# UDHD reduces ground rent for urban areas by 50%

GANGTOK, 24 AUG:

Urban Development &
Housing Department
[UDHD] has reduced
ground rent for urban and eas of the State by 50%. This news was shared with media by Gangtok MLA, Pintso Chopel Lep-cha, at a press meet held in the office of UDHD Sec-

retary today.

A notification had been issued by UDHD on 21 Aug revising the ground rent in various bazaar areas.

The new ground rent [Dhuri Khajana] per 100 sq ft in Gangtok is Rs 200, for Deorali Rs 200 and for Tadong Rs 150.

Likewise, the new ground rent for Singtam, Rangpo, Ranipool, Jore-thang, Namchi, Gyalshing, Mangan and Nayabazaar is Rs 100 per 100 sq ft. For other bazaar areas, it is fixed at Rs 25 per 100 sq ft.

The revision by the

department has come after public dissatisfaction over a 2016 notification wherein the Dhuri Khaja na had been increased by 10 times.

Gangtok MLA, Lepcha, informed that State Government has taken this pro-people

grievances shared by pub-lic in Gangtok and other urban areas of the State.

Another important no-tification has been issued by the UDHD on 21 Aug stating that the State Gov-ernment has considered regularisation fee of unauthorised construction on both Government allotted

sites and private sites at a nominal rate of 50% of the existing regularisation fee within a window period of 60 days. All applications to this effect have to be submitted to the chief town planner within 60 working days of the noti-

Devika Sharma, during the press meet, highlighted on many unauthorized constructions on Government allotted lands and private lands without the submission of the blueprints. On payment of the regularisa-tion fees, such encroach-ment and unauthorized

construction will undone, she added.



### Stand Up, Not Clamp Down

Sikkim needs to be brave, not prudish in tackling substance abuse and suicides

 $S^{\mathrm{ometime}}$  in early 2016, the Social Justice, Empowerment & Welfare Department was handed over a detailed list of what was expected of it. Most of the directions were routine reminders of what a Department with an elaborate, self-explanatory name like "Social Justice, Empowerment & Welfare Department" should have been doing all along. These included directions like working in close coordination with other related departments, preparing workable plans to make Sikkim malnutrition free etc. There were also some specific directions which one hopes the Department got working on. In fact, because the directions were issued more than two years ago, one hopes that some of these tasks have already been completed. For instance, one of the directions issued to the Department was to conduct/commission a study on suicides and its causes in Sikkim. This was a necessary and welcome initiative, but since one has not heard any further developments on this count, the file to commission such a study is probably still being processed or maybe the study remains a work in progress.

Meanwhile, Sikkim continues to lose people to sui-

cides. Worse still, it still does not know why the numbers are so disturbingly high. Hopefully, this newspaper is wrong in speculating that the study is caught in red tape; hopefully, the study has been undertaken and its findings submitted and are being deliberated upon.
Further, the Department was also asked to come up

with programmes to fight drug abuse and alcoholism with special focus on high relapse rates. That was also a welcome intervention, but not one as easily delegated as, say, a study on suicides. This one requires much wider collaborations, a stronger will to take criticism and a more resolute commitment to address the challenge. It would be unfair to expect bureaucrats in a transferable job to get so invested in a cause/ issue, and it is unlikely that a problem as big as substance abuse can get solved through departmental interventions alone. It is a good sign that the government is seized of the matter and is consistently making policy-level commitments reiterating its willingness to address the issue as was recently reiterated by the Chief Minister as well when he put on record that addicts and peddlers need to be tackled differently and that the mission against substance abuse needs to be more nuanced and compassionate.

While this is a good place to begin from, it is never advisable for governments to get involved in all aspects of social interventions. As it is, there is too much government in all fields of activity in Sikkim and if even social responsibilities are passed on to it, what will the rest of the society contribute? Another important reason why the battle against substance abuse should not be led by the government is because government directives and orders lack the light touch required to address a problem as complicated as substance abuse. One of the proposals on how to address the problem, for instance, was to expel students from school after three warning if they still consume alcohol, and expel them straightaway if they abuse drugs! Alcoholism and drug abuse while on duty by government servants was also to attract termination from service! Apart from the legal minefield that such diktats are walking into they are also highly insensitive because surely, there must be better ways to end addiction and alcoholism than removing addicts and alcoholics from the scene.

# Kerala's monsoon: lessons from recent floods in India

Media call it the worst flood of the century in the region. After more than two weeks of relent-less rain, Kerala, a state at the southern tip of India, internationally for its scenic green land scapes, touristic spots and backwaters, is left with over 1 million people in relief camps, and close to 400 reported dead – the num-ber is expected to be much higher, as many areas renain inaccessible.

In the mountainous Coorg or Kodagu district in the neighbouring state of Karnataka, thousands of people have been ma-rooned because of torren-

tial rains. Exacerbated by landslides in hilly terrain, flooding has led to the destruction of homes, bridges, road networks and industries.

Far from being a surprise, the possibility of such devastation was highlighted seve

# THE NEED TO CHANGE OUR DE-VELOPMENT APPROACH

In 2011, the Western Ghats Ecology Expert Panel, chaired by the internationally renowned ecologist Madhay Gadgil, submitted a report to the Indian Ministry of Environment and Forests. The report warned that an ill-thought focus on development was impacting the sustainability of the Western Ghats hill chain, one of the world's most biodiverse areas that runs along the west coast of India. The expert report urged a number of states, including Karnataka and Kerala, to adopt an approach of thoughtful conservation, limiting activities such as quarrying, dams and construction near protected forests in hilly areas. The report was rejected by the Ministry as well as by both states.

With the experience of hindsight, it is clear that the worst flood damage took place in those regions where the Gadgil committee recommended

In Kodagu, for instance, tens to hundreds of thousands of large trees were felled in 2015 to construct a high-tension electric wire line. Uncontrolled sand mining has constrained river flows, while the rapid spread of high-rise buildings on unstable hill slopes has weakened the soil. This un-planned development has left the area susceptible to flash floods and landslides, caused by a combination of tree felling on steep hillslopes and heavy

### AIRPORTS BUILT ON WATER BODIES

The flooding of the Kochi airport is another example of poor planning leading to disastrous outcomes. The airport was built on the paddy fields and wetlands adjacent to the Periyar river, and ex-tends up to the banks of the river on one side.

The longest river in Kerala, it has a number of dams - some of which had to be opened to release

water during the rains. The airport was badly hit, with estimated economic costs of at least Rs 500

crores because of its forced closure for several days.

The Periyar river is not the only one that has been dammed. The state of Kerala has 44 rivers with a total of 61 dams. Many had to be opened across Kerala as they were dangerously full – a step that, while essential during a time of emergency, contributed to the heavy flooding. A 2017 report by the Comptroller and Auditor General of India warned that not a single one of these dams had an emergency action plan in place for disaster management. Pre- and post-monsoon safety inspections had not been carried out for any of these dams either.

Given how likely it is that coastal and riverine

cities will experience flooding in coming years, you would think we know better than to build airports near bodies of water. Yet Kochi airport is not an exception. The runways of the Mumbai airport have been built over the Mithi river, and the airport is located on a reclaimed pond. One of the runways of the Chennai airport extends over the Adyar river, affecting its long-term safety and stability.

It is no surprise that these airports, which are among the busiest in India, frequently flood when the rains are heavy – leading to large-scale eco-nomic losses. Yet the new Navi Mumbai airport is coming up in an equally unsuitable location on coastal wetlands.

### REVERSING THE TREND

In the era of climate change we have just entered, extreme rainfall events are going to become increasingly common. Uncontrolled growth at the expense of the environment will severely exacer-bate the impacts of climate change. Our cities are simply not prepared for extreme weather events. The recent collapse of a bridge in Genoa, killing at least 43 people, is linked to poor maintenance, but also to heavy rainfall.

Certain types of infrastructure may be less suitable to some contexts in a changing climate scenario. Wildfires in California cause extensive damage to private property because many cities are extend-

ing their boundaries into forest areas. As local climate becomes hotter and drier, with fires becoming more likely, new homes are being built in areas that are highly susceptible to fire instead of less exposed locations.

Some cities are seeking to reverse this trajectory of unplanned construction. Nairobi is in the midst of an extensive demolition drive, uprooting thousands of buildings built on riparian land that choke the flow of water and contribute to severe annual floods.

Seoul. between 2002-2005, the city munic ipality tore up an elevated highway that had been built over the Cheong-gyecheon stream. This internationally famous ur-

ban-renewal project reduced traffic, reduced air pollution and cut the urban heat-island effect. In Yonkers, New York, an ongoing project aims to restore the buried Saw Mill river

Similar urban river daylighting projects are gaining traction in cities around the world. Zurich has been an early pioneer, developing the Bach-konzept (stream concept) to create, restore and uncover a number of streams and springs. London, which built over a number of famous rivers, has now uncovered and restored a number of these waterways, while Sheffield, having experimented with daylighting, is now considering uncovering sections of the local Sheaf river.

The demonstrated ecological and environmental benefits are clear – as are the social and eco-nomic returns. For example, Seoul's iconic Cheonggyecheon stream restoration led to a more than six-fold increase in biodiversity, a 35% decrease in air pollution and a growth in property prices that is double of that in other parts of the city

The restored stream attracts tens of thousands of visitors daily who contribute significantly to local economy. Such ideas of restoration need to become more widespread, and embedded in routine climate change and disaster management planning. The investment made is amply repaid many times over in economic security and growth, biodiversity, local health and quality of life, and resilience against future disasters.

Once the emergency relief is attended to, Kochi and Kodagu would do well to use their recent expe rience as a warning of future disasters to come in a world of increasingly uncertain climate.

The focus must be on long-term restoration projects that can reverse some of the environmen-tal and ecological damage that has led to the cur-rent situation. But such learning need not be confined to the areas that have experienced the worst. The rest of the world has much to learn as well.

# Why Indonesia should stop sending drug users to prison

Indonesia is locking up more inmates than it can handle. Prison overcrowding has become one of the government's top priorities under its legal reform policy. It has led to various problems, including riots and bribery.

As of June 2018, the government had detained almost 250,000 in-mates in prisons across the country. The prisons' total capacity can accommodate only half of that figure.

The overcrowding problem is mostly due to Indonesia's justice system, which can easily send criminals to prison even for minor cases. Under the system, drug users are sent to prisons instead of rehab centres. They are even categorised as serious criminal offenders together with graft convicts and convicted terrorists. Recent data show that drug users account for a third of those jailed for serious crimes.

Given the huge numbers in prison, the government needs to stop send-ing drug users to prison and revisit its punitive approach to them

### INDONESIA'S DRUGS POLICY

As a starting point, we must under stand that drug convicts are not necessarily drug dealers. When someone is a drug convict, he or she can be a drug user, or a drug dealer, or both in



However, Indonesian law does not acknowledge this differentiation and tends to treat all drug convicts as serious criminal offenders. Under the law, drug abuse is considered a serious crime and the offenders will get a severe punishment. This potentially includes the death penalty.

Article 127 of the Law on Drugs states that a judge can offer rehabilitation programs for drug users after trials. However, the regulation is not effectively implemented yet. Most legal officers believe that sending drug

users to prisons is the com Recent undisclosed research from the Indonesia Judicial Monitoring Society shows that of 21 cases in-volving drug users in Jakarta District Court in 2015, only six were sent to a

rehab centre.

Inconsistencies in Indonesian law present another challenge. Even though there is an article that offers rehab, another article encourages jail

Article 112 states that a person who owns, keeps, controls and serves narcotics should receive a jail sentence. This defines drug users as serious criminals, as logically the person who uses drugs also owns and keeps the drugs. Recent research from the Institute for Criminal Justice Reform (ICJR) shows that legal officers tend to rely more on article 112 than article 127 in handling drug cases, as the former is easier to prove than the

President Joko "Jokowi" Widodo's harsh approach in dealing with drug cases has only worsened the problem.

"The government has decided not to extend the ban any longer but would keep a close eye on the quality of products be-ing sold to the consumers," Sangma said.

# NSF rally in Kohima against entry of illegal immigrants

Коніма, Aug 24 (РТІ): The Naga Students' Federation (NSF) today took to the streets of Kohima to protest against alleged influx of illegal immigrants and demand inclusion of Dimapur district under the purview of Inner Line Permit (ILP).

The Inner Line Permit is required by non-Nagas to visit Nagaland and Dimapur is the only district in the state which is not under the purview of ILP.

The NSF, the apex stu-dents' body of the state, described today's rally as the second phase of protest against "influx of illegal immigrants into

Addressing the gathering, NSF president Kes-osul Christopher Ltu said the younger generation is worried that illegal immigrants would overtake the indigenous people of the state if the influx is not checked.

"Government chineries have miserably failed to monitor implementation of ILP in the state," he alleged.

Ltu claimed check gates in different parts of the state re-mained ineffective maintaining no record of outsiders entering the state with ILP and going back.

Because of this "failure of government mechanism", the NSF was com-pelled to check the ILP of non-Nagas on August 8 in the first phase of its protest, he said.

"The government should take the NSF and civil societies into confidence in making the ILP regime efficient and effective," said Neichute Doulo, a member of the NSF's ILP committee.
The NSF members

rallied through the main town of Kohima amid rain and submitted a memorandum on their

In the memorandum, the NSF said exclusion of Dimapur from the purview of the ILP has made the district a safe haven for illegal immigrants, posing the "biggest demographic threat to the indigenous inhabitants of the state".

"It is without any doubt to assert that, overwhelming population of people with questionable identities inhabit Dimapur district which is evident as most of them do not possess any documents of their identification proof," the students body said in the

#### JAIL TIME IS NOT EFFECTIVE FOR DRUG USERS

Sending drug users to jail only make things worse for them due to rampant corrupt practices inside prisons. Inmates can get everything they want for a price, including

Yale University researcher Gabriel J. Culbert revealed the rampant use of drugs in Jakarta's prison. Based on his research in 2014, he found that 56% of inmates used drugs in prison. The respondents also claimed they still can get illegal drugs in prison. This means jail sentences are not ef-

Inside jail, drug users are also exposed to wider drug communities. According to the National Anti-Narcotics Agency, 50% of drug trafficking is controlled from inside

### THE BAD IMPACT

Sending drug users to prisons is not only

ineffective but also creates many problems.

If the government decides to send every drug user to prison, this will only hurt the state's budget as more inmates mean more

The state's budget for prison was set at Rp 1.2 trillion (US\$83 million) in 2017, alost double the allocation in 2012.

If the government continues to lock up

drug users in jail while the budget is limited, it will lead to two bad consequences. The first is the poor quality of the prison service. The second is rampant corruption involving both guards and prisoners. Under-paid guards will take bribes from prisoners

whose needs are not being met.

Another problem arising from putting drug users in jail is overcrowding. Having more inmates than each prison can handle leaves them prone to riots and corruption.

Corruption is rampant in overcrowded prisons as the government's limited budget means it fails to provide services that meet the basic needs of inmates

### LESSONS FROM OTHER COUNTRIES Instead of sending drug users to prison, In-

donesia should learn from how other countries handle drug cases.

The Netherlands has introduced a poli-

cy that doesn't criminalise the use of marijuana. This policy allows the distribution of small amounts of cannabis in Dutch "coffee shops". These coffee shops successfully avoid exposure to hard drug markets. Research shows that even though a quarter of Dutch people have consumed marijuana, the Netherlands has the lowest number of narcotics addicts in Europe.

Portugal also provides an interesting lesson. In 2000, Portugal introduced a policy that does not criminalise drug use, which broke a global paradigm in handling drugs problems. Instead of a repressive approach, Portugal has chosen a new humane approach that focuses more on minimising harm from drug use.

In doing so, Portugal has stopped criminalising, marginalising and stigmatising drug users. Following the recommendation of the Global Commission on Drug Policy, Portugal has offered health and medical treatments to drug users who need them. Five years after decriminalising drug use, Portugal had decreased its overdose cases from 400 to 290 a year. Knowing that Indonesia's punitive ap-

proach to drug users is doing more harm than good, it is probably a good time for the government to evaluate its legal policy on drug issues. It is important to keep in mind that the government should emphasise drug policy to fight against drug addiction and illegal distribution and not

PALEMBANG, AUG 24 (PTI): Top seeds Rohan Bopanna and Divij Sharan notched up their maiden men's doubles gold medal at the Asian Games, dominating the final clash with a thoroughly clinical perfor-

ed enough and a feeble return went into the nets to give India the first tennis gold of the ongoing event.

India have claimed the men's doubles gold on four occasions at the Games, the last pair being Somdev Devvarman and Sanam Singh in the 2010 Guangzhou edition.

Mahesh Bhupathi and Leander Paes remain the most successful Indian men's doubles pair in the Asian Games history, having claimed back-toback gold medals in the 2002 and 2006 Games.

Paes had stunned the Indian team this time by pulling out on the eve of the Games after complaining of not getting a specialist partner of his choice.

In 2014, Saketh Myneni and Sanam had ended with a silver medal.

# Now an app to rate, review your 'neta'

NEW DELHI, AUG 24 (PTI): An app that allows voters to rate and review litical their po representatives and aims to foster political accountability and transparency among leaders among launched here today.

Aptly called Neta app, which was unveiled by former President Pranab Mukherjee, the techology platform will let users rate their MLAs and MPs and is being billed as an instrument to gauge voter sentiment across constituencies in the country.

"A good democracy cannot function without informed voters, good leaders, accountability and complete transparency," Mukherjee said said at the launch of the app created by 27-year-old entrepreneur Pratham Mittal.

Speaking on the occasion, Delhi Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal noted that while India is a large democracy, there are people who give their votes based on caste, religion and other perceptions. "There are many who have not even

met their representatives... in such an atmosphere I think this initiative will give voters information about candidates and their work. It would help both the party

and people," he said.

Mittal, founder of Neta App, said that the platform uses combination of Artificial Intelligence, advanced algorithms, one time password and Aadhaar numbers to ensure that the voters who rate leaders are genuine.

The app in its beta version has already seen over 1.5 crore verified voters rating and reviewing their local leaders across 543 parliamentary constituencies and 4,120 assembly constituencies over the last eight months.

The app is available on Andriod and iOS and web in 16 languages to cater to a diverse user profile. According to a statement, to ensure participation across demographics including rural areas, the platform uses a combination of mediums like the app itself, IVR calls, SMS and even offline activation leveraging ASHA and Aanganwadi workers to collate data on evolving political inclinations.

# Plantable Rakhis: A bond of love that will live on

NEW DELHI, Aug 24 (PTI): More than a colourful, decorative silk thread, Raksha Bandhan has been a celebration of the lifelong bond between brothers and sisters, sprinkled with love, occasional fights and a dash of bitter-sweet nostalgia for a shared childhood.

While many brothers keep the rakhi on their wrists for weeks or even months to come, the festive thread eventually finds itself in a forgotten corner of a drawer or worse, a garbage bin.

But the advent of "plantable" rakhis with seeds strung together on a thread could bring in that element of longevity.

As the name suggests, the life of these rakhis won't end with Rakhi season. Instead, they will find new life in the form of plants.

"In the past years, the import of plastic rakhis, mainly from China, has increased. All our products are made by men and women of village Tauli Budh in Uttarakhand. The raw materials are grown on our farms," Nupur Agarwal of Evolve Foundation told PTI.

The rakhis, she said, are just eco friendly but are also help-

ing locals find employment.
The concept of plantable rakhis teaches one how to be patient and how to grow a plant, just like farmers do, she added.

Apart from a rakhi with seeds on it, the rakhi box also contains other plantable material like roli, rice, seed pencil, seed letter paper,



coir boxes and soil

Divya Shetty of Plantcil believes in the idea of recycling and re-us-ing, and her idea of eco-friendly rakhis has garnered deserving attention from customers.

"The relationship between a brother and a sister is an ever-growing one, just like a plant... The seeds on the rakhi last for a year and we have sold four lakh plantable rakhis boxes till now," Shetty said.

Plantcil's rakhi kit contains a rakhi, roli-chawal, a plantable message card and a plantable pencil ranging between Rs 499 and Rs 2.999 based

on the number of rakhis.

The seeds on the plantable material include lupine flower, tomato, marigold, and tulsi.

Seeing rakhis stored out of guilt or simply thrown away led Divyan-shu Asopa of 21 Fools to think of plantable rakhis with the aim of "restoring the essence of the fes-tival with this sustainable switch".

"Every year, we see innumera-

ble rakhis thrown away or stored out of guilt. This wastage of rakhis inspired us to create a seed paper rakhi which would turn itself into a plant," Asopa said.

The prices of plantable rakhis range from Rs 251 for one rakhi to Rs 1,001 for a set of 10. It's not just out plantable rakhis.

The festival market in India has, over the years, shown a grad-ual tilt towards a sustainable and eco-friendly model of business while trying to keep the essence of the festival alive.

After eco-friendly gulaal for Holi, fireworks manufacturer have dwelled on developing eco-friend-ly fireworks for Diwali, and for Raksha Bandhan, the market this year is filled eco-friendly rakhi to choose from

# UN summit on TB seeks to put spotlight on killer disease

It's the world's number one killer among infectious diseases, but ulosis has been eclipsed by HIV/AIDS as a focus of global at-

tention and donor funding.
When world leaders gather at the United Nations next month, they will be asked to change that by committing to end the tuberculosis pandemic by 2030 and come up with USD 13 billion annually to achieve that goal.

A row between the United States and South Africa threatens, however, to cast a pall over the first high-level meeting on tuberculosis, to be held on the sidelines of the General Assembly meeting in New York.

Billionaire philanthropist Bill Gates whose global fund has done game-changing work to boost public health in poor countries will be among the headliners of the TB summit on September 26.

"TB is not a disease of the past, but if the world works together to fight it, I have no doubt it can be," Gates said in post on Twitter.
Two months of negotiations

on a final declaration were scheduled to wrap up in July, but the talks have dragged on after South Africa opposed US proposals to delete language that recognizes the right of poorer countries to access cheaper medicines.

Medical charity MSF has apauded South Africa's stance and urged countries to resist what it has described as "an aggressive push" by the US pharmaceutical lobby to restrict access to low-cost

drugs.

Diplomats said negotiations

on a possible were continuing on a possible compromise.

Last year, the World Health

Organization sounded the alarm when it said tuberculosis had sur-passed HIV/AIDS as the world's number one infectious killer and was the ninth cause of death

worldwide.
About 1.7 million people died from TB in 2016 out of 10.4 million worldwide who became ill from the severe lung infection, according to the WHO.

A 30-point final declaration under negotiation would commit overnments to end the global tuberculosis epidemic by 2030 by stepping up investment and innovation to fight the disease.

Governments would agree to

mobilize at least USD 13 billion a year by 2022 for treatment and care and an additional USD 2 billion to fund research at a time when tuberculosis is becoming

Five countries are the hardest-hit by the TB pandemic: India, accounts for a quarter cases, Indonesia, China, the Philippines and Pakistan, but it remains unclear whether these nations are sending high-level officials to the

Non-governmental organizations say leaders from key donor countries like the United States, Britain, France, Germany and Canada must turn up for the meeting

to be ground-breaking.

"TB is not just a health issue. TB is an economic issue, a development issue, a security issue and we need leadership from heads of states," said Paula Fujiwara, the scientific director of the Par-

Against Tuberculosis and Lung Disease. "If they don't deliver in September, we are going to do everything in our power to hold them countable for the lives lost," she

About 33 heads of state and government have so far said they will attend, according to UN officials.

At the summit, leaders will pledge to provide diagnosis and treatment to 40 million people with TB from 2018 to 2022, including 3.5 million children.

# Indonesian earthquake death toll reaches 555

JAKARTA, Aug 24 (AFP): A string of deadly earth-quakes that rocked Indonesia's Lombok island this summer killed 555 people and injured near-ly 1,500, the disaster agency said Friday, with hundreds of thousands

left homeless. The picturesque island next to holiday hotspot Bali was hit by two deadly quakes on July 29 and August 5. On Sunday, it was

shaken by a string of fresh tremors and aftershocks, with the strongest measuring 6.9 magnitude.

Indonesia's disaster agency said Friday most the deaths occured in the northern part of Lombok, with several also killed in neighbouring Sumbawa island.

Many victims were killed by falling debris as the tremors rippled across the island, causing

widespread devastation.
Whole communities were flattened, leaving cracked streets lined with rubble, caved-in roofs



and collapsed buildings.

Some 390,000 people emain displaced after the quakes, the disaster

agency said.

Aid organisations have vowed to step up humanitarian assistance on the island as devastated residents struggle in makeshift displacement

They warned that access to food, shelter and clean water has been insufficient for some residents displaced by the

> deployed "We've troops to isolated vil-lages that are difficult to reach," disaster agency spokesman Sutopo Pur-wo Nugroho said in a

statement.

"There are many villages... that are hard to access with motorbikes. Some aid has to be delivcosts are estimated to top seven trillion rupiah (USD 478 million).

Indonesia sits on the so-called Pacific "Ring of Fire", where tectonic

plates collide and many of the world's volcanio quakes occur.

In 2004, a massive 9.1 magnitude quake struck off the coast of Sumatra and triggered a tsunami that killed 220,000 throughout the region, including 168,000 in Indonesia alone.



# US-China trade talks end with no breakthrough

WASHINGTON, AUG 24 (AP): US and Chinese negotiators ended two days of meetings without breaking a deadlock over trade that has unnerved financial markets and disrupted global com-

The delegations "exchanged views on how to achieve fairness, balance and reciprocity in the economic relationship," Lindsay Walters, a White House spokeswoman, said in a statement. She did not mention further talks.

A Chinese Commerce Ministry statement said the talks were "constructive and frank" but gave no details. It said the two sides would "maintain contact."

The dispute over China's high-tech industrial policy escalated yesterday as the Trump administration and Beijing imposed taxes on an additional USD 16 billion of each other's goods.

The administration last month had

slapped tariffs on an initial USD 34 billion in Chinese products, and Beijing responded in kind.

The Trump team is preparing tar-iffs on USD 200 billion more of Chi-nese products, and China has vowed to counterpunch by targeting USD 60 billion in American goods.

The US-China talks this week were

the first since discussions in June failed to produce any agreement.

# Sessions bites back as Trump says impeachment would sink economy

**WASHINGTON, AUG 24 (AFP):** President Donald Trump has warned the US economy would collapse if he were impeached, as legal chaos

rolling the White House had experts saying his presidency is under threat. Speaking on the eve of a close-ly watched meeting of central bank chiefs Friday, Trump also took aim again at his Attorney General, Jeff Sessions, prompting a rare retort from the embattled justice depart-

Days after Trump's former fixer Michael Cohen told a federal judge he made illegal campaign contri-butions at the president's request -- to silence women alleging affairs with Trump -- the Republican leader

with Tulip — the Republical leader told Fox News that an impeachment would only cause more turmoil. "I will tell you what, if I ever got impeached, I think the market would crash. I think everybody would be very poor," Trump said on "Fox and Friends."

"You would see -- you would see numbers that you wouldn't believe in

The US president then launched into a rambling statement on job creation and other economic progress he said had been made during his

presidency.
"I don't know how you can impeach somebody who has done a great job," Trump said.
Trump was dealt severe back-to-

back blows on Tuesday when Cohen pled guilty to illegal campaign fi-nance violations and former Trump campaign chairman Paul Manafort was convicted of tax and bank fraud within minutes of each other.

The Manafort conviction was the first case sent to trial by the special prosecutor probing Russian meddling in the 2016 election.

But an unchastened Trump ap-



pears intent on riding out the storm as Washington grapples with the latest upheaval in his tumultuous presidency. The president has insisted he did

nothing wrong after Cohen, his longtime private lawyer and fixer, implicated him in the illicit hush payments made before the 2016 election to two women who claimed to have had af-fairs with the Republican presidential candidate.

Although Cohen did not name them, the women were believed to be porn star Stormy Daniels and Play-boy model Karen McDougal.

Because the hush payments were intended to influence the outcome of the elections, they violated US laws governing campaign contributions. In entering a guilty plea, Cohen

said the payments were made "in coordination with and at the direction of a candidate for federal office," in clear reference to Trump. Trump was evasive when asked

in the Fox News interview if he had instructed Cohen to make the payments, saying that his former lawyer "made the deals," and insisted that Cohen's actions were "not a crime."

"Campaign violations are consid-

ered not a big deal, frankly," he said.

Trump then said the hush payments were financed with his own money -- to which Cohen had access -- and that while he had no knowledge of them at the time, he had since



expert Kate Belinski, of the Nossaman law firm, said to expect legal consequences for both Trump and his campaign -- most likely in the form of a civil complaint before the Federal Election Commission

The president lauded the 69-year-old Manafort for leaving his fate to a jury rather than striking a plea deal -- a move that has sparked speculation Manafort hopes for a

Asked if he was considering such a move, Trump said only that he has "great respect for what he has done, in terms of what he has gone through."

On Thursday, the mom took to Instagram to share the image as she hinted that rapper "left... a final gift"



The post came as Florida man Dedrick Devonshay Changes artist's murder. No other details were provided.

nother with some claiming it's ex-girlfriend Geneva Aya-la, who accused the rapper of brutally assaulting her while she was pregnant in a 2017 case. Sources close to the rapper told TMZ, however, she is not the woman in question.

The Selena actress can still be seen on television as a host on World of Dance, which airs on NBC on Wednesday at 9pm.


# **Indian Idol: Ex** contestant talks about physical abuse on the show
