## CS assault case: Kejriwal, Sisodia among 13 AAP MLAs chargesheeted

today named Chief Min-ister Arvind Kejriwal and his deputy Manish Sisodia as accused in its charge sheet in connection with the alleged assault on Chief Secretary Anshu Prakash in February.

The charge sheet, which was filed before Additional Chief Metropolitan Magistrate Samar Vishal, has also named as accused 11 legislators of the Aam Aadmi Paror the Aam Aadmi Par-ty -- Amanatullah Khan, Prakash Jarwal, Nitin Tyagi, Rituraj Govind, Sanjeev Jha, Ajay Dutt, Rajesh Rishi, Rajesh Gupta. Madan Lal. Parve Kumar and Dinesh Mohania.

In its around 1,300 page charge sheet, the police has alleged that Kejriwal, Sisodia and others had criminally conspired to threaten the Chief Secretary of death or grievous hurt, obstructed him in discharging his public function and caused hurt.

AAP leaders of other of fences punishable under sections of IPC, including wrongfully confining any person, assaulting or us-ing criminal force to deter public servant from discharge of duty, insulting him to provoke breach of peace and abetment of

peace and abetment of the offence.

They were also charge sheeted for of-fence committed under section 149, which says if an offence is committed by any member of an unlawful assembly, every other member of such assembly shall be held guilty of the offence.

The court has put up the charge sheet for consideration on August 25. If convicted, the accused may get a maximum of seven year jail term.

The Delhi Police had on May 18 questioned Kejriwal for over three hours in connection with the alleged assault on Prakash.

Hindi conference.


In keeping with past practice,

opposition parties. He never addresses opposition parties in proper language."

He also alleged the ruling party of implementing separate rules for the opposition parties during rallies and political meetings.

The SKM president strongly opposed the decision of the State Government to provide 5th Pay Commission arrears from 01 Jan, 2017, instead of 2016.

"Government employees have not re-ceived their 5th Pay Commission pay scale and they are aggrieved by the decision of arrears to be provided from 01 Jan, 2017. This is not acceptable. We demand that the government pay arrears from 01 Jan, 2016 itself. The arrears should be paid in one go and not in three installments. If the government does not immediately pay their arrears, SKM will sit on a fast-unto-death hunger-strike. We will make sure that government employees receive their arrears from 01 Jan, 2016 along with revised pay scale when SKM comes to power," he said.

The SKM president also commented on the CM's announcement with regard to provision of employment in MR/ adhoc basis to

one member of each unemployed family.

"It was our party's agenda of one family-one job programme which was lifted by SDF but we had also said that we will pro-vide regular employment and not on MR/ adhoc basis to each family. What SDF will do is terminate those who have been provided with MR/adhoc jobs after elections just like they gave fake housing scheme allotment orders before the 2014 elections. The State Government must issue a notification immediately on its employment announcement so that services of such persons are not terminated after the 2019 elections," Mr Tamang

He further alleged that the State Government has regularized services of MR employees but is handing over appointment orders only after demoting them to lower posts.

"The MR workers should be regularised on the posts they were working in. Home Guards should also be regularised after five years of service like the MR workers. They should not be posted as chowkidars. They know about police processes and should be regularised in police service itself," he said. He added that Mr Chamling had an-

nounced abolishment of labour contract system on Labour Day earlier this year but notifications on the same has not been is-

"The State Government must immediately abolish labour contract system. Only those close to the SDF government are ben-efiting from factories, hydel power projects and pharma companies set up in Sikkim. Buses and trucks are hired in large numbers by these factories and hydel projects. The truth is that all these buses and trucks are owned by MLAs, ministers and persons close to them. The government should have sponsored buses and trucks for the unemployed youths to help them earn a livelihe stated.

Mr Tamang also challenged the SDF government to bring a resolution in Sikkim Legislative Assembly for reservation of Nepali seats under provisions of Article 371F. He stressed that the resolution will have full support of SKM if it is passed and sent to the

Addressing the Organic Mission of the State, Mr Golay expressed, "We are not against Organic Mission but it should be properly implemented. Farmers and consumers should not suffer due to this mis-

Let people choose what they want to eat. If the State Government is that dedicated to the mission, it should start making arrangements for export of organic vegetables so that the farmers of Sikkim can earn even

more."

Mr Tamang also criticised the SDF government for failing in every sector including

health and education.

"We challenge SDF to have an open debate with us on any subject at Paljor Stadium in front of people. I am least concerned about whether I can contest the 2019 elections or not. Let the Election Commission of India decide on this. We have thousands of candidates ready for the elections. I did not revolt against SDF with the intention to become the CM. Either as a captain or a coach, we are ready to enter the ground and emerge victorious," he concluded.

Sharing his experience during his year imprisonment in Rongneck Jail, Mr Golay said that he had developed gall bladder stones before going to jail and his family had approached the court to get an order for his

"The State Government wanted me to undergo treatment at Vendanta or AIIMS. I knew it was a conspiracy so I gave an un-dertaking refusing treatment at Vendanta or AIIMS due to threat to my life and went back to jail. The pain was chronic sometimes but I tolerated the pain for the people of Sikkim," he said.

"I ate the jail food and did other things

### Six climbers, crew rescued in Tajikistan chopper accident

DUSHANBE, AUG 13 (AFP): Six climbers and a crew member were rescued from the site of a helicopter accident in a remote mountainous region of Tajikistan while nine others remain miss ing after a "hard landing' emergency services said.

The Tajik Committee for Emergency Situations told AFP that a rescue helicopter reached the site in the east of the country and brought back the first group of six mountain-eers and a crew member of the Mi-8 accident.

"Some of the climbers suffered injuries. They are receiving help," the

committee said.

It added that two other rescue helicopters were on their way to the site, around 300 kilometres east of the capital Dushanbe.

Earlier authorities said 16 people were feared dead in the acci-dent that took place yes-terday at 1130 GMT, the committee said and two helicopters were sent on a rescue and recovery mission to the crash site

The emergency committee said the group had been climbing the Ismoili Somoni mountain that was once known as Peak Com munism and was the high-est in the Soviet Union.

The statement did

not identify the climbers or the crew.

The accident comes two weeks after four Western cyclist tourists were killed in an attack initially reported as a hitand-run road accident, striking a blow to the country's emerging tourism sector.

The attack that saw the tourists rammed with a car before being attacked with knives was claimed by the Islamic State group, although the authoritarian govern-ment refused to acknowledge the group's claim.



It takes years of close dialogue and interaction to develop even a reasonable understanding of what shapes another's culture. If this statement were true, then one would expect social and socioeconomic in-terventions - which by definition aim to change the environment or behaviour of people - to be based on a deep understanding of the 'stakeholders'/ 'beneficiaries'. Of course, that does not always happen, but should at least be attempted.

Unfortunately, more and more such projects are conceived, planned and even executed from a distance. In our country, schemes and projects are invariably designed with the "bottleneck approach". Developmental analysts look for the bottleneck which is blocking their version of development from reaching the people and then try and ease the bottleneck. That is kind of like allopathy in targeting the symptoms instead of the ailment. Look around, a host of national flagship programmes float on this model and a sizeable number of community-specific demands and promises also mirror similar sentiments.

When it comes to what the Primitive Tribe Welfare Board could achieve for the Lepchas of Sikkim, they need to learn from an old intervention which has de livered only limited returns (and this might be highly contentious) – the system of a quota for every ill. Analysts, when India got Independence, racked their brains on why the adivasis were not assimilating into the mainstream faster. Lack of education and opportunities was the obvious answer. So a quick-fire solution was worked out - reservation.

And sure enough many tribals started getting into premier institutes, some even completing their courses and going on to land plum jobs. Exulted with the results, the planners forgot part-b of the original plan - improving infrastructure in tribal areas. Education in the remote regions remains dismal and the system of reservation keeps getting extended. The fact that 71 years on, reservation still not only exists but now includes even more communities is proof that the magic formula was not all that it was made out to be.

What appears scary at this juncture, especially for Sikkim, is that the same formula continues to be applied and the same oversights continue. As things stand, all that the primitive tribe status has secured is an additional 5% reservation in higher education for the Lepchas, and while this access to exclusive quota in education is welcome, the next step needs to be taken and better educational infrastructure for the community created in their midst. And this is only one aspect of what can be attempted.

The welfare board for primitive tribes should begin its recommendations by proposing interventions beyond quotas; the Board should direct the creation of more, better and more relevant infrastructure for the community at every level whether they are at the school education level or skill development interventions or improved access to them. The scholarship for students from North Sikkim at Tashi Namgyal Academy has delivered a handsome crop of achievers. Imagine what could happen if such an institution was estab-lished in Dzongu itself! How many more futures could have been collectively improved? And it is never too late to attempt something on these lines. If the initiative was made a collaborative effort of the community, many more intangible benefits could also manifest. And that is the kind of role the Primitive Tribe Welfare Board should conceive and chaperone to completion...

# The Taj Mahal is wasting away, and it may soon hit the point of no return

The saying goes that the Taj Mahal The saying goes that the ..., is pinkish in the morning, milky white in the evening, and golden when the moon shines. Though this may once have been true for the famously pristine marble monument, a mix-ture of pollution and poor management has now burdened the Tai with a 24-hour layer of yellowy-brown. Condemning the "lethargy" of restoration efforts, India's Supreme Court recently told the government to restore the Taj or demolish it.

Located in Agra, in the northern Indian state of Uttar Pradesh, the Taj Mahal is one of the most iconically beautiful buildings in the world. Built by Mughal Emperor Shah Jahan as a testament to his grief, following the death of his first wife Mumtaz Mahal, Rabindranath Tagore called it "a tear running down the cheek of time"

The Taj was constructed of trans-ucent white marble, brought to Agra from the north-west Indian region of Rajasthan. It was then inlaid with semiprecious stones, including jas-per, jade, turquoise, lapis lazuli, sapphire and carnelian. The whole river-side complex, including the gardens and surrounding sandstone walls, was finished in 1653.

#### A MAUSOLEUM IN NEED OF NEW LIFE

Over the last four centuries the Taj has aged and darkened as a result of natural oxidation processes - the marble equivalent of rust - but it has been given no help by its hostile surroundings. It has been drenched in acid rain, coated in soot from in-dustrial and domestic chimneys, and

eroded by atmospheric pollutants.

Air pollution in Indian cities is legendary, and Agra is no exception. As in many Asian cities, increasing car ownership has caused traffic to surge, while dirty air seeps from Agra's oil refinery and tannery chim-neys. These pollutants – sulphur dioxide, Nox gases, and mainly car-bon-based particulates – have steadi-ly weathered and eroded the Taj's brilliant white facade, giving it a vellow sheen. Despite the establishment of a 4,000 square mile protective area



around the site, (the Taj Trapezium Zone), within which emissions are supposedly strictly controlled, photographs show a marked deter in the Taj's condition over the last few

Legal emission limits have been long contested by developers, and are widely ignored. Smoky funeral pyres are lit, and piles of rubbish are regularly burned very close to the buildings, Pollution from the Yamuna River presents a further challenge. Untreated sewage and industrial waste pours in from the city, creating nutrient-rich waters. These nutrients are then picked up by the wind and deposited in the Taj's increasingly porous stonework, allowing river-derived microorganisms to thrive on its

surfaces, colouring them green.
Allegedly, excrement from the many insects that thrive in the contaminated river water has hastened the damage, but the effect is surely negligible compared to that of fossil fuel-derived sulphur dioxide and ni-trogen dioxide.

Since 1998, a range of Indian research institutes have explored res-toration methods, and millions have been spent trying to reverse the dis-colouration. One attempt involved smothering the Taj with damp clay poultices similar to face packs. It was hoped they would draw the damag-ing acids out of the surface layers of narble, but, if anything, they seem to

#### A TEMPLATE FOR RENEWAL

In London, some 50 years after the completion of the Taj Mahal, Sir Christopher Wren designed a struc-ture of comparable ambition. St Paul's Cathedral was finished around 1711, a resting place for the nation's great and good, and was built from the light-coloured, calcerous rock, Portland Stone.

St Paul's has suffered many of the same problems as the Taj Mahal acid rain, soot, atmospheric pollut-nts, darkening with age. But after 40 years of monitoring by teams of university geographers, employing scientific techniques such as repeat-ed observation with microerosion meters, the extent of the weathering is far better understood

Older British readers may recall the infamous smogs that engulfed Britain's cities in the 1940s and 50s. Four hundred years of coal-powered domestic heating, and latterly the fumes emanating from vehicles and coal-fired power stations, allowed sulphur dioxide and fine particles of carbon to reach toxic levels in London's air.

On cold, still autumn evenings, dense chemical smog can do as much damage to calcerous or chalky stone as it can to people's lungs. Combined with rainfall it creates weak sulphuric or nitric acid, which over centuries can erode calcareous stone. When St. Paul's was closely examined in the 1980s, some of the parapets and carvings had crumbled away completely leaving stone surfaces held together by black sooty crusts, hiding the voids beneath.

The worst excesses of soot and sulphur dioxide have been curbed by environmental legislation, though the atmospheric nitrogen produced by traffic, particularly diesel vehi-cles, still causes problems. Like Agra, London regularly breaks the World Health Organisation limits on air pol-

However, the rate of weathering on St Paul's seems to have halved with the fall in atmospheric sulphur dioxide. Concerns remain over mi-croflora growing on stone surfaces, but sensitive cleaning and the odd replacement stone have largely pro-tected Wren's legacy. It remains to be seen whether the Taj can be similarly restored.

The Taj Mahal is a wonder of the modern world, but this national and international treasure needs swift and decisive action if it is not to lose its legendary lustre.

# Climate change and wildfires – how do we know if there is a link?

Once again, the summer of 2018 in the Northern Hemisphere has brought us an epidemic of major wildfires.

These burn forests, houses

and other structures, displace thousands of people and animals, and cause major disruptions in people's lives. The huge burden of simply firefighting has become a year-round task costing billions of dollars, let alone the cost of the de struction. The smoke veil can extend hundreds or even thousands of miles, affecting air quality and visibility. To many people, it has be-come very clear that human-induced climate change plays a major role by greatly increasing the risk of wildfire.

Yet it seems the role of climate change is seldom mentioned in many or even most news stories about the multitude of fires and heat waves. In part this is because the issue of attribution is not usually clear. The argument is that there have always been wildfires, and how can we attribute any particular wildfire to climate

As a climate scientist, I can say this is the wrong framing of the problem. Global warming does not cause wildfires. The proximate cause is often human carelessness (cigarette butts, camp fires not extinguished properly, etc.), or natural, from "dry lightning" whereby a thunderstorm produces lightning but little rain. Rather, global warming exacerbates the conditions and raises the risk of wildfire.

Even so, there is huge complexity and variability from one fire to the next, and hence the attribution can become complex. Instead, the way to think about this is from the standpoint of basic science - in this case,



GLOBAL WARMING IS HAPPENING

To understand the interplay between global warming and wildfires, consider what's happening to our planet.

The composition of the atmosphere is changing from human activities: There has been over a 40 percent increase in carbon dioxide, mainly from fossil fuel burning since the 1800s, and over half of the in-crease is since 1985. Other heat-trapping gases (methane, nitrous oxide, etc.) are also increasing in concentration in the atmosphere from human activities. The rates are accelerating, not declining (as hoped for with the Paris agreement).

This leads to an energy imbalance for the planet.

Heat-trapping gases in the atmosphere act as a blanket and inhibit the infrared radiation – that is, heat from the Earth - from escaping back into space to offset the continual ra-diation coming from the sun. As these gases build up, more of this energy, mostly in the form of heat, remains in our atmosphere. The energy raises the temperature of the land, oceans and atmosphere, melts ice, thaws permafrost, and fuels the water cycle

through evaporation

Moreover, we can estimate Earth's energy imbalance quite well: It amounts to about 1 watt per square meter, or about 500 terawatts glob-

While this factor is small compared with the natural flow of ener gy through the system, which is 240 watts per square meter, it is large compared with all other direct effects of human activities. For instance, the electrical power generation in the U.S. last year averaged 0.46 terawatts.

The extra heat is always the same sign and it is spread across the globe. Accordingly, where this energy accumulates matters.

#### TRACKING THE EARTH'S ENERGY IMBALANCE

The heat mostly accumulates ultimately in the ocean – over 90 percent. This added heat means the ocean expands and sea level rises.

Heat also accumulates in melting ice, causing melting Arctic sea ice and glacier losses in Greenland and Antarctica. This adds water to the ocean and so the sea level rises from this as well, rising at a rate of over 3 milimeters year, or over a foot per century.

On land, the effects of the ener

gy imbalance are complicated by water. If water is present, the heat mainly goes into evaporation and drying, and that feeds moisture into storms, which produce heavier rain. But the effects do not ac-cumulate provided that it rains on and off.

However, in a dry spell or drought, the heat accumulates. Firstly, it dries things out, and then secondly it raises temperatures. Of course, "it never rains in southern California" according to the 1970s pop song, at least in the summer half year.

So water acts as the air conditioner of the planet. In the absence of water, the excess heat effects accumulate on land both by drying everything out and wilting plants, and by raising temperatures. In turn, this leads to heat waves and increased risk of wildfire. These factors apply in regions in the western U.S. and in ns with Mediterranean climates Indeed many of the recent wildfires have occurred not only in the West in the United States, but also in Portu gal, Spain, Greece, and other parts of the Mediterranean.

The conditions can also develop in other parts of the world when strong high pressure weather domes (anticyclones) stagnate, as can happen in part by chance, or with increased odds in some weather patterns such as those established by either La Niña or El Niño events (in different places). It is expected that these dry spots move around from year to year, but that their abundance increases over

time, as is clearly happening.

How big is the energy imbalance effect over land? Well, 1 Watt per square meter over a month, if accumulated, is equivalent to 720 Watts

# Communist veteran Somnath Chatterjee passes away

KOLKATA/NEW DELHI, AUG 13 (PTI): Communist veteran and former Lok Sabha Speaker Somnath Chatterjee passed away at a private hospital here this

morning following multiple organ failure. He was 89.

The 10-time Lok Sabha MP is survived by his wife Renu, a son and two daughters.

Chatterjee passed away around 8.15 am after his condition deteriorated following a mild heart attack yesterday, a hospital official said.

"He suffered multiple organ failure and had stopped responding to treatment late last night," the official told PTI.

His body was taken to the state Assembly, where it was accorded a gun salute, and then to his residence.

Chatterjee, who was associated with the Communist Party of India-Marxist for most of his life, had do-nated his body to medical science.

It will be handed over to the government-run

SSKM hospital later in the day. He had suffered a cardiac arrest, systemic sepsis and renal failure along with respiratory problems and underlying diabetes, said a senior doctor, who was treating him.

Chatterjee suffered a mild heart attack yesterday morning but was

The former speaker had suffered a haemorrhagic stroke last month.

Known as a 'Bhadralok (gentle man) Communist' like his mentor Jyoti Basu, Chatterjee had been under treatment for the past 40 days. He was discharged from hospital just for three days after his health had shown signs of improvement.

However, his condition deteriorated last Tuesday



and he had to be hospitalised again, the hospital official said.

Leaders across party lines condoled the death of Chatterjee, describing him as an outstanding parliamentarian who enriched Indian

Condoling his death, Prime Minister Narendra Modi said he was a stalwart of Indian politics.

"He made our parliamentary democracy richer and was a strong voice for the well-being of the poor and vul-nerable," the prime minister said.

Congress President Rahul Gandhi said Chatterjee was an institution who was greatly respected and admired by all parliamentarians across party lines.

"He was a remarkable human being, an eminent

parliamentarian and a very clear headed speaker of the Lok Sabha. I convey my heartfelt condo the bereaved family," said former vice president M Ha-

mid Ansari in a condolence message.

Recalling her long association with Chatterjee, Lok Sabha Speaker Sumitra Mahajan said he was from a different ideology, but was always kind to her.

"I have been observing Somnath da from the very

first day I entered Parliament and learnt a lot from him. He was a big brother to me," Mahajan told reporters.

She added that Chatterjee's tenure as the Lok

Sabha speaker was a guide for her and he had estab-lished that the speaker's post was above politics by refusing to step down from his position.

Chatterjee, who was speaker of the Lok Sabha from 2004 to 2009, was expelled from the CPI(M) in 2008 for refusing to resign as speaker after his party withdrew support to the UPA-I government.

## If you want Olympic medal, you have to provide facilities accordingly: Vinesh

New Delhi, Aug 12 (PTI): Vinesh Phogat says India expects Olympic medals from its wrestlers but the grapplers do not have access to world class facilities required to produce such champions, though there has been "slight improve-

ment" in training conditions.

The 23-year old Vinesh from Haryana is in good form, having won gold medals at the Commo wealth Games and Grand Prix of Spain ahead of the Asian Games.

She was part of the national camp in Lucknow but revealed that she had to skip sessions because it was hot in the training hall and intense practice could have caused an injury.

"We have Asian Games now and then World Championship is also approaching but things still stand where it was before. Food quality (at training Centres) has got better but lot of things need to

be changed.
"If you want an Olympic medal, you have to provide matching facilities too. We train irrespective



of the conditions but it affects recovery and becomes a cause of injuries. The wrestling hall (in Lucdespite it being a rainy season. "We were sweating a lot and it affects your recovery.I started feel-

there is no electricity. And I had to skip training sometimes. But what do we do?," Vinesh said.

Vinesh though was not highly

right.

"They also try their best but wrestling has changed a lot. Young wrestlers who have retired recently, should come into coaching. Like, If I return to wrestling as a coach after 10 years, I will prove to be a much better coach.

"So when seniors and young coaches will work together, it will give better results. I need a coach who can work 24 hours with me. They can't focus on each athlete.'

Vinesh said the competition in Jakarta will be as tough as the Olympics.
"There is a Japanese Olympic

champion and Chinese Olympic bronze medallist in the field. It is going to be tough and I have devised a strategy according to each of my opponent," she added.

# Koepka holds off Woods to win 100th PGA Championship

St. Louis, Aug 13 (AFP): Brooks Koepka held off dramatic challenges from Tiger Woods and Adam Scott in a thrilling nine battle Sunday to win the 100th PGA Championship.

The 28-year-old two-time US Open champion sealed his third major title by firing a four-un-der-par 66 to finish 72 holes on 16-under 264, edging Woods by two strokes at Bellerive Country Club with Australia's Scott an other shot adrift.

"To do this is truly incredible," Koepka said.

As Woods electrified spec-

tators by displaying the form that made him a 14-time major champion, American rival Koep ka stayed calm and persevered under intense pressure to claim the Wanamaker Trophy and a top prize of 1.98 million (1.73 million euros).

"I heard all the roars when Tiger made his run," Koepka

aid. "It was fun. It made it enjovable.

"It's my focus. For some reason the majors get my attention. When you're firing at flags you have to be calm and focus on every shot." Deadlocked for the lead with Scott -- who began the back nine with three birdies in four holes -- and only one stroke ahead of Woods, Koepka sank a 10-foot birdie putt at the par-4 15th and a six-foot birdie putt



the last two holes to secure the

'I missed putts on 14 and 15 and Brooks didn't and my mo-mentum was gone," Scott said. "I'm definitely playing better and in the right direction and that's a positive."

Woods, who hasn't won a major title since the 2008 US Open and hasn't won any title in five years, proved he is a legitimate major title contender once again at age 42 with an epic 64 which he concluded with a 20foot birdie putt at 18, the crowd roaring as he walked off.

"These fans were so positive all week," Woods said. "I can't thank them enough for what they were saying out there and what it meant to me coming back trying to win a major champion-

Koepka, who defended his US Open crown in June at Shinnecock, became only the fifth player to win the US Open and PGA Championship in the same year, joining Woods, Jack Nick-laus, Gene Sarazen and Ben Ho-

And it came in a season where he missed the Masters with a left wrist injury.

"Going from that to even being able to play this year to this, it's absolutely mind blowing,"

Koepka said.

In his eighth month of a comeback season after spinal fusion surgery and years of back injuries, Woods grinded out four birdies against a lone bogey on both the front and back nines but could never draw level with

Koepka, settling for his seventh career major runner-up finish. "I played hard," Woods said.

"Bit of a struggle with my game. I was hanging in there, grinding it out trying to make as many birdies as possible." Crowds cheered the veteran through a thrilling round that saw him miss every front-nine fairway but take only 10 putts, scrambling from dirt, trees and bunkers to stay in the hunt. "It was a struggle until I

found a little bit of something on the back nine," Woods said. "I was hanging in there with my mind and it got me through." Woods, who said he wants to be chosen as a captain's pick for the US Ryder Cup team, was pleased he was able to contend at the PGA and lead in the last round of last month's British Open.

"I would never have forseen that a year ago," Woods said.

The impact was dramatic for

## 'Indians may live 4 yrs longer if country achieves WHO air quality standards'

New Delhi, Aug 13 (PTI): Indians would live for about four years longer on an average if the country meets the WHO's air quality standards, according to a new study. Noting that ambient air pol-

lution alone may cost India more than USD 500 billion per year, it said it is causing hundreds of millions of people in the country to lead shorter and sicker lives.

A group of researchers have proposed a slew of measures to overcome the issue that includes applying monetary charges on excess emissions

Indians would be able to live for about four years longer on an average if the country meets the WHO's air quality standards, the study said.

Under the World Health Organisation quality standards, fine particulate matter (PM2.5) should be 10 g/m3 annual mean and 25 g/m3 24-hour mean while the coarse particulate matter (PM10) 20 g/m3 annual mean and 50 g/m3 24-hour mean.

To help improve India's air quality, researchers from the University of Chicago and Harvard Kennedy School have laid



out five key evidence-based policy recommendations in a new report titled 'A Roadmap Towards Cleaning India's Air', the Energy Policy Institute at the University of Chicago said in a statement.

Moreover, if India were to

meet the WHO's air quality standards, its people would live about four years longer on an average. The economic costs of pollution, through its impact on is winter. health care expenditures and workforce productivity, will be significant, it said.

The study noted more than

660 million Indians live in areas that exceed the country's standard for what is considered safe exposure to fine particulate matter(PM2.5).

For Delhi, the results of the odd-even scheme suggest driving restrictions may be most effective as emergency measures during the worst periods which

"The analysis found evidence of a 13 per cent reduction in PM2.5 concentrations during the January round. The effect was particularly large between

to a reduction in traffic during the morning peak hours. In contrast, the analysis found no evidence of an effect during the April round. The absence of an April effect may have been due to greater dispersion caused by warmer temperatures," the study said.

It recommended improving emissions monitoring by better aligning incentives of auditer angining incentives of adultors, providing regulators with real-time data on polluters' emissions, applying monetary charges for excess emissions, providing the public with information about polluters, and using markets to reduce abate-ment costs and pollution, according to the study.

"While the economic costs of pollution are high and there is no easy solution, we remain optimistic because of the incredible innovations currently being experimented with throughout India," Rohini Pande, a profes-sor in Rafik Hariri University and co-director of Evidence for Policy Design (EPoD) at Harvard Kennedy School, was quoted in the statement.

Also, climate scientists cannot say that extreme events are due to glob al warming, because that is a poorly posed question. However, we can say it is highly likely that they would not have had such extreme impacts without global warming. Indeed, all weather events are affected by climate change because the environment in which they occur is warmer and moister than it used to be.

In particular, by focusing on Earth's Energy Imbalance, new research is expected to advance the understanding of what is happening, and why, and what it implies for the future.

## Death toll from quake that hit Indonesian island passes 430

JAKARTA, AUG 13 (AP):
The death toll from the earthquake that rocked the Indonesian island of Lombok a week ago has passed 400 and the government is estimating economic losses of at least several hundred million dollars.

The national disaster

The national disaster agency said Monday the August 5 quake killed 436 people, most of whom died in collapsing buildings.

buildings.

It said damage to homes, infrastructure and other property is at least 5 trillion rupiah (USD 342 million), calling that a temporary figure that will rise as more assessments are made. The agency said rebuilding will cost hundreds of millions of dollars.

The magnitude 7.0 quake flattened thousands of homes and according to the disaster agency's latest estimate has displaced about 350,000 people.



## Iran's Khamenei: 'No war, no negotiations with the US'

TEHRAN, Aug 13 (AFP): Iran's supreme leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei said today that there would be neither war nor negotiations with the

United States.

"Recently, US officials have been talking blatantly about us. Beside sanctions, they are talking about war and negotiations," he said via his official Twitter account in English.

"In this regard, let me say a few words to the people: THERE WILL BE NO WAR, NOR WILL WE NEGOTIATE WITH THE U.S." There has been widespread speculation over whether Iran would be forced back to the negotiating table following Washington's withdrawal from the 2015 nuclear deal and reimposition of sanctions.

But Iran has rejected

fresh talks, saying the US can no longer be trusted after violating its commitments under the deal.

# Imran Khan among 329 newly-elected members of Pak's Parliament take oath

Pakistan's Prime Minister-in-waiting Imran Khan was among the 329 new-ly-elected members of the National Assembly who took the oath today, setting the stage for the cricketer-turned-politician to form the next government, only the second democratic transition of power.

The maiden session of the 15th National Assembly, the lower house of Parliament, concluded after outgoing Speaker Ayaz Sadiq administered the oath to the leaders in the 342-member house.

The 329 members signed their presence in a register.

The National Assembly session was then adjourned till 10 AM, August 15, Geo News reported. President Mamnoon Hussain had summoned the maiden session at 10 AM in parliament house today, 19 days after Khan-led Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) party emerged as the single largest



in the general elections.

Khan and other prominent leaders including Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz (PML-N) president Shahbaz Sharif, Pakistan Peoples Party (PPP) chairman Bilawal Bhutto-Zardari and former president Asif Ali Zardari also took oath.

The PTI chief shook hands and posed for a photo with Bilawal, who is entering the National Assembly for his maiden term, Dawn reported.

The Speaker announced that elections of the new Speaker and his deputy will

be held on August 15.

The PTI has nominated Asad Qaisar for Speaker, while opposition has named Syed Khurshid Shah of the PPP as the joint opposition candidate for the post.

Earlier, the maiden session started with the National Anthem, followed by recitation from the Holy Quran.

Khan looked prominent

Khan looked prominent as he sat in the front row of the parliament house close to the chair of the leader of the house, which he is eventually expected to take after formal election as Prime Minister.

Strict security measures have been put in place to avoid any untoward incident during the proceedings and irrelevant persons have been barred from entering the house.

The PTI emerged as the single largest party with 116 seats in July 25 elections. Its number increased to 125 after nine independent members joined it and final tally reached 158 after it was allotted 28 out of 60 seats reserved for women and 10 seats reserved for minorities.

the list of the Cabinet has not been finalised but there is a general consensus that Shah Mahmood Qureshi will be the new Foreign Minister and Pervez Khattak the new Interior Minister. Asad Umar is expected to get the key post of Finance Minister.

Khan is expected to appoint prominent businessman Abdul Razzak Dawood as advisor on finance. Dawood served in the Cabinet of former military dictator Pervez Musharraf.

The election of the Prime

The election of the Prime Minister will be held after election of the new Speaker who will supervise the election of the premier.

The PTI has nominated Khan for the top post and he is scheduled to take oath on August 18 at the President House.
The combined opposition

has nominated Shehbaz Sharif against Khan.

The new government faces a strong opposition as the PML-N has a final tally of 82 seats, followed by the PPP with 53 and Muttahida Majlis-e-Amal (MMA) 15 seats. The three have joined hands and formed the combined opposition.

The PTI has the support of smaller parties including Muttahida Quami Movement (MQM) with seven seats, Balochistan Awami Party (BAP) five, Balochistan National Party (BNP) four, Pakistan Muslim League (PML) three, Grand Democratic Alliance (GDA) three, Awami Muslim League and Jamori Watan Party one seat each.

This will be the third consecutive democratic government in Pakistan since 2008 when military ruler Musharraf announced general elections after serving as president from 2001 to 2008 following a coup in 1999.

The PPP formed the gov-

The PPP formed the government in 2008, followed by the PML-N led by former prime minister Nawaz Sharif in 2013.

# Malaysia's Mahathir aims to scrap China deals

PUTRAJAYA, Aug 13 (AP):
Malaysia's prime minister
said today he will seek to
cancel multibillion-dollar Chinese-backed infrastructure projects that
were signed by his predecessor as his government works to dig itself
out of debt, and he blasted Myanmar's treatmen
of Rohingya Muslims as
"grossly unjust."

Mahathir Mohamad made the comments

during a wide-ranging interview with The Associated Press days before the 93-year-old leader heads to Beijing for his first visit there since returning to power in an electoral upset three months ago.

Mahathir said he wants to maintain good relations with China and welcomes its investment, so long as the projects benefit Malaysia. But he took his toughest stance yet

But he took his toughest stance yet on Chinese-backed energy pipelines and a rail project along peninsular Malaysia's eastern coast that were struck by his predecessor, Najib Razak. The former premier faces trial on multiple charges related to the alleged multibilion-dollar looting of the 1MDB state investment fund. He denies wrongdoing.

westment fund. He denies wrongdoing.
"We don't think we need those two
projects. We don't think they are viable.
So if we can, we would like to just drop
the projects," he said from his office in
the administrative center of Putrajaya.

During his time in power, Najib drew Malaysia closer to China, which sees the multiethnic Southeast Asian country as a key part of its ambitious One Belt, One Road global trade initiative. The former prime minister reached deals for the 688-kilometer East Coast Rail Link and the two gas pipelines in 2016.

Malaysia's new government has already suspended work on the projects, being built by Chinese state-backed companies, and called for drastic cuts in their ballooning cost, which it estimates at more than 22 billion. Some of that money has already been paid and could be difficult to recoup.

If scrapping the projects altogether isn't doable, Malaysia will need to at least put them on hold until the future, Mahathir said.

Mahathir also urged China to respect the free movement of ships throughout the South China Sea. China and multiple Southeast Asian nations including Malaysia have competing claims on islands and reefs in the sea along with the rich fishing grounds and potential fossil fuel deposits around them.

China claims much of the sea as its own and has built up several man-made islands equipped them with runways, hangers, radar and missile stations to bolster its claim.

It has accused the US, which routinely deploys aircraft carriers, other warships and planes to the sea, of meddling in a purely Asian dispute. Chinese ships also patrol the sea.



"We are all for ships, even warships, passing through, but not stationed here," Mahathir said. "It is a warning to everyone. Don't create tension unnecessarily."

Mahathir was scathing in his criticism of Myanmar, a country whose inclusion into the Association of Southeast Asian Nations he had pushed for in 1997 despite concerns over human rights abuses and protests by the US.

"It is grossly unjust to do what they have done, killing people, mass murder, that's not the way civilized nations behave," he said.

The previous government of predominantly Muslim Malaysia strongly supported the Rohingya, a persecuted minority in Myanmar who have fled by the hundreds of thousands to neighboring Bangladesh after a crackdown last year that some have called ethnic cleansing.

Malaysia has said the displacement

Malaysia has said the displacement of Rohingya is no longer a domestic issue for Myanmar, in a rare departure from ASEAN's non-interference policy in each other's affairs.

Mahathir added that he was "very disappointed" in Myanmar leader Aung San Suu Kyi's failure to halt the oppression.

"Obviously she appears to be with the government of the day on how they treat the Rohingyas. It's a question of justice and human rights. You can't do that," he said.

He stopped short of committing Malaysia to taking in more Rohingya refugees, however, saying the 7 million legal and undocumented foreigners Malaysia already hosts are "far too many." Mahathir is a larger-than-life figure in Malaysia, with his influence dominating the multiethnic country's politics from the Cold War into a new millennium.

His first turn as prime minister

only in 2003. He rose to prominence by controversially championing the county's indigenous Malays, whom he saw as disadvantaged compared to the country's Chinese minority, and he oversaw the rapid development of his young country while concentrating power under his increasingly autocratic rule.

Mahathir long seemed to relish his role as an antagonist to the West. He frequently criticized the U.S. and its close allies often with colorful and at times offensive language while promoting what he saw as Asian values and interests.

The release of the prisoners "is in line with Pakistan's consistent policy of not politicising humanitarian issues," Foreign Office Spokesperson Mohammad Faisal said in a statement.

The 30 prisoners being set free also include 27 fishermen, it added.

"This is a humanitarian gesture to mark Pakion August 14," he said.

"It is our hope that the Indian side will also reciprocate in a similar manner," he said.

Over 470 Indians, including 418 fishermen, are detained in Pakistani jails, according to a government report submitted before the country's Supreme Court in July.

The 27 fishermen to-

The 27 fishermen today reached Lahore and will be handed over to the Indian authorities at the Wagah Border.

Senior jail superintendent at Malir jail in said that they had released the fishermen yesterday and sent them via train to Lahore after getting orders from the interior ministry.

been released as a goodwill measure," he said. Faisal Edhi of the Edhi


Faisal Edhi of the Edhi welfare trust said the fish ermen were obviously delighted at being released some of them had spent the last two years in jail.


weeks at the top.

emi Lovato has reportedly left the re-Demi Lovato has reportedly left the re-habilitation facility she entered last week in search of additional treatment in Chicago.

According to People magazine, the 25-year-old singer and her mother, Dianna De La Garza, left Los Angeles and flew to Chicago to meet with a psychiatrist who specializes in mental health and sobriety treatment.

"She's in the midst of recovery," a source told the publication.

"It's going to be a long road, and Demi knows that. Emotionally, it hasn't been easy, but she's doing okay," it added.

Last month. Lovato overdosed on what was reported as an unspecified opioid. She was found unconscious in her Hollywood Hills residence. She was then taken to Cedars-Sinai hospital, where she listed in stable condition and has remained there since the incident.

Following her hospitalization, the singer had cancelled performances in Atlantic City and Toronto, which were originally

slated for July 26 and July 29 respectively. Earlier this week, the singer cancelled the rest of her 2018 tour dates to focus on

her recovery.

In an Instagram post recently, the sing-

er spoke about her battle with addiction. saying she needed "time to heal and focus on my sobriety".

"I have always been transparent about my journey with addiction. What I've learned is that this illness is not something that disappears or fades with time. It is something I must continue to overcome and have not done yet," she wrote.

"...I now need time to heal and focus on my sobriety and road to recovery. The love you have all shown me will never be forgotten and I look forward to the day where I can say I came out on the other side," she added.
