Cikkim University is holding its 5th Convocation here at Manan Kendra on Sunday. President of India, Ram Nath Kovind will be the chief guest of the Convocation. The President will be accompanied by the Governor, Ganga Prasad, who is also the Chief Rector of Sikkim University, and Chief Minister, PS Tamang as guests of honour.

The Convocation proceedings will be chaired by Sikkim University Chancellor, Lt Gen [Retd] DB Shekatkar. The President is scheduled to reach Gangtok on Saturday.

This was informed during a press conference of Sikkim University, which was addressed by Chancellor, Lt Gen [Retd] DB Shekatkar, Vice-Chancellor, Prof Avinash Khare and Registrar TK Kaul of Sikkim University.

Addressing the press conference, they informed that degrees will be bestowed upon students who have passed in years 2017, 2018 and 2019 during the convocation.

"More than 200 students will be awarded gold and silver medals. Out of 122 gold medallists, 74 are girl students. President will hand over gold

medals to 11 medallists in person," it is informed.

They expressed their happiness on 90% of the gold medallists being girl students.

Due to limited time given by the President and seeing a large number of students attending the convocation, the university has decided to hold the convocation in two phases at Manan Kendra on Sundav.

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EPCA declares public health emergency in Delhi-NCR

NEW DELHI, NOV 1 (PTI): A Supreme Court mandated panel on Friday declared a public health emergency in the Delhi-NCR region and banned construction activity till November 5.

As the pollution levels in the region entered the "severe plus" category", the Environment Pollution (Prevention and Control) Authority also banned the bursting of crackers during the winter season.

In a letter to chief secretaries of Delhi, Haryana, Rajasthan and Uttar Pradesh, EPCA Chairman Bhure Lal said, "The air quality in Delhi and NCR deteriorated further last night and is now at the severe plus level. We have to take this as a public heath emergency as it will have adverse health impacts on all, particularly our children."

Under these circumstances, he said, construction activities, hot mix plants and stone crushers in Delhi. Faridabad, Gurugram, Ghaziabad, Noida and Greater Noida will remain closed till morning of November 5. The blanket of haze over Delhi thickened on Friday morning with the national capital's pollution levels increasing overnight.

Bhure Lal said pollution touched "severe plus" levels early on Friday morning but came back to "severe" category later. According to official data, the overall Air Quality Index (AQI) at 1 pm on Friday was recorded at 480, which falls in the "severe" category.

An AQI between 0-50 is considered 'good', 51-100 'satisfactory', 101-200 'moderate', 201-300 'poor', 301-400 'very poor' and 401-500 'severe'. Above 500 falls in the 'severe-plus emergency' category.

Earlier, the EPCA had banned construction activities only for the period between 6 pm and 10 am till November 2. Now, no construction can take place even in daytime.

New Delhi, Nov 1 (PTI):

German Chancellor Angela Merkel braved the toxic air in Delhi on Friday as she went about her outdoor engagements without wearing a mask, when several people in the national capital were seen taking preventive measures against inhaling the polluted air.

Merkel (65) remained seated when the national anthems of India and Germany were played during her ceremonial reception at the Rashtrapati Bhawan, after she was granted exemption due to her medical condition.

The German chancellor, however, had to face a blanket of haze that thickened over the national capital on Friday morning.

A Central Pollution Control Board (CPCB) official said Delhi's Air Quality Index (AQI) en-



tered the "severe plus" or "emergency" category late on Thursday night, the first time since January.

Merkel's hectic itinerary in Delhi included many outdoor engagements -- from the ceremonial welcome at the Rashtrapati Bhawan and paying homage to Mahat-

ma Gandhi at Rajghat to her visit to Gandhi Smriti.

The German leader will meet a business delegation on Saturday and visit an auto parts manufacturing facility in Manesar, near Gurgaon.

Before heading home. the chancellor will also visit the Dwarka Sector 21 metro station.

Sikkimese artist selected for Gandhiji's birth anniv celebration



GANGTOK, 01 Nov (IPR): Ministry of Culture, Government of India, has selected two folk music artists from North East, Yangchok Lachenpa from Sikkim and Rajesh Boro from Assam on the launch of "Change Within" as a celebration of 150th birth anniversary of Mahatma Gandhi by Prime Minister

of India, Narendra Modi at Lok Kalyan Marg, New Delhi on 19 Oct. Yangchok Lachenpa is a veteran artist in Bhutia folk song & music and is an employee of Culture Department. He is widely known for his performance in yak and singye dances and has to his credit a Bhutia song book published last year.

Nagaland hopeful of positive outcome of peace talks Minister Neiphiu Rio has claimed a

"breakthrough" in the ongoing negotiations to resolve the state's decades-old insurgency problem even through the Centre has asserted it is yet to conclude the talks and will consult all stakeholders before finalising any settlement.

The Union Home Ministry on Thursday had said that lot of rumours and misinformation is being spread that the final Naga settlement has been arrived at and will be announced soon.

"This is creating anxiety and concern in some parts of the country. It is clarified that before any settlement is arrived at with Naga groups, all stakeholders including states of Assam, Manipur and Arunachal Pradesh will be duly consulted and their concerns will be taken into consideration. No credence needs to be given to such rumours and incorrect information," the MHA statement said.

The talks were convened in Delhi in a bid to iron out differences, partic-

KOHIMA, NOV 1 (PTI): Nagaland Chief ularly on the NSCN-IM's demands for a separate flag and Constitution for the Nagas, which have already been rejected by the Centre. The central government has already rejected the NSCN-IM's demand for unification of Naga inhabited areas -- located in Manipur, Arunachal Pradesh and Assam. The three northeastern states have also vehemently opposed it.

While the dialogue with the Naga National Political Groups (NNPG) is said to be over, talks with the NSCN-IM, a major insurgent group in the Northeast, have centered on its demands for a separate flag and Constitution for the Nagas. Rio, Deputy Chief Minister Y Patton and Opposition leader T R Zeliang appreciated that the negotiating parties agreeing to remain onboard for a final settlement.

Various Naga civil societies and NNPG, a conglomerate of seven organisations which is holding separate talks with the Centre, hoped that the final settlement would be achieved after thorough consultation with all

stakeholders. "It is a historic moment and an occasion of great joy for all Nagas and the nation as a whole. Peace will now pave the way for genuine progress and true nation-building," Rio said in a tweet.

Extending deepest appreciation to the negotiating parties for the "historic breakthrough", he thanked Prime Minister Narendra Mod and Home Minister Amit Shah "for the political will and concern for the Naga people".

He also congratulated the Centre's interlocutor and Governor R N Ravi, NSCN (IM) and NNPG for their efforts and lauded the civil societies, mass based organisations, NGOs, churches and the Naga people for their support and prayers. "We pray god almighty & look forward to a new era for the Naga people," he said.

Patton said a "solution that respects our unique history, will bring a new and better dawn for the Naga future". Zeliang hoped that the dream and desire of the Naga people for permanent peace and tranquility in Nagaland would soon become a reality. The Working Committee of NNPG also joined the bandwagon in appreciating the efforts of the union government and NSCN (IM).

In a statement it said the NNPG believes that the NSCN (IM) leadership has opted for peace and adopted a practical and realistic approach in arriving at a conclusion of negotiations by acceptance the reality the time.

A press release issued by its media cell said in the course of negotiations between NNPG and the union government, the latter had also endorsed the usage of Naga emblem/flag specifically for cultural identity within Naga homeland.

"The Naga flag is a political symbol and cannot be confined to socio-cultural activities. Therefore, together in one voice, Nagas would pursue it politically and democratically. The flag, since the dawn of Naga political consciousness, has ever been an expression of our political identity and aspirations," it stated.

at Rs 95,380 cr in Oct

New Delhi, Nov 1 (PTI): The Goods and Services Tax (GST) collections came in at Rs 95,380 crore in October, down 5.29 per cent from Rs 1,00,710 crore in the same month last year, as per government data released on Friday. This is the third consecutive month when GST mop-up remained below the Rs 1 lakh crore mark, despite the festival season.

Revenue collection from GST in September stood at Rs 91,916 crore.

"The gross GST revenue collected in the month of October, 2019 is Rs 95,380 crore of which CGST is Rs 17,582 crore, SGST is Rs 23,674 crore, IGST is Rs 46,517 crore (including Rs 21,446 crore collected on imports) and Cess is Rs 7,607 crore (including Rs 774 crore collected on imports)," the finance ministry said in a statement.

Total number of GSTR 3B returns (summary of self-assessed return) filed for the month of September (up to October 30) was 73.83 lakh.

The total revenue earned by the central and the state governments after regular settlement in October was Rs 38,224 crore for CGST and Rs 37,645 crore for SGST.

Commenting on the data, traders' body CAIT said lower tax collections should not be assumed to be an indicator of economic slowdown.

This lower GST collection is a result of a major chunk of offline sales shifting to the e-commerce companies which recently concluded their festive season sales, it alleged.

"Since these companies by flouting the FDI policy are indulging in deep discounting and predatory pricing policies, they have an expertise in avoiding GST and causing a severe loss of revenue to the government," CAIT said.

Vishal Raheja, DGM, Taxmann said that weak demand, low GDP growth rate and decline in industrial output could be the reasons for decrease in GST revenue in October.

He added that GST collection in October has increased by 3.78 per cent as compared to September. The rise, he said, could be due to to early festival season.

"Recently, government has also taken various fiscal measures to boost economy and it will surely help to raise revenue collections. The government might consider implementing the strict measures such as audit, surveys etc. to curb the GST evasion and to eventually increase the tax collection," Raheja added.

Aditi Nayar, an economist with ICRA, said the year-on-year decline in the GST collection in October is disturbing, although it can partly be explained by the cumulative impact of GST rate cuts as well as subdued consumption growth. "The next month's collections, which will cover the festive period, will provide critical cues as to the extent of slippage that we could expect in the GST collections in FY2020 relative to the budgeted target," she added.

EPCA declares...

EPCA directed that all coal and other fuel-based industries, which have not shifted to natural gas or agro-residue, will remain shut in Faridabad, Gurugram, Ghaziabad, Noida, Bahadurgarh, Bhiwadi, Greater Noida, Sonepat, Panipat till the morning of November 5.

In Delhi, industries, which have not yet shifted to piped natural gas, will not operate during the period, it said.

"Cracker burning is completely banned for the entire winter period. We note that there are festivals coming and given the experience of Diwali, when in spite of all efforts, cracker burning was extremely high and led to accumulation of toxins in the air, this measure is needed," Bhure Lal said.

He also said that it is imperative that implementing agencies take urgent steps to stop local sources of pollution, as this will only add to the already polluted air.

"This requires stringent vigilance and punitive action against all cases of local pollution, from plastic and garbage burning to dust pollution. I am also constrained to say that in spite of all our efforts, there are still many instances of local pollution and therefore, enforcement needs to be stepped up further," he said.

Thereafter, owing to operational commitments, the Command headquarters was shifted to Barrackpore, Ranchi and Lucknow before being permanently established at Fort William in the "immediate wake of the Sino-Indian conflict" in 1962, a Defence communique said.



Necessary Gestures

Schools should be more inclusive

News-watchers would have noticed frequent reportage about parental awareness programmes on Inclusive Education and Training at government schools across the State. Some years ago, the State Government launched the Sikkim Grant of Scholarship to Students with Disabilities Scheme, 2014. This scheme, as its name suggests, aimed at addressing the special needs and requirements of the disabled in accessing even routine services like education. These are welcome moves, especially in a society where disability and special needs have traditionally attracted only sympathy at the most, rarely empathy and mostly scorn and even ridicule.

The scholarship initiative also complemented the monthly monetary aid extended to persons with disabilities, and already in place commitments like Special Olympics Bharat. What will be interesting now will be to take an update on how the scholarship is delivering and whatever has happened to the Special Olympics Bharat scheme in Sikkim, about which one does not hear much anymore. The concerned agencies should check whether the scholarships and monthly monetary stipend were even released in time, and whether they were substantial enough to have been effective enough aids. This follow-up is necessary because now the State is taking such gestures to the next level with the inclusive education initiative. An update on how previous efforts have delivered on ground will go a long way towards ensuring that the commitment to inclusive education is not just another fund-driver commitment - something which will lose priority when funds runs dry. What is also important to bear in mind is that even if the previous schemes have not delivered well, there is still hope for them. A policy initiative is a permanent commitment and slackness among babus is a condition that can be corrected. But for that, a "performance audit" is required first. Since one speaks of an unrepresented and extensively under-represented section of the society when one speaks of children with special needs, the performance audit should be undertaken at the earliest and necessary course-corrections undertaken.

The inclusive education effort is welcome because until this initiative came along, education of children with special needs did not fall under the purview of the Human Resource Development Department and was left under the charge of Social Justice Department. While there can be no denying the fact that the affairs of children with special needs is a social justice commitment, the overlap when it came to education, did not serve anyone's interests too well. It is also an accepted fact that such a clear separation of the education of children with special needs from the learning of other children, also reinforced the offensive stereotypes which othered these children and caused their shunting away. The inclusive education initiative, which aims to make education, well, inclusive, and classrooms open and accessible to all, is thus a necessary and welcome gesture. That does not however make it an easy task, which is where training and sensitization become so important. Teachers, parents and school managing committees need to be groomed well and with more nuance that government trainings are normally capable of delivering. One hopes that the trainings underway across Sikkim on this topic are being conducted and managed well, and not with the tokenism that government functions invariably settle for.

Returning to the importance of the gesture, the initiative reassures one that the State Government, having recognised the presence of this section of the society once again, has realised the moral obligation towards ensuring better care and access for them. Emboldened, one hopes that more initiatives will follow from more sections of the society. This is a big step forward in a State where such children were, till not so long ago, hidden away at home and their presence ignored by the society at large. Things changed with the setting up of the Spastic Society, and the diligence of its volunteers helped in educating not just the special children, but also those responsible for their care. There have been wider undertakings like the Special Olympics Bharat and other such efforts but these have been less consistent than would have been desirable. Sadly also, there has been very little societal involvement in the work and engagements of groups like the Spastics Society or even the much older "Blind School" in Namchi. Their circles are still limited to the volunteers, the staff, the special children and their families. The lay people make, at most, only guest appearances on special occasions and that is a tokenism that everyone can do without. It is for this reason that the government's continuing initiatives, irrespective of how lavish the outlay or how effective the official follow-up, is so welcome. With the society at large refusing to get involved in the care or rights of persons with disabilities, the State's direct involvement should help make up for the gap between what this special section deserves and what it gets. Such gestures also open the doors for those involved in their care to pursue and achieve the many more measures that need to be taken to guarantee the special people a life of self-respect and dignity.

How colonial rule predisposed Africa to fragile authoritarianism

The impact of colonial rule on sub-Saharan Africa continues to be the subject of intense debate and controversy. Barely a year goes by in the UK without a public figure igniting a furore by arguing that colonialism somehow benefitted the people it oppressed.

But our new book, "Authoritarian Africa: Repression, Resistance, and the Power of Ideas", paints a very different picture. We re-evaluate the political legacy of colonialism and find that it had a profound impact on African political systems.

The colonial era strengthened the power of "Big Men" – powerful local leaders – over their communities. This undermined pre-existing checks and balances. In this way the colonial era helped institutionalise repressive forms of government.

At the same time colonial rule also ensured that post-colonial leaders would face a major struggle to assert their authority. It did this by creating states with limited capacity to provide services and police their own territories.

The unstable authoritarian pathway that so many states followed after colonial rule was no accident. It was facilitated by the ways in which European empires undermined democratic elements within African societies.

Understanding the deeper impact of colonial rule is, therefore, important. Not only to give us a better sense of history, but also because it helps to contextualise the development of African politics ever since.

BIG MAN RULE

Prior to colonial rule, many – though not all – African societies lived in relatively small groupings that were much smaller than modern, centralised states. In some cases, these societies didn't recognise a strong central authority figure at all. This put limits on the extent to which power could be abused. The low population density meant that communities might move to another area if a ruler was excessively exploitative.

These systems weren't necessarily democracies. Power was often dominated by older, wealthier men. But, most were a long way from being centralised political systems capable of mass repression.

Colonial rule fundamentally changed this picture in two ways.

First, it created clearly demarcated national boundaries and a central authority structure, along with a more extensive bureaucracy and security forces. Thus, post-colonial presidents enjoyed the potential to wield power over a vast territory and diverse group of communities.

Second, colonial governments typically lacked enough officials to effectively run their territories. To maintain political stability they therefore collaborated with – or subordinated – existing leaders and power structures. In many cases, this involved funding and arming willing collaborators to enable them to exert greater control over their communities. These leaders were expected to manage their communities and prevent a rebellion against colonial rule.

It was more efficient for colonial governments to engage with fewer leaders who could deliver the support of a greater number of people. In addition, many colonial officials falsely assumed that Africans lived in tribal kingdoms. As a result, the process concentrated power in the hands of a relatively small number of "Big Men" and entrenched ethnic identities.

Some African communities resisted the imposition of what they saw as illegitimate authority structures. In others, political entrepreneurs gave colonial regimes what they wanted in a bid to accumulate greater power. But, in both cases, the colonial era disempowered its "subjects.

It also laid the foundations for politics in many African states to become dominated by a struggle for power between the leaders of different communities. **THE BIRTH OF ELECTION RIGGING**

European powers also handed over a poisoned chalice at independence when it came to democratic institutions. Colonial governments had done little to create the conditions under which democratic politics could take hold and thrive. In some cases they even refused to hold elections until the eve of independence. Instead, they systematically sought to deny Africans their political and economic rights, and stymie the emergence of popular nationalist parties.

This typically involved highly repressive laws. These enabled governments to censor the media, ban public meetings, and detain political leaders on flimsy charges. When colonial regimes came under threat, their default response was invariably intimidation and violence.



All of these policies were enacted by states that were extremely centralised and in which the colonial governor wielded vast power.

In a number of countries – including Kenya and Nigeria – colonial governments even attempted to manipulate elections to ensure that their allies would emerge victorious. The first rigged elections held on the continent were those organised by Britain and France.

If colonial governments taught aspiring political elite anything, it was how to use co-option and coercion to demobilise popular movements. Indeed, many African governments have restricted the basic freedoms of their citizens by using colonial era legislation still on the statute books.

Just a few years ago, for example, five radio journalists were arrested in Zambia for allegedly calling a government politician "useless" under Section 179 of the penal code. The code was first introduced under British colonial rule.

RISE OF FRAGILE AUTHORITARIANISM

This complex colonial inheritance gave rise to a set of governments characterised by fragile authoritarianism.

On the one hand, the authoritarian structures fostered under colonialism meant that democratic constitutions were quickly undermined after independence. On the other, the social and political impact of colonial rule made it more difficult for governments to assert control.

This tension led to the emergence of a set of political systems that typically struggled to establish a sustainable alternative to democratic rule.

The challenges that post-colonial leaders faced were particularly difficult because they were multifaceted. There was the threat posed to them by rival Big Men. And there was also the fact that these leaders had inherited states that lacked an effective infrastructure or public services. They also inherited economies that were designed to extract value rather than create mass employment.

Most African governments lacked the funds needed to make up for this deficit. This was made worse by the fact that the early 1970s saw a period of economic decline. As a result, building effective totalitarian regimes — in which the state uses re-

pression and control over information to regulate all aspects of life -- was often all but impossible.

In this sense, post-colonial states reproduced a core feature of colonial rule: in the absence of a strong state, maintaining political stability depended on a combination of coercion and co-option. Leaders who understood the importance of this balancing act could stay in power for decades. Those who did not could be toppled in weeks.

THE PAST OF THE PRESENT

Of course there is much more to Africa than fragile authoritarianism. And the way in which these legacies played out was not uniform. It was shaped by variations in the colonial power and the different strategies that the Belgian, British, French, and Portuguese deployed.

The decisions of African leaders and the nature of the nationalist movement that fought for

independence were also of great importance. For example, in two countries — Botswana and Mauritius — they enabled multiparty democracy to be built and maintained after independence.

But in many ways these exceptions prove the rule. On the whole, colonialism reinforced the authoritarian elements within African societies while undermining the elements of inclusion and accountability that had previously balanced them out. The cumulative impact of these changes made it more difficult for African countries to forge democratic futures.

When viewed in this light, it is clear that there is little reason for European nations to be proud of their empires.

What really causes home field advantage — and why it's on the decline

Never before has the away team won every single game in the World Series, but that's exactly what happened this year.

When the Washington Nationals won Game 7 in Houston to clinch the series against the Houston Astros, it marked the seventh straight road team win, which begs the question: What ever happened to home field advantage?

I'm a professor of computing and information, and my own research – as well as other research – clearly supports the presence of an edge that comes from playing at home.

But what causes the home field advantage? The answer remains unclear, but several hypotheses have been proposed. While my focus is on the NBA, these arguments can apply to other sports, including baseball. Having said that, baseball is the sport where the home field advantage is the least pronounced among the four most popular sports in the U.S.

The crowd has nothing to do with it Many sports fans believe that crowd noise has a direct impact on player performance.

While no one can ever be sure what's going on in a player's head when the opposing team's fans get loud, the data show that players aren't particularly fazed by boos during an away game.

I analyzed both home and away freethrow shooting of all the players for the NBA's 2018-19 season. Free throws provide a controlled setting that isolates the home crowd as the only externality potentially affecting the shot.

The results indicated there is no evidence that players perform differently on free throws whether they're at home or playing away.

In a similar argument for the NFL, the common perception is that a loud crowd will make it more difficult for visiting players to hear the play that's called, and this will lead to confusion and delayed reactions from players.

But if crowd noise really did have this effect, you'd expect more false start penalties to be called on the visiting team. This does not happen.

Referee bias and traveling

While the crowd appears to have no or very little effect on players' performance, that might not be the case for the referees.

Several compelling data points support the hypothesis that a large portion of the home edge is due to officiating bias in favor of the home team in the form of subjective calls.

For example, in basketball, the number of fouls charged to a team – and consequently the number of free throws awarded – are subject to referee bias. I analyzed the data from the 2018-19 NBA season and found that the home team is awarded on average approximately 0.8 more free throws, or 0.6 points per game.

Given that the home court advantage in the NBA was approximately 2.7 points last year, these extra shots from the charity line account for approximately 22% of the home edge.

Other subjective violations, such as traveling, also break in favor of the home team, with visiting teams being whistled for about half a violation more each game. This is essentially one-half less possession, which is worth approximately another 0.6 points, explaining another sizable part of the home edge.

The same holds true for other sports. In soccer, referees add more stoppage time when the home team trails by a goal compared with when the home team is ahead by a goal. Interestingly, referee bias in soccer is reduced when there is a track field separating the pitch and the fans.

In baseball, during a full count, more pitches are called strikes for the home team's pitcher.

In the NHL, referees call 20% fewer penalties for home teams, which is equivalent to about 0.25 goals.

Another plausible hypothesis for explaining home field advantage – one supported by several studies – involves travel. In particular, studies have shown that traveling, back-to-back scheduling of games and jet lag are associated with reduced performance.

Some teams also seem to benefit by playing in regions that have unique weather patterns or altitudes. For example, Denver's basketball team has the most pronounced home field advantage in all of professional sports. This is probably due to the city's high altitude – 5,280 feet – which may cause visiting players to suffer from headaches, dizziness and other complications of altitude sickness.

A declining advantage?

Of course, these aren't the only possible reasons for the presence of home field advantage.

The question remains open, but researchers do know that the home field edge has been slowly declining over the years.

Using a regression-based method, I calculated the home edge in terms of points in the NBA during the past 15 years. The declining trend potentially can be attributed to changes in officiating, more comfortable travel and advances in understanding the body's circadian rhythm that can lead to more educated travel preparation.

After the NFL introduced instant-replay review of close plays, the home team's winning percentage dropped from 58.5% to 56%. This may indicate that prior to the adoption of instant-replay reviews, officials awarded more close calls to the home team.

Last week, the Portland Trail Blazers won in Dallas, beating the Mavericks due to a new rule allowing coaches to challenge referee decisions. Portland challenged – and managed to overturn – a foul called five seconds before the end of the game that most probably would have

given the win to the home team.

While home field advantage still matters, it's mattering less and less with every season – just ask the Houston Astros.

No ration to 20 Odisha families for defecating in open



BERHAMPUR (ODISHA), **Nov 1 (PTI):** Over 20 families in Ganjam district have not been given ration supply after a panchayat body decided to stop the benefits from reaching people who were found defecating in open. According to a decision taken at a panchayat meeting on October 20, the distribution of ration under the public distribution

system (PDS) was stopped to over 20 families in last 11 days, Sushant Swain, the sarpanch of Goutami panchayat in Sanakhemundi block, said.

However, Ganjam district collector Vijay Amruta Kunage said, the benefits under National Food Security Act (NFSA) and State Food Security Act (SFSA) to any person should not be curtailed.

If anyone was found defecating in open, particularly on roadside, the panchayat body will instruct the dealer concerned to stop giving ration to such people for a month, Swain said.

The move is aimed at making people aware of the need to use toilets, he said. Around 300 women, all members of a selfhelp group (SHG), patrol the open spaces in the panchayat from 3 AM to 5 AM and 5 PM to 7 PM to keep vigil on the vio-

lators, the sarpanch said.

"If they find anyone defecating in the open, they inform the panchavat. The women do the work voluntarily," he said. Initially several villagers had opposed the decision of the panchayat but the number of people defecating in the open was now gradually reducing, he claimed.

Those who do not have toilets in their houses have been asked to build toilets in the next two months under Swachh Bharat Mission (SBM), Swain said. Goutami panchayat has around 2,000 households with a population of 4,563. Of these, Of these, 180 families do not have toilets in their houses at present, the sarpanch said. However, some of them have initiated steps for construction of toilets, he said.

"We will discuss the matter with the block office and ensure that all beneficiaries get ration," said the collector.

Peasant leader Bhala Chandra Sarangi said, "Right to Food is the constitutional right of a person, a panchayat cant deny this right to people.

"There are other methods to create awareness among the people to stop open defecation."

India was declared open defecation-free on October 2.

Delhi schools to be shut till Tuesday



NEW DELHI, NOV 1 (PTI): The Delhi government on Friday decided to shut all schools till November 5 after a Supreme Court mandated panel declared a public health emergency in the Delhi-NCR region in the wake of rising level of pollution.

As the pollution level in the region entered the "severe plus" category", the Environment Pollution (Prevention and Control) Authority banned construction activity till November 5 and bursting of crackers during the winter season.

"In the wake of rising level of pollution caused by stubble burning, the Delhi government has decided to shut all schools till November 5," Delhi Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal tweeted in Hindi.

The chief minister also met EPCA Chairman Bhure Lal and assured him of all cooperation in implementing the Graded Response Action Plan (GRAP).

"I had an excellent meeting wid Sh Bhure Lal ji, EPCA chief. I sought guidance from

him and reiterated the commitment of our govt in dealing wid pollution. I also assured him all cooperation in implementing GRAP and other measures," Kejriwal said in another tweet.

In a letter to chief secretaries of Delhi, Haryana, Rajasthan and Uttar Pradesh, Lal said, "The air quality in Delhi and NCR deteriorated further last night and is now at the severe plus level. We have to take this as a public heath emergency as it will have adverse health impacts on all, particularly our children."

The blanket of haze over Delhi thickened on Friday morning with the national capital's pollution levels increasing overnight.

Lal said pollution touched "severe plus" levels early on Friday morning but came back to "severe" category later. According to official data, the overall Air Quality Index (AQI) at 1 pm on Friday was recorded at 480, which falls in the "severe" category.

An AQI between 0-50 is considered 'good', 51100 'satisfactory', 101-200 'moderate', 201-300 'poor', 301-400 'very poor' and 401-500 'severe'. Above 500 falls in the 'severe-plus emergency' category.

In an earlier tweet, Kejriwal said Delhi has turned into a "gas chamber" due to smoke arising out of crop burning in Punjab and Haryana.

He said the Manohar Lal Khattar government and Captain Amrinder Singh government were forcing their farmers to indulge in stubble burning causing spike in pollution in the national capital.

On Friday morning, distributed Kejriwal masks to school children as part of the government's initiative to protect them from pollution and also explained children about stubble burn-

He told students that smoke emanating from stubble burning in Punjab and Haryana was causing air pollution here and asked them to write letters to chief ministers of the two states urging them to control it.

Rly, PWD joint team to inspect Tallah Bridge condition

KOLKATA, NOV 1 (PTI): A team of the Railways and the Public Works Department (PWD) officials would conduct a joint inspection of the Tallah Bridge in the northern part of the city and submit a report on its condition to the state government within 15 days, a senior official said.

This was decided during a meeting chaired by Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee at the state Secretariat on Friday, the official said.

Depending on the

report, the fate of the bridge will be decided, he said. Engineering consultancy firm RITES had in September declared the 625 metre-long Tallah Bridge, that connects North 24 Parganas district with the city, as 'most vulnerable' after studying its condition.

A Mumbai-based firm employed by the state government for the same purpose had corroborated the RITES report and recommended demolition and reconstruction of the bridge.



England claim first blood in New Zealand T20 series

CHRISTCHURCH, NOV 1 (AFP): A maiden half century from James Vince powered England to a convincing seven-wicket victory over New Zealand in the opening Twenty20 international in Christchurch on Friday.

Vince top-scored for the tourists with 59 as England chased down New Zealand's 154-run target in 18.3 overs to take a 1-0 lead in the five-match series. While Vince's man-of-the-match performance caught the eve, captain Eoin Morgan was also full of praise for his bowlers, who laid the platform for victory by restricting the Black Caps to 153 for five.

"The game was won and lost in the first innings... James Vince played outstanding well but all credit to the bowlers today," he said.

A three-wicket haul from spinner Mitchell Santner was not enough to rescue the Black Caps, whose batting line-up failed to fire after Morgan won the toss and sent them in.

England's win came despite the absence of several senior players, who have been rest-



ed for the series after a gruelling period that saw them win the World Cup and fail to reclaim the Ashes.

A trio of debutants in the team facing New Zealand fitted in seamlessly, with Sam Curran and Pat Brown both snaring a wicket each.

All-rounder Lewis Gregory was not needed with either bat or ball and will hope to make an impression when hostilities resume in Wellington on Sunday.

Morgan said his squad was building its depth by blooding youngsters ahead of the T20 World Cup in Australia next year.

"It's a chance for them to stake their claim," said the England captain, who emphatically ended the match with a six off the final ball to finish on 34 not out.

New Zealand's regular captain Kane Williamson is out of the series with a hip injury and the Black Caps sorely missed his batting prowess.

Stand-in skipper Tim

Southee said there was room for improvement in bowling, batting and fielding. "We were probably a little bit off in all three areas," he said.



Tokyo 'will not obstruct' moving Olympic marathon: governor



Токуо, Nov 1 (AFP): Tokyo "will not obstruct" moving next year's Olympic marathon and race-walking to northern Japan over heat fears, the city's governor said Friday, adding that she remains unhappy with the decision.

"We cannot agree with the IOC but we will not obstruct the decision made by the IOC, which has the final decision-making authority," Yuriko Koike said at a meeting with Olympic officials and organisers.

"In other words, this is a decision without an agreement." The International Olympic Committee made the decision to move the events last month, citing concerns about Tokyo's notoriously hot and humid sum-

mer. But the abrupt move sparked anger in Tokyo, where the marathon in particular was seen as a key event, giving the city a chance to showcase its attractions and build public engagement with the Olympics.

The IOC has said the decision was necessary to protect the health of athletes, especially after many required medical attention in the hot conditions of the World Championships in Doha earlier this year.

"I think then it's clear we do have an acceptance of this proposal," John Coates of the IOC's coordination commission said, after Koike and other officials including Japan's Olympic minister said they would back the move.

Adapting to pink ball only challenge in Day/ Night Test: Pujara

TAPAN MOHANTA KOLKATA, NOV 1 (PTI):

Cheteshwar Pujara can't wait for India's first ever Day/Night Test despite all the talk of it being a challenge as he is confident that the country's formidable batting lineup will have no trouble adapting to the pink ball.

The prolific batsman topped the run charts (453) with two daddy hundreds, including a 256 not out for India Blue in the Duleep Trophy more than three years back when pink ball was experimented with for the first time by the Sourav Ganguly-led BCCI technical committee.

Now, after taking over as the BCCI president, Ganguly has convinced the Bangladesh Cricket Board and both the countries will play their maiden pink ball Test at Eden Gardens from November 22-26. Former players, including the great Sachin Tendulkar, have spoken about the multiple challenges like dew while playing in the evening.

"It's going to be exciting...What we played was a first-class match, this is going to be a Test match. I'm sure all the players are excited about it," the Indian Test No.3 told PTI in an exclusive interaction. Pujara said pink ball could pose some problems during the twilight period.

"In the twilight period, I feel that maybe, sighting the ball could be a little challenging. (But) the more you play, you get used to it. It's always about experience and knowing how the ball is behaving," he said.

Pujara had complained about sighting the ball under lights

in the 2016-17 season but he claims to be better-prepared now.

"The more we play, the more we gain experience of how to tackle the ball. Every ball has its challenges. I don't think it will require a huge change to shift from red ball to pink ball. The reason is it's the same format. We are still playing a five-day match," the 31-year-old said.

"Yes, under lights, it will be different. But it's about getting used to the pink ball. That's what I feel. Rest, I don't think will be a major difference. Once we play some Test matches, we will be able to know the exact difference and can improvise.


Apart from Pujara, Mayank Agarwal, Rishabh Pant, Kuldeep Yadav, Mohammed Shami and Wriddhiman Saha, from the current Indian Test squad, have the experience of playing with a pink ball at the domestic

Summing up the mood in the camp, he said: "We wont' have any issue. Most of the guys have played in Duleep Trophy and for the ones who have not played, it would be a good learning curve for them."

"The help for the bowlers could come at a different times unlike the traditional Tests. It could be under lights or without lights. Once we play, we will get to know about all such things. We will have to adapt to it as quickly as possible."

India are going to play their first ever Day/ Night Test about four years after Australia and New Zealand played the pink ball Test at the Adelaide Oval on November 27, 2015.

Nadal eases past Wawrinka as Djokovic sets up Tsitsipas clash



The 33-year-old Nadal is already guaranteed to usurp Djokovic at the rankings summit next week, but winning a maiden Bercy title would also secure the yearend top spot before next month's ATP Tour Finals in London.

He produced an impressive display on Thursday to take his career head-to-head record against three-time Grand Slam champion Wawrinka to 19-3 with a clinical 6-4, 6-4 victory.

Djokovic had earlier booked his last-eight place with a 7-6 (9/7), 6-1 win over Britain's Edmund.

Nadal has never won the Paris Masters or the ATP Finals and only two of his 84 titles have come indoors.

"That's the beautiful thing about this sport, (to) have the capacity to adapt yourself to the different conditions," said the 12-time French Open winner, who called the doctor onto the court in the second set to help deal with a stomach problem.

Nadal will face 2008 champion Jo-Wilfried Tsonga in the quarter-finals after the French wildcard saved two match points to edge out Germany's Jan-Lennard Struff 2-6, 6-4, 7-6 (8/6).

"I have a match against a player that is playing well," said Nadal. "I need to do a lot of things well, but I hope to be ready to make that



Nadal took the first set thanks to a single break of serve in game three, saving break points in the second and eighth games himself before serving it out in style.

back-Wawrinka's hand started to fire at the start of the second set, but Nadal kept the Swiss at bay, helped by one incredible forehand winner to direct a smash from his opponent into the corner of the court.

The 19-time Grand Slam champion saw off Wawrinka's challenge with a break to lead 5-4 in the second set and served out the match to make it his seventh Paris Masters quarter-final in as many appearances.

Top seed Djokovic needed seven set points in the first set before beating Edmund with relative comfort by racing through the second to make his eighth quarter-final in the tourna-

"I was feeling ener-

gy-wise better and felt more alert, just more strength, more energy, more speed," said the 32-year-old, who has been struggling with illness this week.

The 16-time Grand Slam title-winner is chasing a record-extending fifth Bercy crown and will next face world number seven Stefanos Tsitsipas, who beat Alex de Minaur 6-3, 6-4.

The 21-year-old Tsitsipas leads his head-tohead with Djokovic 2-1, after victories at the Shanghai Masters earlier this month and the 2018 Canadian Open.

"He (Tsitsipas) is one of the best players in the world," said Djokovic. "He's already (an) established player." Djokovic is hoping to tie Pete Sampras' record of finishing six years as the world's best player, while Nadal is looking to achieve the feat for a fifth time.

DIMITROV DOWNS THIEM Former world num-

ber three Grigor Dimitrov produced a fantastic performance to beat fifth seed Dominic Thiem 6-3, 6-2 and reach the last eight in Paris for the first time.

Dimitrov was the world number 78 heading into the US Open, but reached the semi-finals and is now ranked 27th.

The 28-year-old will take on Cristian Garin for a semi-final spot, after the unseeded Chilean saved three match points in a deciding-set tiebreak to end the run of French qualifier Jeremy Chardy with a 6-7 (4/7), 6-4, 7-6 (8/6) success.

Greek star Tsitsipas, who has reached at least the semis in each of his last three tournaments, eased past De Minaur, ending the Australian's hopes of qualifying for the Tour Finals.

Gael Monfils, who is chasing a spot at the ATP Finals, takes on Moldova's Radu Albot in Thursday's final match, with the winner to face Denis Shapovalov, after the Canadian youngster beat sixth seed Alexander Zverev for the first time -- 6-2, 5-7, 6-2.

Bopanna progresses, Sharan out of Paris Masters



PARIS, Nov 1 (PTI): India's top doubles player Rohan Bopanna advanced to the quarterfinals of the Paris Master with partner Denis Shapovalov but his compatriot Divij Sharan made a second round exit, here.

Bopanna and his Canadian partner outplayed American-Argentine pair of Manuel Gonzalez and Austin Krajicek 6-1 6-3 in their second round match which lasted just 59 minutes.

The Indo-Canadian team broke the rivals four times and did not face a single breakpoint during its commanding win.

However, Sharan and his Kiwi partner Artem Sitak, who entered the event as alternates and knoccked out the fourth seeds earlier, lost 2-6 3-6 to French team of Fabrice Martin and Jeremy Chardy in just 53 minutes.

Sharan has won two titles this season, triumphing at Pune with Bopanna and at St. Petersburg with Igor Zelenay.

The title with Sharan in Pune remains Bopanna's only trophy in 2019. They had united as a

team at the beginning of the season, eyeing Tokyo Olympics, but separated after finding it difficult to enter big tournaments with their combined rankings.

Funerals begin as town mourns victims of Pakistan train fire



Distraught relatives gathered Friday for the first funerals of some of the 74 people killed when fire ripped through a crowded train in Pakistan, with many of the victims residents of a single town.

Sobbing family members crowded a government building in Mirpurkhas overnight as the first bodies covered in white cloth began arriving by ambulance from the scene of the disaster.

After morning with women prayers, watching from nearby rooftops, more than a hundred men attended the first funeral -- of a car mechanic named Mohammad Saleem, who was in his late 40s.

It was held at the Bismillah Mosque, from which at least 42 pilgrims had left to board the train one day earlier, bound for a religious fes-

tival near Lahore.

Officials say as some of the train's passengers cooked breakfast around dawn Thursday, two of their gas cylinders exploded, sending flames racing through three carriages as the train passed near Rahim Yar Khan, in Punjab province.

At least 74 people died, some after jumping through windows on the still-moving train to escape the blaze.

Rescue officials found bodies and some injured passengers along a two-kilometre stretch of track, Dawn newspaper reported.

The train was a daily express service that runs between the southern port city of Karachi and Rawalpindi, adjacent to Islamabad.

Trains on that route can reportedly hit speeds of up to 110 kilometres (68 miles) per hour. Lo-

cal media said that the speed may have helped fan the flames.

Journalists were allowed inside the interior of the carriages early Friday. The fire appeared to have burned them entirely, with virtually no space visible that was not blackened and charred.

One of them -- Wagon No.12 -- was carrying mainly people from Mirpurkhas, the town's deputy commissioner, Attaullah Shah, told AFP.

"There was never such a tragic incident to happen to Mirpurkhas," he said. Eight of the bodies had been confirmed as being residents of the town so far, he said.

Twenty-four purkhas residents were among the injured.

But at least another 40 are still missing, he

He said that among Officials in Rahim Yar the missing was his nephew, as well as the Khan have said many of

those who left from the mosque had known one another or lived nearby.

Yawar Hussain came to the deputy commissioner's office overnight in hopes of finding his brother Mohsin, 20.

Clutching a photograph of his brother wearing a starched beige shalwar kameez and sunglasses, the 23-year-old described rushing home after hearing of the accident.

"I consoled my father, and my mother and sisters were crying," he said.

Train accidents are common in Pakistan, where the railways have seen decades of decline due to corruption, mismanagement and lack of investment.

Gas cylinders are supposedly banned on trains. Pakistan's railways minister Sheikh Rasheed Ahmed said Thursday that it had been a "mistake" to allow the cylinders on board, and Prime Minister Imran Khan has ordered an inquiry.

Some witnesses told local media the fire had not been started by the cylinders at all, but by some kind of fault on the train.

The train had been diverted Thursday to carry pilgrims to the annual Tablighi Ijtema, one of Pakistan's biggest religious gatherings, which sees up to 400,000 people descend on a tented village outside Lahore for several days to sleep, pray and eat together.

US Interior Department grounds Chinese-made drones



The US Department I of the Interior has grounded its fleet of Chinese-made drones as it conducts a review of the program.

Nick Goodwin, an Department Interior spokesman, did not provide a reason for the decision but it comes amid US security concerns over Chinese electronics.

Goodwin said the review had been ordered by Interior Department Secretary David Bernhardt.

"Until this review is completed, the Secretary has directed that drones manufactured in China or made from Chinese components be grounded," he said.

Exceptions would be made for drones that are being used for emergency purposes such as fighting wildfires, search and rescue, and dealing with natural disasters, Goodwin said. According to sources familiar with the program, the Interior Department has a fleet of 810 drones, almost all built by Chinese companies.

Only 24 are US-made and even those have Chinese electronic components, the sources said.

The US Department Homeland Security issued a warning in May that Chinese-made drones could pose a security risk.

The United States has also taken steps against China's Huawei by effectively banning American companies from selling or transferring US technology to the Chinese telecoms giant.

US intelligence believes Huawei is backed by the Chinese military and that its equipment could provide Beijing's spy agencies with a backdoor into the communications networks of other countries. China's for-

eign ministry said Friday that it was "still seeking further understanding of the specific situation" but called for the US to provide a "non-discriminatory environment for Chinese companies".

"We urge the US to stop abusing the concept of national security, stop exaggerating the socalled China threat, and stop oppressing Chinese companies without reason," foreign ministry spokesman Geng Shuang said at a regular press briefing.

The Chinese company DJI produces about 70 percent of the world's commercial drones.

"We're very disappointed," a DJI spokeswoman told AFP, adding that the company had no other comment for now.

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No need for passport for Sikh pilgrims visiting Kartarpur: Pak PM

ISLAMABAD, NOV 1 (PTI): Pakistan Prime Minister Imran Khan on Friday announced that Sikh pilgrims from India would not need a passport to travel to Kartarpur and no fee would be charged from them on the opening day of the corridor on November 9.

"For Sikhs coming for pilgrimage to Kartarpur from India, I have waived off two requirements: i) they won't need a passport-just a valid ID; ii) they no longer have to register 10 days in advance. Also, no fee to be charged on day of inauguration and on Guruji's 550th birthday," Khan tweeted.

The Kartarpur Corridor will connect the Dera Baba Nanak shrine in India's Punjab with Darbar Sahib at Kartarpur, just 4 kilometres from the International Border, located at Narowal dis-



trict of Pakistan's Punjab province.

India and Pakistan last week signed the agreement on the Corridor that will allow Indian pilgrims to undertake visa-free visit to Gurdwara Darbar Sahib, the shrine of the Sikh religion's founder Guru Nanak Dev in Pakistan, notwithstanding a chill in bilateral ties over Kashmir.

The agreement will allow 5,000 Indian pilgrims daily to visit Gurdwara Darbar Sahib where Guru Nanak spent last 18 vears of his life.

Each visitor would be required to pay USD 20 as fee, though India has requested Pakistan not to charge the Indian pil-
