T Tamro Sikkim Party today ■ Lannounced the launch of its election campaign with the slogan, "Naya Sikkim, Hamro Sikkim."

HSP office bearers announced this at a press briefing held here today.

Addressing the press, the party's working president, Bhaichung Bhutia, explained the party slogan as one conveying the frustration of the youth here with the same faces and same politics having been dominant in the State for 25 years.

"We are scrutinising our candidates. We will not field those having criminal records or those facing corruption charges," he added.

The party will go to the people with a development agenda, he said.

The press briefing was also addressed by HSP president Dr Bina Basnet, and spokesperson Biraj Adhikari.

Mr Bhutia explained that the party would be leveraging five main issues and that a detailed manifesto will be released in due time.

The five broad themes

will cover Welfare State, Social Justice, Economic Justice, Democratic Liberties and Accountable

Governance. The "Welfare State" stance will seek "universal public provision of good quality social services including education, health, maternal care and early childhood care, good and safe roads, affordable electricity charges, etc." Under this, a new scheme for farmers comprising assured income, freedom from indebtedness and sustainable farm practices will be included.

Under social justice, amendments will be passed to ensure at least one-third representation of women in the Legislative Asssembly, judiciary and police and special programmes launched

# New PHSC inaugurated at Ben

The construction commenced on 22 February 2018 and was completed on 22 February 2019.

Various medical facilities like General OPD, MCH Clinic, ANC/ PNC room, Labour Room, Dressing room, Nurses



Duty Room and a storeroom have been accommodated in the ground floor and a two-room residential quarter for medical staff is provided on the first floor.

Addressing the gathering, Minister Gurung expressed gratitude towards the department for providing a genuinely-needed health infrastructure after it was reportedly damaged by the devastating earthquake.

The campaign was led by North District Congress president Gyurmik Youseel Bhutia, accompanied by South District Congress president, Hari Basnett, Pradesh Congress Scheduled Tribes Cell chairperson, Aita Singh Tamang, and party workers and covered the stretch from Kabi to Mangan.

An SPCC press release informs that the team distributed leaflets carrying the party's message regarding many issues concerning Sikkim such as the Congress' belief about dilution of provisions of Article 371F by the present SDF government, amendment of old laws, unchecked influx and the inability of regional political parties to



protect the rights of Sikkimese people.

Interacting with the local people, district Congress presidents also reiterated the Congress party's stand against the Citizenship Amendment Bill which was stalled in the Rajya Sabha due to strong opposition by Congress MPs.

They also strongly condemned the support extended by Sikkim's Lok Sabha MP PD Rai to the Bill, which, the release argues, works against the interests of Sikkim and expressed dismay

at the SDF government's betrayal of the Sikkimese people.

It is time people realise the inability of regional political parties to safeguard the constitutional rights of the Sikkimese people, the release concludes.

# Sanders attacks 'dangerous' Trump at campaign launch

NEW YORK, MAR 3 (AFP):

US Senator Bernie Sanders returned to the place of his birth on Saturday to deliver the first rally speech of his presidential campaign, vowing to defeat "the most dangerous president in modern American history" Donald Trump.

The Vermont independent voiced confidence at the address in the New York borough of Brooklyn that he would first beat the crowded field of his rivals for the 2020 nomination, with much of his liberal, populist agenda now considered mainstream Democratic policy.

"I want to thank all of you for being part of a campaign which is not only going to win the Democratic nomination, which is not only going to defeat Donald Trump, who is the most dangerous president in modern American history," Sanders told the crowd of several thousand people.

"But, with your help, we are going to transform this country and finally create an economy and a government which works for all of us, not

just the one per cent." He promised that his campaign would say "loudly and clearly that the underlying principles of our government will not be greed, hatred and lies". Sanders returned to Brooklyn College, which



rally emphasising his personal story, as the working class son of a Jewish immigrant who grew up in poor housing.

"I did not have a father who gave me millions of dollars to build luxury skyscrapers, casinos and country clubs," Sanders said in another dig at Trump.

"I did not come from a family that gave me a USD 200,000 allowance every year beginning at the age of three."

Sanders spelled out his big ticket items for 2020, his second presidential campaign after losing the nomination to Hillary Clinton in 2016 --"Medicare for All," a USD 15-an-hour minimum

wage and climate change. Many are long-held principles previously dismissed as too radical by more moderate more widely accepted talking points as he squares off against several other progressives who have embraced many of his issues.

Following November's mid-term election, the Congressional Progressive Caucus -co-founded by Sanders in 1991 -- wields more power than at any time in its history.

Senators Kamala Harris, Cory Booker, Elizabeth Warren and Kirsten Gillibrand, all 2020 candidates, co-sponsored his Medicare for All legislation in 2017.

Julian Castro, another Democratic hopeful, joins Gillibrand in supporting universal early childhood education.

And Warren, Booker and Harris have all proclaimed support for the Green New Deal,

platform to combat climate change that was unveiled this month by congresswoman Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez, a rising liberal star.

Sanders was an outsider candidate three years ago. But with his massive political network, muscular fundraising capacity and resilient message, he is now a frontrunner.

He would need to best multiple formidable rivals -- including former vice president Joe Biden, should he enter the race -- and victory is anything but assured.

On Sunday, Sanders heads to Selma, Alabama, to mark the anniversary of the 1965 clash known as "Bloody Sunday" and will also visit Chicago, where he graduated from college and was active in civil rights protests.

### **TMC forms 12-member** panel for poll campaign in West Bengal

Kolkata, Mar 3 (PTI): The Trinamool Congress (TMC) has formed a 12-member committee Sunday to chart modalities on election campaign in West Bengal for the upcoming Lok Sabha elections, the party's secretary general Partha Chatterjee said.

The committee would look into the applications by aspiring candidates to fight the elections and forward those to the party's supremo Mamata Banerjee, Chatterjee told newspersons here.

The 12-member committee comprises Mamata Banerjee's nepnew and MP Abhishek Banerjee, Subrata Bakshi, Firhad Hakim, Arup Biswas, Suvendu Adhikari, Chandrima Bhattacharya, Sashi Panja, Moloy Ghatak, Jyotipriyo Mallick, Subrata Mukherjee, Derek O'Brien and Partha Chatterjee.

"The committee will look into election-related publicity and screening of applications of aspiring candidates in consultation with party supremo Mamata Banerjee," Chatterjee said.

While Abhishek Banerjee and O'Brien are Lok Sabha MPs, the other 10 members of the committee are ministers in the state cabinet.

Out of 42 Lok Sabha constituencies in West Bengal, TMC won 34 seats, the Congress got four and the BJP and CPI(M) won two each in the 2014 general elec-

Taking on the BJP, which has emerged as the principal opposition party in the state in terms of vote share in the 2018 panchayat elections, Chatterjee said the saffron party indulges in creating divisions among people.

"In the name of Sankalp rally, they tried to go on a rampage in different parts of the state," he said, referring to clashes between the BJP workers and the police at a few places in the state on Sunday.

The 'Vijay Sankalp' bike rally is a part of the BJP's countrywide prepoll exercise to establish contact with people. BJP workers clashed with the police in several places of West Bengal on Sunday as the saffron party was prevented from holding its 'Vijay Sankalp' rally.

"These attempts will be dealt with strongly by the administration," Chatterjee said.

### SpaceX's new crew capsule aces space station docking

CAPE CANAVERAL (US), MAR 3 (AP): SpaceX's new crew capsule has arrived at the International Space Station, acing its second milestone in just over a day.

No one was aboard Dragon capsule launched Saturday on its first test flight, only an instrumented dummy. But the three station astronauts had front-row seats as the Dragon neatly docked Sunday morning and became the first American-made, designedfor-crew spacecraft to pull up in eight years. If the six-day demo

goes well, SpaceX could launch two astronauts this summer under NA-SA's commercial crew program. Both astronauts were at SpaceX Mission Control in California, observing all the action.



### Colourful protest festival at Red Fort, artistes unite against 'assault on culture'

**(PTI):** A high-octane rap, a thought-provoking nukkad natak, a poet reciting poems celebrating love, and a band playing songs on 'protest and change', the 15 August Park in front of the Red Fort is buzzing with all kinds of activities.

More than 200 artistes have gathered at the historic monument in Delhi for an innovative two-day event against what they call an "assault on culture" and "attack on democracy" in India. The organisers are calling it a "protest festival".

Decked up with hundreds of contemporary posters against lynching, communal hatred and war, the site is a sight to anyone paying attention.

One poster mocks the government's promised "good times" by showing people from rural India wearing virtual reality headsets and waiting in a queue outside a theatre showing "Achhe Din".

Another displays a mob surrounding a man and beating him with sticks as onlookers capture the incident on cellphones.

"Words can be moulded. Question everything.

On social media, everyone is an expert. We are not binary. Popular opinion can be wrong. Read 1984 by George Orwell," reads a poster titled "Antidotes To Hate".

Besides topical posters, the event also displays works of artistes such as Pushpamala N. Tushar Joag and Prabhakar Pachpute. Documentary films are also being screened.

Shubam, from rap group Azaad Forward Bloc which performed at the protest site, said the artistes gathered are putting to meaningful use their respective art to spread the word.

"We, as a nation, are going through a bad phase," the 19-year-old

"I write rap. I know I can make people aware of various issues in my 16-line rap... My words can change minds for better. I have come to the protest festival to do that," he added.

The event saw fewer footfalls Saturday, possibly due to rainfall. But the crow swelled on Sunday. Rashi Girotra, a Delhi University student, said she would have attended the "festival" on Saturday too had the weather permitted.

"The crowd, as you see, is picking today. I am sure it will be jam-packed by evening. People know how important it is to stand united at this time, Girotra said.

For the uninitiated, the seeds of Artistes Unite, the collective organising the event, were sown during the first 'Not in My Name!' campaign in 2017.

Helmed by documentary filmmaker Saba Dewan, that campaign was organised to protest the lynching of 16-year-old Junaid aboard a train in the name of religion.

"AU came together as a platform because we as citizens and artistes felt that we must come together to resist the culture and politics of hate, and speak up for democracy," Dewan told PTI. Dewan is also behind this event.

Some of the artistes participating in the festival are Dhruv Sangari, Rabbi Shergill, Shubha Mudgal, Sonam Kalra, Maya Rao, Fouzia Dastango, Ashok Vajpeyi, Akhil Katyal, Arpita Singh, Orijit Sen, Shilpa Gupta, Sohrab Hura Furqan Faridi and Shaheen Ahmed.

# Ashok Khemka among 9 IAS officers transferred in Haryana

CHANDIGARH, MAR 3 (PTI): The Haryana government on Sunday issued transfer and posting orders for nine IAS officers with immediate effect, including 1991-batch senior bureaucrat Ashok Khemka.

Ashok Khemka, principal secretary of Sports and Youth Affairs Department has been posted as principal secretary of Science and Technology Department, where he had been posted earlier as well.

The 1991-batch IAS officer had first been mentioned by the media in 2012 when he had cancelled the mutation of a land deal between Congress leader Sonia Gandhi's son-in-law Robert Vadra's Skylight Hospitality and major real estate developer DLF.

The IAS officer, who was posted for nearly 15 months in the Sports and Youth Affairs Department, headed by Minister Anil Vij, has been transferred over 45 times in his career so far.

### Constable parses acquittals while doing LLM, makes suggestions

Mumbai, Mar 3 (PTI): A tional Director General of police head constable has come out with several suggestions for improving conviction rate in Maharashtra after studying over 200 court rulings as part of his Master of Laws (LLM) studies.

The thesis submitted by constable Dwarkadas Bhange has prompted the police authorities to direct district-level officials to study trial court judgements.

Bhange said in his thesis that there should Bhange presented a be a better co-ordination between investigating ofmeetings every week.

A "calender of evidence" should be prepared for helping the prosecution, a practise

followed by the Central Bureau of Investigation, he suggested.

Investigating officers should stay in touch with witnesses throughout the trial, he said.

One of his suggestions is that a special cadre of "scene of crime officers" should be created for collection of evidence.

Summaries of Supreme Court judgements in criminal cases should be provided to all the investigating officers, he said.

Probationary IPS officers and Deputy Superintendents of Police can be given the task of analysing cases of acquittals in the respective district, he suggested.

### 2 militants, 5 security personnel, a civilian dead after 56-hour gunfight in Kupwara



SRINAGAR, MAR 3 (PTI): Two militants, five security forces' personnel, including a CRPF officer, and a civilian were killed in a 56-hour encounter in Kupwara district of Jammu and Kashmir, police said on Sunday.

A police spokesman said the operation at Babagund area of Kupwara took time as it posed considerable difficulties to the security forces due to the topography of the area.

Two militants were killed by security forces in the encounter which began on Friday morning, the police spokesman said here.

He said bodies of both the militants were recovered from the site of the encounter and their identities and affiliations are being ascertained.

The spokesman said a CRPF jawan identified as Sham Narayan Singh Yadav who was injured in the exchange of fire on Friday, succumbed to injuries on Sunday taking the number of security forces' fatalities to five.

Two CRPF personnel, Inspector Pintu and Constable Vinod, and two cops, Selection Grade Constables Naseer Ahmad and Ghulam Mustafa Barah, were killed in the gunfight on Friday, the spokesman said.

He said one civilian, Waseem Ahmad Mir, also sustained bullet injury "in the nearby area" and later succumbed at a hospital on Friday.

The encounter had begun when se-

curity forces launched a search operation in Babagund area in north Kashmir, following information about presence of militants there. "Area where the terrorists were hid-

ing was very congested and civilians in the adjoining houses had to be evacuated to the safer places away from the site of encounter," he said.

He said incriminating materials, including arms and ammunition, were recovered from the site of encounter.

Police have registered a case in this matter and the incriminating materials have been taken in case records for further investigation, the spokesman added.

He urged people to not go near the encounter zone as there could be stray

"People are requested to cooperate with police till the area is completely sanitized and cleared of all the explosives materials if any," the spokesman said.

### IAF pilot Varthaman wants to return to cockpit at the earliest

**(PTI):** Wing Commander Abhinandan Varthaman, who became the face of the tense military confrontation between India and Pakistan, conveyed to the IAF brass that he wants to return to the cockpit as soon as possible, officials said Sunday.

For the last two days, the Indian Air Force (IAF) pilot has been undergoing medical treatment at a military hospital here.

Varthaman told senior IAF commanders and doctors treating him that he wants to start flying at the earliest, the officials told PTI.

On Wednesday, he became the first IAF pilot to shoot down an F-16 fighter jet during an aerial combat with the Pakistani Air Force. Varthaman was captured by the Pakistani Army after his MiG-21 Bison jet was hit in a fierce dogfight.

He returned to India to a hero's welcome on Friday night.

His health condition is being monitored by a group of doctors at the Army's Research and Referral hospital, the officials said.

"The efforts have been to ensure that he returns to the cockpit soon," said a military of-

The officials said Varthaman has been in high spirits despite the harassment he suffered in Pakistan.

Varthaman arrived in the national capital on an IAF flight around 11:45 PM Friday, nearly two-and-half hours after he crossed over to India through the Attari-Wagah border.

The IAF pilot was first taken to the Air Force Central Medical Establishment (AFCME), a compact and specialised medical evaluation centre for aircrew of all the three services.

Later he was brought to the Army's Research and Referral hospital.

After he was captured, Varthaman showed courage and grace in handling the most difficult circumstances for which he was praised by politicians, strategic affairs experts, ex-servicemen, celebrities and people in general.

Defence Minister Nirmala Sitharaman and Air Chief Marshal B S Dhanoa met Varthaman separately on Saturday during which he apprised them about the mental trauma he was subjected to during his captivity in Pakistan.

During the meeting. the defence minister commended him on his valour and expressed the nation's gratitude for his selfless service.

Tensions between India and Pakistan escalated after Indian fighters bombed terror group Jaish-e-Mohammed's biggest training camp near Balakot, deep inside Pakistan early Tuesday.

Pakistan retaliated by attempting to target Indian military installations on Wednesday. However, the IAF thwarted their

The Indian strike on the JeM camp came 12 days after the terror outfit claimed responsibility for a suicide attack on a CRPF convoy in Kashmir, killing 40 soldiers.

### Westerly Disturbances Pour a Reminder

Water on the streets expose drained initiatives and opportunities

The persistent downpours of the past ■ week and more are serving as timely reminders of everything that remains ignored in the capital. No sooner do the clouds open up that traffic grinds to a halt, roads having become ferocious rapids making one wonder what the capital has learned from the numerous slips and spillovers that descend on Gangtok every monsoon. The storm water drains cannot channel these short bursts of rain caused by westerly disturbances and that makes one wonder what the monsoon, which will be heavy this year if the present prequel is any indication, have in store for the capital.

What use are storm drains if they don't carry away thunderstorm waters? The only reassuring signs after every shower are the UD&HD workers struggling to unclog the drains, again and again and again. At least someone is responding quickly enough. But what continues to fail the capital is the science behind its jhoras and drains. Either the engineering deployed in their training is all wrong or the training itself is suspect because there is no way that one can be led to believe that the storm drains have consumed crores in construction and repairs and corrective works just to look pretty in fresh coats of cement. They are supposed to drain surface run off, not unleash torrents on the roads. When they do the latter, they not only expose the shortsighted planning that went into their training, but also damage and weaken roads ahead of the monsoons. One could also blame the carelessly "dropped" construction material and the occasional pile of overnight garbage for the clogging, but that can be easily remedied.

That said, what the failure of the jhoras and drains also expose is the quick exit civic enlightenment made the moment donor funding was no longer at hand to publicize citizen-initiatives to manage garbage disposal. Every jhora that spills over to the streets and every drain that finds itself blocked whenever water needs to channel through it, disgorge not just rain waters, but also everything that one calls garbage. The jhoras, unfortunately, continue to double as convenient waste bins and the water pipelines continue using these channels as convenient pathways from source to home. Then, of course, there are some sewage lines that still continue to open directly into jhoras greeting many mornings with a stench for everyone unlucky enough to be living near them.

The recent wave of evening downpours is welcome. They washed the dry hills and beat down the dust. Unfortunately, they might have came a little late for the farmers and the hail did not help either, but, if it reminds the Gangtokians [private and public] of all the responsibilities they continue to ignore, it can still be considered timely enough.

## The power of language: we translate our thoughts into words, but words also affect the way we think

Have you ever worried in your student years or later in life that time may be starting to run out to achieve your goals? If so, would it be easier conveying this feeling to others if there was a word meaning just that? In German, there is. That feeling of panic associated with one's opportunities appearing to run out is called Torschlusspanik.

German has a rich collection of such terms, made up of often two, three or more words connected to form a superword or compound word. Compound words are particularly powerful because they are (much) more than the sum of their parts. Torschlusspanik, for instance, is literally made of "gate"-"closing"-"panic".

If you get to the train station a little late and see your train's doors still open, you may have experienced a concrete form of Torschlusspanik, prompted by the characteristic beeps as the train doors are about to close. But this compound word of German is associated with more than the literal meaning. It evokes something more abstract, referring to the feeling that life is progressively shutting the door of opportunities as time goes by.

English too has many compound words. Some combine rather concrete words like "seahorse", "butterfly", or "turtleneck". Others are more abstract, such as "backwards" or "whatsoever". And of course in English too, compounds are superwords, as in German or French, since their meaning is often distinct from the meaning of its parts. A seahorse is not a horse, a butterfly is not a fly, turtles don't wear turtlenecks, etc.

One remarkable feature of compound words is that they don't translate well at all from one language to another, at least when it comes to translating their constituent parts literally. Who would have thought that a "carry-sheets" is a wallet porte-feuille -, or that a "support-throat" is a bra soutien-gorge - in French?

This begs the question of what happens when words don't readily translate from one language to another. For instance, what happens when a

native speaker of German tries to convey in English that they just had a spurt of Torschlusspanik? Naturally, they will resort to paraphrasing, that is, they will make up a narrative with examples to make their interlocutor understand what they are trying to say.

But then, this begs another, bigger question: Do people who have words that simply do not translate in another language have access to different concepts? Take the case of hiraeth for instance, a beautiful word of Welsh famous for being essentially untranslatable. Hiraeth is meant to convey the feeling associated with the bittersweet memory of missing something or someone, while being grateful of their existence.

Hiraeth is not nostalgia, it is not anguish, or frustration, or melancholy, or regret. And no, it is not homesickness, as Google translate may lead you to believe, since hiraeth also conveys the feeling one experiences when they ask someone to marry them and they are turned down, hardly a case of homesickness.

#### **DIFFERENT WORDS, DIFFERENT MINDS?**

The existence of a word in Welsh to convey this particular feeling poses a fundamental question on language-thought relationships. Asked in ancient Greece by philosophers such as Herodotus (450 BC), this question has resurfaced in the middle of the last century, under the impetus of Edward Sapir and his student Benjamin Lee Whorf, and has become known as the linguistic relativity hypothesis.

Linguistic relativity is the idea that language, which most people agree originates in and expresses human thought, can feedback to thinking, influencing thought in return. So, could different words or different grammatical constructs "shape" thinking differently in speakers of different languages? Being quite intuitive, this idea has enjoyed quite of bit of success in popular culture, lately appearing in a rather provocative form in the science fiction movie Arrival.

Although the idea is intuitive for some, exaggerated claims have been made about the extent of vocabulary diversity in some languages. Exaggerations have enticed illustrious linguists to write satirical essays such as "the great Eskimo vocabulary hoax", where Geoff Pullum denounces the fantasy about the number of words used by Eskimos to refer to snow. However, whatever the actual number of words for snow in Eskimo, Pullum's pamphlet fails to address an important question: what do we actually know about Eskimos' perception of snow?

No matter how vitriolic critics of the linguistic relativity hypothesis may be, experimental research seeking scientific evidence for the existence of differences between speakers of different languages has started accumulating at a steady pace. For instance, Panos Athanasopoulos at Lancaster University, has made striking observations that having particular words to distinguish colour categories goes hand-in-hand with appreciating colour contrasts. So, he points out, native speakers of Greek, who have distinct basic colour terms for light and dark blue (ghalazio and ble respectively) tend to consider corresponding shades of blue as more dissimilar than native speaker of English, who use the same basic term "blue" to describe them.

But scholars including Steven Pinker at Harvard are unimpressed, arguing that such effects are trivial and uninteresting, because individuals engaged in experiments are likely to use language in their head when making judgements about colours - so their behaviour is superficially influenced by language, while everyone sees the world in the same way.

To progress in this debate, I believe we need to get closer to the human brain, by measuring perception more directly, preferably within the small fraction of time preceding mental access to language. This is now possible, thanks to neuroscientific methods and - incredibly - early results lean in favour of Sapir and Whorf's intuition.

So, yes, like it or not, it may well be that having different words means having differently structured minds. But then, given that every mind on earth is unique and distinct, this is not really a game changer.

# Why banning controversial voices from universities is bad practice

Two years ago the University of **▲** Cape Town (UCT) "disinvited" Flemming Rose from giving its annual T.B. Davie Academic Freedom Lecture. Rose is the cultural editor of the Danish publication, Jyllands-Posten that depicted the Prophet Muhammad in cartoons.

The term disinvited was coined by the American-based Foundation for Individual Rights in Education. It refers to speakers who have been disinvited after being invited to speak at universities. Between 2000 and 2017, the foundation had found 192 incidents in which students or members of university staff had pushed for speakers to be disinvited.

In rescinding the invitation, UCT's former vice-chancellor, Dr Max Price, invoked the language of "safe spaces" and asserted that bringing Rose to campus: "might retard rather than advance academic freedom on campus."

Last year the Stellenbosch University found itself in a similar situation when a group of Israeli scholars withdrew from a planned conference. They cited feelings of inhospitality and exclusion. In this instance, after meeting with the South African Jewish Board of Deputies, the university's vice-chancellor, stated that: "As a research-intensive university of global significance, we continue to welcome academics from all over the world at Stellenbosch University -including scholars from Israel -- and

This conundrum is being faced by universities across the world. In 2017 a survey of 115 UK universities showed that 54% actively censored speech, 40% stifled speech through excessive regulation. Only 6% were deemed truly free, open places.

In Australia, the Institute of Public Affair's Free Speech on Campus Audit 2017 showed that the majority of Australian universities limit the diversity of ideas on campus. For example, 34 out of the country's 42 universities (81%) have policies and actions that are hostile to free speech on campus and seven (17%) have policies and actions that threaten free speech on campus. Only eight of Australia's 42 universities (19%) have an explicit policy that protects intellectual freedom.

In principle, academic freedom infers that both staff and students at universities have the right to participate in intellectual engagement and debate, without fear of censorship. This right extends into speech, writing (textual or digital), without fear of reprisal.

In this sense, academic freedom is akin to the preservation of intellectual autonomy. Yet, as the two South African examples show, speakers being disinvited is not uncommon in South African universities.

We argue strongly against the practice in our latest book on free speech at universities. We do so on the grounds that disinvitation compromises the very idea of human engagement and deliberation. This is because the act of disinviting an individual, for whatever reason, is in itself an abandonment of freedom and speech.

It not only stifles any opportunity for engagement with difference or controversy, but it implies that academic freedom is the preserve of those who are in agreement. If we are all in agreement, then where is the debate, and new ways of thinking?

#### ACADEMIC FREEDOM IS NECES-**SARY FOR DEMOCRACY**

Firstly, regulating hurtful speech without re-signifying it, that is creating opportunities where harmful speech is challenged and re-directed, can aggravate the volatility between groups that favour controversy - and those who oppose it.

If controversial speakers are denied opportunities to speak at universities, it can be claimed that their right to freedom of speech has been hampered. Universities need to guard against what the Times Higher Education refers to as becoming "hotbeds of left wing bias", or "political monocultures".

Universities can't be considered "safe places" where controversial ideas of people are considered at odds with liberal and or radical voices and deserve to be stunted.

Secondly, when controversy is opened up, people have an opportunity to scrutinise the controversial statements and find ways to rebut dissenting and provocative claims. Regulating speech doesn't imply that speakers of harmful speech merely

abandon their views. It simply means that their views are left unchallenged, and undisrupted. We argue that this deepens the already inhumane and undignified actions of some people even further.

#### CONTESTATION IS IMPORTANT FOR DEMOCRACY

Universities shouldn't cultivate intolerance towards dissent. Rather they ought to instil in students and lecturers capacities to appreciate divergent views. Universities need to create the conditions and safe spaces for people to cross-over into the unfamiliar and the controversial. The implications at play here are not only in relation to the academic well-being of a university, they also affect our understanding of a democratic society.

The real question is: what kinds of students, and hence society, do universities want to produce? Students need to learn that the relationship between knowledge and power can be emancipatory. Intolerance and exclusion, for example, can only be allayed if people have access to knowledge.

Academic freedom, therefore, is not only about unconstrained speech. It is also about questioning peoples' worldviews, so that they can consider other ways of thinking, and bring into contestation what's familiar, known and readily accepted.



Sameer came out of the shadows of his illustrious colleagues last year when he reached the knockout stage of the World Tour Finals as a qualifier, riding on his title run at Swiss Open, Hyderabad Open and Syed Modi International at Lucknow.

Two of these titles -- Swiss Open and Syed Modi -- were Super 300 events and Sameer, who had reached the finals of Hong Kong Super Series in 2016, hopes to achieve his dream of winning a higher level tournament when he steps out at the Arena Birmimgham for the All England Championship.

"I want to win a big tournament and I want it to be All England," Sameer told PTI in an interview.

The youngster from Madhya Pradesh had lost 12-21, 22-20, 21-17 to World no 2 Shi Yuqi of China in the semifinals after holding the match point in the second game.

### Severing cricketing ties with nations not our domain: ICC tells BCCI



DUBAI, MAR 3 (PTI): The International Cricket Council has turned down the BCCI's request to sever ties with countries from which "terrorism emanates", saying the ICC has no role to play in matters like these.

In the wake of the Pulwama terror attack, in which more than 40 CRPF personnel were killed, the BCCI, in a letter to the ICC, urged the world body and its member nations to sever ties with countries which harbour terror.

"There was no chance that anything like that would have happened. The ICC chairman made it clear that the decision to ostracize a nation is taken at the government level and ICC had no rule. The BCCI knew it all along but still took a chance," a BCCI official told PTI on conditions of anonymity.

The BCCI letter did not make a specific reference to Pakistan, which has been accused of harbouring terrorists by India.

The issue came up during Saturday's ICC board meeting chaired

Manohar but not much time was spent on it.

The BCCI was represented at the board by acting secretary Amitabh Choudhary.

"So many players

from member nations play the Pakistan Super League and they would have never entertained such a request. Yes, security was a concern and it had been duly addressed," the Board official added.

The Indian cricket team is scheduled to play Pakistan in the World Cup on June 16. There have been calls to boycott the clash in the wake of the heightened diplomatic tensions between the two countries following the Pulwama attack.

The demand has been made by some of the biggest names in Indian cricket such as Harbhajan Singh and Sourav Ganguly.

However, the Committee of Administrators (CoA) running Indian cricket has so far not taken any decision on the matter, saying that it will seek the government's view.

### Oxford University spin-off set for India launch with tech solution to sight loss Aditi Khanna

London, Mar 3 (PTI): A UK-based Indian-origin entrepreneur is in the process of setting up a base in India for the launch of a range of smart glasses for people with sight loss, devised by an Oxford University research spinoff start-up.

Rakesh Roshan is the CEO of OXSIGHT, a company founded in 2016 to create wearable tech nology devices based on research into how the brain manages visual information.

The company began conducting trials in India two years ago in partnership with leading eye hospitals and clinics and is now in the process of setting up a 100 per cent subsidiary in India to make the devices, which are aimed at innovative solutions for sight degeneration, more widely available.

"In the first phase, we have appointed a distributor in India, who will import the devices and sell it directly to our customers who have already gone through the product trials," Roshan said at a global launch event for OXSIGHT in London earlier this week.

"In the second phase, we will sign a few more distributors as India is a large country. Our India office will continue to work with distributors, manufacture in India, run the R&D centre, and operate our customer care centre in various languages," he said.

The company has eight product testing centres in India, including in Kolkata and Hyderabad, with Sushant OXSIGHT Low Vision Centre of Excellence at Ansal University in Delhi as its central clinic.



A small team also runs mobile clinics at other hospitals and clinics, with plans for its wider adoption across the country over the years.

"Like any other technologies and continued R&D focus, we expect the prices to come down and also with increased volume the economy of scale kicks in," said Roshan.

Globally, it is estimated that around 1.3 billion people live with some form of visual impairment. According to the World Health Organisation (WHO), 188.5 million have mild visual impairment, 217 million have moderate to severe visual impairment and 36 million people are blind.

"There is very little awareness in India about low vision and a lot more government support is required in the area," said Professor Monica Chaudhary, Director of the School of Health Sciences at Ansal University, who is one of the Indian experts working with OXSIGHT.

Experts believe that the new technology will help address the lack of distinction between low vision and complete blindness. Peripheral

vision loss is commonly caused by degenerative sight loss conditions such as glaucoma, diabetic retinopathy, and retinitis pigmentosa.

The founding members of OXSIGHT began their research at the University of Oxford in 2010, working closely with the low vision community in the UK. The aim was to develop this knowledge into innovative solutions for sight degeneration that have a balance of style, functionality and

intuitive technology. The first device, OXSIGHT Prism smart glasses, was launched last year, and the company is in the process of developing clinical partnerships with a number of opticians across the UK and Europe.

At present, the company is providing trials, fitting and clinical support at their clinics in London, Oxford and Manchester Greater Area through several clinical partners.

OXSIGHT partnered with Epson to develop their smart glasses to help people with peripheral vision loss, also known as "tunnel vision".

The smart glasses use augmented reality and image interpretation

technology to enhance users' remaining vision.

They are controlled via a hand-held console and fitted with a camera which streams a live-feed into two high-resolution video displays.

These screens are placed directly in front of the wearer's eyes and the images produced are manipulated to fit into the user's area of useable vision. "The OXSIGHT Prism

is worth it for me because it allows me to make the most of my remaining sight. One of the best things was that when I first tried the Prism device on, I found that I could see my wife's eyes, which I haven't been able to see for at least 10 years," said David Quigley, one of the first people in the UK to get an OXSIGHT Prism device.

The OXSIGHT glasses have seven modes, with features including: increased image contrast, super colour mode, textmode, edge enhancement, inverted colour and a digital zoom to allow users to magnify objects and obstacles.

These features have been shown to enhance the remaining vision of people with peripheral vision loss.

Another startup Absolute Water claims that it converts 17 lakh litres of sewage water into drinking water everyday, while Saahas Zero Waste specialises in treating and recycling waste without disturbing the ecosystem.

The other startups include NaMo E Waste, Rudra, Chakr Innovation and Urban Kisaan.

While Namo E Waste claims to be working towards recycling and ensuring safe disposal of e-waste, Rudra converts plastic into poly fuel and Chakr Innovation has created world's first retro-fit emission control device for diesel generators which can capture over 90 per cent of particulate matter emis-

sions, the statement said. Urban Kisan empowers people to grow their own safe, fresh and high quality food with the help of Hydroponic farming technique, the statement said.

"Planet Healers is not just a TV show; it is an attempt by Discovery to create mass awareness about environmental hazards faced by our country which will have significant long-term impact," said Zulfia Waris, Vice President, Premium and Digital networks, Discovery Communications India in a statement. "We have focused this series on individuals who have dedicated themselves to create innovative technology-led solutions for the conservation and preservation of our planet.

"They are common people with uncommon ambitions and incredible self-belief who are making a difference," Waris said.

# JeM's 'Ghazwa-e-Hind' brought India-Pak on brink of war twice in 20 yrs

NEW DELHI, MAR 3 (PTI): Pakistan-based Jaish-e-Mohammad's audacious terrorist strikes, part of its 'Ghazwa-e-Hind' (Holy War Against India), have turned it into one of the most deadly terror groups and brought India and Pakistan on the brink of war twice in two decades, officials said.

The most deadly terror strikes of the JeM in the past 20 years include attacks on the Pathankot airbase, the Army brigade headquarters in Uri, the Badamibagh cantonment in Srinagar and the bombing of the Jammu and Kashmir Assembly.

India and Pakistan were almost on the brink of war in 2001 when the JeM attacked the Indian Parliament, and again now after the February 14 suicide attack on a CRPF bus in Pulwama, which killed 40 jawans, a security official said Sunday.

The terrorist group. with close links with al-Qaida, had resolved at a conference held in Okara district in Pakistan on November 27, 2017, that it would continue its "Ghazwae-Hind" irrespective of the Indo-Pak ties, the official said citing an intelligence report.

The IeM, which had close links slain al-Qaida leader Osama bin Laden, was formed after the release of terror mastermind Masood Azhar from an Indian jail on December 31, 1999 after

When bin Laden was cornered in Tora Bora and the Pakistani army was forced to hold one side of the cordon of these vast caves, the JeM became the conduit to bring fighters and their families from Afghanistan into safe havens in Pakistan, run by JeM and another deadly terrorist group Lashkar-e-Taiba, the official said.

Khalid Sheikh Mohammed, one of the key conspirators of 9/11, housed fleeing al-Qaida

cadres in Karachi, he said. It is widely believed that to help bin Laden flee Tora Bora, JeM carried out attack on Parliament in New Delhi, leading to a war-like situation between India and Pakistan after Indian armed forces were mobilised along the country's western bor-

This provided a pretext to the Pakistani army to withdraw much of its forces from its western border, which were in cordon of the Tora Bora caves, thus helping the escape of bin Laden to Pakistan.

"It took 10 more deadly years to get Osama bin Laden. This is the nature and capability of JeM. Its activities just do not impact India, but feed on terrorism and has been a major threat to global peace and security," the official said.

November 2005, a few hours before the swearing in of Ghulam Nabi Azad as Chief Minister of Jammu and Kashmir, a JeM suicide squad detonated a powerful car bomb in the Nowgam area of Srinagar, killing 10 people and injuring 18 others.

On January 2, 2016, a heavily armed group of JeM attacked the Pathankot airbase in which seven security personnel and a security personnel were killed.

The JeM attacked the Uri brigade headquarters on September 18, 2016, killing 17 soldiers and injuring 30 others.

After the Pulwama attack, the Indian Air Force carried out an aerial attack on the biggest camp of JeM in Balakot in Pakistan, leading to another war-like situation between the two countries.

# India a high-tariff nation, says Trump

Washington, Mar 3 (PTI): India is a very high-tariff nation, US President Donald Trump alleged on Saturday, stating that he wants a reciprocal tax or at least some kind of tax.

"India is a very high-tariff nation. They charge us a lot," Trump said in his address to the Conservative Political Action Conference (CPAC) in the Maryland suburb of Washington DC.

In his speech that lasted for more than two hours, Trump touched a wide range of issues including domestic, global and bilateral relationship with countries like India.

Referring to his often-cited example of the iconic Harley-Davidson motorcycles, he said, "When we send a motorcycle to India, it's a hundred per cent tariff. They charge 100 per cent when India sends a motorcycle to us, we brilliantly charge them nothing."

"So, I want a reciprocal tax or at least, I want to charge a tax. It's called the mirror tax, but it's reciprocal," Trump asserted. Early this year, at a White House event to announce his support for reciprocal tax, Trump had said he was satisfied with the Indian decision to reduce the import tariff on Harley-Davidson motorcycles from 100 per cent to 50 per cent. "Even this is not enough, this is okay," he had said.

"Look at motorcycles as an example. (In) India, it was 100 per cent. I got them down to 50 per cent, just by talking for about two minutes. It's still 50 per cent vs 2.4 per cent (on imported motorcycles to the US). Again, other than that, it's a very fair deal," the president had told reporters at the White House on January 24.

On Saturday, he used the Indian example of how other countries were imposing high taxes on American products and now it was time for the US to impose a reciprocal tax. To prove his point, Trump said, he was using India as an example.

"But India is a very high-tariff nation. And they charge tremendously. So they charge a hundred. So I say, I'm not going to charge you a hundred, but I'm going to charge 25 per cent, and I hear this turmoil in the Senate because we are charging 25 per cent," he said. Trump told his supporters that there was resistance to his move from the Senate.

"I say, fellows, listen, they are charging us a hundred per cent. For the exact same product, I want to charge them 25 per cent. I feel so foolish charging 25, because it should be a hundred. But I'm doing 25 only because of you. I want to get your support," he said.

Thereafter, mimicked the response from the lawmakers. "Sir, that's not free trade. Where did these people come from? Where do they come from? I need your help, I need your help, the voters' help. Where do they come from?," he said.

Trump said the US could not allow a country to charge it 100 per cent while it got nothing for the exact same product.

"For one thing, they don't respect us. They think we're stupid. They don't respect us. But let me tell you something, the world respects our country again," he said.

"America is now booming like never before. Other countries are doing very poorly,"

### If anyone won the Oscars this year it was Netflix - the prize for its industry disruption

No single film dominated the 2019 Academy Awards as in some years, but arguably Netflix emerges as the winner. It entered the awards as an outsider and won in some of the most important categories. With 15 Oscar nominations, Netflix achieved as many nominations in 2019 as in the previous five years added together.

The Netflix film Roma was nominated for 10 awards including best picture, best director, best foreign language film and best cinematography, and went on to win the latter three. For the first time, a film distributed by an online streaming provider has won the industry's highest accolade.

Behind the polite plaudits and acceptance speeches there are bitter feelings within the mainstream film industry on whether Netflix merits this level of recognition. John Fithian, president of the National Association of Theater Owners, articulated this reticence when he said: "for filmmakers who want to go to Netflix, they are kind of selling their soul – the pot of money versus how they know a movie should be seen."

Roma's success is the latest beachhead in the ongoing march of Netflix as a serial disruptor in the entertainment industry. In the late 1990s the company famously disrupted the video and DVD rental business through an online subscription model with rented titles distributed by post. Its tenacity in sticking to this model saw Netflix dispatch rental industry leader Blockbuster, which closed in 2010.

Next in line were television broadcasters, which Netflix took on through its online streaming service once broadband internet speeds allowed it. This has fuelled the unprecedented speed of the company's international expansion, transforming Netflix from a content aggregator to a producer of high-quality content,

now posing a major challenge to mainstream broadcasters and encouraging many "cord-cutters" to cancel the cable TV subscriptions once seen as essential. It has also viewing habits, ushering in the generation of "binge-watchers". But the success of Roma at the

Oscars was not a happy accident. It was the result of the same single-minded determination that has driven Netflix's previous industry disruption. The film was the ideal weapon to seek an Academy Award. It had a director and producer with strong track records and previous awards and its black-and-white arthouse style offered only limited appeal to mainstream cinema audiences anyway. Netflix even compromised on its long-held day-and-date strategy, which requires its programming to be available in all regions at the same time in order to meet the qualifying criteria of the Academy (which requires that a film has some degree of cinema release). It also commissioned the Oscar campaign veteran Lisa Taback to promote the case for this movie with Academy members.

KEEPING UP THE MOMENTUM But Netflix now faces stark commercial realities. The company's share price has risen over 20fold and its revenue has grown from US\$3.5 billion to US\$16 billion since 2012, but by 2018 the company had long-term debt of over US\$10 billion. And this excludes the additional US\$19.3 billion needed to secure the rights to content Netflix intends to stream in the future.

The sheer volume of content that Netflix subscribers now expect is expensive to sustain, with production budgets estimated to be in the region of US\$13 billion this year. This puts pressure on free cash-flow which will inevitably remain negative for the foreseeable future.

If Netflix is to service its mounting

debt burden and remain sustainable. it needs to accelerate new subscriber growth and increase the revenue subscribers yield. This will be necessary in the face of aggressive competition driven fundamental changes in from other established streaming players, such as Amazon, Hulu or HBO, and to stay one step ahead of new entrants such as Disney and Apple, which come equipped with very deep pockets.

This will not be possible if Netflix continues to be seen as merely an alternative delivery channel for viewing content that would otherwise be available via broadcast television. Instead, Netflix wants to be recognised as the premium channel through which high-quality content may be viewed. The hope is that it will therefore be perceived by the market as being at least equivalent - if not superior - to cinemas as somewhere to watch the latest movies. Achieving such a shift in consumer and producer preferences would disrupt the established industry business model of giving cinemas precedence for latest releases.

Even were Netflix to achieve this, past precedent suggests that we should not expect the company to be satisfied. The company makes no secret of its view that it sees itself in competition with all other users of leisure time and leisure dollars. Its focus on enticing subscribers to further increase their viewing hours at the expense of other activities is unlikely to diminish.

However, the question remains whether whether Netflix can navigate its financial challenges and battle the competition that seeks to thwart its extraordinary march of disruption. Media mogul Barry Diller has already concluded that Netflix has won and that "Hollywood is now irrelevant". Perhaps, but we can expect many more episodes of Netflix as serial disruptor to play out before we know for sure.

### Qaeda-linked Syria group kills 21 regime forces: monitor Hayat Tahrir al-Sham or-

BEIRUT, MAR 3 (AFP): A Syrian jihadist group linked to Al-Qaeda killed 21 regime and allied forces Sunday near Idlib province, in one of the deadliest breaches of a six-month-old truce deal. a monitor said.

"At dawn, 21 fighters from the regime forces or allied militia were killed in an attack by Ansar al-Tawhid jihadists," the Svrian Observatory for Human Rights said.

"Five jihadists were also killed," Rami Abdel Rahman, the director of the Britain-based monitoring group, said.

Ansar al-Tawhid has ties to the larger Hurras al-Deen group, which is also active in the area. Both are considered semi-officials franchises of Al-Qaeda in Syria.

The area of Idlib and small parts of the adjacent provinces of Hama and Aleppo are mostly controlled by the rival ganisation. HTS is led by fighters who formerly belonged to Al-Qaeda's ex-affiliate in Syria. Sunday's deadly at-

tack was carried out against regime positions in the village of Masasna, in the north of Hama province, the Observatory said. "It was one of the highest casualty figures among regime ranks since the Putin-Erdogan deal," Abdel Rahman said.

He was referring to an agreement reached in the Russian resort of Sochi between Russian President Vladimir Putin and his Turkish counterpart Recep Tayyip Erdogan.

Under the September 17 deal, Turkey was supposed to exert its influence over anti-regime groups in the Idlib region to get them to pull back their fighters and heavy weapons from a demilitarised zone. The agreement was meant to stave off a planned offensive by the regime and its Russian backers that aid groups feared could spark the eight-year-old Syrian conflict's worst humanitarian crisis yet.

The government assault on the last major bastion of forces opposed to President Bashar al-Assad's rule has indeed been held off but the deal's provisions have not been implemented and the de facto truce looks shakier than ever. Since the Sochi agreement, HTS has consolidated its grip on the Idlib province and Turkey appears to be in no position to deliver on its commitment.

Breaches of the demilitarised zone have spiked in recent days. Another 20 regime and allied forces were killed in three days of clashes about a week ago.

ctor Kangana Ranaut Saturday said the system in place in ABollywood helps people with privilege and repels when it is challenged.

At the India Today Conclave 2019, she said her many fallouts in the industry happened because she was always presented do-or-die situations in which she always fought her survival.

"I come from a situation where I really do not have a backup plan. I don't have a plan B. It's not like I wake up in the morning and think about 'Oh wait a minute. How many people can I offend today and how to make my life difficult?' That's not how it is.

"... The kind of story I have I wasn't left with an option. I wish they did. I wish they let me do my thing and I wish there wasn't this do or die situation. I would have preferred it like that. But if one of us has to do die I will make sure that it is not me," Kangana said.

A couple of her past few films have been plagued by controversies. Her 2017 film "Simran" was marred by a spat between her and screenwriter Apurva Asrani, who claimed that she poached his writing credit.

Her latest release "Manikarni ka: The Queen of Jhansi" was also embroiled in multiple controver-

Kangana said the credit for her success is hers only as she is the only actor in the film industry "who has not worked with a big production house or a big hero".

"We all know that Bollywood, the film industry is classist and so is the rest of the society. The system works for certain people the way it is. It is definitely going to resist when you are going to challenge it."

The three-time National Award winner said after her debut film "Gangster", she struggled a lot for work.

"When I came to the industry with a film like 'Gangster', I won the Best Actress award in entire Asia and then I did not have any work at all. They did not know what to do with an actor like that.

"Item numbers were prevalent and so were the patriarchal and chauvinist sort of male depiction in films where actors and actresses are just showing up to get pinched in their butt or get mocked. So I did not had any work. So I like said if it is a do-or-die situation I'm going to

ensure that I survive," Kangana said.

She said the power players of Bollywood tried to suppress her voice but she fought every time.
