#### Saudi admits Khashoggi dismembered in consulate

RIYADH, NOV 15 (AFP): Five Saudi officials face the death penalty over the murder of journalist Jamal Khashoggi, who was drugged and dismembered inside the kingdom's Istanbul consulate, Riyadh's public prosecutor said Thursday.

Khashoggi, a Wash-ington Post columnist and vocal dissident, died after being drugged by the five accused and then dismembered, a spokes-man for the public prosecutor's office said in the first Saudi acknowledgeof the manner of his killing.

The journalist's body parts were then handed over to an agent outside the consulate grounds, the spokesman said.

#### **Elderly** woman killed in monkey attack in Agra, second death in two days

AGRA, Nov 15 (PTI): A 58-year-old woman died after being attacked by simians when she had gone out of her house to relieve herself at Thok Mohalla here, two days after an infant was killed

by a monkey in the city.

Bhoomi Devi was attacked Wednesday evening and was found with severe injuries. She was taken to a hospital where she died during treat-ment, police said.

On Monday, a 12-day-old baby died after a monkey snatched him from his mother and left him bruised and bitten on the terrace of a neighbour's house in Kachhera Mohalla here.

Devi's family members

said. "She had lost so much blood that doctors could do nothing to save her."

#### Blanket ban on use of term 'Dalit' by media not advisable: PCI

New Delhi, Nov 15 (PTI): The Press Council of India has decided against issuing a directive to the media prohibiting the the word "Dalit", saying a blanket ban was neither advisable nor

In August, the Ministry of Information and Broadcasting had issued an advisory to all private satellite TV channels, urging them to refrain from using the nomen-clature 'Dalit' for people belonging to Scheduled Castes in compliance with a Bombay High Court directive.

The Press Council of India (PCI), in its decision, that was made earlier but ratified during

PCI chairperson C K Prasad, while replying to a question on the issue of the use of the term 'Dalit' during a media in-teraction, noted that the Bombay High Court directed the I&B ministry to consider issuing such a directive.

"The order of the Bombay High Court was turn to pg02 THIRUVANANTHAPURAM, NOV 15 (PTI): Consensus eluded a crucial all-party meeting called Thursday to resolve the stand-off over permitting women of men-strual age into the Sabarimala shrine with the Kerala government firm on implementing the Supreme Court order and the Opposition walking out in protest.

After the nearly three-hour long meeting, dubbed as a 'farce' by the Opposition, Chief Minister Pinarayi Vijayan said his governnent was duty bound to enforce the court's September 28 verdict allowing women of all ages to pray at the hill temple of Lord Ayyappa as it had not been stayed.

The meeting was convened by him in the backdrop of statewide protests by devotees after the Supreme Court ended an age-old ban on entry of women

in the 10-50 age group.
"The government has no oth-

er option as Supreme Court has made it clear that the September 28 verdict has not been stayed which means women in the 10-50 age group have the right to visit the Sabarimala temple," Vijayan told reporters.

Opposition Congress-led United Democratic Front (UDF) and the BJP staged a walkout at the meeting, convened two days ahead of the temple's opening on November 17 for the twomonth long pilgrim season when lakhs of devotees are expected to throng the shrine.

Leader of the Opposition in the state assembly Ramesh Chennithala accused the government of being adamant, while BJP state President P S Sreedharan Pillai said the meeting was a 'waste of time'. Meanwhile,

Pandalam Royal family, associated with the temple, told Vijayan that there was no change in its stand with regard to rituals and traditions of the shrine and it was against entry of young women.

The views were conveved during talks held separately the chief minister with the familv member Sasikumar Varma and Tantri (head priest) Kandararu Rajeevaru on the issue.

"We are against the entry of young women. There is no change in the stand", Verma told reporters adding Vijayan informed them about the limitations of the government vis-a-

vis the court order. Kandararu Rajeevaru said "we can only appeal to young women

not to come to Sabarimala".

At the all-party meet, Vijayan rejected the demand that the government seek time from the court to implement its order since a bunch of review petitions are expected to come

up for hearing before the apex court on January 22.

The government cannot say that belief was above the Constitution, he said.

It put forward certain suggestions, including setting apart certain days for young women to offer prayers, instead of all days, Vijayan said, adding these had to be discussed with all stakeholders.

He said the CPI(M)-led LDF government was not adamant but was duty-bound to implement the court verdict.

Chennithala said the govern-ment was "adamant" in its stand and it refused to accept the Opposition's suggestions.
"We decided to walk out of the

meeting after the Chief Minister's reply. The meeting was a farce, government was not ready for any compromise", he told reporters

#### Prohibitory orders clamped in three Guwahati police districts

GUWAHATI, Nov 15 (PTI): Prohibitory or-(PTI): Prohibitory orders under section 144 of CrPC have been imposed in the three police districts of Guwahati city with immediate effect on Thursday, ahead of Friday's Assam secretariat gherao programme of KMSS and AJYCP against the Citizen (Amendment) Bill, 2016

The order clamped in the East, West and Central police districts will remain in force till further notice, police said.

The 'Janata Bhawan Gherao' at the secretariat on Friday by Krishak Mukti Sangram Samiti(KMSS), a peasant organisation, and Assam Jatiyatabadi Yuba Chha-tra Parishad (AJYCP), a student organisation, is expected to see partici-pation from 68 other organisations from other parts of the state, protest organisors said.

Protesters ling from Sadia, Dhubri and Diphu to participate in the agitation were detained at Tamulpur, which is about 80 km from here, and Sipajhar, which is about 60 km from here, police said.

Citizenshin (Amendment) Bill, 2016 was introduced in the Citizenship Act, 1955.

The bill seeks to grant citizenship to people belonging to minority communities such as Hindus Sikhs, Buddhists, Jains, Parsis and Christians from Afghanistan, Ban-gladesh and Pakistan after six years of residence in India, instead of a wait of 12 years, even if they do not possess any proper document.

The Rohingyas staged protest marches demanding realisation of a five-point demand as the precondition that included deployment of UN peacekeeping forces in the Rakhine State to ensure their safety and giv-ing them the full citizenship status in Myanmar. "We want our security and dignity, we don't believe them (Myanmar authorities)," a Rohingya protestors told a private TV channel. Kalam earlier said none of the 50 families spoken to so far "expressed their willingness to go back under the present circumstances" and "We cannot force them to go back against their will."

"We are waiting, we will start the repatriation if neone agrees to go back by 4pm," Kalam said. Bangladesh officials on Thursday held several

rounds of meetings with the Rohingya in their effort to motivate them to return home but said they were at liberty to decide on their return. The authorities in Dhaka, however, are yet to make any announcement on the situation. The UN rights body chief Michelle Bachelet on Tuesday urged Bangladesh to halt the repatriation plans fearing that sending them back would put their lives at "serious risk".

The date for the beginning the repatriation was set on October 30 in line with Myanmar officials talks with Bangladesh while they visited the crammed Rohingya camps in the country's southeastern Cox's Bazar visibly in their effort to start a process as Naypy-idaw agreed to begin their repatriation by November.

Bangladeshi officials said they so far provided Myanmar a list of 24 000 Rohingvas in two phases while Myanmar said they verified 5,000 of them while media reports quoting Naypyidaw sources suggested

they could return initially 2,000.

Myanmar earlier announced a large-scale repatriation plan in November 2017 but Dhaka alleged the country took little steps to keep their promise.

Myanmar, however, is still refusing to acknowledge

any wrongdoing in its treatment of the Rohingyas.

The UN investigators said Myanmar's top military officials should be prosecuted for genocide but the country has rejected the calls, insisting it was defending itself against armed fighters. The UN has called on both governments to halt the "rushed" repatriation plans but the pleas appear to have fallen on deaf ears. #### Indian-origin minister leads resignations in fresh Brexit turmoil for Theresa May

LONDON, NOV 15 (PTI): British Prime Minister Theresa May's uneasy Brexit truce was shattered Thursday as Indian-origin Shailesh Vara became the first of the four ministers to resign over a "half-way house" divorce deal with the European Union. Minutes after Vara

stepped down as North-ern Ireland minister, Prime Minister May was hit by a bigger blow as her Brexit Secretary Dominic Raab resigned from the Cabinet saying he "cannot in good conscience" support the draft of the withdraw-al agreement with the 28-member bloc.

"We are a proud nation and it is a sad day when we are reduced to obeying rules made by other countries who have shown that they do not have our best interests at heart. We can and must do better than this. The people of the UK deserve better," said Vara, Conservative Party MP for North-West Cam bridgeshire, who has been a minister in the Northern Ireland Office (NIO) since

will finally become a sovereign nation". Raab, who

took charge as Secretary of State for Exiting the EU after his predecessor David Davis stepped down in protest over May's Brexit negotiations in July, said the proposed arrange-ment to avoid a post-Brexit border with Northern Ireland is a "very real threat to the integrity of the United Kingdom".

"I cannot support an indefinite backstop ar-rangement where the EU holds a veto over our ability to exit. No democratic nation has ever signed up to be bound by such an extensive regime, imposed externally without any democratic control over the laws to be applied, nor the ability to exit the arrangement," he said.

Raab's resignation was followed by another pro-Brexit minister, work and pensions secretary Esther McVey, announcing that she is resigning from the Cabinet over the issue.
Another junior Brexit

minister Suella Braverman quit over Brexit, shortly after her former boss Raab quit office.

"It is with deep regret and after reflection that I have had to tender my resignation today as a Brexit Minister. Thank you for the opportunity. I look forward to working to support Brexit from the Backbenches. This has not been an easy decision," Braverman said in a tweet.

The resignations are being seen as a sign of bigger troubles ahead for May, who is set to defend the agreement before MPs in the House of Commons on Thursday.

"I firmly believe that draft Withdrawal Agreement was the best that could be negotiated, and it was for the Cabinet to decide whether to move on in the talks," she said in her statement at the Downing Street doorstep after hours of talks with her top team on

Wednesday evening.
"The choices before
us were difficult, particularly in relation to the Northern Ireland backstop. But the collective decision of Cabinet was that the Government should agree the draft Withdrawal Agreement and the Outline Political Declaration this is a decisive step which enables us to move on and finalise the deal in the days

ahead," she said.

There were already rumblings that while she claimed the Cabinet had collectively given its backing to her deal, many ministers had spoken out against it and were not entirely happy with the final text.

### Odisha govt announces special package for drought hit people

BHUBANESWAR, Nov 15 (PTI): Odisha gov-ernment Thursday announced a special pack-age for the people hit by drought in nine districts

The package was decided at a meeting chaired by Chief Minister Naveen Patnaik, officials said.

Earlier, the state gov ernment had identified as many as 5,633 villages of 66 Blocks and 16 urban local bodies (ULBs) of nine districts - Baragarh, Bolangir, Baragarh, Bolangir, ogarh, Jharsuguda, Deogarh, Deogarn, Jilai suguua, Kalahandi, Nabarangpur, Nuapada, Sambalpur and Sundargarh, as drought affected areas.
The farmers in these

districts have suffered crop loss of 33 per cent and above due to moisture stress.

To give relief to farm-ers who have taken credit from different banks, the state government has decided to convert short term kharif loans the affected areas during kharif 2018 hav-ing crop loss of 33 per cent into medium term loan, he said.

Due date of Kharif

short term loan advance in the affected areas will be extended up to September 30, 2019 to facilitate conversion of such loans into medium term loans, the official said.

The Central govern-ment would be requested to provide interest incentive of 3 per cent for medium term (conversion) loans which is at par with crop loans for prompt paying farmers, he said.

The government has also decided 100 per cent remission in respect cess on land revenue and compulsory basic water rate will be given to farmers where the crop loss is 33 per cent or more the official said

Similarly, it has been decided that school fees and school examination fees up to high school level in government schools shall be waived in the affected areas. #### As Another Academic Year Draws to a Close

Think of expanding collaborations and inspiring participation

nother year, hopefully one of improved learning, is drawing to a close for schools in the State. The students can take a well-deserved break for having persevered through another academic year, with many of them having struggled with a disinterested faculty and poor infrastructure, but the teachers and the department cannot afford to take any time off. In fact, it is now that the real work on formulating and implementing policy improvements begins. The year was mostly taken up with routine administrative works and now that the routine of schools in session will soon no longer be the more pressing concern, more time and planning can be invested on addressing the recurring challenges of educating Sikkim. And while it is hoped for government schools to receive special attention since most of the students are enrolled in them, it is also important for private schools to take stock and plan improvements because they carry an inspirational veneer with most parents wanting their wards in them if possible.

Sikkim has routinely performed well in all indicators for school education, and by that count the Human Resource Development Department has a reputation to live up to. At policy level and when it comes to funds commitments and policy intents on paper, Sikkim has proven that it is focused on providing better education. What we also know, however, is that this focus is not always backed by the required diligence at the administrative level. Let's looks at some aspects that are wrong with the way Sikkim seeks to educate in its schools. Routine matters which should have been streamlined a long time back continue to get stalled and delayed. That textbooks still take a longer time to reach schools should not be acceptable any more. It is also not uncommon for some schools to hold the first term examinations for students who have not received teachers for some of the subjects. Why this continues to happen is difficult to understand. Then there is the unique situation of understaffed rural schools and still bursting-at-their-seams urban and suburban institutions. And this despite years of trying to correct the balance.

Both these aspects have received some attention in the recent years, and every new academic year should see this process get further refined and less influenced by political pressure and other influences. The winter pause is now being used for advanced teacher training sessions and workshops, and one hopes that this will now graduate to a level where the teachers are also invited to participate in the policy-refining initiatives. Teachers, after all, know best what the students still require and how their learning experience can be made more meaningful. For far too long, teachers have received directions and orders, but no concerted efforts have been made to take their counsel or even take them into confidence. That is a wealth of experience and understanding that Sikkim is not tapping into and should make an effort to source.

Also left out from preparations for the next academic year is feedback from students themselves. There might still be time to begin this process to inform at least some of the initiatives for the next session. A simple offer like inviting school clusters to send in recommendations for what the Department could do for them before schools reopen and for student clubs to send in wish-lists would be a good place to begin. Such a move would not only establish a better connect between the department and the schools, between officials and teachers and between the State and the students, but also seed a stronger sense of belonging and reinforce the urge to participate. That would be a good feeling to end an academic year and look forward to a new one.

## How anti-Semitic stereotypes from a century ago echo today

few weeks ago, my parents woke up to find a large, orange Aswastika daubed in paint on a wooden plank outside their house in Sydney. We have a mezuzah attached to our front doorpost, so the "dauber knew we were a lewish household. At the time, my parents were angry and sad more than frightened.

My family's experience cannot compare with the hate that burst forth in Pittsburgh several weeks ago, when 11 congregants at the Tree of Life Synagogue were murdered simply because they were Jewish people attending prayer. But we are living in a period of increasing hatred directed at minorities of all kinds, and anti-Semitism is on

the rise across the globe.

The Pittsburgh synagogue gunman, Robert Bowers, raged in online platforms that Iews were "invaders" trying to destabilise the United States They were, he said, "an infestation' and "evil". Bowers' rants cast Iews in the role of dangerous revolutionaries out to destroy Western civilisation. This has long been a staple perspective of anti-Semitism.

In my research, I have been study

in the anti-Semitic images that were commonplace in Vienna early last century. These stereotyped images served to vilify Jewish people, culminating in the removal of most of the Jews from Vienna in 1938.

I believe it is important that we re-

I believe it is important that we reflect on these upsetting images to consider how the "mainstreaming" of anti-Semitic ideas and images in popular media can have terrible consequ

### CARICATURES IN THE FIN-DE-SIÈ-CLE VIENNESE PRESS

At the turn of the century, the Austrian capital was home to the third-largest Jewish population in Europe after Warsaw and Budapest. Accounting for almost 9% of Vienna's population, Jews were a highly visible minority. They were also a constant source of conversation and fear with-in Vienna's political and civic arenas.

Anti-Semitic caricatures and literary sketches in the Viennese press ran rife from the end of the 19th cen-



tury until the German annexation of

Austria in March 1938.

The cartoons presented a variety of messages that characterised Jews in a number of negative roles: as the binary opposite to Aryan morality and virtuousness, as money-grubbing parvenus, or as attempting to take over large parts of the city. What all these stereotypes had in common was their characterisation of lewish people as an Other who did not belong within European society.

One caricature from the wide-ly read Viennese biweekly satirical magazine Kikeriki, published in 1900, comments on the presence of Jews at elite social events.

It depicts Jewish men and women ridiculed for their supposed racial characteristics (a view strongly in-fluenced by the popularity of eugenics and Social Darwinism during this period) and, by satirising the popular dance styles at elite city balls, implies that Jews dominated Viennese elite circles. The image's caption makes no overt references to Jews, but the visual stereotypes would have made it very clear to the readers what this image was about.

Another cartoon from 1890 in Figaro (not to be confused with the popular French daily Le Figaro) depicts two men meeting on a crowded Viennese street. One of the men, a visitor, asks a local if he would be so kind

as to point out the Judengasse [Jews Street]. The latter replies, "Perhaps you can tell me where is it not."

The scene behind these two gentlemen is filled with characters drawn with common Jewish bodily stereotypes: large hooked noses, dark curly

hair and thick lips.

Although at this time most Jews living in Vienna spoke German and were adherents to secular German culture, the figure of the Ostjude (Eastern Jew) was a typical feature of these cartoons. Anti-Semitic car-toonists, newspaper editors and pol-iticians harnessed a fear connected to an increased Jewish migration from Austria's eastern crownlands and the

pogroms of the Russian Empire.

Despite the fact that Yiddish-speaking, Orthodox, tradition ally attired Jews never accounted for the majority of Vienna's Jewish pop-ulation, cartoons often depicted them as descending en masse into an un-

suspecting "German" city.
Other cartoons bemoaning Vienna's
"Jewification" gave way to those speculating on the revenge that would be meted out to the Jews; not necessarily violence and murder, but other forms such as banishment from the city and

### its social and political arenas. 'JEWIFICATION' AND REVENGE TODAY

The effects of this tradition of anti-Semitic representation are clear. It took very little for average men and

women to turn on their Jewish neighbours and colleagues after the man Anschluss in March 1938.

Many Viennese Jews were lucky to escape. Some, just under 2,000, found a haven in Australia. They have since, like many other refugees and migrants, contributed to the economic, cultural and political developm culture in the post-WWII period.

Yet the themes of "Jewification" and revenge expressed in these cartoons are, sadly, still relevant today.

In his online rants, for instance, Bowers had condemned the Hebrew Immigrant Aid Society (HIAS) - a Jewish refugee advocacy and support group founded in New York in 1881 – for "bringing in invaders".

The Hungarian-born Jewish bil-lionaire philanthropist George So-ros, meanwhile, has been the target of anti-Semitic demonisation. And in Charlottesville last year, hundreds of mostly young white men marched with torches chanting the Nazi slogan "Blood and Soil" and "Jews will not replace us".

How we speak about and depict others in the media and social dis-course perpetuates long-held stereotypes and ultimately emboldens hatefilled individuals. It is for this reason that we should look to the past – and learn from it.

### The kilogram is being redefined – a physicist explains

w much is a kilogram? 1,000 grams. 2.20462 pounds. Or 0.0685 slugs based on the old Imperial gravi-1,000 grams. 2.20462 tational system. But where does this amount actually come from and how can everyone be sure they are using the same measurement? Since 1889, countries who

are members of the General Conference on Weights and Measures have agreed to use a standard block of metal kept near Paris – to define the kilogram. But although the modern block is stored in a highly controlled environment, its weight can change by tiny amounts as wear and tear causes it to lose mass and dirt causes it to increase. To address this problem, scientists around the world have spent nearly two decades discussing how the kilogram could instead be defined in relation to constant measurements of nature. And now they have finally reached a decision.

The first kilogram (originally called a grave) was de-fined in 1793 by a commission of the French Academy of Sciences, who wanted a better standard than the fixed amounts of grain that had traditionally been used. The commission decided that the new measure would be the mass of one cubic decimetre of distilled water at 4°C (the temperature at which water has its highest density under standard conditions). This had the advantage in that most properly equipped labs would be able to reproduce


this standard. Subsequently, a prototype of this mass was cast in brass.

Unfortunately, this definition of mass depended upon another variable measurecan gradually change in mass. Radically, the answer from the International Bureau of Weights and Measures is to overhaul the definitions of a kilogram, as well as all the oth-

the hyperfine ground state levels of Caesium-133. This is the same no matter when or where it is measured.

ment, the metre. At this point, the metre was only provision-ally defined as part of the dis-tance from the North Pole to the equator. Once the value of the metre and the temperature of water at its densest were more accurately defined, the kilogram also had to be replaced. And a new prototype was cast in platinum to represent this mass.

Eventually, this was replaced with the international prototype kilogram (IKP) used today, cast from a mixture of platinum and iridium to make it very hard and prevent it reacting with oxygen. The IPK and six copies are kept by the International Bureau of Weights and Measures in the Pavillon de Breteuil, Saint-Cloud, near Paris in France to act as a reference to meas against. Copies of the IPK are transported across the world to ensure all participating coun-

tries use the same standard.

But even the modern IPK

er basic units of measurement used in science (known as SI units, from the French for in-

ternational system).

Instead of measuring the kilogram against a block stored in a vault, we can define it based on precise values of constants of nature. Agreeing a definition has taken a long time because we needed to be able to measure these con stants to exacting standards with an uncertainty of 30 parts per billion (meaning the measurements are accurate to 0.00000003 of a unit).
Scientists have actually al-

ready done this for time and length. A second is no longer a fraction of the time it takes the Earth to revolve, which can change as the globe speeds up or slows down. Instead, a second is now de fined by the time it takes for a certain amount of energy to be released as radiation from atoms of Caesium-133. Spe cifically, one second equals

to redefine the metre in relation to the second and another natural constant, the speed of light in a vacuum (c), which scientists have calculated as 299,792,458 metres per second. So one metre is now the length travelled by light in 1/c seconds.

The new definition of the kilogram uses a measurement from another fixed value from nature, Planck's constant (h), which will be defined as 6.62607015×10–34 joule seconds. Planck's constant can be found by divid-ing the electromagnetic frequency of a particle of light or "photon" by the amount of energy it carries.

The constant is usually measured in joule seconds but this can also be expressed as kilogram square metres per second. We know what a second and a metre is from the other definitions. So by adding along measurements, with an exact knowledge of

ing the new definition has taken so long is because scientists have had to create very precise devices to mea-sure Planck's constant with a high enough degree of ac-

Planck's constant, we can get a new, very precise definition of

curacy. The method has also been controversial because it will break the link that the kilogram has to other base SI units, particularly the mole, which measures the amount of a substance in terms of the number of particles it's made from. Some scientists have proposed alternative methods as a result.

But following a symbolic vote, the new definition of the kilogram will be used by the International Bureau of Weights and Measures and national measurement institutes around the world, along with new definitions of the remain-ing base SI units, the mole, the kelvin (temperature), the ampere (current) and the candela (luminous intensity).

For most people, everyday life will carry on as normal despite the redefinitions. One standard bag of sugar will con-tain as much sugar as it ever did. But some of these changes, for example to the kelvin, will mean practical advantages for scientists making very precise measurements. And to answer the question "how much is a kilogram", we will no longer have to compare blocks of platinum or worry about scratching them.

### Top India, China officials hold defence, security dialogue, agree to maintain peace on the border

BEIJING, NOV 15 (PTI): A year after the Doklam standoff, top defence officials of India and China have agreed on the importance of maintaining peace in the border areas while implementing the consensus reached between Prime Minister Narendra Modi and President Xi Jinping at Wuhan.

The ninth annual defence and security dialogue on November 13 was held over a year after the 73-day military stand-off in the Sikkim sector.

The talks were held between the two defence delegations headed by Defence Secretary Sanjay Mitra and China's Deputy Chief of Joint Staff Department of the Central Military Commission Lt General Shao Yuanming, a press release by the Indian Embassy here said on Thursday.

Asked about the outcome of the defence and security dia-logue, Chinese foreign ministry spokesperson Hua Chunving said the two sides have changed ideas on the management of border affairs and upholding peace and tranquillity.
"We believe the two sides

sus between the two leaders to ensure peace and tranquillity at our border areas and ensure stability of our bilateral ties,"

she said.

At the talks, both sides agreed on enhancing defence exchanges and interactions at different levels between the two militaries, the press release said

Mitra was accompanied by senior officials of the ministry of defence and Indian Army, Navy and Air Force

The annual dialogue did not take place last year following the tense standoff between the two militaries at Doklam, which was triggered by the Chinese PLA's plan to build a road close to the narrow Chicken's Neck corridor connecting India's northeastern states in an area also claimed by Bhutan besides China.

The standoff ended when Chinese troops stopped the road construction after which both

countries stepped up efforts to normalise relations leading to the informal summit between Modi and Xi at Wuhan in April this year. The defence dialogue was also held ahead of the 21st round of border talks between the Special Representatives of the two countries in the Chinese city of Dujiangyan on November 23-24.

National Security Advisor Ajit Doval and Chinese State Councillor and Foreign Minister Wang Yi are the designated Special Representatives for the border talks.

Besides efforts to work out a solution to resolve the dispute on the border spanning 3,488 kms, the border talks also fo-cussed on discussions on other aspects of India-China relations.

The two militaries are due to hold the annual 'Hand-in-Hand' drills next month in China after gap of one year.

During the dialogue, both

sides also agreed on specific defence exchanges for 2019.

"Both sides agreed to

hance exchanges and interactions through reciprocal high-level visits between the two ministries of defence as well as between military commands, joint training exercises, mutual visits by defence personnel including mid-level and cadet officers were also agreed upon," the Indian Embassy release said.

They reiterated the importance of maintaining peace and tranquillity in the border areas, implementing the consensus reached between Modi and Xi and specific additional confidence building measures at the operational level, it said.

The two nations also had an exchange of views on regional and global issues.

Both sides underlined the importance of this dialogue as an important mechanism between the two countries for consultations on defence and security matters. They emphasised the need to further strengthen military-to-military ties in order to strengthen political and strategic mutual trust between the two countries," it said.

Both sides agreed to hold the next round of the dialogue at a mutually convenient time in India in 2019.

Elections to the 40-member Mizoram Assembly will be held on November 28.

Mizoram is the only northeastern state where the Congress is in power and the BJP is keen on mak ing inroads in the Christian-dominated state.

Mizoram Pradesh Congress Committee (MPCC) leader Lalhru-aitluanga Kawlni said that public meetings and door-to-door canvassing were being organised in villages under the close supervision of the local forums of the Mizoram People's Forum (MPF), the church-sponsored

election watchdog.
The standard mode of campaigning in the assembly elections in 2008 and 2013 was a common platform with all candidates of a constituency sharing a stage.

However, this time,

the MPF has relaxed the guideline and skipped the common platform.

After consulting representatives of political parties, the MPF has agreed to door-to-door campaigning by the can-didates, a MPF leader said. But the candidates have to be accompanied by MPF leaders of the local units during their house-tohouse campaigning to ensure that they do not use money power, the MPCC leader said.

The MPF leaders were also chairing pub-lic meetings addressed by the contestants, the MPCC leader said.

"Election observers, especially personnel of the surveillance team, are also maintaining a strict vigil and checking vehicles," he said.

The display of flags

of political parties and posters have also been minimised under the supervision of the flying squads and the MPF.

Bio-data of the candidates and their appeals to voters were collected by the MPF leaders and distributed to the members of each household besides publishing them in the house journals of the churches, he said.

Lallenmawia Jongte, the secretary of the opposition Mizo National Front (MNF), said that the front did not organise public meetings, except in some villages.

"We convened party block conferences and unit meetings where candidates and star camwhere paigners or party leaders delivered speeches to persuade the voters to vote in their favour." ngte said. Door-to-door

paigns were being conducted in all the villages under the supervision of the MPF and the election watchdog was extremely particular about organising dinners, he said

Community feasts have been prohibited by the MPF and any politi-cal party organising such feasts as part of their campaign was being condemned publicly, he said.

Election campaign offices have been opened in all the villages and more than one campaign office have been set up in larger villages and towns.

Supporters of contestants were found visiting relatives in other villages for canvassing support for the nominees

Campaigning has also come of age in the state with the use of social media like Facebook and Whatsapp.
With television and

radio still being used by candidates and campaigners, social media is also being extensively used to woo younger voters.

On the major poll is-

sues, the ruling Congress was banking on its flagship programme - the New Land Use Policy (NLUP) - which brought the party to power for two consecutive terms.

The Congress also floated a new policy called New Economic Development Program (NEDP) as a convergence of the NLUP under which around Rs 1 lakh each was disbursed to each beneficiary family.

The opposition MNF promised assistance to the tune of Rs 3 lakh to each family under the Socio-Economic opment Policy (SEDP) and to close down liquor shops and impose prohi-bition again as wished by the powerful church.

The MNF is banking on a non-Congress government at the Centre for funding its development projects.

Zoram People's Movement (ZPM), the newly floated conglomerate of two political parties and five groups, which is contesting in 36 seats as a group of indepen-dents, promised crop insurance, purchase of the produces of the farmers and remunerative prices by earmarking fund in the annual budgets.

#### Mizoram civil societies hail EC move to replace poll officer

AIZAWL, NOV 15 (PTI): Election Co sion's move to replace S B Shashank as Mizoram's chief electoral officer was welcomed on Thursday by the civil societies that had spearheaded movement to seek the poll officer's ouster.

"We welcome any-body as state CEO, except Shashank, who was working against the in-terests of the Mizo people by making an all-out effort to register Bru voters in the Tripura relief camps without following established procedures," Vanlalruata, chairman of the NGO, Coordination Committee, told PTI.

The poll panel announced in the morning that IAS officer Ashish Kundra was being ap-pointed as the chief electoral officer of the state with immediate effect The order came after

some civil society groups Mizoram demanded Shashank's ouster over a row on allowing Bru voters lodged in Tripura relief camps to exercise their franchise from there. Vanlalruata added the civil societies would cooperate with the new CEO if he was willing to work towards free, fair and peaceful polls.

The committee -- an apex body of civil societies and students' organisations in the northeastern state had sought Shashank's exit from the state shortly after the state election commission removed principal secretary (home) Lalnunmawia Chuaungo

The agitation against Shashank was launched a fortnight ago, with the committee demanding committee demanding that the officer be transferred outside Mizoram.
It also demanded that

11,232 Bru voters in six Tripura relief camps be allowed to exercise their franchise at their respective polling stations in Mizoram, and not in Tripura as committed by the poll panel. Thousands of Bru community

members had fled the state and took shelter in Tripura following ethnic clashes in 1997. They since been living in six relief camps of the

neighbouring state.

The EC had earlier this month sent two high-level teams to assess the situation in the state, following an agitation by the civil societies outside the CEO office.

After the visits, the poll panel had asked the Mizoram government to suggest names for the CEO's post. Shashank left Mizoram last week after being summoned by the chief election commis-sioner to Delhi.



roon Lorgat. SABC, the strapped national broadcaster, will televise the tournament. The free-toair coverage is expected to boost the popularity of cricket, although it is unlikely that CSA are

The works of Arundhati Roy, Jeet Thayil, Perumal Murugan and Tabish Khair among others which were in the longlist failed to make the cut.

According to the jury, which also included Claire Armitstead, Nandana Sen, Firdous Azim and Tissa Jayatilaka, the six novels poi-gnantly bring alive a wide spec-trum of themes and emotions that are so relevant in contemporary South Asian life.

The shortlisted books are: Kaikini's "No Presents Please" in

Kannada (translated by Tejaswi-ni Niranjana); Shamsie's "Home Fire"; "Miss Laila Armed And Dangerous" (Manu Joseph); "Exit West" (Mohsin Hamid); Mukherwest (Month) Hallidy, Musher-jee's "A State Of Freedom" and "Harilal & Sons" (Saraf). Rudrangshu Mukherjee said evaluating these books reminded

#### EU's Tusk says summit to sign Brexit deal Nov 25

BRUSSELS, Nov 15 (AFP): EU President (AFP): EU President Donald Tusk on Thursday confirmed the bloc mit to seal the hard-fought Brexit agreement with Britain on November 25.

Tusk's announcement will come as a boost to British Prime Minister Theresa May as she begins the daunting task of selling the deal to a fractious parliament where she faces resistance from arch Brexiteers and EU supporters alike.

fron Ambassadors the 27 remaining EU states will meet by the end of the week to share their analysis of the withdrawal deal, Tusk said, adding that he hoped "there will not be too

many comments".

They will also take stock of work on the "Joint Political Declara-tion" about future relations between Brussels and Britain, which Tusk said should be finalised with London by Tuesday and then analysed by member states' officials.

"Then if nothing extraordinary happens, we will hold a European Council meeting in order to finalise and formalise the Brexit agreement. It will take place on Sunday the 25th of November at 9:30 am," Tusk told the press alongside EU chief negotiator Michel Bar-nier a day after the 585page withdrawal agree-ment was approved by the British cabinet.

Tusk paid tribute to the work of Barnier and his team, who he said had "ensured the limitation of the damage caused by Brexit" and secured the interests of the EU.

Barnier said the deal was "fair and balanced". though it has caused uproar among Brexit supporters in May's govern-ment who accused her of betraying the June 2016 vote to leave the bloc.

The deal covers cit-

izens' rights, Britain's financial settlement and plans for a post-Brexit transition period during which both sides hope to agree a new trade deal.

The most controversial element is a "back-stop" plan to keep Britain in a customs union with the EU until a trade deal is agreed that avoids the need for border checks with Ireland.

Many Brexiteers fear this would leave Britain a "vassal state", tied to the bloc indefinitely.

"Pakistan doesn't want Kashmir. It can't even manage its four provinces. The big thing is insaaniyat (humanity). People who are dy-ing there, it is painful. Any death, be it from any community, is painful," Afridi said.

# Chaos in Lanka parliament as Speaker comes under siege

Parliament on Thursday as agitated lawmakers loyal to President Maithripala Sirisena and Prime Minister Mahinda Rajapaksa surrounded the Speaker in his chair after the premier, who lost a floor test, demanded fresh elections to resolve the political turmoil.

Trouble erupted when Speaker Karu Javasuriya agreed to a request from ousted premier Wickremesinghe's United National Party that a vote be taken on a statement made by Rajapaksa de-manding fresh polls.

Jayasuriya had allowed Rajapaksa to make a statement as a member of parliament after stating that he does not recognise the claim of the Sri Lanka Freedom Party (SLFP) leader who lost a no-confidence motion on Wednesday.

"I was the president ad premier, so this prime minister's post is not important," Rajapaksa said. "I urge all 225 members to join me in calling for a fresh election. We want a general election," he said, adding that a fresh election was the best way to resolve the crisis.

UNP legislator Lakshman Kiriella urged Jaya-suriya to take a vote by name, showing the loss of confidence over Rajapaksa's remarks.

Jayasuriya asked the House if it agreed and with resounding voices of 'Aye' he proceeded to

He was immediately surrounded by Sirisena and Rajapaksa's MPs who were protesting against Javasuriva's decision to take the vote.
"I am the Speaker and

I decide," Jayasuriya told the angry lawmakers as UNP MPs formed a ring around the Speaker's chair to shield Jayasuriya.

"They are trying to assault the Speaker," UNP legislator Harsha de Silva tweeted from the House. Objects were thrown

at the Speaker's chair and at least one MP was seen leaving the chamber bleeding, an official said.
The commotion con-

tinued for about half an hour before Jayasuriya adjourned the House.

"We are the lawful government and we will sit in the government benches today," Ajith P Perera, a senior UNP leg-islator said earlier. The UNP had sat on the opposition benches during the no-trust vote.

Rajapaksa's side has disputed the no-trust motion, saying proper procedure was not fol-lowed and accused Jayasuriya of bias towards his own party. Since the

Speaker had ruled that Rajapaksa had no major-ity, Wickremesinghe remains the lawful premier, the UNP claimed.

The UNP said they would boycott a meet-ing called by Sirisena with political parties which backed the mo-tion against Rajapaksa on Wednesday. This was after a strongly-worded letter from Sirisena to Jayasuriya last night.

Sirisena, in response to an official communique by Jayasuriya on the vote in parliament, told the Speaker that a prime minister does not necessarily require a parliamentary majority, that Jayasuriya had violated parliamenta

ry procedures and standing orders of parliament in conducting the no-trust motion against Rajapaksa, and that he as president was the sole authority in appointing a

Parliament Wednesday passed the no-confidence motion against Rajapaksa who was installed by as premier by Sirisena in a controversial move, after the Supreme Court overturned the presidential decree to dissolve the House and hold snap polls on January 5.

Amid raucous scenes Parliament on Wednesday met for the first time since October 26, when Sirise-na sacked premier Wick-

remesinghe, installed Rajapaksa in his place and suspended the House, plunging the island nation an unprecedented Constitutional crisis.

The vote of no confi-dence against Rajapaksa has further complicated the political crisis as the former strongman has rejected the outcome of the floor test. It is not yet clear whether Rajapaksa will resign or whether the ousted Wickremes-inghe, who has the support of 122 lawmakers. will return to power.

### Death toll from California wildfires rises as 130 still missing



toll in the deadliest wildfires in recent California history climbed to 59 on Wednesday as authorities released a list of 130 people still missing. Most of those unaccounted for are from the Butte County town of Paradise, in northern California which was virtually erased from the map by the so-called "Camp Fire" blaze that erupted last week.

Butte County Sheriff Kory Honea told journalists Wednesday evening that 461 search and rescue personnel and 22 cadaver dogs were involved in the effort to locate those missing and DNA testing was being expedited to identify the victims.

"Beginning Thursday, anyone who believes a family member perished can provide a DNA sample" to the sheriff's office, Honea said.

Paradise, a town of around 26,000 in the foothills of the Sierra Nevada mountains, was popular with retirees and many of those reported missing by the sheriff's office are elderly -- in their 70s, 80s and 90s. Virtually every home in Paradise, located 80 miles (130 kilometers) north of the state capital Sacramento, was destroyed by the fast-moving fire fuelled by

At least 59 deaths have been reported so far from the devastating wildfires and body recovery teams were going house-to-house with cawere going noise-to-noise with ca-daver dogs in Paradise on Wednes-day. "We are in the midst of a ca-tastrophe," Governor Jerry Brown told a press conference. "The fire was unprecedented, overwhelming,

Long, head of the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), said Paradise was looking at a "total rebuild" with many homes, busi-

esses and infrastructure destroyed.
"This is going to be a very long and frustrating event for the citizens of Paradise," Long said.

"We're going to have to find a new normal." "You're not going to be able to rebuild Paradise the way it was." An AFP reporter in Paradise on Wednesday saw crews removing trees, repairing fences along roads and towing away cars. Authorities said livestock owners were being allowed in to restricted areas for brief periods to feed the animals but it was unclear when residents would allowed back in

Fifty-six deaths have been reported from the "Camp Fire," mostly in Paradise, while three people have died in the "Woolsey Fire."

Honea said that of the 56 human remains found in his county, 47 had been identified. While the cause of the "Camp Fire" is still under investigation, a lawsuit has been filed against the local power company, PG&E, by fire victims claiming negligence by the utility. The complaint alleged that the fire began on November 8 when a high voltage trans-mission line failed, igniting a vegetation fire. As thousands of firefighters fought the fires, incredible tales have emerged of courage and survival.

A man who asked to be identified by only his first name, Scott, told the San Francisco Chronicle that

when the "Camp Fire" surrounded his home in Concow in Butte County he and his family plunged into a reservoir along with a 90-year-old neighbor, Bruno.

"Bruno was saying, 'Just leave me. I can't do this," Scott, 51, told the newspaper, "I said, 'Bruno, we're not going to leave you. And I'm not going to burn, so you better hurry. remained in the cold water as flames licked the shore and made their way to a small island in the reservoir after finding a pair of rowboats.

Allyn Pierce, a nurse in Paradise, told The New York Times and CNN how his life was saved by a bulldozer driver as he fled the town in his pickup truck along with other residents on Thursday. Pierce said cars were catching fire around him and he dictated a goodbye message to his family, expecting his vehicle to catch fire next.

"I stayed calm but I was terrified," Pierce said.

Then all of a sudden this bulldozer comes out of nowhere and knocks this burning truck out of the

Instead of fleeing to safety, however, Pierce turned around and went back to the Adventist Health Feather River Hospital, where he works as an intensive care nurse, and helped evacuate patients to the hospital's helipad. Pierce displayed pictures of his Toyota pickup truck which he said was still working despite lights which had melted and a rear passenger door which had been welded shut by the heat from the fire.


