High Court dismisses petition challenging appointment of Labour Commissioner

GANGTOK, 13 JUNE:

The High Court of Sikkim has upheld the appointment of the Labour Commissioner for Em-Compensation, plovees' stating that the petition challenging the appointment was devoid of merit.

The State Government had appointed Lakchung Sherpa as Labour Commissioner on 14 Feb ear-lier this year after the One Man Selection Committee of Justice Kalyanjyoti Sen-gupta, Chairman, Sikkim Lokavukta, recommended her from among the three shortlisted candidates.

Sushmita Dong, a legal professional, had challenged the selection of on the grounds that before selection, no rules were framed under the Act of 1923. Section 32 of the Act of 1923 empowers the State to make rules to carry out the purposes of the Act.

While writing the judgment, Chief Justice Satish Kumar Agnihotri dismissed the contention of the petitioner and said that under Section 32 of the Act of 1923, there is no delegation with re-gard to appointment of Labour Commissioner, adding that even oth-erwise, non-framing of rules does not invalidate the selection for any post.
"The State Govern-

ment is not competent to frame rules for selection

and appointment of the Labour Commissioner," the Court observed while dealing with the issue pertaining to framing of Rules for selection and appointment of the Labour Commissioner

Indisputably, the post of Commissioner for employee's compensation, which is termed as Labour Commissioner, is a creation of Parliament enactment, not under the State Government but under

the Central Government.

Underlining the requirement of requisite qualification, as pressed by the petitioner citing state government Notification prescribing a uniform upper age limit of 40 years for all commu-nities of the State in the services/posts to be filled up by direct recruitment under the Government of Sikkim and in the State Public Sector Undertak-ings of Sikkim, the court said that the upper age limit appears to be for services wherein ap-pointment is made directly from young freshers.
Section 20 of the Act

of 1923 contemplates experienced persons having put in some qualifying services as judicial officer or as a gazette officer or in legal profession. This requirement is for a senior seasoned man, in the upper age limit of 40 years cannot be prescribed, the court said.

GANGTOK, 13 JUN [IPR]: Election Commission of India has mandated that 100% Voter Verifiable Paper Audit Trail [VVPAT] shall be used along with Electronic Voting Machines [EVMs] at Polling Stations in all the future elections to

Parliamentary and Assembly Constituencies.

In order to meet the requirement of 100% VVPAT coverage in the next General Election to Lok Sabha 2019 and simultaneous elections to Sikkim Legislative Assembly, sufficient num-ber of VVPATs have been requisitioned by ECI. Machines manufactured by Bharat Electronic Ltd. [BEL] were dispatched from Bangalore on 07 Jun via road to Sikkim.

Nodal Officer for EVM & VVPAT, Tashi Tshering Bhutia, who is also the Joint Director at the office of Chief Executive Officer [Sikkim], received the VVPATs which were escorted by IRBn Police personnel from Bangalore to Sikkim. The machines were received in the Dis trict headquarters on 13 Jun. The political parties were also informed for supervising the process of storing the machines in

In the posting order, the High Court has said that the District &

Sessions Judge [East] will dispose of all matters heard and reserved for judgment before joining new of posting adding that in case the District & Sessions Judge [East], Gangtok is unable to dispose of the case, reasons for the same should be reported to the High Court.

MVD inspection drives aims at awareness generation

GANGTOK, 13 JUN:

Ateam of Motor Vehicle Division officials, led by RTO [Enforcement], Rakam Rai, has been conducting a series of in-spections in the capital to check against unauthorized fare hikes and the validity of documents of taxi drivers. The move is also to bring wider awareness about the various traffic rules and reg-

The team yesterday conducted mobile inspection from Ranipool, covering Mayfair area, 06th Mile, Tadong, Deorali all the way up to the main bazaar. The inspection is set to con-

tinue for the next few days, Mr Rai informed.

Speaking to SummitTimes Mr Rai informed that the MV Division conducts such inspections routinely through the year.

"The Motor Vehicle Division. Enforcement Cell is responsible for this kind of inspection and checking of documents of various vehicles," he further informed.

The team is inspecting driving licenses, vehicle insurance, road permits, pollution certificates, vehicle registration, num-ber plate issues and other necessary documents, he informed.

"We have found many vehi-cles without insurance and drivers with invalid driving licenses," he informs.

'Failed registration books, vehicle plying without number plate, plying taxi with TR num-ber and many other issues are ruled out during the inspection,"



He said that the inspection drive is an awareness drive and the department is not charging any fine or issuing challans as the department is focusing only on creating awareness amongst drivers, vehicle owners, and passengers, he said.

Mr Rai appealed passengers to be informed of the vehicle they are traveling, drivers to carry all valid documents and renew them on time to avoid

"We are not against anyone nor are we targeting drivers. We just want to make them aware of various duties and help them follow all rules and regulations that implies," Mr Rai said.

Mr Rai has also appealed to stakeholders to help the department bring awareness among all and avoid any untoward incidents and urged everyone to be more responsible as without mass awareness and people's participation nothing is possible, he stresses.

There have been several re-orts of overcharging by taxi drivers. The team is also looking in to the matter seriously and enquiring about the same, he informed.

"Passengers are the responsibility of the drivers whether tourists or local commuters: should be responsible towards them," he added.

Additionally, the team also inspected the Auto Emission Testing Centre located at Deorali and enquired about the sta-tus and functionality of various equipments used for the testing of air pollution from vehicles. The team has directed the testing centre to keep all machinery up to date in order to get accu

Handle the budget tourists with more care

 ${f T}$ he past few tourist seasons have been "bumper" for Sikkim, and the latest one is in search of an even higher superlative. Everyone associated with the sector has kept long hours and raked in hand-some earnings. But it has not all been good. Reports abound about tourists not only being charged usurious amounts for their holidays, but also being stood up by cabbies who landed still higher rates or hotels which overbooked and extended only miserly hospitality. In the rare case, the reasons were genuine, stemming from infrastructural limitations and impossible to resolve logistics. Unfortunately, in most of the cases, it was sheer greed. Travellers realise that arriving in a new place and jacked up on endorphins from the experience leaves them vulnerable to the occasional cheating. In fact, these even form part of the whole touristy experience, but when this becomes the dominant memory, the negativity becomes palpable and the word of mouth can prove damaging. No one will blame the destination or its people for flights missed due to landslides or traffic jams, but if a holiday is spoiled by stakeholders driven purely by profit margins, the word will spread.

Harrowing tales of tourists ill-treated and unat-tended are not rare aberrations any more. Tourists, especially those travelling on a tight budget, are snared in cons with embarrassing regularity and this is not something that the State should take lightly. For all its hopes of roping in the dollar tourists, fact remains that tourism in Sikkim is sustained by those who love Sikkim so much that they scrimp and save to get here They may be loud, they may drive a hard bargain, but they are the ones who come to Sikkim in the largest numbers and who pay higher fares and sit through a bumpy five-hour ride [one way] to get their half an hour with Tsomgo. They are the backbone of the tourism industry here. They are the bird in the hand for Sikkim Tourism while other prospects are still in the

They need to be handled with greater care. It is all too easy to dismiss reports of their harassment as one meted out by agents in their own backyards and hotels being operated on lease by their 'own' people. Fact remains that it is Sikkim's image that takes a beating. Reputation is everything in this business The best example can be seen in neighbouring Darjeeling. In the wake of its two Aandolans, tourism had reduced to a trickle. It had just about resuscitated that Aandolan 3.0 had arrived at this time last year and derailed some future seasons too. Even until then, although Darjeeling still attracted more tourists than Gangtok, the numbers had fallen and peak season days reduced. Even through the lull, tourists avoided the neighbouring hills if they could because of the reputation it has earned. Sikkim, which is just about finding its feet as far as tourism is considered, cannot afford such blacklisting.

The industry has to remember that for every tourist complaint filed, there are many more that go un reported to the authorities. It is another matter that many vent on social media which, let's accept it, can do as much for promotion as it can do for ruining carefully cultivated images. Every complaint should thus be taken seriously and some examples set to convince tourists and those in the tourism business that Sikkim is serious about proving itself to be a tourist-friendly destination. Tourism is a thrust sector of the Sikkimese economy and yet it is allowed to blunder about unregulated. There appears to be yawning gap between the industry, its players and its policy makers. Policies are framed with a particular audience in mind while the ground realities on tourist arrivals are different. Associations are granted many privileges and yet internal monitoring of services remains muddled. For a State so particular about local protection, it is ironic how a significant portion of the hospitality industry [especially those catering to the budget tourists] operates on lease. This ambiguity has to be done away with so that regulation of the industry becomes more meaningful. Every time a tourist is duped in Sikkim, it is not the establishment that suffers, it is Sikkim's reputation that takes a beating. And, as mentioned earlier, reputation is everything in this business

SummitTIMES US-North Korea summit agreement is most revealing for what it leaves out

n my preview of the historic US-DPRK summit in Singapore, I asked where Trump and Kim might find lowest common denominator points of agreement to potentially unlock a confidence-building pathway.

That this summit has even taken place at all could be seen as an achievement, given where US-DPRK relations were in 2017. We should therefore be unsurprised that despite Trump's hype in the lead-up to the event, the common denominators of agreement amounted to promises of a new relationship and little else of

However, it is not so much what is in the joint statement as much as what has been left out that is the big

To tease this out, let's consider the four specific points of agreement articulated in the joint statement released by US President Donald Trump and North Korean Chairman Kim Jong-un at the conclusion of to-

A NEW RELATIONSHIP?

In the first article of the agreement, the two parties committed to establishing a "new US-DPRK relations." What might a new relationship between the two countries look like?

The leader-to-leader summit between the two countries was unprecedented and potentially could repre-sent a tentative first step on the road to rapprochement. Symbolism is the obvious place to begin, given the low base the relationship between these two countries is starting from.

If we jump to article four, both parties have committed to the process of recovering the remains of UN forces prisoners of war and soldiers missing-in-action from the Korean War, along with the immediate repatriation of the remains of those already identified.

In a similar way to the family reunion program articulated in the inter-Korean Panmunjom Agreement, the repatriation of POW/MIA remains is a relatively easy confidence-building measure on which to base a longer-term pathway of more substantive measures. It is also of great importance as a mark of respect to the families of those military per sonnel who can find closure with the return of their deceased loved ones.

The second article refers to joint efforts "to build a lasting and stable peace regime on the Korean Peninsula." As I've argued previously, a settle-ment to formally conclude the Kore-

an War could be potential common interest around which to develop an

engagement pathway.

Prior to the summit, Trump hinted that the "signing of a document" to close hostilities was a possibility. The closest the joint statement comes to this is a passage in the second para-graph, which reads: "President Trump committed to

It is not immediately clear from the text what these security guarantees might be, but it certainly falls short of any kind of non-aggression pact or peace treaty. Such an outcome was al-ways unlikely at this summit and would be the product of a longer negotiating process should it come to pass

THE END OF 'COMPLETE, VERIFIABLE, IRREVERSIBLE DENUCLEARISATION'? The joint statement gets interesting

in article three, in which "the DPRK commits to work toward the complete denuclearisation of the Korean -Peninsula."

The wording around "complete denuclearisation of the Korean Peninsula" reflects the North Korean interpretation of the concept, which has been well-documented in the

lead-up to the summit.

Tellingly, there is no mention of "complete, verifiable, irreversible denuclearisation" (CVID) in the statement text, which is a clear departure from long-standing US policy.

There are a couple of ways this could be interpreted. On the one hand, it is possible that Trump lived up to the pre-summit fears of some domes-tic critics and gave away too much for too little in the negotiation. From this perspective, the master negotiator Trump was played by Kim into signing off on the North Korean position, through which Kim gets international legitimacy and domestic prestige from attending the summit without having

to make any concessions.

On the other hand, Trump's omission of CVID could be a calibrated strategy accompanied by a clearly articulated and wide-ranging en-gagement strategy, scaffolded around a formal peace treaty. If so, it could prove to be the circuit-breaker that opens the pathway toward the aforementioned "new US-DPRK relations" and the collective management of North Korea as a nuclear power.

Either way, this will become clear-if and when follow-up negotiations take place. Either way, there are factions of the international political spectrum who will be unhappy with the outcome.

It is significant that article three pays homage to the Panmunjom Agreement, which may be the key to understanding how the US-South Korea-DPRK engagement triangle may

The Panmunjom Agreement, for all its ambiguity, does have an articulation of economic and security confi-dence-building measures, based on a shared vision for a permanent Korean Peninsula peace regime.

If we assume a calibrated strat-

egy in deferring to the Panmunjom Agreement, the US-DPRK joint state-ment may indicate the bulk of the heavy lifting with regard to confidence-building measures will be han-dled as an inter-Korean affair, with Trump's apparent non-aggression promise providing space for engage-ment initiatives to evolve.

WHERE TO NOW?

My take-home message from the omission of CVID from the joint state-

ment is confirmation that North Koto willingly denuclearise.

In "working toward complete denuclearisation," North Korea may

agree to a nuclear weapons and ballistic missile testing moratorium, decommission obsolete nuclear facilities, or even promise to freeze production of new nuclear weapons, without ever having to compromise its nuclear weapons capability.

We should not be surprised if one or both parties back-pedals from the joint statement at some stage. Seasoned North Korea watchers will be expecting North Korea to backtrack from the joint statement to extract concessions, or add new conditions to their continued commitment to the "new US-DPRK relations," as we have seen several times previously.

We are also likely to see Trump sustain considerable political heat domestically for his perceived capitulation on CVID and for omitting human rights from the discussion, as well as from the Japanese government for selling out their security interests.

This pressure may be sufficient to prompt a recalibration of the US interpretation of the joint statement. Backpedalling from either side will change the position of the other and the whole engagement process out of the water.

The final paragraph of the joint statement commits US Secretary of State Mike Pompeo to meet with an as yet unidentified high level North Kore-an official. It will be at these meetings and beyond where the "new US-DPRK relations" will start to take shape.

Male dolphins use their individual 'names' to build a complex social network

theconversation.com In life it often pays to keep a close eve on competitors and rivals. Historian Doris Kearns Goodwin's book, Team of Rivals, tells how US president Abraham Lincoln persuaded each of his political rivals to join his cabinet, thereby turning them into his allies.

But the formation of alli-

ances with potential competi-tors is not unique to humans. In a study published in Current Biology, my colleagues and I describe how such be-haviour is also found among bottlenose dolphins.

We found that individual male dolphins retain their unique signature whistle, allowing them to recognise many different friends and rivals in their social network, something not currently known from any other non-human animal.

THE SHARK BAY NETWORK
In Shark Bay, Western Australia, pairs and trios of unrelated male dolphins work together in alliances to herd single females for mating opportunities. On a second level, teams of alliances work together to steal females from opposing alliances and to defend against such theft attempts.

The males are therefore cooperating with in

dividuals with whom they are in direct reproductive competition, since paternity success cannot be shared. But the bonds between these teams of rivals are as strong as those between mothers and



calves, and these friendships and alliances can last entire lifetimes

So how do these males keep track of all these different relationships, and how do they maintain such strong social bonds? The answer may lie closer to home than you think.

VOCAL LABELS FOR DOLPHINS

Previous research has shown that bottlenose dolphins develop an individual vocal label know their signature whistle, which they use to broadcast their identity.

These dolphins aren't born with their own signature whistle. Rather, each dolphin develops a signature whistle within the first few months of life that is structurally unique from those of its com-

It has been shown that these signature whistles are somewhat comparable to human names. Dol-phins use them to introduce themselves or even copy others as a means of ad-

dressing specific individuals.
For decades it was thought that male dolphins would converge onto a shared signature whistle when they formed alliances with one another.

It was proposed that such an alliance signature would allow males to advertise alliance membership to compet-ing males or to sexually receptive females. A type of vocal badge or group label.

Intriguingly, we found that male dolphins in Shark Bay retain individual vocal labels

distinct from their allies INDIVIDUALLY 'NAMED' DOLPHINS

This is an unexpected finding as it is well known that animals that form strong social bonds will vocally accommodate one another, making their calls more similar. By doing so, animals are not only advertising the strength of their relationships but

also their group membership.

Such vocal convergence is found in many animals including parrots, songbirds, bats, elephants and primates.

Yet, it appears that in the complex network of dolphin alliances in Shark Bay, retaining individual "names" is more important than sharing calls. It allows male dolphins to recognise many different friends and rivals in their social network.

Even within these dolphin alliances males can show preferences and avoidances for with whom

they cooperate.

Bottlenose dolphins have been shown to remember the signature whistles of other individuals even after 20 years of separation. This long-term social memory combined with the use of individual vocal labels, allows dolphins to keep track of many different relationships, as well as the history of those relationships.

Our research suggests that vocal labels play a central role in the recognition of cooperative partners and competitors in biological markets.

MALE BONDING, DOLPHIN STYLE If allied male dolphins do not converge onto similar calls, then how do they reinforce their strong bonds?

Well, males in Shark Bay invest a lot of time in gentle contact behaviours, such as petting.

This may be similar to grooming behaviour in primates, which has been linked to oxytocin release. Oxytocin is a hormone that is known to facilitate social bonding between both humans and

non-human animals, as well as promoting both trust and cooperation. Dolphin alliances in Shark Bay are

Dolphin alliances in Shark Bay are also characterised by high levels of synchronous behaviour. Males in alliances can perform the same behaviours at exactly the same time, surfacing in precise synchrony or performing coordinated displays.

It appears that synchrony, rather than shared calls, is what represents alliance unity.

In human societies, synchronous behaviour, such as choreographed dancing, military marching or parades, is believed to have evolved to signal the quality of relationships.

It appears, then, that the multi-lev-

It appears, then, that the multi-level dolphin alliances in Shark Bay share some traits with humans societies, where individual vocal labels help with the recognition of cooperative partners, and synchrony is a signal indicating the strength of those partnerships.

Karbi Anglong Police arrested the prime accused, Joz Timung alias 'Alpha', from Belurghat area under the jurisdiction of the same Dokmoka Police Station where the incident had taken place, Superintendent of Police S P Ganjala said.

Timung was allegedly responsible for asking villagers over phone to stop the vehicle carrying the two men and spreading rumours of them being child lifters, the SP

The police had launched a massive search operation to nab him but he was constantly on the move and was finally apprehended early this morning, he said.

Timung is a resident

Timung is a resident of Kangthilangso village where the two men had gone on Friday last. Two friends - Nilot-

Two friends - Nilotpal Das (29) and Abhijeet Nath (30) - were on Friday pulled out of their vehicle at Panjuri in Karbi Anglong district and beaten to death by a group of irate villagers, who suspected them to be child-lifters.

The Karbi Anglong Autonomous Council (KAAC) has decided to give Rs five lakh each to the parents of the two deceased men and also install their statues at the place where they were lynched, KAAC Chief Executive Member (CEM) Tuliram Ronghang said.

The Council, which held a meeting with media, government officials and prominent citizens at Diphu last evening, condemned the incident.

Ronghang said Karbis are a part and parcel of Assam and many tribal and non-tribals live in Karbi Anglong autonomous area, forming a greater Assamese society.

After US-N Korea summit, Shahbaz Sharif asks India to follow suit

LAHORE, JUN 13 (PTI): India and Pakistan should resume comprehensive peace talks, tak-ing a cue from the his-toric Singapore summit hetween IIS President Donald Trump and North Korean leader Kim Jongun. PML-N chief Shehbaz Sharif has said.

In a rare statement on India, the brother of oust-ed Pakistan Prime Minister Nawaz Sharif said the yesterday's summit between Trump and Kim should set a good precedent for both the bicker-ing neighbours to follow.

"Ever since the start of Korean War, the two nations have been at odds with one another both threatening to use military force with their nuclear arsenals facing each other.

"If the United States

and North Korea can re-turn from the brink of a nuclear flashpoint, there is no reason why Pakistan and India cannot do the same, beginning with

a dialogue on Kashmir," Shahbaz said said in a series of tweets.

The leaders of the US and North Korea met in Singapore for a summit where Kim pledged to work towards the "complete denuclearisation" in return for security guarantees from Washington. "It is time for com-

prehensive peace talks in our region. International community must focus on the peace process in Afghanistan. Dialogue between Pakistan and India over Kashmir should also resume so that the long-festering Kashmir

dispute is resolved in accordance with the UN resolutions," Shahbaz

Many political pun-dits in Pakistan believe that Nawaz's efforts to normalise ties with India was one of the major reasons behind his ouster as premier. Shahbaz, who is a

prime ministerial can-didate from the ruling PML-N, asked India to leave the past behind and start afresh. "The US and North

Korea talks should be a role model for Pakistan and Indian. If they can return from their previ-ous hostile positions of attacking each other, Pa-kistan and India can also resume composite dialogue," he said.

Shahbaz said if his party returned to power in the July 25 elections, it will promote peace in the region with a focus on Afghanistan, noting that peace in the war-torn country is "inextricably intertwined" with peace and security in Pakistan.

He also welcomed the initiatives mooted by the Afghan government and the Taliban for a ceasefire during Eid-ul-Fitr.

Terming it a positive

first step towards promoting an Afghan-led Afghan-owned peace process, Shahbaz said the PML-N government had played a pivotal role in initiating steps for peace in Afghanistan, including hosting the first-ever direct, face-to-face talks between the Afghan government and the Taliban in Murree in July 2015.
