FALLING DEBRIS AT SETI JHORA BLOCKS NH10 FOR 3 HOURS

KALIMPONG, 19 JUL: National Highway 10 remained closed for about 3 hours this evening when massive amounts of falling debris covered the highway at Seti jhora. Early this morning, there was some debris falling but it had not affected traffic in the area. However, later in the evening, an uprooted tree followed by massive amount of debris toppled down the hill thus covering the entire stretch of the highway below. Two JCB machines of PWD, NH Division, cleared the debris although debris continued to fall. After about 3 hours, one way traffic was restored. Executive Engineer, PWO NH Div, Utttam Pradhan, said that clearing work has been stopped for the night but will resume early in the morning on 20 Jul.

CBI names P Chidambaram, Karti in Aircel-Maxis case charge sheet

New Delhi, Jul 19 (PTI): Congress leader P Chidambaram and his son Karti Chidambaram were today named as accused in a charge sheet filed by the CBI in the Aircel-Maxis deal case in which they have been charged for alleged criminal conspiracy and misconduct.

The agency filed its oplementary charge supplementary sheet before special CBI

judge O P Saini who fixed ification, punishment for it for consideration on July 31.

Besides Chidam-baram and Karti, the CBI named 10 individuals, including public servants, and six companies as accused in the case.

The charge sheet was filed for the alleged offences of criminal conspiracy under the Indian Penal Code (IPC), public servant taking illegal grat-

abetting this offence and public servant committing criminal misconduct under the Prevention of

Corruption Act.


If convicted, the offences entail a maximum punishment of seven years.



The CBI was conduct-

ing probe as to how Chidambaram, who was the finance minister in 2006, granted Foreign Invest-ment Promotion Board (FIPB) approval to a foreign firm when only the Cabinet Committee on Economic Affairs (CCEA)

was empowered to do it.

The senior Congress leader's role had come under the scanner of investigating agencies in the Aircel-Maxis deal of Rs 3.500 crore and INX Media case involving Rs 305 crore. In its charge sheet

filed earlier in the case against former telecom minister Dayanidhi Ma-ran, his brother Kala-nithi Maran and others, the agency had alleged that Chidambaram had granted FIPB approval in March 2006 to Mauri-tius-based Global Communication Services Holdings Ltd, a subsidiary of Maxis.

The Maran brothers and other accused, who were listed in the CBI charge sheet earlier, were discharged by the special court which had said that the agency had failed to produce any material against them to proceed with the trial.

The CBI had alleged in the charge sheet against the Marans that Global Communication Services Holdings Ltd had sought FIPB approval for USD 800 million for which only the CCEA was competent, but Chidam-baram had given approval to the firm in March 2006

It had claimed that the finance minister was competent to accord approval on project proposals of up to Rs 600 crore and proposals beyond this required the approval of the CCEA.

The Enforcement Directorate is also probing a separate money laun-dering case in the Aircel-Maxis deal in which Chidambaram and Karti have been questioned by

the agency.

Both Chidambaram and Karti have denied the allegations levelled against them by the CBI

Remuneration of sport coaches being doubled to Rs 2 lakh

The remuneration of coaches in various sports disciplines would not be limited to Rs one lakh as the government has in-creased the cap to Rs two lakh, the Lok Sabha was informed today.

Responding to supplementaries during Question Hour, Sports Minister Rajyavardhan Singh Rathore said it has been decided to in-crease the cap of remuneration by 100 per cent as the present cap of Rs one lakh was found to be impractical as foreign coaches were charging much more.

Another option being considered is to draft a model law that states can adopt to prevent in-cidents of mob lynching, the functionary said.

"Everything is in the preliminary stage as the entire Supreme Court order asking the Centre to come up with a new

DELHI, JUL 19 law has to be examined," he added. He said it will take several days before the government firms up its stand.

The government may also further strengthen the framework relating to social media to ensure that rumours which may lead to such incidents are Condemning the ris-

ing incidents of lynching in India, the Supreme Court had on Tuesday asked the government to enact a law to deal such cases. A bench headed by Chief Justice Dipak Misra had termed the incidents of lynching "horren-dous acts of mobocracy" which cannot be allowed to become a new norm.

Changes in RTI Act will make it useless, all Indians must oppose move: Rahul

NEW DELHI, JUL 19 (PTI): the Right to Information (RTI) Act will render the law "useless", Congress chief Rahul Gandhi said today and advocated that "every Indian" should oppose the proposed changes, which seek govern-ment control over the salaries and terms of information commissioners.

The BJP wants to hide the truth, Gandhi alleged. The amendments, if cleared

by Parliament, will give the gov-ernment powers to fix tenures, salaries as well as other terms and conditions of service of in-formation commissioners at the Central Information Commis-

Every Indian deserves to know the truth and the BIP wants to hide the truth. The BJP believes the truth must be hid-



den from the people and they must not question people in power. The changes proposed to the RTI will make it a useless Act," Gandhi said on Twitter.

He added that the changes being suggested "must be op-

posed by every Indian". Gandhi tagged a letter by the National Campaign for People's Right to Information, which has challenged the amendments on the ground that they undermine the independence of informa-

tion commissions.

For Real Issues, Look Beyond Averages

Focusing too much on "rates" can distract from the real concerns

ikkim, with a population of barely over 6 lakhs, Sikkim, with a population of barely over 6 lakns, finds itself elated and despondent at frequent intervals when national report cards on economic and social indices are released. Data is invariably crunched on averages and Sikkim's small size, depending on how the data is worked, invariably delivers the State either effusive accolades or embarrassing brickbats. The projections on school dropouts in Sikkim, crime rate and even suicide numbers, when calculated on formulae worked out for national statistics end up projecting prevalence rates which appear much more distressing than they actually are. Make no mistake, all of these are worries, but probably not of the scale that the "rates" project. That is the trick that percentages and averages can play, and as many times that Sikkim has been flustered by such figures, it has also found size-skewed data provide it with reasons to celebrate Fact is that Sikkim's entire population is little more than half the average voter strength of a Lok Sabha constituency, but it has the trappings and largesse of a State, data of percentages and averages then becomes a very unreliable yardstick to measure performances by.

To Sikkim's benefit, its size is so small that report cards in the people's eyes do not need complicated figures or bombastic claims; every change, improvement, success and failure is universally palpable and open to immediate public appraisal or ridicule. That should be the yardstick by which the politicians and executive measure performance and delivery instead of awaiting what the number might register.

Unfortunately, the obsession with statistics has infiltrated these sections as well. Some years ago, too much breath was wasted on the school dropout rates, with the Opposition parties haranguing the government about it and the ruling party and concerned de-partment introducing their own calculations which worked down the rate to a third of what the Union Ministry was claiming. Matters had come to such a pass that the entire debate was centred around the numbers, and were no longer about the trend it recorded. When a debate on discussion gets fixated for too long on the numbers, it can end up inuring the people and the policy makers on the actual issue. In a situation where governments are now bound by law to ensure that every child is in school till the age of 14, any drop-out should be considered too much. When one debates on averages and rates, the limitations of statistics for a small pool come to the fore. The dropout rate debate was about a staggeringly impossible 80+% claimed by Delhi to a dramatically lower 25% claimed by the Department and this was then reflected against the 56% national average. When so juxtaposed, the still jaw-dropping 26% dropout rate somehow becomes acceptable when presented alongside the national average of around 56%. These are old figures and the numbers are comparatively better and much lower now, or so is being claimed. But to continue with the thought – when these numbers were released in 2009-10, the national figure related to the academic record of more than 13 crore students in class I to V. Sikkim, by comparison, was handling 82,992 students from

In the battle for numbers, what ends up getting sidelined is the fact that as per the HRD Department's own records, a decade ago in 2007-08, between 20 to 25 per cent of the students failed in every class between classes I to VIII. This led to dropouts and also reflected on the efficacy of the classrooms. Since then, the no failure rule has come into play, so the question that needs to be asked is whether the now less than desperate dropout rates are more because the shortcomings of the classrooms are taking longer to sink in since children are moving along from class to class? The board exam results usually attract a lot of media attention and analysis, but such consistently high failure rates in beginner classes itself had not been paid much attention to.

What are the schools imparting by way of educa tion if starting from class-I itself, a quarter of the class manages to fail? Let's accept for now that they would fail because nothing much has improved by way of how the schools are staffed. These are the more important questions which one expects the people's representatives to raise and debate and take the Department and school managements to task for. But that is not happening. And that is because Sikkim continues to refuse to look beyond the averages to notice the real issues.

The rescued Thai boys are considering becoming monks — here's why

theconversation.com After their dramat-ic rescue from Nang Non cave, 12 Thai boys and their soccer coach mourning the loss of a Thai Navy SEAL, Sa-man Gunan, who died during the rescue ef-forts. The father of one of the boys said that in order to pay tribute to the Navy SEAL, many boys are SEAL, man, considering ten. wilv becoming

Ordaining as a full monk – known as "bhikkhu" in Pali, the religious language of the Theravada Buddhism

over 20. The boys would instead be ordained as novices, or "nen," who undergo fewer restrictions. Additionally, at least one of the boys is Christian, and would likely not be ordained as a monk

But in the wake of the rescue efforts, the act of ordaining is not surprising. In Theravada Buddhist practice, ordaining to be a monk and donating the nerit thus gained is one of the greatest honors that a person can give to another.

MONASTICISM IN THAI LIFE

Monks in Southeast Asia, with their saffron robes and shaven heads, are iconic. They can be seen on the roadside with alms bowls, accepting handfuls of rice from villagers in early morning processions, or gathered in the evenings chanting Pali scriptures in the Buddhist temples that lie at the heart of most Thai villages. In my own research, I spent hours talking with monks – from abbots of major temples to those who had been ordained for a short

I also met monks engaged in "magical" activities such as healing, to those who saw their role as scholars. My first impression, like that of many travelers, was of a group of men seeking enlightenent through isolation from the world.

Indeed, this isolation is at the core of Buddhist teachings. For Buddhists, worldly desires lead to suffering. Therefore, cessation of desires can lead to happiness and eventually enlightenment.

But monks are not a homogeneous group. Buddhists join the monkhood – the sangha - for many different reasons, only some of which are related to achieving transcendence and enlightenment. While some may choose to remain monks for their entire lives, most Buddhists ordain for a limited period. Thai Buddhists with whom I've worked have ordained for a few months during childhood, for the length of the rainy season, or even just for a day before undertaking a dangerous journey or follow ing the death of a parent.

Buddhism, as it is practiced in Thailand, ad-

dresses many worldly needs. It takes into consideration the lives of people who are not necessarily ready to renounce the world quite yet.

MONASTIC EDUCATION

Before the advent of government-run schools in the late 19th century, the Buddhist temple was the key institution for the education of young boys in Thailand. Boys as young as 5 entered the temple to learn to read and write, and to study the basics of Buddhism.

When Theravada came to Southeast Asia from India in the second millennium A.D., replacing local versions of Hinduism and Mahayana Buddhism, this religious focus on promoting education within the village was revolutionary, as it became a central part of village life.

Theravada was focused not on the trappings of kingship and rule, but on serving communities. The temple in the center of the village served as the chool, fairgrounds, hostel and welfare office in addition to its role as a religious center.

Today, this role of educating Thai boys has largely been replaced by government-run schools. This transition has allowed for the education of

But some Buddhist schools remain, especially in Thailand's North, that keep a focus on mostly men's religious education. They teach the local Northern Thai script (distinct from Central Thai

and largely fallen out of use) in addition to the religious languages of Pali and Sanskrit KARMA AND MERIT But education is not the only reason to seek to be ordained.

Most Thai men get ordained in order to make merit – known as "tham bun." Devoting oneself to the study of the Buddha's teachings, the dhar-ma, is one of the most holy acts that one can do. Buddhists who get ordained are believed to acquire a great deal of bun, or merit.

For Buddhists, this life is but one in a cy-

cle of deaths and re-births, where the good deeds one does in the past determine where and in what form - human, animal, divine being – one is reborn. Eventually, over many lifetimes, enough knowledge and merit will allow for escape from this cycle and transcendence.

But as anthropologist Lucien Hanks described, in Thai religious system, practitioners can donate and receive merit from others. Normally, the recipient of the merit are parents. It is a way to thank them for their sacrifices.

In the case of the 12 boys and their coach, however, they are offering the merit they will make to Officer Saman, in order to ensure a better rebirth in his next life.

THE OBLIGATION OF A DEBT

Like many languages, Thai has certain concepts that do not translate well into English. One of these, "krengjai," refers to the feeling of obligation toward someone who has given a gift too great to repay. It

is a heavy feeling.
For observers, it is easy to imagine the gratitude that the boys must feel to Officer Saman, but it is just as easy to overlook the sense of responsibility that must weigh on the boys as well. As the classic anthropological theorist Marcel Mauss pointed out, gifts come with obligations, and the sacrifice of a

In this way, the boys are likely becoming monks not to reflect upon their own fate or experience in the cave. Rather, they are doing this to repay Saman's sacrifice with the greatest gift that they can

Why Indonesia should not bar ex-offenders from running for public office

Gearing up for Indonesia's elections next year, the General Election Commission (KPU) passed the 2019 Legislative Election Regulation. This prohibits people who had been convicted of corruption, drug traf-ficking and child sexual violence from running in the election.

According to KPU, these crimes are "extraordinary and have damaging effects to the society".

These crimes are severe. But, un-der Indonesia's often flawed criminal justice system, taking away ex-offenders' right to run for office by means of regulation could undermine our democracy and preclude a group of people from having a chance to serve

NEVER-ENDING PUNISHMENT

Deprivation of certain rights, including the right to hold public office, is not a new feature in Indonesian criminal law. Under the Criminal Code, a judge can bar a perpetrator of a crime from holding public office as an additional form of punishment.

But, in addition to the Criminal

Code, a number of laws also bar ex-offenders from working in the public sector. Several laws in Indonesia bar convicted criminals from serving as police officers, judges, prosecutors, judicial commissioners, or other government-related" positions, even

As for legislators, the 2008 Law on Legislative Election requires law-makers to never have been convicted of a crime that carries a penalty of

more than five years in prison.

These laws mean that even though someone has already been sentenced

that sentence, the state continues to punish the person by taking away certain civil rights. Punishing ex-offenders via legislation disregards due process of law, and is given without objective considerations

CONSTITUTIONAL

COURT RULING
In 2009 the Constitutional Court gave a decision on a review of the Legislative Election Law that was requested by Robertus, who could not run in the 2009 legislative election in West Sumatra because he had been sentenced to nine years and eight months in

prison in 1976 for violent theft.

Reviewing Robertus's case, the court ruled that ex-offenders deserved a right to be elected to public office under certain conditions:

- they have to wait five years after
- their release before running
 they must announce to the pub lic prior to their campaign that they re convicted criminals

they are not repeat offenders or recidivists.

The court only decided on the right to run for elected positions

(lawmakers, president, local leaders) where the public has the power to vote candidates in or out. Ex-offend-ers still could not serve in appointed positions such as a cabinet minister, a commissioner, or expert staff.

With this year's legislative elec-

tion regulation, the KPU is creating exceptions to the Constitutional Court decision for corruption, child sexual violence and drug trafficking.

FLAWED CRIMINAL JUSTICE SYSTEM

The KPU ruling is problematic because our criminal justice system is imperfect and often carried out un-

fairly.

Stealing or misappropriating money for personal profit is wrong and can impact the country's devel-opment. But a number of people have to bear the status of being a corruptor due to disjointed legislation that conflates state losses and company losses. For instance, a former director of state-owned airline Merpati, Hotasi Nababan, was sentenced to prison for a business judgment that went awry and was deemed to cause state

Child sexual violence sounds irredeemably wrong when we imagine an adult taking advantage of their power over a helpless child. But often in Indonesia those who are convicted of child sexual violence are children themselves. They date and have consensual sex. And the parent, often of the girl, who finds out about the sexual relationship reports the boy to the police. The boy then gets convicted for exploring his sexuality with his girlfriend and carries that with him for the rest of his life.

And, lastly, we have the case of drug trafficking. Many drug users who should be rehabilitated are given a label drug trafficker by a judge because the very vague prohibitions on possession of drugs under the Nar-cotics Law mean a drug user could be categorised as a drug trafficker

HELPING EX-OFFENDERS RE-ENTER SOCIETY

Legal expert Anthony C. Thompson argues that the government and legal community should provide sufficient tools to help ex-offenders re-enter their communities. While the gov-ernment could provide re-integration programmes, lawyers, courts and schools could collaborate to offer innovative and non-conventional assistance with such programmes. With these interventions, ex-offenders will have better prospects of not going back to the criminal circles and can reinvent themselves as members of society.

Removing an ex-felon's right to hold public office is the reverse of the intervention that Thompson proposes. And it will result in Indonesia poes. And it will result int tentially precluding a large number turn to 05

ITANAGAR, IUL 19 (PTI): The Arunachal Pradesh government has handed over the probe into the death of former MLA Ngurang Pinch eight months ago to the CBI, official sources said today.

The government's decision to hand over the case to the central investigating agency was communicated to the CBI director by state Home Commissioner A C Verma yesterday, the sources

The letter termed the case as "serious and sen-sitive" and said despite handing it over the case to crime branchs special investigating team (SIT) nothing conclusive emerged from the probe even after seven months since the case was trans-

"Further, there are representations from public to transfer the case to CBI," the letter

read.

The body of Pinch, who was the chairman of Arunachal Pradesh Agri-culture Marketing Board, was found floating in a river in Papum Pare dis-trict on November 18 last year. He was on a rafting expedition along with eight others the previous day and had stayed on the river bank near the confluence of the Popum and the Poma rivers.

The MLA was found missing on that day and on searching his body was found floating in the river between Basar Nallo and Rana Ghat on the Assam side.
Pinch's family mem-

bers have alleged that his death was a well-planned murder and demanded that the CBI take over the probe from the SIT as the state crime branch failed to act against a few people.

Bora urges Home Minister to intervene in NRC updating process

GUWAHATI, JUL 19 (PTI): Assam Pradesh Congress president Committee Ripun Bora today urged Union Home Minister Rajnath Singh to intervene in the National Register of Citizenship (NRC) up-

dating process.

Bora, in a letter to Singh, alleged that the NRC Authority is "acting in a partisan" manner to drop the names of lakhs of Indian citizens from the draft NRC.

"We have received in-puts from different parts of the state that names of several lakh Indian cit-izens will find no place in the draft NRC due to political interference by the state government as they wanted to misuse the NRC for their political gain by creating religious polarisation," he said.

Bora, a Rajya Sabha MP, alleged that some people belonging to the minority community had gone to different parts of the state to work as labourers and some local people had lodged complaint against them in police stations that they were foreigners.

"Now, the NRC state Coordinator has for-warded all such cases registered in different police stations long back against those Indian cit-izens to the verification officers of the concerned NRC Seva Kendra with instruction to delete these names from the Draft NRC without any verification of their records, he claimed.

Apart from keeping on hold the names of 1.25 lakh D-Voters and their descendents, names of approximately 90,000 declared foreigners and their descendents will not appear in the draft NRC to be published by 30th July 2018, he claimed.

"There is panic on this issue everywhere in Assam and if names of several lakhs genuine Indian citizens are left out, it will not only be an injustice but abuse of Constitutional powers," Bora said.

He urged the Union Home Minister to intervene immediately in the matter before publication of the Draft NRC on 30th July.

Bodies of 8 of 19 missing fishermen recovered from Bay of Bengal

KOLKATA, JUL 19 (PTI): The Indian Coast Guard (ICG) has recovered the bodies of eight of the 19 fishermen, who went missing on Monday after their trawlers capsized in the Bay of Bengal, a top ICG official said here today.

"The bodies have been handed over to the fishermen's associations for identification," ICG Inspector General (North East region) K S Sheoran said. Six bodies were recovered today,

while two were found yesterday, he

The bodies were found from an area in the sea, about 35 nautical miles from the Dalhousie island, and a Dornier aircraft and Coast Guard ship "Sujay" remaining missing fishermen, Sheoran said.

A hovercraft was also maintaining vigil close to the coast, he added.

The fishermen had ventured into the sea from Frazerganj in South 24 Parganas district.
Fishing trawler FB Joykishan had

capsized amid an extremely rough sea condition and inclement weather on Monday, following which the searchand-rescue operation was launched by the Coast Guard.

The members of fishermen's associations also assisted in the search-andrescue operation.

"The Coast Guard station at Frazerganj is co-ordinating with the fishermen's associations in the area and is also in touch with the families of the missing persons," Sheoran said.

The search operation would continue till all the missing fishermen were accounted for, he added.

Meanwhile, fishermen have been advised not to venture into the sea due to the prevailing inclement weather, rough sea condition and a fresh depression developing over Northeast Bay of Bengal, Sheoran said.

Six to seven trawlers carrying men from the Namkhana and Kakdwip ar-eas of South 24 Parganas had set sail around 10 am on Monday, Bijan Maity, Secretary, West Bengal United Fisher men Association, said.

Three of the boats -- FB Malleshwar, FB Joykishan and FB Maa Shibani -- capsized in the sea.

Ten fishermen on board FB Jovkishan, six on board FB Malleshwar a three more, who were on other trawlers, had gone missing, Maity said.

The state has power to govern people, including the power to restrict ex-offenders' right to hold public

But, instead of creating laws that restrict the rights of their subjects - in this case, ex-offenders the best way to put all interests in equal place is by using judicial process. Let the judge examine facts,

and cases, and decide whether it is good or not to expunge the offend-er's right to hold office.

More importantly, the judge also needs to explicitly mention the time limit during which ex-offenders cannot exercise those particular rights. That mechanism perhaps will put justice at its noble table. In the end, the state should show more confidence in its citizens to choose their own representatives, whether they were a criminal or not.

England spinners out-bowled Kuldeep and Chahal: Tufnell

LONDON, JULY 19 (PTI): England may have cracked the Kuldeep Yadav code, but former left-arm spinner Phil Tufnell savs India will be better playing him in the

Test series as well, hav-

ing done the good thing by picking the "rare" tal-ent in the five-day squad. Tufnell was full of praise for Yadav, marking

him as a rarity.

"You don't come across too many left-arm wrist spinners. There are a few leg spinners around across all formats. Kuldeep is a rare bowler. When you come across his type of bowling, you need to really work it out because it is something you haven't seen before. It is a special thing, and a rarity really," said Tufnell.

When asked if Yadav should be in the playing eleven for the first Test starting in Birmingham on August 1, he replied, "I would definitely play

"It's a good thing India haven't sent Kuldeep home. Just look at the weather we have had. I think it is set to be similarly fair for the next month or so.

So you never know India might even play three spinners depending on pitches and their nbinations.

"India have three world class spinners in their Test squad, but I would definitely think of Kuldeep. I would want him hanging close around the English batsmen." he added.

With a 2-1 win in the ODI series, England un-

derlined their status not only as the world's number one ranked ODI side but also the tag of favourites going into the 2019 ODI World Cup.

"This series was a bit about bragging rights. England can raise their neck a bit. You could have said the same about India as well. Beating England here would have given them a bit of upman-ship if they meet next year.

"And I think they will, because these two sides are poised to make it far in the World Cup. They would meet in a semi-fi-nal or final for sure. They are two very good sides, batting deep and possessing clever wicket-taking bowlers.

"So I can see these two teams progressing far in the World Cup. If they meet in the final, it will be a cracker jack. It is a game we would all want to see," he said.

Tufnell has said that the hosts won the ODI series because their spinners Adil Rashid and Moeen Ali outperformed Indian spinners.

Kuldeep Yadav took 6-25 in the first ODI at Nottingham, but then returned 3/68 and 0/55 in the next two matches at Lord's and Leeds. Yuzvendra Chahal managed only 2/135 across the three games.

In comparison, Adil Rashid and Moeen Ali shared eight wickets between them to bowl England to victory. Rashid, in particular, was quite impressive with hauls of 2-38 and 3-49 in the last two games where the In-dian batting faltered.

He bowled a ripper Indian skipper rat Kohli at Headingley, who was bowled and left stunned as the ball turned sharply from leg to take the off stump. That dismissal changed the course of the third ODI as India went on to lose the series 2-1.

"Indian batsmen are very adept at playing spin bowling and have done so all their lives (But) Rashid and Ali have a very good partnership going at the moment. They are very experienced in one-day cricket and were top of their game with some really dry weather here,"

Tufnell said.

"Plus, the pitches have been turning. If the pitches are turning, you have always got a chance as a spin bowler and it doesn't matter who you are playing against.

2024 Paris Olympics.
The next Winter The next Winter Olympics will now include: women's mono-bob, Big Air freestyle skiing for men and women. plus mixed team events in short track speed skating, ski jumping, ski aerials and snowboardcross.

IOA meet to discuss Ministry's proposal on relaxing Asiad selection criteria

NEW DELHI, JUL 19 (PTI): The Indian Olympic Association (IOA) has called meeting of its Core and Legal Committees tomorrow to decide its future course of action after the Sports Ministry asked it to relax the Asian Games selection norms for better medal prospects.

The sports ministry yesterday urged the IOA to relax selection norms in specific cases "in the larger interest of the sports and sportspersons" after concerns were raised by various athletes and teams that have missed the

The ministry said the Olympic body in consultation with particular federations may reassess the earlier decision on sending entries if those ineligible disciplines have performed consistently for six months but not made it due to lack of exposure and at the same time have strong chance of finishing in the top four.

The recent circular has put the IOA in a dilemma and the Olympic body has decided to discuss the matter with its Core and Legal Committee before re-

nding to the sports ministry.
"We have called a meeting of out Core Committee and Legal Committee tomorrow morning at 11 am to discuss the matter and see how to take forward the Ministry's proposal," IOA secretary general Rajeev Mehta told PTI.

The meeting will also be attended by IOA president (Narinder Batra) and chairman of Preparation Panel (Lalit

Bhanot). We will have to discuss the matter extensively and see what can be

The IOA official, however, admitted that it would be tough to convince the Asian Games orgainsers for late inclusions as the last date of entries by name was June 30.

'We will have to take a decision on the Ministry's proposal. But it has come too late. If we decide on sending more athletes, whether to accept our request or not, rests on the Asian Games Or-gainsing Committee," he said.

To make matters worse for the IOA. the draws of some sports, including football, have already been announced and it is highly unlikely that the Indian contingent will be accepted at this

contingent earlier this month leading to a massive controversy as they left out football fr low rankings and the entire four-member triathlon team for

furnishing "misleading information".

The IOA then dropped 20 athletes from the Pencak Silat team, alleging fake credentials, prompting the national federation to threaten legal action.

The men's handball team was cleared at the expense of Pencak Silat athletes after the federation knocked the doors of Allahabad High Court.

In the original squad announced by IOA, six Sambo athletes - two male and four female - were included but the number was later cut to just one.

Ahead of China, India to remain fastest growing economy in FY19 & FY20: ADB

NEW DELHI, JULY 19 (PTI): India will continue to be the fastest growing major economy, ahead of China, with 7.3 per cent growth rate in 2018-19 and 7.6 per cent in 2019-20, the Asian Development Bank (ADB) said today.

The growth in India will be driven by increased public spending, higher capaci-ty utilisation rate and uptick in private investment, said its supplement to the Asian Development Outlook (ADO). While retaining India's growth rate for

current fiscal and the next. ADO said economic growth in China will decelerate to 6.6 per cent in 2018 and further to 6.4 per cent in 2019. China's growth rate was 6.9 per cent in 2017.

On India, it said: "In sum, the GDP growth forecast for FY2018 (ending March 2019) is maintained at 7.3 per cent. Growth in FY2019 is expected to rise to 7.6 per cent as measures taken to strengthen the banking system bolster private investment and as benefits kick in from the goods and services tax. Any fur-ther increase in oil prices poses a downside risk to growth.

ADB said India is the dominant economy in the South Asia sub-region with its growth gaining momentum at 7.7 per cent in the last quarter ended March of 2017-18, the highest rate of growth since first quarter of 2016-17.

This pushed full-year growth to 6.7 per cent (2017-18), a tad higher than estin ed in ADO 2018, largely driven by government spending for both consumption and public administration.
"In the first half of 2018-19, the growth

rate is expected to benefit from a low base. Other key drivers of growth include an uptick in public consumption, which is typical before elections, and a recovery in exports following shortages of working capital related to a new goods and services

tax," said the ADO supplement.

In India, the private consumption is expected to grow at a healthy rate as disruption caused by demonetisation in 2016 fades. Capacity utilisation rates are at their highest in 4 years and should pro-

vide incentives to firms to invest.

Growth in Asia and the Pacific's developing economies for 2018 and 2019 will

remain solid as it continues apace across the region, despite rising tensions be-tween the US and its trading partners.

"South Asia, meanwhile, continues to be the fastest growing sub-region, led by India, whose economy is on track to meet fiscal year 2018 projected growth of 7.3 per cent and further accelerating to 7.6 per cent in 2019, as measures taken to strengthen the banking system and tax re-form boost investment," it said further. Developing Asia is largely on track to

meet growth expectations as set out in April in Asian Development Outlook 2018 (ADO 2018), said the report. The regional gross domestic product (GPP) is forecast to expand by 6 per cent in 2018 and 5.9 per cent in 2019, the rate envisaged in April, ADO supplement said. In April, ADO had said that India's

economic growth will rise to 7.3 per cent this fiscal and further to 7.6 per cent in the next financial year, retaining the fastest-growing Asian economy tag, on back of GST and banking reforms.

"Although rising trade tensions remain a concern for the region, protectionist trade

measures implemented so far in 2018 have not significantly dented buoyant trade flows to and from developing Asia, said ADB Chief Economist Yasuvuki Sawada

"Prudent macroeconomic and fiscal policy-making will help economies across the region prepare to respond to external shocks, ensuring that growth in the region remains robust," he said.

ADO has also retained the combined growth forecast for the major industrial economies -- the US, the Euro zone and Japan -- as growth in the US and the Euro area remains robust. In Japan, though, unanticipated contraction in the first quarter prompts slight revision of the 2018 growth forecast, it added.

However, ADB said that the rise in pro tectionist trade measures from the US and countermeasures from China and other countries "poses a clear downside risk to the outlook for developing Asia".

The ADO supplement has factored in

the tariffs imposed by July 15.

"The risk of further ratcheting up of protectionist measures could undermine consumer and business confidence and

thus developing Asia's growth prospects.

On price rise front, ADO has raised the South Asia inflation forecast to 5 per cent from 4.7 per cent, mainly to accommodate an increase in the forecast for India, but kept at 5.1 per cent for 2019

"The upgrade in the 2018-19 inflation forecast for India from 4.6 per cent to 5 per cent responds to higher oil prices, significant depreciation of the Indian rupee in the past few months, and generous increases announced on 4 July in minimum support prices for summer crops," the ADO said. For developing Asia, it has revised down inflation projections from 2.9 per cent to 2.8 per cent in 2018 and from 2.9 per cent to 2.7 per cent in 2019 citing domestic factors to help contain inflation-

"As the US monetary policy normalises, central banks in the region act to spare their currencies' sharp depreciation and to subdue inflation. Further, some governments have reintroduced subsidies to contain the effects of rising food and oil

NEW YORK, JUL 19 (PTI): Facebook has said it will start removing fake news and misinformation after mounting criticism that the flow of ru mours on its platform sparked violence and led to physical harm to people in countries around the world, including in India, according to media reports.

Presently, Facebook bans

content that directly calls for violence but the new policy will cover fake news that has the potential to stir up physical harm which includes both written posts and manipulated images, CNET reported.

Facebook has been ac-cused of helping to spur violence in Myanmar, Sri Lanka



and India. The social network also has drawn intense criticism for its policies surrounding misinformation in general. The social network said last week that it would not ban InfoWars, a right-wing website

known for pushing conspiracy theories, the report said.

In India, Facebook-owned messaging service WhatsApp is facing the flak for allowing the circulation of large number of irresponsible messages

ocation that has led to grow-ing instances of lynching of innocent people.

The company will work with local organisations to help judge which posts fall under that category. If Face-book can't make a definitive call working with one organisation, it might bring in other organizations to help, the report said.



LONDON, JULY 19 (PTI): An Indian-origin landlord in the UK has been jailed for 12 months over his failure to ensure proper fire safety standards which led to the death of two children in a fire at a property owned and managed by him, the first prosecution of its kind in the country since new smoke alarm regulations were intro-

duced in October 2015. Kamal Bains, a letting agent responsible for the property in Huddersfield area of West Yorkshire, failed to fit smoke alarms to the house for tenants.

The 51-year-old was sen-

tenced at Leeds Crown Court yesterday in what is believed to be the first prosecution of its kind in the UK since new Smoke and Carbon Monoxide Alarm (England) Regulations were introduced in October

"Failing to adhere to the legislation is a criminal offence and one which can have tragic consequences," said Senior Investigating Officer Detective Superintendent Steve Thomas, who led the investigation into the deaths of three-year-old Logan Taylor and Jake Casey, aged two in February 2016

"During an examination of the property after the incident, there were no signs of smoke alarms having being present prior to the fire. There was also no evidence to suggest a smoke alarm had ever been fixed to the upstairs ceiling and only a fixing bracket was present downstairs," he said.

Bains had been on trial at Leeds Crown Court after pleading not guilty to charges of manslaughter of the boys, who were overcome by smoke after a fire started in their bedroom. But mid-way through the trial, he pleaded guilty to a lesser charge of failing to discharge an employer's general duty owed under Section 3 (1) of the UK's Health and Safety at Work Act 1974.

The letting agent, whose company was in charge of the rented property, had been charged by West Yorkshire Police last year in relation with the fatal fire, arising from his ciliurate to the property of the failure to ensure that working smoke alarms were installed at the address where the family

were living.

Bains was repeatedly asked by the tenants to carry out repairs to the address, including the installation of smoke alarms since they moved into the house in May 2015.

The fire was believed to have started as a consequence of an electrical fault in equipment which was in the young boys' bedroom. The two boys were asleep in their bedroom when devices, including a television set alight, and proved fatal for the two boys who were overcome by smoke.

The boys' parents, Emma Taylor and Jamie Casey, expressed relief at the end of the court proceedings after a "long and painful process".

Indian student Koppu's killer had long criminal record in US

WASHINGTON, JUL 19 (PTI): The man who killed 25-year-old Indian student Sharath Koppu in Kansas City had an extensive criminal background and was just 15 when he was first arrested, according to a media

report. Marlin James Mack, 25, who was shot dead on Sunday after shooting three Kansas City police officers, was first arrested in Tulsa, Oklahoma, when he was 15 for breaking into cars and two years later he was held again for bringing a gun to school, the Kansas City Star reported.

At 17, he was sentenced to prison for five years for robbing a woman at gunpoint in front of

her three small children.

Though Mack was
once known as one of Tulsa's most wanted rob-bers, Kansas City police were not aware of him before he became the lead suspect in the killing of Koppu, who hailed

from Telangana. Koppu, a Universi-ty of Missouri-Kansas City student, was fatal-ly shot on July 6 in the back during a suspected attempted robbery at a restaurant where he worked in Missouri.

was pretty much a liar and misfit extraordiand misfit extraordi-naire, David Walker of the Tulsa Police Department, who had interviewed Mack in 2011, told the daily.

For his first arrest, in

2009, Mack was charged with robbery by force.
Despite Mack's young

age, he already had a rep-utation for violence, the daily said quoting the police officer.

He was sentenced to five years in prison for second-degree robbery, possession of a firearm as a juvenile and two counts of assault with a dangerous weapon. In March, 2015, Mack

was released from pris-on. Just seven months later, he returned to prison for carrying a firearm after a former conviction of a felony. He was released in February, 2017.

Despite his extensive

criminal record in Oklahoma, he had never come to the attention of Kansas City police. He became a person of interest in the shooting death of Koppu, a software engineer who had come to the US in January to pursue his master's degree. Mack's father is serv-

ing a life sentence for shooting two people in the head in 2000.

White House considering Putin proposal to let Russia interrogate ex-US ambassador, financier

Washington, Jul 19 (PTI): President Donald Trump will discuss allowing Russian investigators to come to the US to question American citizens, including a former ambassador to Russia, in exchange for assistance in the ongoing US probe into election interference, the White House has said.

President Vladimir Putin during a press conference with Trump in Helsinki on Monday proposed that special counsel Robert Mueller's team could travel to Russia to question 12 Russian intelligence of-ficers charged with interfering in the 2016 presidential election, if Russia is allowed to interrogate some Americans.

The Americans wanted for question ing by Russia include Michael McFaul, who was ambassador to Russia from Jan-uary 2012 to February 2014, and American-born financier Bill Browder, who lobbied the US government to impose new sanctions on Moscow.

Trump had described Putin's proposal

as an "incredible" offer.
White House Press Secretary Sarah

Sanders yesterday indicated that no final decision had been made but that the proposal was under consideration.

"There was some conversation about it, but there wasn't a commitment made on behalf of the US, and the president will work with his team and we'll let you know

if there's an announcement on that front, Sanders told reporters.
Russian prosecutors are seeking to in-

terview McFaul and 10 other "U.S. officials and intelligence agents" in connection with their case against Browder.

Russian prosecutors accused the fi-

nancier of laundering USD 1.5 billion through offshore accounts and donating USD 400,000 of that sum to Hillary Clinton's 2016 presidential campaign
