be a part of the healing process or may lead to re-traumatization, persistence and continued detrimental effects from traumatic memories.

SC strikes down law on adultery; says it is unconstitutional, dents individuality of women

NEW DELHI, SEP 27 (PTI): The Supreme Court Thursday declared that adultery is not a crime and struck down the anti-adultery law, saying it was unconstitutional as it dented the individuality of omen and treated them as "chattel of husbands".

The apex court's five-judge Constitution bench

was unanimous in striking down Section 497 of the Indian Penal Code dealing with the offence of adultery and holding it as manifestly arbitrary, archaic law which is violative of the rights to equality and equal opportunity to women

Section 497 of the 158-year-old IPC says: "Whoever has sexual intercourse with a person who is and whom he knows or has reason to believe to be the wife of another man, without the consent or connivance of that man such sexual intercourse not amounting to the offence of rape, is guilty of the offence of adultery."

Adultery was punishable by a maximum five ears in jail or fine or both. A five-judge bench comprising Chief Justice Dipak

Misra and Justices R F Nariman, A M Khan wilkar, D Y Chandrachud and Indu Malho tra said that unequal treatment of women invites the wrath of the Constitution.

The top court, which held adultery

as a relic of the past, said the autonomy is intrinsic in dignified human existence and Section 497 denudes women from making choices.

The apex court pronounced four sets of concurring judgements to declare penal provision on Adultery and section 198 of CrPC dealing with prosecution of offences against marriage as unconstitu-

"We declare Section 497 IPC and Section 198 of CrPC dealing with prosecution of offences against marriage as unconstitutional," said the Chief Justice, who wrote the judgement for himself and Justice Khanwilkar, adding that any provision treating women with inequality is not constitutional and it's time to say that "husband is not the master of

Justice Malhotra, the lone woman judge on the bench, said Section 497 is clear violation of fundanental rights granted in the Constitution and there is no justification for continuation of the provision. Justice Nariman termed Section 497 as archaic

law and concurred with the CJI and Justice Khanwilkar, saying that the penal provision is violative of the rights to equality and equal opportunity to

Justice Chandrachud said Section 497 destroys and deprives women of dignity and is destructive of women's dignity, self-respect as it treats women as "chattel of husbands".

The CJI said adultery dents the individuality of women and it is not a crime in countries like China, Japan and Australia.

Adultery might not be cause of unhappy marriage, it could be result of an unhappy marriage, Justice Misra said.

The CII began reading the judgement by saving the beauty of the Constitution is that it includes "the I, me and you".

He said equality is the governing parameter of the Constitution and section 497 of the IPC is mani-festly arbitrary the way it deals with women.

The bench held that adultery can be treated as civil wrong for dissolution of marriage.

There can't be any social licence which destroys

a home, the CJI said, but added that adultery should not be a criminal offence.

The court said adultery can be a ground for civil wrong, a ground for divorce but not a criminal

Justice Chandrachud said autonomy is intrinsic in dignified human existence and Section 497 denudes women from making choic-

es and held adultery as a relic of past. Legislature has imposed a condition on sexuality of women by making adultery as offence, he said, adding that sec-

tion 497 is denial of substance of equality. The CJI and Justice Khanwilkar said

mere adultery cannot be a crime, but if any aggrieved spouse commits suicide because of life partner's adulterous relation, then if evidence is produced, it could be treated as an abetment to

Homestays set to play significant role in travel mart



KOLKATA, SEPT 27 (PTI): Homestays will grow and play a significant role in tourism as the country's travel market is projected to grow at an annual rate of 11-11.5 per cent to USD 48 billion by 2020, a consultant said.

"There is no doubt that the country's hospitality industry must diversify its offerings to keep up with this exponential growth and tap its poten-tial. Alternative accommodations such as homestays - which currently occupy only a small section of the market - will grow in stature and play a significant role," Anarock Property Consultants Chairman Anui Puri said Thursday

The country witnessed 15.6 per cent annual increase in foreign tourist arrivals in calendar year 2017 as against the previous year.

"Homestays are indisputably one

of the means to cater to growing demand. Rising disposable incomes, focused government measures to boost the travel industry and the growing appetite for travel is accelerating this growth," Puri said without giving any number of homestays now

As per the government data, the country will need more than 2.5 million rooms across the hospitality industry to meet the snowballing demand by 2020. In its efforts to bridge the growing demand-supply gap, the union government has provided several incentives to home stays, the consultant said.

The government has also relaxed the licensing rules for people seeking to convert their property into certified homestays and is developing a centralised data base. It is also urg-ing the state governments to exempt homestays from service taxes and levies including water charges, electricity and other commercial charges to attract more homeowners to convert their property into homestays, Puri

Simultaneously, it is working with on line aggregators like Airbnb that list home stay property and introduce guest houses and bed-and-breakfast

Final of any tournament is a one-off game in complete isolation from how a team has performed in the tournament Even the most consistent teams have slipped on the proverbial banana peel when it has mattered the most.

Add to this the fact that the Indo-Bangla cricketing rivalry has

grown in intensity.

But what is definitely a dampener for Bangladesh heading into the final is the injury woes that the side is facing.

Star batsman Tamim Iqbal is already out with a fractured hand and Bangladesh will also not have premier all-rounder Shakib-Al-



Hasan in the line-up owing to a

finger injury.

He is expected to undergo surgery which will also force him out of the home series against Zimba-bwe starting September 30.

For India, it will be a different test though.

A victory in the Asia Cup without their skipper and best batsman Virat Kohli will be a big statement going into next year's World Cup.

Not to forget, the Asia Cup tro-phy will be a healing touch after 1-4 Test series defeat in England.

The team's exploits in shorter

formats have always successfully papered over the deficiencies when it comes to playing quality five-day cricket in adverse conditions.

An Asia Cup triumph can partially divert attention from the England debacle.

RBI eases cash reserve rules to ease liquidity

MUMBAI, SEP 27 (PTI): The Reserve Bank of India Thursday allowed banks to dip further into statutory cash reserves in a bid to ease a liquidity squeeze afflicting the nation's money markets.

RBI in a statement

said banks could 'carve out' up to 15 per cent of holdings under the statutory liquidity reserves to meet their liquidity coverage ratio (LCR) requirements as compared to 13 per cent now.

This resulted from a

rise in the facility to avail funds for LCR to 13 per cent from 11 per cent, effective October 1, RBI said in a statement.

The move by the cen-

tral bank follows concerns over tight liquidity conditions and banks unwillingness to lend to NBFCs

RBI said it "stands ready to meet the durable liquidity requirements of the system through various available instruments depending on its dynamic assessment of the evolving liquidity and market conditions."

Citing proactive steps taken in the last few days, RBI said it conducted open market operation (OMO) on September 19 and provided a liberal infusion of liquidity through term repos in addition to the usual provision via the liquidity adjustment

facility (LAF).

It further said that another OMO will be conducted Thursday to ensure adequate liquidity in the system.

As of September 26, banks had availed of Rs 1.88 lakh crore through term repos from the Reserve Bank, the apex bank said in a statement.

"As a result of these steps, the system liquidity is in ample surplus," it said.

Saina sails into Korea Open quarterfinals

Religion and fashion can go together: Mariam Farid

Doнa, Sept 27 (PTI): Leading Qatari woman athlete Mariam Farid, who competes wearing a hijab, says she would never compromise on her identity but would not mind blending a bit of fashion with religion.

At a young age of 15, Mariam had played a signifi-

cant role in Qatar winning the bid in November 2014 to host its first ever IAAF World Championships.

As Qatar's ambassador, she had delivered an emotional speech, convincing the panel to accept their bid which emphasised on breaking barriers and changing the western world's perception about the Arab world.

Four years after that successful bid, Mariam is now preparing herself to deliver on the promise when Doha will host the Championships next year.

She is aiming to produce a strong show in the

"In the beginning, I used to wear a long shirt and then a short shirt but now I try to find something easier and comfortable. It's (Hijab) not going to make me less faster. Even if it slows me down, it is, what makes me comfortable, this is my identity. It should not bother anyone," said Mariam.

To prove her point that running with her body cov ered, won't compromise her speed, she cites example of Australian athlete Cathie Freeman, who became the women's 400m Olympic champion in 2000 while run-

ning with full body-kit, her arms and head covered.

And she is not the only one who wears hijab. In 2016, when Kariman Abuljadayel became the first Saudi woman to compete in the 100 metres at the Rio Games, she also wore full body-kit.

However, Mariam would like to modify the hijab, a must for women in many Islamic countries. Maybe 10 years down the line when she is done with athletics career, she wants to manufacture hijabs that would complement the beauty of a woman.

"I want to start my own business, which helps



in empowering and inspiring younger generation of women. None of the brands are appreciating women wearing hijab in sports. It will be a good idea to open

doors," she said. "Recently Nike gave me a hijab. Whatever it is, but looks bad (laughs). We need brands like Nike and didas to do (design) something beautiful for us."

So how different the hijab, she wants to introduce, would be from the one worn now?

"Beautiful. I should not look awkward. Just because I am wearing a scarf, it should not make me look

less beautiful. It should be fashionable. Of course, religion and fashion can go together." Coming from a family of seven, which has five doc-

rs, Mariam says she does not feel pressure to perform before the home fans.

"A champion is not made in one day or one year. It takes years. I started three-four years back. I don't feel pressure. One year to go, nothing is impossible.' When Mariam, all of 20 and without a major med-

al in her kitty, says that she is her own role model, the Qatari may sound cocky.

However, the strong-willed hurdler says it is important to be confident because If you are not, people

around you will try to break you.
"Not everyone wants to see you happy. Majority would want see you fail. I don't want to sound arrogant but I am my own role model. I feel I can do whatever I want to do. I have my own goals and passion,

What makes her so confident at such a young age? That's my character. I don't accept people telling me that I can't do this or that," said the communications student at Northwestern University in Doha

Supremely-confident Mariam, coached by Tunsian Awatef Hamrouni, admits that she has flaws too.

"I am not patient enough. This part is killing me. Coach says it will take lot of time (to do well in big championships). I am confident, one day, I will do something big.

"400m hurdles is easy to succeed fast. I am tall and

it helps me to jump easily. Jumping the hurdle is break for me from running. So I have a break at every 10 hurdles, It's easy for me."

She also insists that the Arab world is not how the West looks at it.

"Western world have this stereotype that we don't do sport. We (women) sit at home, we are not allowed to move outside. It's a perception and its wrong. Yes, it was not in our culture, 15-20 years ago but now we have strong teams, where a lot of girls are playing, e said adding that they do train with boys too.

Mariam says hosting World Championship will

break a lot of stereotypes.

"It's very powerful message to the Arab world, to the Muslims and to the people in this region, that we are not less than anyone. No one could imagine that a small country like Qatar could host world championships.

China slams US B-52s fly over disputed seas as 'provocative'

BEIJING, SEP 27 (AFP): The Chinese defence ministry on Thursday denounced flyovers by US B-52 bombers over the South China Sea and East China Sea as "provocative" actions amid soaring tensions between the two global powers.

The Pentagon said Wednesday the heavy bombers had taken part in a combined operation with Japan over the East China Sea and had flown through international airspace over the South China Sea a day before.

"Regarding the provocative actions of US military aircraft in the South China Sea, we are always resolutely opposed to them, and will continue to take necessary measures in order to strongly handle (this issue)," Chinese defence ministry spokesman Ren Guoqiang told a monthly news briefing.

China has claimed large swaths of the strategic waterway and built up a series of islands and maritime features, turning them into military facilities. Brunei, Malaysia, the Philip-

Brunei, Malaysia, the Philippines, Taiwan and Vietnam have competing claims to the region, and an international maritime tribunal ruled in 2016 that China's claims have no legal basis.

Pentagon spokesman Lieutenant Colonel Dave Eastburn said this week's flights were part of "regularly scheduled operations."

The United States rejects China's territorial claims and

routinely says the military will "continue to fly, sail and operate wherever international law allows at times and places of our choosing."

Washington this week enacted new tariffs against China covering another USD 200 billion of its imports while it last week sanctioned a Chinese military organisation for buying Russian

weapons.

China has reacted angrily, and this week scrapped a US warship's planned port visit to Hong Kong and cancelled a meeting between the head of the Chinese navy and his American counterpart.

US Defence Secretary Jim Mattis said he was not con-

cerned the US transit flights would increase tensions with

"If it was 20 years ago and they have not militarised those features there, it would have just been another bomber on its way to Diego Garcia or whatever," he told Pentagon reporters, referring to the US military base in the Indian Ocean.

"So there's nothing out of the ordinary about it, nor about our ships sailing through there."

The Pentagon chief went on

The Pentagon chief went on to say there is no "fundamental shift in anything." "We're just going through

"We're just going through one of those periodic points where we've got to learn to manage our differences," he said.

Maldives opposition seeks foreign help for transition

COLOMBO, SEP 27 (AFP):

The Maldivian opposition appealed to the international community Thursday to help ensure a peaceful transition of power amid fears that strongman Abdulla Yameen may cling onto power despite his shock election defeat.

The joint opposition, which includes four political parties that successfully put forward the little-known Ibrahim Mohamed Solih at Sunday's vote, called for external help to re-establish democracy in the tiny Indian Ocean archipelago.

"In this regard, we look towards our friends and partners in the international community to assist us, as we move forward in trying to create a Maldives in which all citizens can enjoy peace, prosperity and justice,"



statement.

It did not say what form of assistance was requested, but opposition sources said they were looking for strong foreign warnings to Yameen to go quietly.

The statement came hours after the country's military chief and the head of police issued veiled warnings on television against Yameen trying to cling onto power.

Yameen decisively lost Sunday's election, despite all his main rivals being in prison or in exile, sparse media coverage of the opposition, and monitors and the opposition predicting vote-rigging. Formal results will be

announced by the election commission on Sunday and Yameen -- who on Monday conceded defeat -- must hand over power to successor Solih on November 17 at the end of his five-year term.

end of his five-year term.
But rumours have abounded on social media and elsewhere that Yameen could file an election seeking the delay of the announcement.

of the announcement.

This prompted military chief Major General

Ahmed Shiyam to appear on a private TV channel on Wednesday night promising the results would be honoured.

"The people have spoken," Shiyam said. "I want to assure the Maldivian people that the military will protect the will of the people."

will of the people."

Election commission chief Ahmed Shareef confirmed that Yameen's party has lodged several complaints of suspected voting irregularities.

voting irregularities.

"We will look into these concerns," Shareef said.

But he added that there were no grounds for him to delay the announcement of the formal results.

On Wednesday, the opposition accused Yameen of delaying the release of high-profile political prisoners despite calls by Solih for their

release.

Shortly after his shock defeat, Yameen freed five prisoners.

But scores of others
-- including Maumoon
Abdul Gayoom, his estranged half-brother and
former president -- remain incarcerated.

There was no immediate comment from the government.

Yameen jailed or exiled most of his rivals during his turbulent five-year term.

Suspecting a plot to impeach him, in February Yameen declared a state of emergency and arrested top judges as well as political opponents.

Yameen's rule dented

Yameen's rule dented its image as a honeymoon paradise and attracted alarm abroad -- both the US and the EU had threatened financial sanctions unless the democratic situation improved.

California almonds bloom after going 'nuts' due to drought

MODESTO (CALIFORNIA) SEP 27 (PTI): California almonds, which cater to about 80 per cent of the global demand, have fully recovered from a four-year drought that ended in 2016, with the harvest returning to record levels this year, according to growers and promotars of the recilions response.

ers of the resilient crop.

Almonds are becoming more important to California and to consumers worldwide, who are eating more of the tree nut per capita than ever, amidst criticism for the crop's extensive water usage.

Fuelling the boom is robust

Fuelling the boom is robust foreign demand, particularly from markets like India and China, where the industry has been promoting almonds as a healthful snack.

The state harvested an estimated 1.85 billion pounds of shelled almonds in 2013-14, which was slightly less than the 1.88 billion pounds in 2012-13, according to the Almond Board of California (ABC).

However, after dropping during the drought, the 2017 almond crop rebounded to a record 2.14 billion pounds of shelled nuts, the board said.

"California almond orchards spread over 1.33 million acres in 2017, spanning 500 miles. 2018 forecast for almond production is 2.45 billion pounds, on 1.07 million bearing acres," said Richard Waycot, President and CEO, ABC.

"The world tree nut production is 4,187,108 metric tonnes and almonds form about 30 per cent of the total nut production followed by walnuts at over 20 per cent," he said.

With 6,800 groupers and 101

With 6,800 growers and 101 processors, the board said, almonds form California's top valued agricultural export and number one US specialty crop export.

California's Central Valley has



mild winters and abundant sunshine which makes it the perfect place to grow almonds.

Harvest begins in August and ends in mid-October before winter rains begin. Almond varieties are harvested separately, meaning the harvest process occurs 2-3 times.

Winter rains in the valley and snow-melt from the surrounding mountains replenish the ground-water annually to some extent, but drought has parched the valley since 2011.

There is a robust system in place where growers can bring water from mountains full of snow, said Danielle Veenstra, Manager, Reputation Management & Sustainability Communications at ABC.

Almond-picking is also a highly mechanised process, which attracts farmers concerned about migrant-worker labour shortages, and its long history in the state creates a level of expertise competitors can not match.

Veenstra said that over the past 20 years, almond farmers have improved their water use efficiency by 33 per cent, producing more crop per drop.

She said 87 per cent of farmers practice demand-based irrigation instead of using a fixed schedule.

Almond farmers, said Veenstra, use efficient micro-sprinkler or drip irrigation at nearly two times the rate of farmers state-wide.

"To help sustain groundwater levels, almond farmers and researchers are experimenting with flooding orchards in the winter to recharge underground aquifers," she said.

Before the drought, the big

Before the drought, the big concern for almonds was the supply of pollinators.

ply of pollinators.


Honeybees began dying in alarming numbers in 2006 due to a phenomenon named Colony Collapse Disorder. Millions of bees mysteriously disappeared, leaving farms with fewer pollinators for crops.


Explanations for the phenom-

Explanations for the phenomenon have included exposure to pesticides or antibiotics, habitat loss and bacterial infections.

Beehives are now more expensive as permanently higher death rates require faster replacement of hives, said a grower who works in an almond farm near Modesto.

However, almond demand has given growers incentive to pay more for bees that are trucked in from across the US to help pollinate trees, with the crop being the single biggest user of commercial pollination services.

The actor said she wants to spread a message through her story so that other women
