Delhi's air auality on brink of turning 'severe' as ban on construction activities comes into force

New Delhi, Nov 1 (PTI): A ban on construction activities came into force in the national capital Thursday as Delhi's air quality was on the brink of turning "severe" due to stubble burning in the adjoining regions and unfavourable mete-orological conditions, authorities said.

The overall air quality index (AQI) of Delhi was recorded at 393, which falls in the "very poor" category and is just seven points from turning severe, according to data by the Central Pollution Control Board (CPCB).

Gurgaon, Faridabad and Noida recorded an AQI of 416, which falls in the "severe" category, while air quality was "very poor" in Ghaziabad and Greater Noida.

Eleven areas in Delhi recorded "severe" air qual-ity while 16 areas recorded "very poor" air quality, ac-

ding to the CPCB data.

The PM2.5 level was recorded at 217. Fine particulates can be a matter of more serious health concern than PM10 (particles in the air with a diameter of less than 10 micrometres).

As per the CPCB data, the PM10 level in Delhi stood at 368.

The Centre-run System of Air Quality Fore-casting And Research (SA-FAR) said the AQI of Delhi-NCR would continue to remain in the upper range of the "very poor" catego-ry in the next three days.

"This is mainly due to weather conditions as stub-ble contribution is marginal now. The moisture intrusion over Delhi and surrounding regions due to the westerlies disturbances will increase with effect from November 4 to enhanced holding capacity of atmosphere resulting in increase in PM2.5 levels," the SAFAR website said.

"Winds are calm and it is favourable for stagnation of pollution. Although upper air winds where transport takes place are from stubble burning site but speed and magnitude is low and hence unlikely to impact Delhi air quality significantly," it added.



Domestic violence widely accepted in most developing countries: Study

London, Nov 1 (PTI): Domestic violence against women is widely accepted among many societies in developing countries, with 36 per cent of people believing it is justi-fied in certain situations, a study has found.

Researchers at the University of Bristol in the UK analysed data from 1.17 million men and women in 49 low-and middle-income countries.

The findings, pub-

lished in the journal PLOS ONE, will help shape national and international strategies to prevent domestic violence, they said.

Surveys measured whether people thought a husband or partner was justified in beating his wife or partner if she goes out without telling him, argues with him, neglects the children, suspects her of being unfaithful, refuses to have sex, or burns the food.

On average, 36 per cent of people thought it was justified in at least one of these situations, the researchers said. Attitudes towards

domestic violence varied significantly across the 49 countries with only three per cent of people justifying it in the Dominican Republic, in the Caribbean, compared to 83 per cent in Timor-Leste, South East Asia.

Overall, the societal acceptance of domestic

South Asia with nearly half the population (47 per cent) justifying it and in Sub-Saharan Africa (38 per cent), compared with Latin America and the Caribbean (12 per cent), Europe and Central Asia (29 per cent).

OTP authentication better than biometric for Aadhaar verification: HC told

The Delhi High Court on Thursday suggested incorporating recommendations, like using OTP

New Delhi, Nov 1 (PTI):

We made it authentication instead of biometric, given by two amicus curiae to plug a "loophole" in the Aadhaar verification system that had been misused by a mobile shop owner to issue fresh SIM cards in the Nepal striker, Dona Thapa, went on to complete name of unwary customers for use in fraudulent activities.

The shop owner, during Aadhaar verification of a SIM, used to make the customer give thumb impression twice by saying it was not properly obtained the first time and the second round of authentication was then used to issue a fresh connection which was handed over to some third party, the high court had earlier noted while initiating a PIL on the issue.

A bench of Chief Justice Rajendra Menon and Justice LS Mehta, on Thursday took on record the report submitted by senior advocate Davan Krishnan and advocate Rushab Aggarwal who were appointed as amicus in the case to assist the

The bench also asked the Centre, Delhi gov-ernment and the Unique Identification Authority of India (UIDAI) to file their response to the report and listed the matter for hearing on February 12.

We feel it (suggestions) should be incorporated," the bench said.

In their joint report, the two lawyers have said that OTP authentication should be the preferred method instead of using biometrics where "security concerns are more pronounced" and 'loopholes are easily acces-

They said that biometrics should be only requested where it is essential.

The report also said

there should be a "cooling off period" between au-thentications, "to ensure that if multiple authentications take place in quick succession the UIDAI systems would not respond, and thus effectively block-ing loopholes as is highlighted in the instant case".

The other suggestions proposed in the report were that FIRs in such cases should be forwarded by the investigating agencies to UIDAI so that it has information of these loopholes and can create methods to

file a complaint under the Aadhaar Act to ensure prosecution to the fullest extent of the persons who carry out such activities, the

"This would enable the general public to assess whether they were also vic-tims and to take remedial action if necessary."

Mid-air collision avoided in Indo-Bangladesh airspace border

KOLKATA, NOV 1 (PTI): Two IndiGo planes came too close for comfort before averting a mid-air collision at the border airspace of India and Bangladesh, Airports Authority of India (AAI) officials said Thursday.

With only 45 seconds before the possible collision, it was averted after the Air Traffic Control (ATC) tower in Kolkata instructed one plane to turn right and move away from the other aircraft that had come

"Both the aircraft, belonging to low cost carrier IndiGo, had come on the same level on Wednesday evening and posed a threat to both the aeroplanes," a senior AAI official at the Kolkata airport told PTI over phone

"One aircraft was going to Guwahati from Chennai and the other from Guwahati to Kol-kata. The planes had come close to each other around 5.10 pm," he



kata-bound flight was at 36,000 ft in Bangladesh airspace and the other one at 35,000 ft in Indian airspace.

Bangladesh ATC had asked the Kolkata-bound flight to descend to 35,000 ft and when the aircraft followed the order, it came close to the aircraft which was at 35,000 ft, the official said.

An ATC official in

Kolkata saw it and immediately ordered the Chennai-Guwahati flight to make a right turn and move away from the path of the descending aircraft, averting a disaster, he said.

"We have no such information as of now,"

an IndiGo spokesperson told PTI when contacted

As per standard procedure, an investigation will be initiated, another AAI official said.

It is not known if the Airborne Collision Avoid-ance System (ACAS) or the Traffic Alert and Collision Avoidance System (TCAS), which are generally fitted in aircraft, had alerted the pilots or not, the official said, adding that everything will be found out during the investigation.

SC allows use of 5 more documents for claim to draft Assam NRC, extends deadline to Dec 15



NEW DELHI, NOV 1 (PTI):

The Supreme Court on Thursday allowed the use of five more documents by claimants for the draft Assam NRC, saying the premise "better to exclude genuine person than to in-clude a wrongful person" can't be accepted.

It over-ruled the objections of state NRC coordinator that the documents to be relied upon to stake claim such as refugee registration certificate and ration card can be forged.

The claimants for draft Assam NRC can now stake claim with the help of total 15 documents provided in List-A of the claim form.

A bench of Chief Justice Ranjan Gogoi and Justice R F Nariman also extended to December 15, the earlier deadline of November 25, for filing of claims and objections for

The five new documents allowed by the bench to prove the legacy for the claimants include ror the claimants include extract of names in NRC, 1951; extract/certified copy of Electoral Rolls up to the midnight of March 24, 1971 and Citizenship Certificate and refugee certificate and refugee certificate issued by com-petent authority (up to March 24, 1971 midnight).

The other two legacy documents include Certified copies of pre-1971 Electoral Roll, particularly, those issued from Tripura and the ration card.

Rejecting the contention of Assam NRC coordinator Prateek Hajela, the bench said, "your contention that refugees registration certificate, cer-tified electoral rolls and ration card can be forged to stake claim cannot be

It further said: "Your contention that it's better to exclude the genuine person than to include a wrongful person cannot be accepted. We don't agree with you".

The bench noted that Hajela in its report filed in the court on October 4, had objected to the use of any one of the five docu-ments saying that during the process of verification for inclusion of names in the draft NRC large number of forged documents were filed.

"It is our considered view that the mere pos-sibility of filing of forged documents or that such documents were filed in the earlier exercise cannot be a ground to exclude the same from the impending process of filing of claims and objections," the bench

It added that all such documents must be subjected to a thorough pro-cess of verification and would be accepted only after due and complete satisfaction of the genuineness of the same.

The Assam govern-ment in its response has sought inclusion of these five documents for claim-ing the status in draft NRC saying that the apprehen-sion of forgery of docu-ments can be taken care of by adopting some differt means.
The Centre has also

taken a similar stand as that of the Assam government and said that these five documents could be allowed to be use for stak-ing claim in draft NRC.

"In this regard, we per-mit Hajela to undertake through his team a vigorous process of verification and have additional layers of such verification to ensure that only and only eli-gible persons are included in the final NRC," it said.

The court also accepted the Standard Operating Procedures (SOP) prepared by Centre and fixed the time line for various stage in publication of draft final NRC.

The bench said that

after the December 15, deadline for filing claims, January 15, 2019 will be the deadline for issuance of notices by the competent authority to the claimants to accord them hearings and February 1, 2019 will be the deadline for commence-ment of the verification

process.

It said that further details of the time schedule including the time for completion of verifica-tion/enquiry of the claims which will now be allowed will follow at the appropriate time and asked Hajela to file a report after December 15.

The court said that the documents filed by person belonging to state other than Assam shall also be accepted subject to back-end verification of the authenticity of such certificates.

Dealing with an application of Gorkhas, whose documents were not accepted by the authorities engaged in NRC work, the bench asked Hajela, "Do you have any problem with Gorkhas? Gorkhas are assets to the country. Include them in draft

The apex court had on September 5 had allowed use any one of the 10 of a total 15 documents provided in List-A of the claim form to be used by the claimants for proving

The ten legacy docu-ments which were made admissible include land documents like registered sale deed, permanent residential certificate issued from outside the State, passport and LIC insurance policy of the relevant period. The final draft NRC list

was published on July 30 in which names of 2.89 crore of the 3.29 crore people were included. The names of 40,70,707 people did not figure in the list. Of these, 37,59,630 names have been rejectand the remaining 2,48,077 are on hold.

The first draft of the

NRC for Assam was published on the intervening night of December 31 and January 1 in accordance with the top court's direction. Names of 1.9 crore people out of the 3.29 crore applicants were in-corporated then.

Bees, neither Busy nor Buzzing

At least the horticulturists should have noticed

The Baramati sub-division under Pune district in Maharastra is a rural belt of pomegranate and onion growers. Some of the farmers, those who became part of a pilot project - Madhu Sandesh - reported their first bumper crop in a while two years ago. In fact, not only had the volume of their produce grown substantially, the quality too was markedly better. The pilot project was launched in November 2015. For farms to report a substantial turnaround within a year should have gotten everyone interested. Unfortunately, it appears that no one elsewhere has been keeping track or taking notes.

Growers in Baramati reported harvests of around 12 tonnes from farms which used to otherwise yield between 7 to 8 tonnes. Sure, these could be cyclical variations, but traditional growers would know that, Hence, when they credit the improvement in volume and quality to honey bees, everyone should sit up and take note, especially horticulturists in Sikkim who continue to struggle with failing crops and poor quality.

Under the Madhu Sandesh project, farmers were trained to rear honeybees on their farms and use them extensively for pollinating their pomegranate and onion fields. So dramatic have the improvements been that more farmers are lining up to take the training and those who already have honeybee hives in their farms, are looking around to install more, even on rented patches!

There is nothing earth-shatteringly new in the Baramati experience given that colony collapse (of bees) and the resultant effect on fruit orchards across the world have been much discussed worries in these times of climate change and ecological distress. Unfortunately, not enough people are speaking of this phenomenon in Sikkim. But if one were to look around, the warning signs are aplenty.

Farmers from Dzongu have been complaining of falling produce in their orange orchards. Local or ange produce could be in decline elsewhere as well. It has been several decades since the State lost its North Sikkim apples [although one hears off and on about attempts to revive apple orchards there]. Large cardamom plantations stand devastated across the State. Between an entire Board devoted to spices and a department charged to look after Horticulture, an explanation remains awaited which makes a durable solution even more distant. Although one hears often about mischievously named crop diseases afflict-ing the fruits and frequent reference to the advanced age of the [large cardamom] plantations, these only explain the symptoms which are manifesting in the fields and not the overall crop failure. There have even been reports of disease-resistant strains being developed and attempts to promote improved plantation management practices. What one does not hear being discussed as often is the health of pollinators in Sik-kim's fields. Agriculture does not require pollination, but horticulture, every expert will agree, is not possible without pollinators. Fruit-bearing trees flower to attract pollinators, and the number of pollinating agents is directly proportional to the number and health of fruits borne. Bees are among the most prolific and important pollinators and the role of wild bees in pollinating large cardamom, as against the damage that honey bees can wreck, has been studied and documented. The same applies to oranges and apples, which are also serviced by a host of other insects.

Studies on declining produce in orchards elsewhere in the world have flagged shortage of pollinators as the main culprit. Bee populations are in un-explained decline across the world and even casual surveys will prove this to be the case here as well. It is perhaps important then that horticultural issues facing Sikkim should start at the basics by checking first on the presence and health of pollinators in the farms. Another good place to pick up some tips would be Baramati, and a study tour to that corner of Pune could be easy managed. The Bee experiment also ties in well with Sikkim's Organic Mission. In Baramati for instance, a substantial part of the training was on how to use pesticides and fertilizers without affecting the bees. That worry does not exist in Sikkim since chemical pesticides and fertilizers which are known to wipe out bee colonies are not used in farms here anymore These are all ideas and suggestions and would be of some consequence if there was some follow-up

The unimaginable costs of sexual assault

What is the cost of sexual assault? The answer depends on whom you ask.

Social and behavioral scientists like me mea-

sure the consequences of sexual assault in terms of mental health, physical health and educational out-comes. We know that post-traumatic stress symptoms may last for years and even decades. Health is compromised indirectly, in ways unknow unknowable to victims.

Economists measure the cost of health and

ental health care and days of productivity lost.

Other costs, however, are intangible, harder to quantify. We might call them quality-of-life issues. What might these costs include?

TWO DOORS

Dr. Christine Blasey Ford might put her desire to have two doors in the front of her house – and the couple's therapy bills that followed that panic-driv-

en request – into the intangible category.

As for me, I have lived in a single-story house for 25 years. I have avoided leaving my home after dark so that I don't have to re-enter it. Errands I don't complete in daylight stray into the next day. I ask for restaurant seats against the wall, arrange my desk to face the door, and am always aware of the nearest exits. I have loved successive German shepherd dogs who gave me comfort while I slept and security to stroll my neighborhood.

Twenty-five years ago, I descended a staircase

and encountered a man wielding a tire iron. He bludgeoned my head and tried to rape me.
I suffered multiple surgeries, endured years of

therapy, and still startle more easily than a cat. But far from being damaged, I consider myself thriving, some might say flourishing – despite the costs I incur. I have fixed the problem of who lurks on the first floor by not having a second one. But the prob-lem of entering my house after dark remains. I am wary of who may be there when I return, even with

multiple locks, an alarm system and those sweet

I do these things because I will never forget the depth of horror that invaded my mind, body and soul when I thought the man with the tire iron was going to kill me. I understand in ways I wish I could not why Ford's voice cracked when she gave voice to her realization that she could be suffocated.

Friends and family accommodate my quirks. I'm lucky I don't have to devise novel explanations for seemingly irrational behavior. Others bear an additional burden of creatively explaining away

DESCRIBING AND MEASURING VIOLENCE

The heinous assault against me occurred in the midst of my doctoral studies on violence against women at the University of Virginia. Then, and many times later, I vowed to continue my research. If I changed focus, the man who tried to kill me would have silenced me. I persisted despite concerns I would be perceived as unobjective.

And yet, the nature of my research changed over time. I began to focus on the conceptualization and the measurement of aggression against women, a far more basic question than I had imagined for myself. Maybe this pivot to theoretical territory felt safer, less visceral. My goal was to name the various ways in which women were violated, to help the public understand myriad ways in which women lost autonomy due to violence and the threat of it.

I have written about the importance of language and naming in scholarly journals as well as in The Conversation. I wanted the problem to enter into the public discourse with less shame and stigma. In retrospect, maybe these goals were personally

In light of this work, it may seem surprising that the sustained and exponential growth of #metoo disclosures both on campus and off - and society's reaction – have shocked me. Often I am heartened by what I hear – particularly from the youth whose sexual values and ethics reflect substantial norms change from my generation of Xers - but it has also taken a toll.

When Harvey Weinstein was arrested, I fell to the floor in tears. I cried most of the morning. You can bet it wasn't for Weinstein. It was for me. It was for other women. I was happy and grieving at the same time. The unimaginable was happening. Society was holding a man of great power and wealth accountable. His arrest was a chink in the stigma of sexual violation. I have lived to see happen what I never thought I would. Women who had much to lose by doing so were disclosing their experiences,

and society was believing them.

But now, after Ford's testimony in front of the Senate judiciary committee, I myself am looking for a safe "second exit" - surprisingly, from research on sexual assault that has been my focus for so long. Has my work kept some healing at bay, or has it healed more than I know? Have I incurred costs I cannot name? Each new public or private disclosure is more wrenching for me than the previous. I turn the newspaper over, the radio off. I am nause-ated, no longer in the abstract realm of theory, data and statistical inference.

I have worked for nearly 30 years on naming and identifying harms to women. I'm not sure what direction I will take next. If my work has, in some way, even indirectly, contributed to the so-cial change we are now awash in, I feel an incred-ible sense of accomplishment. If just one woman is spared from blame for just being in her home, for inadequately locking a faulty glass door or for creatively saving her life, I have great return on my

investment.

We will never be able to estimate the true cost of sexual assault. The ways in which women - even those who flourish – arrange their lives after an assault are impossible to imagine. Two front doors – who could have imagined? We can't measure what we can't imagine. But we can begin to name.

The World's Tallest Statue Celebrates **Development at the Cost of the Environment**

Prime Minister Narendra Modi inaugurated the world's largest statue, the Statue of Unity in Guja-rat, on 31 October 2018. At 182m tall (240m including the base), it is twice the height of the Statue of Liberty, and depicts India's first deputy Prime Minister, Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel.

The statue overlooks the Sardar Sa-rovar Dam on the Narmada River. Patel is often thought of as the inspiration for the dam, which came to international attention when the World Bank withdraw its support from the project in 1993 after a decade of environmental and humanitarian protests. It wasn't until 2013 that the World Bank funded another large dam project.

Like the dam, the statue has been

condemned for its lack of environmental oversight, and its displace-ment of local Adivasi or indigenous people. The land on which the statue was built is an Adivasi sacred site that was taken forcibly from them.

The Statue of Unity is part of a broader push by Modi's Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) to promote Patel as a symbol of Indian nationalism and free-market development. The statue's website praises him for bringing the princely states into the Union of India and for being an early advocate of Indian free enterprise.

The BJP's promotion of Patel also serves to overshadow the legacy of his boss, India's first prime minister, Jawa-



harlal Nehru. Nehru's descendants head India's most influential opposition party, the Indian National Congress.

The statue was supposed to be built with both private and public money, but it attracted little private investment. In the end, the government of Gujarat paid for much of the statue's US\$416.67 million price tag.

The Gujarat government claims its investment in the statue will promote tourism, and that tourism is "sustainable development". The United Nations says that sustainable tourism increases environmental outcomes and promotes local cultures. But given the statue's lack of environmental checks and its displacement of local populations, it is hard to see how this roject fulfils these goals.

The structure itself is not exactly

a model of sustainable design. Some

5,000 tonnes of iron, 75,000 cubic metres of concrete, 5,700 tonnes of steel, and 22,500 tonnes of bronze sheets were used in its construction.

Critics of the statue note that this emblem of Indian nationalism was designed by a Chinese architect, and the bronze sheeting was put in place by Chinese labour.

The statue's position next to the controversial Sardar Sarovar Dam is also telling. While chief minister of Gujarat from 2001 to 2014, Modi pushed for the dam's construction despite the World Bank's condemnation. He praised the dam's completion in 2017 as a monument to India's progress.

Both the completion of the dam and

the statue that celebrates it suggest that the BJP government is backing economic development over human rights and environmental protections.

The statue's inauguration comes only a month after the country closed the first nature reserve in India since 1972. Modi's government has also come under sustained criticism for a series of pro-industry policies that have eroded conservation, forest, coastal and air pollution protections,

and weakened minority land rights.
India was recently ranked 177 out
of 180 countries in the world for its environmental protection efforts.

Despite this record, the United Nations' Environmental Programme (UNEP) recently awarded Modi its highest environmental award. It made him a Champion of the Earth for his work on solar energy develop-

ment and plastic reduction.

The decision prompted a backlash in India, where many commentators are concerned by the BJP's environmental record.

Visitors to the statue will access it via a 5km boat ride. At the statue's base, they can buy souvenirs and fast food, before taking a high-speed elevator to the observation deck.

The observation deck will be situated in Patel's head. From it, tourists will look out over the Sardar Sarovar Dam, as the accompanying commentary praises "united" India's national development successes.

But let's not forget the environmental and minority protections that have been sacrificed to achieve these goals.

The gold had been smuggled into India from Bhutan and was being transported to Delhi, the statement issued by the DRI said.

In another operation conducted the same day, officers of DRI intercepted three passengers arriving by train from West and seized 10.2 kgs of foreign marked nuggled gold having market value of Rs 3.26 crores from them.

The modus operan-was similar in both the cases. "The gold was concealed in special-ly designed cloth belts worn by the passengers,

In one instance, two gold bars weighing 1 kg each were concealed in the shoes of one of the passengers, the probe agency said.

The seized gold had been smuggled into India via the land border with neighbouring countries was being transported to Delhi for sale during the ongoing festive season, it said.

All five passengers are Bhutanese nationals and have been arrested, the DRI said.

There has been a

spurt in the number of seizures by DRI of gold being smuggled into India from China, Myanmar and Bhutan via the land border, it said.

Such smuggling of gold into India is expected to peak during the festive season due to increased domestic demand and high differential between the price of gold in India and the source countries,

West Bengal BJP president Dilip Ghosh claimed that the owner of the ground had granted permission for holding the rally but the district police administration had declined to grant it in the last minute citing "baseless" reasons.

The police declined to comment on the reason for which the permission for the rally was declined.

The clash took place this morning after BJP leaders tried to hold the rally at a ground near the industrial town without any proper permission, the police said.

When police along with the civic police tried to stop the BJP activists from conducting the rally by taking away the microphone, clashes broke out between the two sides.

"Four police personnel

and others were injured. We have started an inves tigation," said a police official.


Television es showed BJP activists attacking civic police personnel with bamboo

The American claimed he had lost the desire to play basketball after his father's death and wanted to do something different. Fleur van Rens, a sports psycholo-

chair of the Elite Athlete Program at Murdoch University in Perth, said athletes changed sports for a multitude of reasons, including identity loss after retirement and even exercise dependence.
"Upon athletic retire-

ment, the athletic identity disappears. Those athletes who have not developed another identity tend to find themselves in a small existential crisis -- they need to figure out who they are beyond their sport," she told AFP.

"This makes the athletic retirement process detrimental to the wellbeing of some former athletes... and could cause them to consider a comeback or a pursuit in another sport.

Lack of self-worth may also play a part, but it could simply be enjoyment of sport or to fulfil a long-held dream, as in the case of Bolt. Many top athletes excelled at other sports when they were young, but had to make a choice -- Rafael Nadal vas a talented footballer before focusing on ten-nis, while Roger Federer was a decent skier.

Bolt was football-mad growing up, but track and field took priority. Where he goes from here is unknown. He has previously tried out at other clubs to no avail and is at an impasse after being offered a contract by the Mariners for far less than what he was seeking.

ing, and must decide whether he wants a football career -- and an extended life in sport --badly enough to accept

THIRUVANANTHAPURAM, Nov 1 (PTI): Former In dia captain Rahul Dravid was Thursday inducted into the ICC Hall of Fame at a brief function here ahead of the final ODI between India and the West

Dravid became only the fifth player from India to be named in the ICC Cricket Hall of Fame.

Legendary opener Sunil Gavaskar presided over the formalities.

The ICC, on July 2, announced his induction into the Hall of Fame.

Dravid joins an elite list that includes Bishan Singh Bedi, Kapil Dev. Gavaskar and Anil Kumble.

Dravid aggregated 13,288 runs in 164 Tests with 36 centuries and 10,889 runs in 344 ODIs

with 12 centuries, and was in 2004 named as the ICC Cricketer of the Year as well as the ICC Test Player of the Year.

Dravid, who played a solitary Twenty20 International, was also a brilliant slip fielder and finished his Test career in 2012 with 210 catches, which is a world record.

"It is a matter of great honour to be named by the ICC in the Cricket Hall of Fame. To find your name in a list of all-time greats across genera-tions is something one only dreams of while setting out on a cricket career and the kind of recognition that would delight any player," Dravid was quoted as saving in an ICC media release after the induction.

India at the UN supports lifting of US sanctions against Cuba

1 (PTI): India reiterated its support for the lifting of all sanctions imposed five decades ago by the US against Cuba, saying the continued existence of the embargo undermines multilateralism and the credibility of the UN itself.

Diplomats senting more than 135 countries including India overwhelmingly called on the Trump administration to end its economic, commercial and financial embargo against the Caribbean island, saying the nearly six-decade-long blockade impedes Cuba's right to develop-ment and its ability to participate fully in the global economy

People to people contact holds immense possibilities for fostering better understanding between nations. The international community needs to intensify its efforts to promote an environment free from sanctions and embargoes. India hopes that the embargo will be withdrawn at the earliest," India's Deputy Permanent Representative to the UN Ambassador Tanmaya L al said Wednesday.

Lal was participating the General Assembly session on 'Necessity of ending the economic,

mercial and financial Blockade against Cuba'. The representatives

stressed that the US must heed the Assembly's repeated calls to lift its restrictive policies. Delegates noted that from April 2017 to June this year, the impact of the US embargo on Cuba's foreign trade amounts to more than USD 4 billion

Lal said that every year, the General Assembly rejected the imposi-tion of laws and regulations with extra-territorial impact and all other forms of coercive economic measures that hurt the progress and prosperity of the people the world over.

Last year, 191 member states voted in favour of the resolution, expressing their strong support to lifting of the embargo.

He said the General Assembly has also called upon all states to refrain from promulgating and applying and to repeal and invalidate laws and measures that have extra-territorial effects affecting the sovereignty of other states, in conformity with their obligations under their obligations under the UN Charter and international law.

"There can be little doubt that the continued existence of this embargo, in contravention of the overwhelming world opinion as expressed by

this Assembly, under-mines multilateralism and the credibility of the United Nations itself." Lal said.

said that India stands in solidarity with the General Assembly in its unambiguous rejection of domestic laws having extra-territorial impact. 'Such embargoes have

the effect of impeding the full achievement of economic and social development by the population of the affected country, in particular children and women. They also hin-der the full enjoyment of human rights, including the right to development food, medical care and social services among other things," he said.

Delhi's air quality was on the brink of turning severe Thursday. The overall air quality index was recorded at 393, only seven points shy of falling in the severe category. The Uttar Pradesh gov-

ernment has asked its western districts, close to NCR. to suspend all construction activities between November 1 and 10 and shut for a week industries using coal and biomass fuel to check a rise in air pollution. Vardhan, the Union en-

vironment minister, said the issue of air pollution should not be "politicised" and everyone should give their full cooperation to protect the environment.

He flagged off 52 teams which would monitor violations that may result in rise in air pollution in Delhi.

On Wednesday, the Central Pollution Control Board directed state pollution control bodies Punjab, Haryana and Delhi to start criminal prosecution against agencies or individuals who do not comply with directives to check air pollution.

The largest province of Punjab, which was facing major protests, decided to close down schools for a day and also cancelled supplementary Secondary School Certificate examination.

Private schools Sindh and Khyber-Pakhtunkhwa provinces also remained shut. However, educational institutions were open in Islamabad.

Hospitals were on high alert due to fear of clashes as police and paramilitary forces tried to contain the distur-bance. Long queues of traffic were witnessed in Lahore, Islamabad and other cities due to block-ade of several major roads. Mobile phone and internet services were also suspended in different parts of the country.

There was no offi-cial word on the plan to clear the protesters but security sources said all options were being considered.

"We are ready to take action and restore the writ of the state," a senior police official told PTI.

The Pakistan Inter national Airlines (PIA) advised passengers to report at least four hours prior to their flight de-parture as roads have been blocked in major

cities across the country.
Protests were also
being staged in Gujranwala, Mansehra, Fais-alabad and other cities across the country.

Meanwhile, Bibi's husband Ashiq Masih has

Sri Lankan President Maithripala Sirisena lifts suspension of parliament

COLOMBO, NOV 1 (PTI): Sri Lankan President Maithripala Sirisena has lifted the suspension of parliament and summoned a meeting of the legislature on Monday to end the current political stalemate in the country over the sudden sacking of prime minister Ranil Wickremesinghe, cials said Thursday.

Sirisena replaced Wickremesinghe with former president Mahinda Rajapaksa in a dra-matic turn of events last Friday.

Sirisena also sus-pended Parliament until November 16. which experts said was meant to buy time to engineer crossovers from Wickremesinghe's side to Ra-japaksa in the 225 member parliament to reach

ber parliament to reach the 113 majority mark. He was under in-creasing political and diplomatic pressure to reconvene Parliament and resolve the crisis.

The president has agreed to call a parliamentary session on November 5, officials at Rajapaksa's office said.

Sirisena and parlia-ment Speaker Karu Jayasuria discussed the issue yesterday. Sirisena later indicated that he may call the session next week.

Jayasuriya's office, however, said that seat for the prime minister in the assembly would be reserved for Rajapaksa as the parliamentary officials are bound by the government gazette issued naming as the pre-Sirisena swore in a

new Cabinet under Rajapaksa on Monday despite a warning from the parliament speaker of possible violence if lawmakers were not summoned immediately to resolve the crisis. Wickramasinghe,

He has called for a floor test to prove his majority in parliament. Rajapaksa has so far

One 'black box' recovered from crashed Indonesia iet: official

JAKARTA, Nov 1 (AFP): One black box from a crashed Lion Air jet has been recovered, the head of Indonesia's National Transportation Safety Committee said Thursday, which could be critical to establishing why the brand new plane fell out of the sky.

"We found one of the black boxes," Soerjanto Tjahjono told AFP.

"We don't know vet whether it's the FDR (flight data recorder) or CVR (cockpit voice recorder)." The devic-es record information about the speed, altitude and direction of the plane as well as flight crew conversations

They could be a key piece of evidence in determining why the Boeing-737 MAX 8, which went into service just a few months ago, plunged into the Java Sea off Indonesia's northern coast on Monday, killing 189 people.

Images from the crash site showed two divers swim to a support vessel and place an orange-coloured device into a plastic tub, which was then carried onto the boat.

Despite their name, black boxes are typically bright orange.

Australian nun who angered Duterte to leave Philippines MANILA, OCT 31 (AFP):

An Australian nun who battled a government bid to expel her from the Philippines after she angered President Rodrigo Duterte, said Wednesday she will leave rather than face certain arrest and deportation.

Sister Patricia Fox's abrupt announcement came because immigration authorities refused hours earlier to extend her tourist visa and ordered the 71-year-old out

by Saturday.

Fox, who has spent nearly three decades advocating for the Philippines' poorest, has become a symbol of under-stated resistance during her seven-month admin-

istrative fight to stay.

But with her legal options all but exhausted, the soft-spoken nun decided to return to Australia rather than take the risk of being removed forcibly. "I've been given an

ultimatum that if I don't leave by 3 November, they will send people to chase me," she told AFP. "There is no point being arrested and deported and I don't have any choice." Her supporters condemned the denial and pledged to keep up their legal battle to allow her to return.

"We will not allow the government to forcibly expel Sr. Fox," the National Union of People's Lawyers said in a statement. "Our fight is not yet over."

She apparently angered the president by



ioining a fact-finding mission in April to investigate abuses against farmers, including killings and evictions by soldiers fighting guerrillas in the

southern Philippines.

In Duterte's hometown of Davao, Fox went to see farmers detained on charges of possessing explosives, and attended a press conference by work-ers who were fired after demanding better wages and conditions.

Shortly after that she

was arrested briefly on charges of violating her visa's terms against activism and the slow turning wheels of the Philip pine bureaucracy began moving to strip her of her papers.

It coincided with a

crackdown by Duterte against foreigners whom he accuses of meddling in his nation's affairs.

In April, Manila also expelled Italian Giacomo Filibeck, deputy secretary general of the Party of European Socialists, who had condemned Duterte's ti-drug war.

months later Four Australian rights activist Gill Boehringer, 84, was barred entry for having attended a protest in 2015, allegedly in violation of

immigration laws.

Duterte accused Fox of "disorderly conduct" and said: "Don't let her shameless mouth".

She landed in the Philippines in 1990 as a member of the Sisters of Our Lady of Sion, a congrega-tion of nuns founded in France in 1847 and famed for harbouring Jews flee-ing from Nazi persecution in World War II.

A former practising lawyer who worked with indigent clients in Australia, Fox has said she has been educating landless Filipino farm hands and factory workers about their rights.

Justice Menardo Guevarra told AFP that Fox has to leave the Philippines because her visa will expire, even though the deportation case against her is not re-

Bingeing on Netflix, Prime? You might be an addict, need help

New Delhi, Nov 1 (PTI): Long hours before the screen, bingeing on your favourite show as the night slips into dawn and another day beckons that this all too familiar scenario can spiral into a medically certifiable addiction is already in evidence,

say doctors.

There is increasing anecdotal evidence of people getting hooked to multiple screens television, computer and phone -- with online video streaming platforms like Netflix, Hotstar and Amazon Prime offering entire seasons of television shows and thousands of films at the touch of a button.

Now, in what could be India's first such case, a 26-yearold in Bangalore is being treat-ed for "Netflix addiction".

The young man, being

tional Institute of Mental Health and Neurosciences (NIMHANS), reportedly Health turned to the online video streaming platform to keep himself occupied during a six-month period of unemployment before he realised he just couldn't stop.

"He used to watch (online series) for seven hours, and sometimes it would go up to 10 hours per day. It led to loss of control, withdrawal. When his parents asked him not to watch, he would get angry and irritated," Manoj Kumar Sharma, who is treating the man, told PTI.

Netflix, which came to India two years ago, said they did not have a comment on the incident.

According to Mumbai-based psychologist Har-ish Shetty, addicts of online television can be spotted by their behavioural and view



ing patterns.

Much like drugs, addicts of online television feel the need to watch shows every day, gradually withdrawing their environment. This often results in strained and dysfunctional relationships in both the personal and professional spheres.

One begins to crave for it (shows), getting angry

what he wants. There is very little communication with the people around," Shetty told PTI.

What initially starts as an entertaining activity soon turns into a habit, so much so that addicts begin prioritising television over relationships and work.

Kasturi Roy Bardhan agreed with Shetty's premise. Binge-watching shows,

helped her switch off when something sad or upsetting might be happening in her life. Like the NIMHANS pa-tient, she has, in the past, focused her attention on online shows to shut out reality.

The longest she sat in

front of the screen was when she finished an entire season of the British crime drama Broadchurch . A season comprises eight episodes, each 45 minutes long that's six straight hours of television

watching.

But the UK-based research student said she is not an addict. She admitted to neglecting relationships and work in the past due the kind of time she spent on Netflix, but said she withdrew when she realised the damage it was doing.

A few months ago I was nge watching Downton

said the 28-year-old, has Abbey' instead of writing my dissertation which was due in a month's time. Now, I sit on Netflix once every two days, Bardhan said.
According to comparison

website Finder India, Netflix's India library, which began with 826 titles, is among the most extensive in the world. It now has 4,706 titles -- 3,342 films and 1,364 TV shows.

Research firm Media Partners Asia noted in its July 2018 report that India's online video market, driven by competition among well-cap-italized global and local platforms, was growing rapidly and the trend was expected to continue for the "next three years".

"India's 14 per cent annual growth in video content investment was a standout in 2017," the report stated.

With so many options available at the push of a button, Shetty said people often found themselves in front of their screens for long hours and get anchored to it sooner

than they realise.

Addicts start watching shows through the night, and anchoring happens, he said, adding that the health im-

pacts were dangerous. Media agency Zenith, in its Online Video Forecasts 2018, predicted that consumers of online videos globally were expected to spend an average of 67 minutes a day watching online video this year, up from 56 minutes last vear.

Depression, anxiety, high blood pressure and psychosomatic illnesses are some major consequences of binge

watching.

The NIMHANS patient reported eye strain, and also complained of fatigue, Sharma said.

BENGALURU, Nov 1 (PTI): Richa Chadda despises the term "female-oriented" films but the actor says the phrase will con-tinue to be relatively novel till such movies become a norm. The 31-year-old actor says she started hearing the term
