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Violence during BIP-sponsored bandh in WB; 1600 people arrested

KOLKATA, SEP 26 (PTI): Scattered incidents of violence, including torching of buses and clashes, occurred and 1,600 peo-ple were arrested during the 12-hour bandh called by the BJP in West Bengal Wednesday to protest the death of two students in North Dinajpur district.

BJP workers clashed with Trinamool activists and fought pitched battles with police at some places during the shut-down, which the saffron party claimed was a success due to "people's support" and called it off two hours ahead of

schedule.

However, Chief Minister Mamata Baneriee described the shutdown as a "complete failure" saying the people of Bengal have rejected the "culture of shutdown and bandhs".

Normal life remained largely unaffected in the metropolis and the ad-joining districts. But in North Dinajpur, the scene of the September 20 clash between the police and protesters in which the two students were killed, the shutdown made its impact.

BJP supporters torched a state bus at Canning street in central Kolkata, police said. Stone pelting incidents were reported from Shyambazar and Sealdah areas in the metropolis.

Requirement for firewood for cooking and heat during the collection trip that could last from 5 to 10 days is a ma jor concern, along with non biodegradable trash being left behind, the release adds.

Kerosene stoves to minimise firewood usage have been distributed, and strict instructions for bringing back all the trash are given during sensitisation during programmes organised every year before the on-set of the cordyceps collection season with the

nmunities. The idea behind conducting a clean up after the collection season was mooted during a learning trip to Bhutan organised for the Lachenpa com-munity by WWF-India in 2017, where similar exercises are organised by the community involved in cordyceps collection.

The current clean up exercise was jointly organised by Lachen Dzum-

a and Lachen Tourism Development Committee with support from WWF-India under its Biodiversity Conservation project supported by TATA Housing, it is informed. Armed with sacks for

collecting the garbage and the indomitable Lachen spirit, Phuchung and his team left for the high altitude areas from Lachen on September 23, 2018 despite inclement weather conditions. The team spent four days in the high altitude meadows, cleaning up areas where waste had been dumped, as well as collecting litter along the trails. A quick waste audit conducted on the collected trash revealed that most of the waste that were collected were of multilayered plastic packaging and PET bot-tles, the WWF release details.

Phuchung, who is a cordyceps collector himself, says that the team was motivated to orga-nise the clean up as the high altitude areas were important to not only the wildlife but also for the people who depended on the cordyceps for their livelihood. He also expressed hope that more people would join in the clean-up campaign in the future, as a lot more effort is required to bring down the trash lying in the mountains.

More than Organic Mission required to assist farmers

When seventy per cent of the population, that majority living in rural Sikkim which registers agriculture as their profession, is extended less than 3% of the loans advanced by banks in Sikkim, one knows that an inexcusable denial is afoot. As per stipulations governing banking practices in the country, loans to the agriculture sector should constitute at least 18% of the total advances released by banks. In Sikkim, this figure stood at a dismal 2.90% as of 31 March 2016 as per data featured in the 39th State Level Banker's Committee. It would have been all well if the under-performance by banks was because farmers in Sikkim were so well off that they did not need loans to improve the productivity of their farms. But that is obviously not the case. Public sector banks achieved only 37.90% of the target they set up for themselves for agriculture sector loans. But wait, the figure gets even more dismal when one realizes that although 37.9% of the targeted loans were disbursed, these covered only 13.1% of total beneficiaries they had aimed to cover. One cannot understand this hesitation when one also notices that recovery for agricultural loans was at a handsome 63.5% for Sikkim against the dismal 14.9% for loans to industry. If agriculture receives the right boost in the form of adequate loan support, rural Sikkim will prosper. That much any one can figure out. But what confounds is why that is not happening.

Of course, the situation of fewer new generation

hands taking up the proverbial plough is not unique to Sikkim. Census 2011 informs us that 42% of the nation's farmers would, if given the choice, quit agriculture. It is into this frame that Sikkim's situation needs to be viewed. There might not be desperate poverty among the farmers in Sikkim, but the sector has obviously plateaued out and is now on the decline which is why fewer families have the new generation tilling the fields. This is not to suggest that the children of farmers should remain farmers, but is an argument to highlight that dignity needs to be brought back to the sector and more youngsters allowed the chance to leverage their wider exposure, keener scientific temperament and higher ambitions to revolutionise agriculture in Sikkim.

The State Government, to its credit, has undertaken the right policy decision by pursuing the Organic Sikkim mission and identifying horticulture and floriculture as thrust areas for the rural economy. Organic Sikkim, even as it strives to resuscitate agriculture to its original, un-poisoned by pesticides roots in Sikkim, also capitalizes on a growing respect for organic products in the world market. But it will take more than awareness workshops by "service providers" to deliver the real results. Such a turnaround can begin if capital formation in agriculture and allied sectors is accelerated. Sikkim has the benefit of being in a situation where agriculture loans are required not for sustenance but to propel the sector to a new level of prosperity. The investment is required because as per the Agriculture Census of 2010-11, 77% of the farmers in Sikkim fall in the small and marginal category working on average farm sizes of 0.64 hectares. The general consensus on the minimum size of farmland to allow a farmer the space to "do well" is at least one hectare. Hence, for farmers to prosper, or even remain relevant, they will need to invest in their small landholdings and improve productivity through better irrigation, improved seeds, wider diversification and adding sources of livelihood like poultry and animal husbandry. This should ideally come through agricul-

To draw a positive from even the current status of poor banking support for agriculture, this situation allows Sikkim the benefit of learning from the horrors of farmer indebtedness which has torn through wide swathes of farmlands across the country. If the policy-makers decide that banking support for agriculture should be expanded, they should first ensure that fiscal prudence and financial planning is instilled in rural Sikkim. Urban Sikkim already has a very poor track-record of loan repayments, but that spectrum has the cushion of salaries and commerce to tide them over, rural Sikkim is not as privileged, but its resilience is a strong asset to keep the loans safe and serviced if the people are first informed about banking and loan

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South Sudanese football: colonial legacy sheds light on present day fortunes

On July 9, 2011, South
Sudan seceded from
Sudan to become the
world's newest nation. That weekend, its new national football team played match in the capital Juba. Within months, the Confederation of African Football granted the squad provisional membership, and in July 2013 President Salva Kiir named the team Bright Star. Emphasising the importance of unity as a necessary element for national development, Kiir opined that sports should be encouraged to promote that goal.

While the team may be

in its adolescence, Suda-nese football is a vestige of the country's colonial past stretching between 1899 and 1956 in what was

known as the Anglo-Egyptian Condominium. My recently published journal article explores this history, and examines how the game was linked with various ethnic, religious and political projects.

South Sudan has been through a tumultuous time since 2011 independence. Understanding the game's early influences can help shed light on the current context. These insights are as enlightening

FOOTBALL IN COLONIAL SUDAN

In the early 20th century, football in what is to-day Sudan was played at Khartoum's elite Gordon Memorial College. Gordon played annual matches against the Khartoum Military School. Sudan's old-est football stadium was built in Atbara in 1927, and the Sudan Football Association was established in the 1930s. The number of clubs quickly rose from 36 in the 1936-1937 season to 103 in 1945-1946.

In Southern Sudan, the growth of football was linked with Christian missionaries who entered the South in the early 1900s following the destruction of the Mahdist regime. Football was played at the Church Missionary Society's first Southern mission site at Malek and at Yei, where African and non-African participants competed.

The Nugent missionary school was the king

of Southern football during the colonial years. An elite and multi-ethnic intermediate school, the pitch became a site where inter-ethnic competition vas encouraged.

Sudan, still jointly ruled at this point by Britain and Egypt, joined FIFA in 1948. This was years ahead of its independence - which came in 1956 - and membership in the United Nations and Arab League. Six years later it discussed a plan with Egypt, Ethiopia, and South Africa for an African confederation during the FIFA Congress in Bern.

Sudan's early independence years were marred by civil war between Southern rebels and the Northern-based government. Political power had been centred in Khartoum during the colonial era. During the early independence years the govern-ment sought to fashion the country as an Arab and Islamic state. Southerners rebelled and a state of

var persisted until 1972.

Interestingly enough, the war years corresponded with the golden age of Sudanese foot-ball. Sudan hosted the first African Nations Cup, were runners-up in 1959 and 1963, and won it all against Ghana in 1970.

POST-INDEPENDENCE SUDAN AND FOOTBALL'S POSSIBLE MEANING

Conflict resumed in 1983 following President Ja-faar Nimeiri's decision to institute Sharia through-out the country. While the John Garang-led Sudan Peoples' Liberation Army/Movement led the war against Khartoum, Southerners were also embroiled in internal ethnic conflict. The most infamous of these conflicts occurred between the largest ethnic groups, the Dinka and the Nuer.

The 2005 Comprehensive Peace Agreement

ended formal hostilities and a referendum ushered in independence for the South. But ethnic factionalism persisted and erupted into a new civil conflict in December 2013. The main combatants were groups loyal to Riek Machar (a Nuer) and President Kiir (a Dinka). After a host of failed cessation agreements, both men recently agreed to a new peace agreement that reinstates Machar as vice president.

To what extent, then, has football shaped the present context? How might Sudan's footballing past inform South Sudan's present and future?

SPORT AS A UNIFIER

One easy answer is that the sport will be a much-needed unifier. At the multi-eth-nic Nugent School, the pitch was a space in which people from varying eth-nicities could compete in the same space, according to the same rules, with the same objectives in mind. The national team's

composition and the en-couragement of a national league with players, fans, and officials of diverse eth-nicities could convey the important political mes-sage that unity is possible in one of Africa's most fragmented states.

But Sudanese football history also suggests that expectations should be tempered. Nugent School football wasn't always peaceful. One contentious match between Azande

and Dinka squads saw a British referee line both teams up and inflict corporal punishment to encourage them to behave. In addition, although players of multiple ethnicities competed with one another, the teams were still divided along ethnic

Despite this, it's useful to consider that the Sudanese national team during its early post-colonial years enjoyed great success despite the regional maelstrom then wracking the country. This shows that winning on the pitch did not reflect unity or success off the pitch.

AFRICAN FOOTBALL'S POLITICAL CAPITAL

In today's Southern Sudanese political climate, cess in the next African Cup of Nations or — i can dare to dream — qualifying for the 2022 Qatar World Cup may wield more symbolic importance than anything else. If the last 30 years are any indication, it will not make Machar and Kiir any more likely to put aside their personal and political dif-ferences; differences that have so often resulted in bloodshed.

And yet, there are obvious examples of sport's capacity to rally African nations together (if at least temporarily). The 'Invictus' rugby team during Mandela's presidency, the stoppage in Ivory Coast's civil war during its team's World Cup run, and the recent election of Liberian football legend George Weah as president are some examples that speak to African football's political capital.

Whether the Bright Star comes to represent a shining light for the young, war-torn nation remains to be seen.

Donald Trump is making good on his trade war rhetoric with China, announcing tariffs on a further US\$200 billion worth of goods from the PRC. As China promises retaliation, the warmth of the Mar-a-Lago summit of April 2017 is a thing of the past. When this is added to the wide-ranging tensions such as the disputes over barely habitable rocks in the East China Sea, tensions over the competing claims in the South China Sea, and the spectre of nuclear catastrophe on the Korean Peninsula, the sense of geopolitical risk is as pal-pable as it is frightening.

During such periods of turbulence,

it is not surprising that scholars and commentators look to the past for parallels to current crises. Not long ago, the trend, prompted by the centenary of the outbreak of the first world war, was to see Asia on the cusp of 1914like conflagration. This proved a highly imperfect point of comparison.

Today, a more common refrain is that Asia is on the cusp of a new Cold War. If it were to happen, it would mean the rivalry that has been growing is transformed into overt militarised competition that drags the region into its vortex.

In this case, the US is confronted not by an expansionary Soviet Union seeking to capitalise on decolonisa-tion to advance its ideological and geopolitical ambition, but by a resurgent China. Its ambitious president, Xi Jinping, has clearly set out his aim to make China the world's preemi-

nent national power.
Until very recently, it seemed unlikely that a Cold War with 21st century characteristics would eventuate. The USSR and United States inhabited almost entirely separate economic

universes during the Cold War.

This meant the dynamic of com-petition was driven by power politics and ideology alone - the tempering effect of shared economic interests simply didn't exist. Today, so the argument goes, their economic interdependence is a powerful brake on the worst instincts of the two countries.

While China and the US are in com petition, the two countries have also established an extensive range of bilateral mechanisms to manage their complex relationship. There are around 1000 meetings between the countries every year, ranging from summit level down to mid ranking officials, covering issues from trade and investment to coastguard and fisheries.

The two countries know they have to work hard to ensure the competitive dynamic does not spiral out of control. And of course, both sides nuclear weapons act as a great disciplining force, ensuring even the most heated of relationships can remain short of outright conflict. Asia also has a wide array of institution-al mechanisms such as ASEAN and the East Asia Summit that regularly discuss their common concerns and build a sense of regional trust.

Yet, in spite of their many meetings, in which there is much discussion but little agreement, there are good reasons to think a Cold War 2.0 might be a good deal closer than we realise. The US and China are plainly entering into a period of significant geopolitical rivalry. Each has ambitions that are mutually incompatible. Beijing wants a south-east Asian region in which it is not beholden to US primacy, while Washington wants to sustain its regional dominance.

The two also find it extremely difficult to see the world from the other's perspective. Washington does not seem able to grasp that even though Beijing benefited from US primacy in the region, it will not forever accept a price-taker's

position in the regional order.
For its part, Beijing simply does
not believe Washington's claim that it wants China to achieve its potential, and that this can occur without meaningful changes to the current international order. When that is added to the nationalism that is a powerful political force in both countries, the prospects of a bleak geopolitical fu-ture seem very real.

The trade war escalation is one of the most worrying developments. Not only does it signal a more turbulent and less dynamic period in the global economy, it represents the victory of nationalist politics over shared economic interests. More importantly, it may presage a return to a less integrated global economy.

Trump evidently wants to rip up

global supply chains and turn back the clock to the days of mercantilist approaches to economic develop-ment. Most worryingly, due to China's behaviour in the past — stealing IP, predatory approaches to foreign investment and refusing access to its vast markets — Trump's tariffs have a surprising level of support in business circles in the US.

The risk is not only one of sustained tension between the world's biggest economies, but significant division between the interests of the two most important countries. If the golden straitjacket of economic interdependence is gone, the prospects of geopolitics and nationalism winning the day are significantly enhanced. China also sees in the tariffs a confirmation of its long-held suspicion that the US is intent on keeping the coun-

try from fulfilling its potential.

Worryingly, there is widespread complacency in the region. We used comparency in the region. We used to think great power politics had been banished by globalisation. We were wrong. We thought Trump would come to his economic sense when elected. Wrong again. And now the escalation of trade conflict is undermining the most important link between the US and China – their shared economic interests.

We must not fool ourselves again. High intensity geopolitical competition is increasingly likely. Unless the US and China can step down from the escalatory cycle they are on, we are sliding into another period in which great power rivalry, militarised competition and dangerous nationalism

Centre approves Rs 8,606 crore for border infrastructure and management

NEW DELHI, SEP 26 (PTI): The Centre has approved Rs 8,606 crore for 60 projects being implemented under the umbrella scheme of Border Infrastructure and Management (BIM) to meet special development needs of people living in those areas, officials said Wednesday.

The projects are being implemented in 17 states having the international borders with Pakistan, China, Nepal, Bhutan

Myanmar and Bangladesh.

The umbrella scheme Border Infrastructure and Management containing 60 projects and with an outlay of Rs 8,606 crore has been approved, a home ministry official said.

The projects are imple mented in 111 border districts to meet special development needs of border population with focus on people living within 50

The schemes include con struction of roads, schools, primary health centres, promotion of rural tourism, border tour-ism, promotion of sports activities, cleanliness mission, protection of heritage sites, supply of drinking water, community centres, connectivity, drainage, to enable sustainable living in border areas, another official said.

Construction of helipads in re-

mote and inaccessible hilly areas which do not have road connectivity, skill development training to farmers for the use of modern and scientific technique in farming, organic farming are some of the other areas where the projects are being implemented.

Tripura fish supply hit hard as Bangladeshimports stalled

AGARTALA, SEP 26 (PTI): The fish-loving citizens of Tripura are facing a harrowing time with Bangladeshi exporters stopping the supply of fish to the state early this month over alleged extortion de-

mand by anti-socials.

With only a fortnight to go before the start of the Durga puja festival, the snapping of supply has led to the increase in the prices of fishes like 'rohu', 'katla', and 'pabda' in the state, which is dependent on arrival from Andhra Pradesh, West Bengal and Bangladesh.

The supply was stopped after suspected goons allegedly stopped exporters from entering the state after they refused to pay 'tola' (extortion money) at the Agartala-Akhaura integrated-checkpoint September 4. A sizeable amount of fish enters the markets through the ckpoint, a customs official on the condition of

anonymity on Wednesday.

Around 10,000 kg
of fish, therefore, got spoiled, resulting in the loss of around 37,000 USD (approximately Rs 26,87,495 at current rates), he added.

When the Indian traders contacted their coun-terparts in Bangladesh, they clearly stated that if a responsible govern-ment official from India give a written assurance against any illegal inter-ference in the trade in future, only then would they resume fish exports, the official said.

"There was a meet-ing of the exporters from Bangladesh in their country on September 17, during which they

how would they be compensated for their loss on September 4," an exec-utive of the Agartala Exporter and Importer En-trepreneur Sangha said.

The joint director of the state fisheries department, Abani Debbarma, said roughly 70 per cent of the total consumption of fish was produced in the state and the rest comes from Bangladesh, West Bengal and Andhra Pradesh.

The total consumption of fish per year in Tripura is 92,000 million tonnes, of which 72,276 million tonnes are pro-duced in the state and the rest comes from outside, including Bangla-desh. The per-capita fish consumption is around 22 kg in the state.

Speaking on the issue,

ruling Bharatiya Janata Party's state vice-presi-dent, Pratima Bhowmik, said she would take the initiative to solve the problem. "I will hold a meeting with the export-ers and importers of the state to discuss how the problem can be solved. I am hopeful a solution will come out," she told PTI.

A fish trader, Adhir Das, who sells fish at the Battala Market, the capital's main market, said, "The price of fish is soaring every day, because production in the state is not sufficient for consumption. We are facing livelihood problem because there are hardly any customers. We are facing the problem for the last one month

When contacted, Selim Shah, economics professor at Tripura University, said, "Tripura is not self-reliant in fish production."

The laptops are equipped with JAWS (Job Access With Speech) soft-ware, which is a computer screen reader programme for Microsoft Windows. The software allows blind and visu-

ally impaired users to read the screen either with a text-to-speech output or by a refreshable Braille display.

SC refuses to refer to 7-judge bench its 2006 verdict on SC/ST job promotion

NEW DELHI, SEP 26 (PTI): The Supreme Court Wednesday said its 2006 verdict putting the benefits of quota in job promotions for SC/ST employees need not be referred to a seven-judge bench.

The apex court also turned down the Centre's plea that overall population of SC/ST be considered for granting quota for them.

The unanimous judgement was pronounced by a five-judge Constitution bench headed by Chief Justice

Dipak Misra.

The bench, also comprising Justices Kurian Joseph, R F Nariman, S K Kaul and Indu Malhotra, said states need not collect quantifiable data on backwardness of SC/ST for giving quota in job promotion to SC/ST em-

The bench did not comment on two other conditions given in the 2006 verdict which dealt with adequacy of representation of SC/ST in promotion and not to disturb administrative efficiency.

The court's verdict came on pe-

titions seeking that a seven-judge bench reconsiders the court's 2006 judgement which had put conditions for granting quota benefits in job promotions for SC/ST employees.

The bench had reserved its verdict on August 30 after hearing various stakeholders, including the Cen-

tre, on the matter.

A five-judge constitution bench, in its 2006 verdict in the M Nagraj case, had said the states are bound to provide quantifiable data on the backwardness of Scheduled Castes (SC) and Scheduled Tribes (ST), the facts about their inadequate representation in government jobs and the overall administrative efficiency, before providing quota in promotions to members of these communities.

The Centre and various state governments have also sought reconsideration of this verdict on various grounds, including that the members of the SC and ST communities are presumed to be backward and considering their stigma of caste, they should be given reservation even in

The Centre has alleged that the verdict in the M Nagraj case had put unnecessary conditions in granting quota benefits to the SC and ST employees and sought its reconsider ation by a larger bench.

Attorney General K K Venugopal, appearing for the Centre, had strongly argued in favour of granting quota to SC and ST employees, saying there was a presumption of backwardness in their favour

He had said the SC and ST com-munities have been facing caste-based discrimination for long and the stigma of caste is attached to them despite the fact that some of

them have come up.

During one of the hearings, senior advocate Rakesh Dwivedi, who represents those opposing quota in promotions, had told the bench that earlier there was presump-tion of backwardness with regard to scheduled caste and scheduled tribe communities.

Book seeks to decode the enigma called Tiger Woods



NEW DELHI, SEP 26 (PTI): Tiger Woods, who just clinched his first PGA title in five years, is the most mysterious ath-lete of his time, an enigma obsessed with privacy who mastered the art of being invisible in plain sight, of saying some thing while revealing virtually nothing, says a new book on the champion golfer.

journal-Investigative ists Jeff Benedict and Armen Keteyian have come out with a biography of Woods, packed with behind-the-scenes details of the Shakespearean rise and epic fall of a global icon.

"Tiger Woods" offers 360-degree look at Woods' entire life to date, closely examines his roots and the vital role his parents played in his epic rise, fall, and return.

The authors say Woods' greatest victory is not in golf but rather in his journey back into the light, and for the first time in many years, into life.

In 2009, Woods was a transcendent star of almost un-fathomable fame and fortune living what appeared to be the perfect life - married to a Swedish beauty and the father of two young children.

Winner of 14 major golf championships and 79 PGA Tour events, Woods was the billion-dollar athlete earning more than USD 100 million a year in endorsements from the likes of Nike. Gillette. AT&T and Gatorade.

But it was all a carefully crafted illusion. As it turned out, Woods had been living a double life for years - one that exploded in the aftermath of a late-night that exposed his serial infidelity and sent his personal

and professional life off a cliff.
In "Tiger Woods", Benedict and Keteyian dig deep behind

the headlines as they seek an answer to the question that has mystified millions of sports fans for nearly a decade: who is Tiger Woods?

The book, published by Simon & Schuster, draws on more than 400 interviews with people from every corner of Woods' life - friends, family members, teachers, romantic partners, swing coaches, business associates, Tour pros and members of his inner circle.

According to the authors, Woods will forever be measured against Jack Nicklaus, who won more major championships.

"But the Tiger Effect can't measured in statistics. A literary comparison may be more fitting. Given the full spectrum of his awe-inspiring gifts, Woods was nothing less than a modern-day Shake-speare. He was someone no one had ever seen or will ever

see again," they say.

UNITED NATIONS, SEP 26 (PTI): India and the G4 nations voiced concern over the lack of substantive progress in the long-pending Security Council reform, saying it is time to finally initiate text-based negotiations to safeguard the legit-imacy and credibility of the powerful UN organ

The G4 nations, India, Brazil, Germany and Japan, have been calling for the re-form of the UN Security Council, and sup-port each others' bids for the permanent seats in the top UN body.

External Affairs Minister Sushma Swaraj hosted her counterparts Aloys-io Nunes Ferreira of Brazil, Heiko Maas of Germany and Taro Kono of Japan at a meeting of the G4 nations held Tuesday at India's Permanent Mission to the UN on the margins of the 73rd session of the General Assembly.

In a joint statement after the meeting,

the four nations reaffirmed their commitment to multi-lateralism.

"It was time to finally initiate text-based negotiations during the 73rd ses-sion of the General Assembly" in line with the standard operating procedures of the UN General Assembly, the ministers said.

They stressed that adapting the United Nations to the contemporary needs of the 21st century necessarily required reforming the Security Council.

"They stressed the need to safeguard the legitimacy and credibility of this UN organ which deals with international



peace and security," the statement said.

The G4 Ministers reaffirmed the need for an early reform of the Council includ-ing the expansion of both the permanent and non-permanent categories of membership to enhance its legitimacy, effec-

tiveness and representativeness.

They said that the current composition of the 15-nation Council does not reflect the changed global realities and stressed that the UNSC reform is essential

The ministers reiterated their support for Africa's representation in both categories of membership in a reformed and expanded Security Council.

"As aspiring new permanent members of a reformed Council, the ministers reiterated their commitment to work to strengthen the functioning of the UN and the global multilateral order as well as their support for each other's candida-tures," it said.

Rouhani says Trump seeking Iran leadership 'overthrow'

(AFP): Iranian President Hassan Rouhani accused his US counterpart Don-ald Trump of trying to topple his government Tuesday as he poured cold water on the idea of resuming talks with Washington after its pullout from an international nuclear accord.

"It is ironic that the US government does not even conceal its plan for overthrowing the same government it invites to talks." Rouhani said in a speech at the United Nations General Assembly.

"For dialogue to take place, there is no need for a photo opportunity. The two sides can listen to each other right here in this Assembly.

"I am starting the di-alogue right here, and in unequivocal terms, that the question of international security is not a toy in American

domestic politics."
Rouhani took the po dium a few hours after Trump called for Iran's isolation in his UN address, accusing the lead-



ership of Iran of sowing "chaos, death and destruction" as he defended his decision to ditch the Iran nuclear accord.

The five remaining parties to the 2015 accord -- France. Britain. Germany, China and Russia -- agreed during a meeting in New York late Monday to set up a payment system to preserve business ties with Iran despite US sanctions.



from the nuclear deal in May, to the dismay of European allies, Russia and China which had invested years in negotiations to achieve a milestone agreement on keeping Iran's nuclear ambitions

In his UN address last year, Trump bashed the nuclear deal as "an em-barrassment," signalling that the United States was ready to walk away.

Trump and Rouhani declined to meet on the sidelines of the General Assembly session.

Shah Rukh Khan praises 'Tumbbad'


