However, those employees who have been provided Government accommodation are not eligible for house rent,

the notification reads.

The government has also decided to provide Sikkim Border Com-pensatory Allowance at 8% of the revised pay to government employees posted in Sikkim.

Employees will be rovided with High Altitude Allowance of Rs 2400 per month for Lachen, Lachung and other areas above 8000 ft and upto 12000 ft, and Rs 3000 per month for areas above 12000 ft altitude.

Similarly, Risk Allow-nce of Rs 500 to Rs 800 per month will be provided to Safai karmachari, Group D employees working in infectious ward of the hospital other than ward attendants, Male & Female attendants, X-Ray & Pathology Technicians, Nurses working in infectious wards, Dark Room attendants, Line-men of Energy & Power Department and Fire Service personnel up to the rank of Sub-Inspector.

Conveyance allowance of Rs 12000 per month will be provided to the officers of Joint Secretary and equivalent and above in lieu of official conveyance facility. For this, separate guidelines will be issued by the Finance, Revenue & Expenditure Department.

Officers who are not eligible for official con-veyance facility will be provided transport allowance of Rs 1000 per month [Level 15-18 oflow officers].

Similarly, Rs 20,000 will be provided to Police personnel as uniform allowance in initial period and their after Rs 6000 as renewal grant after every three years. Ration allowance of Rs 1000 will be provided to police personnel posted with-in the State and those whose are posted in New Delhi [IRBns] will get ra-tion allowance at the rate of Rs 2000 per month,

the notification states.

The notification further adds that the Non-Practicing Allow-ance will be provided to

those doctors working in the State Government with 12% of revised pay scale per month subject to the condition that they perform clinical duties and opt not to carry out private practice. On the same lines, the Veterinary Doctors will be pro-vided Rs 2500 per month with same condition ap-

plied to other doctors.

One such individual is Arjun Rai, the ever smiling Senior Manager of United Sikkim FC. Arjun has been in football for more than three decades now, first as a player and then as an official. Arjun was born on 25 April 1963 at Naya Bazar, Jorethang in South Sikkim to Late DB Rai and Late Mrs Nar Maya Rai. Now he lives in Gangtok with his wife Lalita Rai. Arjun has one daughter, Kritika Rai and a son Rohen Rai

Arjun loved football since a very young age and those fun games with his friends soon turned serious when he started to play for his school team, Tashi Namgyal Higher Secondary School (TNHSS) in Gangtok. This all boys school has always been known for football and during Arjun's time they had a very strong team. Arjun used to play as a striker and with THNSS he played in a number of tournaments, the most promi-nent being the Subroto Cup in 1982. TNHSS had qualified for the Sikkim State Champions.

He also represented the Sikkim team in Sub Junior Nationals. Arjun also remembers with pride the one time he represented his state in the Senior Nationals Tournament "Santosh Trophy". At the time, Boys Club and Zongri Club were the two best teams in Sikkim and Arjun has the distinction of playing for both the clubs.

By his own admission Arn did not play for very long. Family matters and other things took most of his time out he could never be cut off from the game completely. People like Arjun keep the fire of football burning in the Hills. Selfless individuals, who can go to any length to sup-port young footballers and the game as well. They open clubs, shell out money from their own pockets just so the game remains alive. They don't get anything in return but their passion keeps pushing them.

Slowly Arjun moved to-wards Management, he is also a very good coach and I remember here the first time I saw Arjun Rai at Paljor Stadium. He was my good friend Pranai Rai's uncle and calls him Bhai Dada. Along came a man wearing shorts and a sweatshirt from the corner and told us to keep training hard and offered us a few tips as well. What caught my attention even as a young boy was Arjun's positive energy and that infectious smile on his face. Arjun has four brothers and all of them were interested in football and every Sunday the whole gang used to be at Paljor Stadium for practice. I still remember his elder brother crossing the ball and making us head it. Being close to Pranai even I started calling him "Bhai Dada" but later again changed it to "Ar-jun Daju".

Arjun became a full time Manager in 2004 and took the Sikkim team to Santosh turn to pg02

Talking about Bhaichung Bhutia, Arjun recalls that in the late 80s he heard that a very good young player has joined Tashi Namgyal

friend went to see his game and they were really impressed by what they saw, this boy was special and as Boys Club was in need of some players they quickly took this boy into their fold. That little boy was none other than Bhaichung Bhutia who went on to become the Legend of Indian Football. Arjun never claims he spotted Bhaichung and quickly adds that it was his talent which took him to the pinnacle of Indian Football. After joining Boys Club in a few years' time Bhaichung was signed by East Bengal after Bhaskar Ganguly spotted him playing at the Governor's Gold Cup for the Sikkim team. It gave a lot of joy to Arjun as well. The little boy he had seen a few years back was now joining one of the top clubs of

Bhaichung never forgot his Arjun Daju and their bond became stronger year after year and in 2002 the two of them along with Bhaichung's good friend Sherap Lepcha decided to form a club and they named it United Sikkim Sporting Club. Within a year they were promoted to the top division in Sikkim League. By 2010 they started dreaming of taking this team to the I-League and in 2011 United Sikkim Sporting Club was renamed United Sikkim Football Club after registering it as a private limited company which is a requirement to play in the 2nd Division I-League. A few years down the line United Sikkim became the first team to qualify for the I-League from the football crazy state of Sikkim. Arjun counts this as his most memorable moment as he had always wanted top teams of the country to come and play in Gangtok. The dream came true and within a year some of the biggest names and clubs in Indian Football started to come and play matches against United Sikkim at Palior Stadium It must have been surreal for Arjun. Unfortunately United Sikkim

did not survive in the I-League for long but now again work has be-gun for the I-League with Arjun sending the required letters and documents to All India Football Federation for entry into the 2nd Division I-League.

Arjun is a very jolly person but it was not always a very hap-

py ride for him in football. Once he had even decided to leave the game and concentrate on his work. He is with the Sports Department, but with his family's support he continued and what a loss it would ball. He is very popular with all the players and during my time at United Sikkim I have special bond he had with the boys Always joking and laughing with them. He would call me to his room for a chat and taking out his phone say, "Should I give a missed call to John Abraham" and we used to have a good laugh. Just recently he had met John in Mumbai along with Bhaichung so he had his num ber. Another thing I remember is Arjun struggling to explain things to a Japanese player who had no knowledge of English. Once he said, "This guy will make me forget whatever English I know."

Arjun's love affair with football continues till today and just re-cently United Sikkim FC won the Sikkim League under his guidance

He is now also with the Sikkim Football Association as their Joint Secretary (III) and plans to put in more effort to promote football all over the state. It's somewhat sad that a person like Arjun, who has dedicated his life to football, has not got the recognition he deserves. It's not every day that you come across a person like Arjun who has served the game as a player, manager, coach and official. This shows his love and dedication for the game. We honor and award people from different walks of life for their good work. It's about time we start noticing people like Arjun as well. He is an unsung hero of Sikkim Football and it will be disappointing if he remains the same. At least for once we need to hear this Hero's song.

Let's Talk Gender Equality

Real women's empowerment still awaited in Sikkim

 \mathbf{S} ocial indicators across the board suggest that Sik-kimese women enjoy a better status than women in most other parts of the country. But that should hardly be a comparison to gloat over. While the shame of female foeticide remains unheard of, and dowry related harassments have not reached worrisome lev els, there still remain other issues which hamstring equality for women even in Sikkim. Given that Sikkim has had a largely peaceful and consistently stable past two decades, one would have expected it to have made stronger strides towards gender equality and empowerment. There will be those who will not agree, but let's face it, gender equality evades Sikkim. The State Government has initiated several policy decisions to bring women's issues to centre-stage and has even attempted some forward-thinking legislations within the space available to it, but the societal engagement required to see such plans through and institutionalise gender equality have unfortunately not come

Empowerments that governance can deliver on its own have made rapid strides in Sikkim. For instance, female literacy rate has nearly quadrupled in the past three decades from 22% in 1981 to 76% as of 2011, and now Sikkim is fully literate. This leap has been even more substantial in rural Sikkim where female literacy has gone up from 18% in 1981 to 73% in 2011! While literacy among women is still 11% below males (87%), the gender gap in this indicator has halved from the 22% recorded in 1981. What also bodes well for the future is that literacy levels are handsomely higher among women aged between 15 to 24 years, around 95% of whom are literate (as per State Govt records as of 2007-08). Impressively for Sikkim, the gender parity index in enrolment for higher education and professional courses on government nomination has been tilting in favour of women of late. As per data released by the Human Resource Development Department of the Government of Sikkim, 54% of the students nominated for higher studies by the State Government were women in 2005. In 2010, this share had slipped but

was still higher than males at 52%.

What this improvement could help achieve for Sikkim is a stronger representation of women in the organised workforce. As things stand though, even though there is 30% job reservation for women in State Government employment, women represent only 21% of the total officers in the Groups A and B category. Even here, they are seen more in the traditionally established vocations for women in the State Agricultural Engineering Service, Health Services and Education. In recent years though, women have managed to outgrow the quota by occupying 34% of the posts in the State Civil Services. It helps their ambition to know that the first Sikkimese to clear the UPSC exams to become an IAS officer was a woman - Rinchen Ongmu, IAS batch of 1979, who retired some years ago as the Chief Secretary to the Government of Sikkim and has since been appointed the Chief Administrator of the State. And ves. she was the first lady to become CS in Sikkim, and thus far, also the only one.

This is not a condescending paean to woman power in Sikkim, but an effort to highlight that the fact that they are reaching higher despite a societal indifference to their rights. They manage all this despite a legacy of rules, old laws and practices which are regressively sexist. The linking of a woman's status and identity as a Sikkimese to her father and husband, and refusing her the right to pass on her independent identity to her children is unfair and discriminatory. Similarly, women in Sikkim are particularly discriminated against in that they do not enjoy any legal rights to family property, neither of their parents' nor of their husband's. They can acquire a share of family property only by way of a gift or through a will, but cannot otherwise make any claims to it as a matter of right under law. Yes, a small step towards ensuring some measure of equal property rights at least for unmarried daughters and surviving wives was attempted by the State Government in the year 2008 with the introduction of the Sikkim Succession Bill. Someone should ask what's happening with that and also read up on how offensive the Married Women's Property Regulation of 1962 is.

No one expects the past to be anything but regres-

sive, but to perpetuate the same attitudes without concerted efforts to amend things, despite a governmental hint at more forward-thinking changes, is disheartening. These issues are still to receive any traction in the public domain. Perhaps the young will ask

How parents could revolutionize education and boost results

epeated efforts to improve public school education — curricular enhancements, increased accountability, intensified literacy and numeracy initiatives — are failing to improve student achievement

In the province of Saskatchewan, student achievement results have flatlined and only 43.2 per cent of Indigenous students are graduating on

Saskatchewan's results are not atypical. In her analysis of Programme for International Student Assessment (PISA) results, Man-Wai Chu, assistant professor of education at the University of Calgary, said Canadian students have shown no improve

ments in science, mathematics or reading over the past decade."

So what can we do differently? We can engage parents
— in ways that enable students to do better, like school more and stay in school lon-

ger.
Five decades of research evidence attest to the benefit of parent engagement. The educational and moral imperative is clear: to shift the existing student achievement trajectory, educators must intentionally and systemati-cally use parents' untapped knowledge to enhance student learning.

As educator and fami-

ly-engagement expert, Dr. Steven Constantino said in his book Engage every Familv. "If we as educators could

successfully teach all children by ourselves, then it seems to me we would have already done so.

WALKING ALONGSIDE CHILDREN

During more than 20 years of research into parent engagement, I have come to understand it as a phi-

losophy and a pedagogy of "walking alongside."

This is both a belief system about parents and their meaningful and authentic voice in their children's schooling and education and a way of enact-

ing those beliefs in practice.

When parents are seen to be holders of knowledge, as capable and as possessing gifts and strengths, then this can be leveraged alongside teacher knowledge to enrich programming.

Engaging parents entails assuming a new worl-dview in schools — in which parents are seen to be central to the work of the school, not separate or apart from it.

ELEMENTARY MATH BINS

A former graduate student of mine, Kirsten Koby lak, is now a Grade 1 teacher at Willowgrove School in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan. As part of my research on the impact of graduate teacher education, she shared with me how she wanted to engage parents in their math theme, "Math is Everywhere."

In an email home to parents, she explained how important language and culture are to chil-dren's learning. She posed the question, "Where does math live in your culture?" and asked parents to share such things as game ideas, artifacts with patterns, number lines in different languages and

bins — patterning, fact families, number lines, problem-solving.

Parents came in and taught games and shared

materials, comparing versions of items from one country to another, simultaneously sharing culture, language, history and family stories.

Through this parent engagement, children learned and strengthened math skills such as skip tact with every parent every day. Parents were able to engage in meaningful conversations with their children about curricular concepts in the normal course of their day — and to add their voice and knowledge to their son or daughter's teaching and learning.

Parents were always invited to respond to Jesse's email as well, sharing with him their conver-sations with their child and thus bringing home learning back into the classroom, Parents asked questions and offered to participate in the unfolding curriculum in other ways (sharing knowledge, stories, artifacts or suggesting potential resources

and experiences).

What we see in these examples is that parent engagement can happen on the school landscape or off of it, and with all ages of students. Critical to parent engage-

ment is that it draws on parent knowledge, is connected to teaching and learning, honours a parent's hopes and dreams for their child, enables a parent to remain in the role of parent, is authentic and meaningful, promotes shared decision-making, is strength-based and ensures everyone benefits from the engagement — children, parents, and teacher.

The possibilities of parent engagement in education are endless when these critical attributes are embraced by teachers and lived out in ways that are contextual and culturally responsive — honouring students, parents, families and communities.

A GENTLE REVOLUTION

To shift from the current worldview in education, one which reflects schools as a domain exclusive to educators and students, to a new worldview where schools are using parent knowledge in teaching and learning will take a gentle revolution.

Notice the word "love" embedded in revolution? By working together, with mutual respect, care and concern for one another, educators at all levels of the system and parents can work together

to revolutionize schooling.

We need to establish "parent engagement offices" in ministries of education, develop core teacher education courses on parent engagement, require parent engagement coursework for teacher certification, establish school district positions for parent engagement consultants, structure parent universities and establish parent mentor programs.

The results of such a gentle revolution — creating an integral place and voice for parents in their children's teaching and learning — will positively impact the trajectory of student achievement and other educational outcomes.

Jury finds Monsanto liable in the first Roundup cancer trial - here's what could happen next

In the first of many pending lawsuits to go to trial, a jury in San Francisco concluded on Aug. 10 that the plaintiff had developed cancer from exposure to Roundup, Monsanto's widely used herbicide, and ordered the company to

herbicide, and ordered the company to pay US\$289 million in damages. The plaintiff, Dewayne John-son, had used Roundup in his job as groundskeeper in a California school district. He later developed non-Hod-gkin lymphoma. The jury awarded Johnson \$39 million in compensatory damages to cover pain, suffering and medical bills due to negligence by Monsanto, plus an additional \$250

million in punitive damages.

This means the jury wanted to punish Monsanto because members believed the company deliberately withheld from the public scientific knowledge that glyphosate, the active ingredient in Roundup, was a can-cer danger. The size of the damages awarded indicates that the jury was not persuaded by Monsanto's expert witnesses.

Product liability lawsuits are an important part of American culture. There are many examples of companies knowingly adding toxic agents to their products. So there must be a process for aggrieved individuals who have been harmed to hold these comes accountable.

On the other hand, a lawsuit can be brought against any company for any reason, and some may be frivolous. It is

an unfortunate comment on our health care system that so many people are uninsured, and if struck by a dreaded disease, must seek money to deal with it somehow from somewhere.

In many instances it is simply un-known whether a product and its contents are a danger. This verdict is just the first in what could be a long legal battle over Roundup, and proving cau-sality in such cases is not easy. But here are some observations from my own experience trying to help figure out why people get cancer.

HOW CREDIBLE IS THE SCIENTIFIC

CASE AGAINST ROUNDUP?

Much of the plaintiff's case was based on a widely criticized 2015 statement by the International Agency for Re-search on Cancer, part of the World Health Organization, that glyphosate was a "probable human carcinogen" (Group 2A on its scale). A classification of "human carcinogen" (Group 1) means that a panel of scientists convened by the IARC believes the agent is a cancer hazard to humans, like smoking and ionizing radiation. The 2A classification is not as strong. It means that there is credible evidence, but it does not reach the standard of "beyond a reasonable doubt."

The IARC's process for determin-

ing carcinogenicity has come under heavy criticism before. In particular, in the early 2000s some observers worried that industry was actually influencing the agency to downgrade its classification of chemical agents. In the Roundup cases, the accusation against the IARC cuts the other way. According

to some accounts, it was biased against industry and sought a harsh classifica-tion for glyphosate.

The IARC has provided a detailed

defense of its process in the glyphosate evaluation. It has also published a monograph on glyphosate with all the gory details of the science behind its evaluation.

I served on a monograph working group in 2007 for an IARC assessment of whether shift work was a potential cancer hazard. I have also participated in three other meetings sponsored by IARC over the years, so I have seen the agency's process up close. In my view, IARC personnel go to great lengths to ensure objectivity and scientific rigor.

This does not mean that their classifications are the last word. In fact, the agency has often changed its clas-sification of an agent based on new evidence after initial evaluation. Sometimes it has become more certain that the agent poses a hazard, but in other

ses it has downgraded the hazard. WHAT PATH FOR GLYPHOSATE?

Glyphosate and Monsanto could follow the path of the Johns-Manville company, which started manufacturing asbestos products in the 1880s. After many epidemiological studies showed that exposure to asbestos caused very high rates of lung cancer – primarily pleural mesothelioma – and much lit-igation, the company went bankrupt in 1982. Its assets were reorganized to form the Manville Trust, which allocates monetary damages to people harmed by asbestos.

Some products still contain small

quantities of asbestos today, including motor vehicle parts and fireproof clothing. The Environmental Protection Agency tried to ban it in 1989, but was overturned by a federal court. Nonetheless, because asbestos is so clearly linked to cancer, most compa-

nies avoid it now for fear of liability. Alternatively, glyphosate may fol-low the route of saccharin, an artifi-cial sweetener discovered in the late 1870s. In 1970 scientists reported that saccharin caused bladder cancer in rats, which led the U.S. Food and Drug Administration to propose a ban on this extremely popular product in

However, after much more research - including toxicology in rats search – including toxicology in rats and epidemiologic studies in people – the IARC downgraded saccharin from a classification of "2B: possible human carcinogen" to "3: not classifiable," and the U.S. National Toxicology Program removed saccharin from a 2016 report on carcinogens. As it turned out, the mechanism for causing bladder cancer in rats did not apply to people, and epidemiological studies showed no association.

Monsanto will undoubtedly ap peal this initial decision, and it could be years before the issue is settled once and for all. But with this verdict, the onus is now on Monsanto to pro-vide compelling evidence that Round-up is safe in other trials that soon will

4 Bru refugee families return to Mizoram from Tripura

AIZAWL, AUG 27 (PTI): Altogether four Bru ref-ugee families have returned from the relief camps in Tripura after the final repatriation process started on Saturday, a senior state home department official here said. he said.

A total of 32,876 Brus belonging to 5,407 families living in six relief camps in North Tripura district were identified by Mizoram government during November 2016 as bona fide residents of the state and could be repatriated.

The official said two

Bru families, to be resettled at Rasdali and Meidum villages in villages Mizoram-Assam border district of Kolasib, re-turned today, the second day of the repatriation.

Yesterday being Sunday, it was not an official day for repatriation but one family returned. Another family had come back to Mizoram on Friday, a day before the re-patriation commenced,

The official said the state government would continue to undertake the repatriation process scheduled to be conduct-ed from August 25 till September 25 in accordance with the road map for repatriation prepared by the state government and approved by the Ministry of Home Affairs.

During an exercise identify who wanted to return to Mizoram recently, 2,753 people belonging to 423 families, majority of them from Kasakau relief camp, expressed willingness to be repatriated.

However even these expressed ingness to return to Mizoram earlier were most likely to stay back, Mizoram Bru Displaced People's Forum (MBDPF) president A Sawibunga told PTI from Naisingpa-

ra relief camp.

The MBDPF had signed an agreement with the Centre and gov-ernments of Mizoram and Tripura on July 3 in New Delhi for repatria-tion of the Bru displaced people. The repatriation process is scheduled to be completed before September 25.

The agreement stip-ulated that Rs 4 lakh for each repatriated Bru family would be deposited in the bank account of the head of the family which would mature after three years and payment of Rs 1.5 lakh as housing assistance

Each repatriated Bru family would also be given Rs 5,000 through Direct Benefit Transfer every month and free ration for two years.

A section of the refu-

gees, however, were not happy with the package and demand more.

The Brus are in Tripura since late 1997 in the wake of a communal tension triggered by the murder of a forest guard inside the Dampa Tiger Reserve on October 21, 1997 by Bru National Liberation Front militants. The first attempt to

repatriate them in 2009 failed and triggered another wave of exodus af-ter the killing of a youth three days before the commencement of the repatriation process.

Though some Bru families had returned to Mizoram during a number of repatriation processes and on their own, many of them refused to leave Tripura.

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'Crying, stressed' pilot caused deadly Nepal plane crash: probe

KATHMANDU/DHAKA, Aug 27 (PTI): The pilot of the US-Bangla plane that crashed in Nepal in March had cried and suffered an emotional breakdown during the flight, killing 51 people, according to a report by Nepal's investigators.

The Dhaka to Kathmandu US-Bangla Airlines flight, with 67 passengers and four crew members on board, caught fire after it careened off the runway and ploughed into a football ground near the Kathmandu's Tribhuvan International Airport on March 12.

Captain Abid Sultan was going through tremendous personal men-tal stress and anxiety, and a series of erroneous decisions on his part led to the crash of the flight, according to the details of the official investigation led by the Nepal gov ernment, the Kathmandu

Post reported.

Throughout the flight, Sultan was engaged in erratic behaviour that marked a departure from his usual character-signs that should have imme-diately raised red flags, Nepali investigators con-

cluded in the report.

Investigators say Sultan had been smoking cigarettes frequently during the hour-long flight from Dhaka to Kathmandu.
"When we analysed

the conversation on the Cockpit Voice Recorder, it was clear to us that the captain was harbouring severe mental stress. He also seemed to be fatigued and tired due to lack of sleep," investiga-tors wrote in the report.

"He was crying on several occasions," the report added.

The report also shows that Sultan made multiple abusive statements toward a female colleague (another co-pilot in the company) who had questioned his reputation as an instructor, and their relationship was a major topic of discussion throughout the flight, it said.

The voice recorder has captured nearly an hour-long conversation between the captain and his co-pilot in the cock-pit, further demonstrating Sultan's tensed mood throughout the flight and a complete lack of situational awareness.

"I don't f---ing care about safe flight, you f--your duty," Sultan said at one point inside the cockpit, according to the report. It was not clear

whom the pilot was directing the statement at, as the co-pilot was the only crew member present inside the cockpit during the flight.

Nepal's only national airport lies in a narrow bowl-shaped val-ley with the Himalayas to the north, making it a challenging place to land.

As the flight UBG 211, a Bombardier Dash 8 Q400, approached the runway it made a last-minute change direction, failed to ciently reduce its speed and did not carry out the necessary landing checks, investigators said.

Nepal has witnessed a number of accidents involving aircraft in recent years. The accident was the

deadliest since September 1992 when all 167 people aboard a Pakistan International Airlines (PIA) plane were killed when it crashed near the Kathmandu airport. In February, 2016,

Tara Air's Twin Otter 400 crashed in Rupse of

Myagdi, killing 23 people. Nepal Airline's DHC-6 Twin Otter 300 (9N-ABB) crashed near Sandhikharka of Arghakhan-chi, killing 18 people in February, 2014.



Sindhu to fight for gold, Saina fetches bronze in Asiads

Olympic silver medallist PV Sindhu remained in the hunt for a historic Asian Games gold medal after a tense win but Saina Nehwal settled for a bronze following her 10th straight defeat against world number one Tai Tzu Ying, here today.

World number three Sindhu beat Akane Yamaguchi 21-17 15-21 21-10 for her second win over the Japanese at the Asian Games, having beaten her in the team championship as well.

The energy-sapping 65-minute match featured a 50-shot rally in the decider, which Sindhu won.

World number 10 and Olympic medallist Saina played with good intensi-ty but lost 17-21 14-21 to a superior Tzu Ying, who stood out with her court coverage and retrieving in the 32-minute contest.

Coming into this match, Saina had lost last nine matches against Tzu Ying, including three in the 2018 season.

India can seek extradition of Choksi without Red Corner Notice: CBI

NEW DELHI, Aug 27 (PTI): India can seek extradition of fugitive billionaire Mehul Choksi without an Interpol Red Corner Notice as it is not a mandatory requirement for the process, the CBI has told the Minis try of External Affairs.

In a communication to the ministry earlier this month, the agency said the purpose of a Red Corner Notice (RCN) is to locate an absconding ac-cused which has already been achieved in Choksi's case after confirmation

from Antigua that he is their citizen, officials said. They also said that having an RCN is of little value now as Antigua has granted him citizenship and Choksi is now an An-

tiguan passport holder.

The agency has communicated to the ministry that it has already written to its counterpart agency in Antigua for the provi-sional arrest of Choksi, who is the alleged mas-termind of the over 2 bil-lion USD bank fraud in the Punjab National Bank.

"The contention of Antiguan authorities that the only way the move-ment of Choksi could be restricted is through issue a Red Corner Notice is not legally sound as primary objective of locating the subject has already been addressed," the letter said.

The subsequent steps for a provisional arrest and an extradition will have to be taken by Antigua for which an RCN is not a "prerequisite", the officials said.

Choksi has appealed to the Interpol to not issue an RCN against him as the charges are politically motivated, they said.

He also said the conditions of jails in India are not good and staying their would violate his human rights, the officials said.

Choksi, the uncle of his alleged partner in crime Nirav Modi, also said the charges against him have been hyped by the media and he might not get a fair trial in India as courts may be influenced by news reports, they said.

GENEVA, AUG 27 (AP): Investigators working for the UN's top human rights body said today that top Myanmar military leaders should be prosecuted for genocide against Rohingya Muslims.

The call, accompanying a first report by the investigators, amounts to some of the strongest language yet from UN officials who have denounced alleged human rights violations in Myanmar since a bloody crackdown began last August.

The three-member "fact-finding mission" working under a mandate from the UN-backed Human Rights Council meticulously assembled hundreds of accounts by expatriate Rohingya, sat-

ellite footage and other information to assemble the report.

The UN-backed Human Rights Council created the mission six months before a rebel attack on security posts set off the crackdown that drove hundreds of thousands of Rohingya fleeing to neighbouring Bangladesh.

Through hundreds of interviews with expatriate Rohingya and use of satellite footage, the team compiled accounts of crimes including gang rape, the torching of hundreds of villages, enslavement, and killings of children some before their eyes of their own parents.

The team was not granted access to Myan-

mar and has decried a lack of cooperation or even response from the government, which received an early copy of the report.

The team cited a "conservative" estimate that some 10,000 people were killed in the violence, but outside investigators have had no access to the affected regions making a precise accounting elusive, if not impossible.

Above all, the investigators said the situation in Myanmar should be referred to the International Criminal Court, and if not, to a special tribunal. Last week, Myanmar's government rejected any cooperation with the ICC, to which it is not a party. China, a perma-

nent member of the UN Security Council with veto power over whether the issue will be brought before the ICC, has been reticent about condemning Myanmar's government during the crisis.

UN officials and human rights watchers have for months pointed to evidence of genocide in Myanmar, and the United States late last year said that "ethnic cleansing" was occurring in Myanmar. But few experts have studied the issue as indepth and in such an official way as the fact-finding team, with a mandate from a body that has Myanmar's approval: The country is among the 47 members of the Human Rights Council.

The United Nations does not apply the word "genocide" lightly. The fact-finding team's assessment suggests the crimes against the Rohingya could meet the strict legal definition which was last met over crimes in Bosnia and Rwanda nearly a quarter-century ago.

Human rights watchers say determining "genocidal intent" is perhaps the most difficult criteria to meet: In essence, it's the task of assessing the mindsets of perpetrators to determine if ethnicity, race, religion or another attribute had motivated them.

"The crimes in Rakhine state, and the manner in which they were perpetrated, are similar in nature, gravity and scope to those that have allowed genocidal intent to be established in other contexts," the report said, alluding to a region of Myanmar that is home for many Rohingya.

for many Rohingya.

Adding into their assessment: The extreme brutality of the crimes; "hate rhetoric" and specific speech by perpetrators and military commanders; policies of exclusion against Rohingya people; an "oppressive context," and the "level of organization indicating a plan for destruction."

The investigators cited six Myanmar military leaders by name as "priority subjects" for possible prosecution, led by Min Aung Hlaing. A longer list of names is to be kept in the office of the UN human rights chief for possible use in future judicial proceedings. The United States and European Union have already slapped sanctions on some Myanmar military leaders, though Min Aung Hlaing is not among them.

The authors called for the creation of a special body, or "mechanism," to keep watch on the still-evolving human rights situation in Myanmar. They said the United Nations' own role in the country since 2011 should be reviewed to see if the world body did all it could to prevent such a crisis

China hails first-time participation of India, Pakistan in SCO counter-terror drill

BEIJING, AUG 27 (PTI): China today welcomed the participation of militaries of India and Pakistan for the first time in a mega anti-terror drill of the SCO and hoped that the two countries could enhance dialogue and cooperation both bilaterally and within multilateral mechanisms to maintain regional peace and stability.

Iran lawsuit against US sanctions opens at UN court THE HAGUE, AUG 27 ing of sanctions pending a value since April.

THE HAGUE, AUG 27 (AFP): Iran opened a lawsuit today demanding the UN's top court order the suspension of renewed US sanctions which it says are devastating its economy. The Islamic Republic

The Islamic Republic says US President Donald Trump's decision to reimpose sanctions over its nuclear programme aim to bring it "to its knees" and are in breach of a 1955 treaty.

Sanctions had been lift-

ed under a 2015 multilateral agreement in return for Iran committing not to pursue nuclear weapons. Burtrump reimposed unilateral sanctions three weeks ago. He said they were needed to ensure Iran never huilds a nuclear bomb

A second wave of punitive measures are due to hit Iran in early November, targeting its vital energy sector including oil exports.

Judges at the International Court of Justice in the Hague opened hearings with the Islamic Republic's lawyers due to make their opening arguments.

opening arguments.

The US measures have added to Iran's economic woes, helping to fuel strikes and protests from across the country and political spectrum.

In the latest blow, Iran's parliament impeached Economy Minister Masoud Karbasian yesterday.

Tehran filed its case before the ICJ in late July, calling on the Haguebased tribunal's judges to order the immediate liftdefinitive ruling.

It said the sanctions would cause it "irreparable prejudice". It argues they breach the 1955 Treaty of Amity and Economic Relations between Iran and the United States.

"The current US Administration is pushing the sanctions to their maximum with the sole aim of bringing Iran to its knees," Iran's lawyers said in the court filing.

"The USA is besieging Iran economically, with all the dramatic consequences that a siege implies for the besieged population." - 'One-sided deal' -The ICJ is expected to

take a couple of months to decide whether to grant Tehran's request for a provisional ruling. A final decision in the case may take years.

The 2015 deal was

signed by Iran and the five permanent members of the United Nations Security Council plus Germany.

Trump, who took office in 2016, called it a "horrible one-sided deal." He said it "failed to achieve the fundamental objective of blocking all paths to a Iranian nuclear bomb." To the horror of the other signatories, Trump pulled out and announced he would reinstate sanctions.

Tehran says that the new sanctions are already hurting its economy. Iran's currency the rial has lost around half its Value since April.

In a court filing at the

In a court ning at the ICJ, Iran's lawyers said the US sanctions threaten tens of billions of dollars' worth of business deals with foreign companies.

International companies including France's Total, Peugeot and Renault, and Germany's Siemens and Daimler, have suspended operations in Iran since Trump announced the US withdrawal from the nuclear deal in May.

Air France and British Airways announced Thursday they would halt flights to Tehran next month, saying they were not commercially viable. The British carrier added however that the decision was unrelated to the fresh sanctions.

Trump said the sanctions would turn up the financial pressure on Tehran to come to a "comprehensive and lasting solution" regarding its activities such as its "ballistic missile programme and

its support for terrorism."
Iran's supreme leader
Ayatollah Ali Khamenei this
month appeared to rule out
any immediate prospect of
talks, saying "there will be
neither war, nor negotiations," with the US.

Washington's lawyers

Washington's lawyers will present their case on Tuesday. Experts expect them to challenge the ICJ's jurisdiction.

The ICJ was set up in 1946 to rule in disputes between countries.

India, Pak to resume talks on Indus Waters Treaty in Lahore this week

(PTI): India and Pakistan will resume their talks on various aspects of the crucial Indus Waters Treaty in Lahore on Wednesday, the first bilateral engagement since Prime Minister Imran Khan took office.

India's Indus Water Commissioner P K Saxena is expected to reach here today to begin the two-day discussions with his Pakistani counterpart Syed Mehr Ali Shah on Wednes-

day, Dawn quoted a government official as saying.

The last meeting of the Pakistan-India Permanent Indus Commission was held in New Delhi in March during which both the sides had shared details of the water flow and the quantum of water being used under the 1960 Indus Waters Treaty.

The talks will be the first official engagement between India and Pakistan since Khan became Pakistan's 22nd prime

minister on August 18.

In a letter to Khan, Prime Minister Narendra Modi had expressed India's resolve to build good neighbourly relations between the two countries.

India and Pakistan would also finalise the schedule of future meetings of the Permanent Indus Commission and visits of the teams of the Indus commissioners the official said.

The 1960 Indus Waters Treaty, brokered by the World Bank and signed by then prime minister Jawaharlal Nehru and Pakistan's president Ayub Khan, administers how the water of the Indus river and its tributaries that flow in both the countries will be utilised.


