

Human Spaceflight Programme in month's time worked on for over a decade, is being revised

BENGALURU, JUL 7 (PTI): Days after it successfully carried out a flight test for a new system, meant for saving lives of astronauts in an exigency. ISRO today said it would approve in a month's time an 'internal document' on developing crucial technologies un-der its Human Spaceflight

Programme.
"No human spaceflight programme has been approved in India yet. We had prepared the document to develop cru-

cial technologies in 2004. Now we are in the process of revising it. In a month's time, we will ap-prove our internal docu-ment," ISRO Chairman Dr K Sivan told reporters af-ter the 11th annual Katre Memorial Lecture here.

Only Russia, the US and China have the human spaceflight programme.

Sivan said the central government is yet to give its formal approval for the human spaceflight mission which was on the drawing board of the space agency for quite a long time now.

Sivan said the document, which was being

for review and interactions with stakeholders, including Indian Air Force and Hindustan Aeronautics Ltd.
The space agency had

successfully carried out a flight test for the new-ly-designed Crew Escape System on Thursday.

According to ISRO, the system is an emergency measure designed to quickly pull away the crew module along with the astronauts to a safe distance from the launch vehicle if the mission gets aborted.

The first 'Pad Abort Test (PAT) demonstrated the safe recovery of the crew module in case of any exigency at the launch pad, it said.

Replying to a query, Sivan said in addition to 'Pad Abort Test', ISRO has validated five critical technologies for various future space missions.

"We and the govern-

ment work on a threeyear plan, with a sev-en-year strategy and a 15-year vision," he said. The technologie

technologies

validated are wireless communication, digital telemetry and Ka-band altimeter, he said.

The wireless communication would ensure transfer of data without the use of cables and digital telemetry would enable less use of power, he said. Ka-band would en-

able highly accurate landing information when the module is descending, Sivan added.

The PAT technolo-

gy is very essential for manned missions in future, he said.

Sivan said ISRO works on government-approved programmes and others for the agency's research and development.

"The pad abort test for the crew escape sys-tem is part of our R&D work," he said.

On space tourism, Siv-an said it would take at least 15 years to develop the vehicle to go to space and return to earth.

"We are not close to that. We need to work a lot towards achieving the dream of putting a man into space," he said.

Unnao rape case: CBI files charge sheet against 5 accused, including BJP MLA Sengar's brother

NEW DELHI, JUL 7 (PTI): The CBI filed its first charge sheet today against the brother of Unnao BJP MLA Kuldeep Singh Sengar and four others in con-nection with the killing of a person, whose daughter as allegedly raped by the lawmaker, in prison, officials said.

The agency has filed charge sheet against Jai Deep Singh alias Atul Singh Sengar, a brother of the MLA, and his accomplices Vineet Mishra alias Vinay Mishra; Birendra Singh alias Bauwa, Ram Sharan Singh alias Sonu Singh and Shashi Pratap Singh alias Suman Singh, all residents of Makhi village in Unnao District of the state.

murder and other related offences, a CBI spokes-person said here.

A 17-year-old girl has alleged that she was raped by Bangermau MLA Kuldeep Singh Sengar of the BJP at his residence when she had gone to meet him with a relative seeking a job last year.

She had been running from pillar to post and even tried self-immolation in front of Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath's official residence alleging police inaction.

Her father had came from Delhi to attend the court hearing on April 3 for registration of a case re-lated to rape of her minor daughter against the MLA

In the evening, he was allegedly abused and beaten up by the accused in front of his house during which he sustained serious injuries. He was also slapped with arms act by the local police and put in jail where he succumbed to injuries in the absence of treatment on April 8.

During investigation, all the FIR accused named in the FIR were arrested and they are presently in judicial custody, the spokesperson said.

"Further investigation in this case to look into the roles of others including an MLA, officials is continuing," he said.

Vietnam expecting 1,70,000 visitors from India

KOLKATA, JUL 7 (PTI): Ambassador of Vietnam Ton Sinh Thanh today said the number of Indian tourists to his country has increased "very fast" and it is expecting 1,70,000 visitors this year. The number of Indi-

The number of Indian tourists to Vietnam has risen from 16,000 in 2010 to an estimated 1,10,000 last year, he said and called for promoting India as a destination for Vietnamese.

The ambassador, who was addressing the 30th Travel and Tourism Fair event here said, "Vietnam has a safe environment and is a stable and peaceful country. People are very friendly and we have lots of cultural and historic heritage."

Listing the tourist attractions, Thanh said "Vietnam has several UN-ESCO-recognised world heritage sites, lot of relics including Hindu relics and long seaside beaches. And we have a tourist season spanning all round the year," he said.

From seven million

From seven million global visitors in 2012 there were 20 million foreign visitors to Vietnam last year, he said adding the majority of them were from the Asian countries of China, Japan, South Korea and India.

The percentage of global tourists from Europe and US were 13 per cent and 5-6 per cent respectively last year, the diplomat said.

KOLKATA, JUL 7 (PTI): The proposed indefinite truckers strike in the country from July 20 is set to hit West Bengal hard as it is a consuming state, a goods transporters' body said here today.

(AIMTC) has called the
nationwide strike after
the government failed to
address its long pending
issues and concerns.

Truck owners in West Bengal have said they will join the strike.

"The repressive and retrograde policies of the government are not tuned with the ground realities and are trampling the transport sector which is now on the verge of imminent collapse impacting 15 crore people associated with the sector," AIMTC president S K Mittal said here.

The association has demanded reduction in diesel prices by including it into Goods and Services Tax (GST) list, uniform pricing, quarterly revision of fuel prices, toll barrier free movement for trucks across the country to prevent loss.

Other issues include reduction in third party motor insurance and abolition of tax deducted at source.

Calcutta Goods Transport Association VP Santosh Saraf said there are about three lakh trucks in the state who will be part of the strike.

He said West Bengal

He said West Bengal being a consuming state there will be impact owung to rhe strike.

West Bengal imports fish, eggs, fruits, spices among other consumer products from other states.

Some 1,000 trucks, big and small, enter West Bengal from other states, he said.

Reticence in These Times of RTI

Instead of seeking applications, vol-unteer information

When we, the world's largest democracy, passed
the Right to Information Act long years back, it
was not necessarily a moment to celebrate. In fact, it was a moment of acute embarrassment because it was a public admission that 60 years (at the time, it is 71 now) since winning Independence, India was still run by a bureaucracy that had to be told that in a government of, for and by the people, information necessary to them should be made readily accessible. It is unfortunate enough that the Right to Information has been consciously sabotaged by the red tape that it seeks to cut away, but what is worse is that the message of openness that RTI seeks to institutionalise is lost on a babudom groomed on the irrationality of things like the Official Secrets Act. In fact, there are many offices and officers who now clam up claiming they are not the authorized information officers or ask queries to be written out and submitted as an application under

RTI is not just about submitting requisitions and receiving information; it is more a signal for officials to proactively share information, explain developments and become more forthright. This, as a behavioural change, and not necessarily making photocopies of files under the threat of disciplinary action that the RTI Act carries. RTI is not about "exposing" malpractices [although it does that too], but more about explaining governmental/ departmental processes. It seeks a maturity where people can just ask for information and get it, without having to file applications and waiting a month; it seeks a work culture where people with doubts and confusions can approach an officer and get their clarifications and explanations, not hit a wall that confounds them even more, makes them more suspicious. This is the message that needs to go out from the corridors of power into the offices of the executive. The reticence with which government offices respond to queries which would help clear confusions that could develop into embarrassments later, is confounding.

It is important that the concerned agencies understand that when they hesitate, they create doubts, and once suspicion has been seeded, the task to clear the air becomes extremely difficult. Reticence also leaves the field open for speculations and conspiracy theories to proliferate. It fact, it is advisable to always get of a potential "situation" by volunteering formation because that suggests openness and that inspires confidence even when the issues are complicated and even potentially divisive. Most times, there could be valid explanations for failures and mistakes and even blunders, but the people won't know unless they are told.

Swedish intellectuals form new literature prize in Nobel protest

STOCKHOLM, JUL 7 (AFP): What do you do when this year's Nobel Literature Prize, the world's most prestigious accolade of its kind, is postponed because of a sexual assault scandal? You cre-

ate your own award.

More than 100 Swedish intellectuals have joined forces to form a new prize-giving body in protest after the Swed-ish Academy, which selects Nobel laureates, was plunged into crisis over its long-stand-

ing ties to a man accused of assaulting several women.

The alternative honour serves to denounce "bias, arrogance and sexism", according to its founders The New Academy, whose members include authors, artists and journalists.

It is meant to "remind peo-ple that literature and culture at large should promote democracy, transparency, empathy and respect, without privilege", the 107 intellectuals

wrote in a joint statement.

As the #MeToo movement has made waves globally, the Swedish Academy descend-ed into turmoil in November when local media published the testimonies of 18 women claiming to have been raped sexually assaulted or harassed by an influential French cul-tural figure who has long been connected to the institution

The revelations led the Academy to announce in May there will be no Nobel Literature Prize this year, as disagreements on how to deal with the scandal sowed deep discord among its 18 members and prompted six to quit - including the first woman per-manent secretary Sara Danius.

But for some the lack of a Nobel literature award for the first time in almost 70 years was unacceptable.

"Sweden is one of the world's most democratic, transparent and gender-equal countries... it needs a great literary prize," Swedish columnist and one of the founders of the new prize, Alexandra Pascalidou, told AFP.

The Swedish Academy's embers used to be appointed for life before its patron, Sweden's King Carl XVI Gustaf, was forced to change the statutes making it possible for members to resign and be replaced.

Resigning member Kjell Es-pmark told the Dagens Nyheter newspaper that the institution had "given way to nepotism, attempts to cover up serious violations, stale macho values and arrogant bullying".

Seen as the bearer of high culture, the Swedish Academy, founded in 1786, is traditionally known for its integrity and discretion, with meetings and

decisions on prizes kept secret.

But the New Academy plans to make its prize-award-

ing process transparent.
"We want to create something which is open and inclusive and which allows people to contribute," said Pascalidou.
The new literature award

-- which carries a prize of one million kronor (around 97,000 euros, USD 113,000) raised from crowdfunding and donations - will be handed out at a December 10 ceremony.

Research Check: Does drinking coffee help you live longer?

here's only one thing better than a hot cup of There's only one thing better than a not see coffee in the morning: a new research paper telling you your daily habit is good for your health. Headlines this week presented the good news from

the journal JAMA Internal Medicine:
Like many previous studies, the JAMA paper found people who drank coffee had a lower risk of dyng of any cause – and specifically, of dying from heart disease and cancer - over the course of the study.

But this study only shows a correlation between drinking coffee and a lower risk of early death. It doesn't show coffee was the cause of the lower risk.

The research is important, however, because coverturns the theory that people who drink six or more cups of coffee a day are at greater risk of early death. This issue had not been effectively ad-

essed in previous studies. HOW WAS THE RESEARCH CONDUCTED?

This was a prospective trial, which tracked almost half a million British residents over ten years as part of the UK Biobank study.

In a prospective trial, subjects are recruited, then their health and illness are followed over time. We have a good idea of how healthy they were to start off with. We also have a good idea of other fac-tors that could impact their health from the start, rather than trying to reconstruct them after they have developed a disease.

In a baseline questionnaire, subjects gave de

tailed responses to coffee consumption (how much, how often, what types of coffee and whether it was caffeinated or decaffeinated), as well as other factors such as alcohol, tea, race, education, physical activity, body mass index (BMI) and smoking (including intensity, type of tobacco and time since quitting).

The volunteers were all genotyped to determine their genetic variations of major caffeine metabolising enzymes.

The participants' health status was monitored during the study and, if they died, their cause of death was determined by the National Health Service using internationally recognised criteria.

WHAT DID THEY FIND?

After taking into account factors such as smoking and alcohol intake, the researchers found fewer coffee drinkers died than those who didn't drink

coffee over the ten-year study period.

Depending on the amount consumed, coffee drinkers were around 5-10% less likely to die from heart disease, cancer and other causes during the study period than non-coffee drinkers.

Compared to non-coffee drinkers, those who conumed one cup of coffee a day had an 8% lower risk of premature death; this increased to a 16% lower risk for those who drank six cups a day. People who drank up to eight cups of coffee a day were 14% less likely to die prematurely than non-coffee drinkers.

This pattern was seen for all types of coffee, in-

cluding instant and decaffeinated coffee.

The researchers found drinking six or more cups of coffee a day was not associated with an increased risk of death. While some previous studies had hinted at this (see here and here) the relationship was still uncertain. The current study is the most exten-

sive exploration of high coffee intake to date.

They also found people who had a history of cancer, diabetes, heart attack or stroke were not at a higher risk of death from drinking a moderate amount of coffee.

Finally, and most importantly, the researchers found people who were less able to break down caffeine were not at higher risk of death.

Previously, researchers had thought people who broke down caffeine more slowly would have higher risks of heart disease because they had higher levels of caffeine in the blood than the average person. This turns out not to be so.

WHAT DOES IT ALL MEAN?

As with the previous studies, this is a correlation study. So, while there was an association between coffee consumption and a lower risk of death, we still can't say coffee was the cause of the lower risk

There may be some other environmental variable that was not accounted for. Coffee consump tion may entail more walking, for instance, which was not captured in the lifestyle questionnaires.

But it is still plausible coffee causes the lowered death risk. While coffee is most notable for its caffeine content, it also contains a host of antioxidants such a caffeic acid and cholorogenic acid, which

might have health benefits

This may be why the risk of death in the JAMA study was also lower for those who drank decaf-feinated coffee. Decaf has been similarly effective in reducing the risk of heart disease in other studies.

Despite a recent US court ruling coffee compa-es in California must carry cancer warning labels, this study supports previous research that coffee consumption is protective against cancer, particularly of the colon and liver.

Coffee consumption is also thought to be protective against type two diabetes, Parkinson's and Alzheimer's disease. However, the effect of coffee consumption is modest, and should not replace

other factors such as diet and exercise.

On the other hand, women who drink coffee may have an increased fracture risk, and may wish

to reduce coffee consumption during pregnancy.

This week's JAMA study might not be reason enough to start drinking coffee, but if you love the drink, you needn't worry about having another cup. – Ian Musgrave

BLIND PEER REVIEW

This is a fair and accurate assessment. Although an observational study, it is still good news for coffee drinkers. We're unlikely to ever have a large, randomised controlled trial that can truly answer this question of causation.

One limitation of the study, which is described in the paper, is that the researchers just asked participants to tick which type of coffee they predominately drink. So there may be some mis-classification of people who regularly drank more than one type of coffee. – Clare Collins

What's next for Najib Razak, Malaysia's disgraced former prime minister?

The arrest of Naiib Razak, the for-The arrest of Najio Nazan, and mer prime minister of Malaysia, on Tuesday was widely expected. In fact, many Malaysians were hoping he would be arrested immediately after the ruling party, the United Malays National Organisation (UMNO), was defeated in the May 9 election.

Najib was the main reason why UMNO lost - he was widely seen as corrupt and the main person behind the scandal at 1Malaysia Development Berhad (1MDB), a state invest-

US prosecutors have accused Najib of diverting US\$731 million from 1MDB into his personal bank account. Many people assume Najib's arrest is connected to this fund, but legally speaking, he faces charges relating to a company called SRC international, a one-time subsidiary of 1MDB.

SRC took a loan of about US\$1 bil-

lion from a state-run retirement fund and Najib is alleged to have siphoned off about US\$10.5 million from the top. The money allegedly ended up in his bank account, the same account that was implicated in the 1MDB affair.

Najib has denied any wrongdo ing, and on Weddnesday pleaded not guilty to the charges.

Why was Najib not charged in the 1MDB probe? The simple answer is that the 1MDB investigation covers multiple jurisdictions. At the last count, money involved in the 1MDB affair is believed to have passed through the following financial systems: the United States, United Kingdom, Singapore, Switzerland, Australia, Luxem bourg, Hong Kong, Thailand, United Arab Emirates, among others.

It is simply not possible to put



such a complex case together in such a short amount of time following the election of opposition leader Mahathir Mohamad two months ago.

The good news is that, under the new Mahathir administration, foreign governments will now have access to Malaysian documents related to the 1MDB probe. The US, Singapore and Switzerland are among the countries investigating the scandal. When Najib was in power, all financial institutions in Malaysia refused to cooperate with

these foreign probes.

Why is SRC International different? The key factor here is a star witness, a former director of SRC International who decided to come forward to testify for the prosecution. This individual was too afraid to come forward when Najib was prime minister. That is no longer the case.

There are several key witnesses in the 1MDB scandal who may be thinking along the same lines as the former SRC director. With Najib no longer in control, some of these witnesses may now turn against him, as well.

Top of the list is Jho Low, the accused mastermind of the 1MDB scam. He is believed to be dividing his time between Macau and Taiwan, both places where extradition to Malaysia is not possible

Another important witness under tremendous pressure to come forward is Tim Leissner, the former Southeast Asia chairman for Goldman Sachs, the bank that handled most of the 1MDB bond sales. He was pushed to resign from Goldman Sachs in February 2016, and both Singapore and US securities regulators have banned him from working again in the financial industry.

An interesting side note is that

he is better known in the US as the husband of Kimora Lee Simmons, an American model and fashion designer and the former wife of hip hop mogul Russell Simmons.

What's next in the Najib case?

By charging Najib, the Mahathir administration is keeping an electoral promise to take action against the former leader. But more importantly,

the new government is also sending a strong message to Malaysians and the international community that it is serious about cleaning up the mess left by Najib's government, especially when it comes to corruption.

For Najib, this will likely be the first of many trials he will face, as more charges are expected in the 1MDB case. It's also likely that Na-jib's family members, including his wife, stepson and son-in-law will face charges, as they are alleged to be direct beneficiaries of the stolen funds.

And this will likely bring an end to the Razak political dynasty in Malaysia for the time being. Najib's father was Malaysia's second prime minister and many of his immediate relations used to hold political office. Until the election in May, Naiib's cousin, Hishammuddin Hussein, had been Malaysia's defence minister.

UMNO will also need to shed its associations with Najib in order to rehabilitate its image among the Malaysian people. Last weekend, the party elected a new president, former Deputy Prime Minister Ahmad Zahid Hamidi.

All in all, Najib's arrest represents a clean break from the past for all of Malaysia. The end of one-party rule has opened up the possibility of a new era of good governance in the country, which was unthinkable just three months ago. In today's "new" Malaysia, anything is possible - even calling to account a former prime minister who was just defeated.

More importantly, going forward, the Malaysian public will demand full accountability from their leaders, both past and present.

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Belgium stun Brazil to reach World Cup semis

KAZAN ARENA, JULY 7 (AFP): A superb first half display by Belgium ended Brazil's hopes of a record sixth World Cup crown as a Fernandinho own goal and a superb Kevin De Bruyne strike proved enough to win 2-1 and seal a semi-final spot.

Brazil Although roared back in the second half with a headed goal from Renato Augusto, it is the Belgians who will face France in Saint Petersburg on Tuesday.
Unbeaten in their last

15 games, Brazil's bid for a second consecutive place in the semi-finals looked in safe hands.

But after an energetic start that saw Thiago Sil-va come close and Neymar show early promise, Brazil heads went down following Fernandinfollowing ho's own goal before De Bruyne's superb strike from distance put the Red Devils in control on 31 minutes.

Late changes by Brazil coach Tite paid off as Rena-to Augusto's superb head-



dragged the south Americans back into contention.

But as Belgian legs tired, Brazil spurned several great chances to push the match into extra-time, Augusto drilling inches wide and Coutinho skewing his effort off target

from Neymar's pass.

Courtois produced a great save in the dying minutes, tipping over a curling drive from Neymar as the Belgians ensured they will make just their second visit to the last four, 32 years after their surge to semis in Mexico.

- RED SURGE -On eight minutes Courtois was flapping when Neymar's corner was flicked on by Joao Miranda, came off the thigh of Thiago Sil-

va and then off the post.

Tite had replaced suspended holding midfielder Casemiro with Fernandinho in his startming line-up, handing the Manchester City player his first World Cup start since he was hauled off at half-time on Brazil's way to the humiliating 7-1 semi-final defeat to Ger-

Fernandinho's World Cup woes continued, Hazard's corner coming off the midfielder's arm to glide past Alisson and into the net as he rose to block.

Brazil almost equal-

ised immediately, Neymar dribbling down the left and finding Gabriel, only for his effort to go amiss.

But Belgium's early opener showed the Red Devils were oozing confidence, Hazard and De Bruyne linking incisively to carve open the Sele-cao's well-oiled defence with surprising ease.

On 21 minutes De Bruyne set up Hazard on a free run inside to set up Thomas Meunier, only for Miranda to block his intended cross for Lukaku.

A minute later De Bruyne found Lukaku in acres of space, the big striker coolly nutmegging Miranda before seeing the

ball frantically cleared into the stands

Superb control from Marcelo saw the Real Ma-drid defender chest down, cut inside and unleash a

low drive that Courtois did well to block. But when Belgium countered on the half hour, it was with devastating effect.

Lukaku looked in-

vincible as he powered through Brazil's midfield before finding De Bruyne in space on the right.

The Manchester City ace had time to pick his spot before unleashing a right-footed drive that screamed past Alisson and inside the 'keeper's

far post. Tite replaced the in-effective Willian with Ro-berto Firmino at half-time and soon after changed Jesus for Douglas Costa.

But it took the arrival of China-based Augusto 17 minutes from time that sparked Brazil into life.

Brazil saw two penalty claims in quick succession waved away by Serbian referee Milorad Mazic after Nevmar tumbled following contact with Fel-laini and Gabriel went to

ground after a challenge from Vincent Kompany. De Bruyne released Hazard down the left but he firing narrowly wide of Alisson's far post as Luka-ku waited to pounce. Minutes later Au-gusto hung in the air to

meet Coutinho's perfect-ly-weighted cross and direct it past Courtois to spark celebrations among the Brazilian fans in Kazan. But he drilled inches

'Bitter' Brazil boss Tite keeps quiet on future



Kazan Arena (Russia), July 7 (AFP): Brazil coach Title left questions hanging over his future but refused to point the finger as the five-time champions crashed out of the World Cup after a 2-1 quarter-final defeat to Belgium.

Four years after the drama of Neymar's injury and a humiliating 7-1 semi-final defeat to Germany on home soil. Brazil vere forced back to the drawing board as they followed neighbours Argentina, Uruguay and Colom-bia in exiting the tourna-

ment earlier than hoped. Brazil had been un defeated in their last 15 games under Tite, a streak in which a resur gent Selecao had conced-

ed only three goals.

Their World Cup
hopes were turned upside down in 31 first-half min-utes when Fernandinho's 13th minute own goal put Belgium ahead before a superb strike from Kevin De Bruvne left Brazil, and Neymar, staring at a spectacular defeat.

Tite admitted it was a "bitter" defeat, but he brushed aside suggestions he could resign.

"I'm not going to talk about the future, I'm not

thinking about the future," said the 56-year-old. "I will do a general assessment of the match and our campaign, but I won't be making any comments on individuals.

"This is not very human. And we also have to look at the global context.
"We played a match in
which we had lots of possession, a lot of oppor-tunities, but in terms of effectiveness... Belgium managed to turn their opportunities into goals. 'They weren't supe-

rior to us on the pitch, but more efficient. That's certain." Neymar, who appeared in great form when scoring once and setting up another in a 2-0 last 16 win over Mexico, failed to spark on the night despite testing Belgium 'keeper Thibaut Courtois at the death.

The Paris Saint-Germain star, left in tears at the final whistle, refused to talk to waiting media.

Real Madrid de

Real Madrid fender was a threat to Belgium throughout thanks to his marauding runs down the left flank, summed up feelings when he said: "It was a horrible night."

Tite could only concur.

"It's a heavy, bitter feeling. This was very hard for us to swallow,"

"I'm not going to say we were unlucky. Belgium have top quality players like De Bruyne, (Romelu) Lukaku, (Eden) Hazard and even (Vincent) Kompany and Courtois.

"They're top players." As Brazil's dream of a record-extending sixth World Cup ended, Ro-berto Martinez's Belgium ended a 32-year wait to reach the final four of the tournament.

The Red Devils will now play France, who eliminated Uruguay 2-0 earlier in the day, in an enticing semi-final. all-European

Despite the disappointment on Friday, the visitors are still in con-tention for their sixth consecutive T20I series' win, which is part of an unbeaten run stretching back to September 2017.

The last time India lost a bilateral T20I con-test was against West Indies in July 2017, albeit that was a one-off game In fact, India's last series' loss with more one T20I game also came against the same opposition, at Florida in August 2016.

In between those two losses to West Indies, India beat England 2-1 in a

Even so, this is about more than just rankings at this juncture. At the start of what promises to be an intensely fought summer of cricket, this is now about bragging rights and carry ing winning momentum into the ODI series.

Thai coach apologises to parents as boys write they're OK

MAE SAI (THAILAND), JUL 7 (AP): The soccer coach trapped in a cave with 12 Thai boys apologised to their parents in the first letter he and the team have sent out through divers, in which the boys say they're doing well and missing their families

Rescuers said they won't immediately at tempt an underwater evacuation because the boys have not yet learned adequate diving skills. But if heavy rains start again, divers will try to take the boys out right away, Chiang Rai Gov.

Narongsak Osatana-korn said at a midnight news conference on Friday. The same day saw a disheartening setback with the death of a former Thai navy SEAL diving in flooded passageways to deliver oxygen supplies.



"To the parents of all the kids, right now the kids are all fine, the crew are taking good care. I promise I will care for the kids as best as possible. I want to say thanks for all the support and I want to apologize to the parents," wrote 25-year-old Eka-pol Chanthawong, the coach of the Wild Boars

One boy writes: "I'm doing fine, but the air is a little cold but don't worry.
Although, don't for-

get to set up my birthday party." Another, identi-fied as Tun, writes: "Mom and Dad, please don't worry, I am fine. I've told Yod to get ready to take me out for fried chicken.

With love." The name reference could be of a waiting relative.

The rest of the scrib-bled letters on pages from a notebook struck a similar message of love for parents and telling them not to worry.

One boy named Mick wrote: "Don't be worried, I miss everyone. Grand-

pa, uncle, mom dad, and siblings I love you all. I'm happy being here inside, the navy SEALS have taken good care. Love you all." The boys, 11 to 16, and their coach went exploring in the cave after a soccer game June 23. Monsoon flooding cut off their escape and prevented rescuers from finding them for almost 10 days. The only way to reach

them was by navigating dark and tight passageways filled with muddy water and strong currents and in oxygen-depleted air.

Asked at his news conference about bring-ing the boys out underwater, the governor replied, "Not today because they cannot dive at this time." Narongsak said the boys were still healthy and have practiced wearing diving masks and breathing in preparation for the diving possibility.

Thai officials had been suggesting in public statements that a quick underwater evacuation of the boys and their coach was needed because of the possibility that access to the cave could soon close again due to seasonal monsoon rains expected this weekend.

Earlier efforts to pump out water from the cave have been set back every time there has been a heavy rain.

Cave rescue specialists have cautioned against that approach except as a last resort, because of the dangers posed by inexperienced people using diving gear. The path out is considered especially compli-cated because of twists and turns in narrow

The suggestion that the trapped team might have to wait months in-side until a safe way out is available as was the case in 2010 with Chilean miners trapped underground has met with little enthusiasm.

Authorities continue

to pursue a third option, which is finding a shaft or drilling into the mountain in which the cave is located to find a sort of back door entrance.

The death of the Thai diver, Saman Gunan, underscored the risks of making the underwater journey. The diver, the first fatality of the rescue effort, was working in a volunteer capacity and died on a mission to place oxygen canisters along the route to where the boys and others are shel-

tered. Thai SEAL com mander Rear Adm. Arpa-

korn Yookongkaew said. The strategically placed canisters allow divers to stay underwa-ter longer during the five-hour trip to reach the stranded team.

Elon Musk, the en-trepreneur behind the Tesla automobile and the SpaceX rocket company, said he would send engineers to help. One of his enterprises is Boring Co., which digs tunnels for advanced transport sys-tems and has advanced ground-penetrating radar.

Musk also brain-stormed on Twitter about possible technology for a safe evacuation, suggesting that an air tunnel constructed with soft tubing like a Bouncy Castle could provide flexible passage out.

New IDs to deliver recognition, protection to Rohingya refugees in Bangladesh: UN

YOSHITA SINGH UNITED NATIONS, JUL 7 (PTI): About 900,000 Rohingya refugees in Bangladesh will soon get credit card-sized plastic IDs that will help provide them another level of protection and preserve their right to voluntarily return to Myanmar in conducive conditions, according to

the UN refugee agency.

As per the UN estimates, nearly 700,000 minority Rohingya Muslims have fled to Bangladesh to escape violence in Myanmar's Rakhine State since August 25 last year when the army launched a military crackdown.

Myanmar does not recognise Rohingya as an ethnic group and insists that they are Bangladeshi migrants living illegally in



the country.

The exercise, which began at the end of June, is expected to take up to six months to complete.

It "will help consolidate a unified database for the

purposes of protection, identity management, documentation, provision of assistance, population statistics and ultimately solutions for an estimated 900,000 refugees who

have fled from Myanmar to Bangladesh in successive waves of forced dis-placement," Charlie Yaxley, spokesperson for the Office of the UN High Commissioner for Refugees (UN-

HCR) said in Geneva.

Since August last year, more than 720,000 have fled in what was one of the world's largest and fastest growing refugee emergencies in decades.

"The verification will play a key role in estab-lishing refugees' identi-ties and their declared places of origin in Myan-mar," Yaxley said. "It will help preserve

their right to voluntarily return home, if and when they decide that the conditions are right to do so," he said.

The exercise will also help boost accurate refu-gee data supporting of the government and humanitarian partners to better understand their specific needs; plan, target and deliver protection and assistance; and avoid dupli-

cating services.

"Biometric data, including iris scans and fingerprints as well as photographs, are used in the exercise to confirm in-dividual identities for all refugees over the age of

12," Yaxley said.
The credit card-sized plastic IDs, issued jointly by the Bangladesh Gov ernment and the UNHCR, contain a number of anti-fraud features.

Since the start of the ercise on June 21, some 4,200 refugees have been verified. Despite heavy onsoon rains in recent ys, most refugees attended their verification appointments, aware of the significance of having an identity card.

In addition to providing laptops, servers,

wireless routers, biometric hardware and printing equipment, the UNHCR is also making available special biometric regis-

tration software.

"Following his visit to Bangladesh this week, the UN High Commissioner for Refugees Filippo Grandi said greater resources must be found to develop educa-tion, healthcare and infra-structure to baild a more sustainable life for Rohingva refugees and their hosts," the spokesperson said.

Ten months into the Rohingya refugee crisis, the response continues to remain focused on addressing the massive humanitarian needs, and on mitigating the impact of monsoon rains in refugee settlements.

To date the IIN's Joint

Response Plan for the Rohingya refugee situation in Bangladesh is only 26 per cent funded.

"Additional interna tional support is needed to step up the assistance from purely humanitarian and day-to-day support towards medium-term and developmental assistance." said Yaxlev.

The UN has described the atrocities by the Myanmar military on Rohingya refugees as a textbook exwhile the rights groups called it a genocide

Buddhist-majority Myanmar, however, rejects the charge, saying its security forces launched a counter-insurgency op-eration on August 25 in response to Rohingya militant attacks.

UK launches new visas open to Indian scientists,

academics LONDON, JUL 7 (PTI): The UK has launched new visas that will be open to overseas scientists including researchers, Indians, to encourage the growth of the country's

research sector

The new UKRI Science. Research and Academia scheme, which is being added to the already existing Tier 5 (Temporary Worker Government Au-thorised Exchange) visa route, opened from yes-terday for researchers, scientists and academics from outside the European Union (EU) to come to

the UK for up to two years.
"The UK is a world leader in research and innovation and these change es will make it easier for international researchers to work and train in the UK," said UK immigration minister Caroline Nokes in a statement announcing the launch.

"We must have an immigration system that makes sure we can attract leading international talent and benefit from their knowledge and expertise.

"I recognise the crucial contribution science makes to the UK econo my and society and I am determined that the UK will continue to welcome leading scientific and re search talent from around the world," she said.

The scheme will be operated by UK Research and Innovation (UKRI), which brings together the country's seven research councils, Innovate UK and Research England.



'Religious ultra-right candidates in Pak polls can be disturbing'

KARACHI, JUL 7 (PTI): Several religious ultra-right and right-wing extremist groups have fielded their candidates for the July 25 general election in Paki-stan, raising the stakes for democratic and liberal forces in the country, a leading newspaper said in an editorial.

Two newly-formed ultra-right religious parties. the Tehreek-i-Labaik Pa-kistan and the Allah-o-Akbar Tehreek have fielded more than 200 candidates for the National Assembly seats from all four prov-inces in the country.

The Allah-o-Akbar Teh-

reek (AAT), said to be the latest incarnation of the Lash-kar-e-Taiba terror group, has filed nominations for 50 National Assembly seats in Punjab and Khyber Pakhtunkhawa provinces.

Mumbai attack mastermind Hafiz Saeed-linked Milli Muslim League is also contesting the election under the banner of AAT after the election commission dismissed a plea to register it as a political party.

The Dawn newspaper in its editorial has noted that while several mainstream political parties have been subjected to exceptional scrutiny and several mainstream politicians have struggled to get their names on a ballot paper, the new ultra-right religious crop has virtualfaced no public scrutiny.

The mainstream relious parties have formed Mutthaida Majlis Amal (MMA) platform from will

be contesting election.

The 'Dawn' editorial says the normalisation of the religious far-right and right-wing extremist groups in national politics ought to be of a great concern to all right-thinking and demo-

cratic citizens of Pakistan.

"It is not clear if a so-called policy of main-

cy of Duleep Singh is as

streaming of militant groups is being surreptitiously foisted on a largely unsuspecting electorate or if the religious far-right and militant groups have themselves identified a political opening of a lifetime." the editorial said.

The editorial said that the right of individuals to participate in an election, as candidates or voters, must not be limited or infringed pelling legal reason.

Iran executes 8 over 2017 Islamic State attack on Tehran

TEHRAN, JUL 7 (AP): Iran said today it executed eight people convicted in the 2017 Islamic State group attack on parlia-ment and the shrine of Avatollah Ruhollah Khomeini in Tehran.

The June 7, 2017 at-

tack has so far been the only assault by the Sunni extremists inside of Shiite Iran, which has been deeply involved in the wars in Iraq and Syria where the militants once held vast territory.

The judiciary's offi-

cial Mizan news agency and semi-official news agencies in Iran acknowledged the executions Saturday, but did not say when they took place. Executions in Iran are carried out by hangings.

While Iran is one of the world's top enforcers of the death penalty, such mass executions are rare The last mass execution reported in August 2007 saw Iran hang seven men convicted of rape in Mashhad at the same time.

The news agencies on Saturday named those executed as Soleiman Mozafari, Esmail Sufi, Rahman Behrouz, Majed Mortezai, Sirous Azizi, Ayoub Esmaili, Khosro Ramezani and Osman Behrouz.

The Islamic State at-tack killed at least 18 people and wounded more than 50.

Over a dozen others remain on trial over the attack. Iran's paramilitary Revolutionary Guard responded to the attack by launching six missiles into eastern Syria targeting IS militants

LONDON, JUL 7 (PTI): A small UK town in the East Anglia region of England will become the twin city of Amritsar as it celebrates the 125th death anniversary of Maharaja Duleep Singh, the last Maharaia of the Sikh Empire. with a two-week-long Punjabi festival.

The festival, a partnership project between Esıltural Diversity Proiect (ECDP) and Thetford Town Council, is planned as a cultural celebration as well as an exploration of the story of Duleep Singh and his cultural legacy. This includes his family the political and cultural context of the time he was living in, and how this influenced Thetford and the surrounding area today.
Peter Bance, historian

and author of 'Sovereign. Squire & Rebel: Mahara jah Duleep Singh & the Heirs of a Lost Kingdom', explains: "Thetford and Elveden was where the Maharaja had his most cherished memories from the birth of his children to the extravagant shooting parties that were once held here.

'It was a place where he was most at home and at peace, away from the politics of Punjab and the puppeteers of Whitehall [British government]. This place was in fact, where he was at his happiest. The festival will involve

a procession through the town centre as a collabora-tion between Bhangra and Morris dancers and Dhol Drummers and will include Punjabi food stalls, Sikh martial arts Gatka, henna painting and storytelling activities along the River Ouse, encompassing the town's annual River Festival.

"The cultural lega-

significant for Thetford as it is for Punjab. The festival provides an opportunity for audiences to learn more about his fascinating story, and get involved in a range of activities, talks and events. It is also a chance for us all to further explore the under-appreciated links hetween Thetford and Punjab due to this shared heritage," says Festival Director Indi Sandhu.

The organisers believe that the story of Duleep

Singh, the youngest son of Maharaja Ranjit Singh who arrived in Britain in forced exile in 1849 during the British Raj, is complex and requires

a degree of critical engagement which can be achieved through poetry, readings and talks.

"For the rest of the world, the name of Du-leep Singh conjures up the 'Koh-i-Noor', 'British Empire', stories of imperial occupation. It is imbedded with negative connotations. But for the people of Thetford, he holds wonderful memories," adds Anand, who will also be coordinating some of the talks at the festival.

Duleep Singh's former home, Elveden Estate, has an Indian-inspired hall and a churchyard where he is buried with his wife and teenage son.

Ariana Grande responds to Pete Davidson's Manchester joke

ast fall, before Pete David-₄son and Ariana Grande were even dating, the comedian made a joke about the bombing that happened at Grande's Manchester concert in May 2017.

According to The Mirror,

Davidson told his audience at a Puerto Rico benefit show that Grande must have realized how famous she was after the bombing because "Britney Spears didn't have a terrorist attack at her concert".

His comments, of course, have sparked some backlash. A mother of one of the Manchester victims told The Mirror she found the joke "heartbreaking and outrageous", and many of Grande's fans feel the same way—especially now that she's engaged to Davidson.

"I respect Ariana and I want



her to be happy and everything, but she was just broken after the Manchester bombing, so I don't know why she is still with Pete, like yeah he made that joke a while ago, but like it's not funny, it's just rude. This is my opinion," one fan, who goes by @ariissalegend on Twitter, posted on July 4. The message racked up 786 retweets and over 6,000 favorites.

It didn't take long for Grande to see this message and reply. The next day, she wrote a lengthy response explaining her feelings about the joke—which is the first time she's talked about it.

"this has been v tough & conflicting on my heart. he uses comedy to help ppl feel better ab how f-ed up things in this world are. we all deal

w trauma differently I of course didn't find it funny. it was months ago & his intention wasn't/ is never malicious but it was unfortunate, the "No Tears Left to Cry' singer, 25, tweeted, later adding: "i hear and respect you all always."

Grande's tweet appeased some of her fans. @ariissalegend dropped the subject, responding to Grande, "I love u and I respect u in so many ways! Forever greatful to have u in my life! And thank u for sharing light on the situation! I'm now understanding it more." Some of her followers

however, aren't here for this justification.

"parents lost their childs,

some people lost their friends, sisters, etc so HE

CANNOT do a joke about that," one person tweeted. "This 'joke' didn't help them in anyway but instead it has upset them. He should be called out and he should apologize bc he doesn't get to joke about that, no one does."

A source close to Davidson told PEOPLE: "The joke was taken out of context. He lost his dad in 9/11 and is close with other victims of violent tragedies. As a way of coping he turns to humor ...He's obviously sensitive to tragedy as he lost his own father and his intention is to just make people laugh."
On May 21, PEOPLE con-

firmed Grande and Davidson vere dating casually; on June 11, a source confirmed the pair had gotten engaged after only weeks together.
