National Commission for SCs seeks clarification on reduction of SC reservation

SUMMIT REPORT GANGTOK, 04 AUG:

With regard to the State Government's recent move of reducing the reservation for Scheduled Castes from 07% to 04% [vide notification no. M (14) 35/GEN/DoPl. the Singtam Scheduled Caste Welfare Association [SS-CWA] had written to the National Commission for Schedule Castes [NCSC], Government of India seeking their intervention to redress the matter.

An SSCWA press re-lease informs that the NCSC, on 31 July, served notice to the State giving 40 days time to the State Government to clarify the reduction of reservation for SCs in Sikkim.

As per an SSCWA

press release, the NCSC, in its notice to the State Government, has asked for the provision of the Con-stitution of India under which have they reduced the reservation and that if the State Government has sought any views from central agencies before taking the decision to reduce the reservation.

The SSCWA has urged Scheduled Caste MLAs to remain vigilant and alert while formulating the State's reply to the Na-

tional Commission.

The association has further requested the State Government to restore the original 07% reservation of SCs to uphold the sanctity of the Constitution of India.

The state government, Health Department and the school authority have to be answerable and responsible regarding the safety of the vaccination, she added.

Cervical cancer accounts for only around 1.75% of cancer cases, she claimed adding that more people are dying of other cancers and the government should do something about that as well.

The State Govern-ment had decided not to implement this vaccination programme during 2014-15 after facing lot of protest and criticism, and MLA Dr Mechung was ther with SKM, had also protested against this vaccination but now he is supporting the same vaccination programme, said Ms Bhandari.

She also demanded that the State Government issue a white paper on its works and initiatives for women's empowerment. SDF has not worked in the interest of Sikkimese women, she added.

LONDON, Aug 4 (PTI): The Indian High Commission in London has handed over the extradition request documents for fugitive diamantaire Nirav Modi, wanted in India as a prime accused in the USD 2 billion loan fraud scam at Punjab National Bank, to the UK Central Authority, according to official sources here

The unit within the UK government's Home Office will now process the request, which falls under mutual legal assistance requests, to assist in criminal investigations or proceedings, before an extradition warrant can

be issued against Modi.

The whereabouts of the billionaire jeweller remain unknown, but the Indian government had been informed by the UK's Crown Prosecution Service (CPS) in June that it can initiate extradition proceedings despite

Due to slow progress of work on National Highway 10, the contracts of Divya Shakti and Jag-bandhu Ghosh Agency, agencies which were carrying out work on NH 10. have been terminated. Both the agencies had been given the work amountng to Rs 32 crore on Feb 2017. However, even after 16 months only 18% of the work has been completed due to which the highway is in very bad shape.

GUWAHATI, AUG 4 (PTI): The flood situation in Assam deteriorated today with two more deaths reported in Sivasagar district, taking the toll to 43, while nearly 1.1 lakh peo-ple remain affected across six districts in the state.

According to the Asagement Authority (ASD-MA), two persons lost

sam State Disaster Mantheir lives in flood-related incidents at Sonari reve-

With this, the total number of persons losing their lives in the two waves of flood this year in different parts of the state

The ASDMA said over 1.09 lakh people are affected at present in Dhemaji, Lakhimpur, Darrang, Golaghat, Sivasagar and Charaideo districts.

Till yesterday, around 87,000 people were affected in the six districts.

As per the ASDMA re-port today, Golaghat is the worst affected with over 91,000 sufferers, followed by Lakhimpur with al-most 6,000 people affected in the deluge.

A Golaghat district offi-cial said heavy landslide has

formed an artificial lake on upstream of Doyang river and the situation may wors-en if it breaches, which will bring more water to Doyang and Dhansiri rivers.

Currently, 163 villages are under water across the state and 10,991 hectares of crop areas have been damaged, the ASD-MA report said.

Dengue claims 30 lives, over 14k people affected across country

New Delhi, Aug 4 (PTI): With the onset of monsoon, dengue has affected over 14,000 people across the country and claimed the lives of 30 people till July 22 this year, according to data from a government body.

According to National Vector Borne Disease Con-trol Programme (NVB-DCP) under the Union Health Ministry, 14,233 cases have been reported across the country.

In 2017, the disease had affected around 1,88,401 people and claimed 325 lives across the country.

In Delhi, till July this year, 90 cases of dengue have been reported al-though there has been no death, according to the NVBDCP data.
Union Health Minister

IP Nadda had reviewed the reparatory activities with the principal secretaries of 20 high-burden states, including Delhi, on April 27.

Nadda had also writ-ten to Delhi Chief Minister recently, stressing the need for initiating actions to implement preventive and control measures to check spread of dengue.

Avoid the Babel **Syndrome**

Resuscitate languages and the rest will follow

One of the more encouraging signs when it comes to the vibrancy of languages is to see the young make lists in the mother tongues. It is a rarity, because even speakers of the lingua franca nowadays take notes in English and they are already conversing on the smart phones in emojis. The worry then is that the mother tongue, the language they would be expected to be the most fluent in when conveying emotions and ideas, has now become the formal language – something they can write exams in or maybe use to speak with elders, but cannot joke or share ideas in. So, when the mother tongue becomes the language of casual conversations and spontaneous note-taking, it becomes a special moment, underlining a community's success at keeping their culture alive because no culture can survive once its language is lost.

In fact, a major concern exists in communities all over the world over the preservation of native languages and cultures. While earlier, indigenous communities could rely on traditional educational systems to ensure their cultural survival, this support system does not exist anymore. Earlier, the language would get passed down around kitchen fires and along with it would slip through the essence of ethnic cultures and traditions. As Sikkim grows more cosmopolitan, outside influences have edged out this form of education. The formal education system which includes many indigenous/ local languages in its curriculum does not include the subtlety with which cultures were instinctively fostered earlier. At best, the schools can equip the students with the lan-guage, which they should then utilise to learn. Unlike the present trend where the learning curve ends with the schooling years, the learning should in fact begin once the basics of a language have been picked up and then should launch the process of mastering it. This becomes necessary because indigenous languages are finding fewer and fewer people using them anymore and the few who have mastered the tongue need to record whatever it is they can cull from the older generation so that some element of their identity survives the march of time. In fact, this is one aspect of the cultural revivalism afoot all over the Hills that needs to be paid more attention to.

While it is all too easy to play the role of the victimised and collect sympathy, it is in proving real concern and engagement that the Hill communities are failing. This applies not just to the minority Lepchas and Bhutias of the Hills but also the Nepalese. It needs no reiteration that language is the link to identity. It is the language that keeps cultures alive. The nuances of each language highlight the influence of the past which shapes the present of individual communities. That said, let's look at the state of ethnic languages among the speakers themselves. When a language is being taught in school, it has to mean more than just a medium of communication. It has to become the tool of learning and discovery. One does not know whom to blame here, but few in Sikkim have proven that they can deploy their language skills for this purpose.

Blame it on the influence of television or now ac-

cess to affordable broadband which has wiped out the reading habit or the confusion of being exposed to too many languages [Nepali, English, Hindi and the mother tongue, in Sikkim's casel, but fact remains that we are grooming a generation of students who are not proficient in any language. We are talking here in terms of reading, understanding and writing. Anyone can communicate, but a student is expected to do better.

The previous generation has to shoulder most of the blame. They relied too much on tokenism. A language day here, a smattering of language skills there and they thought they had done enough. They were wrong. A language has to become relevant to survive. It can be made relevant if important and interesting books are written in that language, if popular music uses it. Just look around, how many interesting books can a lay person find in Bhutia or Lepcha which is not available in other languages. Even Nepali language essentially survives only as the lingua franca. To prove the point - can anyone recall the last work in fiction in Nepali which was a runaway hit that everyone wanted to read and possess? Fact remains, we are wiping out our cultures because we are not serious enough about our languages.

Why the mainstream media should stop giving extreme views a platform

n recent weeks, a number of quite astounding articles have appeared in the British press. These have included among others, a Times column opining the benefit to Britain in the current climate of having a political leader like Donald Trump, Vladimir Putin or Recep Tayyip Erdoğan; referred to as "strongmen". In the Daily Telegraph, a similarly toned piece contemplated the reinstatement of the death penalty after Brexit.

Somewhat appealing to the lowest common denominator, these and similar articles prompt questions about the extent to which Britain's mainstream media is shifting towards the right of the political spectrum. Even more worrying is the ex-

tent to which it is "normalising" extreme right-wing ideas and ideologies.

A recent Sunday Times article by Andrew Gilligan referred to "hipster fascists" with their penchant for New Balance trainers and skinny jeans. So their views might be out where the huses don't run, but at least they have a decent dress code.

It's not just the print media. Mainstream broadcasters have been giving significant airtime to various prominent far-right identities. These have included former Breitbart London editor Raheem Kassam appearing on BBC Radio 4's Today programme to discuss the release of Tommy Robinson, the former leader of the anti-Islam English Defence League, on bail after winning an appeal

against a contempt of court conviction. Meanwhile Ezra Levant, Robinson's former employer at the Ca-nadian far-right website Rebel Media, appeared on BBC 5 Live's Breakfast Show.

Steve Bannon, the former executive chairman of Breitbart News and Donald Trump's former strategy guru, was invited onto LBC and told Nigel Farage: "I don't think Robinson's a bad guy. I think he's a solid guy and I think he's got to be released from prison." This followed an extensive interview with PBC Neurosiable in May. with BBC Newsnight in May.

It is worth noting that prior to his conviction,

Robinson himself was something of a darling of the mainstream media. He has been a guest on ITV's Good Morning Britain, BBC Radio 4's Today, BBC2's Newsnight and BBC1's The Big Questions,

nong others.
Given the recurrence of Robinson's appearanc-

es in the mainstream media, it can be argued that not only has this played down the highly divisive and dangerous views and ideologies he has espoused but so too has it legitimised his claim to be voice of the people. That has the potential to have quite dangerous and dire consequences.

A 'NEW NORMAL'

A 'NEW NORMAL' Indeed, one of the goals of right-wing extremists has always been to appear "normal". In recent years, the British National Party (BNP) was trans-formed under the leadership of Nick Griffin. By trying to look more like mainstream politicians. Griffin believed that the BNP would become more electable. Despite the outward change, its nationalist agenda remained constant.

While the BNP achieved relative success in lo-cal and European elections, Griffin's appearance

on BBC1's Question Time pretty much destroyed his credibility both inside and outside the BNP. Describing the treatment he received as being akin to a "lynch mob" highlights the stark difference between then and now.

If seen to be complicit in the process of "normalisation" then – through playing down or trivialising the very real and detrimental impact bigotry and hate can have on the lives of individuals, communities and wider society – the mainstream media could be accused of conferring acceptability on some of these view

WORKING-CLASS HEROES?

Focusing upon the style, clothes or brands worn by far-right activists or having debates about the extent to which they might be a "working-class hero" fails to acknowledge the highly politicised agendas and ideologies those being focused on seek to disseminate. It also has the potential to embolden and strengthen their supporters and act as a recruiting tool – making them appear as the "true voice" certain communities, groups or constituencies.

You could argue that the mainstream media did much the same with the unprecedented platform afforded to the now-imprisoned Islamist extremist, Anjem Choudary. Not only did he reinforce nega-tive stereotypes about Muslims and Islam in the wider community - but the mainstream media's endorsement of him as a key Muslim leader caused consternation among the vast majority of British Muslims for whom his views were extreme and not in the least representative of them.

HAIL STRONGMEN

The same can be said by the "strongman" article by Clare Foges, a former speechwriter for David Cameron. Her article massively plays down the more un-

palatable policies of leaders such as Rodrigo Duterte of the Philip-pines and Turkish president Erdoğan. Foges in fact praises them, as well as Trump and Putin, for getting things done.

But it also overlooks the very real fact that under their leader ship, values that are held dear by democracies including the UK - among them democracy, free speech and justice - have at times been restricted, con-strained or completely removed.

Knowing that the murder of Jo Cox and the attack on Fins-Jo Cox and the attack on rins-bury Park Mosque were perpe-trated by individuals aligned to extreme right-wing ideologies should be itself warning enough that affording greater legitimacy to and normalising such views is

Put this in the context of the sharp rise in the number of people being referred to Prevent for holding extreme right-wing views and the fact that levels of hate crime last year reached record highs and the seriousness of the matter is unquestion-

I'm not advocating censorship or limiting free speech – far from it. What I am saying is that the mainstream media has a responsibility for ensuring objectivity and impartiality. The zeal to maintain what is obviously a false balance by giving a platform to such extremists is not part of that remit. Big media organisations must be aware that legitimisation of the far right is not acceptable. They cannot normalise nor be seen to give permission to what are, in truth, hateful ideas and ideologies,

Zimbabwe's historic elections: a case of leopards not changing their spots

Zimbabwe's general elections on July 30 were being labelled as "historic". For the first time since independence in 1980, the ballot paper featured the faces of new presidential candidates, Emmerson Mnangagwa and Nelson Chamisa. And, prior to the poll, there was no large scale violence by security institutions and youth militia, as had happened previously.

Indeed, the elections were peaceful and voters turned out in large num-bers. But that's where the good news ended as violence broke out after the

release of the parliamentary results.
Supporters of the Movement for
Democratic Change (MDC)- Alliance
led by Chamisa marched to the Zimbabwe Electoral Commission's command centre protesting against the slow re-lease of the presidential election results. The parliamentary results were released early in the day, giving Za-nu-PF (68%) of the seats. The MDC-Al-liance was insinuating that the presi-

dential results were being rigged.

The day before any results were released MDC-Alliance leaders had upped the ante by announcing they'd won, and saying that they wouldn't ac-cept any other result. The army and police responded to

protesters with the familiar brutality, leaving three people dead. In the space of two hours Zimbabwe went from having peaceful, free and fair elections, to ones marred by violence and accusations of fraud. The promise of a new dawn seemed to vanish instanta-

What went wrong? Are the parliamentary election results a reflection of voter rigging or of the MDC-Alliance's

Zimbabwe needed these elections

to be credible, no matter who won. A legitimate government – with a strong mandate – can develop and implement a much needed national development plan to fix the country's shattered

Both presidential candidates and political parties promised peace and a new beginning. But, when the chips were down and the votes began to show a familiar trend of Zanu-PF dom inance, both parties resorted to old tactics. MDC-Alliance resorted to disruption and discrediting the elections while Zanu-PF, through the security establishment, used undue force.

Accusations and counter accusations of who was to blame became the order of the day as they both plunged the country back into familiar chaos. These leopards were now revealing that they had not changed their spots, in full view of an international commu-nity they were hoping would come and invest after an election

ZANU-PF

Last November the governing Zanu-PF ushered in a new political dispensation, via a military assisted transition that ousted former president Robert Mugabe. The party was never going to hand over power on a silver platter and would have been preparing for a win in what they no doubt expected to be a competitive race.

Zanu-PF always had the upper hand given its 38 years in power since independence. It had access to more funding, including state resources, that enabled it to run a more effective campaign. Its many huge billboards, advertising a re-imaged Mnangagwa, new vehicles and a flood of green party paraphernalia all indicated that it d invested large amounts of money in these elections.

The party also benefited from a biased state media. And it could also still ride on the wave of the sweeping changes it had brought about from No vember 2017, which included opening up the democratic space in terms of freedom of speech and association and

The fact that these elections were held in full view of international and regional observers, that political parties were allowed to campaign freely, and that the run up to the polling day
was largely peaceful, could all be credited to their new form of governance.

MDC-ALLIANCE

The MDC-Alliance went into the elections on a weak footing. They were fractured, having brought five parties together very recently in an alliance through the efforts of the young Chami-sa. They didn't have enough resources, nor time to mobilise effectively, though they still attracted thousands to their lies in urban areas.

But the MDC-Alliance ran a cam-

paign that focused mainly on the presidential elections. They pinned their hopes on Chamisa being able to woo a predominantly young Zimbabwean population eager to see change.

But after votes had been caste, the behaviour of the alliance's two leaders left a lot to be desired. Tendai Biti and Chamisa declared themselves the winners of the presidential poll well be-fore election results were announced by the Zimbabwe Electoral Commission. They also said they would not accept any result that did not declare them the victors.

This could have been partly responsible for the violence that

At a time when they needed to show good leadership, they employed the usual tactics of discrediting elec-toral processes before results were even announced. The situation wasn't helped by the fact that the electoral

commission took a long time to release the presidential results (citing procedures for the delay). This was bound to exacerbate tension such very low trust in the electoral

The electoral commission has always been accused of being biased towards Zanu-PF. It should have devel-oped mechanisms to alleviate distrust, and come up with a strategy to ensure that results were released without de-lay and through proper channels, and not through social media.

There were a few irregularities that were noted by all the observer missions. These included the voters' roll not being available on time, too many assisted voters, the lack of an effective communication strategy by the electoral commission, media bias, and intimidation of voters, especially of women candidates.

It was certainly not a level playing

field. But, the environment and irregularities were not deemed to be at a scale big enough to jeopardise the credibility of the elections.

WHAT NOW?

It's time political parties and individ-uals put their narrow self interests aside and act on behalf of Zimbabwe as a whole. This is the only way for the country to move forward.

If the MDC-Alliance claims Zanu-PF

rigged the elections with the help of the electoral commission, the onus is on them to prove it. Till then, both par-ties need to sort out their differences as quickly and as peacefully as possible for the sake of the people of Zim-babwe, who have endured much hard-ship because of political elites intent on serving their own interests.

Verification of WB migrants' identities for Assam NRC to take couple of months more

Kolkata, Aug 4 (PTI): The verification of identities of the people, who have mi-grated from West Bengal to Assam, for the National Register of Citizens (NRC) may take another couple of months to be completed, a senior state govern-ment official said here.

The process is a "long-drawn one" and reports on the NRC verification from officers concerned are being awaited, he said.

"There is not a single paper lying with us right now. All those which were not sent for updating the NRC are awaiting verification. It (verification) is a long process and we are working on it. It may take another couple of months to be completed," the offi-

He said that there was pressure from the Assam government in returning the NRC verification dod uments expeditiously.

West Bengal is the

biggest defaulter in the NRC verification process, Registrar General and Census Commissioner of India Sailesh, who is overseeing the entire exercise of the NRC, had said last week.

"The largest number of documents that we have not received among all states was from West Bengal. We had to strug-gle. We had to follow up. But we have not received substantial number of documents from West Bengal. The response (of results was not satisfactory," Sailesh had said.

According to the state government official, nearly 15,000 responses were sent to the Assam government out of the total about 1.14 lakh requests and "we are working on the rest".

The NRC verification is faster in areas like Kolkata but is "pretty slow" in the rural areas, he said. Stating that less man-

power is a reason for the delay, he gave the example of cases which needed to be verified from the West Bengal Council of Higher Secondary Education.

The official said that the home department was also helping those departments short of infrastructure in expediting the process of NRC verification.

'We had asked other departments to check the authenticity of the peo-ple concerned and the rest of the verification was done by our officers. So we did everything to speed up the process," the official said.

In the districts, a verification request was needed to be referred to the district magistrate who would then send the file to the SDO.

"The file will move from the SDO to the BDO

who will refer it to the gram panchayat for verification. The file will be through the same channel. So the verification is taking a long

Sailesh had said that the he had made an exception by deputing his own staff to assist the state government.

"But West Bengal was the only state where all required documents for the draft NRC was not re-

ceived," Sailesh had said.
Out of about 1.14
lakh cases sent to Bengal government, only 7,438 responses have been received. Sailesh had said.





Kohli is not invincible, slip catching let us down: James Anderson

BIRMINGHAM, (PTI): England pacer James Anderson says Virat Kohli is not "invincible" and poor slip fielding from his team mates has allowed the Indian skipper to get off the hook in the first innings of the opening cricket Test here.

It was an engrossing duel between Test cricket's second most successful pacer, Anderson and Kohli on the second day when the Indian skipper was dropped twice off the bowler on 21 and 51 by Dawid Malan.

Kohli went on to score 149 and was batting on 43 not out in India's sec ond innings score of 110 for 5 with the visitors still needing 84 more to

Anderson rued his side's poor catching and said England need to take their chances against a

batsman of Kohli's calibre.
"I've been encouraged the way I've bowled at him (Kohli) in this game so far, found the edge a few times in the first innings. On another day I could have got him for 20, and then we're not talking about how brilliant he is," Anderson said last night.

"You can't drop Virat



Kohli on 21, because he's one of the best players in the world, and he'll capitalise on that and which he did. We could have been in a much different position now. We've just got to go away and know we can get him. No one is invincible in world cricket. We can get him out," he said.

Anderson said that Kohli can shield his tail very well, like he did in the first innings, and thus England need to find a way to quickly get him out if the hosts desire to win the Test.

"To be a part of it is

great, and tomorrow we've got a really good chance of winning the game. If we recover well and come back fresh in the morning, we know it's going to be 25-30 overs max one way or the other, so we can give it all we can," said Anderson.

"If he (Kohli) bats like he did in the first innings India will win. Even batting with the tail, he just managed to find the gap, or get down the other end - the way he batted with the tail was brilliant.

"We need five wickets, simple as that, fair-

ly quickly - otherwise, they'll get the runs. We've just got to give it everything we've got for the first 15-20 overs leave absolutely nothing out there," he said.

Anderson said the ongoing match was a brilliant example for Test cricket.

"It's been really exciting, if not a bit frustrat-ing at times. What's been great is the way the momentum has shifted. Test cricket at its best the way we dominated the first two sessions of the match, then India wrestled back

the momentum, then it was our job to go out and bowl well. It's gone to and fro," he said.

"It's a really exciting place to be, because you know we could do something special tomorrow by winning this such a close Test match. So we'll go to bed dreaming about getting Kohli out first thing," he said.

Book records ways how women responded to coming of English into their lives

New Delhi, Aug 4 (PTI): The post-Independence period saw a gradual rise in the number of Indian women writing in English and female writ ers have now started to own and acknowledge that the language is the best medium

to express themselves, argues a new book. The antholo-

The antholo-"Influence of English on Indian Women Writers: Voices from Regional Languag-es" is edited by K Suneetha Rani, professor at the Centre for Wom-

en's Studies, University of Hyderabad.

The aim of the book is to The aim of the book is to record the different ways in which women responded to the debates around English in different languages and genres. It brings into discussion Indian women's choice of writing or not writing in Fawriting or not writing in English in the context of identity

movements, says Rani.
English as a symbol of

modernity in India was first accessed by men, giving them a new image of masculinity while Indian languages were 'feminised' - seen as meant for women. Among upper-caste women, English was a vehicle for social reform and for lessening seclusion.

invisibility and economic dependence, the contributors argue.
For the so-called lower castes,

the language was aspirational, indi-cating emancipa-tion and empower-ment possibilities, threatening

upper-caste dominance. En-glish formed its own language of gender and made women's voices stronger in regional lan-guages, which can be seen in the flowering of women's articles, fiction, biography and let-

ters, they say.

The book, published by Sage, records the different ways in which women re-sponded to the coming of En-

The beginnings of the English discourse in India in the 19th and the early 20th centuries, as many critics have observed and argued, seems to have been built majorly around the category of gender,

Such discourse also presented contradictory approaches to the English argument, but they were all intricately connected, she says.

"English helped in mould-ing better family women; English provided a garb of modernity to reiterate traditional gender stereotypes; English contributed to the creation of the world of dichotomies but English also created a hope for the outcastes deprived of entry, education and employment," the book says.

The onus was on wom-en to access the benefits of modernity and also to prove themselves. This proving was limited to their capability in education but extended to their loyalties and roles. So, women started to debate Enstyle, grounded in their context and crisis, it says.

According to Rani, the regional languages became vibrant platforms for the discourse around the English question, closely connecting it with the questions of tradi-tion, modernity, colonialism, nation and especially gender.

"English became an agency for women to express them-selves and to explore the domains of knowledge that they were not allowed to access earlier. Such women's voices are heard more extensively and powerfully in regional lan-guages in their fiction, person-al narratives, essays, columns and editorials of the journals, the book says.

The articles in the volume

examine the English debate from various angles as debated by women in their articles, speeches, fiction, biographies and letters. The essays take the identities and specifici-ties into consideration instead of essentialising the debates around English.

C Vijayasree argues in "Lan-guage, Reform and National-ism: Indian Women's Writing

in the Nineteenth Century" that the intersecting sites of English education, rhetoric of reform and nationalist discourse provided a larger context within which the literary production of Indian writers took shape in the 19th century.

In "Women and Reform". Alladi Uma introduces the woman question in term of reform and the nautch question focusing on the late 19th and

early 20th centuries.
Sanjukta Dasgupta presents "Colonized: The Bengali Woman Writer in British India", drawing attention to an inter-esting anti-colonial notion in the 19th century that women's education, their ability to read and write and publish their writing in regional languages and English were considered

Pak polls: 1.67 mn votes rejected, says report

ISLAMABAD, Aug 4 (PTI): A total of 1.67 million votes cast across Pakistan in the 2018 general election were rejected, which was 11.7 per cent more than that of the 1.5 million ballots discarded in the 2013 polls, according to an independer watchdog report. A ballot is rej

ot is rejected from the count if it does not clearly show which candidate has been marked by the vot er or more than one candidate have been marked.

As per the Election
Commission of Pakistan,

there were over 100 million registered voters but only about 51 per cent exercised their franchises.

The Free and Fair Elec tions Network (FAFEN) report released yesterday was based on its monitoring of the entire polling process in the four provinces of Pakistan as well as the Islam

abad Capital Territory (ICT).

The report stated that the number of ballots rejected from the count is more than double than that in the 2013 elections

in the ICT region.

There was a 40 per cent increase in the number of rejected votes in Baloch istan, 30.6 per cent in Khy-ber Pakhtunkhwa (KP), 7 per cent in Sindh and 6.6 per cent in Punjab, it said.

The votes rejected from the count surpassed the margin of victory in 49 (18.1 per cent) of the 270 contested seats of the National Assembly, These include 26 seats in Punjab, 11 in Sindh and six each in KP and Balochistan.

Similarly, the number of ballots excluded from the count exceeded the margin of victory in 120 (21 per cent) of the 570 provincial assembly con

provincial assembly constituencies where elections were held.

These include 58 constituencies in Punjab, 24 in KP, 22 in Sindh and 16 in Balochistan, the report said.

The victory margin in 79 national and 169 provincial assembly seats is less than 5 per cent of the

total votes polled, it said.

According to Pakistan's election law, a candidate can demand recounting of ballots if the margin of victory is less than 5 per cent of the total votes polled in the constituency, or 10,000, whichever is lesser.

UN chief's spokesperson declines to comment on UN report on Kashmir

United Nations, Aug 4 (PTI): A spokesperson for UN chief Antonio Guterres has declined to comment on the UN Human Rights High Commissioner's re-port on Kashmir, saying it is for the human rights chief to speak for himself and up to the Member States of the Human Rights Council to evaluate its content.

India had rejected High Rights Zeid Ra'ad Al Hus sein's report in June in which he had called for a commission of inquiry by the Human Rights Council to conduct an indepen-dent, international invesrights situation in Kashmir.

Sunita Williams among 9 astronauts named by NASA for first commercial flights

Indian-origin US astronau Sunita Williams is among the nine astronauts named first missions into space on commercially provided rockets and capsules,

starting next year.

After years of vehicle development and building anticipation, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) has now put the crew in com-mercial crew spacecraft.

The space agency announced vesterday that the nine astronauts will launch on the first crewed test flights and missions of new commercial spacecraft built nd operated by The Boeing Company and SpaceX.

"Future Commercial Crew astronauts will be riding to space on partner vehicles built by SpaceX & BoeingSpace," NASA said

in a tweet.
"We are on the brink of launching American astronauts on American rockets from American



soil," said NASA Administrator Jim Bridenstine during the Launch Amer-

The eight active NASA astronauts and one former astronaut-turned-corpo rate crew member will launch on Boeing CST-100 Starliner and SpaceX Dragoncapsules to the International Space Station beginning in 2019.

The missions will mark the first crewed launches from US soil since the end of the space shuttle pro-

gramme in 2011.

"Today, our country's dreams of greater achievements in space are within our grasp. This accomplished group of American

astronauts, flying on new spacecraft developed by our commercial partners Boeing and SpaceX, will launch a new era of human spaceeX, will launch

flight," Bridenstine said. He said the announcement advances "our great American vision" strengthens America's

leadership in space.

NASA has worked closely with the companies throughout design, development and testing to ensure the systems meet its safety and perfor-

mance requirements.

"The men and women we assign to these first flights are at the forefront of this exciting new time for human spaceflight," said Mark Geyer, director of NASA's Johnson Space Center in Houston

"It will be thrilling to see our astronauts lift off from American soil, and we can't wait to see them aboard the International Space Station," Geyer said.

In addition to naming e crews of the test flights, NASA also announced the four astronauts who will fly aboard the first opera-tional Starliner and Dragon missions to the space station. Both vehicles were developed in cooperation with NASA to deliver crew members to and from the

orbiting laboratory.

Josh Cassada, 45, will
fly with Sunita ("Suni") Williams, 52, aboard NA-SA's first contracted Star-liner mission. It will be Cassada's first spaceflight. Williams previously logged 321 days in orbit on two stays aboard the space station, most recently returning to the Earth in 2012.

The commercial crew members took to the stage during an event led by Bridenstine at the agency's Johnson Space

NASA astronauts Robert Behnken, 48, and Douglas Hurley, 51, will fly together as SpaceX's first Dragon crew.

Veterans of two spaceflights each. Behnken and Hurley will lift off atop a SpaceX Falcon 9 rocket from the Kennedy Space Center's Pad 39A the same Florida launch pad where the space shuttle left Earth for the last time in July 2011 with Hurley as pilot. NASA astronauts Eric Boe, 53, and Nicole Mann,

41, will join the commander of that same final space shuttle mission, former astronaut and now Boeing executive Christopher Ferguson, 56, as the crew of the Starliner test flight, launching atop a United Launch Alliance Atlas V rocket from Complex 41 at the Cape Canaveral Air Force Station in Florida.

Ferguson, who has been involved from the start in the Starliner's development, flew three shuttle missions as a

This will be Mann's first launch, having joined the

astronaut corps in 2013.

Behnken, Hurley, Boe and Mann are NASA's first astronauts to be named to the test flights of new US spacecraft since the March 1978 announcement the space shuttle's first orbital flight test crews Ferguson will become the first former NASA astronaut to return to orbit as a company's crew member when he flies.

Prior to their maiden

crewed missions. both Boeing and SpaceX plan uncrewed test flights in late 2018 or early 2019.

Both companies will also conduct abort system test flights to ensure the astronauts can safely escape should their rockets go awry.

Victor Glover, 42, and Michael Hopkins, 49, will fly on the first operational mission of SpaceX's crewed Dragon. It will he Glover's first time in space. Hopkins logged 166 days aboard the space station in 2014.

The two pairs of NASA crewmates will fly to the station with Russian cosand internaannounced at a later date Between the end of the space shuttle program and the start of commercial crew operations, NASA's crew members have and the space station on Russian Soyuz spacecraft.

Behnken, Boe, Hurley and Williams were named in 2015 as NASA's "commercial crew cadre" and have been working with Boeing and SpaceX on the development of the spacecraft and the simulators that will be used to train astronauts to fly.

Boeing's and SpaceX's commercial spacecraft may also open the space station and more broadly, Earth orbit to more privately-fund-ed visitors and spaceflight that do not have their own estic crewed spacecraft

Zimbabwe prez calls for unity as oppn cries foul

HARARE, AUG 4 (AFP): HARAKE, -Zimbabwean President President Mnangagwa Prev in the wake of allegations his election victory was tainted by fraud, hailing the vote as a fresh start for the country after the repressive rule of Robert Mugabe.

As defeated opposition leader Nelson Cha-misa decried the official results as a sham, Mnangagwa, a former Mugabe ally, defended the vote

With the eyes of the world on us we delivered a free, fair and credible n," Mnangagwa told reporters yesterday.

He added that while "no democratic process is flawless", Zimbabwe's first post-Mugabe election was a far cry from the fraud-tainted polls seen during Mugabe's 37 years in power.

His plea for unity came after allegations of foul play sparked a deadly crackdown on protesters in Harare on Wednesday vhen troops opened fire, killing six.

Mnangagwa, who is seeking to end Zimba-bwe's international isolation and attract badly needed foreign invest-ment, said he would set up an independent commission to investigate the bloodshed.

was marred by violence in



the aftermath of the vote and called on the winner o show "magnanimity" and the opposition to show 'graciousness in defeat".

Final results showed Mnangagwa won 50.8 per cent of Monday's vote against Chamisa's 44.3 percent -- a knife-edge 0.8 per cent above the threshold needed to avoid a run-off.

But Chamisa has insisted he was the winner of an election he con-demned as "fraudulent, illegal, illegitimate".

"We are not accepting fake results," he said, vowing to challenge the results through the courts.

Mnangagwa stretched out a hand to Chamisa, telling him: "You have a crucial role to play in Zim-babwe's present and in its unfolding future."

Mnangagwa was allegedly involved in state violence during the 2008 elections when then opposition leader Morgan

Tsvangirai pulled out of the run-off after at least 200 of his supporters were killed in attacks. Apart from Mugabe,

who ruled with an iron fist since independence from Britain in 1980 until last year, he is the only president that Zimbabwe

Chosen to lead the ZA-NU-PF party in November after the brief military in-tervention that deposed Mugabe, Mnangagwa had promised a free and fair vote to turn the page on years of brutal repression.

Mugabe left Zimbabwe's economy in disas-trous shape, presiding over the seizure of white-owned farms and hyperinflation, and Mnangagwa has made investment a priority. "Zimbabwe is now

"Zimbabwe is now open for business," he told reporters. "We want to leapfrog and catch up other developing countries."

Charles Laurie of ansaid that after taking over from Mugabe, "Mnangag-wa's task was not just to win the election, but to convince the international community of a new Zimbabwe by winning it cleanly and fairly. "The killing of six pro-

testors and questions over his government's conduct at the polls, means Mnangagwa drags virtually all of Mugabe's baggage into his presidency," he added.

President Cyril Ramaphosa of neighbouring South Africa was the first key partner to congratu-Mnangagwa, calling on all Zimbabweans to accept the result.

Chamisa has alleged

flagrant vote-rigging under the Zimbabwe Election Commission, a body which under Mugabe was frequently accused of helping to fix elections in favour of ZANU-PF.

"Mr Mugabe was at least sophisticated," Chamisa complained.

ZEC officials have ro-

bustly denied allegations of bias or rigging, and in-ternational observers have largely praised the con-

duct of election day itself.

But EU monitors said

large majority in parlia-mentary elections held alongside the presidential vote.

Pak anti-graft body approaches Interpol, seeks Red Corner Notices against Sharif's sons ISLAMABAD, AUG 4 (PTI): ruption cases and court

Pakistan's apex anti-graft body has approached In-terpol seeking issuance of Red Corner Notices against jailed former pre-mier Nawaz Sharif's sons Hasan and Hussain, a media report said today.

Sharif's sons were de-clared as absconders by an accountability court after they failed to appear in either of the three cas-es launched against them along with their father following a Supreme Court decision on July 28, 2017. The decision to issue

Red Corner Notices was taken after National Ac-countability Bureau (NAB) Chairman Justice (retd) laved Igbal had asked the interior ministry to initi-ate the process of bringing back Hasan and Hussan, who have been living in London to take care of their ailing mother Kulsoom Nawaz, "The Express Tri-

bune' reported.

The Federal Investiga tion Agency (FIA) has submitted an application to the Interpol headquarters in France with the request to issue the red warrants of Hasan and Hussain, the report said, quoting sources.

The application sub mitted through the FIA headquarters states that Hasan and Hussain are wanted in Pakistan in corhas already issued peragainst them. Previously, the court

had issued directions for separate trials of Hasan and Hussain from their father after they failed to appear before the court despite repeated orders to face the charges in line with the Sue Court's direction in the Panama Papers case.
Earlier, while separat-

ing their trial and declaring them as "proclaimed offenders", the court ordered non-bailable perpetual warrants of arrest against them.

The court on July 6 had also sentenced former prime minister Sharif to 10 years in prison, his daughter Maryam Nawaz to seven years and son-inlaw captain (retired) Saf-dar to one-year jail term.

The court also imposed a fine of 8 million pounds on Sharif and 2 million pounds on Maryam. No fine was imposed on Safdar.

Sharif was disqual-ified as Prime Minister in July 2017 by the Supreme Court following a challenge to his office by Cricketer-turned-politician Imran Khan on the basis of publication of the

India third Asian nation to get STA-1 status from US

WASHINGTON, AUG 4 (PTI): India has become the third Asian country after Japan and South Korea to get the Strategic Trade Authorization-1 (STA-1) status after the US issued a federal notification to this effect, paving the way for high-technology prod-uct sales to New Delhi, particularly in civil space

and defense sectors.

India is the 37th country to be designated the STA-1 status by the United States.

The federal notifica-n, issued yesterday, gains significance as the Trump Administration made an exception for In-dia, which is yet to become a member of the Nuclear

Suppliers Group (NSG).

Traditionally, the US has placed only those countries in the STA-1 list who are members of the four export control re-gimes: Missile Technology Control Regime (MTCR), Wassenaar Arrangement (WA), Australia Group (AG) and the NSG. In its federal notifica-

tion, the Trump Adminis-tration notes that India is a member of three of the four multilateral export regimes.

Mainly because of the

political opposition from China. India's membership application has been pend-ing before NSG, which takes decision by consensus.

By placing India in the STA-1 list, the United States has acknowledged that for all practical purposes India

adheres to the export control regimes of the NSG. This exception for New Delhi is intended to

send a strong political message to China and the world, taking into account that America's closest ally Israel is yet to be given this status, primarily because it is not a member of these multilateral export control regimes.
"This action befits In-

dia's status as a Major Defence Partner and recognises" the country's mem-bership in three of the four export control regimes the MTCR, WA and AG, the

This rule is another in the series of rules that implement reforms to which the US and India mutually agreed to promote global

non-proliferation, expand high technology cooperation and trade, and ultimately fa-cilitate India's full membership in the four multilateral export control regimes.

According to the noti-

fication, the US and India continue their commit-ment to work together to strengthen the global non-proliferation and export control framework and further transform bilateral export control cooperation to recognise the full potential of the global strategic partnership between the two countries. This

This commitment has been realised in the two countries' mutually agreed upon steps to ex pand cooperation in civil space, defense, and other high-technology sectors

and the complementary steps of the US to realign India in US export control regulations, and support India's membership in the four multilateral export control regimes, it said.

To date, with the effective support of the US, India has been admitted to three of the four multilateral export control regimes, the MTCR on June 27, 2016, the Wassenaar Arrangement on December 7, 2017, and the Australia Group on January 19, 2018.

These memberships, important to the two

countries' global strate-gic partnership, are en-hanced by the US' recognition of India as a Major Defence Partner in the In-dia-US Joint Statement of June 7, 2016 titled, "The

United States and India: Enduring Global Partners in the 21st Century."

"This recognition facilitates and supports India's military modernisation efforts with the US as a reliable provider of advanced defense articles," the notification said.

As a result, the Bureau of Industry and Security (BIS), formally recognises under the Export Administration Regulations (EAR) India's membership in the WA multilateral export WA multilateral export control regimes and revises the EAR accordingly, the federal notification said.

"In addition, to export control-related benefits for India as a result of prior amendments to the EAR in furtherance of the US-India global strategic



Jodhpur court asks Salman Khan to seek permission before travelling overseas



Salman Kilali Jodhpur Court convicted him in a 1998 Kankani blackbuck poaching case. He was sentenced to 5-years imprison-ment but is out on bail. The court was to hear the actor's plea against the judgement on 03 Aug and 04 Aug.

Now, adding a twist to the tale the court has asked the actor to seek their permission, every time, he needs to travel overseas. Salman moved an application in the sessions court on Friday seeking exemption from the order that mandates him to take permission for going abroad. But the court ruled against the application.
