He was on fast since June this year. Agarwal hreathed his last at the hospital here at around 2 pm.

He was moved to the AIIMS hospital, Rishi-kesh on October 9 from the protest site.

The two-day annual event of Integrated Mountain Initiative [IMI] was followed by a conclave of Himalayan States on "Well Being of the Next Generation of Himalayan People" on 05 Oct at Shimla which was jointly organized by HIM-COSTE, IMI and Shoolini University, a press release informs.

With the theme "Well Being of Next Generation of Farmers in the Indian Himalayan Region", the IMI Summit VII included three technical sessions namely Ecological Drivers of Change, Social Drivers of Change and the Economic Drivers of Change.

These sessions were followed by integrative session wherein key learnings from the three sessions were discussed threadbare and action points were deliberated. The concluding session "Youth Perspectives on New Age farming

in the Indian Himalayan Region".

Speaking at the inaugural function, Minister of Irrigation and Public Health & Horticulture, Government of Himachal Pradesh, Mahender Singh Thakur, highlighted the challenges faced by the farmers and horticulturalists in the hill States due to natural calamities. He called for adoption of new technologies and methods of farming to improve the productivity in order to enhance the livelihoods of farming community.

Minister for Social Justice, Empowerment & Cooperation, Government of Himachal Pradesh, Dr Rajiv Saizal, who attended the valedictory function as chief guest, stressed on the importance of a pan-Himalayan cooperation platform of the mountain States in the country.

The summit was attended by over 200 delegates from all the 10 mountain States and districts of the Indian Himalayan Region representing diverse areas of work including researchers,

grassroots workers, policymakers, young agri-entrepreneurs and development professionals.

In his keynote address, Food Policy Analyst & Writer, Devinder Sharma, pointed out the stark fact that economic models of growth being followed were highly discriminatory and had made agriculture unvi-

Amongst the recommendations that emerged from the ecological drivers of change were understanding and recognising traditional

practices of shifting cultivation that were environmentally sound and compensating the Himalayan states for the ecosystem services provided by them.

Discussions about the

social drivers of change recommended the need for advocacy and com-munication through role modelling to restore agriculture as an aspirational livelihood, training of youth to complement agriculture with entreprenual opportunities such as ecotourism, poli-cy changes which enable consoldiation of fallow landholdings and its productive use and popularising traditional ag-riculture, including pro-moting farm based folk history in schools and amongst the public. Economic drivers of change discussions desired that farmers be compensated for the discriminatory increase in their incomes and for their role in preserving ecology and for a national mission to release the synergies in the agricultural sector.

Apart from efforts to improve the farm economy in the mountain and hilly states through

income incentivisation, introduction of new technologies and maintaining soil health, the Conclave also focused on opportunities for non-farm activities such as eco-tourism to improve mountain livelihoods.

The conclave also discussed the need to have a coherent policy for the payment of eco-system services [ESS], green bonus/green cess to the Himalayan States to compensate for the development disabilities.

The conclave concluded that a holistic and integrative approach is the need of the hour to ensure that development policies are compatible with one another and addressing the needs of the mountain communities for their well-being without compromising on the sustainability factor.



Corruption Hurts the Already Vulnerable

That's a good enough rea son to say No More

he Corruption Perception Index, published annu-The Corruption Perception Index, published annually by Transparency International, a corruption monitoring organisation based in Berlin, was released in February earlier this year. As this year too draws to a close, and the festive season of Laxmi approaches, so begins the routine of taking stock and reminiscing over the year gone by and that brings us to pause a while on corruption and the nation. As per the Corruption Perception Index released this year, India has slipped to the 81st spot from its all-time high of 76 registered in 2015. Last year, it had ranked 79th. On this index, the higher you rank, the cleaner is the system, or at least the perception of it. India's slide could either be because other nations have become cleaner, or we, as a nation have become more corrupt. Both scenarios are possible, and given the crores being offered to even minor players to switch political allegiances, the thousands of crores that big honchos have been allowed to default on and flee and the lakhs of crores of tax-payer money being announced to bail out compromised banks and the disgustingly rich, it is the latter which appears more plausible. The list is for 180 countries, with New Zealand on No. 1 position as the cleanest society and Somalia at the bottom end as the most corrupt country. India finds in its corruption vicinity countries like Phillipines and Maldives all of which have scored a 40 on a scale of 0 (highly corrupt) to 100 (very clean). This troika is has been lavished the ignominy of being recorded as the "worst regional offenders". Pause on that too as you try and recollect that famous chowkidar jumla by the pradhan sewak.

Over two-thirds of the 180 countries and territories in this year's index fall below the midpoint of the scale (along with India) with the global average score of a paltry 43, indicating endemic corruption in the public sector. As a country, we are even more corrupt than the global average for corruption.

While there are enough arguments to question the process by which Transparency International works out its list, these are only precision issues, and the world at large agrees that the list is accurate. The TI report reveals that although India's ranking has slipped, its corruption perception has improved slightly for the better. We had scored 38 in 2015, but even this slight improvement is nothing to write home about, since, as mentioned, as a nation we continue to be more corrupt than the average for the world as a whole

That said, what is significant about the TI rankings is that the Corruption Perception Index, started in 1995, has been instrumental in creating awareness and triggering debate on corruption. But that is for governments and societies more conscious about their image. Bhutan, for example, is ranked a respectable 26th with "first-division-marks" of 67 points. What is significant is that in 2009, Bhutan was ranked 49th While the neighbour has shown marked improvement, we remain sloppy. There is clear unanimity in our country that corruption is widespread, all pervasive and attendant to every arm of the government. Unfortunately, we approach corruption with a fatalistic attitude – accepting it as unavoidable and trapping ourselves in a rut where palms need to be greased even for routine works. Where corruption was at one time required to push through works which would put the concerned officer's future and career at risk, in our instinct to jump the line and aversion to make the system work, we have now created a monster which needs to be fed even to process what should be ours

Someone recently argued that corruption is ingrained in our culture by pointing out that we routinely bribe even Gods for favour ["Bhakal" anyone?], so bribing mortals does not weigh too heavy on our conscience. But it should. What most of the debates and chest-beating on corruption overlook is that it is not just an inconvenience, it is much worse, because now that it is institutionalised, it worsens the realities of the most vulnerable sections of society. A corrupt system makes no difference between skimming from a multi-crore construction project or siphoning grants and aid meant for victims of natural calamities or subsidies marked for the underprivileged. Kickbacks and embezzlement compromise the effectiveness of such necessary public expenditure as poverty alleviation, education, environment conservation, public infrastructure creation, aid etc. While economies with a vi brant private enterprise can cushion corruption with some resoluteness, societies which are more dependent on government dole and grants to finance multi-ple challenges, suffer the most crushing blow because of the denial which corruption causes. These are also invariably societies which are less empowered and thus less likely to make a noise about graft, and in their desperation, more likely to continue feeding the monster even larger shares. By accepting and indulging corruption, we have painted ourselves into a corner and the only escape is if we realise that the slivers which reach us are not enough for the boxed in crowd, put our feet down, and collectively say "No More"...

Masculinity should not be defined by the Kavanaugh hearings

ith the hearings that led to the confirmation of Brett Kavanaugh as a United States Supreme Court justice still in our rear-view mirrors, what have men learned from

the events of the past few weeks?

I watched the hearings streaming live on my phone. That moment in time will be with me forey er. Over 20 million others also watched, transfixed by those live-broadcast hearings.

The millions who viewed the hearings saw the courageous narrative of one woman who opted to speak up and speak out about sexual assault. But

we also saw the defence and reaffirmation of heteronor-mative masculinity that rests at the core of a gender poli-tics so finely scripted in these hearings.

As a masculinities scholar. I was struck by the familiar narrative of masculinity as I listened to Kavanaugh during the hearings. Kavanaugh's recollections, reflections and details of his boyhood days are similar to what many (but not all) boys might claim as their own. Kavanaugh dis-missed drunkenness as normal and acceptable among

boys. Drinking beer, football training, beach parties and being among "the boys" are part of a long narrative of dominant masculinity in North America.

Kavanaugh normalized a set of practices of nasculinity that resonated not because they are valid, but because they show the dominating, oppressive and typical ways some men wield power over others. The reverberation of this message with the Republican party and a president who claims that "locker room talk" is normal and nothing more than boys being boys is disturbing.

Kayanaugh revealed what masculinity was to him then and validated what masculinity is to him now

PERFORMING MASCULINITY

Kayanaugh's 1982 calendar reads like an archival rendering of privileged adolescent masculinity in the 1980s. Boyhood and being a boy, according to the calendar, was a series of validating and re-affirming "boyish" events. Kavanaugh affirmed his place within and among the masculinizing privlieged boys familiar to us all. He showed the tak-en-for-granted ways that he had participated as just "one of the boys" doing what boys typically do.


There were no apologies, no reflections, not yen an acknowledgement of his actions as ques-

tionable or dubious. There was no reflection of his privileged white, middle-class masculinity. On that he was silent, but his actions, his temperament and

Kavanaugh's performance while in the hearings was enough to raise concerns from some senators about his conduct, his attitude, his ability to assume the job of Supreme Court justice. Other sena-tors saw the narrative of his life as typical, common and nothing more than a window on life as it was They argued that the future Supreme Court justice was just like the rest of the boys. But being like the "rest of the boys" does not legitimize or validate

his calendar spoke volumes.

A LESSON OF SURVIVAL AMONG MEN?



WHAT HAVE MEN LEARNED?

Men need to see, hear and mobilize on the lessons they are learning about themselves as men and the culture of masculinities they navigate every day. Men need to stop legitimizing, validating and excusing the harassing, objectifying and sexu-alizing of women along with the marginalizing and belittling of other men who do not subscribe to the Kavanaugh-esque rules of boys being boys.

To speak up and speak out within and among

men and boys, alongside women and girls as allies. men and boys, alongside women and giris as alies, is to push back on the myth that boys and men are naturally aggressive, dominating and oppressive.

Masculinity is not simply genetic, we learn how to become certain kinds of boys

and we also learn which boys

are more valued than others.


The story told during the Senate confirmation hearings is one that showcases the state of gender relations in North America, Kavanaugh has attempted to show the nation that his experiences as a young man are typical, normal and simply the way it is for all boys. This is North American masculinity and Kavanaugh makes no excuses but instead is exalted as a

We are left asking ourselves what are men learning about being men in the current climate of post #MeToo? Why the defensiveness, the polarizing of men against women as though men will "lose" something by speaking up and speaking out against sexual assaults and the oppression of oth-ers who are different?

Membership does have its privilege, but that does not justify the silence of some men. The white upper middle-class privilege we witnessed on stage during the Senate hearings was unsettling and disturbing because it does not reflect the expe-riences or attitudes of all men. Men have an opportunity to, particularly now, resist and be unlike the rest of the boys.

Men can be agents of and for change. The dominant narrative of being one of the boys is fractured and we can rewrite it but only if men and boys resist the simplification and dumbing down of what it means to be a man.

Maintaining membership by acting like the rest of the boys is a lesson of survival among men. President Donald Trump said "it's a scary time for men in America." His claim suggests that from Trump's perspective, there are no differences among men; they are all the same.

Times have been unsettling and indeed scary for many men for a long time, but not for the reasons Trump is suggesting. Trump failed to consider the true situation of men in a nuanced and complex way. He ignored the diversity of masculinities by race, class, sexual orientation, ethnic location and religion. In so doing, he collapsed all masculinities and took away the agency of men — their ability to act differently and to be unlike the rest of "the boys

This singular, unified version of masculinity is powerful. The suggestion that all boys and men share similar positions of power and privilege con-tributes to an "us/them," "men/women" divide. Trump effectively reaffirmed that the ability to speak and to be believed is what it always has been, a narrative of power and privilege.

Sexual assault, rape culture and the voices of

many women continue to struggle to be believed and to be heard.

Our food system is at risk of crossing 'environmental limits' - here's how to ease the pressure

The global food system has a lot to The global food system nas a 101 to answer for. It is a major driver of climate change, thanks to everything from deforestation to cows burping. Food production also transforms bio-diverse landscapes into fields inhabited by a single crop or animal. It depletes valuable freshwater resources, and even pollutes ecosystems when fertilisers and manure washed into

streams and rivers.

The planet can only take so much of this stress. Staying within its envi-ronmental limits will require a global shift towards healthy and more plantbased diets, halving food loss and waste, and improving farming prac-tices and technologies. That's what a team of international researchers and I found in a new study published in the journal Nature.

CROSSING ENVIRONMENTAL LIMITS

The global food system has fundamentally altered our planet and the resource base humanity depends on. Food production is responsible for about a quarter of all greenhouse gas emissions and therefore is a major driver of climate change. Agriculture occupies more than a third of the Earth's land surface and has led to reductions in forest cover and loss of biodiversity. Farming also uses more than two thirds of all freshwater resources, and the over-application of fertilisers in some regions has led to "dead zones" in oceans.

Without concerted action, we estimated that the environmental pressure of the food system could increase by 50-90% by 2050 as a result of population growth and the continued Westernisation of diets. At that point, those environmental pressures would exceed key planetary boundaries that define a safe operating space for humanity.

Crossing planetary boundaries would increase the risk of destabilis-ing essential ecosystems. Among others, it could lead to dangerous levels of climate change with higher occur-rences of extreme weather events; affect the regulatory function of forest

Climate change cannot be sufficiently mitigated without people eating a lot less meat. Adopting healthy and more plant-based diets globally could reduce the greenhouse gas emissions of the food system by more than half, and also reduce other environmental impacts, such as those from fertiliser application and the use of cropland and freshwater, by a



ecosystems and biodiversity; result in disruptions of water flows with impacts on the global hydrological cycle; and pollute water bodies such that it would lead to more oxygen-depleted dead zones in oceans.

PLANETARY OPTION SPACE

Fortunately, such a situation can be avoided. We combined detailed environmental accounts with a model of the global food system that tracks the production and consumption of food across the world. With this model, we analysed several options that could keep the food system within environmental limits. Here is what we found: tenth to a quarter.

In addition to dietary changes, proving management practices improving and technologies in agriculture is required to limit pressures on agri-cultural land, freshwater extraction, and fertiliser use. Increasing agricultural yields from existing cropland, balancing application and recycling of fertilisers, and improving water management, could, along with other measures, reduce those impacts by around half.

Finally, halving food loss and waste could, if achieved globally, reduce environmental impact of food production by up to a sixth

A CALL TO ACTION

Many of the solutions we analysed are already being implemented in some parts of the world, but it will need strong global coordination and rapid uptake to make their effects felt.

Take the necessary improvements to farming technologies and management practices, for instance. That would require a lot more investment in research and public infrastruc-ture, it would need the right incentive schemes for farmers to ensure they don't miss out financially, and things like fertiliser use and water quality ould need much stronger regulation.

Tackling food loss and waste will

require measures across the entire food chain, from storage and trans-port, through food packaging and labelling, to changes in legislation and business behaviour that promote zero-waste supply chains.

When it comes to diets, com-prehensive policy and business ap-proaches are essential to make serious changes possible and attractive for a large number of people. Important aspects include school and workplace programmes, economic incentives and labelling, and aligning national dietary guidelines with the current scientific evidence on healthy eating and the environmental impacts of our diet.

As an individual, you can help by adopting a healthier diet with less meat. You can call on business to reduce waste across their supply chain and offer more plant-based food options. And you can hold politicians to account by demanding strong regu-lation of environmental resource use and pollution.

India lost USD 79.5 billion from climate-related disasters in 20 years: UN

UNITED NATIONS, OCT 11 (PTI): India suffered a whopping USD 79.5 billion economic loss due to climate-related disasters in the last 20 years, according to a UN report which highlights the impact of extreme weather events on the global economy.

The report titled 'Economic Losses, Pov-

erty and Disasters 1998-2017' was compiled by the UN Office for Disaster Risk Reduction. It states that the years between 1998 to 2017 have seen a dramatic rise of 151 per cent in direct economic losses from climate-related disasters.

In terms of the im-

pact of disasters on the global economy between 1998 and 2017, affected countries reported direct losses of USD 2.908 trillion, more than twice of

what was lost in the previous two decades.

Illustrating the grow ing threat from climate change, extreme weath-er events now account for 77 per cent of total economic losses of USD 2.245 trillion, said the report released on Wednesday.
This represents a "dra-

matic rise" of 151 per cent compared with losses reported between 1978 and 1997, which amounted to USD 895 billion.
The greatest econom-

ic losses have been experienced by the US at USD 944.8 billion, followed by China at USD 492.2 billion, Japan at USD 376.3 billion, India at USD 79.5 billion and Puerto Rico at USD 71.7 billion.

Storms, floods and earthquakes place three European countries in the top ten nations for economic losses: France, USD 48.3 billion; Germany, USD 57.9 billion and Italy USD 56.6 billion. Thailand with USD 52.4 billion and Mexico at USD 46.5 billion complete the list.

In terms of occurrences, climate-related disasters also dominate the picture, accounting for 91 per cent of all 7,255 major recorded events between 1998 and 2017.

Floods (43.4 per cent) and storms (28.2 per cent) are the two most frequently occurring disasters.

During this period, 1.3 million people lost their lives and 4.4 billion people were injured, homeless, displaced or in need of emergency assistance.
563 earthquakes,
including related tsuna-

mis. accounted for 56 per cent of the total deaths or 747,234 lives lost, the report said.

The report was re-leased ahead of the International Day for Disaster Reduction on October 13.
In his message for the

day, UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres said in the wake of the devastating earthquake and tsunami in Indonesia, it was clear that disasters have a steep human cost as millions of people are displaced every year, losing their homes and jobs because of extreme weather events and earthquakes.

"A better understanding of the economic losses from extreme weather events can help to generate greater action on climate change and in-creased ambition on reducing greenhouse-gas

"Measuring economic losses can also motivate Governments to do more to achieve the targets of the Sendai Framework for Disaster Risk Reduction which seeks a substantial reduction in disaster loss-

es by 2030," he said.

Guterres said that reducing the econom-ic losses from disasters has the power to trans-form lives and contribute greatly to the eradication of poverty.

A key target of the

global plan to reduce disaster losses, the Sendai Framework for Disaster Risk Reduction, is to reduce economic losses from disasters and the report highlights the fact that 63 per cent of disaster reports contain no economic data.

Another key highlight is the disproportionate impact of disaster events on low and middle-income countries even if high-income countries bear the brunt of absolute economic losses. Only one high-income

territory ranked among the "top ten" in terms of annual average percentage losses relative to GDP
- Puerto Rico with 12.2 per cent.

UN Secretary-General's Special Representative for Disaster Reduction Mami Mizutori said much needed to be done to address the high number of deaths in seismic zones.

"The death and suffering caused by this month's earthquake and tsunami in Indonesia brings home the need to raise public awareness and to apply high stan-dards for construction in seismic zones.

"The report's analysis makes it clear that economic losses from extreme weather events are unsustainable and a major brake on eradicating poverty in hazard exposed parts of the world," Mizutori said.

Mizutori said there was a need to do a much better job of capturing economic loss data if nations are to have a fuller understanding of what works when it comes to reducing economic losses, saving lives and live-lihoods, and managing disaster risk.

While high-income countries recorded loss-

es for 53 per cent of reported disasters between 1998 and 2017, low-income countries only recorded them for 13 per cent of disasters.
The report concludes

that climate change is increasing the frequency and severity of extreme weather events.

Lanka rejects US claims, says no Chinese military base at port

Сосомво, Ост 11 (РТІ): Sri Lankan Prime Minister Ranil Wickremesinghe has rejected US' claim that China might set up a "forward military base at a strategic port it has leased to the communist nation, describing it as "imaginary".

Last year, Colombo had leased the Hambantota port to Beijing for 99 vears after it failed to repay a Chinese loan of USD 1.4 billion for the project.

China gaining the control of the port has raised concerns that the country could use the harbour for military purposes.

Addressing a mme at London's ford University on Monday. Wickremesinghe said some people are seeing "imaginary Chinese Naval bases in Sri Lanka. Whereas the Hambantota Port is a commercial joint venture between our Ports Authority and China Merchants - a company listed in the Hong Kong Stock Exchange."

"There are no foreign naval bases in Sri Lanka," he emphasised.

His comments came days after US Vice-President Mike Pence alleged China of using "debt diplomacy" to expand its global influence and said that Hambantota "may soon become a forward military base for China's

growing blue-water navy".

Several media reports suggested that the deepwater port, which is near a main shipping route be-tween Asia and Europe, is likely to play a major role in China's Belt and Road Initiative (BRI).
The BRI, also known

as the Silk Road Economic Belt, is a development strategy proposed by the Chinese government which focuses on connec tivity and cooperation be-tween Eurasian countries.

The Chinese government calls the initiative "a bid to enhance regional connectivity and embrace a brighter future". However, other nations, including In-dia, see it as a push by Beijing to take a larger role in global affairs with a China-centred

trading network.
India's has been vocal in expressing its opposition to the BRI, which includes the China-Pakistan Economic Corridor (CPEC) that traverses through Pakistan-occupied Kashmir.

"latest sneeze" from Wall Street "could morph into a global markets pandemic," he added.

Investors are wary of possible further U.S. interest rate hikes, which will raise the cost of corporate borrowing and weigh on economic growth.

On Wednesday, President Donald Trump said the Federal Reserve making a mistake" with its campaign of rate increases. "I think the Fed has gone crazy," he charged.

FAFT team not happy with Pakistan's efforts to combat terror financing: Report

ISLAMABAD, (PTI): Not Ост (PTI): Not impressed with Pakistan's efforts to combat terror financing, a delegation of the Financ Action Task Force (FATF) has asked it to do more to strengthen its legal frame work if it wants to avoid being blacklisted by the Paris-based anti-money laundering watchdog, according to a media report on Thursday.

Currently placed on the FATF'S 'grey list', Pakistan has been scrambling in recent months to avoid being added to a list of countries deemed non-compliant with anti-money laundering and terrorist financing regulations by the FATF, a measure that officials here fear could further hurt its economy.

A second team of ex-

perts from the FATF arrived over the weekend to review the progress made by Pakistan on an action plan agreed in June to address global concerns.

Dawn reported that delegation of the Asia Pacific Group (APG) of the FATF was not impressed with the prog-ress made by Pakistan so far as it found the legal framework insufficient and the institutional arrangements weak.

According to sources, the delegation feared that the setup installed for scrutinising the activities of non-profit organisations, brokerage houses, exchange companies and donations of corporate entities - registered under the companies act was not robust enough.

The sources said that

the APG believed that even in areas where the legal framework appeared vigorous, the implementation mechanism was not geared to track down financial flows of the entities in question, because the agencies involved were not well-connected,

according to the report.
This weakness was prominent in real estate brokerages where large business transactions remained outside the am-

bit of legal records.

A team of the Securities & Exchange Commission of Pakistan (SECP) reported to the APG that brokerage houses were largely documented though real estate dealers and their operations were generally outside its area of regulation. The APG also no-

ticed shortcomings in commodity trading - and the effectiveness of laws against money laundering through cross-verification of service providers.

The sources said the delegation asked the relevant authorities to issue deadlines for resolving the flagged weakness-es so that the problems could be remedied and future performance evaluations be made on the proposed matrix.

The authorities would also have to properly record the number of donation boxes placed by reli-gious and other organisations at restaurants and business centres among other places. Besides, all currency and real estate dealers would have to would have to record every transaction both small and large.

The purpose of the mutual evaluation visit is to assess the effec-tiveness of Pakistan's Anti-Money Laundering and Counter Financing of Terrorism (AML/ CFT) regime under FATF methodology.

The visiting team included Ian Collins of the United Kingdom's Scotland Yard, James Prussing of the United States De-partment of the Treasury, Ashraf Abdullah of the Financial Intelligence Unit of the Maldives, Bobby Wahyu Hernawan of the Indonesian Ministry of Finance, Gong Jingyan of the Peoples Bank of China and Mustafa Necmeddin Oztop of the Turkish Min-

istry of Justice. In June 2018, Pakistan made a high-level political commitment to

work with the FATF and the APG to strengthen its AML/CFT regime and to address its strategic counter-terrorism nancing-related deficiencies by implementing a 10-point action plan.

The successful implementation of the plan and its verification by the APG is a prerequisite for the FATF to remove Pakistan from its grey list. Earlier in August, the

APG - as part of the mutual evaluation -identi-fied a series of deficiencies in Pakistan's AML/ CFT mechanisms. By the end of September next year, Pakistan must comply with the 10-point action plan it committed to with the FATF or else it will fall into the black list.

The authorities are required to upgrade agencies and their human resource assets to be able to handle foreign requests to block terror financing and freeze illegal assets. The authorities are working on strengthening laws for extradition of those involved in terror financ ing and money laundering on requests from FATF-member countries.

By January next year. Pakistan will identify and assess domestic and international terror financing risks to and from its system to strengthen investigations and improve inter-agency coopera-tion, the Federal Investigation Agency, the State Bank of Pakistan, the SECP, banks, the interior department as well as all other associated federal and provincial agencies, the report said.

Sierra Leone scraps project for Chinese-built airport

FREETOWN RA LEONE), OCT 11 (AFP): Sierra Leone has scrapped a USD 400-mil-(347-million-euro) scheme for a Chinese-built airport, saying the project was too costly, but Beijing sought to dismiss the concerns on Thursday.

In a statement, the ministry of transport and aviation said that "after serious consideration and due diligence," the government had determined the Mamamah International Airport initia-

tive was "uneconomical". All contracts under the project are being terminated, it said on Wednesday.

China's foreign ministry said Thursday the assertions that projects 'do not contribute to local livelihoods do not correspond with the facts."

"When cooperating with Sierra Leone, China always follows the princi-ple of equal consultation," spokesman Lu Kang told reporters during a regular press briefing.
Critics say China's ap-

proach to development abroad is exacerbating debt problems in poorer countries, but Chinese and African leaders rejected such concerns at a summit in Beijing last month, with President Xi Jinping pledging another

USD 60 billion for the con-

ous president, Ernest Bai Koroma, signed a loan agreement with China for the airport shortly before elections in March that his party lost.

His successor, Julius Maada Bio, vowed to stop the scheme. He also lashed Chinese

infrastructure projects generally as "a sham" that brought the impoverished West African state scant economic benefit.

The scheme entailed building a new airport around 50 kilometres (30 miles) outside the capital Freetown.

It would be completed in 2022 and managed and maintained by the Chinese. But critics questioned

the need for a new airport given that Freetown's existing airport, Lungi, is operating below capacity.

The government on Wednesday said it was looking into the possibility of building a bridge be-tween Freetown and Lun-gi airport -- a scheme that has been priced at more than USD 1 billion.

The airport and another major Chinese project, a toll road, shoul-dered their way into Si-erra Leone's presidential election in March.

Several candidates declared the schemes were unaffordable and should be scrapped or reviewed. Bio went furthest, go-

ing on record as saying "most of the Chinese infrastructural projects in Sierra Leone are a sham with no economic and development benefits to the

China has provided infrastructure and devel-opment aid to Africa since the Cold War.

But its interest and presence in the continent have grown exponentially in the past two decades, in parallel with its emergence as a global econom-Hopkins Un Washington. ic giant.

here were always whispers There were arrays allegations of sexual harassagainst Vikas Bahl, says Arjun Kapoor, who is shocked that it happened at Phantom Films, a production banner which was viewed as a torchbearer of change in cinema.

Bahl is accused of sexual harassment by a former employee of Phantom Films, formed by four partners -Bahl, Anurag Kashyap, Vikra-maditya Motwane and Madhu Mantena. The company was dissolved last week amid allegations that Kashyap and Motwane did not address the issue, a claim both deny.

Ariun, 33, said he had interacted with the four film-makers and it was saddening to read the details.

"There was speculation in the industry.There were certain peo-



ple who knew the reality within the office (Phantom Films). The hearsay doesn't allow us the to do something when people within the office are not doing something. It is like when there is a robbery happening in your house, the neighbour can't file the complaint.

"Not having an HR in of-fice is bizarre, I am not able to wrap my head around this... It is basic for any company, you could have saved the girl from further damage if you had a

safe environment in your office, it is sad and bizarre," Arjun told PTI.

Arjun said there is not point giving individuals importance by discussing them as everyone is still coming to terms with it.

"We had only heard, we

had no understanding. It is unfortunate as they were in-telligent, sorted and successful people who were going to he the torchbearers of change

"It is a sad time for people as we are still processing what happened. There is no reason talking about individuals, giving them more importance than they deserve. They will be outcast anyway."

The #MeToo movement of India has brought out several skeletons out of the clos-et. Personalities like Nana Patekar, Alok Nath, Rajat Kapoor, Vikas Bahl and Kailash Kher have been accused of sexual harassment.

Asked whether he will ever collaborate with people who have been named, Arjun said, "These are not important things. You think society will allow them to exist? Work is a far-fetched thing. People who are going to be named are not going to be able to roam around easily. It is going to be a different environment.

Women have come out and spoken and one needs to hear them, respect and understand what they have been through,

"Whether one takes ten years or 20 years, it is not important. They can take 30 years or three minutes. The fact that they had the courage to come out and take names is commendable. They are in a vulner able position and we need to let them put everything out."

... I would like to say when a woman is going through something like this, they don't look for evidence. You have to support them. 99.9 per cent of the women will be speaking the truth. It doesn't suit them to malign their own life and somebody else's."

Arjun said it is unfortunate that the film industry is the starting point of #MeToo but he is happy that it will bring about a change.

"If the film industry has

to be a villain for there to be a cleanse in society, for people to have fear to ever do these things again, if we can cause that fear in any man across the country and stop him subconsciously from doing something like this, I will take that.'

Arjun said the stories are like the opening of the Pando

'The mud-slinging that has happened, somewhere the industry is to be blamed because we have ignored the speculation and nobody bothered to get to the bottom of things. And we all behave like it doesn't happen in the film industry. The reality is coming out and it is a Pandora's box.
"We all need to shut up

and listen. To look for excuses is stupid, we have to intro-spect as an industry and as a profession. We have to try and find a solution to make it a

safe environment for women."

The actor said the industry will have a unified reaction against the culprits and in creating a safe and secure envi-

"There will be a harsh treatment that will follow from the law as well as from the profession, but we need to take time to take stock. We action. This is something that will go on for a while and certain facets will emerge. Then, we will all be in a position to have a solution."

Ariun said the issue of women safety is not just limited to films. It is a deep-rooted mindset in the country.

"There is a big difference between social decorum and being friends or wanting to be physically intimate with a man and that blur of lines only Indian men seem to have. It is a big problem that we don't seem to comprehend when a woman is being nice to you.

That blur has caused a lot of damage. The demarcation is now needed, when a woman says, No, it is a No."

away. The old days, it was a little different than Penn-sylvania to it," he said as he spoke about winning the state in the 2016 presidential

Pointing to the media, Trump said he would use the original phrase, except for the media. "I would do it except for these people up there.



They would say, did you hear what President Trump said? Did you hear what he said?'

he said imitating reporters.

"So, there is an expres sion, but we'll change the expression. Pennsylvania was always the person that got away. That's pretty good," he said amidst applause from the audience.

The revelation of the al-

legations against Weinstein inspired many women to reveal their own stories of sexual assault, but Trump has recently taken shots at the #MeToo movement by expressing concern for me who are accused of sexual assault or harassment.

Supreme Court Justice ett Kavanaugh's recent confirmation hearings renewed attention to the topic as the Senate considered Christine Blasey Ford's accusation that Kavanaugh sexually assaulted her. The president told reporters the no-tion that Kavanaugh sexually assaulted someone and that the allegations from Ford and other women could be taken as fact made this a very scary time for young men in Amer-

Trump had earlier mocked the #MeToo move ment at a rally in July. He did so while simultaneously mocking Senator Elizabeth Warren of Massachusetts and saying that should she win the Democratic nomination in 2020 and they were to debate, he would toss an ancestry test to her and dare her to take it.
