Delhi's air quality was most deadly in 2016 in 2 decades, reduced life expectancy by 10 years: Study

New Delhi. Nov 19 (PTI): During the past two decades, Delhi's air quality was the "most deadly" in 2016 as it reduced the life expectancy of a resident by more than 10 years, a new study said Monday, asserting that the national capital was the second among 50 most polluted areas of the country.

India is today the world's second most-polluted country, trailing only Nepal, it said and pointed out that loss of life expectancy was the highest in Asia, exceeding six years in many parts of India and China.

According to air quality life index and accompanying report produced by the Energy Policy Institute at the University of Chicago (EPIC), globally particulate pollution reduces average life expectancy by 1.8 years, making it the greatest global threat to human health. "By comparison, first-hand cigarette smoke leads to a reduction in global average life expectancy of about 1.6

years," it said. "The impact of particulate pollution on life expectancy is comparable to that of smoking, twice that of alcohol and drug use, three times that of unsafe water, five times that of HIV/AIDS, and more than 25 times that of conflict and terrorism," it said.

Speaker allows 2 MLAs more time to respond in disqualification case

wo of the seven sit-I ting MLAs of Sikkim Democratic Front party, who are facing disqualification proceedings before the Speaker, were allowed more time to file their response as they are in mourning due to demise of family members.

While hearing the petitions filed by Pahal Man Subba, former MP, and Navin Kiran Pradhan & Others seeking disqualification of seven MLAs who had joined SDF in 2015, on anti-defection ground, the Speaker of Sikkim Legislative Assembly today accepted the reply filed by five MLAs and allowed the two MLAs to file their responses later.

Counsel, N Rai, for respondents sought time on the behalf of Rangpo-Pendam MLA, Gopal Baraily, who is in mourning after demise of his mother and Rhenock MLA, Hemendra Adhikari, who is also in mourning after demise of his grandmother.

In the meantime, two more applications were also filed before the SLA Sikkim Krantikari Morcha and Independent MLA, Rup Narayan Chamling, seeking disqualification on the same grounds.

The Speaker allowed their applications and issued notice to the seven MLAs - Ugen Nedup Bhutia, Shyam Pradhan, Hemendra Adhikari. Pintso Chopel Lepcha, Dr. Mechung Bhutia, Gopal Baraily and Timothy William Basnett and directed them to file their responses by 07 Jan 2019.

The Sikkim High Court on 25 Aug, last year had struck down the Parliamentary Secretaries Appointment and Allowances Act, 2010 as unconstitutional after Pahalman Subba and others including the principal opposition party, Sikkim Krantikari Morcha, had petitioned the court.

Striking down the Sikkim Parliamentary Secretaries Appointment, Salaries, Allowances and Provi-Miscellaneous sions Act, 2010, the divi-

sion bench had observed that Article 194 does not expressly authorise the State Legislature to create offices such as the one in question giving liberty to the petitioners to appropriate forum on the issues of disqualification and other related issues if advised so.

In light of the above judgment, Pahalman Subba, OP Bhandari and Navin Kiran Pradhan had petitioned the Governor seeking disqualification of 14 sitting legislators as Parliamentary Secretaries, Government Chief Whip, Chairman of Public **Accounts Committee and** Chairperson of Estimate Committee on grounds of holding 'office of profit' and availing oth-

er benefits. Later, the then Governor Shrinivas Patil on the recommendation of the Election Commission of India [ECI] had ruled that they will not be disqualified for holding office of profit as the offices occupied by them are not offices under the government or fall under the exempted category.

Defence Pension Adalat held for first time in Gangtok

The 161 Defence Pension Adalat [DPA] kicked off today at Defence Auditorium organized by the Principal Controller of Defence Account [Pension], Allahabad in collaboration with Army Formation, Headquarter 17 Mountain Division, Gangtok, informs a press release.

The Additional Controller General of Defence Account [CGDA], Sanjiv Mittal who was the chief guest inaugurated the two-day 161 Defence Pension Adalat.

Six including one-yr-old killed in fatal road mishap

Six people were killed in a fatal road accident that took place at Lower Tarku in South Sikkim on 18 Nov evening.

Driver of the vehicle, Bhim Rai [30] along with Chandra Bahadur Gurung [48] and Nar Bahadur Gurung [58] died on the spot while Tilak Gurung [45], Nar Maya Gurung [45] succumbed to their injuries at Namchi District Hospital. One-year-old Joel Gurung died at Central Referral Hospital in Gangtok.

The vehicle [Mahindra Max[bearing registration number SK/01/J/0888 carrying 12 occupants reportedly tumbled 350 ft below the road near Mangley at Lower Tarku in South Sikkim. The vehicle was plying towards Yangang from Namthang after attending a marriage cere-

Other injured occupants are Nirman Gurung [37], Dil Rupa Gurung [28], Man Bahadur Gurung [30], Dawa Diki Gurung [22], Devi Lal Gurung [05], Aukshana Gurung [04] and Tanush Gurung. They are admitted at Singtam Hospital for treatment.

- Earnest money deposit @ 2.50% in State Bank of Sikkim shall be in the form of Deposit Receipt of Schedule Bank which includes deposits in the form of temporary deposit receipts(TDR) in favour of the Accounts Officer, Roads & Bridges Department, Niram Bhawan, Gangtok. - The Department reserves the rights to with hold payments to the contractor unless 12. test certificates are not produces by the contractor when called upon to do so.
- 13. Avoidable damages due to negligence of the contractor shall be at his own risk and cost. The Department shall not be liable for payment of such damages (if any), including accidents to labourer at site.
- 14. The offer shall remain valid for a period of 90 days. The work should commence within 15 days from the issue of work order.
- 15. All the conditions as mentioned in the NIT shall be deemed to a part of the agreement to be entered with the contractor. Security deposit shall be collected by deductions from the running bills of the contractor @ 5.00% of the value of work done.
- 16. The Department reserves the right to accept or reject any or all tenders without assigning any reason thereof.

Waste Does Not Understand Urban-Rural Boundaries

...so why should the two zones have different garbage management plans?

Readers would have noticed the occasional surfacing of news-reports on awareness sessions being held at the GPU and ward levels around Sikkim in pursuit of zero-waste status.

This is welcome and urgently required.

It was after all not fair that lavish budgets were expended on waste management limited to the urban sprawls at the cost of 75% of the population which resides in rural Sikkim. 4.55 lakh of Sikkim's population of 6.07 lakh resides in rural areas. This, as per the 'Provisional Population Totals' [paper 2, volume 2 of 2011] Rural-Urban Distribution of Population Sikkim [series 12] released by the Directorate of Census Operations, Sikkim. And this is after the urban spread was significantly expanded in Sikkim some years back. The point being made here is that the 75% population which resides in rural Sikkim lives more or less the same lifestyle as families in urban areas, following similar patterns of consumption, and hence generating similar waste. They should thus be provided matching organizational and infrastructural arrangements to manage their waste. The traditional modes of disposal will not deliver for the non-biodegradable and excessive nature of contemporary waste. Most village homes have a pit to dispose their waste. When this waste was organic in nature, the 'pit' approach worked well, but kids no longer buy loose balls of 'Anda' mithai wrapped in paper anymore and their sweets come in plastic wrappers and guests at social gatherings are no longer served in plates stitched from 'malatho' or banana leaves and even drink water from Styrofoam cups (sorry, scratch that since Styrofoam is now thankfully banned in the State, but plastic still abound) now.

The traditional waste management system, which focused only on household level disposal and had no need for segregation, collection and organized disposal, just won't do anymore. The rural areas generate the same waste as urban zones, hence it is necessary that they are extended matching systems of collection and disposal. This requirement becomes even more urgent as more areas start hosting tourists and village tourism becomes the new mantra for development here. Look around, most tourist spots even in the outskirts of Sikkim do not have any semblance of waste disposal or collection. Sure, they have their rabbit and panda bins, but those are but fig leaves when it comes to waste management. Look into the backyards, and a study on consumption patterns is laid out strewn along the slopes. Sikkim is now an organic state, inorganic waste encroaching into its fields and jhoras does not sit well with this status. It is no longer even about appearances. Proper waste disposal systems, and the once a week garbage truck runs to ship away waste is not even close to proper, are an urgent requirement in the bastis and at all tourists spots. The sooner the planners start working out sustainable plans and projects to deliver this, the better it will be for Sikkim and its environment.

Iran: How US sanctions are strengthening China's global power

As the US begins to enforce what are possibly the strongest sanctions on Iran to date, headlines have been dominated by the bellicose rhetoric of the Trump administration and Tehran. This comes on the heels of Washington's withdrawal from the Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action (JCPOA) negotiated by Trump's predecessor, Barack Obama, alongside Britain, France, Russia and China.

The marked difference between the latest sanctions and previous rounds has been the criticism of them voiced by European states, who previously had accepted what had been imposed by Washington. So has US unlateralism gone too far?

While the most recent round of sanctions aims to put further pressure on Tehran for regime change and to support American regional allies, such as Israel and Saudi Arabia, they also have an indirect beneficiary in the form of the US's biggest global rival, China. And this has wider implications for the region.

THE MIDDLE KINGDOM MEETS THE MIDDLE EAST

While European firms have explored ways to circumvent American sanctions or seek waivers, the threat of sanctions is likely to scare away many firms from doing business in the country. This will leave a void that China is likely to fill. As a result, Chinese firms will gain a near monopoly on Iranian oil and trade.

While Chinese imports of Iranian oil have initially experienced a slight decline, it is possible that this is one of Beijing's ploys to see wheth-

er deals serving China's interests are offered by an increasingly isolated Iran. For while Iran has been receptive to Chinese investment in the past, it has equally sought European investment to balance this out and to prevent China from playing too dominant a role in the country. The sanctions have now made China's dominance all the more likely.

China increasingly is building its influence in a region that has traditionally been dominated by the US. This may see Tehran become more amenable to Chinese global initiatives, such as the Belt and the Road Initiative (BRI) and the Shanghai Cooperation Organisation (SCO).

The former is likely to see further Eurasian integration under China's watch, while the latter, as a loose military alliance, is likely to be attractive to Iran as a deterrent to regime change.

But while these moves follow the common pattern of Chinese foreign policy, most notably Beijing's willingness to take greater risks and conduct business in shunned nations, they have wider implications for the region and the wider world.

THE WAY OF MAO

Beijing has long been adept at exploiting developments in the international system for its own benefit – and Iran is the latest example of this. In this case, it is filling the void left by European firms that have been scared off by the threat of sanctions.

This raises questions about the utility of sanctions at a time when they have become a cornerstone of the Trump administration's diplomatic arsenal. While there have been cases of sanctions being successful,

most notably in ending apartheid rule in South Africa, they have rarely suceeded in changing state behaviour in recent years.

But possibly the most significant implication is how sanctions have led to widespread de-dollarisation. whereby the dominant global status of the dollar has been challenged. Since sanctioned states are no longer attached to the established system, it is easier for them to adopt an alternative way of operating. An example is the Petro Yuan – whereby China's oil imports have been priced in yuan rather than in dollars – which has been adopted by oil-rich states targeted by sanctions, most notably Russia and Venezuela. The sanctions on Iran will only exacerbate

The Petro Yuan is evidence that China is challenging the established US-centric system and seeks to provide an alternative. This is reminiscent of Mao Zedong's strategies for guerrilla warfare, where an insurgent seeks to make the government irrelevant over a long period of time before overthrowing it. By building ties with sanctioned nations and creating alternative international institutions, China is deploying a similar strategy on a global scale in an effort to bypass the the US.

As a result of this, there has also been wider Sino-Russian cooperation, such as in Syria. There, China is poised to play a role in rebuilding the country alongside Russia's military assistance to it, having found common ground in their concerns over Islamic militancy .

Russia and China were also signatories of the Iran deal and have been dissatisfied with Washington's abandonment of it. Trump's present strategies have often been described as a "reverse Nixon", seeking further ties with Russia to counter China. But the situation in Iran is more likely to see China and Russia jointly challenge the US.

By withdrawing from the deal, Trump has also split the Western world and while it is easy to turn Iran away from the table, it will be tougher to get it back there.


WHAT NEXT?

As a result of these developments, China has become one of the wild cards of the Middle East, challenging and changing the established system there. This also questions the utility of sanctions in the long-term since nations under longstanding sanctions are more open to alternative systems.

By providing an alternative, China seeks to challenge the established system by making it irrelevant. While China has abandoned Mao's ideology, his strategies continue to be influential.

While the sanctions were seen as an attempt to preserve American dominance in the region, they will have consequences that will indirectly challenge this. This is one US play that could badly misfire.

Here's how the 'brightest' object in the universe formed

A ctive galaxies are some of the most luminous and impressive objects in the sky. They tend to be massive, distant and emit extraordinary amounts of energy as material falls into the supermassive black hole that lurks at their centre. Astronomers have recently discovered that some of them are also hidden from plain view by huge amounts of gas and smoke-like dust. But it is unclear how these

Now our team of astronomers has worked out more about the origin of the most luminous galaxy found in the universe: a "quasar" called W2246. Our findings, published in Science, show clear signs of W2246 forming by several galaxies merging.

rare objects form and feed.

W2246 was first discovered in the all-sky infrared survey made by the WISE spacecraft in 2010. But we don't see it as it looks today. When we look out into the universe we detect light that has taken some appreciable time to get to us. This galaxy is so far away that we see it as it was when the universe was only about 8% of its

present age.

The object is extremely bright – about 10,000 times more luminous than our galaxy, the Milky Way. Previous work using a range of cutting-edge telescopes – including the Atacama Large Millimetre Array (ALMA), and the Hubble and Herschel Space Telescopes – confirmed in 2016 that W2246 is the current holder of the record for the most luminous galaxy in the universe.

The bulk of the power

from W2246 emanates from a relatively compact region in its centre, several times smaller than the Milky Way. The images also show that this region contains a remarkable cloud of hot, uniform, high-pressure gas, plausibly starting to expand out as a bubble in all directions.

NEW OBSERVATIONS

The latest observations were carried out by my colleague Tanio Diaz Santos in Chile, and 11 other astronomers, using the ALMA and Jansky Very Large Array (JCLA) telescopes, at excellent sites in Chile and New Mexico respectively. The work has revealed the smog of gas and dust contained within W2246 in unprece-

dented detail.

The fact that W2246 could be so bright without feeding on nearby galaxies has long been a mystery to astronomers - potentially challenging our theories about galaxy formation. But our new results reveal that there are indeed a number of nearby companion galaxies that are in the process of being gobbled up by this object. This is evidenced by connecting dust bridges of carbon-rich solid material, similar to diesel soot. These trace the routes along which matter from the companion galaxies is being sucked in towards the supermassive black hole.

The presence of dust is important as it is made of elements that are only produced by nuclear reactions deep inside massive stars, and are then spread around the galaxy when these stars explode as supernovae. This indicates that the gas seen around W2246 has been cycled inside stars in the past probably in the surrounding galaxies - prior to the start of the galaxy's current dramatic burst of activity. The new images therefore provide insight not only into the activ-

ity in the galaxy as we see it

today, but also into its history at even earlier times.

To be visible to ALMA. the bridging dust must be actively heated. This could be done by young stars that also occupy the bridges, or by the radiation from the hugely bright core of W2246. The conditions in the gas within the bridges suggest that even if W2246 is the primary heat source, the gas in the bridges can still collapse under its own gravity to form new stars in dense clouds, which would allow it to be gobbled up by the central black hole to fuel W2246.

From the relative speed and separation of the companion galaxies, it is possible to work out how much mass they contain. We can also estimated that the duration of the current interaction is about 200m years. Together, we used this to determine the rate at which gas must be fed into the black hole, uncovering that it is indeed sufficient to produce the dramatic energy output we see from the object.

However, the details of what happens within the bright compact core of the galaxy as this material rains in, and enters the the black hole (that then heats and drives away material) can't be seen. Observations on finer scales will be needed to investigate what happens deep in the heart of W2246.

OUT WITH A WHIMPER?

Luckily, further observations using ALMA and the forthcoming James Webb Space Telescope (JWST), scheduled for launch in 2021, will be able to reveal exactly how the gas and dust travels within and is distributed around the galaxies, gets converted into stars and is consumed by the black hole.

Not only will these observations give insight into this most extreme galaxy, it could also help us understand the processes that build more ordinary galaxies, and the conditions required to ignite all galaxies' most luminous phases.

It's been great watching W2246. In about 100m years, it will definitely have finished its meal of neighbouring galaxies. It will then lose its sparkle, and another object will take the crown of being the brightest galaxy in the universe. Nothing is forever.

Khaleda Zia challenges 10-year prison term in orphanage

graft case Dhaka, Nov 19 (PTI): Bangladesh's former prime minister Khaleda Zia on Monday challenged the 10-year sentence handed out to her for embezzling funds meant for an orphanage trust in her late husband's name, claiming that she has been convicted in a "fabricated" case.

A bail petition was also submitted alongside the petition seeking stay order of the jail term, reported bdnews24.

On February 8, Dhaka Special Court convicted the former premier in the Zia Orphanage Trust graft case and sentenced her to five years of imprisonment for embezzling 21 million Bangladeshi Taka (USD 252,504) in foreign donations meant for the Trust. Five others accused - including her son and BNP senior vice-chairman Tarique Rahman - received 10 years' imprisonment each.

On October 30, the High Court doubled the jail term of Zia to 10 years. "Usually a sentence is reduced on appeal. But in Khaleda Zia's case it was increased. This is completely motivated by politics," the former premier's lawyer Kaysar Kamal was quoted as saying by the report. The BNP chairperson has been "sentenced in a false, fabricated and fake case, he added.

The petition to stay the verdict in the Zia Orphanage Trust graft case was filed a day after she challenged the trial court's verdict in the Zia Charitable Trust graft case in which she was sentenced to seven years in prison and fined Tk 1 million (USD 12,024).

Zia, 73, has been in custody since February 8, when she was handed jail term in the case related to embezzlement of funds in the orphanage trust named after her husband late president Ziaur Rahman. Zia was made vice-chairperson of the BNP in March 1983 after the assassination of her husband. She became chairperson of the party on May 10, 1984, a post she is holding till now.

In her 35 years of political career, Zia went to the jail several times. During the 2007-2008 tenure of the army-backed caretaker government, she was in jail for about a year on charges of corruption.

Over 7,000 women, children saved from being trafficked in 5 yr in Nepal: Police

KATHMANDU, Nov 18 (PTI): Over 7,000 women, girls and children have been saved from being trafficked to India and China through the porous Indo-Nepal borders in the last five years by the Nepal Police, a senior police official said

A total of 7,029 women, girls and children, of which 3,896 were under the age of 18 years, have been rescued from border points mainly on the Indo-Nepal border areas by the police, Nepal Police Spokesperson and

on Sunday.

Senior Superintendent of Police Uttam Raj Subedi told reporters here.

They were mainlv rescued from Jhapa, Ilam, Morang, Udaypur, Sankhuwasabha, Parsa, Sarlahi, Mohottari, Siraha, Chitwan, Makwanpur, Nuwakot, Sindhuli, Nawalparasi, Rupandehi, Kapilvastu, Gulmi, Dang, Banke, Bardiya, Jumla, Kailali and Kanchanpur districts while being trafficked India and China, he added.

SSP Subedi said that Nepali women and girls are vulnerable to trafficking due to the porous Nepal Police teams have been deployed in these areas to prevent trafficking of children, girls and

women. Also, Nepal Police has set up rehabilitation centres for survivors of human-trafficking in Jhapa, Kathmandu, Sindhupalchowk, Parsa, Chitwan, Kailali and Banke districts, he added.

Januka Dhakal, vice-chair of Samaj Utthan Mahila Manch, an non-government organisation which is working to prevent trafficking of girls and women, said poverty made women and girls more vulnerable to trafficking.

Traffickers target such women and girls with the promise of lucrative jobs in foreign countries. Most of such women end up in brothels in India, she said, adding that girls and women are trafficked mainly for prostitution, sex slavery and forced labour.

Nepal's anti-trafficking law stipulates maximum sentence of 20-year in jail and a fine up to Rs 2,00,000 for anyone found guilty of hu-

Nepal Police is also planning to establish a separate Human Trafficking Bureau to prevent human-trafficking in Nepal.

The Ministry of Home Affairs has approved a proposal submitted by IGP of Nepal Police Sarbendra Khanal seeking establishment of the Bureau and a Cyber Bureau, the spokesperson said.

"We hope that it will be more easier to prevent trafficking of girls and women once the bureaus are set up," SSP Subedi said.

Bill to give land rights to enclave dwellers in Bengal passed

KOLKATA, NOV 19 (PTI): The West Bengal Assembly on Monday unanimously passed a Bill to give land rights to enclave dwellers in north Bengal, ending an era of uncertain future of the people residing in those enclaves.

Bangladesh and India had exchanged a total of 162 enclaves on Aug 1, 2015, ending one of the world's most complex border disputes that had lingered for seven decades since Independence.

She thanked Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee for her commitment to develop "river tourism along the river Hooghly."



'Magnificent Mary' in quarters, Sarita bows out

New Delhi, Nov 18 (PTI): Five-time champion M C Mary Kom punched her way into the 48kg quarterfinals while another veteran Sarita Devi made an early exit after losing a hard-fought 60kg bout in the AIBA Women's World Championships here on Sunday.

Chasing a historic sixth gold and first medal since 2010, the 35-year-old Mary Kom registered a convincing 5-0 win over Aigerim Kessenayeva of Kazakhstan in her opening bout of the tournament.

The 36-year-old Sarita, who won a gold in the 2006 edition when it was also held in the Capital city, lost to 2016 World Champonships silver medallist Kellie Harrington of Ireland in a split 3-2 verdict.

Sarita, who got a standing count against her opponent in the third round, later said the decision was wrong. She, however, said that she will accept the decision as she does not want another ban.

The Manipuri was handed a one year ban by the world body AIBA for refusing to accept her bronze medal in protest during the victory ceremony at the 2014 Asian Games.

Besides Mary Kom, three other Indians -- Manisha Moun (54kg), Lovlina Borgohain (69kg) and Kachari Bhagyabati (81kg) -- also made it to the quarterfinals with 5-0, 5-0 and 4-1 wins on points in their respective pre-quarterfinal bouts.

Five Indians took the field



on Sunday and only Sarita lost her bout. They are now just one step away from clinching a medal.

Mary Kom began with a watchful approach in the first round but she got to her rhythm with a left-right combination on her opponent in the second round. There were no many clear punches from both sides but the Manipuri, a mother of three, was clearly the better boxer with all the five judges giving their nod.

Four judges gave 30-27 each while one awarded 29-28 in favour of the Indian.

"It was a tough fight and there was a bit of pressure as it was my first bout of the tournament. I have been handling the pressure of expectation from the people of my country for the last 16 years and I am happy to face this pressure," said the Olympic bronze medallist.

Mary Kom next face Wu Yu of China in the quarterfinal on

"I think she is an intelligent boxer and fast also. I have to think about which technique I have to use," she said.

A win on Teusday will assure Mary Kom of at least a bronze medal which will be her first since 2010.

Sarita and Harrington traded a lot of punches in their lightweight pre-quarterfinal bout which was a fast and intense affair.

The veteran Indian, who also competed in the inaugural World Championships in 2001, expressed surprise when the Irishwoman was declared the

"I am not happy with the decision (of the judges). The decision has gone 'ulta' (opposite), I thought I had the upper-

hand in all the three rounds. But what do I do, I was banned for one year after the 2014 Asian Games controversy. So, I cannot say anything now," she said after her bout.

"I don't know why these things happen to me only."

About the standing count against her in the third round, she said, "It was not a standing count. My opponent was a southpaw and her legs got entangled in between mine and I slipped and fell."

The day began on a happy note for India with Manisha sending reigning world champion Dina Zhalaman of Kazakhstan packing with yet another authoritative win in 54kg to place herself just a step away from grabbing a maiden medal.

The 20-year-old Manisha won a 5-0 unanimous verdict against her more experienced

rival in a pre-quarterfinal bout in her maiden World Championships. This was the second win of the Haryana girl against Zhalaman as she had defeated the Kazakh boxer in the Silesian Women's Boxing championship in Poland earlier this year. In the quarterfinals, Manisha faces top seed and 2016 World Championships silver medallist Stoyka Petrova of Bulgaria.

"For me, once I am inside the ring it does not matter whether my opponent is a world champion or a silver medallist. So, my approach will be the same in my next bout also," she said.

"Today, like on my first bout, I played from a distance but I played faster and more aggressive. It was a good bout."

Borgohain, an Asian Championships bronze medallist last year, had a tougher fight against 2014 World Championships gold medallist Atheyna Bylon od Panama. It was a physical and aggressive fight and both the boxers fell on the floor on more than one occasion. The 21-year-old Assamese next faces Scott Kaye Frances of Australia in the quarterfinals on Tuesday.

For Bhagyabati, it was even tougher against a taller opponent Irina-Nicoletta Schonberger of Germany. But the Indian also turned out winner in her debut World Championships bout.

She now faces Paola Jessica Caicedo of Columbia in the quarterfinals on Tuesday.

These sensitivities -- backed up by Beijing's clout on the world stage -- mean Taiwan is forced to compete as "Chinese Taipei" at the Olympics and other international sports competitions.

The IOC wrote to the Chinese Taipei Olympic Committee (CTOC) and the government Friday saying that any name change was "under its jurisdiction" and warned of consequences if it felt there was interference.

It outlined a point in the Olympic Charter which says the IOC has the right to suspend a national Olympic committee if its activities are "hampered" by regulations or acts of government. The local committee has already expressed concern that the island could lose its membership if it tries to push for the name change. "The IOC does not interfere with local procedures and fully

TAIPEI, Nov 19 (AFP): respects freedom of expression. However to avoid any unnecessary expectations or speculations, the IOC wishes to reiterate that this matter is under its jurisdiction, in accordance with the Olympics Charter," the letter said.

IOC warns Taiwan

It added that the IOC would see any attempts to pressurise the local committee as external interference that could lead to "protective measures".

"The IOC is hoping that the interest of the Olympic Movement in Chinese Taipei will prevail over political considerations so as not to disrupt the CTOC delegation and the athletes," it added.

Taiwan has never formally declared independence from China and Beijing has threatened to react with force if it ever did.

The Chinese Taipei name was agreed upon in 1981.

But since then there has been a growing sense of separate Taiwanese identity on the island.

Tall Aussie bowlers have advantage but Indian batsmen ready for challenge: Rohit games and drew one,

Brisbane, Nov 19 (PTI): Australia's towering pacers are at an advantage against the "not that tall" Indian batsmen, says visiting vice-captain Rohit Sharma but insisted that his team is ready to rewrite the script of the battle this time. India start the tour with the T20 Internationals from November 21 here and Rohit said Rohit said it would a tough task to counter the fast pitches.

"India have always played either at Perth (venue for second Test from December 14-18 this time) or Brisbane. These two conditions are challenging and the Australians have tall bowlers who exploit those conditions and use it to their advantage," he said.

"Indian batsman are generally not that tall, so it is not easy for us but the guys are determined to change things this time, we are ready to accept the challenge," he asserted. "It is challenging for our batsmen...But most of the guys have come to Australia before. So they understand the conditions. Of course their bowling attack will challenge us whichever format we play but as a batting unit, we are prepared," Rohit said.

India will start with a three-match T20I series, followed by a four-match Test series and a threegame ODI Series. The visitors have never won a Test series in Australia, drawing three and losing eight of their 11 outings.

"Whenever we travel outside India there is always a special feeling and Australia is one place where we want to leave our mark and do well as a unit," Rohit said after India's practice session at The Gabba.

"Last time we played a Test series here, although we lost two but I thought we played few close games, especially at Brisbane. "We want to make it count this time around, there is a real good feeling inside the group. The motive is to seize all the moments and win."

Stressing on the significance of putting up a good performance in Australia ahead of the 2019 World Cup, Rohit said: "When you do well in Australia, you feel good as a team and thinking about the World Cur ahead, it can only give you confidence winning in places like Australia."

Rohit said everybody in the team needs to step up against a formidable side like Australia.

"Australia in Australia will always be dangerous without a doubt. In places like Australia you want the whole unit to come together, that is our focus," he said.

"We don't want few individuals to step up, we want whole lot of guys to put their hands up and take up the challenge. So, we want everybody to step up and make it count. "We have some quality bowlers, in particular, spinners, so we will try to challenge them with our spinners. They still have a quality batting line-up, so let's see how we go."

Rohit said the idea be-

hind landing up early here was to adapt to the conditions as much as possible. "The reason we came down a few days earlier is to get used to the bounce here. Brisbane, which if I may say so, probably is the fastest pitch. It has always challenged us as a batting unit. We are ready to accept that as a batting unit. "This time around, we want to change our fortunes and come out with some exceptional performances. It is not going to be easy but we have quality in our group."

Djokovic sets sights on 2019 after 'phenomenal season'

LONDON, NOV 19 (AFP): Novak Djokovic set his sights on the Australian Open after a painful defeat in the ATP Finals at the hands of Alexander Zverev took some of the gloss off an incredible season.

The Serbian world number one looked unbeatable heading into Sunday's final, winning all four of his matches in London in straight sets and not dropping serve once. But his 21-year-old opponent showed no fear at a packed O2 Arena, trading heavy blows with his illustrious opponent from the back of the court and outlasting him in long rallies to win 6-4, 6-3.

A sanguine Djokovic was eager to put the defeat into context after a memorable second half of the season, during which he has clambered back to the top of the men's game from the lowly ranking of 22 he found himself in as recently as June.

"Obviously no one likes to lose a tennis match," he said. "You try your best. But at the same time, as I said on the court, you put things in a larger perspective, see things a bit differently. "When you get out of this feeling of a little bit disappointment that you lost, I mean, all the posi-



tive things that I have to reflect on and also take from this season, especially the last six months."

31-year-old started his year with a miserable early exit at the Australian Open, followed by elbow surgery and a string of disappointing results on his return to the court.

But since Wimbledon started he has suffered just three defeats -- including Sunday's against Zverev -- winning a fourth title at the All England club and following up by securing a third US Open crown to leave him on 14 Grand Slams -three behind Rafael Nadal and six behind Federer. "Overall it was a phenomenal season that I

have to be definitely very proud of," Djokovic said. What is frightening for Djokovic's rivals is

that -- Sunday's surprise defeat aside -- he appears to be getting better. Widely regarded as one of the greatest returners in the history of the game, it is his serving numbers that have been so striking during his run to the final in London.

Federer remains a threat and Nadal and Andy Murray are on the road back from injury while Zverev will start next season full of confidence despite his poor record at Grand Slams.

But Diokovic will be the man to beat when the first major of next year comes round in Melbourne in January -- it is a venue where he has won six times.

"Having a Grand Slam so early in the season makes us train probably very hard and be kind of aware that we have to be at our best in the first week of the year," he said.

"The first Slam is there in January. I've had most success in my life, in my career, in Australia out of all four Slams. Hopefully I can keep that going.

"Wouldn't it have been nice if we got Osama bin Laden a lot sooner than that, wouldn't it have been nice?" Trump told Fox news.



Most Asian markets rise as investors weigh China-US trade row

(AFP): Asian markets mostly rose Monday but investors were keeping a close eye on the China-US trade row after Donald Trump's optimistic comments on a possible deal were offset by a war of words between his vice president and Xi Jinping.

The mood across the region was a little calmer at the start of the week, providing some much-needed support after the volatility of seven days ago, with oil stabilising and the Federal Reserve tempering fears about its plans for interest rate hikes.

US markets provided a positive lead after Trump said Friday that Beijing had made overtures toward resolving their trade war, meaning he might hold off imposing another round of tariffs. The president's comments followed an indication from one of his top economics advisers that talks were under way ahead of a planned meeting at the G20 in Argentina at the end of this month.

However, hopes for an early agreement were jolted by a spat at the weekend APEC meeting between Mike Pence and Xi over China's economic and regional ambitions, with the US vice president mocking Beijing's "constricting belt" and a "one-way road" initiative.

Trump's "America First" protectionist agenda, saying it was a "short-sighted approach" that was "doomed to failure".

The stark differences between the two sides meant the APEC gathering ended without a final communique for the first time in its history.

Still, investors in Asia were in a buying mood Monday as they picked up bargains.

Seoul gained 0.3 per cent and Taipei added 0.1 per cent with Manila jumping more than one per cent.

However, Sydney dropped 0.6 per cent, Singapore was off 0.4 per cent and Wellington eased 0.2 per cent.

There was also some support from comments by top Fed officials last week hinting at concerns about the global economic outlook, indicating they see signs of slowing that could affect their plans for raising borrowing costs.

Expectations the US central bank would press ahead with a series of hikes well into next year, making debts more expensive for investors, have helped send global markets down this year.

But while the pros-

scheme and hit out pect of slower rate hikes would be cause for celebration, Stephen Innes, head of Asia-Pacific trade at OANDA, sounded a note of caution.

"A Fed pause during a hiking cycle is a very strong 'canary in a coal mine' type of signal and could eventually lead a more profound correction lower in US equity markets if the US economy does sputter," he said.

Oil prices rose more than one per cent, extending gains from the end of last week after major producer Saudi Arabia said it plans to cut output and called on other producers to follow suit. "Hope is building on OPEC Plus (countries) to curb output as oil prices have entered into a bear market, falling over 20 per cent from the peak in early October when Brent was at USD 86 per barrel," Margaret Yang Yan, market analyst at CMC Markets Singapore.

However, the commodity remains under pressure from concerns about global demand and rising output as well as the China-US trade war.

On currency markets the pound managed to hold off falling further as attention turns to British Prime Minister Theresa May's attempts to win over enough members of her party to push through her Brexit deal.

California wildfire death toll rises to 77

CHICO (US), Nov 19 **(AP):** Authorities say one more set of human remains has been found, bringing the total number killed in a devastating California

wildfire to 77. A state incident report released Sunday evening says the flames destroyed more than

10,500 homes. Over a thousand names remain on a list of those unaccounted for after the so-called Camp Fire swept through the rural town of Paradise

on November 8. Authorities stressed that many of those may be safe and unaware they have been reported missing. Hundreds of volun-

teers are sifting through ash and debris, searching for human remains before expected rains complicate their efforts. The predicted downpours could wash away telltale fragments of bone, or turn loose, dry ash into a thick paste that would frustrate the search.

The fire was 65 per cent contained Sunday.

Crews searching for remains of people after the devastating Northern California wildfire are stepping up their efforts ahead of rains forecast for later this week that could complicate their work.

A team of 10 volunteers along with a cadaver dog were examining burned houses Sunday in a Paradise neighbourhood looking for victims.

Rain would help suppress the fire but could also complicate the search and recovery effort. Officials say ash that is now dry and easy to dust off would turn into paste, making it harder to uncover remains.

The National Park Service says all but one of 13 mountain lions being tracked in Southern California mountains have been accounted for following a devastating wildfire.

As of Friday, the only missing mountain lion was one dubbed P-74, a young male born last year.

In addition, all four bobcats that the agency monitors via GPS have been located in the Santa Monica Mountains northwest of Los Angeles.

Officials have again increased the number of homes and other structures burned by a huge Southern California wildfire.

The figure rose Sunday to 1,130 buildings destroyed - many of them homes - and 300 damaged. The tally is continuing.

Firefighters are making progress against the blaze that broke out November 8 and tore

through communities west of Los Angeles from Thousand Oaks

to Malibu.

More evacuees have If no remains are been allowed back in their homes and the 151-square-mile (391-square-kilometer) blaze is now 88 percent contained.

California's governor is expressing optimism that President Donald Trump will support the state as it deals with raging wildfires.

Democratic Gover-

nor Ierry Brown said in an interview on CBS' "Face the Nation" airing Sunday that the Republican president has "got our back" and has pledged to continue to help. Trump initially blamed state officials for poor forest management in exacerbating the fires and threatened to cut off federal funding. He's since signed an emergency declaration and toured the devastated areas Saturday with Brown and Governor-elect Newsom. Brown also suggested in the CBS interview that the wildfires will make believers of even the most ardent climate change skeptics "in less than five years" and that those living forests might need to build underground shelters to protect them from wildfires going forward.

Pope Francis has prayed for victims of California's wildfires and freezing weather on the US East Coast.

Jayasuriya's decision not to recognise Rajapaksa as the prime minister until a floor test is held has angered Sirisena.

China completes deployment of BeiDou navigation system; adds two new satellites

BEIJING, Nov 19 (PTI): China has completed the deployment of its home grown BeiDou Navigation Satellite System (BDS) constellation with the successful launch of two more satellites and will start providing services to countries participating in the Belt and Road Initiative by next month, the state media reported on Monday.

The BDS, which will rival US' Global Positioning System (GPS), will provide high-precision, reliable positioning, navigation and timing services anywhere in the world by the end of 2020, Xinhua news agency reported.

The BeiDou system, named after the Chinese term for the Big Dipper constellation, added two more satellites to its Bei-Dou Navigation Satellite System (BDS) on Sunday night.

The satellites were launched into space on a Long March-3B carrier rocket from the Xichang Satellite Launch Centre in Sichuan Province.

The satellites entered a medium earth orbit more than three hours later and will work with 17 other BDS-3 satellites already in space, the report said.

With the launch of two new BDS-3 satellites on Monday, China will complete the basic navigation system and start to provide services for countries participating in the Belt and Road Initiative (BRI) by the end of this year, the report said.

The Belt and Road Initiative (BRI), a pet project of Chinese President Xi Jinping, is an ambitious effort to improve regional cooperation and connectivity on a trans-continental scale.

The initiative aims to infrastructure. strengthen trade, and investment links be tween China and some 65 other countries. It is also expected to boost Beijing's influence in these countries.

"This is a key step for BDS developing from a domestic Chinese system to a regional and then a global navigation sysdesigner of the BeiDou system.

China plans to launch another 11 BDS-3 satellites in the coming two years. By the end of 2020, the BeiDou system, named after the Chinese term for the Big Dipper constellation, will become global, and provide high-precision, reliable positioning, navigation and timing services anywhere in the world, the report said.

"China developed BDS through a unique technological approach, contributing Chinese wisdom to the theory and construction of international satellite navigation systems," said Xie Jun, deputy chief designer of the Beidou system.

Altogether 18 BDS satellites have been sent into space from the Xichang Satellite Launch Center in southwest China's Sichuan Province in 2018.

Chi Jun, head of the BDS-3 satellite team from the China Academy of Space Technology (CAST), said this year has seen tional name of NAVIC.

"We improved our work efficiency by reforming the management process. The number of satellite staff at the launch center has been reduced by nearly half, and the testing time before launch has been shortened by nearly a third," said Chi.

In the CAST production base in Beijing, several BDS satellites are being manufactured at the same time, the report said.

"We try to improve intelligent manufacturing capability, and cut down production times. Construction of the BDS-3 system has accelerated," Chi said.

Once the BDS is fully deployed, it will be the fourth global satellite navigation system after the US GPS system, Russia's GLONASS and the European Union's Galileo.

India too is building its navigational system called the Indian Regional Navigation Satellite System (IRNSS), with an opera-
