Chief Minister announces slew of sops for Govt employees, asks them to work with more dedication now

SUMMIT REPORT

GANGTOK, 11 SEPT:
The State Government has capitulated On its decision to pay arrears to government employees from 01 Jan, 2017 and has now decided to shift the date to 01 Jan, 2016. It was also decided that advance arrears will be paid during the forthcoming Dasain festival.

Chief Minister Pawan Chamling made the announcement on his Facebook page today wherein he informed about a meeting that had taken place today at Samman Bhawan with the representatives of Group C& D government employees.

"Over the last few months, I have come

to understand that some of our State Government employees, specially the Group C&D are expressing their unhappiness regarding the Pay Committee recommendations. It must be remembered that as the Chief Minister, I take it as my responsibility to look after the needs and welfare of our employees, whom I consider the pil-lar of State administration as well as my partners in State-building, I therefore, felt it pertinent to hold deliberations so as to provide the best possible pay package to them." he wrote.

Another decision taken during the meeting was the formation of a Sub-Committee to examine and sort out the anomalies (if any) in the Pay Committee recommendations.

It was also decided that arrears will be paid at the following rate: i) Group A employees- Rs. 1.05 lakhs, ii) Group B employees - Rs. 95,000, iii) Group C employees - Rs. 50,000, Group D employees - Rs. 40,000,

The government has also decided to resume the practice of second Saturdays as official holiday.

However, as notified earlier, the allowances will be payable from 1st September 2018 and arrears will be disbursed in three annual installments as recommended by the Pay Committee.

Earlier, the then Pay Revision Commit-

tee chairperson, Rinchen Ongmu Thakar-

pa, had recommended implementation of rrears from 01 Ian 2017 instead of 01 Ian 2016 which was accepted by the Government in the month of June earlier this year.

Addressing the government employ-es, Mr Chamling has said that changing the date for payment of arrears alone has set the State back by Rs 354 crore - a huge amount of fund which could have been used for developmental projects, adding that the State Government has gone out of its way in ensuring that the hopes and aspirations of government employees are

The CM goes on to remind government employees "that they do not contribute directly to the State as they draw their salaries from the State Ex-Chequer. Since they enjoy the benefit of Income Tax exemption, they have a huge advantage financially compared to their counterparts in other states and even in the Central Government departments.

Further stating that the government has done the best possible for the employees and will continue doing so, the CM has said that the onus now lies on each and every State Government employee to perform his/her duties with more dedication, sincerity and honesty and transform themselves to be most disciplined and able work force of the country.

Petrol, diesel prices hit fresh highs

New Delhi, Sep 11 (PTI): Petrol and diesel prices hit fresh highs on Tuesday as rupee plunged to an all-time low, making imports costlier. A 14 paisa per litre hike in petrol and die-sel prices each took the rates to an all-time high, according to price noti-fication of state-owned fuel retailers.

Petrol price in Delhi climbed to Rs 80.87 per litre, while in Mumbai it inched up to Rs 88.26. A litre of diesel in the national capital was priced at Rs 72.97 and Rs 77.47 in Mumbai.

Centre announces hike in incentives of Asha, Anganwadi workers

NEW DELHI, SEP 11 (PTI): In good news for lakhs of Asha and Anganwadi workers. Prime Minister Narendra Modi Tuesday announced a hike in their monthly honorarium from October.

In addition all accredited social health activists (Asha) will be brought under the coverage of various social security schemes and provided free insurance cover under Pradhan Man-tri Jeevan Jyoti Bima Yojana and Prime

Minister Suraksha Bima Yojana.

The social health activists will not have to pay any premium for the insurance coverage and will get Rs 4 lakh in case of any untoward incident, the prime minister said during a video interaction with Asha, ANM (auxiliary nurse midwife) and Anganwadi workers from across the country.

He said the revised incentive will come into effect from October and it will reflect in their salaries from November onwards, which would be a Diwali gift for them.

Those who drew an honorarium of Rs 3,000 will from now on get Rs 4,500 and those who used to get Rs 2,200 will get Rs 3,500, he said.

The honorarium of Anganwadi helpers will be hiked from Rs 1,500 to Rs 2,500, he said.


These are routine incentive given by the Centre to Asha and Anganwadi workers. The state governments also give them separate incentive.

There are around 14 lakh Anganwa-dis or child care centres in rural areas across the country and 10 crore beneficiaries, who include children under the age of six and pregnant women and lactating mothers. There are a total of 12,83,707 Anganwadi workers and 10,50,564 helpers.

There are a total of 10,23,136 accredited social health activists (Asha) across the country.

Cannot Afford to Forget

But is just remembering enough?

 $N^{\rm ext}$ Tuesday will mark seventh anniversary of 18 September Earthquake, that monumental event which pulled a wicked surprise on Sikkim, not an easy trick to play on a region which has lived for centuries with extreme weather conditions and temperamental plate tectonics. After the temblor had coursed through Sikkim, around 8,000 homes had been rendered too dangerous to be habitable anymore and heritage, both tangible and intangible, had been damaged beyond salvaging. Several of the monasteries are still in the process of reconstruction, the administrative headquarters of the State still functions out of a borrowed facility, around 1,200 of the destroyed rural homes are still being "reconstructed" under the ambitious REDRH project and the most ambitious hydel project in the State is only now on the verge of being commissioned, having finally shaken off the earth-quake setback. Since the earthquake reminded Sikkim of the tectonic realities which lie underneath, Sikkim has been reintroduced to some other extremes of its setting – from flashfloods, to forest fires to landslides to GLOFs, over the past five years, the Sikkimese have experience the whole spectrum of the Sikkim expe rience - at one time luxuriating at nature at its most indulgent and at others cowering under nature at its most devastating.

Against this backdrop, disaster preparedness

should receive a relook, hopefully a more nuanced retouch given the significance of the upcoming weekend. Sikkim should not forget that the surprise of 18/09/11 stemmed not so much from the unprecedented scale of the earthquake as from the inexcusable fact that Sikkim forgot that it occupies among the more disaster-prone sectors of the subcontinent. As for the earthquake itself, the only surprise it can stake claim to is in its confirmation that Sikkim harboured tectonic potential to push a 6.8 scale earthquake. Through the recorded history of earthquakes in the region, the big ones of the past century and a half [which wreaked substantial damage in Sikkim as well] had been earthquakes with their epicentres at "established/ identified" trou-ble-spots - fault-lines many hundred kilometres away from Sikkim. In some warped sense of misplaced security, this had apparently convinced people and policy-makers at a subconscious level that the State could do very little to cushion the impact of the next big one and that Sikkim's distance from the expected ground zeros would absorb some of the ferocity and dissipate the impact. This was admittedly wrong because no one can prevent an earthquake, but everyone can and should work towards mitigating it. And now, even the excuse of distance is no longer available with the tectonic plates on which Sikkim sits broadcasting in very clear terms that even they can pack a mean punch. In effect then, natural disasters are no longer about 'if' and 'when' and have now become 'here and now'.

And now, as the amplified fury of end-monsoon showers are battering the highways and patches of patchy hill slopes, it's not just about earthquakes, but a host of other challenges like landslides, cloudbursts, GLOFs etc and if the winter runs dry, there will be forest fires and man-animal conflicts as well. Natural disasters do not play in isolation and when these incidents achieve disaster proportions, they work in combinations. Seven years since the devastation of September 2011, yes, it has been that many years, after Sikkim has recollected the experience and taken stock of repairs and restoration, it should test the practicability and resoluteness of its proposed responses for future calamities. Modern lifestyles have a way of blindsiding obvious realities, and if any lesson is to be learnt from the 18 September horror, it should be in rediscovering the traditional knowledge base. Centuries of living in a particular region grooms people to instinctively respect the brute force of nature and adopt lifestyles which mitigate the impact of the nature of disasters indigenous to a particular region. Sikkim obviously had this, but lost it in the past fifty years or so. These need to be re-remembered and all disaster preparedness plans should respect the knowhow of resident populations and reinforce traditional practices with scientific verification and planning.

This anniversary, Sikkim should make sure that it

does not forget – not just the earthquake and the affected – but also the traditional knowledge base which served its people well in the past.

Making society civil again

United States media has been awash with debates about civility in recent months after a number of officials in Donald Trump's administration have heckled and shamed in public places.

Commentators claimed the cause of incivility stems from everything from political orientation to Donald Trump's leadership and the way we communicate on social media. The recent White House wavering on flag-lowering protocol following the death of Sen. John McCain has only reinforced the ubiquity of this issue, as did high-profile speakers calling for a return to civility at his funeral.

But eroding civility is not just a modern Amer can affliction; Canada, the U.K. and others are not

Respect and civility ultimately reflect our so-cial competency. Their decline can be attributed to a number of factors in our modern world: Abrupt encounters between different beliefs (e.g., through immigration and refugee "crises"), the disbelief and denial that social inequalities still persist, social media algorithms that only expose us to beliefs that are similar to our own and the rise of both real and artificial online trolls.

THE MICROCOSM: INCIVILITY IN GROUPS Whether intentional or instinctual, human and non-human animals alike act in a way that ensures

equitable exchanges within their group.

We seek balance. If we are treated in a respect-

ful manner, we want to return the favour. If we feel slighted, we typically want reprisal. This is the cat-alyst for the spiral of incivility.

Incivility has become a persistent concern in workplaces around the world (e.g., U.S. and Japan). It reflects more general tendencies driven by fea-

tures of individual psychology in group settings. Whether at work, at a restaurant, or at home, our expectations will ultimately depend on the kind of relationship we believe we share with those around us: Communal sharing in a family, equality with a co-worker, deference to a boss or even proportional cost and benefit in a market economy

All of these expectations reflect possible models of fair interpersonal exchange that we might reference. Crucially, violating their norms can make us feel justified in engaging in verbal and nonverbal

Rather than being unethical or disrespectful, others simply might not share the same beliefs about what is appropriate in a given context: For example, as children grow older, the expectation of deference to a parent can turn into an expectation of equality — one that is not yet shared by

fort to understand each other. Despite our confidence in knowing the intentions of others, our accuracy can be quite low.



DEPERSONALIZING OURSELVES, OTHERS ONLINE

All we truly know of each other are sundry frag-ments that are hastily gathered in a moment. Social judgments are made fast and furjously. Yet, understanding others is a multi-faceted competency that requires time to develop.

In an online setting, where many social cues are modest or absent, we are left with the written word. Without nonverbal cues discerning their meaning can be a daunting task. Online posts have become the Rorschach tests of our time. They are as ambiguous and equally inaccurate in predicting

Making matters worse, when we feel like we are one of the crowd, we tend to misbehave. Anonymity, a lack of time, and stress can reduce helpful behaviour and increase antisocial behaviour.

In online spaces, we feel disinhibited. Online communities and dating sites are replete with un-civil behaviour. Rather than living in a community with repercussions, we practice avoidance. Rather than constructively confronting perceived inaccuracies we find in ourselves, we might run further away from one another and toward the fringes.

In the short run, we might preserve a fragile sense of self as a good and competent individual. In the long run, this isolation only reinforces perceived differences and places us in a bubble.

LOSING CONTACT WITH OUR LEADERS

Power can alter our behaviour. It can change what people want and how they attain their goals.

Leaders believe that they must symbolically

represent the group and its values. If those with power feel it's their duty to adhere to the values of the group, they will. If certain values are deemed irrelevant, they will be ignored: A leader might focus on a group's finances and neglect its ethics.

Over the long term, leaders can trap themselves

if these values are not realistically attainable over the course of their tenure. This moral hypocrisy places them in a precarious position. The higher the

pedestal, the greater the fall. And people will push.
Wanting a world without ambiguity, follow ers often resort to rationalizing inconsistencies and can dismiss the proposals from those of other groups, something that can translate into re-



CHOOSING THE COURSE OF HISTORY

History is a willing tutor if we're prepared to listen with a critical ear. When we come together to fight a common enemy, we can push back empires. When we lose common ground, our societies shatter. A reading of the history of North America reflects

an uneasy plurality. Whether historically or presently, evidence suggests that tensions can be reduced when faced with common threats. Leaders can and do manipulate this to increase cohesion within the majority. However, there is a price to pay.

In the Second World War, Japanese-Canadians

paid the price. Now, an increase in hate crimes might suggest Canadian Muslims are footing the bill. The U.K. and the U.S. have their own variants.

Unless we want to become another failed stratum in the sediment of history like Rome, we must choose our responses wisely. When our barbarians

are at the gates, will we be prepared?

The greatest threats are not as simple as identifiable countries or peoples. Instead, our common adversaries are largely self-made. Antibiotic-re-sistant diseases, climate change, workforces illequipped for seismic technological shifts and over-

implified rhetoric imperil us. The endemic rashness of political discourse can no longer be tolerated.

Civility has a role to play here as we challenge ourselves and others. We must be humble with the limits of our knowledge. In an age when fact and opinion have become blurred for many, we must approach absolute statements with caution. This requires deliberation and respectful exchange. The more reasoned the arguments we take into consideration, the better off we will be.

Equally important, civility does not imply that all opinions have equal merit. Instead, we must invest time and effort in our response and avoid being stuck between reactive gut feelings and indif-ference. We must reflect on how we will be judged and remembered when the dust of history settles

In an irrevocably globalized world, civility is likely more important now than it has ever been.

What happens when you hold in a fart?

Ever been in a situation where passing wind is going to be hugely embarrassing and you've had to hold in a fart? Let's face it – we all have.
Trying to hold it in leads to a build

up of pressure and major discomfort. A build up of intestinal gas can trigger abdominal distension, with some gas reabsorbed into the circulation and exhaled in your breath. Holding on too long means the build up of intestinal gas will eventually escape via an uncontrollable fart.

The research is not clear on

whether the rise in pressure in your rectum increases your chance of de-veloping a condition called diverticulitis, where small pouches develop in the gut lining and become inflamed – or whether it doesn't matter at all.

WHAT IS FLATUS?

Flatus, farts and breaking wind refer to intestinal gases that enter the rectum due to the body's usual gastro-intestinal processes of digestion and metabolism and then leave via the

As your body digests food in the small intestine, components that can't be broken down move further along the gastrointestinal track and eventually into the large intestine called the colon.

Intestinal bacteria break down

some of the contents by fermentation. This process produces gases and by products called fatty acids that are reabsorbed and used in metabolic



pathways related to immunity and preventing disease development.

Gases can either be reabsorbed through the gut wall into the circula-tion and eventually exhaled through the lungs or excreted via the rectum,

HOW MUCH FLATUS IS NORMAL?

It can be challenging for researchers to get people to sign up for experi-ments that measure farts. But thankfully, ten healthy adults volunteered to have the amount of gas they passed over a day quantified.

In a 24-hour period all the flatus they expelled was collected via a rectal catheter (ouch). They ate normally but to ensure a boost in gas produc-tion they also had to eat 200 grams (half a large can) of baked beans.

The participants produced a median total volume of 705ml of gas in 24 hours, but it ranged from 476ml to 1,490ml per person. Hydrogen gas was produced in the greatest volume (361ml over 24 hours), followed by carbon dioxide (68ml/24 hr). Only three adults produced methane, which ranged from 3ml/24 to 120ml/24 hr. The remaining gases, thought to mostly be nitrogen, contributed about 213ml/24 hr.

Men and women produced about the same amount of gas and averaged eight flatus episodes (individual or a series of farts) over 24 hours. The volume varied between 33 and 125 ml per fart, with bigger amounts of intestinal gas released in the hour after meals.

Gas was also produced while they were asleep, but at half the rate compared to during the day (median 16ml/hr vs 34ml/hr)

FIBRE AND FLATUS

In a study on dietary fibre and flatus, researches investigated what happens to intestinal gas production when you put people on a high-fibre

diet.

The researchers got ten healthy adult volunteers to eat

their usual diet for seven days while consuming 30 grams of psyllium a day as a source of soluble fibre, or not. In the psyllium week, they were asked to add 10 grams - about one

heaped tablespoon – to each meal.

At the end of each week, the par ticipants were brought into the lab and, in a carefully controlled experi-ment, had an intra-rectal catheter inserted to quantify how gas (in terms of gas volume, pressure and number) moved through the intestine over a couple of hours.

They found the high psyllium-fi-bre diet led to longer initial retention of gas, but the volume staved the neaning fewer but bigger farts.

WHERE DO THE GAS-

ES COME FROM?

Gas in the intestines comes from dif-ferent sources. It can be from swallowing air. Or from carbon dioxide produced when stomach acid mixes with bicarbonate in the small intestine. Or gasses can be produced by bacteria that are located in the large

While these gases are thought to perform specific tasks that impact on health, producing excessive intestinal gas can cause bloating, pain, bor-borygmus (which means rumbling sounds), belching and lots of farts.

The smelliest farts are due to sul-phur containing gases. This was con-firmed in a study of 16 healthy adults who were fed pinto beans and lactu-lose, a non-absorbable carbohydrate turn to 05

Centre to withdraw assistance to Bru relief camps from Oct 1

Centre has appealed to the Bru families housed in Tripura relief camps to return to Mizoram as assistances doled out to them would be withdrawn from October 1.

A meeting was held in Aizawl Monday between the state home department, po-lice and the Centre, which was attended by leaders of the civil societies and representatives of the relief camps.

Ministry of Home Affairs'

Joint Secretary (North East) Satyendra Garg said the Bru leaders in the relief camps would identify those who want to be repatriated and submit the names to the Centre and the Mizoram government.

The Bru refugees in the

Tripura relief camps presently receive free ration and subsistence allowance of Rs 5 per day per person from the

Centre.

The transportation cost for the repatriated families would be borne by the Mizoram government but no state government official would be deployed in the relief camps, as was done earlier, to oversee the process, a senior state home depart-ment official who attended

the meeting said.

The meeting was convened in the backdrop of a tepid response to the ongo-ing repatriation process of the Bru refugees from August



25 to September 25 in which to Mizoram so far, the official

said.

The officials had earlier said that four families were repatriated since the process was kickstarted on August 25

The official said that the meeting was attended by the state Principal Secretary for Home Lalnunmawia Chuaungo, top home department and police officials, president the central committee Young Mizo Associa tion (YMA), leaders of both Mizoram Bru Displaced People's Forum (MBDPF) and Mizoram Bru Displaced Peoand also Elvis Chorkhy, chairman of the Equal Package Demand Committee, representing the Bru families already repatriated to Mizoram.

The state government withdrew the officials deployed in the relief camps to undertake the physical repatriation process after four days of the commencement of the repatriation.

The Centre was earlier optimistic that the Bru families would return to Mizoram during the repatriation pro-cess after inking the agree-

ment on July 3 between Union Home Minister Rajnath Singh, chief ministers of Mizoram and Tripura and Mizoram Bru Displaced People's Forum (MBDPF) chief A Sawibunga in Delhi. As per the agree-ment, all the Bru refugees were to be repatriated before

September 30.

The agreement stipulated that Rs 4 lakh for each repatri-ated Bru family would be de-posited to the bank account of the head of the family which would mature after three years and payment of Rs 1.5 lakh as housing assistance. Each repatriated Bru fam-

ily would be given Rs 5,000 through Direct Benefit Transfer every month and a free ra-

tion for two years.
Senior Ministry of Home Affairs officials said that the relief would be closed by first week of October and assistance doled out to the inmates will be discontinued forth-

Thousands of Brus had been lodged in the Tripura re-lief camps since late 1997 in the wake of a communal tension triggered by the brutal killing of Lalzawmliana, a forest guard, inside the Dampa Tiger Reserve on October 21, 1997 by Bru National Liberation Front (BNLF) militants.

The first attempt to repatriate them from November 16, 2009 not only failed but triggered another wave of exodus after Bru militants gunned down a youth at Bungthuam village, three days before the commencement of the repatriation process.

Though some Bru families had already returned to Mizoram during a number of repatriation processes and on their own will, many of them continued to refuse to leave Tripura till date despite many

The ministry listed signs that might indicate that a child is involved in the game. The signs include becoming with-drawn from friends and family, persistent low mood, visible marks such as deep cuts or wounds

on any part of the body. It also gave guideline on ways to protect a child

from the game.

"Monitor your children's online or social media activity to ensure they are not engaging in this challenge and take regular reports from child counsellors and do not hesitate in seeking professional help," the WCD advisory said.

No mechanised boats to ply on Assam rivers till further orders

GUWAHATI. SEPT 11 (PTI): For the safety of passengers, no mechanised country boats will be allowed to ply on rivers in Assam till further orders, state Transport Minister Chandra Mohan Patowary Tuesday.

All single-engine ferries should be converted to double-engine ones with revers ible gears and as per safety norms, there must be one life jacket for each passenger in the vessel, he said.

It will be mandatory for each passenger to

put on the life jacket while boarding the vessel and deputy commissioners have been directed to conduct safety audit of the ferry vessels in their respective districts, the minister said.

"The government accords highest pri-ority to the safety of the passengers and is taking all possible measures to provide safe, reliable and sustainable mode of transport," Patowary told reporters after a review meeting with officials of the Inland Water Transport department

Patowary also took stock of the World Bank funded project preparation and the realso took stock of the World form measures initiated during the last oneand-a half years.

The project will address the sector reforms holistically, for which Germany-based consultants 'Inros Lackner' have submitted the inception report and the vessel design

and terminal design are being readied.

The Transport Department has been working on a Regulatory Bill for the last six months and the 'Assam Inland Water Transport Reorganization Act' would be placed before the Assembly for approval in the forthcoming session.

The Act will facilitate the setting up of a

separate Regulatory Authority and separate port and shipping management companies, taking into the consideration the recommendations of the Khosla Committee Report submitted in 2013.

The minister also directed that capacity building of IWT staff and other stakeholders must be enhanced.

During the last two years, work on 15 steel vessels and three wooden vessels had been undertaken.

Of them, four steel vessels have already been deployed in Barak and one steel and three wooden vessels in Majuli while the remaining ten vessels will be completed within this financial year, he said.

Humanitarian group says 100 migrants die off Libyan coast

CAIRO SEP 11 (AP): Doctors Without Borders says more than 100 people have died in a shipwreck off the Libvan coast and the remaining survivors are being held in detention in Libya

humanitarian organization says in a Monday news release the shipwreck occurred Sept. 1 and survivors include people with severe burns, pregnant women and babies. A team from the organization provided medical care.

The group says two rubber boats left the Libyan coast carrying migrants from Sudan, Mali, Nigeria, Cameroon, Ghana, Libya, Algeria and Egypt. One of the boats deflated and sank.

The Libyan Coast Guard recovered 276 survivors from both survivors from both boats and brought them to the port city of Khoms, Libya, and only two bodies were reportedly recovered.

Libya has emerged as a major transit point to Europe for those fleeing poverty and civil war elsewhere in Africa.

Pak court issues arrest warrants against former prime minister Abbasi

Pakistan court Monday issued bailable arrest warrants against former prime minister Shahid Khaqan Abbasi for skipping proceedings in a case seeking action against him for disclosing the min-utes of a high-profile security meeting to his party leader Nawaz Sharif.

The petition also seeks action against Sharif under treason charges for claiming that those involved in the deadly 2008 Mumbai terror attack belonged to Pakistan.

A Lahore High Court's three-member bench headed by Justice Syed Mazahar Ali Akbar Naqvi again issued notices to Sharif and a Dawn journalist, who had interviewed the PML-N

The bench was annoyed when no one appeared before the court on behalf of the



Abbasi and the reporter.
"The LHC issued bailable arrest warrants against Abbasi, directing the authorities concerned to send notices to Nawaz Sharif through su-perintendent of Adiala Jail,

Rawalpindi and the Dawn reporter through Senior Superintendent Police Operations Islamabad," a court official

Justice Naqvi observed that Abbasi should have at-

tended the court as he was present during the previous hearing on June 29.

Petitioner's lawyer told the court that Abbasi was in Lahore to run his campaign

Assembly seat NA-124 but he avoided the court hearing.

The petitioner said Sharif, who was disqualified by the Supreme Court in the Panama Papers case in July 2017 and subsequently jailed for 10

years in last July in Avenfield corruption case, in the interview to the Dawn reporter in May last made the remarks that those involved in the Mumbai attack case actually belonged to Pakistan thus committed treason.

The petitioner said the "anti-state" statement of Sharif - a three-time prime min-ister - could be used against Pakistan by its enemies.

She said a meeting of the National Security Council (NSC) was held to discuss the 'misleading' statement of the disqualified premier and later the then prime minister Abbasi met Sharif and conveyed to him the concerns of the military leadership on his

statement. "The act of Abbasi was also a clear violation of his oath as he was bound not to allow his personal interest to influence his official conduct," she said.

The court adjourned the hearing till September 24.

Williams' heated exchanges with an umpire at the tournament final this week have stirred the tennis world.

She was found guilty of code viola-tions and fined USD 17,000 -- raising allegations that there are double standards for male and female players.

Knight, who has a reputation for controversial cartoons, was pilloried from far and wide, including by a member of the US Congress and a large portion of the 22,000 people who commented on his Twitter post showing the drawing.

The detractors included author JK Rowling, who said: "Well done on reducing one of the greatest sportswom-en alive to racist and sexist tropes and turning a second great sportswoman into a faceless prop."

Knight responded to the criticism

by pointing out that he had drawn an unflattering portrayal of Australian male tennis star Nick Kyrgios "behav-

ing badly".

"Don't bring gender into it when it's all about behaviour," he said.

Navratilova to Serena: Even if guys do it, it's wrong



NEW YORK, SEPT 11 (AFP): Martina Navratilova, an 18-time Grand Slam singles champion, says Serena Williams was wrong in her outburst at the US Open women's finals even though she agreed there is a double standard.

Writing in an opinion article for the New York Times, the 61-year-old Czech-born American said a higher standard need-ed to be observed when Williams called chair umpire Carlos Ramos a "thief" and was penalized a key game in the second

"We cannot measure ourselves by what we think we should also be able to get away with," Navratilova wrote. "In fact, this is the sort of behavior that no one should be engaging in on the

Williams, who was thwarted in her bid for a record-tying 24th Slam singles crown in losing to Japan's Naomi Osaka, said she was punished for saying something where men have said far worse without incurring such a penalty.

"Serena Williams has part of it right. There is a huge dou-

ble standard for women when it comes to how bad behavior is punished -- and not just in tennis," Navratilova said.

"But in her protests... she also got part of it wrong. I don't believe it's a good idea to apply a standard of, "If men can get

away with it, women should be able to, too.

"Rather, I think the question we have to ask ourselves is this: What is the right way to behave to honor our sport and to

respect our opponents?'

Williams was issued a warning for coaching, something her coach sitting in the stands, Patrick Mouratoglou, admitted to

Williams was unhappy at the violation call and complained to Ramos she hadn't taken any signals.

Williams later smashed her racquet, resulting in a code

violation and a point deduction, which she argued over with

"Ramos, effectively, had no choice but to dock her a point," Navratilova said.

"It was here that Ms. Williams really started to lose the plot. She and Mr. Ramos were, in effect, talking past each other.

"She was insisting that she doesn't cheat -- completely believable, but besides the point -- while he was making a call over which he, at that point, had little discretion." Matters escalated and Williams called Ramos a "thief," incurring the crucial

It's difficult to know, and debatable, whether Ms. Williams could have gotten away with calling the umpire a thief if she were a male player," Navratilova wrote. "But to focus on that, I think, is missing the point. If, in fact,

the guys are treated with a different measuring stick for the same transgressions, this needs to be thoroughly examined and must be fixed.

Speaking to the publication about that time of her life, Kylie noted: "I was super insecure about my lips. I really


wanted to illusion of bigger lips, so I overlined mine like crazy, and then people started getting obsessed."

her baby girl Stormi.


