334 soldiers killed from 2016-18 in areas where AFSPA is in force: Govt

New Delhi, Jun 24 (PTI): As many as 334 soldiers were killed from 2016 to 2018 in areas where the Armed Forces Special Powers Act (AFSPA) is in force, Defence Minister Rajnath Singh told Parliament on Monday.

In a written response to a question in the Rajya Sabha, Singh said 113 soldiers were killed in 2016, 125 in 2017 and 96 in 2018 in areas where the AFSPA is in force.

The AFSPA, which gives special powers to the armed forces, is in place in Jammu and Kashmir and certain parts of the north-east.

HC verdict on Maha govt's Maratha quota on Thursday

MUMBAI, JUN 24 (PTI): The Bombay High Court will on Thursday pronounce its judgment on a bunch of petitions challenging the Maharashtra government's decision to grant 16 per cent quota to Maratha community in government jobs and educational institutions.

On November 30 last year, the Maharashtra legislature passed a bill proposing 16 per cent reservation in education and government jobs for the Marathas under the Socially and Educationally Backward Class (SEBC) category. Several petitions were filed in the high court challenging the reservation, while a few others were filed in support of the quota.

On February 6, a division bench of Justices Ranjit More and Bharati Dangre commenced hearing in all the petitions. In April this year, the court closed the petitions for verdict.

The government. while defending its decision, had said reservation was only to bring up the Maratha community which was neglected since long. The petitioners chal-

lenging the quota decision, however, claimed by granting reservation to the Maratha community, the government has given them permanent crutches which they will never be able to shed.

The government has destroyed the concept of equality by setting up a special category - Socially and Educationally Backward Class - for the Maratha community, the petitioners argued.

They also claimed that as per the Maharashtra State Backward Class Commission report, Marathas and Kunbis are one and the same caste and hence, should be included in the Other Backward Classes (OBC) category.

I-League to approach court if ISL is made top league, AIFF calls it premature and unfair

New Delhi. Iun 24 (PTI): The I-League clubs Monday said they will approach "appropriate courts for relief" if the ISL is made the country's top league, even as the All India Football Federation called it "premature and unfair".

Miffed at AIFF general secretary Kushal Das's public acknowledgement of Indian Super League as the country's main league, representatives of Mohun Bagan, East Bengal, Churchill Brothers, Minerva Punjab FC and Gokulam Kerala FC, among others, held a meeting in the capital, where they decided to move courts.

The clubs feel Das' acknowledgement will be rubber-stamped in the AIFF's executive committee meeting on July 3.

"With media reports indicating that the ISL being announced as the top division league post an Executive committee meeting scheduled for July 3rd, the I-League clubs are standing united stronger than ever," the clubs said in a joint statement.

"The refusal of the President of AIFF to meet the I-League clubs in spite of several requests and the subsequent vindictive actions specifically towards the I-League clubs, combined with the coercive and blackmailing attitude of FSDL towards AIFF by refusing to make payments pushes the game to an uncertain future." The apex body promptly responded with a statement of its own while urging the aggrieved clubs to come back to the drawing board.

"The AIFF feels that it is very premature and unnecessary to prejudge any action of the AIFF, and be commenting on the AIFF Executive Committee meeting on

July 3, 2019 in advance. "The AIFF as a custo-

has always endeavoured to balance to the interest of all stakeholders, and the Hero I-League, and its clubs. To say that the future of Hero I-League, and the clubs will not be taken into consideration for any future decisions of the AIFF would be unfair," the federation said in its statement.

Miserable state of Government Health Sector in India

A midst the hullabaloo of development, economic growth, rise in GDP and per capita income, the progress of science and technology, the lives of the people at the lowest rung of the society has not changed a bit. The recent case of death of over 156 children due to acute encephalitis syndrome in Bihar is an example of it.

DEATH OF CHILDREN IN BIHAR

This is not the first time that it happened in Bihar. During the summer months of 2012–14, a similar outbreak had occurred where hundreds of children had died. According to the media reports on Thursday more than 400 children's have been admitted to hospital to be treated for the condition.

The experts studying the outbreak of acute encephalitis during 2012-14 have found that the victims were malnourished children who had suffered a toxic reaction to litchis. The investigation by T Jacob John, a virologist from the Christian Medical College in Vellore of the outbreak in 2012-14 found out that most of the victims were the children of labourers in the area's litchi orchard.

After having eaten litchis through the day, the children went to bed hungry, without a nutritious dinner. The combination of malnutrition and toxins in the litchi fruit caused a condition called hypoglycaemic encephalopathy, which affects the brain, according to the researchers.

Despite having the full measure of the causes of the outbreak Bihar Government did not take any prevention measures.

APATHY OF MINISTERS AND CM

Nitish Kumar, who calls himself 'Vikas Purus' did not even visit the hospital in Muzaffarpur until weeks, which is just 2 hours drive from Patna. It shows the apathy of the elected leaders. The health minister of Bihar was seen enquiring about the India Pakistan Cricket match score during the press conference about the tragedy.

THE MYTH OF AYUSHMAN BHARAT

The central BJP Government which boasts of Ayushman Bharat scheme being the largest public health scheme in the world, where the budget of Rs 6400 crores was allocated during the budget of 2018-19, which upon close observation appears to be more beneficial to the insurance companies than the actual beneficiaries. A report on The Times of India says, "the government's new health insurance scheme that envisions providing cashless insurance up to Rs 5 lakh for 10.74 crore poor families will benefit private hospitals such as those run by Fortis because of severe lack of adequate health facilities in the country."

GOVERNMENT SPENDINGS ON HEALTH

India spends just 1.3% of its total GDP in health i.e Rs 3 per capita, which is one of the lowest among the developing countries of the world. According to a report on The Times Of India, India has just 7 hospital beds per 10000 population, which is one of the lowest in the world. Russia has 97 and even China has 38 beds per 10000 population.

ACUTE SHORTAGE OF DOCTORS AND **NURSES**

Almost all public hospitals suffer from an acute shortage of manpower. According to a report on the Center for Disease Dynamics, Economics & Policy (CDDEP), government hospitals in India are facing a shortage of 6 lakh doctors and 20 lacs nurses. According to the recommendation of WHO(World Health Organisation) ratio of 1: 1000 must be maintained, ie there should be one doctor for every 1000 population and 1 nurse for every 483 population. However, in India the ratio of the government doctor to population is 1:10189, this means in average, one doctor is doing the work of 10 doctors in Government hospitals of India.

OUT-OF-POCKET EXPENDITURE PAU-PERISING THE COMMON PEOPLE

According to the report, In India, 65 per cent of health expenditure is out-ofpocket, and such expenditures push some 57 million people into poverty each year. This means millions of population is becoming poorer due to expenditures in health.

DEATHS DUE TO EASILY-CURABLE-DIS-EASES

The report of CDDEP further says, 57 lakh people die every year from the diseases which can be easily treated using antibiotics. "The findings of the report show that even after the discovery of new antibiotic, regulatory hurdles and substandard health facilities delay or altogether prevent widespread market entry and drug availability. Just the mere existence of an effective antibiotic does not mean that they are available in countries where they are most needed" Economic Times has quoted the Director of CDDEP as saying.

HOSTILITY BETWEEN MEDICAL PRAC-**TITIONERS AND CITIZENS**

The common people, out of helplessness due to the miserable condition of the government hospitals, are venting out their frustrations to doctors and nurses. The slew of attacks on doctors and nurses that have taken place in recent past in various places of the country are because of the failure of the common people to grasp the root cause of the crisis. The ruling class is fermenting unnecessary hostility between the common people and the medical practitioner so as to divert peoples' attention from the real cause. Both the doctors, nurses and the common people are being exploited by the ruling class. Due to lack of manpower, the workload on doctors and nurses in a government hospital is too much, exhaustion makes them angry and sometimes they burst out their anger to the common people. Common people cannot see that almost all the government hospitals across the country are running with an acute shortage of manpower and basic infrastructures.

PRIVATISATION OF HEALTH SECTOR

Ever since India allowed 100 % FDI in 2000 the governments, both at the centre and the state, have been using every available opportunity to hand out public health service to the private hospitals by slashing funds in health sector continuously, which is pushing a vast multitude of people away from the ambient of necessary service like

health. The outright negligence of the public health services, acute shortage of manpower, lack of medicines in Government hospitals in India is an indirect endorsement to the private hospitals, which are run by powerful capitalists of the country, whose sole motive is to maximize their profits. The ruling class knows people will spend on health even if it drives them to extreme poverty. For the profit-seeking capitalists, there is no safer field of investment than health. The government voted by us actually work in the interest of influential capitalist in the our country and the abroad. In one hand standard of government hospitals are deliberately being degraded and in the other private hospitals are fostering rapidly.

According to a report on The Times of India, the profit of private hospitals in India rose by 80 per cent between 2012 and 2017. Private equity investors have made an investment of over \$3.4 billion in Indian hospitals between 2007 and 2017.

According to the Government, India's medical tourism could be worth \$9 billion by 2020, up from \$3 billion in 2015. This statement makes the intent of the government clear.

ROLE OF COMMON PEOPLE

The need of the hour is voicing for raising funds in the government hospitals, the appointment of sufficient doctors and nurses in the hospitals and voicing for standardisation of hospitals with necessary equipment and medicines.

The Reserve Bank of India Monday launched an application on its website for lodging complaints against banks and NBFCs with a view to improve customer experience in timely redressal of grievances. The Complaint Man-

agement System (CMS) is a software application to facilitate RBI's grievance redressal process.

Customers can lodge complaints against any regulated entity with public interface such as commercial banks, urban cooperative banks, Non-Banking Financial

Companies (NBFCs). The complaint would propriate office of the Ombudsman/Regional Office of the RBI.

The CMS will be accessible on desktop as well as on mobile devices. The RBI also plans to introduce a dedicated Interactive Voice Response (IVR) system for tracking the status of complaints.

Keeping the convenience of customers in mind, the CMS has been designed to enable online filing of complaints.

"The application also improves transparency by keeping the complainants informed through auto-generated acknowledgements and enabling them to track the sta-

tus of their complaints and file appeals online against the decisions of the Ombudsmen, where applicable," said RBI Governor Shaktikanta Das at the launch of CMS.

History Lessons for All Sikkim's history should not be just for the State to study

Tistory, they say is always written by the victor $oldsymbol{\Pi}$ who decides which portions of the vanquished histories suit his plans and which bits are best left untold. The same has held true for the history taught in schools in India. The curriculum is embarrassingly North India-centric, so much so that even though students learn by rote the names of all those who made it emperor in the Slave Dynasty, ask them about what the northeast was up to in the meantime and they draw a blank, a complete blank. It is accepted that prior to the advent of the East India Company, the region was a collection of one empire and several kingdoms and princely states, each with its own intrigues and their own histories. But those stories are not included in the History of

So, the history we learn in school is actually the composite histories of the areas which came together to form the Union of India in 1947 and later? Well, not really. The focus is too limited to the areas which either the British researched in some detail or were studied some more by later-day historians. It is unfortunate that the number of pages devoted in history text books to particular areas is directly proportional to the number of MPs that area has.

But that's not history. It is only part of the

The blind-spotting of areas that got cut off with partition is even worse. The Muslim League for example was a part of the Indian Freedom Struggle and the demand for the creation of Pakistan came much after the movement had already gathered critical mass. We, however, read very little of the role played by this group in the Struggle for Independence save reading about them as the organization that forced the Partition. Icons like Subhas Chandra Bose and Bhagat Singh too are glossed over. But that's another debate.

Before progressing further, it is important to make clear why we study history in the first place - to get a better understanding of where we belong where we fit into the larger scheme of things, where we come from and how we arrived where we are today. There has been much talk about making Sikkim join the mainstream which is why it is not enough to just study Sikkimese history in schools in Sikkim [which would still be a good place to begin]. Sikkim needs to figure in the history books studied elsewhere in the country. In junior school, students learn of what Confucius meant to China even before they are taught when and how Sikkim joined India. One is not suggesting that the State become even more parochial and force Local even in the curriculum, but Sikkim does have a history that's worth learning. Few dynasties have ruled for the three hundred years that the Namgyal dynasty has to its credit [the British rule which hogs the history books lasted less than a hundred years]. Surely the British intrigues vis a vis Tibet should make for interesting reading, as should the Nepali adventures in Sikkim in the 18th century. If kids can learn of the distant Great Wall of China, why can't the story of the Lepcha tower of pots be told to them; maybe not as history, but at least as more than a myth. And would the Lepcha rebellions launched from Eastern Nepal or the stand they took based out of Kalimpong make for some interesting chapters?

It might not be out of place to even suggest here that Sikkim should prepare at least two chapters on Sikkimese history to fit into text books for schools all over the country and take it to the Centre for whetting by the text book boards for inclusion in the syllabi. The country remains endlessly occupied with rewriting its History textbooks anyway, why not slip Sikkim in too.

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South Africa should learn from Brazil about how to tackle 'hidden hunger'

South Africa faces a double burden of hunger and malnutrition, on the one hand, and obesity with associated non-communicable diseases (NCDs), on the other. In many countries, in both the global North and South, malnutrition and obesity frequently co-exist in the same people. This is a condition known as "hidden hunger".

Hidden hunger is a result of various factors. These include poverty, inequality, urbanisation and industrialisation of the food system. The interplay of these factors leaves low income households with very limited access to fresh, healthy foods. Instead, many South Africans – and other people living in similar conditions - subsist on diets high in sugar and processed starch. These diets contribute to increasing levels of obesity. But they don't meet nutritional needs.

My research among urban farmers and low-income residents in Johannesburg identified the complexity of factors that influence dietary choices. It also identified the obstacles to accessing healthy food. Cost is a major impediment while physical access, nutritional knowledge, concentration in the food industry and dietary norms also played a role in shaping diets. Without addressing all of these, South Africa will be unable to address the double burden of malnutrition and non-communicable diseases (NCDs).

Despite the fact that diet has been a major contributing factor to the growth of NCDs in recent years there are virtually no connections between South Africa's agricultural and health policies. Policies to address hunger and malnutrition have tended to be housed in the Department of Agriculture. They have focused on increasing production, whether through urban agriculture or support to small-scale farmers in rural areas.

For its part, the Department of Health remains confined to treatment with medication and limited advice - like diet and exercise. This is despite the fact that the department recognises there needs to be a multi-pronged approach to NCDs.



This needs to change. South African practitioners and policy makers could learn from international examples, where the public and private health sectors have begun to make the link between food and wellness. In particular. policies that were introduced a quarter of a century ago in a city in Brazil provide a useful template of what an integrated approach could look like.

CONNECTING THE DOTS

Innovative policies and programmes in various countries are beginning to link food and health.

To draw a few examples from the United States, which faces high rates of obesity and NCDs, the new field of culinary medicine looks at how dietary changes can restore and maintain health. A number of hospitals are creating food gardens to serve healthy meals to patients. Doctors are writing scripts for fruits and vegetables so that patients can afford them.

At the same time, in the US and Canada, food banks and other organisations that combat hunger are attempting to distribute healthier foods. These organisations are also engaging in advocacy for a more just and equitable food system.

The link is also being made wise discarded by retailers. The food

between the livelihoods of food producers and the environmental sustainability of the food system. In the US a non-governmental organisation incentivises recipients of the government's food assistance programme, SNAP, to buy fresh produce at local farmers' markets through a double value coupon programme. The UN's Purchase from Africa for Africans Programme leverages public procurement for school meals to improve children's health and education while supporting small-scale family farmers. It draws lessons from Brazil and has been implemented in five African countries.

The city of Belo Horizonte, Brazil provides a noteworthy example of how innovative, integrated food and nutrition security policies can assist communities. It has been implementing policies designed to ensure that residents are able to enjoy the right to food for the past 25 years. The city's programmes include:

popular restaurants serving

subsidised healthy meals; shops selling subsidised fresh fruit and vegetables in under-served areas;

a food bank. This reduces food waste by rescuing food otheris then checked and provided to social programmes (such as crèches and old age homes);

farm stalls and farmers' markets. These enable small-scale farmers to sell directly to consumers, cutting out the middleman and thereby raising incomes;

public procurement from small-scale farmers, especially those using agroecological production methods;

school lunches and school gardens. These ensure that children have access to nutritious meals and that they learn about food production and nutrition.

On a research visit to Belo Horizonte, I saw how these programmes improve access to fresh fruits and vegetables - a key measure in the fight against malnutrition and

They also support decent incomes for small-scale producers through direct market access and public procurement. In addition, environmentally sustainable production is encouraged through reservation of additional public funds to purchase agroecologically-farmed foods.

Beyond the health and economic benefits, the programmes support social cohesion through communal eating spaces, cultural events that feature local gastronomy, and local farmers' markets where people can meet the farmers who grow their food and enjoy a sense of community.

One of the most remarkable aspects of Belo Horizonte's food and nutrition security programme is its low cost: less than 2% of the city's budget. Another is the degree of cooperation among government departments, as well as partnership with civil society organisations.

When the policies and programmes developed in Belo Horizonte were rolled out nationally, Brazil experienced a notable decline in hunger.

The model provides many useful lessons that could greatly benefit South Africa. The Department of Health, along with other government departments and civil society partners, needs to take a bold move to tackle the problems of malnutrition, obesity and associated NCDs through a multi-faceted approach.

How mafia and corruption scandals rocked Italian football and left fans with a crisis of faith

Football could be considered Italy's most popular sport, with worldclass teams worth billions attracting a dedicated following across the country. But more than that, football shapes the nation's collective identity, bringing people from the smallest village to the biggest city together in their love for "the beautiful game".

But over the past decade, media investigations and research have uncovered an unseemly lack of virtue within the industry. Mafia infiltration and corruption have come to characterise Italian football to the point that malpractice, deviance and criminal behaviour might seem to be the

For example, fans of one of Italy's most successful teams, Juventus Football Club (also known as "Juve"), have been dismayed by a series of corruption allegations. In April 2019, the Italian Supreme Court ruled that Juventus managers had supplied match tickets that were touted for profit by groups of hard-core fans, known as ultras, under the control of individuals linked to the Calabrian mafia, known as the 'ndrangheta.

In an earlier case, concluded in October 2018, former Juventus player and 2006 World Cup winner Vincenzo Iaquinta was sentenced to two years in prison for firearms offences, in part of a larger trial concerning the infiltration of 'ndrangheta clans in northern Italy. The footballer's father was also sentenced to 19 years on mafia-related charges.

PLAYING FOR POWER

These incidents are not confined to one club - organised crime

groups have interests at all levels of the sport. In 2018, football generated €2.397 billion in Italy alone – the bulk of which came from audiences, not even counting TV, sponsorship and advertising contracts. It's obvious that an industry attracting such enormous amounts of money would make an appealing target for criminal groups that seek to accumulate profits and conceal the proceeds of crime.

But mafia-type groups are also driven by power, with the aim of gaining influence through intimidation or protection and ultimately governing through violence or corruption. Criminal groups such as 'ndrangheta clans use football as a platform to boost their reputation and prestige through more or less legal activities.

Some clans will interfere with youth soccer associations, for example by sponsoring young players, buying or establishing teams or even "saving" them if they are in financial difficulties. A special committee of the Italian parliamentary Antimafia Commission explored these occurrences throughout Italy in 2017.

Groups may use the leverage gained in local environments to exploit business opportunities or gain power at higher levels, too. In the case of Juventus, ticket touting offered clans control over a profitable market, as well as a means to exercise power over the sometimes violent ultras. This, in turn, boosts the reputation of the clans by demonstrating their capacity to exercise influence and control over people and territories using money and violence, if needed.

LOSING FAITH

Mafia groups also use personal

networks and contacts to fix match results and benefit from illegal betting networks. A famous case involving a Serie A footballer, Giuseppe Sculli – the grandson of a very prominent 'ndrangheta boss – showed how mafia interests can be pursued through players or referees for criminal purposes.

In Italian football, match-fixing can occur at alarming scales. The Calciopoli scandal in 2004 eventually led to Juventus being relegated to the lower league in 2006. During this case, it was alleged that different football players, referees and managers had created a system of corruption and sleaze which favoured the victories of certain teams, including in the Serie A.

Italians' faith in fairness in football after the Calciopoli scandal has dropped drastically. But money laundering and fraud allegations continue to be made against those the highest level, as seen in the 2019 case concerning the former president of the Palermo FC, Massimo Zamparini.

While the state of Italian football seems especially bleak, allegations of corruption in this industry happen everywhere. In October 2018, Belgian authorities charged five people in relation to a massive police inquiry into financial fraud and match-fixing. In May 2019, Spanish police forces arrested a number of La Liga and second division players and club executives as part of an investigation into match-fixing. Most recently, in June 2019, former UEFA president and Juventus football star Michel Platini was arrested on suspicion of corruption over the decision to name Qatar as host nation of the 2022 World Cup

- even as he serves a four-year ban from football for receiving a "disloyal payment".

A RED CARD FOR CORRUPTION

There is no doubt that boosting public confidence in the fairness of football requires improved systems of governance, from the local levels to the national arenas. So it's good news that international governing body FIFA is set to restore the offence of corruption to its ethics code, having it removed the previous year.

There also needs to be better care and transparency around the enormous amount of money that the industry attracts. FIFA and national bodies - such as the FIGC in Italy, for example - need to oversee the transactions for buying and selling teams and players, make arrangements for legal betting and ensure accountability in sponsorship systems, to begin

But there also needs to be an awareness that the industry offers social and symbolic capital to mafia organisations and organised crime groups, as well as economic opportunities to "dirty" entrepreneurs. In response, bodies such as FIFA need to develop specialist knowledge and build in antidotes to corruption, while maintaining oversight and disciplinary power over the industry.

The football field is a meeting place for different interests and different people. It's a space for business, but also for entertainment and competition. Leadership of such fields requires integrity, dedication and the will to work for the many not enrich the few.

Assam to set up special group to protect rhinos of Pabitora

(PTI): The authorities will set up special rhino protections groups following reports that poachers from other states are targeting Assam's Pobitora Wildlife Sanctuary that has the highest density of rhinos in the world.

According to the intelligence reports, poachers from neighbouring Nagaland and Manipur in collusion with local miscreants have targeted the sanctuary where no poaching was reported during the past three years, Morigaon Superintendent of Police Swapnil Deka said.

The special rhino protection groups will consist of villagers in vulnerable and sensitive areas near the famed rhino habitat and they will report any suspicious movement of people to the authorities to pre-



vent poaching, he said.

"The success of no poaching during the last three years in the sanctuary was possible only due to the efforts of the villagers and they must continue to cooperate with the forest and police departments in preventing such incidents," Deka said.

By protecting the rhino, they are protecting the wetland ecology which sustains them in the area, he said.

Saudi Arabia and the US have accused Iran of being behind attacks on oil tankers near the Persian Gulf over the past several weeks, while the UAE has been urging diplomacy to avert a wider conflict. On the eve of Pompeo's

visit to the kingdom, Yemen's Iranian-allied rebels attacked a Saudi airport near the Saudi-Yemen border, killing a Syrian resident and wounding 21 other civilians, the Saudi military said.

The Houthi rebels claimed they used bomb-laden drones in the attack on the Abha airport, the second in Drones were also used to attack a Saudi oil pipeline last month. Saudi Arabia has

Copa America starts anew in quarters, says Argentina's Messi

PORTO ALEGRE, JUN 24 (AFP): Argentina will start from afresh in the Copa America after averting disaster with Sunday's 2-0 victory over Qatar that sent them into the knock-out stages, star Lionel Messi said.

Goals from the Barcelona icon's forward partners Lautaro Martinez and Sergio Aguero were enough to propel Argentina from bottom of Group B to second and into a quarter-final meeting with Venezuela on Friday at Rio's Maracana stadium.

"The important thing was to win to keep going in the Copa, to get through the group stage," said Messi, who will turn 32 on Monday.

"This will be an important boost for what's to come ... another Copa begins now.

"This victory must give us strength and make us grow as a team."

Argentina's performance was far from pitch-perfect, but they were good enough to beat a limited Qatar side, who gifted them the opening goal after four minutes when Bassam Hicham played a suicidal ball across his own box straight to Martinez.

Messi admitted, though, that there were nerves in the Argentina camp.



"It's tough playing this kind of game due to the necessity, the obligation (to win), the fear of missing out.

"But beyond that we played well and went through, which is what matters." Aguero, who was recalled after he was dropped for the 1-1 draw with Paraguay, had a mixed game alongside Messi and Martinez.

Earlier, China gave USD 4.6 billion in shape of deposits and commercial loans and Saudi Arabia provided USD 3 billion cash deposit and USD 3.2 billion oil facility on deferred payments. The United Arab Emirates also provided USD 2 billion cash deposit.

Oatar's financial assistance was announced by its foreign minister Sheikh Mohammed bin Abdulrahman Al Thani.

Australian Islamic State orphans rescued from Syria camp

SYDNEY, JUN 24 (AFP): Eight orphans of Australian Islamic State fighters have been spirited out of a camp in Syria, Prime Minister Scott Morrison said Monday, in an apparent U-turn.

The children and grandchildren of two notorious jihadis are now in the care of Australian officials, he said in a statement.

The children are believed to be aged between two and 17 and were living in a camp in northern Syria -- making consular access all but impos-

Morrison previously indicated his government would only help citizens if they approached an embassy or consulate but appeared to have had a change of heart.

"The fact that parents put their children into harm's way by taking them into a war zone was a despicable risk. act," Morrison said in a statement.

"However, children should not be punished for the crimes of their parents." The group includes three surviving children and two grandchildren of Sydney-born Khaled al security and the Sharrouf -- who came to prominence after posting a photo of one of his sons holding the head of a Syrian soldier.

There are also three children of Yasin Rizvic who travelled from Australia to Syria with his wife.

Both Islamic State fighters are presumed dead.

Morrison did not name the children or elaborate on how they were removed, but confirmed they were

Los Angeles, Jun 24 (PTI): Cole Sprouse says he had a crush on Jennifer Aniston while he was working on "Friends" as a child actor.


The "Riverdale" star featured as Ben, the son of Ross Geller (played by David Schwimmer), when he was around nine years old.
