"The hero must mandatorily be shown to face wealth to then turn away from it. He must be shown to face sexual possibilities to then turn away from these two. In this double about-turn lies his heroism," Suri

writes.

There is an entire genre of films based on chapters from Gandhi's life. The most famous -and most successful -- is Richard Attenborough's 1983 Oscar winner "Gandhi" with Ben Kingsley in the central role.

While "Gandhi" takes a sweeping view of Gandhi's life, right till his assassination, many films have chosen to focus on specific phases.

In "Gandhi, My Father", Khan dwells on the troubled relationship between Gandhi and his eldest son Harilal. Shyam Benegal's "The Making of the Mahatma" focuses on his South Africa years.

There are other films in which Gandhi plays a prominent role -- "The Legend Of Bhagat Singh", "Netaji Subhas Chandra Bose:

High Court reverses Headmaster's acquittal in POCSO Act case, sentences him to 3 yrs RI SUMMIT REPORT Court headed by Acting Chief Justice guilty for offences under Section 9(c), statements of the Prosecution Witness-

SUMMIT REPORT GANGTOK, 01 OCT:

The High Court of Sikkim has reversed the acquittal of pedophile Headmaster of a Government Primary School and convicted him for offences committed under Protection of Children from Sexual Offences Act and sentenced him to 3 years rigorous imprisonment and a fine of Rs 25,000.

While delivering the judgment on an appeal by the State against the acquittal, the division bench of the High

Meenakshi Madan Rai and Justice Bhaskar Raj Pradhan directed the convicted Headmaster to surrender before the Special Judge by 11AM on 01 Oct and undergo the sentence imposed on him by the High Court.

The bench cancelled all the bailbonds of the Headmaster and directed that 'should the accused fail to surrender, the Special Judge shall initiate necessary steps.'

The Headmaster has been found



Speaking on the occasion, Asst Director, Dipendra Rai, Nutrition Board, spelt out the Paanch Sutra and its components which include 1000 days of child anaemia, diarrhoea, hand wash and sanitation and nutritious food as poor nutrition can lead to reduced immunity, increased susceptibility to disease, impaired physical and mental development, and reduced productivity.

Roshna Thapa, Soreng PHC briefed the audience about the importance of health & hygiene in daily life especially for lactating mother and babies. She urged the gathering to practice hygiene to prevent diseases and in turns it will lead to good health, especially cleanliness and good disposal of waste water and drinking water supply. While speaking on anaemia Dr Thapa briefed the audience about its causes and the preventive measures.

There are many causes of anaemia, out of which iron deficiency accounts for about 50 percent of anaemia in children and Medical Officer, Dr women of reproductive age-group, she added. Dr Thapa said that women in the childbearing years are particularly susceptible to iron-deficiency anaemia because of the blood loss from menstruation and the increased blood supply demands during pregnancy.

Various actors have played the man. Darshan Jariwala ("Gandhi, My Father"), Surendra Rajan ("The Legend Of Bhagat Singh", "Netaji Subhas Chandra Bose: The Forgotten Hero", "The Last Days Of The Raj" and web show "Bose: Dead/Alive), Neeraj Kabi ("Viceroy's House" and "Samvidhaan"), Rajit Kapoor ("The Making of the Mahatma") and Dilip Prabhavalkar ("Lage Raho Munnabhai").

Naseeruddin Shah, who played Gandhi in "Hey Ram", has written about his efforts to get Kingsley's role in his autobiography "And Then One Day".

"I later deducted that Ben had in fact already been cast as Gandhi and this whole process of tom-tomming all of us being tested and sneaking the news to the press in India that I had been chosen was a masquerade conducted to pre-empt objections that inevitably would have arisen if a white actor were announced straightway," Shah wrote.

In a 1926 article in Young India, Gandhi wrote that German papers accused him promoting a film company when he had never even been to a cinema. He said he refused to be "enthused about it and waste God-given time in spite of pressure sometimes used by kind friends".

"They tell me it has an educational value. It is possible that it has. But its corrupting influence obtrudes itself upon me every day. Education, therefore, I seek elsewhere," he wrote.

Gandhi watched just a few film in his life, including Vijay Bhatt's "Ram Rajya" in the 1940s.

According to Khan, Gandhi was against the "escapist" nature of movies and would have changed his opinion had he lived longer and

"He was a biography person. He wanted people to get inspired by great lives and do something interesting in their own. He did not want people to escape from life, he wanted them to confront life," Khan told PTI. Benegal said his 1996 film "The Making of the Mahatma" is about Gandhi's process of understanding things and the story of his evolu-

"I do believe Gandhi's influence has been very profound on Indians. It may not necessarily show on the surface but somewhere it has to do with the idea of compassion, a sense of humanity," Benegal added.

Rohini Hattangadi, who played Kasturba in "Gandhi", said she did not immediately understand the magnitude of the film. "When I was selected for 'Gandhi', the first thing that came to mind was, 'What kind of a film will be made?'... After I got the role, I read

his autobiography and realised, this is the life one should follow," Hattangadi told PTI. Darshan Jariwala, who enacted the role of Gandhi in "Gandhi, My Father", believes the Mahatma's "basic anguish" on communalism,

economic disparity and casteism are still valid. "As a nation we tend to appropriate when convenient to us and when it is not, then we tend to justify it with some other philosophy. His basic anguish about Hindu Muslim unity still remains valid, his basic preaching against casteism still remains valid.

Battle the Bottle

🖰 andhi Jayanti, given the Bapu's campaign against Ithe bottle, offers a good occasion to speak of drinking issues. The occasion is made even more relevant given that Gandhi Jayanti this year comes so close to the festive season of Dasain and the string of celebrations that will follow. So yes, the festive season is upon us; a season which will be as much about piety and loving your family as it will be about excesses. The cops had been on the case at a time, playing occasionally with their breathalyzer toys. They were trained on it but no longer stop vehicles or direct people to blow into the equipment at random. One could argue about the many levels at which such random stopping [without any apparent reason] for random checks is wrong, but that we leave for another day.

For now, let's return to alcoholism since the topic as been broached. This problem is not talked about enough probably because it is substance abuse and HIV/ AIDS which receive funding, leading unfortunately to a situation where Sikkim's battle with the bottle is not discussed with any seriousness as a problem anymore.

But a problem it is.

Many people tend to identify alcoholism as a traditional dispensation of the hill people. This is an ill-informed preconception since alcoholism [as a wide-spread problem] is most definitely a recent challenge; it could not have arrived here more than half a century or at the most six decades ago. Alcoholism really becomes possible with the arrival of the IMFLs [India Made Foreign Liquors] since the local brews required too much work and time to be manufactured in enough quantities to feed the alcoholism on a scale that is now possible and also common. It is hence wrong to begin any discussion on alcoholism by mentioning that it is a traditional weakness of the Hill People. Yes, the people tippled and must have also gotten drunk occasionally because communities here allowed 'drinking', but that cannot be construed as meaning addictive levels of drinking. The prejudice, however, because it serves so many businesses so well, has been allowed to set in and after it was ignored in the initial years [of IMFLs and other mass distilling units arriving], spread rapidly to ingrain itself in the society. The damage wreaked by alcoholism cannot be stressed enough and media here should carry forward its success with getting the problem of substance abuse addressed [to some extent] and report more effectively and widely on the abuse of alcohol which is just as impairing. The media, when even it overlooks the problem of alcoholism in the society, ends up reflecting the social acceptance of this malaise as something bequeathed by culture.

Few people are disturbed in Sikkim when a colleague turns up for work reeking of alcohol. The only response that an alcoholic evokes are snide remarks and behind the back jokes. There is still no worried concern, or so it appears. Sikkim's indifference towards this problem will weigh heavy on its collective conscience some day. Many excuse alcoholism with the argument that the person is earning enough to indulge himself/ herself.

While there is no denying the fact that substance abuse is a serious concern, alcoholism, because not enough seem to be taking it seriously, is even more worrying. Even if one were to keep the emotions aside, the impact alcoholism has on the economy should attract corrective action. Most people turn alcoholic in what should be the most productive years of their lives, both professionally as well as a family. When their faculties are compromised, as alcoholism is wont to do, their work suffers as does their family. Those who argue that alcohol boosts creativity or allows them to relax, if their dependence is severe, are only peddling excuses to cover up for their weakness and the rest find refuge in these excuses to cover up for their vacuity towards the problem. Too much is put at risk with this indifference because like with all social problems, alcoholism does not affect only the individual but has the entire family suffering. While the younger 'addict' makes the elders of the family suffer guilt pangs, an alcoholic, because in most cases they are working members of the family, end up abusing the family [because they have more 'power' and control]. Sometimes, while the elders can just ignore the rants of an alcoholic, the younger ones are scarred forever by the trauma. This is a social problem and requires the community to step forward and engage proactively in its battle against the bottle. Sadly, in Sikkim, even the war-cry has not been sounded yet...

Reasserting proper relationships of accountability in the Age of Greta

She sits small on the large stage, her face contorted trying to contain emotion as she labours to push her words out; on the brink of crying. She tells those listening: "This is all wrong, I shouldn't be up here. I should be back in school on the other side of the ocean."

And this is what we see and hear as we watch Greta Thunberg, the 16-year-old girl who just one year ago started a global climate movement, speaking to world leaders meeting in New York for the United Nations Climate Summit.

The adults on stage watch her, the audience watches, the young people outside the UN holding signs watch, and that moment on stage in which she holds so many of us at the edge of our seat is played over and over in an endless chain of social media tweets and likes. We all watch with some mixture of fascination, awe, inspiration and curiosity.

Yet there is a line past which Thunberg's activism can become spectacle. The young person, who in her own words has felt the loss of her childhood because of empty promises from state leaders who were supposed to be the keepers of a healthy planet for her generation, becomes a human sacrifice that none of us should accept.

UNACCEPTABLE SACRIFICE

Her suffering - for our collective benefit - becomes part of what we used to deem an unacceptable sacrifice, and in this time of desperate politics, adults allow it to continue. It is time that Thunberg, who sparked millions of people to action, got some rest. It is time for proper accountability relationships to be redrawn between citizens and their political representatives, consumers and producers, civil society organizations and their members, children and adults.

This article is directed at the adults left in the room.

After all, when our states raise taxes or run deficits, wage war abroad or build infrastructure at home, freeze



wages or create training programs, legislate clean water or relax industrial waste pollution, we don't rely on our children to scream loud enough for our governments to create the change we need.

We have accountability mechanisms in place. We agree on shared purposes, establish who is going to be held to account, to whom and for what. Then we regulate processes, standards and sanctions.

In our regular lives, we read to become better informed and ask political candidates hard questions during election campaigns. We join organizations, discuss the issues with our neighbours on our street and create or sign petitions. Once these political demands have been articulated, we hold public leaders and private companies to their promises by naming, shaming or leaving them.

We vote with our ballots and with our wallets as consumers to orient social action. We try to buy goods produced responsibly and shun those suspect of being socially or environmentally damaging. We take legal action when required. We cajole each other to keep defending agreed goals in our workplace and our neighbourhoods.

COLLECTIVE ACTIONS

Our best social achievements are the products of relentlessly negotiating goals and then enforcing them until we accomplish peace, a liveable wage or a safe place to live and thrive. Though many of these hard-fought battles have been preceded by untold human suffering and environmental disasters.

Just as we have mechanisms to create rules and assign responsibility for public, private and voluntary action in our diverse societies, we also have established modes of sanctioning rule-breakers who individually, and for private benefit, undermine our collective public goods. These accountability mechanisms of our everyday lives need to reassert themselves in the most comprehensive way possible as we face an existential threat to our planet.

This week has been about a collective will to prioritize our quality of life over "endless economic growth," in Thunberg's own words, and in some cases setting up specific accountability metrics.

PERFORMING ACCOUNTABILITY
City mayors, including Toronto's
John Tory, have declared climate
emergencies, joining 800 other
cities around the world who have
done this so far. Companies are
supporting the climate strikes by
closing stores, temporarily ceasing
operations and launching their own
digital strikes in which their websites go dark.

Giants like Amazon are pledging to drastically reduce their carbon emissions ahead of their own targets. Pension funds and insurers are committing to carbon neutral portfolios by 2050. Some academic institutions, like the University of California, are also divesting from fossil fuel holdings their billions of dollars in pension funds and endowments.

Some media outlets are changing the language they use when reporting on climate, introducing into their style guides wording like "climate crisis" instead of "climate change."

Some professors are cancelling their regular classes and holding teach-ins, open and participatory fora for lecturing and debating large social issues that are reminiscent of ones that helped galvanize student protests against the war in Vietnam.

Children, who are so much at the core of this fight, have resorted to domestic courts and complaint mechanisms in international conventions. Most recently they have filed a complaint to the UN Committee on the Rights of the Child, against the five largest emitting states that are signatories of the convention. They accuse states of violating their rights by subjecting them to the devastating effects of climate change.

To reassert proper relationships of accountability, the next steps must include ensuring compliance and effecting sanctions wherever failures to deliver results start to emerge. After all, we cannot set standards if we as citizens, consumers and members of civil society are not equally committed to enforcing them.

Just as we sanction those who undermine our political resolve for peace, equity or human security we have to sanction with all the accountability mechanisms we already have at our disposal those who undermine carbon emission standards and maximum carbon budgets. Adults must reassert and enforce the collective will – not marvel at a young person's self-control on a global stage to get that work done.

What fictional superheroes can tell us about devotion and why we believe in gods

The relentless supply of movies about superheroes and supervillains is difficult to ignore. Some people can't get enough. Others hope to avoid them. But psychological researchers see a cultural phenomenon worthy of study.

Fictional characters with supernatural powers are often based on mythical gods and goddesses, fighting an ancient battle between good and evil with abilities that violate our intuitive expectations about the world.

In our recently published research, we asked 300 study participants to describe features of fictional supernatural beings and we compared them with features of the gods people worship. We found some striking differences that provide clues as to why some beings attract religious devotion, while others do not. WHAT MAKES RELIGIOUS BEINGS SPECIAL

The question of why religious beings are special is more puzzling than it first appears. Initially, it seems obvious that an ancestral spirit that, for example, reads minds and walks through walls, could be an object of worship. We expect minds to be private, living things to die, and solid objects to be impermeable. Entities that defy such expectations – which researchers call "folk theories" – are remarkable and memorable.

The problem is, many other entities violate our folk theories in the same way. Some superheroes can read minds and walk through walls as well, and yet these characters rarely elicit belief. Still other entities with superhuman powers, such as Bigfoot, vampires or werewolves, are occasionally believed in, but not prayed to.

Why don't people worship such entities, which defy our expectations just as well as Jesus, Allah and Zeus do?

Our work points to an answer that has been proposed by philosophers and psychologists for centuries, from David Hume to Sigmund Freud. We believe in gods because it is comforting.

When we asked participants about the traits they ascribe to supernatural religious figures, we found that, on average, they rated them as more beneficent than fictional beings



that people do not worship. In other words, religious beings are better equipped to improve people's lives in significant ways than fictional characters with superhuman abilities.

THE COMFORT THEORY

Religious beings were also found to routinely defy folk theories about psychology in particular – possessing abilities such as omniscience, mind-control, telepathy and precognition – rather than defying folk theories about biology (such as regeneration) or physics (flight)

In our current research, we found people believe that beings with such psychological abilities are better equipped to help us. This may be because threats to our species have become increasingly social over evolutionary time. Detecting deception, maintaining one's reputation and avoiding social exclusion have become more significant concerns than avoiding predators and finding shelter. Religious beings with the ability to mitigate these social threats should be particularly appealing.

Other features pointed to the comfort theory in less obvious ways. We found that abilities attributed to religious beings were more ambiguous than those attributed to fictional characters. For example, omnipotence and weather control certainly defy expectations, but which ones, and how many? Is god manipulating a storm with his mind, or physically pulling it into position? This ambiguity may best be described with the

phrase "God works in mysterious ways."

Research has shown that when we want to believe in something, such as personally possessing a positive trait, it helps if the trait is ambiguous (e.g. sophisticated) rather than precise (e.g. punctual). This gives us latitude to interpret a variety of evidence in its favour.

The same argument can apply to gods we want to believe in. One person may prefer the god that pulls storms into position. Another may prefer the telekinetic god. If both interpretations are allowed, the god can be made to fit what each person finds plausible. Ambiguous features therefore make it easier to believe in comforting gods.

GODS ARE NEITHER HEROES NOR VIL-

The final feature of religious beings we discovered is that they do not easily fit into the superhero or supervillain categories that often distinguish fictional beings. Gods are more beneficent, but they are also more ambivalent, than fictional characters.

They have the ability to reward, but also to threaten and punish. While a mix of carrots and sticks undoubtedly helps gods enforce religious and moral rules, we suggest that ambivalence is also crucial for eliciting religious rituals and prayers, which in turn reinforce belief.

Indeed, there is little point in beseeching a purely benevolent or malevolent god: the former will always grant your request, and the latter never will. Only an ambivalent god can be swayed by an act of faith or a faithfully performed ritual

A similar account might help explain why polytheistic religions typically contain a mix of positive and negative gods, the latter of which provide little comfort on their own.

In summary, gods are more beneficent, ambivalent, ambiguous and psychologically astonishing than fictional characters and, notably, these are precisely the traits that encourage belief. So even if you shudder at the thought of yet another Marvel movie, the fictional universe has taught us quite a bit about what makes gods special and what motivates some of us to believe in them.

MCL suffers Rs 2.6cr loss due to stir over goat's death



BHUBANESWAR, OCT 1 (PTI): The Mahanadi Coalfields Ltd (MCL) said it suffered a loss of Rs 2.68 crore due to agitation over the death of a

The stir occurred at Talcher coalfields over the demand of local residents for Rs 60,000 as compensation for the death of the goat, killed in an accident with a coal transportation tipper, the MCL said in a statement.

A mob led by some residents of a neighbouring village halted coal transportation and despatch work at Jaganath Sidings number 1 and 2 at Talcher coalfields from 11 am on Monday, it said.

Work resumed only at 2.30 pm after the intervention of senior officials and the police, the

statement said.

This three-and-halfhour illegal stoppage of work caused an estimated loss of Rs 1.4 crore on account of coal transportation to the sidings and Rs 1.28 crore on account of despatch through the Railways, the release

Besides the estimated loss of Rs 2.68 crore, the government exchequer also suffered a loss of Rs 46 lakh due to this stoppage of work, it said.

The company has lodged an FIR with the local police station for necessary action against those responsible for the illegal obstruction of work, the statement said.

Such illegal obstructions to coal mining operations not only act against the economic cern, he added.

Coal mines are restricted working zones where only people who are authorised, trained and have the knowhow of the mines are allowed to enter to perform their job while general movement is totally prohibited, he said.

Calcutta HC grants anticipatory bail to Rajeev Kumar

KOLKATA, OCT 1 (PTI): In a relief to former Kolkata Police commissioner Raieev Kumar, the Calcutta High Court granted anticipatory bail to the senior IPS officer in connection with the multicrore-rupee Saradha chit fund scam on Tuesday, saying it was not an appropriate case for custodial interrogation.

A bench comprising justices S Munshi and S Dasgupta said if Kumar was arrested by the Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) in connection with the case, he would have to be released immediately on bail by an appropriate court on two sureties of Rs 50,000

Observing that Kumar had cooperated with the central probe agency, which is investigating the case, the bench said it was not an appropriate case for custodial interrogation of the petitioner.

It directed Kumar, who is currently the Additional Director General of the West Bengal Criminal Investigation Department (CID), to cooperate with the investigating officers.

It also directed Ku-

mar to make himself available before the investigating officers in the case for questioning on a 48-hour prior notice by the CBI.

On September 21, a pre-arrest bail plea of the IPS officer was rejected by the Alipore District and Sessions Court.

The CBI has issued multiple notices to Kumar since May 27, asking him to appear before it for questioning as a witness in the Saradha chit fund scam.

However, he did not appear before the CBI investigators and sought more time on every occasion, citing various rea-

The Saradha group of companies allegedly duped lakhs of people to the tune of Rs 2,500 crore, promising higher rates of return on their investments.

The IPS officer was part of the Special Investigation Team (SIT) set up by the West Bengal government to investigate the scam, before the Supreme Court handed over the case to the CBI in 2014, along with other chit fund cases.

The Saradha chit fund scam was unearthed in 2013 during Kumar's tenure as the Bidhannagar Police commis-

He was then quizzed by the agency for nearly 40 hours over five days at its office in Shillong in February.

The apex court had, on May 24, refused to extend the protection from arrest to Kumar, which it had granted to him earlier, and asked him to approach the Calcutta High Court or the trial court for seeking relief in the

The CBI had then summoned Kumar on May 27 for questioning in connection with the Ponzi scheme, against which he had moved the Calcutta High Court.

A vacation bench of the high court had, on May 30, granted Kumar an interim protection from arrest and coercive action by the CBI. The protection was extended from time to time.

The high court had, on September 13, vacated its interim order granting Kumar protection from arrest. It had also rejected his prayer for quashing the CBI notice that sought his appearance for interrogation in the case.

Six NDFB(S) militants nabbed in Assam

GUWAHATI, OCT 1 (PTI): Six militants of the National Democratic Front of Boroland (Songbijit), including the outfit's selfstyled cultural secretary, were apprehended and a cache of arms recovered from their hideout during a raid in Assam's Kokrajhar district on Tuesday.

The apprehensions were made during a joint operation by the Indian Army and the Assam Police at Ripu Reserve Forest in the district, a

Defence statement said. Based on specific information about the presence of NDFB(S) militants in Raimana area near Akshaiguri, troops of the Sikh Light Infantry regiment laid multiple ambushes on the intervening night of Monday

and Tuesday when they noticed six individuals moving suspiciously in the area, it said.

On being challenged. the militants tried to escape by taking advantage of darkness and thick foliage but the troops reacted swiftly and nabbed the six persons, the release said.

Spot questioning of the nabbed persons revealed they are ND-FB(S) militants trained in Myanmar, it said.

The apprehended persons are Bahaigya Basumatary alias Belarwm, the outfit's cultural secretary and also the deputy finance secretary, Ranjolal Wary alias Gobla, Rubiram Goyary alias G Rwmwgwmw, Julesh Musharay alias M Jujil-

ang, Sailen Borgoyary alias B Sibithao and Rajesh Narzary alias N Railang, it said.

The statement said

the nabbed persons revealed the location of a temporary camp close the apprehension spot. One M16 assault ri-

fle, six 7.65 mm pistols, twelve magazines, ammunition, medicines, rations and other combat materials were recovered, it said.

While three of the militants are from Kokrajhar district, the remaining three belong to Chirang district, it said, adding the apprehended persons were a handful of the NDFB(S) militants active in the Bodoland Territorial Area Districts (BTAD) area of Assam.

The release said the Army strove for over three months to nab these militants, adding the apprehension is a major setback for the outfit's activities in Kokrajhar district.

Due to tough living conditions, sustained pressure by the security forces and lack of support from the locals, most of the NDF-B(S) cadres are disillusioned and demoralised, it said.

The statement said the security forces will continue exerting pressure through sustained operations till all the ND-FB(S) militants are neutralised.

The NDFB(S) outfit is accused of perpetrating massacres in Assam.



Mahatma transformed Champaran, which takes pride in being the place where, in a way, his journey towards attaining unparalleled greatness started, Brajkishor Singh, secretary of the Gandhi Sangrahalaya memorial and museum in Motihari, told PTI.

The Gandhi Sangrahalaya is one of the numerous places named after the Mahatma in Motihari. There is also the spic and span Bapudham railway station that was inaugurated by Prime Minister Narendra Modi last year.

It was due to Bapu's association with the Khan Abdul Gaffar Khan fondly called the Frontier Gandhi - took the trouble to visit this remote north Bihar district. Many vears later. Subhas Chandra Bose, too, addressed a huge public meeting at the Ramna Maidan here, Singh, who is in his 90s and is a former state minister, said.

He said Gandhi's association with Champaran did not end with the satyagraha for the indigo farmers. He also set up a number of ashrams and schools.

When north Bihar was ravaged by a devastating earthquake in 1934, Gandhi was back with an army of followers, most notable among them being Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru, Singh said.

I am thrilled at the thought that this museum is the very spot where Gandhi stood in front of the sub divisional magistrate, refusing to leave the district or secure release by furnishing a bail bond of Rs 100. The calm courage moved the British officer to the extent that he let off the Mahatma despite his reluctance to fulfill any of these conditions, Singh

A stone pillar, designed by the acclaimed Nandlal Bose, stands at the exact spot Gandhi did on April 18, 1917, his first satyagraha'.

Gandhi was unaware of the very existence of Champaran until he visited in 1917, three years after his return to India in 1914.

I must confess that I did not know then even the name, much less the geographical position, of Champaran, and I hardly had any notion of indigo plantations. I had seen packets of indigo, but little dreamed that it was grown and manufactured in Champaran and at great hardship to thousands of agriculturists, he later wrote in his autobiography The Story of My Experiments With Truth.

He came to Champaran thanks to Rajkuplace that people like mar Shukla, a landowner from Champaran, who was up in arms against the oppression of indigo farmers by the East India Company.

According to Motihari-born academician B N Pandey, it is not just the buildings which have suffered neglect.

Gandhi's visit gave Champaran worldwide fame. But many heroes have remained unsung. All know about Rajkumar Shukla

(But) Shukla got an audience with Gandhi because of Braj Kishore Prasad, whose daughter Prabhavati married Jayaprakash Narayan. Although he belonged to adjoining Saran, I wonder why Champaran has no landmark named after Braj Kishore babu, he said.

He added that any number of people should get credit for making the plight of indigo farmers a matter known well enough before Gandhi came here.

The 150th birth anniversary of Gandhi is indeed an occasion for celebration. So was the centenary of Champaran Satyagraha launched by Bihar government two years ago with much fanfare. But the land awaits due recognition for these unsung heroes whose contributions were less known, but by no means smaller, Pandey added.


