# **CM UNVEILS REGULATIONS** FOR LOCKDOWN 5.0 IN SIKKIM

## School reopening postponed, inter-district travel suspended for 15 days

**SUMMIT REPORT** GANGTOK, 30 MAY:

Thief Minister, PS Tamang [Golay], today announced regulations for Lockdown 5.0 in Sikkim.

Chairing a high-level meeting to decide the way forward as Lockdown 4.0 comes to an end, the Chief Minister announced provisions for the lockdown's next phase in Sikkim. today directed that such students Significantly, inter-district movement will be suspended for 15 days starting 01 June and the decision to reopen educational institutions has been

revoked. As things stand, senior classes at schools and colleges will now resume on 01 July. Just at the time when college and university students from outside the State must have been planning to get back to Sikkim to complete their mandatory 14-day quarantine in time for resumption of classes earlier scheduled for 15 June, the CM not be allowed back until 15 June. This presumably so that they can be quarantined for 14 days before being allowed to sit in classrooms.

Significantly, institutions to examination centres in their home which these students will be returning have been directed to prepare their own quarantine facilities. Thus far, quarantine centres have been arranged and managed by the State Government.

Interestingly, this condition is also being extended to pharmaceutical companies in Sikkim.

As per details of the meeting shared by IPR Department, the Chief Minister also suggested that students from bordering states studying in Sikkim should be allowed to opt for states and directed the Education Department to immediately prepare a proposal in this regard.

Speaking on the immediate challenges, the Chief Minister appealed to the people to be receptive to new opportunities arising from the vacuum left behind by skilled and unskilled workers from outside who have left the State. The Chief Minister stressed that the State was not yet out of danger and hence there should be complete compliance of the lockdown guidelines.

### First batch of medical team treating **COVID-19** patient sent for quarantine



GANGTOK, 30 MAY [IPR]: The first batch of frontline healthcare workers treating Sikkim's first COVID-19 patient at the STNM Hospital in Sochakgang have completed their weeklong COVID duty this morning.

The team of 32 healthcare frontline warriors including one Medical Specialist, one Paediatrician, two Medical Officers and one Dental Surgeon along with Nursing Officers, medical attendants and sanitary attendants received a huge round of applause from the officials and staff of the hospital while on their way to government identified quarantine facility in Gangtok where they will be housed for another 14 days.

The officials and staff then welcomed and cheered for the second batch of 32 healthcare workers as they entered the COVID-19 dedicated hospital to take over charge of COVID duty.

Additional Medical Superintendent, Dr Yudok Bhutia, informed that samples of all the outgoing healthcare workers have been tested a day prior to the completion of their duty and the results are negative. They will be quarantined at designated centre for 14 days and will be tested again in a week. However, if their test results turn out negative, they will be allowed to leave for strict home quarantine for further period, she stated.

She informed that the State's first Viral Research and Diagnostic Laboratory (VRDL) at the STNM Hospital,

#### Remaining Sikkimese stranded in Mumbai to be evacuated soon **SUMMIT REPORT**

GANGTOK, 30 MAY:

Cecretary Coordination (COVID-19), State Nodal Officer for Evacuation, Rinzing Chewang Bhutia, today informed a high-level meeting chaired by the Chief Minister, that most of the stranded Sikkimese people been evacuated from different parts of the country.

He informed that following up on directives received from the Chief Minister, Sikkimese people stranded in Maharashtra were contacted and added that many people have chosen not to return to the State as they have resumed their economic activities in their respective areas.

He updated that around 250 people who are willing to return to Sikkim will be evacuated in the coming days through a special train after approval from the Government.

Speaking about the process of evacuation, the Chief Minister added that the State Government is preparing a special strategy to evacuate people stranded in Maharashtra and Mumbai considering the high rate of infection there. He appealed to the people to be patient in the meanwhile.

#### COVID-19: India records highest singleday spike of 265 deaths, 7,964 cases

NEW DELHI. MAY 30 while Meghalaya and (PTI): The death toll due to COVID-19 rose to 4,971 and the number of cases climbed to 1,73,763 in the country registering a record single-day spike of 265 deaths and 7,964 cases till Saturday 8 am, according to the Union health ministry data health ministry.

India is the ninth worst-hit nation by the COVID-19 pandemic.

The number of active COVID-19 cases stood to 86,422 while 82,369 people have recovered and one patient has migrated, it said. In the last 24 hours, 11,264 patients have recovered.

"Thus, around 47.40 per cent patients have recovered so far," a senior health ministry official

The total confirmed cases includes foreigners.

Of the 265 deaths morning, 116 were 1,723 in Odisha. in Maharashtra, 82 in Delhi, 20 in Gujarat, 13 in Madhya Pradesh, nine in Tamil Nadu, seven in West Bengal, four each in Telangana and Rajasthan, two in Punjab and one each in Chhattisgarh, and Kashmir, Jammu Andhra Pradesh, Iharkhand, Karnataka, Kerala, Uttarakhand and Uttar Pradesh.

Of the total 4,971 fatalities, Maharashtra tops the tally with 2,098 deaths followed by Gujarat (980), Delhi (398,) Madhya Pradesh (334), West Bengal (302), Uttar Pradesh (198), Rajasthan (184), Tamil Nadu (154), Telangana (71) and Andhra Pradesh

# Namchi Government College Quarantine Centre

NAMCHI, 30 MAY (IPR):

As the world is bracing an unprecedented change in the form of COVID-19, the State Government administration in Sikkim particularly the south district is also putting its best efforts to combat this disease. Now, it's been more than two months that this virus has gripped Sikkim, evacuation process of stranded Sikkimese is on track they are being brought via buses provided by Sikkim National Transport and some stranded people are choosing their own mode of transport to enter the state. These people enter via Melli or Rangpo Checkposta fter which they undergo stringent medical checkup at the screening centre set up at Melli and Rangpo respectively, then these people are sent to the various identified quarantine

Currently, the South District has a total of fourteen quarantine centres out of which nine is free and five are paid. Out of these centres a building at Namchi Government College has also been recognised by the authorities as one of the quarantine centre. Presently, a total number

of 118 inmates are lodged here out of which there are 86 females and 22 males. Basic facilities like food, medical doctors and other important

In-charge of this centre have come up with innovative ways to keep the quarantined people interested and occupied by requesting them to do basic household work like cleaning and dusting based on the willingness of the people. The Nodal Officer, incharge and staff of this facility also organizing painting, essay and other various kinds of unique competition so as to encourage and express their work. For this amenities are provided kind of competition the in this centre. Apart from facility also provided pen

musical and dance event was also performed by frontline staff to uplift the spirits of the inmates.

As for food and snacks the kitchen staff serves the quarantined people with standard packets of vegetables and other meals consisting of high nutrients. Breakfast with milk tea is given in the morning additionally, local gentry has also started serving the people with food such as Selroti, momo and other items. This quarantine centre also has a Swab Sample Collection Chamber which has a build-in gloves for the use medical workers. The protocol laid by State Government for COVID-19 is followed carefully at this centre and the quarantined people are strongly requested to follow basic hand and respiratory hygiene and also practise social distancing at all

### this the nodal officer and and notepads in addition times. Year of disappointment, disastrous management and diabolical pain: Cong on Modi govt anniv

Congress on Saturday described the first year of the Modi government as a "year of disappointment, disastrous management and diabolical pain".

Congress leader K C Venugopal said the six years of the Modi dispensation have seen fraying of bonds of empathy, fraternity and brotherhood with increase in acts of communal and sectarian violence.

Congress chief spokesperson Randeep Surjewala said that at the end of six years, it appears the Modi government is at war with its people and is inflicting wounds on them, instead of healing them.

"It is inflicting wounds on Mother India," he said.

"This government is trying to fill the coffers of the select rich and is exploiting the poor and inflicting pain on them," Surjewala said.

The Congress also released a set of six "myths" about the government, highlighting its failures on various fronts and alleging that democracy is under threat and Parliament is being subjugated and side-lined under the BJP-led dispensation.

The two leaders said that while the people of the country are feeling helpless, the government has turned out to be heartless.

On the BJP's charge of the Congress playing politics over the COVID-19 crisis, Venugopal said the opposition party did not indulge in any politics and gave suggestions instead.

"Being a responsible opposition, it is our duty to raise the problems opposition, we highlighted the failures of the government," he said.

Venugopal said the government "is totally insensitive" to the plight of migrant labourers and farmers and the Congress was only trying to highlight the problems and plight of common people and failures of the government in resolving them.

Surjewala also demanded that a virtual session of Parliament be convened immediately to discuss pressing issues and the due process be set in motion for holding of meetings of various parliamentary committees. "When 'pradhan sevaks' become autocratic, the first casualty is the democracy. In fact, democracy is under attack by the Modi government which got elected through this democratic process," he said. The Congress leader said subjugation of Parliament has become the norm.

"Sadly and tragically, Indian Parliament has been sidestepped under the garb and guise of COVID-19 pandemic."

He said standing committees and select committees have been side-lined and given a go-by. Even grassroots democracy of panchayats, zila parishads and municipal councils and corporations have been virtually non-functional with the bureaucracy ruling the roost and the entire country is being ruled directly by the central government.

"This can be fatal for any democracy and more so for Indian democracy. the Congress and 22 political parties have demanded that a virtual session

NEW DELHI, MAY 30 (PTI): The faced by the common people. As of Indian Parliament should be called forthwith and all standing committees and select committees of Parliament constituted for oversight on government should be activated without delay and the democratic process set in motion,"

He also said that justice has been denied to millions of people in the country as the subordinate iudiciary has been non-functional for the first time in India's history for almost 60 days now. Venugopal said at the start of the seventh year, India stands at a crossroads with its citizens exhausted by the weight of this "government's sins, ineptitude and callous insensitivity to the widespread suffering".

"Over the last six years, India witnessed a steady increase in the politics of distraction and false noise, to the point that it has become a defining mainstay of Modi Government's administrative style. While it served the political interests of the BJP, it came at an unprecedented economic and social cost to the nation," he said.

"Prime Minister Modi would do well to remember that extraordinary promises beget extraordinary expectations. But as we shall see, even the most ordinary and mundane expectations of keeping a country running were beyond the capabilities of this Government which promised 'so much' and delivered 'so very little'," Surjewala said. Modi and his cabinet members had taken oath on this day last year for a second term in office.

Dr Yudok Bhutia updated that the patient is in a stable and healthy condition and the viral load of the patient has gone down. He will be tested again next week for consideration of further plan of action by the hospital administration. It was informed that the patient has been cooperative throughout his treatment and added that the medical staffs on duty have shown immense positivity and bravery while treating the sole COVID positive patient of the State.

The entire frontline healthcare warriors were commended and applauded for their determination, grit and selflessness in the fight against the COVID-19 pandemic.

#### Pictorial book for kids offers key info on COVID-19

NEW DELHI, MAY 30 (PTI): A pictorial book seeks to answer key questions related to coronavirus to help five to nine year olds understand this

unprecedented time in which a hidden virus has compelled them to stay at home - away from school, friends and the outdoors. "Coronavirus: A Book for Children" is written

by Elizabeth Jenner, Kate Wilson and Nia Roberts and has illustrations by Axel Scheffler. The book is published by HarperCollins India in partnership with Nosy Crow and is available in English, Hindi, Marathi, Tamil, Malayalam, Gujarati, Assamese and Nepali.

"There's a new word you might have heard. You might hear people talking about it or you might hear it on the news. This word is the reason that you're not going to school. It is the reason you can't go outside very often or visit your friends. It might be the reason why the grown-up or grownups who look after you are at home. The word is coronavirus," the book begins.

According to Tina Narang, publisher HarperCollins India, this is an "extremely relevant picture book" which will "help children understand this truly unique time in which a hidden virus has compelled them to stay at home - away from school, friends and the outdoors".

The book, which also has an expert's input -Graham Medley of the London School of Hygiene & Tropical Medicine, attempts to answer questions like what is coronavirus, how one catches it, is there a cure and what is going to happen next.

It says this is a strange time for everybody, and it's happening all over the world. "But if we are all careful and we all stay at home, we are doing what we can to stop the coronavirus spreading. And that gives the scientists and doctors time to work out how to cure the illness and maybe stop people getting it altogether by using medicines and vaccines," the authors say.

"One day, quite soon, though nobody knows exactly when, you'll be able to visit people you love who don't live with you, play with your friends, go to school again and do lots of other things that you enjoy but that you can't do now," the book says.

It ends on a positive note saying "one day, this strange time will be over".

## Government not serious about Viral Lab, alleges SDF

**SUMMIT REPORT** GANGTOK, 30 MAY:

Tikkim Democratic n spokesperson, MK Subbatoday alleged that the State government has never shown seriousness in expediting the setting up of testing lab for COVID-19 in the State and public pressure has forced the government to do so.

Hefurtherallegedthat the State government has not taken this pandemic situation seriously and is still busy accusing the previous government. The state government should stop playing politics and work for the people, he added.

Addressing a press conference here today, MrSubba stated that in his budget speech the Chief Minister had said that Sikkim is fully equipped to handle the COVID-19 situation but the government has still

not been able to start its own testing lab even after two months of the lockdown.

"The state government unmoved when the viral lab was not operational even after 10 days since its inauguration but it came into action only after North Bengal Medical College [NBMC] returned samples sent by Sikkim," he alleged.

MrSubba stated that 641 labs have already been established in the country but Sikkim has not been able to get approval from ICMR for RT-PCR testing even after two months of lockdown.

Inemployment has a habit of remaining in the news. Or maybe because it is on everyone's minds, that it appears to be in frequent discussion as well and through that affiliation, also getting mentioned often in press releases and becoming standard fare in political pronouncements. Meanwhile, the State Government started with a youthempowerment year a little over a decade ago and has since developed the initiative into skill development which now has a directorate of capacity building dedicated to it, an institute and livelihood schools in all territorial constituencies and now a whole start-up programme dedicated to supporting young entrepreneurs. Scholarships are also on offer, as are attractive student loans. In a scenario such as this, the focus of those wishing to address the challenge of unemployment should be in expending more energy on ensuring that the skill development initiative, the effort which makes the job-seekers employable, are more effectively carried out. Unfortunately, more energy has traditionally been directed at embarrassing the clutch of officers serving on service extensions. The aspiration for government employment is still so strong that these "extensions" still irk many even though their retirement will only open up a sliver of positions. But can one really blame the unemployed who still aspire for government employment at the cost of compromising their chances in private sector advancement or self-employment options? The salary differential is so staggering and the work ethic requirements so relaxed, that it is really unfair to shoo the youth away from government employment and have them pursue opportunities in the private sector.

But this, in a way, is a lost pursuit. There can never be enough government jobs for the youth hoping for employment and it is only a matter of time before government offices are slimmed down and openings shut even tighter. It goes without saying that when the crunch comes, the survival instinct will kick in and the youth of Sikkim will explore and attain new options and livelihoods. But why wait for resoluteness to evolve only when the going gets tough. Sikkim is undoubtedly among the few places which are lucky enough to have the chance of staving off tough times if they "get going" while the going is still good. Few regions have been as pampered and are as blessed with lucky breaks and opportunities as Sikkim is. For a State that has no political clout by way of parliamentarian strength in Delhi, Sikkim has had a good run with the powers-thatbe in getting its demands met and problems resolved even in these times of absolute "sevaks" when larger states have been cold shouldered. Many opportunities have been created and continue to be offered. Even a cursory listing of new investments in Sikkim will bear out that opportunities abound in a diverse range of activities, from trading to academics to white-collar jobs. What is now required is for these opportunities to be seized.

Unfortunately, this is where Sikkim is found lacking. Opportunities require hard work for success. It is this drive that Sikkim needs more of. The technical qualifications apart, every job requires only a few more qualities from prospective candidates - diligence, commitment to quality and a tenacity to compete. The faster Sikkim rediscovers these strengths, the sooner the opportunities will start delivering. The Livelihood Schools, apart from the subjectspecific trainings they impart, should also include sessions on work-culture and introduce trainees to real achievers from around them and from elsewhere so that they complete their courses inspired to sweat it out, compete, stumble and stand up again.

# Why lockdown life is a lot like insomnia a philosopher of sleep explains

As a philosopher who researches insomnia, I'm struck by how similar the lockdown experience is with lying awake through the night, waiting for either sleep to come or the new day to dawn.

In particular, it is this warped relationship with time and the type of discomfort involved that makes the two experiences similar. I've found this analogy of likening lockdown to insomnia helpful for understanding the current situation and for evaluating how we respond

Inspired by the work of the philosopher Emmanuel Levinas, I have identified three features common to most forms of insomnia that can be revelatory for those living under lockdown. These are the waiting involved, along with the watchful and wasteful feelings that accompany it.

The insomniac, regardless of how they pass this time, is in a time of waiting. They wait for the soft relief of sleep – tantalisingly close and yet so far. But, when things get desperate enough, they also wait for the return of daylight, which justifies the abandoning of this waiting, the getting back up and returning to the activities that order our lives.

Either way this waiting is torturous and anticipatory. It involves repeated imaginings of, and reachings for, that which we long for.

Under lockdown we are, at a societal level, thrown into a kind of waiting akin to that of the insomniac in bed. Boredom in the face of this waiting quickly morphs into desperation.

We become so sick of our waiting that we imagine and anticipate not only the successful treatment of COVID-19, and a return to "healthy" normality, but moreover any future



beyond this drawn-out time of confinement.

anticipatory structure of insomnia is connected to a second and equally cruel aspect of sleeplessness. The insomniac is all too aware of their situation. They hear every tick of the clock as they

They sense sleep, just out of reach. The familiar becomes strange and the unnoticed is drawn into view: the ambient noises of the building, the beat of their own heart.

Just so under lockdown. Our waiting at home is not easily ignored or avoided by distractions and activities. Instead, we remain active, hyper-aware and distractedly drawn to the constant stream of news. And yet all this information leads us nowhere. It merely throws us back into the mundane and into an awareness that we are still waiting.

This watchful waiting in insomnia is experienced as wasteful. The suffering from insomnia is riven with the knowledge not only of our powerlessness to end this waiting but also that one is wasting something oh so precious: not just one's time but one's time of rest.

The thought, "I should be asleep"

echoes through every experience of insomnia, as does the imagined loss of productivity in the following day ("I will pay for this tomorrow"). These echoes bring with them agitation, anxiety and anger.

Similarly, in lockdown, we know we are powerless to hasten the end of our waiting but feel pressure to be productive. We should enjoy this extra time we have on our hands, either spending it with our loved ones or taking the chance to improve ourselves. Needless to say, for many such pressure is oppressive. They feel lockdown as time wasted.

CIRCLES. **VICIOUS** 

INTERRUPTED

These features of insomnia and lockdown have a viciously circular structure. One waits for sleep and thus it never comes. One is aware of this absence and thus the experience of waiting is intensified. One grows angry at this futile passing of time, this inactivity without reward.

In this sense, the experience of insomnia perpetuates and strengthens its grip on us. While suffering from lockdown does not extend the lockdown, it certainly intensifies the suffering.

Vicious circles are by their very

nature hard to escape and they are harder to escape the longer we inhabit them. But it is possible to interrupt these structures.

Research increasingly suggests that the best method of escaping insomnia is to avoid a direct, oneon-one conflict with it. Give up on the time of waiting and retreat to the kitchen or the living room. Anywhere but the bedroom, anywhere but the place of sleep(lessness). Locked down, such a change of place is

But we can reconceive and change the spaces we inhabit. This can be as simple as changing a chest of drawers into a desk and inviting friends, via video, to join you around

It can be the changing of the street and the park into spaces for conversation and support, at a safe distance. Staying at home does not mean that this home and its locale, cannot be changed, reshaped or reimagined.

The other fundamental element of insomnia that we can take control of is how we spend our time. Through coordination, compassion and consideration, we can make time for each other. Time formed around one another, put aside for checking in on one's elderly neighbours or for a call with an immunosuppressed friend, is time broken free from the isolation and monotony of lockdown.

This is no guarantee. The analogy with insomnia should make, at least, this fact clear. Insomnia will probably return and lockdown will probably continue to be difficult. Our struggles, anxieties and fears will not disappear. But that doesn't mean we must face them alone. In fact, that's precisely what we shouldn't do.

# Hong Kong: how China's new national security law subverts the territory's cherished rule of law

Tensions are running high in Hong Kong at a decision by China's ruling body, the National People's Congress (NPC), authorising its standing committee to draft a national security law for Hong Kong. The decision, drafted in secret, is likely to become law by August.

It should never have come to this. Article 18 of Hong Kong's Basic Law - the territory's de facto mini-constitution that came into effect after the British handover in 1997 - specifically limited Beijing from applying national laws to the territory, except in matters of defence and foreign affairs. The NPC decision changes all that. It not only authorises the standing committee to draft such a law, it allows the law to be inserted into Hong Kong's Basic Law by promulgation.

This completely by-passes the Legislative Council, the law-making body of the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region (HKSAR) government, and creates new national security crimes. It talks, for example, of "unflinchingly" preventing, stopping and punishing any conduct that seriously endangers national security, such as separatism, subversion of state power, or organising and carrying out terrorist activities. Any activities by foreign and overseas forces that interfere "in any fashion" in the affairs of Hong Kong, and any overseas forces that use Hong Kong to carry out "separatist, subversive, infiltrative or destructive activities", will be punished.

Articles 3 and 4 of the decision also specifically reiterate the HKSAR's obligation to enact its own national security law. Hong Kongers thus face the dubious prospect of having not one but two national security laws.

UNILATERAL DECISION

The US Secretary of State, Mike Pompeo, claimed the NPC's decision means Hong Kong is no longer politically autonomous from mainland China. The US will could now revoke the special status it accords Hong Kong, and which gives it favourable trading terms. This, married with further US sanctions, is a threat to China's economy. Worse still, it would be fatal to Hong Kong's standing as one of the world's major financial centres.

Under a 1984 Joint Sino-British Declaration, Britain retains a watching brief, sanctioned by an international treaty lodged with the UN. Once upon a time, such treaties meant something. Despite this, apart from a few stalwart voices, the UK's initial response was muted, despite the fact that Hong Kong was a British colony until 1997. However, on May 28, the NPC decision finally prompted the British government to offer

the right to live in the UK.

With China becoming a political hegemon as well as an economic powerhouse, its leaders feel able to unilaterally declare the joint declaration obsolete, bar British critics from entering Hong Kong, and denounce all foreign criticism as foreign interference.

CHIPPED AWAY

It would be a mistake to see the NPC's decision as just another aspect of the US-China trade war. It comes after a series of protracted and increasingly unsuccessful attempts by the Chinese Communist Party (CPC) to capture the hearts and minds of Hong Kong people. There was a short window, just after the 1997 handover, when optimism was high and this goal might have been feasible.

But the years since 1997 have been marked by sniping attacks on Hong Kong's legal system, chipping away at what Hong Kongers see as the territory's core value: the rule of law. Its independent judges have been termed "administrators" who must toe the party line. Retiring judges have spoken of the impending demise of the rule of law.

Since 1997, the Chinese government's response to popular protest has been singleminded and blunt repression. Invariably, such conflagrations leave only two escape routes: submission or retraction.

This is what happened in 2003, when HKSAR government first proposed a national security law, as it was obliged to do under Article 23 of the Basic Law. This aimed to prohibit any act of treason, secession, sedition or subversion against the Chinese government.

The broad, sweeping nature of its provisions, which included the prohibition of foreign political organisations or bodies from conducting political activities within the region, caused a storm of protest - on July 1 2003, over 500,000 people demonstrated against the proposal. After a standoff, it was eventually withdrawn.

The NPC latest decision reveals that while the 2003 bill was gone, it was not forgotten. Frustrated with the inability of the HKSAR government to pass such legislation, China secretly planned its own law. In the meantime, it nibbled away at some of Hong Kong's other legal defences.

In 2019, the HKSAR government was pressured by Beijing to introduce a new extradition law. Overnight, Hong Kong, once seen as a city of law, became a city of street battles. The massed ranks of para-military police, equipped with tear gas, pepper spray, water cannons and rubber bullets, openly

300,000 Hong Kongers sanctuary in the form of fought protesters on the streets.

There was violence from both protesters and the police, but while numerous by-standers and protesters felt the full force of the HKSAR's legal and para-military capability, demands for an independent inquiry into police conduct have been rejected by Carrie Lam, Hong Kong's chief executive. My own phone buzzed with messages from former students caught up in events: one messaged that the friend standing beside her had just been hit in the stomach with a rubber bullet. My former student was acting as a frontline medic and, though clearly identified as such, was forced "run for her life" from the police.

Beijing deemed her and others like her "subversives", "secessionists", and "terrorists". This word has now been added to the lexicon of crimes by the NPC's new decision, reflecting China's recent predilection for defining its opponents as "terrorists".

IGNORING THE INTERNATIONAL ORDER

The NPC decision states that China will oppose "foreign interference" in Hong Kong and will punish foreign forces which use Hong Kong to carry out "separatist, subversive, infiltrative or destructive activities". In their own struggle for power before 1949 this is exactly how Chinese communists used Hong Kong. Ever since then they have worried that their enemies would also use the territory as a "base for subversion" to overthrow the communist regime. It is perhaps no wonder, then, that given the domestic and international challenges to President Xi Jinping's authoritarian regime, China sees the Hong Kong protests through a lens of paranoia about the rest of the world.

The NPC decision does not prohibit sedition, treason, theft of state secrets, or ties with foreign political organisations. But it would be naive to think that the new law will ignore such activities. The NPC's decision also states that bodies such as the Ministry of State Security will be allowed to operate in Hong Kong - which could mean spying on schools, universities, the media and monitoring people's personal social media accounts for any sign of dissent.

The possibility that the new national security crimes may violate the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights can no longer be relied upon to check China's intentions. As its dismissal of the Joint Sino-British Declaration suggests, China feels able to disregard laws it sees as against its interests. On Hong Kong as elsewhere, Beijing is prepared to challenge the rules-based international order.

COVID-19 for patients at the Guwahati Medical College Hospital (GMCH) became functional from Friday, the health minister said.

A repatriation flight from Kuwait, carrying 155 passengers under Vande Bharat Mission scheme, arrived at the Lokpriya Gopinath Bordoloi International Airport in the evening, a spokesperson of the Airports Authority of India (AAI) said.

Among the 89 cases reported in the night, 30 were from Kamrup, 17 from Tinsukia, 14 each from Guwahati and Dhubri, 10 from Cachar and four from Dhemaii.

Twenty-five new COVID-19 cases were detected in the evening -six air travellers, 11 from Kamrup (Metro) and eight from Hojai, Sarma

Among the 30 new cases reported during the day, 16 were from Golaghat, six from Karimganj and two each from Lakhimpur, Cachar, Hailakandi and Karbi Anglong, he said.

Twenty-four patients were discharged on Friday, including 12 from Mahendra Mohan Choudhury Hospital (MMCH), six from GMCH, three Silchar Medical College Hospital and one from Jorhat Medical College Hospital, taking the number of recovered and discharged patients in

the state to 125. Of the total 1,024 cases, 892 are active,



while four patients have died, three have migrated and 125 have recovered. the minister said.

also inaugurated an exclusive COVID-19 treatment unit at GMCH and said the Rs 150-crore centrallyfunded unit is perhaps the first of its kind in eastern India.

It is housed in a new building and has 236 beds -- 50 in the ICU and 186 in the wards -- with each bed having a dedicated supply of medical gas.

The unit is centrally air-conditioned and equipped with 14 Ultraviolet Germicidal (UGVI) Irradiation systems, imported from Canada, which will help improve the indoor air quality and bacteria management.

Sarma said the latest COVID-19 patients are mostly those who have returned from other states.

This week alone saw 637 cases. Monday the highest single-day spike of 156 cases followed by 139 on Tuesday, 101 on Wednesday, 97 on Thursday and 144 on Friday.

The state government has partially modified the existing protocols for COVID-19 test, by which swab samples of all patients should be taken on the fifth day after the initial positive result.

If the test result of the sample taken on the fifth day is negative, a repeat swab sample would be

If the results of both the samples taken on the fifth and sixth days are negative, the patient will be released from hospital, subject to verification of the asymptomatic status and approval of discharge by the State Discharge Board, according to an order by the state Health and Family Welfare department's Principal Secretary Samir Sinha.

Hospitals and testing laboratories will give priority to testing COVID-19 patients.

In Assam, 92,390 samples have been tested for COVID-19 so far, with 10,24 testing positive, 84,933 negative and the remaining results are awaited, according to a Health and Family Welfare department bulletin.

The state has decided that everyone coming from outside will be sent for institutional quarantine. No home quarantine will be allowed for the first seven days, till the test results are received.

The nodal officer shall communicate movement of returning personnel in advance to where the disembarking airport or train station is located and the districts where the cantonment or group centres are located.

The nodal officer will confirm that adequate institutional quarantine facilities have been created for the personnel within the cantonment. There will be a general protocol for the Army, Air Force and CAPF personnel on official duty or deployment.

Screening of all personnel will be done at disembarking railway station or airport by district authorities in coordination with the Army, Air Force or CAPF authorities.

The personnel will directly proceed to their cantonment, adequate institutional quarantine facilities will be created by authorities. Any

asymptomatic personnel will have to undergo a combined institutional quarantine inside the cantonment or camp.

Defence personnel returning to their home in Assam on leave will have to follow quarantine and testing protocols stipulated for the public, according to the order.

# Football is back and all it took was the spectre of financial catastrophe

Well done, everyone: we did it. They said it wasn't possible. They said it wasn't safe. They said it would be tactless to start up one of the world's most lucrative sports leagues while thousands are dying. They said it wouldn't be a fair competition. They may still be right about all of this, of course. More on that in a moment.

But for now, football is back. Watch it. Drink it in. Lose yourself in a pure six-week football bender: 92 Premier League fixtures, spread across every day of the week and every conceivable time slot, all of it live on television, much of it free to air. Take that, nulland-voiders; dry your tears, PPG; up yours, Troy Deeney. Football is back and all it took was the spectre of financial catastrophe and the sight of Germany handling things far more adeptly.

The first point to make is that football is hardly striking out alone. Snooker and horse racing are planning to

May doors on Monday. Professional golf, cricket and rugby league will be back by August. The resumption of the 2019-20 season was probably a foregone conclusion from the moment the prime minister offered his backing this month and heaven knows the government would be grateful of a little popular distraction right now. Even so many have

been surprised by the

speed and bombast which the game has managed to coalesce around the terms of its return. Crisis has a marvellous way of focusing minds. Envy, too. Stung not just by the urgency of the balance sheet but the largely frictionless resumption of the Bundesliga and the resolute noises coming out of Spain and Italy, the 20 Premier League clubs managed to set aside their trademark factionalism for just long enough to approve the contours of Project Restart.

Certainly it's possible to feel vaguely queasy about the lengths to which clubs are going in order to prove their readiness: all those millions being spent on tests and disinfectant and distancing, all that singleuse plastic equipment going straight in the bin. Already, Premier League clubs have carried out more Covid-19 tests (2,752) than the entire UK did in the first two weeks of the outbreak.

And of course it will be safe; at least, as safe as it is reasonable to guarantee. But then, what euphemistically described as "the safety issue" was only ever partly about safety. It was less about meeting an objective standard or an acceptable vector of risk than about persuading players and public that they could feel safe. It was to this end that the league commissioned such a formidable array of expertise and scientific research to bolster its case (much of which swiftly and mysteriously found its way into the newspapers).

From an early stage Project Restart was as much PR campaign as public health drive. This is why, from the league's standpoint, the nightmare scenario is not a glut of positive tests among players and staff. Rather, it is the prospect of elite football sailing on in its sterile little bubble while the country at large endures a second wave of the virus: entrenching the idea that good health is not a basic right but a privilege available to those who can afford it.

It's worth noting the astonishing inversion that has subtly taken place here. The return of the Premier League comes as the Women's Super League season is cancelled, as Leagues One and Two move to abort their campaigns, the non-league

facilities and five-a-side pitches and school fields lie unused. Football, the original people's sport, the sport anyone could play anywhere, has been shrunk into an elite pursuit, the preserve of the very richest alone.

And for what?

Germany may already have dropped the canary down the mineshaft but what we don't know still far outweighs what we do. We don't know how much time will be required to build proper match fitness and how sharp any increased injury risk will be as a result. We don't know the extent to which BAME players are being put disproportionately at risk. We don't know when fans will return, or even whether they will return in anything like the same numbers.

Liverpool will the league for the first time in 30 years, deservedly so, nobody knows but what it will feel like to watch them do it in an empty stadium, surrounded by plastic seats and a skinny row of photographers. We don't know how serious the erosion of home advantage will be, although intuition and experience suggest the best clubs will benefit most. We don't know how the asymmetry

pyramid is annulled en of the season will masse, as grassroots impact on fairness. Will Tottenham suffer from playing a "home" north London derby behind closed doors? Perhaps. Will Iosé Mourinho use it as an excuse if they lose? Almost certainly.

> In short, we don't really know anything at all. Nonetheless we push on, because what else is there? The Premier League has thrived by dint not just of its reach but its ubiquity: an endlessly refreshing feed of content, narratives, controversies and tribal beefs. The likes of PPG v Null and Void, Overpaid Footballers v Underpaid Nurses, Kyle Walker v Lockdown Rules, were only going to get us so far.

> This is why the grand reopening also feels like a clearance sale. After all, we know what the real story is here: the billion-pound hole in the broadcast deal that needs to be filled with something, anything. Football has never been entirely free of the profit motive but rarely has it felt less like a vital service and more like a fungible commodity: a commercial obligation, a piece of content, a tin of supermarket mystery meat, to be stacked high and sold at a knockdown rate.

It will certainly smell interesting. It will doubtless sustain us for a while. What we don't yet know is whether you can live off it.

## Dinara Safina: 'Being world No 1 is not fun, it is the opposite'

**TUMAINI CARAYOL** 30 MAY LONDON, [THEGUARDIAN]: The oldest Dinara Safina conference archived on the internet dates back to 2003. Safina was 16 years old, ranked 63rd in the world and she had just defeated Anna Kournikova, the most famous Russian player across the lands. As usual, many questions were about people other than Safina; about Kournikova, her mother, her superstar brother. Finally, somebody wondered what she actually wanted from her own career, "The sport life is so short," she replied. "I just want to enjoy it and don't get injured."

Safina went on to have an enviable career. She won 12 titles, Olympic silver and reached No 1. She bullied top players with her brutal weight of shot, reaching three grand slam finals. Even though she never won Roland Garros, she is one of the best claycourt players of the 21st century.

It has been nine years since Safina, now 33 and retired, last competed and she is locked down in Moscow. It takes just one question - about whether she would return to the sport if not for the stress fractures in her back - to understand that for everything she did, she never actually managed to reach either of those simple goals she set years ago.

"If I would be able to start from the beginning of my career, maybe, but



back to the tour. It's something that I guess is very deep. I think I got disappointed in some way by tennis, because I dreamed that once you become really famous, you become No 1 in the world, you would have a different life. But once you have this, everything, and you realise that it's not what vou've been dreaming of, then all your dreams fall

I don't feel like coming

Safina grew up training in Valencia as her brother, Marat Safin, ascended to No 1 in 2000. Despite his two major titles, Safin's discipline never matched his talent. Fans lined the stadiums for his charisma, looks and famed self-destructions as much as his tennis. Safina was different. Her discipline drove her success as she became a supreme athlete, but she always directed her frustrations inwards. While he would break racquets, she would break down.

This is where her disappointment lies – she came to take everything in her career so seriously that the pressure was suffocating and her joy was lost: "I couldn't handle my emotions and all these things, and for me that's why it was tough." The rise itself was

thrilling.Safinaannounced herself to the world in the spring of 2008, beating both Justine Henin and Serena Williams to win a breakthrough title in Berlin. Within a year she was No 1 and dominant on clay, but the more Safina's ranking rose the more she would play the biggest moments in a state of perpetual torment, on the verge of tears, unable to cope."I always had a dream to be famous, No 1 and all this, but then suddenly I felt so much pressure being there. I didn't expect that I would have this pressure. I thought it was going to be fun, you know? You become famous, you become No 1. And everybody is happy. It's actually the opposite! Everybody wants to beat

In the 2009 Australian Open final, she froze and

by Williams. She collapsed under pressure in the Roland Garros final against Kuznetsova, infamously serving a double-fault on match was the No 1 player in the world yet Serena held three grand slam titles. She became the butt of every joke. "Of course, you

hear every day the same questions in every interview: 'When are you going to win your first grand slam?' And I'm like: 'You think I don't want to win a grand slam?' And then I started to struggle with this because it's something that was really annoying for me and it was very painful because it's something that I really wanted to win."

There was no chance for the redemption achieved by the likes of Simona Halep, Caroline Wozniacki and Kim Clijsters. By 2010 her back pain felt "like somebody stabbed a knife in your back". she continually rehabbed for a return, just the thought of stepping on to the court became a source of trauma. She quickly learned that no longer competing was also a relief for her mental health. "It was so deep in my mind, because phew... I just couldn't go back again to feel this pain. I had enough of this pain and I think another thing [was] that, finally, I could step away from all the pressure I had."

# Trump bans entry of certain groups of Chinese students to US

# Pentagon puts military police on alert to go to Minneapolis

DELRAY BEACH (US), president is headed been in touch with the MAY 30 (AP): As unrest spread across dozens of American cities on Friday, the Pentagon took the rare step of ordering the Army to put several active-duty US military police units on the ready to deploy to Minneapolis, where the police killing of George Floyd sparked the widespread protests.

Soldiers from Fort Bragg in North Carolina and Fort Drum in New York have been ordered to be ready to deploy within four hours if called, according to three people with direct knowledge of the orders.

Soldiers in Carson, in Colorado, and Fort Riley in Kansas have been told to be ready within 24 hours. The people did not want their names used because they were not authorized to discuss the preparations.

The get-ready orders were sent verbally on Friday, after President Donald Trump asked Defense Secretary Mark Esper for military options to help quell the unrest in Minneapolis after protests descended into looting and arson in some parts of the city.

Trump made the request on a phone call from the Oval Office on Thursday night that included Esper, National Security Advisor Robert O' Brien and several others.

The president asked Esper for rapid deployment options if the Minneapolis protests continued to spiral out of control, according to one of the people, senior Pentagon official who was on the

"When the White House asks for options, someone opens the drawer and pulls them out so to speak, the official said.

The person said the military units would be deployed under the Insurrection Act of 1807, which was last used in 1992 during the riots in Los Angeles that followed the Rodney King trial.

The state's governor could ask President Donald Trump to take action or Trump could act on his own authority if he's determined that the local authorities are so overwhelmed that they can't adequately enforce the law, Vladeck said.

It is a very, very broad grant of authority for the president, he added.

# Singapore otters' lockdown antics spark backlash

otters, **S**long adored by the city-state's nature lovers, are popping up in unexpected places during the coronavirus lockdown but their antics have angered some and even sparked calls for a

With the streets empty, the creatures have been spotted hanging out by a shopping centre, scampering through the lobby of a hospital and even feasting on pricey fish stolen from a pond.

While many think of tiny Singapore as a densely populated concrete jungle, it is also relatively green for a busy Asian city, and has patches of rainforest, fairly clean waterways and abundant wildlife.

There are estimated to be about 90 otters in Singapore, making up 10 families, and appearances at popular tourist sites around the city-state's downtown waterfront have transformed them into local celebrities.

They featured in a documentary narrated by David Attenborough,

are tracked avidly by the local media -- and have been spotted more frequently since people were asked to stay home and workplaces closed in April to fight the virus.

"When there's restriction of movement, there's less vehicles and there's less people, so the urban space opens up," said N. Sivasothi, a biologist at the National University of Singapore known as "Otterman" due to his work on the animals.

But their newfound freedoms appear to have emboldened the otters, and they are now facing a backlash.

- 'More daring' -

The most high-profile incident was a raid on a pond at a spa shuttered due to the pandemic. The creatures gobbled several fish including an arowana, a prized species that can sell for tens of thousands of dollars.

Actress-turnedentrepreneur Jazreel Low, who owns the spa, posted pictures on Facebook of fish parts scattered around the pond and lamented a "massacre".

"They probably realised that there was nobody there and became more daring," Low told entertainment news website 8 DAYS.

The case sparked a debate about whether more should be done to stop otters rampaging through the city, with a widely discussed letter in a local newspaper calling for air horns and rubber bullets to be used as deterrents.

"Wild boars have never been encouraged to enter urban areas, neither should otters be just because they look cute," wrote Ong Junkai in the correspondence to the Straits Times, which triggered calls from some for a cull.

In other incidents, a video showed a group charging into the lobby of a children's hospital before being shooed away, and the creatures also filmed were frolicking in the empty streets outside a popular shopping centre.


