Shah backs protesting Ayyappa devotees, slams Left govt over 'crackdown'

KANNUR, OCT 27 (PTI): An "Emergency-like" situation prevails in Kerala with the state government "playing with fire" in quelling with "brutal force" protests by Ayyapa devotees over Sabarimala issue, BJP chief Amit Shah alleged Saturday, escalating his attack on the Left dispensation.

In a hard-hitting speech after inaugurating the BJP district office in politically sensitive Kannur, which has often seen clashes between BJP-RSS and CPI(M), Shah alleged that the communist government is "conspiring against temples" and came out in support of Ayyappa devotees, who have been protesting against the implementation of the Supreme Court decision to allow entry of women of menstrual age into the shrine

"An Emergency-like situation exists in Kerala," Shah alleged and accused the CPI(M)-led LDF government of "suppressing" the Ayyappa devotees' agitation.
Listing court verdicts

Listing court verdicts which have not been implemented, including on 'Jallikattu' (traditional bull taming sport of Tamil Nadu) and prohibiting loudspeakers in mosques, Shah said "impractical" directions should not be given by courts and they should pass orders that can be implemented.

"You concentrate on developing the state rather than attacking the Ayyappa bhakts," the BJP president said and warned Chief Minister Pinarayi Vijayan that he would have to pay a "heavy price" if this continues, as BJP workers "would not hesitate to pull down the government".

Superintendent of Police, Jai Singh Meena said that a rally was organized by CPI(M) supporters at Belonia town, about 110 km from here this morning, which came under attack from about 25 people.

"The police immediately rushed to the spot and the attackers fled the spot..." the SP said.

Saudi rejects Turkey call to extradite Khashoggi's killers

MANAMA, OCT 27 (AFP): Riyadh on Saturday dismissed Ankara's calls to extradite 18 Saudis wanted for the murder of critic Jamal Khashoggi, as Washington warned the crisis risked destabilising the Middle East. "The individuals are

"The individuals are Saudi nationals. They're detained in Saudi Arabia, and the investigation is in Saudi Arabia, and they will be prosecuted in Saudi Arabia," Foreign Minister Adel al-Jubeir told a regional defence forum in Bahrain.

He was responding to Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan who on Friday renewed his call for the 18 men to be extradited for trial in Turkev.

ed for trial in Turkey. Khashoggi, 59, who had lived in self-imposed exile in the United States since 2017, vanished after entering the consulate on October 2 to obtain paperwork for his marriage to his Turkish fiancee.

Gruesome reports have alleged that he was murdered and his body dismembered by a team sent from Saudi Arabia to silence the Washington Post columnist, who had criticised Saudi's powerful Crown Prince Mohammad bin Salman.

After weeks of denials, Riyadh has sought to draw a line under the crisis with an investigation.


Prince Mohammad, heir to the oil-rich nation's throne, publicly denounced the murder as "repulsive", while the Saudi prosecutor acknowledged for the first time this week that based on the evidence of a Turkish investigation the killing had been "premeditated".

But US Defence Secretary Jim Mattis, who was also addressing the Manama forum, warned that "the murder of Jamal Khashoggi in a diplomatic facility must concern us all greatly".

"Failure of any nation to adhere to international norms and the rule of law undermines regional stability at a time when it is needed most," he stressed.

Saudi authorities have arrested 18 men wanted by Ankara following the international furore over Khashoggi's murder, which was reportedly carried out in the consulate by a team which flew to Istanbul.

The journalist's murder has generated inter-national outrage and un-dermined Riyadh's rela-tions with the US and other Western governments. But the Saudi foreign

minister vowed Saturday "we will overcome it." "The issue, as I said, is being investigated. We will know the truth. We will hold those responsible accountable. And we will put in place mechanisms to ensure it doesn't hap-pen again," Jubeir told

the defence forum.

On Thursday, CIA Director Gina Haspel briefed US President Donald Trump on the latest developments in the investigation after a fact-finding mission to Turkey.

Pro-government Turk-ish media said intelligence officers showed Haspel video images and audio tapes of Khashoggi's killing gathered from the consulate.

But the body of Khashoggi, who was once an insider in Saudi royal

circles, remains missing.
"You need to show this body," Erdogan ining that his country had more evidence about the killing to reveal.

The Turkish presi-

dent, who has stopped short of directly blaming the Saudi government, added the 18 suspects must know who killed Khashoggi and repeated his call for the men to be tried in Turkey.

"The culprit is among them. If that is not the case, then who is the local conspirator? You have to tell," he said. "Unless you tell, Sau-

di Arabia will not be free from this suspicion." Khashoggi's fiancee

Hatice Cengiz said in a TV interview on Friday that she never would have let him enter the consulate if she had thought that "Saudi Arabia authorities would hatch a plot" to kill him.

involved in this savagery from the highest to the lowest levels are punished and brought to justice," Cengiz told the Haberturk television station.

She said she had not been contacted by Saudi officials and was unlikely to go to Saudi Arabia for any funeral there if Khashoggi's missing body is found.

Delhi L-G imposes ESMA to prohibit strike by contractual workers of DTC

New Delhi, Oct 27 (PTI): Lieutenant Governor Anil Baijal has invoked the Essential Services Maintenance Services Act (ESMA) to prohibit contractual workers of Delhi Transport Corporation (DTC) from strik-ing work, according to an official statement on Saturday.

The contractual em-

Empowered Women

It will take more than policy interventions

he 50/50 power-sharing arrangement between the sexes has been instituted in Sikkim at the panchayat and urban local body levels, with even the top posts being equally apportioned between the men and women. Just as the 50% seat reservation for women in Sikkim panchayats marked a new milestone for rural empow-erment in Sikkim, so does their equal representation at the top panchayat level. While the verdict is still awaited on how effectively this increased, and mandated by law, empowerment has been leveraged, what is significant is that women in Sikkim have consistently embraced their stake in Sikkim, an involvement they have proven with how enthusiastically they have turned out to vote.

By turning out to vote in larger proportions than men, Sikkim's ladies have displayed that they are keen to have a larger stake in governance and policy-making. Election 2014 was for the second consecutive election that women voters outperformed men in Sikkim. In Elections 2009, against an 81.46% male voter turnout, Sikkim's women posted 82.77%. In 2014, 81.40% of the women voters exercised their franchise to help decide the government for the current term against 80.57% male voters. This is one statistic that should make every Sikkimese proud, because make no mistake, stepping out, braving the heat and the rain later in the evening to vote, is a sign of empowerment. What is more, this is no flash in the pan episode, but appears to be a process which has sustained and grown over the past decade and a half. In Elections 1999, women voter turnout was five percentage points lower than men [79.10% versus 84.36%], and as women's empowerment efforts progressed in earnest [and the SDF government deserves credit for it], in Elections 2004, male and female voter turnout were almost level 77.01% against 77.99%. As already mentioned, the women turned the tables on male voters in 2009, and have retained the bragging rights for the latest election as well. Even as the women voters rank higher in percentage turn-out, they are not very far behind when it comes to absolute numbers either. Against a total of 1,53,425 men who voted in Sikkim in 2014, slightly over 1.46 lakh ladies pressed the EVM buttons.

The numbers prove the heightened involvement with which women in Sikkim have taken to participatory democracy. The panchayat elections are almost due now, and will be interesting to see what statistics the voter turnout reveals at that time.

Generalisations, admittedly, are by nature inaccu-

rate and unscientific tools to draw conclusions, but if one were to surmise on what factors led to more women voting in Sikkim, there would be a multitude of factors, but one of the most substantial motivators must have been the increased attention being paid to women in Sikkim which convinced them that they had a stake in governance and the need to sustain it. Factors such as improving literacy, increased representation [in panchayat and urban bodies] and a slew of other women-centric interventions contribute to this increased voter turn-out, and even as one frowns at sops and quotas, these must be working towards empowerment because that is what the data is posting. This is perhaps also a trend whose time has come, and one which would automatically require political planners to position there stands with improved consideration of women interests. Because women's participation in voting is on the rise, their mandate will require delivery more than rhetoric. There are however still many politicians, who, even if they have shed overt male chauvinism, remain insensitive towards women's issues and some have even displayed boorish poor taste in the recent past. For anyone with any serious political ambitions, gender sensitivity will be a good investment to make. While this used to be consciously included in the activities of most political outfits till a few years back, it has all but vanished from political deliberations in post-election Sikkim. The sooner the wannabe leaders recognise the due rights and aspirations of women, the better it will be for their political futures.

Sikkimese women have established that henceforth their endorsement will be required by every aspirant and every candidate, in every constituency in Sikkim. This power cannot be ignored because while women voters are in [a very slight] majority in five assembly constituencies, in actual turnout [not just percentage points] they outnumbered male voters in as many as nine Assembly constituencies. Even the most basic po litical calculation will thus recommend that political parties in Sikkim allow more women into representative politics roles, in positions which are more than just token. The parties, for their own survival, need to appreciate the power that women now wield in Sikkim and this means that women's issues can no longer be sidestepped. Political power is no longer possible without catering to the women voters, and given the centuries of prejudice and offensively male-centric system that has been imposed on women, one hopes that this vote-bank stands separate from the caste and community divisions that short-sighted politicians tend to carve out. It is an accepted fact that the male voters in Sikkim are segregated by too many petty and selfish responses but the female voter preferences, because they are still relatively new to this level of involvement, remain little understood. The stats, however, offer a good opportunity to Sikkim to take gender equality and empowerment to a new level by stepping away from routine tokenism.

Scooby-dooby-doo: Making sense of scat singing

you go to hear a jazz singer at your local venue, you will most likely experience "scatting" or "scat". Scat singing can be disconcerting because it involves the singer departing from the melody of a song in improvisation and abandoning tradi-tional lyrics in favour of apparently nonsensical utterances such as "doo-yah-dah-dah-dit-dip-bah!" (to quote from Louis Armstrong's 1927 recording, Hotter than that).

For some people, scat marks the descent of jazz singing into meaningless nonsense and unseemly expression. Even the great jazz critic, Leonard Feather, suggested that: "Scat singing – with only a couple of exceptions – should be banned." But, is scat really meaningless and, if not, how can we make sense of it?

Despite the existence of scat-like singing in the folk music traditions of West Africa and Europe (for example, Scottish mouth music), it is most likely that scat emerged in jazz in the early 1900s when singers in New Orleans began to imitate the first jazz instrumentalists. Legend has it that Louis Armstrong, the great trumpeter, vocalist and pioneer of improvisation in jazz, became the first to record scat in the 1926 track Heebie Jeebies, when he forgot the words during a recording session.

This is a plausible story, because recording was

still a fairly primitive process - tracks were recorded in a single take and studios were kept uncom-fortably hot to keep the wax masters soft enough for grooves to be cut in to them. Under such con ditions – especially within the racist culture of the time – it was no wonder that, as Armstrong reported, black musicians felt nervous at the prospect of upsetting white producers by wasting studio time

In this context, Armstrong's covering of a memory lapse with improvised vocal hokum, much a way of protecting himself and his livelihood, as a sign of great vocal artistry. Nevertheless, such recordings established scat as a characteristic feature of jazz singing.

Through the recordings made by Armstrong and later Cab Calloway, scat swiftly became a distinctive feature of jazz's modernity that, along with the saxophone, syncopation, improvisation and outlandish playing techniques, made (and makes) jazz distinctly hip

BEYOND LYRICS

Scat is, however, not just an idle feature of jazz. Instead, it represents in vocal form an important ideology of freedom of expression that has underpinned the whole enterprise of jazz music making since its

inception. Scat allows the jazz vocalist to escape the lyrics and the straitjacket of meanings that comes from words. It grants the singer the status of a solo instrumentalist, like any other in jazz, and thereby moves vocal expression towards abstraction and modes of meaning that are musical rather than verbal. Scat thereby defies linguistic meaning systems and, by extension, the social structures and power relations that condition them.

If, as many aficionados would argue, jazz is the musical expression of freedom that extends from the memory of African American enslavement and emancipation, then scat is its vocal manifestation

Given that freedom may be at stake, it is tempting to take scat very seriously indeed. However, many of the greatest exponents of scat, whether black or white, most often exude fun. Ella Fitzgerald, for example, makes playful reference to Armstrong's 1955 hit record of Mack the Knife in her 1960 rendition of the song, when she breaks in to me decidedly gravelly-voiced scat.

Fitzgerald's televised performance even shows

her mopping her brow with a white handkerchief in just the same manner as Armstrong did in his performances. Is her reference to Armstrong and Bobby Darin a critique of Armstrong's 1950s turn towards pop commercialism (Darin had a huge hit with the song in 1960) or a fondly comedic tribute? The beauty of Fitzgerald's scatting is that it never tells us explicitly and we are left to make up our own minds as we enjoy her playful singing.

NEW LANGUAGE

Fitzgerald's scatting, as much as that by more re-cent luminaries such as Cleo Laine, Al Jarreau or Kurt Elling shows that since jazz's inception, scat has become established as an expressive language

in its own right.

But anyone who has tried to scat on one of great jazz "standards" (classic songs) with a band can tell you that it is simply not the case that anything goes when one is scatting – there are conventions and expectations that come with the idiom. Furthermore, even great scat singers tend to employ certain "licks" (turns of phrase) that are rooted in instrumental solos of the past.

Nevertheless, there is still plenty of room for experiment and development and the underlying connection between scat and freedom remains a powerfully meaningful one that is only reinforced by the playfulness in scatting.

In the performances of masters like Fitzgerald and fellow singer Mel Torme in the video above, it is scat's playful fun that stops it appearing pretentious in its abstract representation of freedom from restrictive structures and oppression. But the combination of its serious underlying message of freedom and its comedic mode of expression means that scat appears curiously double voiced and discursive: we are left to make sense of the contradictory (serious-fun) character of the word-

So, as much as scat might appear to be a descent into utter nonsense, it actually makes a great deal of sense as a particular sort of unresolved expression. It is sensible precisely where words fail – and there is surely a whole lot still to be sung about our experience of contradictory and complicated situations, thoughts and emotions that words can never adequately capture.

Halloween is a time when ghosts and spooky decorations are on public display, reminding us of the realm of the dead. But could they also be instructing us in important les-

sons on how to lead moral lives? ROOTS OF HALLOWEEN

The origins of modern-day Halloween go back to "samhain," a Celtic celebra n for the beginning of the dark half of the year when, it was widely believed, the realm between the living and the dead overlapped and ghosts could be commonly encountered.

In 601 A.D., to help his drive to Christianize northern Europe, Pope Gregory I directed missionaries not to stop pagan celebrations, but rather to Christianize them.

Accordingly, over time, the celebrations of samhain became All Souls' Day and All Saint's Day, when speaking with the dead was considered religiously appropriate. All Saint's Day was also known as All Hallows' Day and the night before became All Hallows' Evening, or "Hallowe'en. CHRISTIAN GHOSTS

Not only did the pagan beliefs around spirits of the dead contin-ue, but they also became part of many of early church practices

Pope Gregory I himself sug-gested that people seeing ghosts should say masses for them. The dead, in this view, might require help from the living to make their

journey towards Heaven.

During the Middle Ages, beliefs around souls trapped in purgatory led to the church's increasing practice of selling indulgences - payments to the church to reduce penalties for sins. The widespread belief in ghosts turned the sale of indulgences into a lucrative practice for the church.

It was such beliefs that contributed to the Reformation, the division of Christianity into Protestantism and Catholicism led by German theologian Martin Luther. Indeed, Luther's "95 Theses," that he nailed to the All Saints Church in Wittenburg on Oct. 31, 1517, was largely a protest against the selling of indulgences.

Subsequently, ghosts became identified with "Catholic superstitions" in Protestant countries.

Debates, however, continued about the existence of ghosts and people increasingly turned to science to deal with the issue. By the 19th century, Spiritualism, a new movement which claimed that the dead could converse with the living, was fast becoming mainstream, and featured popular techniques such as seances, the ouija board, spirit photography and the like.

Although Spiritualism faded in cultural importance after World War I, many of its approaches can be seen in the "ghost hunters" of today, who often seek to prove the existence of ghosts using scientific techniques.

A WIDE, WIDE WORLD OF GHOSTS

These beliefs are not just part of the Christian world. Most, although mot all, societies have a concept of "ghosts." In Taiwan, for example, about 90 percent people report see-

about 90 percen-ing ghosts.

Along with many Asian coun-tries such as Japan, Korea, China and Vietnam, Taiwan celebrates a "Ghost Month," which includes a "Chost Day," when ghosts are believed to freely roam the world of the living. These festivals and beliefs are often tied to the Buddhist story of the Urabon Sutra, where Buddha in-structs a young priest on how to help his mother whom he sees suffering as

a "hungry ghost."

As in many traditions, Taiwanese ghosts are seen either as "friendly" or "unfriendly." The "friendly" ghosts are commonly ancestral or familial and welcomed into the home during the ghost festival. The "unfriendly" ghosts are those angry or "hungry' ghosts that haunt the living.

ROLE OF GHOSTS IN OUR LIVES

As a scholar who has studied and taught ghost stories for many years, I have found that ghosts generally haunt for good reasons. These could range from unsolved murders, lack of proper funerals, forced suicides, preventable tragedies and other ethical

Ghosts, in this light, are often found seeking justice from beyond the grave. They could make such demands from individuals, or from societies as a whole. For example, in the U.S., sightings have been report-ed of African-American slaves and murdered Native Americans. Scholar Elizabeth Tucker details many of these reported sightings on university campuses, often tied in with sordid

aspects of the campus's past.

In this way, ghosts reveal the shadow side of ethics. Their sightings are often a reminder that ethics and morality transcend our lives and that ethical lapses can carry a heavy spiritual burden.

Yet ghost stories are also hopeful. In suggesting a life after death, they

offer a chance to be in contact with those that have passed and therefore a chance for redemption - a way to atone for past wrongs.
This Halloween, along with

the shrieks and shtick, you may want to take a few minutes to appreciate the role of ghosts in our haunted pasts and how they guide us to lead moral and ethical

The Ridge: From an exclusive to an inclusive public space

One of the best part about Shimla is the Ridge.

Located in the center of Shimla

town, the Ridge is abuzz with people and activities from all walks of life. However, this wide open space has a dark colonial history that has thankfully been rewritten and

changed in contemporary today.

During colonial times, the
Ridge was exclusively set aside for British officers. It provided an exquisite view of the Himalayas with the church, the library and the town hall (Gaiety theater today) located very close to each other. This part of Shimla was colonized by the the rich and the powerful as they came to Shimla not just to cool off from hot Indian summers, but also to maintain distance from the natives. With a British only policy, no locals could walk in that area as social interaction with locals was non-existent and it reveals a hierarchical order that pervaded this hill station

If the Ridge was meant for the British, the middle part where the mall road is located or the middle bazar was inhabited by the An-glo-Indians and "domiciled" Brits while the lower Bazar was meant for the coolies, laborers and the

British. And if these servants needed to get to the other end of the hill. el was built by the British to take them to the other side.

There was a stark division of

people and places in colonial Shimla.

But for better or worse not many people know the history of the Ridge nor the tunnel that still exists under the mall today. Everyone goes to the Ridge and the tourists hardly find their way to the tunnel. But after living here for more than half a year, taking my visiting friends to the Ridge via the tunnel is my favorite route.

As we walk up the slopes of Ti-betan market after getting out of the tunnel and towards the Ridge, the uphill can be a bit tiresome for some but one soon forgets about it as you see the flagpole and the tricolor fluttering in all its glory. Indira Gandhi and Mahatma Gandhi's statues mark the dawn of Indian independence in the Ridge but it is the colonial leftovers that still em prominent

There is the Gaiety theater, even enovated in colonial architecture that hosts interesting events like film festivals, dance performances, art exhibition and even Mr. Hi-machal body building competiton. The best part is that most events

a minister can both be found at the film festival and this is not too hard to believe. My friend has spot-ted the chief minister of Himachal walking around the mall. Since no vehicles are allowed in this area, one is expected to walk and to find the CM get off his VIP car and walk

around is a nice gesture I think.

Nearby is the Daulat Singh
Park which charges Rs.5 for entry and only tourists would be foolish enough to pay and enter that park. Because the whole Ridge is a park after all. Also they don't realize that if you climb up the Ridge from mall road, you automatically enter the park and they only look for tickets at the entrance. But this is where "professional" photographers sit and try to convince you to take photos wearing a Himachali dress. There are those who refuse and those who oblige. The ones ready for their photo shoot are usually young girls and newly wed honeymooning couples ready to pose in rolorful clothes

The most popular landmark of Shimla is the Christ Church. It was built in 1857 and still looks grand from the outside. But it is old and the followers of the faith have left but, broken stained glass paintings and flickering light bulbs. It is

Sundays I try to attend this church as its empty pews and torn hymn books make you feel sad and old (like that old rugged cross).

There are plenty of bleachers outside the church for people to sit. And I find this exercise of sitting in these benches, not doing anything and watching people pass by as such a privilege. In today's day and world when we have no time for anything, just watching people watching people is a welcome

Next to the church is the Himachal state library that is also housed in an old "heritage" build-ing. I especially like its location despite being a colonial legacy because it is accessible to all.

While the colonial architec-tures still remain, the takeover by contemporary society and its inclusivity is what I love about the Ridge. If one has found a place to sit, a chaiwala will soon make way to sell his tea. If a grandfather has come out with his grandson, a bal-loonwala will find them and sell the balloon. Young girls in school uniforms and college friends all seem to have a good time as tourists' end up sitting after a long day's walk around Shimla town.

There are festivals, sports and



other activities that happen in the Ridge and one can only appreciate how it has created a space for everyone. The Ridge has become the place to be. It is not just for the oung and the cool, but the coolies and the grandmas all find space in the Ridge to socialize, relax, and enjoy themselves.

Public spaces in our country is hard to find and Shimla's Ridge is a fine example of how we can trans-form a dark history of exclusivity to an inclusive public space.

Chittagong port a boon for the Northeast: Conrad Sangma

SHILLONG, OCT 27 (PTI): Meghalaya Chief Minis-ter Conrad K Sangma has hailed the decision to open the Chittagong port in Bangladesh to facilitate trade with India's North-

Sangma said the decision will boost trade in the region and Meghalaya in particular, which shares a very long international border with Bangladesh.

This is a big step towards ensuring that we, in the Northeasr, have port connectivity and accessibility, Sangma said while addressing the 6th edition of the 'Young Leaders Connect' here.

"It will reduce transportation cost for goods and allow exposure for the northeastern states to the international markets.

he said.
The Bangladesh gov ernment had earlier this month approved a draft agreement to allow northeastern states of India to use Chittagong sea port and Mongla riv-er ports, primarily aimed at restoring pre-partition logistics for the entire

northeast region.
Sangma also said that increase of trade between India, Bangladesh and Myanmar is crucial for the economic development of Meghalaya.

The state shares a 443-km long Interna-tional border with Bangladesh and recently the Meghalaya government has said it will write to the Centre to facilitate setting up of more import/ex-port points along the In-do-Bangladesh border.

The state, rich in natural resources, also offers excellent potential for export for agro-horti-culture products, forest products, handloom and handicrafts, a senior Industries department offi-cial told PTI.

Admitting that the state suffers from locational disadvantages, the official said that poor in-frastructure and scanty information regarding export potential are the reasons why bilateral trade did not pick up as expect-

have always been fascinated with myths, folktales, mythical creatures, Letc. -tales we have been hearing since our childhood. The Tales of Hlo Mung (yeti) who resides in the mountains, speaks the language of whistles, a shape shifter and also a protector, I also learned of Songrong Mung (lam lamey) or as the locals' call it, a short statured being with long breasts. The only advice I would always get if I would encounter it one day was to run downhill as fast as I could. I had heard of the mythical place of Mayel Maluk or Mayel Kyong, a place of eternal bliss where people were immortal, where the lands were fertile and crops of every kind grew. As I grew up, I found out that many other cultures shared similar stories. A cultural construct of a place where everyone wished to be, given the time around which this concept originated everyone wished for fertile lands and crops given the needs of the people then. If it was to be the cultural construct of the present given the needs of the people today, it would be a haven of great technologies alongside the richness of culture -a 'Wakanda" perhaps.

Out of the many tales that I absorbed, one in particular intrigued me. It was about the last Lepcha king -Pano Gaeboo Achyok. As a child I would hear of how he fought selfless-ly to protect his people and land from the invading Bhutanese armies. I had heard of him possessing supernatural powers and how he could pierce a whole tree with his arrow and how he used to slice a whole horse along with its rider in one single blow. These tales had remained with me and the more I heard the more it became interesting that these tales were re volved around an actual person so he had acquired the status of a guardian, a king, and a deity long after his death

and is still revered.

Since my research was on this very personality, I set out to find out more about him. I had prepared a semi-structured research plan of where I needed to go and what I needed to do. At first I thought my fieldwork would go smoothly as I was going amongst my own people. But as time passed this thought turned out to be a distant fantasy. I was criticized by some for not knowing the language properly. I do realize the importance of knowing the language to under-stand the under layers of the culture and the community and I am still try-ing my best to learn it. Some even ignored my questions saying that being from the community itself I should know all this beforehand. These were all minor setbacks. Every time I go for fieldwork I have a great time. I really enjoy getting to learn new things. I enjoyed the visit to different forts

around Kalimpong believed to have been built by Pano Gaeboo Achyok. The most famous among them is Damsang Gree, (Damsang fort) which is situated 45 km away from Kalim-pong town it is located between Alga-ra and Pedong. Built in a secluded hill it is a fortress of stones; as the myth goes it was constructed in one night with the help of his supernatural powers. The fort looks down on Pedong. The name Pedong originates from the Lepcha words pe meaning fodder and dong meaning to find, the name originated as Pano Gaeboo Achyok and his men used to collect fodder for their horses. The location is perfect for keeping an eye on any suspicious enemy activities down below. Today only the ruins remain, a sanctuary for the Lepchas where they worship their last pano and their ancestors.

Following up on Gaeboo Achyok led me to different places in Kalim-pong, I was chasing a myth but the amount of evidences that came up was enough to stir up a "what if..." I feel

that myths, legends always end with a 'what if.' since they are based on a certain amount of truth. Even when I had heard so many things about the pano this was completely new for me. Many do not approve of auto ethnog-raphy as to the biases one may apply when it comes to one's own commu nity but even the "other" researchers tend to get biased when they have strong attachments for the communi-ty they spend a lot of time with. I have always tried to maintain a neutral outlook on finding the facts from the field and conveying it through my work, as belonging to the community I do have my own sentiments attached to it. As ethnocentrism is so engraved in all cultures, biases are meant to be. But then research ethics, cultural relativ-

ism, has hopefully kept me in check.

The next destination was Lungsyol
which is believed to be the birth place of the Gaeboo Achyok, This place also has a gree (fort) called Chyakung Gree, but the structure is a little different from all the other grees, this is more like the foundation of a house which makes perfect sense as being a place for the pano's parents to live while caring for their child. This place overlooks Jalpaiguri far below and further to Bhutan. The legend of Pano Gaeboo Achyok had a strong hold on the place, both Lepchas and non-Lepchas believed in him and considered him to be a supernatural being.

As I moved from place to place, the myth slowly turned into possible realities. I went to more forts, graves, stones, markers, trees, portraits, swords, etc. and the stories revolving around them. They offered information that needed a little attention.

After Lungsyol I moved to Dapling another village in Kalimpong, a three hours walk from Lungsyol. The jour-ney was tiring but for people of Lungsyol it was a daily routine.

Dapling is home to Un-thik Lyang

army and rests their horses as they travelled from one place to another making it a central point from where they communicated with their other observatories. Far below the place where the horses were kept there is a huge jackfruit tree, which as stories state was planted by Gaeboo Achyok's mother as they were travelling through that route. This tree bore fruits to many generation of Lepchas. Now old and unable to bear fruits anymore it is still standing tall providing refuge to small animals and shades to people. There was a feeling brewing up inside my mind once coming face to face with it. It was also remarkable to see how certain objects have the power to conjure memories, and tales thought to be long gone remain dor-mant in the minds of people. After that I went to Suruk -to another fort which is crumbling to dust with the little attention it receives but the tales related to it still echoes among the people around bonfires told to children by their grandparents, ensuring the flow of knowledge and traditions. The last point was Dalim gree, the place where it all ended, situated in Gorubathan, famous for its "Bhutey Daha" (Ghost Lake) this was where Gaeboo Achyokwas believed to have been killed. It is said that when he was killed, his head flew and fell into the lake and since then the place was an active zone for paranormal activities, Whoever did not pray to him before crossing the road through the water body woo meet their death by vomiting blood.

All these places have a lot of ar-chaeological evidences and history buried with them which is but slow-ly eroding with time and negligence. The memories remain only till there is something to evoke it, something constantly reminding people, and the day it perishes the memories will too So it is upon the people themselves



whether they want to cling on to their historical facts or just let it be covered with dust and scrubs till it finally

For the Lepchas, Pano Gaeboo Achyok was a king, a hero and a super natural being who fought to protect them. Today they commemorate him on the occasion of his birthday every year on 20th of December by celebrating a grand festival in Kalimpone where Lepchas from all directions, all religions and all backgrounds come and celebrate it together as one. He has today become a symbol of identity and solidarity for the Lepcha community. It is celebrated in a grand manner. I used to visit the festival every year when I was younger but it was the first time I went to the festi-val as a researcher. I took part in most of the activities talking to people and observing the festival as it proceeded.
Anthropology has taken me to the

field and holistic study in the field has its own beauty because we get to know many new things, see the similarities and differences of a culture and what effects it. We can see a whole continuum of evolutions. It was an eye open-ing journey for me. I gained so much of knowledge from my own community. There is always something more, something unknown and unexplored even in the things we think we know the best and we don't have to go too far in search of facts, it's all around us

The tricky road ahead for Dhoni till 2019 World Cup

Dhoni has written his
own script all these years but omission from India's T20 squad may force him to venture into unchartered terrains moving into the 2019 World Cup in England. While the 37-year-

old is known to keep his cards close to his chest, but it seems that the ODI World Cup might just be the last time that this once-in-a-generation play-er dons the India blues.

The national selection committee has shown first signs of phasing him out from one of the two and T20 certainly seems to be more convenient for the five wise men.

"It's a given that Dhoni won't be around when next ICC World T20 hap pens in Australia in 2020. So, there wasn't any point continuing with him if he will not play World T20,



senior BCCI official privy to selection policy told PTI on Saturday

"Obviously, the selec-tors and team management had a good deliberation on this issue. Both Virat Kohli and Rohit Sharma were present at the selection committee meeting.

"You think selectors could have gone ahead without their approval?" the official said.

In the year 2018, Dhoni played seven T20 Internationals with an unbeaten 52 off 28 balls against South Africa being the highlight.

If that inning is taken out, Dhoni has scored 71 runs off 51 balls in the remaining six matches that

he has played.

It's no secret that
Dhoni is the first choice

wicketkeeper for the En-gland World Cup but a lot will depend on how he

performs in the last three ODIs against West Indies. More so because he will again be out of match practice for the next two months till India play their next lot of ODIs from January to March.

Dhoni's major decisions, retiring from Tests or quitting limited-overs captaincy may look instinctive but those who have seen him closely know how much thought process goes into it.

Delhites advised to avoid outdoor activities, minimize use of pvt vehicles

DELHI, OCT 27 (PTI): Avoiding outdoor exercises and minimal use of private vehicles are some of the measures the CPCB-led task force has suggested for implementation in Delhi-NCR during the first 10 days of November as the air quality is likely to deteriorate rther owing to localised emissions around festivals and stubble burning in neighbouring states.

The Central Pollution

Control Board's task force also recommended clo-sure of all construction activities that generate dust pollution between November 1 and 10.

In a meeting with representatives from En-vironment Ministry, IMD, Uttar Pradesh Pollution Control Board, Haryana Pollution Control Board and Delhi Pollution Control Board Friday, the task force apprised the memhers on the levels of air pollution in Delhi-NCR showing an upward trend

Siddharth Singh, a representative from the India Meteorological Department, said Delhi's air quality, which has deteriorated to the very poor level, would continue to remain in that category

for a few days.

The task force said that at the beginning of November the situation may further deteriorate on account of localised emissions during festivals and regional contribution due to stubble burning.

In view of this and previous years' experience, the task force recommended a few additional measures as proactive steps to deal with the situation for consideration by the Supreme Court-appoint-ed Environment Pollution Control Authority.

It has recommended avoiding outdoor strenuous exercises, minimal use of private vehicles to reduce exposure to toxic air. Other measures in-

cluded shut down of coal and biomass based industries (excluding ther-mal and waste-to-energy plants) from November 4 to 10, intensification of efforts by transport department to check polluting vehicles and con-trolling traffic congestion in Delhi-NCR between November 1 and 10, according to the minutes of the meeting.

The task force also recommended efforts to provide uninterrupted power supply in NCR areas to avoid requirement of operating diesel generator (DG) sets.

D Saha, former air quality chief at CPCB, said meteorological factors like wind speed, solar direction and temperature are mostly responsible for increasing pollution levels in the

city.

"If these factors come the air under control, the air quality automatically improves," he said.

The measures recommended by the task force are only preventive steps and not to create panic as the air pollution in Delhi is governed by meteorological conditions, he said.

Paine axed with Finch named Australia's new ODI skipper



SYDNEY, OCT 27 (AFP): Aaron Finch was named Australia's new One-Day captain Saturday ahead of their upcoming series against South Africa, with Test skipper Tim Paine and his deputy Mitch Marsh axed.

The explosive batsman is already in charge of the Twenty20 team and takes over from Paine who averaged just 7.2 in Australia's 5-0 ODI series rout by England in June.

Spin veteran Nathan Lvon was another notable omission, although Shaun Marsh kept his place despite a dire re-cent Test series against Pakistan in the United Arab Emirates.

Alex Carey and Josh Hazlewood

pointed joint vice-cap-tains in a 14-man squad that sees the return of bowlers Mitchell Starc and Pat Cummins.

"It's very exciting, I'm very humbled, very hon-oured to lead the side and lead Australia." Finch said, welcoming having a bowler as his deputy.

"I think it's really important to have the voice of the bowlers there as well... a lot of the time batters are in leadership roles and bowlers are neglected in terms of that and it's almost an 'us versus them' at times.'

National selector Trevor Hohns said the leadership decisions were based on presenta-tions the players made, their vision for Australian cricket and their actions on and off the field.

"We expect Aaron, Josh and Alex to lead the side through a big Australian summer... they'll also be driving our standards and values as we prepare our defence of the World Cup, which is only seven months away," he said. "We believe the

squad we have selected will give us a great opportunity to not only be competitive at home this summer, but it also allows us to start to build continuity leading into next year's tournament."

Finch, Marsh, Travis Head and Glenn Maxwell spearhead the batting while big-hitting Chris Lynn has been recalled, with Carey taking over the wicketkeeping duties from Paine. "Alex Carev will pull

on the gloves full-time to allow Tim Paine to focus purely on captaining the Test team, which includes preparing for next vear's Ashes," said Hohns in explaining why Paine was dropped. "Alex provides us with

another strong batting op-tion, as he displayed in last year's Big Bash, and he's a wonderful young leader to have around the group and out in the field."

Sirisena suspends parliament till Nov 16 as political crisis deepens in Lanka

COLOMBO, OCT 27 (PTI): Sri Lankan President Maithripala Sirisena on Saturday suspend-ed parliament till November 16 after sacked Prime Minister Ranil Wickremesinghe sought an emergency session to prove his majority, deepening the political crisis in the island nation.

Sirisena's move is seen as an effort to allow former strongman Mahinda Rajapaksa to buy more time to seek jority in parliament.

Parliamentary officials said

the president prorogued the house till November 16. The parliament was earlier due to meet on November 5 to unveil the 2019 annual budget.

Rajapaksa and Sirisena combine has only 95 seats and Sirisena is short of a simple majority in the 225-member house. Wickremesinghe's United National Party (UNP) has 106 seats on its own with just seven short

of the majority.

The UNP claimed that Presi-

dent Sirisena sought to prorogue the parliament as 72-year-old Rajapaksa did not command a majority in the House.

Wickremesinghe had earlier in the day in a letter to Speaker Karu Jayasuriya demanded an emergency session to prove his majority in

asserting that the swearing in of Rajapaksa in his place is "il-

legal and unconstitutional".

Addressing the media along with his constituent party leaders, the UNP leader said, This is a created crisis, there is no need for this crisis. The people must not suffer because of this at a difficult time for them.

He said the crisis could be resolved with no difficulty if the parliament was convened. I can prove majority on the floor of the House," Wickremesinghe said.

Sirisena formalised the

issuing two extraordinary gazette notices.

First notice was on Wickremesinghe being removed as prime minister and the other on the appointment of Ra-japaska as the new premier.

Sirisena also ordered the removal of Prime Minister's Secretary Saman Ekanayake.
The prime minister's sec-

retary has been removed according to the powers vested with the president as the appointing authority. Responding to Sirisena in

writing. Wickremesinghe said he is still the "constitutionally appointed Prime Minister" of Sri Lanka. "I write to inform you that

I am the constitutionally appointed Prime Minister of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka and continue in that office and that I command the confidence of Parliament contemplated in article

said in letter.

Speaker Jayasuriya would now have to decide if he rec-ognised Rajapaksa or Wickremesinghe as the prime minister.

The Joint Opposition group of Rajapaksa backers claimed that the controversial strongman has a clear majority.

Prof GL Peiris of the JO frontliner said the unity government of Sirisena and Wickremesinghe ceased to exist the moment Sirisena's party, Unit-ed People's Freedom Alliance (UPFA), announced that it had withdrawn from it.

"So there is no cabinet from that moment. When the unity government arrangement ended the cabinet needs to be pruned under 30 members," he said. He said when the cabinet

stands dissolved the prime minister will have to be either removed or resign himself.

Peiris said parliament has been suspended to allow

time for Rajapaksa as the new prime minster to present a vote of account in parliament instead of the 2019 budget scheduled for November 5.

"This will provide resources to govern the country for three months," Peiris said.

Meanwhile, Rauff Hakeem the leader of the Sri Lanka Muslim Congress said his par-ty would firmly back Wickremesinghe.

Two other constituent parleaders from minority Tamand Muslim parties, Mano anesan, Palani Digambaram and Rishath Bathiyutheen also said they would be firmly in support of Wickremesinghe and called Sirisena's move to sack Wickremesinghe as illegal and unconstitutional.

Sirisena's sacking of Wickremesinghe was the culmina-tion of an year of bitter relations between them on several policy matters. The president has been critical of the prime Minister and his policies, especially on economy and security.

April, Wickremesinghe successfully defeated a no trust motion in parliament engineered by Sirisena with backing from Rajapaksa.

The UNP, however, suffered one defection after Ra-japaksa was sworn in with Ananda Aluthgamage meeting

Ananda Alutngamage meeting the former president and extending him support.

The political developments unfolded after Sirisena's broader political front UPFA announced that it has decided to quit the current with Wiele. unity government with Wicksinghe's UNP.

The unity government was formed in 2015 when Sirisena was elected President with Wickremesinghe's support, ending a nearly decade-long rule by Rajapaksa.

Rajapaksa's return to pow-ends a more than three-

year-old coalition government that was formed by Sirisena and Wickremesinghe on a promise to combat corruption and financial irregularities.

The unity government was thrown into a crisis after Rajapaksa's new party pulled off a stunning victory in local elections in February seen as a ref-erendum on the ruling alliance.

Sri Lanka nearly faced economic sanctions from the West over Rajapakse's brutal military crackdown on the banned Liberation Tigers of Tamil Eelam (LTTE).

The LTTE sought a separate Tamil homeland in the northern and eastern provinces of the island nation for near-30 years before its collapse in 2009 after the Sri Lankan Army killed its supreme leader Velupillai Prabhakaran

Khashoggi killers 'will be prosecuted in Saudi Arabia': Saudi FM

MANAMA, OCT 27 (AFP): Saudi Arabia will prosecute the suspects in the killing of journalist Jamal Khashoggi, Riyadh's for-eign minister said Saturday in response to a call by Turkey for their extradition.

"On the issue of extradition, the individuals are Saudi nationals. They're detained in Saudi Arabia, and the investigation is in Saudi Arabia, and they will be prosecuted Saudi Arabia," Foreign Minister Adel al-Jubeir said at a regional defence forum in the Bahraini capital.

Jubeir's comments come the day after Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan called for the extradition of 18 Saudi nationals authorities say were involved in the murder of Khashoggi, a Saudi government critic killed in his country's consulate in Istanbul this

After denying knowl-Khashoggi's whereabouts for nearly three weeks, Riyadh admitted Khashoggi's murder had been "premed-itated" but denied the involvement of the kingdom's powerful Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman.

"We will overcome it." Jubeir told the defence forum.

"The issue as I said is being investigated. We will know the truth. We will hold those responsi-ble accountable. And we will put in place mechanisms to ensure it doesn't happen again."

Once an insider in Saudi royal circles, Khashoggi fell out of favour with the monarchy after Mohammed bin Salman was named heir to the throne last year.

The columnist went into self-imposed exile in the United States, where he wrote a column for The Washington Post, which was often critical of the crown prince. Khashoggi was least

seen entering the Saudi consulate in Istanbul on October 2 to complete paperwork for his wed-ding to his Turkish fiancee, Hatice Cengiz.

The India-China border dispute covers the 3,488 km Line of Actual Control (LAC). China also claims Arunachal Pradesh as part of southern Tibet.

Officials on both sides maintain that though a solution to the border dispute still eludes the two countries, a lot of headway has been made in the 20 rounds of talks so far in terms of working out mechanisms to restore peace and tran-quillity along the border to resolve tensions due to aggressive patrolling

The last round of talks which was held in New Delhi between Doval and Yang took place in the immediate backdrop of last year's 73-day stand-off between the two militaries at Dokalam over the Chinese military's plan to build a road close to India's strategic Chicken's Neck corridor that connects the northeastern states.

21st round of India-China border talks to be held next month

The standoff ended after the People's Liberation Army(PLA) halted plans to build the road.

The meeting between

Doval and Yang also prepared the ground for the informal summit be-tween Prime Minister Narendra Modi and President Xi Jinping at Wuhan in April this year, which resulted not only in normalisation of relations but gave a new fillip to the improvement of relations in all spheres of re-lations notwithstanding the border dispute.

Since then both countries have held several rounds of talks to enhance India's exports to China to reduce the USD 51 billion trade deficit as well as improving military-to-military relations. Indian Ambassador

to China Gautam Bam-bawale said last month at a meeting here that India-China military exchanges grew rapidly after the Wuhan summit. Since then military commanders from both

sides are now talking to each other more frankly and more candidly than ever before, he said.

Chinese Defence Minister Gen Wei Fenghe had visited India in August, met Modi and held talks with his Indian counterpart Nirmala Sitharaman.

The Chinese defence ministry said after Wei's visit that both countries are discussing a new version of a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) on defence exchanges and cooperation to improve on the 2006 agreement besides establishing a direct confidential phone line between the two defence ministries and strengthening comn

cations at all levels.

WASHINGTON, OCT 27 (PTI): US President Donald Trump on Friday called for ending the "politics of personal destruc-tion" as he accused the media of using "sinister actions of one individual to score political points against him and his party.

Afghans risk their lives to vote in delayed Kandahar poll

KANDAHAR, OCT (AFP): Afghans risked their lives to vote in legislative elections in southern Afghanistan on Saturday, after the Taliban-claimed killing of a powerful police chief de-layed the ballot by a week.

An hour after voting was due to start, long queues of turbaned men could be seen outside still-shuttered olling centres in the deep-conservative Kandahai provincial capital, which was blanketed with heavy

security in anticipation of militant attacks.

More than half a mil-

lion people are registered to vote in Kandahar province where organisers are under pressure to avoid last weekend's debacle that forced the Independent Election Commission (IEC) to extend the nationwide ballot by a day. Problems with untest-

ed biometric verification devices, missing or incomplete voter rolls and absent election workers following Taliban threats to attack the ballot forced Afghans to wait hours outside polling stations, many of which opened late or not at all.

Similar issues were already evident in Kandahar, the birthplace of the Taliban and a province notorious for voting fraud, with many polling sites in the city still closed -- de-spite assurances from IEC deputy spokeswoman Kobra Rezaei on Friday that we are absolutely ready".

Voting in the province

was postponed following the October 18 death of General Abdul Raziq, an anti-Taliban strongman seen as a bulwark against the insurgency in the south, amid fears of violence flaring up.
