CBI raids in Bengal, MP in chit fund case

NADIA (WB) JUN 27 (PTI): A team of CBI special branch sleuths today raided eight places across West Bengal and one in Madhya Pradesh in connection with an ongoing probe into a ponzi scheme case, a senior of-ficial of the investigating agency said.

Though no arrests vere made today, several documents were seized during the raids conduct-ed at different official and residential premises of the accused persons and companies' premises across the state, he said.

The case was reg-istered in July last year against two directors of Golden Pariwar Hold-ing and Developers Pri-vate Limited - Sukalyan Biswas and Bina Biswas and others, the officer said.

"It was alleged that accused collected huge amounts as deposit from the public on assur-ance to repay them with hight interest. However, the accused did not repay the money and closed down their offices, mis-appropriated the invested amount and cheated

the investors," he said.
"Our investigation is still on and several raids may be conducted as per our requisition for the purpose," he added.

Centre to scrap UGC, bring in Higher Education Commission

New Delhi, Jun 27 **(PTI):** The government is set to replace the apex higher education regu-lator University Grants Commission (UGC) with a higher education commission by repealing the UGC Act, 1951.

"Under the leader-ship of PM @narendra-modi has embarked on a process of reforms of the regulatory agencies for better administration of the HE sector (sic). In a landmark decision, a draft Act for repeal of #UGC & setting up #HECI (Higher Education Commission of India) has been prepared," Union HRD Minister Prakash Javadekar tweeted.

"The draft Act is in accordance with the commitment of govt for reforming the regulato-ry systems that provide more autonomy to HE in-

stitutes to promote excellence & facilitate holistic growth of the education system," he added.

He informed that in 2012-13, the State Government acquired 2.92 acre of land for the construction of the Judi-cial Academy following which the department

decided to take up construction work in phase wise. Phase-I construc-tion work is now complete at a cost of Rs 15 crore, which has four components [administrative block, academic block, auditorium block and approach road with car park and central courtyard] as against nine, he added.

sector. "The Commission shall have the power to grant authorization for starting of academic operations on the basis of their compliance norms of academic quality. It will also have the powers to revoke authorization granting to a higher education insti-tution where there is a case of wilful or continuous default in compli-ance with the norms," the draft said.

"There will be an Ad-visory Council to render advice to the Commission on matters con-cerning coordination cerning coordination and determination of standards in the country. This will be represented by the Chairpersons / Vice-Chairpersons of State Councils for Higher Education and chaired by the HRD Minister," it

The meeting was held as part of pan Himalayan Mountain States project under the National Mission on Himalayan Studies (NMHS) being executed by IMI through its State Chapters and a network of young researchers in each state The broad themes chosen for Sikkim under the project are 'Water and Agriculture'.

The meeting was presided over by Member of Parliament [Lok Sabha], PD Rai who is also the founding member and Governing Council member of IMI.

Delivering the key note address at the meeting, Mr Rai informed that a team has been constituted to take forward initiatives like sustainability and sustainable development goals across the Hima-

Mr Rai also complimented the initiatives taken by the State Gov-ernment like organic farming and carbon neutrality which will make the state sustainable and also secure the future of coming generations.

He however rued about the lack of poor data available on various aspects pertaining to environment and related topics

Secretary [Forest Department], Thomas Chandy while addressing the meet stated that adverse environmental impact not just in the entire Himalayan belt but also the Indo Gangetic plains is a serious concern and its mitigation is the

need of the hour.

Citing the example of organic farming as both mitigation and adaptation he held that such initiatives help establish a balance in environment.

Mr Chandy further added that the preliminary reports say that Sikkim is already carbon negative though the negativity has reduced.

The report is expected within

six months," he said.
Further elucidating about fu-ture plans of the government,Mr Chandy said that a cell will be established where each estimate can be fed in the system whether a proj-

ect is carbon negative or positive. Secretary, IMI, Fantry Jaiswal talked about IMI's achievements over the years and the efforts made by the organization towards mobilizing the policy space for the Indian Himalayan Region She informed that IMI works towards safe sustainable and equitable Mountain Development.

Namrata Rawat explained the key features of the project and expect-

findings with regard to the Dhara Vikas Programme. This was followed by detailed presentations and case studies on various top-ics like the highly appraised Dhara Vikas project of RMDD, climate adaptive farming technologies developed by ICAR, importance of traditional agricultural knowledge and practices for climate adaptation and an interesting case study on the impacts of climate change on high altitude pastoral farming.

Cultures Survive ...provided we don't stifle them

B ecause some things need reiteration from time to time, we return here to arguments that have been tabled often and worries that have been raised frequently because the deliberations continue remain

open, and will for some more time. Turn to any corner of the world and one comes across voices of protest or groans of concern from a culture under threat, a way of life nearing extinction, a lifestyle on the brink. While there are always external elements like the influence of globalisation and the pressure to homogenise which eat away at the edifice of cultural uniqueness, the biggest threat comes from those who refuse to let cultures breathe - those who view it as a relic which needs to be preserved in the purest form as imagined or decided by them. Unfortunately for such groups, cultures are living systems which need to be nurtured, not pickled. But 'preserv-ing' is easier since nurturing would entail allowing a culture to grow and that would go against ill-informed beliefs that cultures are perfect on which any growth is a blemish. Such mindsets refuse to accept that culture is not something that can be pickled and preserved as a museum piece for posterity. Culture, because it is about a people, is vibrant, alive and contemporary. It is spontaneous, almost instinctive, and not something that is learnt; it is imbibed. Since culture forms a part of evolution, it is also subject to fresh interpretations, nuances and relevance.

Because culture is about people, it cannot survive on state patronage alone - that would be relegating it to the status of a museum display. Some years ago, members of the Museums Association of India conferred in Gangtok. The focus of that conference was 'Intangible Heritage – Preservation & Portrayal." In layman's terms, they were speaking of ecomuseology, the science, or rather the attempt, to allow cultures to breathe and thrive unencumbered in their natural habitats. But even this comes with its pitfalls. In the Journal of Indian Museums released at the conference the editorial spoke of the "very amateurish and vulgar commercialisation" of culture that one sees in the tourism sector of Rajasthan. What was true of Rajasthan is true for Sikkim as well. The message – preservation of cultures should not come at the cost of reducing vibrant lifestyles into caricatures. Preservation can happen only if the people to whom the culture belongs want to nurture it. For the same reason, if a people reject their Culture as ripe for extinction, no amount of preservation helps. Yet, a culture should not be dismissed even before one has understood it. It is important that the repository of culture is passed on to the next generation to nurture and craft as it feels right. And yes, people can discard a culture if they want to, but only after they have understood it and decided that it does not serve their purpose any more. What the current holders of culture can do is pass it on to the next generation in an as unadulterated a form as possible. What the younger generation, equipped with its better education, can do is research deeper into their roots. Then, even if the physical form of cultures dwindles away, at least the records will survive for future generations, if it feels so inclined, to revive.

What is required of the establishment is to provide the support which allows these aspirations to manifest.

alarm with a health scare after the final whistle Lionel Messi may have dominated the on

field action in Saint Petersburg, but from his VIP box in the stands Maradona reigned supreme as the undisputed centre of attention.

The 57-year-old football legend started the evening dancing playfully with a female Nigeria fan, saluting and waving to well-wishers applauding him in the moments before kick-off.

Throughout Argentina's nerve-shredding 2-1 victory, which secured the South American giants' passage into the last 16, the host broadcaster television feed regularly cut to images of Maradona as the tension mounted

When Messi gave Argentina the lead early in the first half, Maradona screamed his delight, crossing his hands across his chest and gazing to the heavens.

The 1986 World Cup-winner looked increasingly frazzled as the game wore on, at one stage slumped forward in his seat just before half-time.

After Nigeria made it 1-1 from the penalty spot after the break -- a scoreline that would have sent Argentina crashing out of the tournament -- Maradona grew increasingly distraught.

Revisiting the bang African teams get for the bucks they spend on the World Cup

Each World Cup year African football
teams arrive with renewed hopes of making remarkable progress and break-ing the vise grip that Europe and South America have had on this quadrennial tournament for nearly 100 years. Each time, that hope invariably implodes. That surely has to leave African teams

with some critical questions.

The biggest is whether African teams - at the 2018 World Cup finals in Russia they were Egypt, Morocco, Tunisia, Nigeria and Senegal – getting the best bank for the bucks they invest in their teams and coaches attending the competition. Some football fans may see football as recreational, while some politicians use it as a tool for national building. But football is without question a

business: the players are professionals, the coaches are paid a king's ransom, and governments and umbrella body, FIFA, dole out huge sums to support

federations and their teams.

Taking part in the world cup involves both spending money, as well as earning money. Teams spend millions of dollars preparing for the month-long tournament. The funds go to paying coaches, many of whom are the highest paid professionals in the countries they serve. For example, a top government official in Egypt earns an estimated annual salary of USD\$ 28,294 while Egypt's current football manager Hector Cuper gets a reported USD\$1.7 million annually. Egypt didn't make it past the group stage in Russia.

Players also earn well. In some teams foreign based players – for example a Senegalese who plays for a European club - can earn more. And they're camped in five star hotels and their programme is supported by huge budgets. In the case of Nigeria, the annual budget is USD\$16.2 million. This is not a candy budget by any means. On top of this, FIFA pays countries that qualify

handsomely. And they longer they stay in the tournament, the more they get.



But is this money being managed wisely? Are the funds being invested in African teams being worth it? And are their wiser ways to manage the loot that comes from the ga

BIG BUCKS There is seriously good money in the World Cup – and we're not even talking rights and sponsorships.

FIFA pays each team that make it to the World Cup USD\$9.5million – USD\$8million for taking part in the group stage and USD\$1.5 million for

FIFA's distribution of funds is based on how far each of the 32 teams is able to go in the tournament. Thus, by going further a team returns with more money. Just by progressing to the second round of 16 teams brings in an additional USD\$4 million from FIFA. Getting into the quarterfinals brings a placed team gets USD\$24 million and the fourth USD\$22 million.

The winner of the 2018 World Cup final gets The winner of the 2018 World Cup final gets USD\$38 million, with the runners-up paid USD\$28 million. This is up from 2014 when winners Germany received USD\$35 million and beaten finalists, Argentina, got USD\$25 million.

On top of this teams can land seriously lucrative sponsorships. Take US soccer for example

received USD\$49.7 sponsorships, television, licensing and royalties, according to their football federation's tax form filing for 2015.

OPTIONS

One of the ways in which teams can make better use of the money that gets invested in national teams is by spending less. An easy way to cut costs would be for countries to decide to hire local managers and coaches since they cost quite a bit less than expatriates.

There's a strong case to be made for this. Several local ones have done as well as the expatriates. Take the example of Nigeria. Four years ago at the World Cup tournament in Brazil Nigeria's Stephen Keshi was paid less than his expatriate counterparts but took the Nigerian team to

the second phase. It was a feat only a few expatriate Nigerian coaches have been able to achieve with the country's team.

But there's also a case to be made in investing big, particularly if a country decides that it wants to make it past the first round of the tournament. If the money that's being spent on managers, in particular, isn't getting them through to the second round, why keep them? Why not go for the very best managers and perhaps pay them a bit more In addition, extra money can be put into creating a better working environment to increase the probability of going beyond the first phase.

Governments and football associations should go back to their spreadsheets and do some serious recalculating in preparation for the next World Cup in Qatar in 2020. Serious investment might ultimately be the path to a better payout and it may provide additional money to spend on sport

The recent spate of early World Cup exits might just signal that the best time to reevaluate the investment is now

A group of Southeast Asian descendants wants to be recognised as Indigenous Australians

In 1826, an English merchant, Alexander Hare, brought a group of people from Malaysia and Indonesia as well as South Africa and New Guin ea to an atoll northwest of mainland Australia in the Indian Ocean, Hare took them to the Cocos (Keeling) Islands as indentured workers, slaves and/or convicts. A year later, a Scottish rival, Clunies Ross, took over.

His subjects became known as "Cocos Malays". During the 150-year rule of the Clunies Ross dynasty, the Cocos Malays developed a unique culture and dialect. They adopted Scottish jigs and music in their performance repertoire. Still living on their island home, the Cocos Malays are now Australian citizens. Some seek recognition from the Australian

government as "Indigenous". A recent documentary, Australia's Forgotten Islands, portrayed a growing Indigenous movement among the Cocos Malays. With the ever-present possibility of a large military base being built on the islands, the documentary suggested "Indigenous" status might be a way to maintain a local voice. The documentary portrayed the son of the last "king" of Cocos and several Australian mainlanders championing the Cocos Malay cause for Indigenous

WHAT IS 'INDIGENOUS' STATUS?

Many local groups throughout the world have sought indigenous status to protect their rights, their environment and to win political representation vis-à-vis the majority culture of a nation-state. Yet there is no universally accepted definition of who is Indigenous.

Local groups have succeeded

in their claims on several grounds. Sometimes it is on the basis of being first-known inhabitants (like America's "First Nations"). A group can also argue for a continued presence as long-term inhabitants (e.g. descendance : in Norfolk Island).

Obtaining "Indigenous" status (e.g. descendants of Pitcairn Islanders

also usually requires local groups to

present evidence of having a unique, enduring language and cultura tradition. The claim to "Indigenous cultural identity often emerges in places that were or are colonised. However, each situation is different.

Establishing "Indigenous" status can assist groups by conferring legitimacy on their claims, especially when dealing with government and resource-extraction industries (forestry, mining, etc). To see how this might relate to the Cocos Malays,

need to know their history. HISTORY OF COCOS MALAYS

The Clunies Ross dynasty created its own currency and paid Cocos Malays for harvesting coconuts and performing other labour. This currency could be redeemed at the company store for rice, flour and sugar to supplement a diet of seafood, poultry and other birds. They left matters of religion to the Cocos Malays, who maintained an Islamic Malay culture. This makes them Australia's oldest Muslim community.

From the mid-1900s, Cocos Malay culture and language spread from its atoll home. A large 1940s emigration created a Cocos Malay community in Sabah, Malaysia, where

the government recognises them as one of Malaysia's ethnic groups. The Cocos Malays have also emigrated to Christmas Island, Singapore and to several locations in Western

On the Cocos (Keeling) Islands themselves, increased international attention to the plight of the Cocos Malays led to allegations of slavery and a United Nations investigation.

In 1955, the British transferred sovereignty over the islands to Australia, ratified by the Cocos (Keeling) Islands Act. The Australian government increasingly scrutinised the "kingdom", purchasing most of the atoll from the dynasty in 1978.

In a UN-supervised Act of Self-Determination in 1984, the residents of the islands voted overwhelmingly for integration with Australia. This act symbolised the beginnings of Cocos Malay involvement with the Australian state on their own terms, which has recently seen some Cocos Malays claim to be indigenous to the

INDIGENOUS AUSTRALIANS

In Australia, since the 1990s, the term "Indigenous" has increasingly been employed to address the crimes

The first humans in Australia (sometimes labelled "Australo-Melanesians") arrived more than 50,000 years ago. Their descendants have been displaced and dispossessed

by European settlers since 1788.

Aside from a variety of more derogatory insults, the terms "native", "Aborigine" and "Aboriginal" successively emerged to describe these people.

Some rejected the imposition of these labels and turned to terms from their own languages, such as "Koori'

their own languages, such as "Koorr" or "Nyungar", to refer themselves.
Rights activists have also encouraged the use of inclusive terms "Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders" as well as "First Nations" (see, for example, 2017's Uluru Statement from the Hoort) Statement from the Heart).

For those who identify as "Indigenous", the term also links their aspirations for recognition and reform to a global "Indigenous" struggle. The "Indigenous" label can become more than a political tool; for some it's a form of identity.

THE COCOS CLAIMS

Cocos Malay people can strengthen their claim as Indigenous Australians by pointing to several facts. The islands were uninhabited when the Cocos Malays and their European ruler first settled there. Further, they maintain a long historical tradition; they are sometimes said to have been colonised; and they feel overlooked by the Australian nation-state.

Other groups in our region have successfully appealed to these principles – namely, first people, colonisation, continued tradition, and marginalisation - to be recognised as

Cocos Malays unsuccessful in the short term, they can try other forms of recourse. For instance, the 1955 Transfer of Sovereignty contained a crucial



penalty after a controversial VAR review before he thundered home Gabriel Mercado's cross to send the under-fire Sampaoli running down the sidelines amid wild scenes of celebration.

"After the penalty we got a little nervous and worried about not getting through, said Sampaoli. said San "We

were obviously delighted at the end. The players played with their heart, they are rebels, they have achieved a very important victory looking to the future."

Messi missed a penalty in a 1-1 draw with Iceland and was largely bypassed in a 3-0 thrashing by Croatia that saw calls for Sampaoli to be sacked before their final group game.

However, Argentina avoided the abyss by the skin of their teeth to fight another

Iceland crash out of World Cup after Croatia loss

(RUSSIA), JUN 27 (AFP): Croatia secured first place in Group D today after a hard-fought 2-1 win over gallant Iceland in Rostov-on-Don, setting up a World Cup last-16 tie with Denmark.

While most were on Argentina and their do-or-die match with Nigeria in Saint Petersburg, Croatia wrapped up top spot in the group thanks to a slick second-half volley by Milan Badelj and a late strike by Ivan Perisic, sandwiching a penalty equaliser from Gylfi

Sigurdsson.
"We did everything we could, if you do that you can't be disappointed, we can look each other in the eye and can carry our heads high," said Iceland coach Heimir Hallgrimsson afterwards.

"We never gave up... kept on going."

Croatia coach Zlatko
Dalic said Iceland
showed "good character,
discipline, and fight" but
that even though his side were already through to the last 16, "only a win was satisfactory" for him. With three wins out

of three in Group D, "the focus now moves to the Denmark game, it will be a moment of truth", he

Dalic rested most of the side that thumped Argentina 3-0, with only captain Luka Modric and winger Perisic keeping their places.

"We gave the squad chance to play in the World Cup but from this moment on the group stage is over, we have done our job," he said.

Needing a point to make certain of top spot, Croatia dominated early on, with Real Madrid pair Modric and Mateo Kovacic dictating the tempo without creating clear chances.

Midway through the opening period the Nordic side, who had beaten Croatia in qualifying for Russia, took control, threatening



I was not scared of trials, will come back for Worlds: Aware

It was on the insistence of Aware that the Wrestling Federation of India had delayed the re-trials in the 57kg category and scheduled it for June 26, but the Maharashtra wrestler's old left-knee problem flared up days before the trials, and on his doctor's advise he gave it a miss.

An MRI scan, a copy of which is with PTI, revealed that there is a partial tear/strain in anterior cruciate ligament with minimum joint effusion, which has ruled him out of action for three weeks amid perception that he missed the

trials on purpose. "Why would I miss trials when

Japan space probe reaches asteroid in search for origin of life

Токуо, Jun 27 (AFP): A Japanese probe has reached an asteroid 300 million kilometres away to collect information about the birth of the solar system and the origin of life after a more than three-year voyage through deep space.

Havabusa2 probe settled into an observation position 20 kilometres (12 miles) above the Ryugu asteroid, officials from the Japan Space Exploration Agency (JAXA) said today.

"We have confirmed the arrival of Hayabusa2 at the Ryugu asteroid," JAXA said in a statement. Ryugu is thought to

contain relatively large amounts of organic matter and water, the stuff of life,

JAXA's announcement

UN's International Asteroid Day on June 30, a global event to raise awareness about the hazards of an asteroid impact and technological progress to counter such a

Photos of Ryugu -- which means "Dragon Palace" in Japanese, a castle at the bottom of the ocean in an ancient Japanese tale -- show an asteroid shaped a bit like a spinning top with a rough surface.

The probe will land on Ryugu in coming months and take samples "to clarify the origin of life," JAXA said in an earlier statement. Hayabusa2, about the size

of a large fridge, is equipped with solar panels and is the successor to JAXA's first

asteroid explorer, Hayabusa

-- Japanese for falcon.
That probe returned from a smaller, potato-shaped, asteroid in 2010 with dust samples despite various setbacks during its epic seven-year Odyssey and was hailed as a scientific triumph.

The Hayabusa2 mission costs 30 billion yen (274 million) and the probe was launched in December 2014. It will stay with the asteroid for 18 months before heading back to Earth with its samples in late 2020.

To collect its samples, it will release an "impactor" that will explode above the asteroid, shooting a two-kilogram (four-pound) object into copper

surface to create a crater a few metres in diameter.

From this crater, the probe will collect "fresh" materials unexposed to millennia of wind and radiation, hoping for answers to for answers fundamental questions about life and the universe. including whether elements from space elements from space helped give rise to life on

The probe will observe the surface with its camera and sensing equipment but will also drop tiny MINERVA-II rover robots as well as a French-German landing package named Mobile Asteroid Surface Scout (MASCOT) for surface

VP Pence warns migrants not to attempt to enter US illegally

SAO PAULO, JUN 27 (AP): US Vice President Mike Pence thanked Brazil today for welcoming Venezuelans fleeing their their country's while warning Central Americans running from violence in their homelands not to attempt to enter the United States illegally. Pence announced that the United States will provide nearly USD 10 million more to support Venezuelan migrants. including USD 1.2 million that will go to Brazil, but he urged Central Americans to "build your lives in your homeland."

The seemingly contradictory messages underscored the delicate dance the United States is trying to perform: It wants punish and isolate zuelan President Nicolas Maduro's socialist government while mitigating the effects on the Venezuelan people.



R ohingya refugees in camps in Bangladesh face "a race against time" as the monsoon season brings heavy rains, leading to landslides and floods. Twelve people are thought to have died so far, with the heaviest rain yet to come. "This is an emergency within an emergency," Shelley Thakral, a World Food Programme spokesperson said. "It is a race against time - we need to move people to safe locations as fast as we can and make sure they have the food and resources and relief they need to survive."

US says no exemption to India on oil imports from Iran

Washington, Jun 27 (PTI): The US has told all countries, including India and China, to stop their oil imports from Iran by November 4 or face sanctions for carrying out any transaction with Tehran as there would be "zero" waivers to any country.

Iran is India's third-largest oil supplier behind Iraq and Saudi Arabia. It supplied 18.4 million tonnes of crude oil during April 2017 and January 2018 (first 10 months of 2017-18 fiscal).

President Donald Trump withdrew US from the Iran nuclear deal May to pursue a maximum pressure campaign against Tehran's atomic programme. At the time, his administration gave foreign companies either 90 or 180 days to wind down their business with Iranian counterparts, depending on the type of commercial activity.

"On China and India, yes, certainly," a state department official told reporters when asked if the US has told all countries, including India and China, to stop all their imports of Iranian oil by

The US official said Indian and Chinese companies would be subject

to the same sanctions as those in other

countries.

Given the huge energy needs, India and China are major importers of Iranian oil.

"Their (India and China) companies will be subject to the same sanctions that everybody else's are if they engage in those sectors of the economy that are sanctionable, where there were sanctions imposed prior to 2015. And yes, we will certainly be requesting that their oil imports go to zero, the state department official said on condition of anonymity.

Responding to questions, the official said these countries should start reduc-ing the import of oil from Iran now and bring it to zero by November 4.

The official said this is part of the Trump administration's effort to isolate streams of Iranian funding and are looking to highlight the totality of Iran's malign behaviour across the region.

"We remain engaged with the EU-3 throughout this process, and we are going to continue to branch out in new countries and reach new partners as the weeks go forward," the official said.

Trump favours people coming to US through merit-based system

WASHINGTON, Jun 27 (PTI): President Donald Trump today said he wants foreign workers to come in the US through a merit-based immigration system so as to meet the demands of companies that are moving into America in greater numbers.

Indian-Americans, most of whom are highly skilled and came to the US mainly on H-1B work visas, are the worst sufferers of the current immigration system which imposes a seven per cent per country quota on allotment of green cards or permanent legal residency.
"I want people to

come into our country because our country is doing so well. We have companies moving into our country at numbers that nobody has seen in a long time. We need workers. So, I want people to come in. They have to come in through the merit system though," Trump told reporters at the White House during a luncheon with members of the Congress.

"They have to come in so that they can help our country and these companies," Trump said responding to a question immigration after the US Supreme Court upheld his travel ban against people coming from eight Muslimmajority countries.

US president said he is not against

people coming into the country but made it clear he wants them to come legally through a meritbased system, a move which experts believe would help qualified would people .. like India. In Wisconsin, people from countries


said Foxconn, one of the great companies of the world, is setting up a manufacturing base.

"They make the laptop for Apple, and iPhones a lot of it. And they're building a tremendous plant right now in Wisconsin. They need workers. I have to let people come in. But they have to come in through a merit. They have to be people that can love our country," Trump said.

Trump said that the current immigration policy makes the least sense. It is a hodgepodge of laws that have been put together over years and this needs to be changed, he asserted.

"It's so simple. It's called, "I'm sorry, you can't come in. You have to go in through a legal process. You don't have to see a judge where the judge is going to take three years before you can come back. In meantime, you never come back because you're already in the country. You're someplace in the country. And that would when it's a criminal," he said.

Myanmar military leaders guilty of 'crimes against humanity': Amnesty



NEW YORK, JUN 27 (AFP): Myanmar's military chief and other top brass have been accused by Amnesty International of crimes against humanity for overseeing a "systematic" attack against Rohingya Muslims, according to a report by the rights group today calling for prosecution at the International Criminal Court.

More than 700.000 Rohingva Muslims were forced to flee Rakhine state after a military crackdown that the United Nations has said amounts to "ethnic cleansing".

Myanmar's military has denied targeting the stateless minority and said it was defending itself against Muslim militants who attacked police posts in August 2017

But a new report from Amnesty said army commander-in-chief Min Aung Hlaing and 12 other senior military and security officials oversaw an orchestrated campaign of violence in the restive state where the Rohingya have been historically marginalised.

"The ethnic cleansing of the Rohingya population was achieved by a relentless and systematic campaign in which the Myanmar ecurity forces unlawfully killed thousands of Rohingya, including young children," said the report.

It also accused security forces of sexual plence, torture, forced displacement and burning markets and farmland that starved

mmunities and forced them to flee.
"These crimes amount to crimes against humanity under international law, as they were perpetrated as part of a widespread and systematic attack against the Rohingya population," the report said.

The report said some senior military figures and border guard police oversaw units that directly carried out alleged atrocities, while others knew of subordinates' actions and failed to prevent, stop or punish the crimes.

The 186-page document is the first attempt to name and implicate senior figures in the widespread violence that sparked the mass exodus and humanitarian crisis that followed.

Hundreds of thousands of Rohingva have settled in squalid camps in neighbouring Bangladesh, many too scared to go back despite a repatriation agreement with Myanmar that rights groups have said does not guarantee a safe return.

The report is the most detailed account of the crisis to date and follows fresh sanctions from the European Union this week against

seven security officials accused of serious crimes including sexual violence and killings.

Min Aung Hlaing was not subject to the sanctions but six people on the EU list are also named in the Amnesty report, which is based on more than 400 interviews in Myanmar and Bangladesh from September 2017 to June 2018.

The authors also used satellite imagery, forensic analysis and confidential military documents.


The report also details alleged abuses carried out by the Arakan Rohingya Salvation Army (ARSA), the Muslim militant group that attacked police posts on August

It said ARSA killed informants and people with military links and massacred dozens of Hindus in the area, which the militant group has denied.

Amnesty says it requested a response from Myanmar's military and the office of de facto leader Aung San Suu Kyi but did not

receive a reply.

Myanmar has previously rejected calls for an ICC probe, arguing that it is not party to the treaty that governs the court.

VIVO'S NEW FACE ID TECH HAS 10 TIMES AS MANY SENSOR POINTS AS THE IPHONE X

Vivo, the Chinese phone mak-er that's been on the leading edge of bezel-less phones this year, has today announced other major new piece of technology: a 3D depth-sensing system with 300,000 sensor points, 10 times the number in Apple's Face ID on the iPhone X. Vivo's new tech, mounted on the front of the phone next to the selfie cameras, works

by sending out a pulse of light and calculating the "time of flight" (TOF) that the light takes to bounce back to its sensor. Vivo says it can enable 3D mapping at a distance up to three meters from the phone.

The broad term for this type of technology is "structured light," and it's something other companies like Oppo have also considered for their phones this year, but none have yet decided it's worth the added investment and complexity to include it in their phones. Vivo's demonstration of its TOF 3D sensor at MWC Shanghai this week indicates that it will be among the first Android vendors to step up

and compete with Apple's Face ID directly.

"By combining TOF 3D Sensing
Technology with AI, we will continue to explore new possibilities for a better future," said Alex Feng, a senior executive at Vivo. One



full body scan of a person and then feed that information to a beautification AI that would more intelligently and proportionately pretty you up. Another is to use the same full-body scans to try on clothes virtually

Beside the obvious applications of more precise biometric authentication and better portrait mode for selfies, Vivo's new sensor could also be used for gesture and motion recognition. With a claimed depth detection as far as 3 meters, this system could also enable new augmented reality applications or the scanning of furniture and other objects.

The press release for Vivo's TOF 3D sensor promises that "this is no mere proof of concept," though the company hasn't given an exact timeline for when the technology will be commercialized in an actual phone.

VENOM'S TRAILER IS THE MOST VIEWED IN THE ENTIRE SPIDER-MAN FRANCHISE

The official trailer for Venom has been viewed by for the viewed by far the most out of the en-tire Spider-Man franchise. It even blew past Spider-Man: Homecoming, the Tom Holland-starring debut of Spidey in the Marvel Cinematic Universe which came together on a partnership between Sony and Marvel Studios. Venom, which stars Tom Hardy in the title role, isn't part of the MCU - but clearly, the buzz has been

Venom remains one of the most popular and complicated Marvel characters, and that's reflected in the colossal view count of the first full trailer. which gave the first look at Hardy's full transformation into the iconic Symbiote alien. The trailer drew so many eveballs on YouTube that it doesn't even need to be compared to other Spider-Man trailers anymore. It's become one of the most popular trailers, period.

Thanks to some sleuthing at Screen Crush, it was discovered that the Venom trailer's 64 million views are by a wide margin the most of any movie in the entire Spider-Man franchise. It obliterates the total for The Amazing Spider-Man (37 million), as well as Spider-Man: Homecoming (28 million) and the newly released trailer for Spider-Man: Into the Spider-Verse. It also got more views than Star Wars: The Last Jedi (50 million), Jurassic World: Fallen Kingdom (55 million), and Iron Man 3 (62 million).



In light of the Venom trailer's astronomical total compared to the other Spider-Man movies, it's more appropriate to compare it to all other trailers. As reported by ScreenCrush, it likely cracks the top-20 all-time on YouTube, checking in just behind Thor: Ragnarok's 66 million. It didn't land terribly far behind the first Jurassic World trailer, which has 89 million views. And there may never be a trailer more viewed than the dominating record-holder, Avengers: Infinity War and its 202 million views.

It speaks to the enduring popularity of Venom as a character in the Marvel universe, that he would get his own solo vehicle and the trailer would dominate all other trailers related to Spider-Man. Despite the persistent rumors that Holland may make a cameo, this is ostensibly Venom's movie. The massive YouTube totals for the trailer could also be somewhat of a byproduct of the first teaser trailer showing practically nothing, which left fans wanting more in a way not common to most big-budget movie teasers in recent memory.

Ultimately, it's not much of a surprise that the Venom trailer blew up like it did when you consider that it raced past the likes of Wonder Woman in just its first 24 hours. As a rare R-rated entry into the Marvel realm, one that's based on an iconic yet relatively under-served character on the big screen, Venom previews carry an uncommon amount of weight. The question, now, is whether the next Venom trailer can take the buzz to yet another level.

A QUIET PLACE WRITERS TO ADAPT STEPHEN KING'S THE BOOGEYMAN



AQuiet Place writers Scott Beck and Bryan Woods will team up again, this time to adapt Stephen King's early short story The Boogeyman Directed by John Krasinski, A Quiet Place stunned audiences while scaring up blockbuster numbers for a very grateful Paramount, finishing with \$325 million in worldwide grosses. After a performance like that, it's no surprise that writers Beck and Woods are already conjuring up ideas for a sequel to A Qui-

With its classic fright-film premise of a family trying to survive amid an invasion of sound-sensitive aliens, A Quiet Place drew plenty of comparisons to the work of orror master Stephen King. Indeed, King himself publicly expressed admiration for the film, calling it "extraordinary." King's work has itself become a hot commodity on the movie market, after the massive success of last year's IT, based on the author's voluminous 1986 novel of an

evil clown terrorizing a small Maine community the decades. Multiple King adaptations are currently in the works, including a remake of Pet Sematary, a new feature film based on Tommyknockers and a TV series version of his most recent novel The Outsider.

In a case of a potentially perfect marriage of writing talents, Deadline reports that A Quiet Place scribes Scott Beck and Bryan Woods will help bring yet another Stephen King work to the screen, adapting his early short story The Boogeyman. Twentieth Century Fox is putting the deal together with 21 Laps, the Shawn Levyled production company responsible for Stranger Things (another series filled with echoes of King). The Boogeyman has previously been adapted multiple times as a short film, but this is the first time it will come to life as a feature.

Originally published in 1973 and later reprinted in

King's wildly popular short story collection Night Shift, The Boogeyman concerns a man named Lester Billings, who has seen three of his children die at the hands of a supernatural entity that lives in a closet. The story is mainly set in a psychiatrist's office as Billings tells the horrific story of how he and his wife attempted to evade the Boogeyman, only to lose yet another child to the monster. Like many King stories, including IT, Cujo and Pet Sematary, the story taps into primal fears about children falling prey to evil

Indeed, A Quiet Place itself tapped into many of the same terrors that King has explored in The Boogeyman and so many of his other works. Twentieth Century Fox is hoping that the pairing of King with the men who helped conjure up the creatures of A Quiet Place will result in monster box office returns.
