#### HC wants CS to explain how State Govt plans to save North Sikkim yaks **SUMMIT REPORT** GANGTOK, 9 JULY:

The division bench of the Sikkim High Court has taken suo-moto action on reports of over 300 yaks dying of starvation following heavy snowfall in Muguthang and Yumthang valleys of North Sikkim in December 2018.

The High Court had issued a notice to the State Government last month after local media reported about the yak deaths.

Chief Justice Vijai Kumar Bist and Justice Meenakshi Madam Rai directed the Chief Secretary to file an affidavit on the issue and also explain how the state plans to save yaks from extinction.

The bench observed: "...In fact, affidavit should have been filed by the Chief Secretary, Government of Sikkim. Therefore, we direct the Chief Secretary to file a detailed affidavit in this regard."

Meanwhile, the High Court has taken the affidavit filed by the Principal Director, Animal Husbandry and Veterinary Services Department, into record.

It has observed that while some points have been made about how the challenge can be addressed, the present affidavit was silent on which agency was supposed to implement the suggestions.

The court has directed the Chief Secretary to file a comprehensive affidavit within the next five weeks. The court has fixed the next hearing on the matter for 20 August, 2019.

GANGTOK, 09 JUL (IPR): Chief Minister Prem Singh Tamang (Golay) inaugurated the Sikkim State Portal (www. sikkim.gov.in) and its mobile application and the launch of Online Tax Payment System, Motor Vehicles Division, Transport Department Government of Sikkim at Samman Bhawan today.

During the launch of the state portals, the Chief Minister congratulated the Departments for this historic occasion which will provide service to the public at their doorsteps through online payments and from the comforts of their own homes.

He also stated that the state government has decided to give arrears under the 5th Pay Commission to government employees in one go instead of installments



since it is the right of the people which should not be taken away.

The Chief Minister said that keeping the objective of the Prime Minister's Digital India in mind, the state government with this step is working to ensure that the govern-

ment's services are made available to citizens electronically by making the state digitally empowered in the field of technology.

by the public of far-flung areas for official works and documentations and thus appealed to all departments to make all possible services of the government into e-services and mobile services. ## 1,474 of 2,999 houses sanctioned under **CMRHM** completed

Against the 2,999 houses sanctioned under Phase-1 of the Chief Minister's Rural Housing Scheme, 1,474 have been completed thus far.

This, as per a status report on CMRHM Phase-1 released by the Rural Management & Development Department and circulated among the media today by the Information & Public Relations Department.

Meanwhile, houses have been completed up to slab level and another 219 houses completed up to plinth level.

224 houses are in site levelling and protective works stage and work is still to begin on 124 sanctioned houses.

RM&DD further informs that one beneficiary is yet to be identified and case was decided to be kept in abeyance during the State High Powered Committee Meeting held in May 2019.

The main aim of the CMRHM scheme is to convert all kutcha houses into pucca homes.

The timeline to complete all CMHRM Phase-I houses was also discussed at the State High Powered Committee Meeting and the executing agency has agreed to ensure completion of all CMRHM Phase-1 houses by November 2019.

#### CMs of all NE states to protest if citizenship bill is brought again: Khandu ITANAGAR, JUL 9 (PTI): If the Centre brings the Citizenship Amendment Bill once again, Arunachal Pradesh Chief Minister Pema Khandu Tuesday said he, along with his counterparts in the northeastern states, will protest jointly.

Khandu, who heads a BJP government, informed the assembly that earlier also he had urged the Centre to exempt the tribal state from the purview of the Bill.

The contentious Bill provided for according Indian citizenship to Hindus, Jains, Christians, Sikhs, Buddhists and Parsis from Bangladesh, Pakistan and Afghanistan after seven years of residence in India instead of 12 years, which is the norm currently, even if they do not possess any document.

Replying to a question by Congress MLA Ninong Ering on the steps taken to protect the interest of the indigenous people if the Bill is imposed, Khandu said the state would appeal to the Centre not to impose the bill as it would have a strong ramification.

"The Lok Sabha passed the bill on January 8 but it was not tabled in the Rajya Sabha. I along with the Manipur chief minister had gone to Delhi and apprised the then home minister Rajnath Singh of the probable impact of the bill. (We told him that) it might dilute the rights of the indigenous people of the North East," Khandu said.

A citizenship bill would be brought to give Indian citizenship to Hindus coming from neighbouring nations, Union Home Minister Amit Shah informed the Rajya Sabha on July 1.

"If the Centre wants to bring the Bill again, we will oppose it jointly by taking into confidence all the chief ministers of the region," he said.

A largescale protest had broken out in the Northeastern states earlier this year as the indigenous people of the region were apprehending that if the bill was enacted, it would endanger their identity and livelihood. Khandu said the state government had made its stand clear to the Centre on the citizenship bill citing the violence in the state capital during February over the Permanent Residence Certificate (PRC) issue.

The state government had proposed grant of PRC to six communities that are not natives of Arunachal Pradesh but are living there for decades. It led to violent protests and two persons were killed in Itanagar in February and Khandu had declared: "Never again will we take up the issue of PRC. The issue is closed." Responding to another question of NPP member Mutchu Mithi, Khandu made it clear that there would be no dilution in the inner line permit system in the state.

"Arunachal is protected by the Bengal Eastern Frontier Regulation Act of 1873 and Chin Hill Regulations Act, 1896.

states, according to a

UN report.

The Global Study on Homicide 2019 published Monday by the UN Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC) said that about 464,000 people across the world were killed in homicides in 2017, an increase from 395,542 in 1992.

In India, the number of homicide victims fell from 48,167 in 2000 to 46,460 in 2010, 44,373 in 2015 and 42,678 in 2016. Males constitute less than 20 per cent of the total homicide victims in 2016 in India, it said.

"In India, the overall homicide rate decreased by 10 per cent over the period 2009 2015, from 3.8 to 3.4 per 100,000 population. At the same time, the spatial varirate shifted noticeably, with some states in the north registering an increase in the homicide rate, while some large states in the south (e.g. Andhra Pradesh) experienced a decrease," the report said. It noted that while

some smaller cities can have very high homicide rates, larger cities tend to have homicide rates that are more closely in line with national homicide rates.

There are several large metropolises, particularly in Asia, with populations above 10 million that have homicide rates below 1 per 100,000 population rates that are even lower than the national average (e.g. Tokyo: 0.3; Jakarta: 0,3; Seoul: 0,67; Mumbai (India): 0.9).

Asia, which contains 60 per cent of the global population, recorded the lowest rate of homicide in the world in 2017 while the Americas region had the highest homicide rate, ac-

ation in the homicide cording to the report.

However, because the global population has risen faster than the increase in recorded homicide victims, the overall risk of being killed in homicides has declined steadily. The global homicide rate, measured as the victims of homicide per 100,000 people, declined from 7.2 in 1992, to 6.1 in 2017. the report said.

In 2016, the female homicide rate in India stood at 2.8 per cent. Percentage of women and girls in India aged 15 49 who experienced physical violence (irrespective of perpetrator) in the past 12 months was 18.9 while 33.5 per cent experienced women physical violence at least once in their lifetime, it said.

The report noted that dowry-related killings of women which occur when brides are killed or are driven to commit suicide after being subjected to conabuse by the groom's family in an effort to extort dowry payment or increased dowry involving cash or goods are widely reported in South Asian countries.

"Dowry deaths constitute a unique category of deaths in the Indian Penal Code, which has been amended in recent decades to deal specifically with dowry-related violence," the report said.

It added that available data on dowry-related killings from the National Crime Records Bureau indicate that female dowry deaths account for 40 to 50 per cent of all female homicides recorded annually in India, representing a stable trend over the period from 1999 to

"Despite legislation adopted by the Indian Government in 1961 that prohibits the payment of dowry, the practice continues throughout the country and dowry deaths continue

tinuous harassment and to account for a substantial share of all female homicides," it said.

> "Although the data are not disaggregated by sex, it is likely that women account for a large share of the victims," it said.

The report also found that son preference, which "continues to be deeply embedded in Indian society, can make parents more likely to neglect their female infants and children, "and even to commit infanticide".

Further in South Asia, at least one in five ever-married girls experienced partner violence, with particularly high rates in Bangladesh (47 per cent) and India (34 per cent).

## Migrating People

Understand why rural Sikkim wants to move to urban settings. And plan for it

There has been frequent talk of rural-urban migration in Sikkim and efforts, on the lips and on paper, have been underway for a while now to contain it. It would be wonderful if disruptions or cessations of traditional ways of life could be stopped and people allowed environments in to pursue their ambitions and dreams in surroundings they are familiar with; but that, anyone will attest, is an impossible task. Things change, and even when the change is for the "better", it requires adjustments and sacrifices, with migration being one of the options that many have to take.

Any effort to contain rural-to-urban migration would obviously require a clearer understanding of the causes. It is common to find poverty held up as the main reason prompting people to migrate to cities, a notion transmitted through the caricature renditions of the plight of the poor in mass-entertainment products. It is a believable explanation, but latest data available on migration in India does not hold up this belief. The poor are invariably temporary migrants, shipping out for temporary jobs and as seasonal labour; the more permanent migration in pursuit of opportunities is a luxury which only the better heeled and the more educated enjoy. In most cases, this is human resource which "leaves home" to study and train does so because it can afford to, and, on many occasions, never returns. And then there is the eye-opening data contained in the report released by the National Sample Survey Office suggesting that a third of all Indians are migrants in their present place of residence! Though one in every three Indians is a migrant, they are not all products of rural-urban migration. Most are not escaping the "drudgery" of rural India, but are, in almost all cases, pursuing gainful employment. There is a difference. Within these are of course those who migrate for marriage [found to be the case in most 'non-local' women], or because they have been forced out either by natural disasters or "developmental" projects.

If Sikkim is serious about working on rural-urban migration, it should first understand the exact, and not generalised, reasons for it. Urban amenities might be desired, but cannot by themselves be taken as reasons why people abandon villages. Chasing employment could be a reason, but migration is relatively permanent and that requires complementing opportunities and not just desires to keep rural folk in urban addresses. A data that the country prefers not to unravel, but Sikkim could do well to study and understand, is migration triggered by changes in rural settings. In many instances, land - a people's mooring to the place - is lost, and with this anchor lifted, moving away becomes an easier decision to contemplate. The loss of land could as much be due to acquisition for projects as it could be because of change in landuse patterns. If farms are no longer of a size which make them sustainable, or when the traditional crops no longer harvest on a scale that makes economic sense, a shift is necessitated. Of course, there is also the general desire of every parent to provide better education and opportunities for children if they can afford it, and these opportunities continue to be available almost exclusively in urban setting even in Sikkim. It would be desirable if these facilities could reach the villages too, but that does appear to be happening any time soon, so the pull of the urban areas will remain strong.

Urban planning will hence have to factor these realities into its projections for future years and this will require cross-disciplinary and inter-departmental coordination and planning on a scale that the State has not displayed an aptitude for thus far. Very soon, Sikkim, as the rest of the world, will also be looking at migrations forced by climate change as well and it will be advisable for the State to try and begin the processes to project possible scenarios and start adequate preparations for it. It is important to bear in mind that not all rural-urban migration can be stopped, but what can definitely be achieved is for the urban spaces to be planned better to not only accommodate 'influx', but also provide them with better basic facilities and more respectable opportunities.

## Everest: I interviewed people risking their lives in the 'death zone' during one of the deadliest seasons yet

limbing some of the world's tallest mountains, you enter the "death zone" when you are 8,000 metres from sea level - where oxygen is 34% the concentration it is on the ground below. Climbing here is one of the most dangerous forms of tourism there is. For mountaineers, the most tantalising goal is to climb the world's 14 highest peaks, all of which stretch into the death zone.

They're all in Central Asia and are indeed the deadliest. The biggest, Mount Everest, is 8,848 metres tall and straddles Nepal and China. K2 in Pakistan and China is the second tallest at 8,611 metres, while Kangchenjunga (8,586 metres) and Lhotse (8,516 metres) in Nepal, aren't far behind. Some seasons on mountains like K2 can see death rates of 32% for those attempting the summit.

We usually think of holidays as a chance to enjoy life, but with the bodies of fallen climbers clearly visible on Mount Everest, death is always present in the tourism industry here. In this way, high-altitude mountaineering can be considered a form of dark tourism - when people pay to travel to sites of death, disaster or atrocity.

I'm a doctoral researcher in tourism studies who was stationed for six weeks between April and May 2019 at the Everest Base Camp. There, I interviewed tourists, high-altitude workers and all the people who kept the death zone economy moving and all those who were poised for the summit.

ENCOUNTERS IN THE DEATH ZONE

On May 14 2019, the first climbers of the season reached the summit of Mount Everest. Below at 5300 metres, many more were waiting to acclimatise to the thin air in base camp. I arrived there in mid-April, just as climbers were beginning to acclimatise – exposing their bodies to an altitude which causes the body to produce extra red blood cells so they can carry more oxygen.

By mid-May, climbers at the base camp had been anxiously waiting for over five weeks for the weather to abate, allowing Nepali workers to go to the summit in advance to fix ropes to the side of the mountain so that other climbers can follow safely. In 2018, the window period – when 70-80mph jet stream winds suddenly lull - lasted 11 days, allowing climbers to spread out over many days. In 2019, there had been only five days of low winds by May 23. This meant most climbers had to crowd into climbing the summit in fewer days.

I spoke with two climbers hoping to become the first Greek women to complete the "Seven Summits" - climbing the highest mountain on each continent, one of the most popular challeng-

es in mountaineering. I also met the first Lebanese woman aiming to complete the same challenge. I interviewed the first Romanian woman to try Everest in 2017, but she had to turn around due to tragic complications. In 2019, however, she became the first Romanian woman to climb Lhotse - the world's fourth highest peak.

Many of the climbers had mementos from those they loved – the ashes of a friend, or the mountaineering axe of a fallen comrade. The moments of waiting and anticipating the summit were the most tense. Each contemplated how years spent saving,

passion, a reason to continue going on in the world.

Who and what they desire to be is all bundled up in this "tourist experience". Some find the word to be an insult - that one of the most important moments of their lives could be boiled down to something so frivolous. Tourism certainly does fall short in describing the complex emotions and ambitions of those who explore the highest mountains in the world.

Maybe it's the view of the enormous triangular projection of Everest's shadow drowning the landscape below as the sun rises over the Tibetan Plateau that is so compelling. The sense of being



training and dreaming would soon be put to the test. The people in base camp anxiously chewed their nails and fidgeted while waiting for their 'weather window" to open.

Some had their trips cut short before they could realise their dreams. Altitude sickness, a fall into a crevasse, even fatal accidents from some unpredictable error. All of this played out during the 2019 season even before the summit push, which is always the most dangerous period as this is when climbers enter the death zone. Most climb without serious incident, but every year there are those who don't make it home.

I came here to understand why people travel from all over the world to risk their lives in the death zone. A tourism authority granted them permission to climb and they paid a tourism agency to assist them, but to them, it doesn't feel like tourism. It feels like something much more – an obsession, a

small on something so enormous, the sensation of being as close to the nothingness of space as one can be on Earth. Maybe it's to prove to oneself that "I can", or that "I as a Lebanese woman can", or that an amputee "can".

More than 65 years after the feat was first accomplished, climbing Everest remains perhaps the greatest challenge a person can attempt. Since tourism has opened the experience up to more and more people, the promise of personal and public achievement on the roof of the world has proved hard to resist for many. For some, it's worth risking everything.

## Donor-funded journalism is on the rise in Africa: why it needs closer scrutiny

n enormous and increasing por-Ation of the foreign development aid coming into Africa annually is for media development. Foreign aid funds diverse projects, ranging from investigative journalism in Nigeria, to stories on Chinese building projects in Kenya, or health reporting in South Africa.

The news media landscape and journalism practices - on the continent as well as globally - have undergone massive change in recent times. This, coupled with the collapse of familiar business models, and the limited potential for genuinely independent "watchdog" journalism, the relationship between external influences on local cultures and practices of journalism needs to be reassessed.

A report last year, by the American Centre for International Media Assistance, concluded that about US\$600 million a year is spent on media development in Africa by state and private funders. This may exceed a billion dollars if the opaque amount China spends on media operations and training globally is included. Much of this is focused on Africa.

But how does this aid influence journalism in Africa?

Our recent international study examined the impact of foreign development aid on media systems in seven African countries. These were Ghana, Ethiopia, Nigeria, Tanzania, Senegal, South Africa and Sudan. A separate report focused on Latin America.

We witnessed parallel and intensifying debates among media workers in developing countries who accept (or depend on) foreign funding. Funders themselves are also increasingly reflecting on their objectives and how they measure success. And, the role of foundations in funding

Journalists who took part in our project worried that the foreign assistance or travel they've received may limit the stories they can tell, or influence the way they tell them. On the other hand, they often feared that without foreign financial support, critical journalism in their countries would vanish.

The colonial powers of Britain, France, and Portugal still cast a long shadow over Africa's media. More recently, however, African media has been shaped by the US and China. Many foreign interventions are small like the funding of a single investigative news story, for example. But some are massive.

Since the end of the Second World War in 1945, foreign aid has been tives have caused anxiety among journalists and commentators steeped in the liberal-democratic tradition. This tradition emphasises the "watchdog" role of journalism.

Chinese media, on the other hand, adopt a more persuasive and positive tone and favour official perspectives. This, while taking a critical view of the history of Western involvement in Africa. This approach is sometimes called "constructive journalism". It promises to present Africa in a more positive light than the stereotypes that have historically characterised Western coverage.

The establishment of Chinese media outlets such as China Global Television Network, the wire service Xinhua and China Radio International in Africa have been seen as part of China's strategy to increase its visibility overseas.

We know little about how these exchanges - and other forms of foreign investment by corporate or religious institutions - affect African media and the stories they tell.

The fear is that the Chinese model, because of the government's control over the media, is dangerous to introduce in African countries where press

freedom has often come under attack. But fears about a major shift may be overblown or premature given that research has shown that the influence of Chinese media on journalists and au-

diences in Africa remains minimal. For its part, Western aid has resulted in an Anglo-American culture of journalism education which has proved impractical to implement in countries with illiberal political regimes.

#### A QUANDARY

Should under-resourced African journalists accept any foreign funding?

This is a difficult question. There are risks that come from shunning aid. This includes missed opportunities to develop African media or report independently on local power brokers.

On the other hand, aid can be used to coerce journalists to change their norms and practices unduly.

Media producers and users in developing countries need to be more vigilant about foreign media support. And they need to evaluate it. For citizens in countries that provide such aid, the challenge is to scrutinise the efforts made in their name.

# 162 children died of AES in Bihar, 63 in seven other states: Govt



NEW DELHI, JUL 9 (PTI):

As many as 162 children died due to Acute Encephalitis Syndrome (AES) in Bihar till July 2 this year, while 63 fatalities were reported from Assam, Jharkhand, Maharashtra, Manipur, Odisha, Uttar Pradesh and West Bengal till June 30, MoS Health Ashwini Choubey said on Tuesday.

Responding to a question over whether lychees were the cause of deaths, the minister, in his written reply in Rajya Sabha, said consumption of lychee was safe for healthy individuals, but in "malnourished children, it triggers hyposeizures or AES".

"A research study was conducted by the National Centre for Disease Control (NCDC), along with partner institutions, in the year 2013-14 wherein it has been found that when lychee is consumed by malnourished children, it triggers hypoglycaemia and leads to seizures or AES like picture," Choubey said in his written reply.

On the basis of the study, an intervention strategy for awareness and nutritional supplementation was recommended to the state, the minister said.

ious other aspects of aetiology has been initiated by the Ministry of Health under Indian Council of Medical Research (ICMR).

"In 2019, a total of 162 deaths of children have been reported from Bihar till July 2 due to AES. As per information received from the National Vector Borne Disease Control Programme (NVBDCP), 63 deaths have been reported due to AES till June 30 from other seven states of the country -- Assam (25), Jharkhand (2), Maharashtra (1), Manipur (1), Odisha (1), Uttar Pradesh (17) and West Bengal (16)," his reply stated.

a number of measures that the Centre has initiated to support the Bihar government in the con-

tainment of AES, while

stitutional provisions,

health is a state subject". Choubey, in his reply, said Union Health Minister Harsh Vardhan had reviewed the situation with his counterpart in Bihar and also with officials from the ministry.

A team of experts, consisting of public health specialists from various central government institutes, was deputed to assist the Bihar government in taking immediate measures to contain AES, he said.

Vardhan had also visited Shri Krishna Medical College and Hospital (SK-MCH) at Muzaffarpur in Bihar, Choubey said.

The Health Ministry had sent another high-level multi-disciplinary team, which included senior pediatricians from various central government institutes, to Muzaffarpur.

Epidemiologists from the National Centre for Disease Control (NCDC), pediatricians, senior laboratory technicians are in Muzaffarpur since June 12.

The NCDC's Strategic Health Operations Centre (SHOC) was engaged to monitor the situation in Muzaffarpur and co-ordinate tasks at the field level, Choubey said.

He said the Health Ministry had deputed five teams of doctors, along with technicians from central government hospitals, to SKMCH to support clinical management.

"A central team, consisting experts from Indian Council of Medical Research (ICMR), was also deployed at SKMCH. The team is also scrutinising and reviewing the case records of discharge and deceased patients using a standardised tool to know the reasons for mortality," he added.

Documentary on good work done by police during cyclone Fani

"The short film and report has been prepared to document the good work done by the police for the information of all," he said.

and practices adopted can serve as a reference for the future during any such calamity. These will certainly be very useful and also act as a guide for police officers in the days ahead," the chief minister said.

He lauded the role of police personnel before, during and after the cyclone hit the state.

Patnaik said 24 hours before the cyclone hit the state, police undertook a massive awareness exercise among the public by using loud speakers, mega phones and other means.

They helped in the massive evacuation exercise and around 1.3 million people were evacuated to designated multi-purpose shelter homes, he said. Police

also played a crucial role in the management of law and order, road clearance, distribution of relief, restoration work and others, the chief minister said, adding that police personnel also provided drinking water, first-aid and medical services to the affected people on war footing during the crisis.

An emergency police control room was set-up in Bhubaneswar for vertical and horizontal coordination with districts as well as other departments. Police also exhibited its humane face during post cyclone, under the banner of "Karuna" where cooked food was distributed to more than one lakh people in different areas of worst hit Puri district.

#### Bengal Cong chief resigns taking responsibility for LS poll debacle

KOLKATA, JUL 9 (PTI): West Bengal Congress president Somen Mitra submitted a letter of resignation from the post taking responsibility for the party's poor show in the Lok Sabha election, sources said Tuesday.

However, Gaurav Gogoi, the All India Congress Committee (AICC) in-charge of party affairs in the state, refused to accept Mitra's resignation and requested him to continue in the post, they said.

The Congress won two of the 42 Lok Sabha seats in West Bengal, down from four it had won in the 2014 election.

Last week, Rahul Gandhi formally resigned as the Congress president, saying he was responsible for the loss in the Lok Sabha election and that accountability was critical for the party's future growth.

## Ban on pig import from Myanmar to check ASF



AIZAWL, JUL 09 (PTI): Mizoram government has taken measures to ban import of pigs and piglets, specially from Myanmar, and local residents have been mobilised to generate awareness among the people to prevent the outbreak of African swine fever (ASF) in the border state, an official said Tuesday.

ASF outbreak was reported in China and Vietnam and it is feared that it could reach Mizoram through Myanmar and affect the piggeries in the state, director of the state animal husbandry and veterinary department, Hmarkunga said.

The disease affects only porcine species of all breeds and pork products are widely consumed in the state.

in the state so far, he said. Hmarkunga said the district magistrates of dis-

tricts adjoining Myanmar have issued prohibitory orders against importing pigs and piglets from the neighbouring country.

"The veterinary officials in all the districts, especially those along the 404 km-long international border with Myanmar, were instructed to beef up vigil," he said.

The district authorities have also been instructed to ban import of pork products such as sausages as traces of ASF were reportedly found in the sausages in Japan.

Hmarkunga said that the steps were taken in view of the hardships faced by the people due to the outbreak of porcine reproductive and respiratory syndrome in the state in 2018.

The Supreme Court on Tuesday said that it would accord final hearing in August on a batch of petitions challenging the Centre's decision to deport illegal Rohingya Muslim immigrants to

Myanmar.

"Proposed deportation is contrary to the constitutional protection of Article 14 (Right to Equality), Article 21 (Right to Life and Personal Liberty) and Article 51(c) of the Constitution of India, which provides equal rights and liberty to every person.

"This act would also be in contradiction with the principle of 'Non-Refoulement', which has been widely recognised as a principle of Customary International Law," the plea said.

The principle of 'Non-Refoulement' prohibits States from transferring or removing individuals from their jurisdiction when there are substantial grounds for believing that the

person would be at risk of irreparable harm upon return, including persecution, torture, illtreatment or other serious human rights violations. The plea had also sought a direction that Rohingyas be provided "basic amenities to ensure that they can live in humane conditions as required by international law".

Another petition was filed by one Jaffar Ullah alleging unhygienic situation at refugee camps in Haryana, Rajasthan and Jammu and Kashmir.

The Centre had questioned the bonafides and motives of the NGOs and individuals seeking facilities for the Rohingya refugees, and stated that there is no discrimination between Indians and outsiders in providing health and education facilities.

## Panel formed to review contents of WB text books labelling freedom fighters as "extremists"

KOLKATA, JUL 9 (PTI): Amid a controversy over history text book in staterun schools describing a section of the freedom fighters as "extremists", the West Bengal government Tuesday announced formation of a committee to review the contents of such books.

Headed by educationist Jiban Mukhopadhyay, comprises headmasters and senior school teachers, Education Minister Partha Chatterjee said in the Assembly.



## No Neymar, no problem as Brazil begin new Copa reign

RIO DE JANEIRO, JUL 9 (AFP): As Brazil geared up for the Copa America last month, a Neymar-induced pall of doom and gloom threatened to scupper the host nation's chances before a ball had even been kicked.

The unrelenting circus surrounding the captain and talisman of the Selecao had included lurid rape revelations before an ankle injury in a warm-up game left the Paris Saint-Germain striker on crutches and out of the tournament.

It was an eerie echo of Brazil's disastrous 2014 World Cup on home soil, when Neymar was injured in the quarter-finals and missed his team's traumatic 7-1 humiliation against eventual champions Germany in the last four. Yet as this year's Copa campaign unfolded, Brazil demonstrated that it might have finally cast off the longstanding criticisms of "Neymar-dependency."

While Nevmar's creative spark was sorely missing in a dour 0-0 draw with Venezuela during the group stage, Brazil gradually grew into the tournament.

And by the time captain Dani Alves hoisted the trophy -- Brazil's first major honor in 12 years -- following the 3-1 victory over Peru in the final at the iconic Maracana stadium on Sunday, Ney-



mar had at last been shoved aside as the Copa's major talking point.

What's more, Brazil had proved in finishing with the tournament's best attack, best defence, top player in Alves, top scorer in Everton and top goalkeeper in Alisson -- a clean sweep of every award going -- that they could thrive without Nevmar.

Its importance was not lost on Liverpool's Alisson, no matter how diplomatically he put it.

"It was difficult without Neymar because he's very talented and also brings a lot to the collective," said Alisson.

"It was important to win to show the strength of the group.

"Sometimes he gets all the attention and we're a bit left out... but he's much loved."

## Federer eyes 100th Wimbledon win and Nadal showdown



LONDON, JULY 9 (AFP): Roger Federer can rack up his 100th win at Wimbledon on Wednesday and set-up a blockbuster semi-final against Rafael Nadal.

In a quarter-final line-up which features five players over 30, there is a growing anticipation of a potential 40th career match-up between the sport's two most successful players.

If it does happen, it will be their first at the All England Club since 2008 when Nadal triumphed in what is widely regarded as the greatest final ever played at the

However, before they reach that stage, eight-time champion Federer has to get past Kei Nishikori while Nadal, a twotime winner, tackles big-hitting Sam Querrey.

Whoever battles through that side of the draw is likely to find defending champion and fourtime winner Novak Djokovic waiting in the final.

At 37, Federer is the oldest quarter-finalist since Jimmy Connors in 1991.

He reached his 17th quarter-final at the All England Club -- and 55th at the majors -- with a 74-minute demolition of Italy's Matteo Berrettini, dropping just five games.

Between them, Federer, Nadal

and Djokovic lost only 19 games in their fourth-round ties and faced just one break point.

"I think the best guvs now are fully engaged, they know exactly what to expect from the court and the conditions," said second seed Federer.

#### - 'NISHIKORI GREAT TALENT' -

"That helps us to play better. I think with experience, that's good. We haven't dropped much energy in any way." Federer will take a 7-3 record over seventh-seeded Nishikori into his quarter-final.

Nishikori defeated the great Swiss in the ATP Finals last year, ending a drought which had stretched to almost five years.

"I'm a big fan of his game," said Federer of the Japanese star, who is into his second successive quarter-final at Wimbledon.

"I think he's got one of the best backhands in the game. He's a great return player. Solid mentally. I always thought he was a great talent." Nadal, playing in his seventh Wimbledon quarter-final, faces Querrey backed up by a 4-1 record over the 65th-ranked American.

Querrey made the semi-finals in 2017, beating then world number one Andy Murray in the lasteight before falling to Marin Cilic.

The American has pounded down 100 aces so far at the tournament, dropped serve just once and accounted for fifth seed Dominic Thiem in the first round.

"When he plays well, he can be very, very dangerous on all surfaces," said Nadal, whose recent 12th French Open title took him to 18 majors, just two back from Federer's record.

Top seed Djokovic has a 5-1 record over his quarter-final opponent David Goffin who, at 28, is the voungest man left. Belgian 21st seed Goffin beat

Djokovic the last time they met in 2017 but that was on the clay of Monte Carlo. Goffin is playing in his first All England Club quarter-final but was

## Pakistan's economy at 'critical juncture', needs bold reforms: IMF

Pakistan's economy is at a "critical juncture" where it needs an ambitious and bold set of reforms, the IMF has said, days after the global lender agreed to give a USD 6 billion bailout package to the cashstrapped country.

Pakistan, which currently has a currency reserve of less than USD 8 billion -- enough to cover only 1.7 months of imports -- approached the Washington-based International Monetary Fund (IMF) in August 2018 for a bailout package after the Imran Khan government took over.

The IMF last week formally approved the USD 6 billion loan to Pakistan, which is facing "significant" economic challenges on the back of "large" fiscal and financial needs and "weak and unbalanced" growth. "Pakistan is facing significant economic challenges on the back of large fiscal and financial needs and weak and unbalanced growth," David Lipton, First Deputy Managing Director and Acting Chair of the IMF Executive Board said.

Last week, the IMF approved the 13th bailout package for Pakistan since the late 1980s.

The latest bailout package is worth USD 6 billion, of which USD 1 billion is to be disbursed immediately and the rest in the next three years.

A decisive fiscal consolidation is key to reducing the large public debt and building resilience, and the adoption of the fiscal year 2020 budget is an important initial step, Lipton said.

Achieving the fiscal objectives will require

Washington, Jul 9 (PTI): a multi-year revenue mobilisation strategy to broaden the tax base and raise tax revenue in a well-balanced and equitable manner, he said.

> It will also require a strong commitment by the provinces to support the consolidation effort and effective public financial management to improve the quality and efficiency of public spending, he said.

> Observing that protecting the most vulnerable from the impact of adjustment policies will be an important priority, Lipton said that this will be achieved by a significant increase in resources allocated to key social assistance programmes, supporting measures for the economic empowerment of women and investment in areas where poverty is high.

> A flexible market-determined exchange rate and an adequately tight monetary policy will be key to correcting imbalances, rebuilding reserves and keeping inflation low, he said, adding that an ambitious agenda to strengthen institutions and remove impediments to growth will allow Pakistan to reach its full economic potential.

> In an accompanying report, the IMF said that Pakistan's economy is at a critical juncture.

## Mirabai wins gold at Commonwealth Senior **Weightlifting Championship**



APIA (SAMOA), JUL 9 (PTI): Former world champion Mirabai Chanu led the Indian medal rush by notching up a gold on the opening day of the Commonwealth Weightlifting Championship here on Tuesday.

The Indian contingent won 13 medals that included eight gold, three silver and two bronze medals in senior, junior and youth categories. Mirabai lifted a to-

tal of 191kg (84kg + 107 kg) in the senior women's 49 kg event to win the gold medal in the Olympic qualifying event, the points from which will come in handy for the final rankings of the 2020 Tokyo Olympics.

Mirabai last took part at the Asian Championship in Ningbo, China in April where she lifted 199kg (86kg+113kg) to miss out on a medal by a whisker.

The qualification process for the 2020 Olympics is based on the per-

formances of the weightlifters in six events over a period of 18 months out of which the four best results logged by a lifter will be considered.

Jhilli Dalabehra also clinched the first place on the podium with a lift of 154kg (70kg+94kg) in the senior women's 45 kg event which is not an Olympic weight category.

In the senior women's 55kg, Soroikhaibam Bindyarani Devi and Matsa Santoshi won the gold and silver medals respectively.

Bindyarani lifted 78 kg in snatch to bag the silver medal. Her effort of 105 kg fetched her a gold medal in clean and jerk as well as the overall gold.

Santoshi stood first in snatch with a lift of 80kg but could only manage 102kg in clean and jerk taking her total to 182kg. In the senior men's

55kg category, Rishikanta Singh grabbed the gold with a total lift of 235kg (105kg+130kg).

# Trump targets Paris climate accord, says 'ineffective' global pacts favour worst-polluting countries

WASHINGTON, JUL 9 (PTI):

President Donald Trump has accused the previous Obama administration of waging a "relentless war" on American energy by reaching "ineffective" global agreements that he alleged allowed the world's worst-polluting countries to continue their practices.

His statement came amidst claims by Envi-Protection ronmental Agency's Administrator Andrew Wheeler that the landmark Paris Agreement on climate change is unfair to the US and countries like India and China benefit out of it.

For years, politicians told Americans that a strong economy and a vibrant energy sector were incompatible with a healthy environment. In other words, one thing does not go with the other.

"And that's wrong because we're proving the exact opposite," Trump said in his remarks during a White House event on America's Environmental Leadership.

"A strong economy is vital to maintaining a healthy environment. When we innovate, produce and grow, we're able to unleash technologies and processes that make the environment better while reshoring and, so importantly -you look at reshoring production all the way -taking it away from foreign polluters, and back to American soil," asserted the US President.

Indian business tycoon becomes first expat in Sharjah to get UAE's permanent residency

DUBAI, JUL 9 (PTI): UAEbased Indian business tycoon Lalo Samuel has become the first expat in Sharjah to get the gold card permanent residency. Unlike the long-term visa of 5-10 years for businessmen and talented individuals, the gold card gives permanent residency of the UAE to the holder.

The Kingston Group chairman was handed over the gold residence card by Brigadier Arif Al Shamsi, Director-General of residency and foreigners affairs in Sharjah, the Gulf News reported Monday. The Kingston Holdings owns one of the largest manufacturing companies in the Middle East that comprises several manufacturing units that process plastic and metal.

Samuel, who was selected as one of the top 100 Most Influential Indian Business Leaders in the Arab World by the Forbes magazine continuously for 2013, 2014 and 2015, became one of the 6,800 investors with total investment exceeding USD 27 billion to receive the gold card under a scheme announced in May by Sheikh Mohammed bin Rashid Al Maktoum, the ruler of Dubai.



Trump alleged the previous administration waged a relentless war on American energy.

"We can't do that. They sought to punish our workers, our producers and manufacturers with ineffective global agreements that allowed the world's worst-polluting countries to continue their practices," he said.

These radical plans. he claimed, would not make the world cleaner; they would just make and put Americans out of work, and they put them out of work rapidly.

"They move production to foreign countries with lower standards -- our companies were forced to do that, and they didn't want to do that -- and they drive up the price of gas and electricity at home, and drive it to levels that are literally unaffordable.

"And by the way that's happening to many other countries, but it's not happening here. Other countries -- their pricing on electricity is so high, not even to be affordable. At our level, we are doing numbers that nobody has seen before. Nobody believes what we're doing and what we're producing electricity and other things for," Trump said.

"Punishing Americans is never the right way to produce a better environment or a better economy. We've rejected this failed approach and we're seeing incredible results," he said.

During a conference call with reporters, Wheeler said: "The Paris Climate Accord is an unfair treaty, in terms of the US with our trading partners -- when you see that China doesn't have to even begin making reductions; they can continue to increase their emissions, and they are, until 2030. And other make reductions either, such as India and other developing countries. So it was an unfair trade treaty for the United States".

"Another aspect that a lot of people gloss over is that, under the Clean Air Act -- I believe it's Section 115 of the Clean Air Act -- if we enter into an international treaty, such as the Paris Climate Accord -- if we fail to meet our targets, those are enforceable under our domestic laws," he said.

Most other countries which are signatories to the Paris Climate Accord do not have that same constraint, Wheeler said but asserted that one of the few industrialised countries that has already met their targets for the Paris Climate Accord. "So, regardless of whether we're in the Paris Climate Accord or not, we continue to make progress on that front. But the Paris Climate Accord is unfair to the US consumer, US manufacturer and the US economy," he said.

The US is taking international leadership on issues such as marine plastic debris, Wheeler asserted. In his address, Trump said after coming to power, his administration has created more than six million new jobs and unemployment has reached the lowest rate in a half a century.

"We're unlocking American energy and the United States is now a net exporter of clean, affordable, American natural gas. We're exporting all over the world," he said.

Trump said that the US does not have to sacrifice its own jobs to lead the world on the environ-

# All-Afghan conference brings country closer to peace

KABUL, JUL 9 (AP): All-Afghan talks that brought together Afghanistan's warring sides ended Tuesday with a statement that appeared to push the country a step closer to peace, by laying down the outlines of a roadmap for the country's future and ending nearly 18 years of war.

Washington's Peace Envoy Zalmay Khalilzad has said he is hoping for a final agreement by September 1, which would allow the withdrawal of US and NATO troops.

He will begin an eighth round of peace talks with the Taliban later on Tuesday also in Qatar's capital, Doha, where the two-day conference was held. Tuesday's statement

said that a post-war Afghanistan would have an Islamic legal system, protect women's rights "within the Islamic framework of Islamic values," and ensure equality for all ethnic groups.

The much-touted conference was attended by Taliban, Afghan government representatives, women and members of the country's nascent civil society.

It aimed to produce a new level of consensus among Afghanistan's fissiparous society. No date was given for the tougher negotiations to follow, when the many sides in Afghanistan's protracted conflict will sit down to hammer out the details of what an Islamic system will look like, how constitutional reform will come about, and what will become of the many local militias affiliated with the country's powerful warlords, who are affiliated with Kabul.

They will also have to tackle how women's rights fit into the definition of the "Islamic values," as well as whether to set up an interim administration and when elections should be held.

The conference agreed to keep the momentum going with confidence building mea-

Even as the conference was ending, an airstrike in Afghanistan's northern Baghlan province killed seven people, six of them children.

Early on Tuesday, a strike hit Kotuk Khiel village. The residents carried the bodies of the dead to the provincial capital of Pul-e-Kumri, where Afghanistan National Defense Forces had blocked the road.

Safdar Mohesni, the provincial council chief, said the airstrike was carried out by "foreigners," a reference to the United States.

There was no immediate comment from the US military to a request from The Associated The Taliban have also

have killed or wounded civilians, including a devastating suicide car bombing on Sunday in Ghazni province that killed 12 people and wounded more than 150 others, including many students at a nearby school.

Tuesday's statement also said all sides in the conflict would want international guarantors of any final agreement.

It said that future meetings would be all-inclusive without any mention of direct talks with the Afghan government. The Taliban have steadfastly refused to talk with President Ashraf Ghani's government calling it a puppet.

Participants attending the all-Afghan conference, which Germany and Qatar jointly sponsored, attended as ordinary Afghans "on equal footing," and while there were senior government officials in attendance they were there as ordinary Afghans and not in their official capacity.

Meanwhile Khalilzad's talks with the Taliban will continue on the timeframe for US and NATO troop withdrawal, verifiable anti-terror guarantees, intra-Afghan negotiations, and an eventual cease-fire.

## China reacts guardedly as Hong Kong leader says extradition bill 'is dead'

China on Tuesday reguardedly Hong Kong's embattled pro-Beijing leader Carrie Lam's declaration that the highly controversial plan to allow the extradition of Hongkongers to the mainland "is dead", saying it has "nothing more to add" to its endorsement of her June announcement to suspend it. The Chinese government has backed Lam's move on June 15 to suspend the Fugitive Offenders and Mutual Legal Assistance in Criminal Matters Legislation (Amendment) Bill 2019 following violent protests by lakhs of people.

After her plans to suspend the bill was rejected by protestors who continued to stage mass demonstrations, Lam on Tuesday announced that the widely-loathed move to allow extradition to the Chinese mainland "is dead" but again stopped short of protesters' demands to completely withdraw the bill.

"There are still lingering doubts about the government's sincerity or worries (about) whether the government will restart the process with the Legislative Council," she said in a press conference. "So I reiterate here, there is no such plan. The

bill is dead," she said. Asked how the Chinese central government views Lam's announcement, Foreign Ministry spokesman Geng Shuang told reporters: "On June 15, after the Special Administrative Region of Hong Kong decided to suspend the amendment, the Chinese government expressed its respect and understanding. I have nothing more to add for the time being".

Hong Kong, a former British colony, became a Special Administrative Region of China in 1997, when Britain's 99-year lease expired. It has its own judiciary and a separate legal system from mainland China.

The city is governed under the principle of "one country, two systems", under which China has agreed to give it some autonomy and preserve its economic and social systems for 50 years from the date of the handover.

## China urges US to 'immediately cancel' arms sale to Taiwan

BEIJING, JUL 9 (AFP): China urged ty Cooperation Agency (DSCA) the deal Washington Tuesday to "immediately cancel" the potential sale of USD 2.2 billion in weapons to Taiwan, including battle tanks and anti-aircraft missiles.

The US State Department's decision to greenlight the first big-ticket US military sale to the self-ruled democratic island in decades comes amid already strained ties between Washington and Beijing.

"The sale of weapons by the United States to Taiwan... seriously violates the one-China principle... grossly interferes in China's internal affairs and undermines China's sovereignty and security interests," said foreign ministry spokes-

Geng said that China has already lodged formal complaints through diplomatic channels expressing "strong dissatisfaction and resolute opposition"

"China urges the US to... immediately cancel the planned arms sale and stop military relations with Taipei to avoid damaging Sino-US relations and harming peace and stability in the Taiwan Strait," Geng said.

includes 108 M1A2T Abrams tanks, 250 Stinger portable anti-aircraft missiles and related equipment and support.

Taiwan has been ruled separately from China since the end of a civil war in 1949, but Beijing considers it a part of its territory to be retaken -- by force if necessary.

China has significantly stepped up diplomatic and military pressure on Taipei since the election in 2016 of President Tsai Ing-wen, whose Democratic Progressive Party refuses to acknowledge that the island is part of "One China".

It has also staged military exercises near the island, and steadily reduced the already small number of nations that recognise Taiwan.

The United States switched diplomatic recognition from Taiwan to China in 1979, but has remained an important ally -- and arms supplier -- to Taipei.

Laws passed that year by Congress required Washington to provide the island with means of self-defence. But it has been wary of big-ticket military equipment sales to Taiwan in recent years, fearful of stoking anger in Beijing.
