Army rescues snowbound tourists from North Sikkim

GANGTOK, 10 JAN:

In yet another humanitarian tion, Army rescued over 150 tourists stranded by heavy snowfall in North Sikkim, saving precious lives in sub zero tempera-tures on 09 Jan 2019.

Unprecedented snowfall within a span of two hours cut off Lachung rendering the tourists helpless, a press re-lease informs.

The troops of Trish-akti Corps immediately launched Quick Reaction Teams including medical staff to locate the tourists in stranded vehicles, provide medical care and bring them to the nearest

army camps.
Within four hours, the soldiers, risking their lives, reached out to all stranded persons. One lady with fractured hand was given im-mediate medical care amongst many others who complained of diz-ziness, breathlessness



and other high altitude related symptoms.

All rescued tourists are being provided food, shelter and medical care at the army camps keeping in view the unabated snowfall and temperatures dipping down to

minus 10 degrees.
Choked with emotions, the tourists fell short of words to thank

the soldiers, but the smile on their faces said it all.

As per army sources, the rescue operations will continue through the night to locate any other tourists still stranded in the area.

It may be recalled that earlier on 28 Dec 2018, Indian Army had evacuated over 3,000 strand-

ed tourists from Nathula area in the biggest ever rescue operation carried out in Sikkim.

In fact the social me-dia is still flooded with messages of the rescued tourists, expressing their gratitude to the Indian Army soldiers who va-cated their barracks and provided them with food, shelter and medical care.

in Gangtok today. Chief Engineer (Buildings & Housing), Kuldeep Chettri provided a de-tailed technical report of the structure. He informed that the Educat-ed Unemployed Youth

Co-operative Society Ltd. Development Area, Gangtok, was given the contract

for construction. The four-storeved structure has two base-ments with dormitories and attached washroom and the two floors have multipurpose hall with pantry as well as visitor's lounge, storerooms, office rooms, armory room etc. The roofing is on GCI sheets over tubular truss with PVC ceiling. The cost of the structure, which is spread over 15688 sft, is Rs. 330.45 lakh.

In his address, the Chief Minister said that this building will directly benefit the police frater-

nity.

"Our Police are the most secured lot, free from any kind of fear psychosis. Unlike their counterparts in other states, they do not face

any kind of political terrorism, extortion or any kind of interference from the Government while discharging their duties," the Chief Minister said.

Alok Verma shunted out as CBI chief fore the Committee also

NEW DELHI, JAN 10 (PTI): Alok Verma was shunted out as the CBI chief after a marathon meeting of the high-powered selec-tion committee led by Prime Minister Naren-dra Modi Thursday, officials said.

Verma, a 1979-batch AGMUT-cadre IPS officer, has been removed from the high-profile post on the charges of corruption and dereliction of duty, making him the first chief in the history of the agen-cy to face such action, they said.

His future assign ment is yet to be decided, they said.

There were eight counts of charges against him in the CVC report presented becomprising Leader of Congress in Lok Sabha Mallikarjun Kharge and Iustice A K Sikri, appointed by Chief Justice of India Ranjan Gogoi as his nominee.

The decision was

taken by a majority with Kharge opposing the move, they said. Verma was sent on

forced leave by the gov-ernment in a late-night controversial order on October 23, 2018 in the wake of a feud between him and his deputy Spe-cial Director Rakesh Asthana. He had challenged

the order in the Su-preme Court which had quashed the govern-ment order Tuesday.

The apex court had set aside Verma's forced

leave but restrained him from taking any major policy decision till the CVC probe into corruption charges against him The apex court had

said any further de-cision against Verma who was scheduled to retire on January 31, would be taken by the high-powered committee which se-lects and appoints the CBI director.

The Supreme Court in the Vineet Narayan judgment had fixed a minimum tenure of two years for the CBI director to give him immunity from any political interfer-ence. Later, through the Lokpal Act, the process of selecting the CBI director was handed over to a selection committee.

He further proposed prevention programs that are properly implemented by schools and communities where teachers, parents, family and the society come together to eradicate and uproot the drug hazard from its source.

The DC-South in turn emphasised the responsibility of stakeholders in curbing TB as well as drug abuse.

He appealed to the Panchayats to work in coordination with the Health Department to identify, monitor and refer people who have fallen prey to substance abuse or patients who have been diagnosed with TB to rehabilitating centres and hospitals.

Likewise, he urged the civil society, religious

organizations, students, teachers, educators and youth and media to shoulder collective responsibility to make Sikkim a drug-free state and asked each of them to shoulder the respon-sibility to motivate drug users towards leading a healthy life.

Resource person for the technical session, Consultant Psychiatrist Dr Bibhusan Dahal gave a comprehensive pow-er-point presentation on Substance Use Disorder.

State Programme Of-ficer (SADA) Dr Tekendra Rai explained how SADA works in controlling, reg-ulating and preventing abuse of prescription drugs and controlled substances. He explained how the Act understands the societal challenges posed by addiction.

Similarly, SI Prashant Rai spoke about the role and responsibilities of police in addressing drug abuse, drug peddling and drug smuggling.

He detailed on the

search and seizure pro-cedure adopted by the police during various drug busting operations and also addressed the misconception held by society at large against

Triple talaq ordinance to lapse this month; may get repromulgated

NEW DELHI, JAN 10 (PTI): The triple talaq ordinance, which seeks to make the practice of instant divorce a penal offence, will lapse later this month as a bill to convert it into a law is stuck in the Rajya Sabha.

Sources in the govern-ment said the ordinance is set to be reissued, but its timing is yet to be decided.

An ordinance has a life

of six months. But from the day a session begins, it has to be replaced by a bill which should be passed by Parliament within 42 days (six weeks), else it lapses.

The government is at liberty to repromulgate the ordinance if the bill fails to

get through Parliament.

The ordinance will lapse on January 22, the 42nd day after the Winter

"The ordinance laps-just a week before the Budget Session commences on January 31... government will push for the bill in the session. But whether the ordinance be repromulgated soon after it expires is vet to be decided. Another option would be to wait till the end of the Budget Session in mid February. If the bill is not passed, the ordinance could be reissued then," a senior func-

tionary explained.

A fresh bill to make the practice of triple talaq among Muslims a penal offence was introduced in the Lok Sabha on December 17 last year to replace an ordinance issued in September.

GUWAHATI, JAN 10 (PTI): Bollywood playback singer Angarag Mahanta (Papon) Thursday opposed the Citizenship (Amend-ment) Bill as it hurts the Assamese sentiments. He also supported popular Assamese singer Zubeen Garg, who has written to Chief Minister Sarbananda Sonowal to withdraw the Soliowal to withthaw the Bill and respect the sentiments of the Assamese. "We promote Assamese culture across the globe and if we cannot present it in our own state, it will be lost and we cannot allow it to happen", the singer, who hails from Assam, told reporters.

"There can be no two opinions that the As-samese sentiment has been hurt and I extend my full support to Zubeen da on the stand he has taken on the Bill", he added.

Zubeen had two days back threatened to launch an agitation on his own, if Assam chief minister Sar-bananda Sonowal fails to take measures to scrap the controversial Citizenship (Amendment) Bill.

Let's Give the Young a Library

Private collaborations to help children access the world of books

The weather is chilly and the winter is still holding strong. What the peak of The weather is chilly and the winter break winter should also be alleviating is the guilt the Sikkimese must collectively feel for not having factored in anything for the young when crores were being apportioned for infrastructure development. Children in Sikkim do not have much to choose from by way of safe and healthy outdoor spaces. And now that the children are forced indoors, another denial that the younger generation is suffering comes into focus - it is bad enough that Sikkim denies its young with convenient outdoor spaces, but the situation only worsens in the face of the fact that they are even denied literary escapes.

Not only is there no presence of children's literature either in the local publishing scene or substantially enough in the book-stands (we speak of 'local' reading material here), even access to a decent public library remains largely non-existent. The largest library in the State, the one housed in the erstwhile Gangtok community hall continues to pushed into a corner of an establishment appropriated by the VIPs. Hopefully, the secretariat will move out, eventually, and allow the multipurpose Manan Bhawan to serve more purposes for the young than its current single-purpose to house drab government offices. Till that happens, one continues to miss reading rooms and libraries in Sikkim.

This is not a new theme for this section and has been visited often and will definitely keep resurfacing until things improve. The absence of libraries is unfortunate because libraries even though they are going under the world over, remain the only window available to most children to access the world of words and inspire creative thinking. And no, Facebook and Wikipedia cannot make up for that loss. The failure, like with most things in the State, is not so much of the government as it is of the society at large. Libraries and reading rooms or even child-specific activities need not necessarily come from the State exchequer. In fact the more successful endeavours have come from private initiative.

It is apt here to cite the example of the Bakul Children's Library in Odisha. This library in the Satya Nagar residential area of Bhubaneshwar houses some 20,000 books, includes a multimedia section, has internet access and stocks substantial educational material. All of these have come from community partnership. Everything is donated, children are charged no membership fees and access is free for every child. When it started about a decade ago, it was single-unit operation. Within a few years it had 8,000 books. Now, as mentioned, it has 20K titles and has opened its doors to general readers, yes, even grown-ups. It is managed by volunteers and children throng to it, as much to browse and borrow as to attend story-reading sessions, creative thinking workshops, staging of plays by other kids and everything else that children do. The library was born from a campaign in the year 2006 to collect books for free sharing with children. In its first attempt itself, the volunteers received pledges for book donations from 1,000 people! Not just books, people also pledged time and professional skills to set up the library and sustain it. Its operations now include a mobile library which routinely services 24 villages in Odisha. The model works because the society got involved. They operate on the motto: "If not us, who? If not now, when?"

The feeling to do something for the young surely exists in Sikkim as well, but like in Bhubaneshwar, it requires a core group to take the initiative and harness the desire. Surely, there are enough 'donors' around to stock a decent library to begin with. What will a library achieve? It will open a window for the young in what is becoming an increasingly claustrophobic and consumerist environment. A children's library is not only about books, it is about sharing, learning and even $% \left\{ 1,2,\ldots ,n\right\}$ escaping; experiences and options that every child should have access to.

How Jair Bolsonaro used 'fake news' to win power

air Bolsonaro's election in October 2018 as president of Brazil marked a major shift in Latin American politics, ending nearly two decades of left-wing governments. On January 1, the far-right populist officially took power and is set to introduce new policies on virtually all fronts.

Many of these policies – his plan for the envi-ronment, for example – are problematic, especially given Brazil's status as the world's eighth largest economy and one of the five most populous na-tions in the globe. But the deeper and most press-

ing concerns - both at national and global levels – are arguably the negative aspects of his discourse of discrimination, intoler-

ance and misinformation.

During the 2018 presidential campaign Bolsonaro's speeches were notable for offensive and discriminatory remarks about women, native Brazilians, Afro-Brazilians, the LGBT community and progressive intellectuals. Some of these comments were so offensive that Brazil's attorney general charged Bolsonaro with inciting hate and target-ing specific minority groups.

Now, as president of one of the world's largest economies, Bolsonaro is a ruling figure whose words and actions will

have global repercussions. This can only be viewed as a threat to diversity, inclusiveness, tolerance and democracy – even more so when one considers the manner in which he and his team used misinformation or "fake news" in a systematic manner as a central part of his strategy in achieving power. This has been denounced in Brazil's mainstream media, but it's unlikely that will represent a setback for Bolsonaro now. He has the backing of a majority of Brazilians, and most media outlets – fearing backlash from the new president – are curb-

ing critical opinions and news pieces.

Like many of his fellow populist leaders –
Donald Trump in the US and Nicolás Maduro in Venezuela spring to mind - Bolsonaro relied heavily on social media, and his most potent

weapon was his WhatsApp account. Brazil has around 120m WhatsApp users – 44% of the electorate is said to have used it during the elections

for political purposes.

Bolsonaro's followers created hundreds of WhatsApp groups to share text messages, images, videos and memes – most of which echoed and disseminated Bolsonaro's misinforming and misleading content against his political rivals and the minority groups he attacked.

LIES, DAMNED LIES

One clear example of the way Bolsonaro used "fake news" to spread his message of, discrimina-tion, and homophobia, was a story mainly dissem-



inated via WhatsApp concerning his main political rival, Fernando Haddad – who stood for the Workers' Party after the original candidate, the former president Luiz Inácio Lula da Silva, was banned because of a conviction for corruption and money

The story that was spread via Bolsonaro's social media channels was that Haddad had created a "gay kit" which he planned to introduce in pri-mary schools so that children from the age of six "would be encouraged to become gay". In fact, Haddad, as Brazil's former minister for educa-tion – and alongside other politicians – had promoted an educational programme for primary school students to understand sexual diversity

On another occasion during the campaign, an image was circulated of actress Beatriz Segall with a black eye The WhatsApp post falsely claimed that Segall had been beaten up by rival Workers' Party supporters while she was rallying in favour of Bolsonaro - in fact she sustained the injury in a

One month before the election, in September 2018, Bolsonaro was stabbed during a campaign rally by a man called Adélio Bispo de Oliveira, who said God had sent him. The Bolsonaro campaign circulated an image of Oliviera alongside Workers' Party leader Lula da Silva, at a street demonstra-

tion with the caption: "How can anyone doubt that the aggressor was not given orders by the Workers' Party?". The "aggressor" had a history of mental illness, but no evidence was offered to show any formal links to the Workers' Party.

CONTINUING STORY

Bolsonaro's litany of racist, homophobic sexist and xenophobic comments is long and well documented – and sadly, the president's discourse of falsehood and his distribution of misinforming contents via social media has

not stopped with his election. Ironically, having promised during his inaugural speech to steer the country "without discrimination and division", Bolsonaro followed this with a threat to cut government advertising funds to any outlet that he judged to have spread fake

news about himself or his policies.

In his inaugural speech, Bolsonaro promised to build a "society without discrimination or division". But, after just a week – and the first few policy initiatives including handing management of the Amazon to the agriculture ministry - this would appear to be yet another misleading statement from the controversial new president.

The more women in government, the healthier a population

n November 2015. Prime Minister In November 2015, Frince Minister, Justin Trudeau formed the first gender-balanced cabinet in Canadian history. In announcing his cabination of the first leaf to the first le net, he ensured that half of his closest advisers (15 out of a total of 30)

Canada's gender-equal cabinet vaulted the country from 20th to fifth place in the world in terms of percentage of women in ministerial positions.

When reporters asked Trudeau about why gender parity was important to him, he retorted: "Because it's 2015." His simple yet momentous response res-onated with those committed to equity, diversity and inclusion.

As public health

searchers, this got us thinking — if increasing the number of women in positions of power promotes gender equity, could it also promote population health and well-being? Our findings, published

recently in the journal SSM - Population Health, support the argument that yes, wom en in government do in fact advance population health.

MORE WOMEN IN POWER,

FEWER DEATHS

We first dug into the re-search literature to see how male and female politicians might differ from each other. Compared to their male counterparts, female politicians are more likely to hold left-wing attitudes (with regard to issues such as civil rights, social equality and egalitarianism) and substantively advance women's rights in areas such as pay equity, violence against wom-

en, health care and family policy.
Also, research has shown that women in government tend to work in more collaborative and bipartisan ways and employ a more democratic leadership style compared to men's

also more effective at building coali-tions and reaching consensus.

Next, we examined whether there's a historical association between women in government and population health among Canada's 10 provinces. Between 1976 and 2009, the percentage of women in provincial government increased six-fold from 4.2 per cent to 25.9 per

tality rates on women in government while controlling for several poten-tial confounders. Our findings support the hypothesis that women in government do in fact advance population health.

Interestingly, women in government in Canada have had a bigger ef-fect on male mortality rates than on female rates (1.00 vs 0.44 deaths per 1,000 people).

WOMEN WORK IN MORE COLLAB-ORATIVE WAYS

We also found that there was no

relationship between the political leanings of women in government — whether they belonged to left-wing, centrist or right-wing parties - and mortality rates.

Ideological differences among so-

cial democratic (e.g., NDP), centrist (e.g., Liberal), and fiscal conservative (e.g., Conservative)

political parties seem to be less important to mor-tality rates than increasing the actual number of women elected to government.

This finding supports the idea that women in government tend to work more collaborative and bipartisan ways than their male counterparts.

It's now 2019 and leading public health scholars still tend to downplay the poten-tial effects of political determinants such as gender politics on population health. Instead, they opt to focus almost exclusively on individual and social determinants of health.

We believe gender politics matters in public health because it helps to determine "who gets what, when and how.

We believe that elect-

ing more women in government not only promotes gender equality and strengthens democratic institutions but also makes real and substantive contributions to government spending and population health.

Given that women in government can bring about desirable changes in population health, let's figure out how we can genuinely level the polit-ical playing field for women.

Over 10 lakh children in Meghalaya given MR vaccine

SHILLONG, JAN 10 (PTI): Over 10 lakh children were given Measles-Rubella vaccines in Meghalaya taking the vaccina-tion coverage in the state to over 92 per cent, a senior Health department official said on Thursday.

"Out of 11.56 lakh children, 10.67 lakh were vaccinated during MRVC with the coverage of the vaccination to over 92 per cent," Health secretary Pravin Bakshi said

He was addressing at the state level workshop on the MR vaccination and In-tensified Pulse Polio Immunisation programme here.

"Though the state has achieved 92 per cent, the target is to achieve 95 per cent by intensifying in the days ahead," Bakshi said. The health secretary has also stressed on the need to give special focus in areas where vaccination was refused and also the check the size of the population of

In districts where coverage percentage is low, Bakshi said dedicated cells would be created to make calls to private hospitals, schools and community about the importance of the vaccination.

In the last couple of years, about five out-breaks have been investigated in the state in which three cases were confirmed positive for Rubella while the other two cases were confirmed positive for Measles, according to Health department statistics.

Citizenship Bill: Sedition charges against Sahitya Akademi awardee, RTI activist, scribe

GUWAHATI, JAN 10 (PTI): Sedition cases were registered Thursday against Sahitya Aka-demi awardee Assamese litterateur Hiren Gohain. RTI activist Akhil Gogoi and a senior journalist for their comments on the citizenship bill, a police official said.

They were booked by the Assam Police for their remarks against the Citizenship (Amendment) Bill at an event three days ago, even as the state witnesses protest against the legislation.The adminis-tration has also imposed prohibitory orders in parts of the city.

Police suo motu registered a case against them at the Latasil police station here under relevant sections of the Indi-an Penal Code (IPC) -- including 124(A) that deals with charges of sedition and 120 (B) dealing with criminal conspiracy, Guwahati Police Commis-sioner Deepak Kumar told reporters.

Gohain, Gogoi and journalist Manjit Mahanta have also been booked under IPC sections 121 and 123 -- relating to waging or trying to wage war against the government, he said.

Kumar said the case was registered against the trio for the comments they made against the bill during a meeting. The matter is under in-

vestigation, he said.
"A case has been registered against them. I investigating what spoke during a Nagarik Samaj meeting here on January 7. As of now, this is all that I can tell you," Kumar said.

The trio are part of a civil society group --'Nagarik Samaj' -- which protesting against the bill. Gohain, an eminent litterateur and retired Gauhati University professor, said he has come to know that a sedition case has been filed against him, but was not aware on what basis it was registered.

"I don't know the details or on what basis, the case was filed but have heard that allegations have been made against me that I had 'Independent Assam' in my speech at the protest meeting on January 7 by the Forum Against Citizenship Act Amendment Bill (FACAAB)," he said.

Gogoi is a prominent RTI activist and head of the Krishak Mukti San-Samiti (KMSS). while Mahanta is a for-mer executive editor of a prominent Assamese daily and a columnist. The KMSS along with its 70 partner organisations is on the forefront of protests against the bill in Assam. "I had spoken thrice at the meeting and

on all occasions, I had

highlighted that citizenship should be on the basis of secular principles and the rightly demand of the Assamese on the Citizenship (Amendment) Bill must be achieved by democratic means," Gohain said.

'The gist of my speech was that if all democratic struggle by different par-ties and organisations in the country fail to protect the interest and identity of the Assamese within the framework of the Indian Constitution then the people will have no choice but to demand an Independent Assam", the octogenarian left-leaning intellectual said.

Gohain asserted that the people of Assam are fighting for their "rightful honour" (uchit maryada) and "we are also fighting to safeguard the constitutional framework of our secular country". Advocate Aroop Bor-

bora, who rushed to Gohain's residence after the case was registered. alleged that "police has done this suo moto under the provocation of the government and this is an absolutely fabricated case to douse the fire currently engulfing the entire state following the passage of the Citizenship (Amendment) Bill in Lok Sabha".

"I was also present in the January 7 meeting that police has cited in the FIR. There was nothing

seditious in their speechof the FIR, which I expect to receive by this evening and proceed accordingly after going through it," Borbora, who is the lawyer for Go-hain, Mahanta and Gogoi,

told reporters.

If these three persons are "touched, then the current raging fire will be inflamed further," he feared. All Assam Students' Union chief advisor Samujjal Bhattacharya accused the BIP government in the state and Centre of "indulging in anti-national activities by going against the in-terest of the indigenous people and giving protec-

tion to Bangladeshis".

"We condemn the sedition case filed against a learned intellectual like Dr Gohain whom we hold in high esteem and respect", he said.

Describing Gohain as "Assam's great thinker", Nagen Saikia, also a Sa-hitya Akademi awardee, said, "I may not agree with him on various is-sues but what he thinks is right and he says it with courage".

"Ignoring the peo-

ple of Assam against the bill, the central government is trying to stoke thoughts of cessation in the minds of people", the former president of the Asom Sahitya Sabha, the apex literary body in the state, said.

IIT KGP to launch 6-month Artificial Intelligence course

KOLKATA, JAN 10 (PTI): The Indian Institute of Technology, Kharagpur will launch a six-month Artificial Intelligence (AI) course at three centres in the country, a top official of the institute said Thursday.

IIT-KGP. Director. Partha Pratim Chakrabarti told a press meet here that the certified pro-gramme is aimed at strengthening India's India's talent pool in Machine Learning and AI.

Chakrabarti said the courses, which will begin from March this year will be offered at IIT KGP's Kolkata facility, at IIT KGP's Kharagpur campus and at a rented premise

at Bengaluru.

He said thousands
of new jobs were being created in AI sector every year with AI growing at 10-15 per cent on annual rate and there was need to have more skilled people in the AI sector.

"AI is the future which will more invade our

lives in the coming days," Chakrabarti said.

Head, Centre for Artificial Intelligence, IIT KGP, Prof Sudeshna Sarkar said, the course with 300 students will consist of 16 modules - each having 12-hour duration.

Around 2 lakh jobs in AI are expected to be created by 2020 in India, Sarkar said.

She said the classes will be taken by IIT KGP faculty, reputed academic institutions and industry experts. There will be 60 per cent from the IIT KGP 40 per cent from industry who will be teaching the students in the 16 modules, Sarkar explained. She said the demand is getting nigher in AI in the country than the total number of AI-skilled professionals and there was need to bridge that gap.

The course modules have been carefully designed to cover mathematical and algorithmic foundations, AI fundamentals and statistical and machine learning methods. "The courses will have a blend on fundamental theoreti-cal principles as well as hands-on component and industry use cases and students will have the opportunity to work

"Every course module will be based on assignments and exams and a certificate will be awarded based on successful com-pletion of the modules. It will be rigorous," she said.

The students will be selected competitively from working professionals and senior students. Tools and platforms will be introduced to make the students, from working professionals senior students, technologically competent and ready for jobs.

The AI course, application for which commenced on January 2 for screening and shortlisting, will start from March 10, this year.

Serena handed tough draw in quest for record 24th Slam

MELBOURNE, JAN 10 (AFP): Serena Williams has been handed a challenging draw in her quest for a record-equalling 24th Grand Slam title at the Australian Open, starting with Germany's Tatjana Maria in the first round. The American, seeded 16, is gunning to match Margaret Court's record of singles majors and claim an eighth Australian Open crown.

But Williams is in a tough half of the draw and could meet world number one Simona Halep in round four, and if she gets through that Karolina Pliskova in the last eight.

Before those poten-

tial ties, either Chinese wildcard Peng Shui or Canadian Eugenie Bouchard would await Williams in the second round. Halep, who enters the tournament having played just one game in four months after a back injury, was handed a chance to avenge Estonia's Kaia Kanepi, who beat her in the first round of the US Open in August.

Dhoni is our guiding light, will play crucial role in World Cup: Rohit

SYDNEY, JAN 10 (PTI): Veteran wicketkeep-er-batsman Mahendra Singh Dhoni's indifferent form has come under the scanner in recent times but India vice-captain Rohit Sharma Thursday backed him to the hilt, saying he will play a piv-otal role in the World Cup

later this year. Rohit said besides his finishing abilities, Dhoni's mere presence lends calmness to the team, especially youngsters, and that would be crucial in a big tournament like the World Cup, which starts

May 30 in England.
"Over the years we have seen what sort of presence he (Dhoni) has in the dressing room and on the field. With him being around, there is a sense of calmness in the group, which is very important, and also a bit of help to the captain because he stands behind the stumps," Rohit said ahead of the first ODI against Australia on Saturday. "He has captained India for so many years



and been successful. So him being around with the team always is helpful. He is like a guiding light around the group," he said.

Dhoni's much-vaunted finishing skills are under scrutiny but Rohit said the former captain has it in him to continue being useful with the bat.

"...batting down the order, getting us through the line, his finishing

touch is very important and he has finished so many games for us. His calmness and advice, what he thinks about the game and what we should do right now is

"His presence around the group is a massive factor for us," said the 31-year-old right hand-ed batsman. Rohit said young bowlers like

very important.

Yuzvendra Chahal and Kuldeep Yadav can benefit from Dhoni's presence behind the stumps

"Chahal and Kuldeep are both doing really well so somebody like Dhoni standing behind the stumps and helping those guys about what the batsman is trying to do, it makes a huge dif-ference I think.

"These guys started

playing for India in 2017 and since then they have done really well in and outside India. And one of the reasons for that is MS and how he has guided these two guys in the middle about how to keep things tight and field placements.

"He has played a massive role ever since the time he has left captaincy," he added.

Rai recommends 2-ODI ban for Pandya, Rahul; Edulji seeks legal view

NEW DELHI, JAN 10 (PTI): The Committee of Administrators chief Vinod Rai Thursday recommended a two-ODI ban on India players Hardik Pandya and KL Rahul for their controversial comments on women in a TV show but fellow COA member Diana Edulji referred the matter to the

If the ban is imposed, the duo could miss the first two matches of a three-ODI series against Australia starting Saturday in Sydney. "I am not convinced with Hardik's explana-

tion and I have recommended a two-match ban for both players. However the final decision will be taken once Diana gives her go ahead," Rai told PTI. Pandya's comments on 'Koffee with Karan' were slammed as misogynistic and sexist, prompting the CoA to issue a show cause notice on Wednesday. The all-rounder, in response, said he was sincerely regretful and would not repeat the behaviour.

On the show, he had boasted about hooking up with multiple women and also how open he has been about it with his parents.

Rahul, the more restrained of the two during the interview by film-maker Karan Johar, has not vet reacted to the social media storm. The two players were given 24 hours to explain themselves by the BCCI.

"Diana has sought legal opinion whether the duo can be banned. So, obviously a decision will be taken once she gives her nod. As far as I am concerned, the comments were crass, in bad taste and unacceptable," Rai said.

Edulji also sought the opinion of BCCI acting president CK Khanna, acting secretary Amitabh Chaudhary and treasurer Anirudh Chaudhry on the issue. Responding to her query, Anirudh recommended a suspension for the two and a gender sensitisation programme for them. He also took a dig at BCCI CEO Rahul Johri, who was cleared of sexual harassment charges but advised to under-go gender sensitisation by an inquiry committee

The players must be immediately suspended pending a proper inquiry and must be allowed ne through a proper sensitisation in addition

to serving a ban, if imposed upon them," he said.

"In any case the entire team and support staff must go through a sensitisation process. The CEO may join them in the sensitisation as well as rec-ommended by Ms. Veena Gowda, Advocate," he added. Anirudh said there should also be an investigation into how the two players appeared on

...the provisions of the earlier contracts and the practice in place would have required these contracted players to seek permission to appear on the show. Was such a permission sought? Was such a permission granted? If so, by whom?" he asked in his response to Edulji.

"...I question the situation where the sports journalists are kept at bay while access to the players is given to entertainment shows," he said referring to the provision of players needing the

Board's approval for routine media interviews.

Anirudh said the loose talk on women could also make the two players susceptible to approaches by bookmakers through "honey-traps".

"...the comments such as the ones that have

been made would definitely have painted a large red target on the back of the players for poten-tial recruiters for the organized syndicates who attempt to indulge in match fixing across the

"The very first caution that the ICC Anti-Corruption officers give in briefing to the players is to beware of situations of honey traps and the comments made on the show make it seem that the players may just be ripe for the plucking," he added.

Never seen a batsman concentrate like Pujara and that includes Tendulkar, says Langer

SYDNEY, JAN 10 (PTI): Australia coach Justin Langer Thursday said he has never seen a batsman concentrate as hard as India's Test star Cheteshwar Pujara, who beats even the great Sachin Tendulkar in that aspect.

India won the four-match Test series 2-1 against Australia with Pujara fetching the man of the series award with a total of 521 runs, including three hundreds.
Speaking for the first

time since the visiting team's maiden Test triumph on Australian soil, Langer said Pu-jara's concentration was a challenge for his

...I have never seen a batsman watch the ball as closely as he (Puja-ra) does, and that includes Sachin Tendulkar and Rahul Dravid. His concentration was a challenge. And we have to keep getting better just like him, all our batsmen and bowlers." Langer said.

Langer said his bowlers were stretched to the limit in the Test series, especially in Mel-

bourne and Sydney.

"The guys are working very hard and they are going okay. The first innings in Melbourne and Sydney, honestly, sucked the life out of us because when you are in the field for two days, with only one spin bowler, that takes energy out of the group," he said ahead of ODI series starting Saturday here.

"We have the best spinner and three outstanding pace bowlers, against the outstanding Cheteshwar Pujara and Virat Kohli. So it takes some mental and phys-

ical energy out.

"There are new players and new staff for these three games, so that brings new energy to the group...," he added.

Australia's fast bowl-

ers drew all-round criticism for failing to be as effective as India's as effective as India's pace battery but Langer backed them. The home team will be missing Mitchell Starc, Josh Hazlewood and Pat Cummins in the ODI series, who have been rested to manage workloads.
"...they copped some

pretty strong criticism throughout the se-ries. But on two very flat wickets they kept running in hard and having a go and in this instance they were beaten by some a brilliant Indian aids. liant Indian side. We were beaten by a better side," he conceded.

Langer said the challenge is ever present for his side despite a change in format as the Indian ODI team is just as strong as the Test team. Both sides get down to their respective World Cup preparations with the upcoming series.

"After losing in 2001, in 2004 when we finally beat India in India at Nagpur, without doubt that was the Everest moment of my cricket career. So I am sure for most of the Indian players, especially Virat Kohli, it feels the same but when you are at the top, things are on the way down," he warned the visitors.

"They will be very buoyed and excited but we plan to fight for every thing. They have a good one-day team and we are up against it. Let's hope we are better than we were in the Test series," Langer said.

The Australian coach felt his side has the talent but just needs to apply itself a bit more.
"It's the exciting

thing, when you lose a series to India, its dis-appointing but it helps you get better and it's the same where we are at the moment.

"It is an unbelievable opportunity for us in Tests and ODI cricket to get better and we have to ent, now we have to look at the experience and ability, and aspire to do it," he said.

Australia have made an addition to their squad with batsman Ashton Turner coming in for Mitchell Marsh who is suffering from gastroenteritis and is not avail-

able for the first ODI.

Australia have called off-spinner Nathan Lyon to their ODI squad, and Langer said that this is a move keeping the World Cup in mind, but didn't commit if the hosts would play two spinners in the first match of the series itself.

"Lyon's record in white ball cricket is very good and he is the best spinner in the world. So it would be a waste of opportunity if we don't play him in white hall crick et particularly with the World Cup coming up.

"He is also a gun fieldsman. He is nice and fit, and a gun fielder. I cannot wait to see how he goes and he is also excited about it." he said.

In addition, he spoke about Australia's World Cup preparations, and how they are close to finding the group of players in a bid to retain their 2015 title this summer.
"No one ever feels

locked in. We have a clear plan how we will play our one-day cricket between now and the World Cup.

"It will be a great op-portunity for Lyon and for our batsmen, as we have 10-15 games be-fore the World Cup. So we will pick our (final) side after that. As always we will look to prepare well and win the World Cup," he said.

"In the next few months we will have a group of players together and build towards the World Cup, for which we have a clear idea of who we would like to have but we will have to wait," he

Trump walks out of shutdown negotiations after Democrats reject wall funding

LALIT K IHA Donald Trump and the Democrats to end a partial government shutdown have collapsed after the president stormed out of the White House meeting as the opposition leaders refused to allocate USD 5.7 billion funding for his controversial US-Mexico border wall.

The Democrats accused Trump of slam-ming his hand on the table before he exited, and they said he ignored their pleas to reopen the federal government as they continue to negotiate over his border wall demand.

Funding for a border wall to prevent the entry of illegal immigrants has been the main sticking point in negotiations with Democrats to re-open parts of the federal

government.

A wall along the
US-Mexico border was one of Trump's signature campaign promises. The Democrats are refusing to allocate the money, arguing that a wall would be costly and ineffective. Mexico has rejected Trump's demand to pay for the border wall.

The standoff triggered a partial government shutdown on December 22, shuttering nine federal departments and several smaller agencies and forcing some 800,000 workers to go on unpaid leave or work without pay. The shut-down entered its 19th day Wednesday, making it the second-longest in history after the 21-day shutdown in 1995-96.

Pak antiterrorism court sentences cyberstalker to 24 vrs in iail M ZULQERNAII

LAHORE, JAN 10 (PTI): An anti-terrorism court in Pa-kistan has sentenced a cyberstalker to 24 years in iail for blackmailing 200 lady doctors and nurses through their social media accounts the maximum punishment awarded to a convict in the offence related to social media crimes in the country's history. Anti-Terrorism Court Lahore Judge Saijad Ahmad on Wednesday sen-tenced Abdul Wahab to a total of 24 years in prison along with a fine of Rs 7 lakh.

The judge sentenced Wahab to 14-year imprisonment along with Rs 500,000 fine. In addition to this, he was sentenced to seven-vear in jail along with Rs 100,000 fine. He was awarded a further three-year jail term and fined Rs 100,000.

"All the sentences will run concurrently and benefit of section 382-B of CrPC shall be given to convict," the court ruled.

The section 382-B says that the length of any senof imprisonment ed upon an accused shall be treated as reduced by any period during which he/she was detained in custody for such an offence.

The meeting with Pelosi and Schumer Schumer took place in the Situation Room of the White House. Trump entered the room and shared candies with the Conleadership, but walked out soon after getting 'no' for an answer from the House speaker.

"It's cold out here and the temperature was not much warmer in the

Situation Room," Pelosi told reporters outside the White House after the meeting.

Schumer at Trump alleged that Trump "sort of slammed the table" as the talks fell apart.

"He couldn't get his

way and he just walked out of the meeting," he said, adding, "We saw a temper tantrum because he couldn't get his way."

Alleging that the Democrats are unwilling to change their position over the issue, Vice President Pence said the Democrats want to reopen the government before negotiations can begin.

Monir Hossain from Tangail was jailed by Bangladesh Cyber Tribunal judge Mohammad As-Shams Joglul Hossain on Wednesday.

dnesday. Monir had been on and appeared court for the verdict, bdnews24.com reported.

Alamgir Hossain and Subrata Shil -- two others accused in the case started under the the Information and Communication Technology (ICT) Act -- were acquitted as charges against them were not proved, the report said.

Monir used to run his 'Monir Telecom' shop Tangail's Nagarpur. He had sent doctored images of Hasina, late president Zillur Rahman and former Indian premier Singh to mo-bile phones of users in 2013, said the verdict.

Saturia Police arrest-ed Alamgir after finding out that he was showing around the vulgur 'photoshopped images' on his phone. Following his arrest, Alamgir told police he got the images Monir Telecom.

Rights groups have criticised the government for using the the ICT laws to silence criticism. Critics have lashed out at the government for cracking down on free speech and an increas-ingly authoritarian rule. Some the recent strengthening of defamation laws with a new Digital Security Act (DSA) has spread a climate of fear.

The DSA also pena-

lises obtaining papers, information, or pictures from government offices without official consent.

More than 30,000 flee Boko Haram violence in NE Nigeria: UN

LAGOS, JAN 9 (AFP): Tens of thousands of people have fled their homes in northeast Nigeria after an increase in violence in the Boko Haram conflict, the United Nations said on Wednesday. "More than 30,000

internally displaced peo-ple (IDPs) have arrived in Maiduguri, mainly from Baga in recent weeks" said the UN's humanitar ian coordinator in Nigeria, Edward Kallon.

Baga, on the shores of Lake Chad, has been repeatedly hit in the nineyear conflict, which has killed more than 27,000, left 1.8 million people homeless and triggered a humanitarian crisis.

Fighters from the elf-styled Islamic State West Africa Province faction of Boko Haram over-ran two military bases in and around the fishing town on late December.

Kallon said fighting on December 26 trigon December 26 trig-gered a "massive dis-placement" of civil-ians, with men, wom-en and children flocking to already overcrowded camps in Monguno and Maiduguri.

Monguno is a garrison town 65 kilometres (40 miles) southwest of Baga while the Maiduguri, the Borno state cap-

ital, is 200 kilometres away on the same road.

Both are considered

key prizes for the jihadists, who have increased their attacks on military bases and soldiers since July last year.

A second attack on

Monguno on December 28 forced IDPs Maiduguri. Some 20,000 arrived at one camp, Teachers Village, stretching its capacity beyond the limit.

Kallon said it was unclear how many remained in Monguno but tens of thousands of people are in need of humanitarian assistance, notably shelter, food, water and sanitation.

"The impact of the recent fighting on innocent civilians is devastating and has created a humanitarian tragedy," he added. Local and international aid agencies have been providing life-saving assistance to IDPs for several years in the remote region, which has been devastated by the fighting.

But since November, some 260 aid workers have had to withdraw from three local government areas in northern Borno near Lake Chad where ISWAP are known to operate. Kallon said

"hundreds of thousands of people" had been affected and the withdrawal was the largest since the international response was increased in 2016.

Nigeria's President Muhammadu Buhari said in December 2015 that Boko Haram was "technically defeated" after a sustained counter-insurgency by Nigerian and regional troops.

Tens of thousands of who had previous-IDPs ly fled to Maiduguri have in the last year been en-couraged to leave after the authorities maintained it was safe to re-

On Wednesday Buhari acknowledged set-backs, including "battle fatigue" among soldiers from a persistent wave of guerrilla style hitand-run tactics and suicide bombings. Buhari was elected in 2015 on a promise to end the nflict and security has again become a major election issue as he seeks second term of office at polls next month.

Troops on the ground have increasingly com-plained about conditions, including a lack of relief and support, as well as equipment to fight the hetter-armed militants

Congo: Opposition leader Tshisekedi wins presidential vote peaceful. democratic

KINSHASA (DR CON-**GO),** Jan 10 (AP): Congo opposition leader Felix Tshisekedi has won the long-delayed presiden-tial election, the electoral commission announced early Thursday, as the vast country braced for possible protests over alleged rigging.
Tshisekedi, who re-

ceived more than 7 mil-lion votes, or 38 per cent, had not been widely considered the leading candidate and is relatively untested. The son of late opposition leader Etienne, who pursued the presidency for many years, he surprised many last year by breaking away from an opposition effort to unite behind a single candidate.

Some observers have suggested that President Joseph Kabila's government sought to make a deal as hopes faded for a win for ruling party candidate Emmanuel Ramazani Shadary, who re ceived more than 4 million votes, or 23 per cent.

It is not immediately clear whether opposition candidate Martin Fayulu, who had vowed to clean up Congo's widespread corruption and led in polling, will contest the results.

The constitutional court has 14 days to validate them. Favulu received more than 6 million votes, or 34 per cent. This is Congo's first transfer of power since independence in 1960. Kabila has ruled since

2001 in the troubled nation rich in the minerals key to smartphones around the world and has amassed vast wealth He is barred from

serving three con-secutive terms, but during more than two years of election delays many Congolese feared he'd find a way to stay in office.
"This is the corona-

tion of a lifetime," the deputy secretary-general of Tshisekedi's party, Rubens Mikindo, said Rubens Mikindo, said above the cheers at party headquarters.

"This is the begin-ning of national reconciliation."

Scores of people in the capital, Kinshasa, danced after the election results were announced long after midnight, but observers waited to see how other Congolese how other Congolese would respond, especially after Fayulu this week warned that the results were "not negotiable."

Activist groups on Wednesday urged people to "be ready to massively take to the streets" if results didn't match "the truth of the ballot boxes.'

Attention turns to Congo's powerful Cathchurch, which has said its 40,000 election observers at all polling stations found a "clear

winner" but was barred by electoral regulations from saying more.

If the church found Fayulu won, "how will react? population Stephanie Wolters, analyst with the Institute for Security Studies, posted on Twitter ahead of the announcement.

She added, will the African Union "consider a power transfer 'enough' or will they push for investind real result?"

The delayed results come after international pressure to announce an outcome that reflected the will of the people. The United States threatened sanctions against officials who rigged the vote. The largely peace ful election was marred by the malfunctioning of voting machi that Congo used for the first time

Dozens of polling centers opened hours late as materials went missing.

And in a last-minute

decision, some 1 million of the country's 40 million voters were barred from participating, with the electoral commission blaming a deadly Ebola virus outbreak.

Defiantly, tens of thousands of voters in one of the barred communities held their own ballot on election day. Fayulu won easily. Congo's government cut internet service the

day after the vote to

prevent speculation on social media. As the electoral commission met this week, anti-riot police moved into place outside.

Some Congolese weary of Kabila's long rule, two turbulent years of election delays and years of conflict that killed millions of people said they simply wanted peace.

Some said they would happy as long as Fayulu or Tshisekedi won, while recalling the vio-lence that followed past disputed elections.


Many Congolese objected to Shadary, suspecting that Kabila would continue to rule from behind the scenes.

Now Congo faces a new leader who is little known after spending many years in Belgium and living in the shadow of his outspoken father.

On Wednesday ternoon, hours before results were announced, some Tshisekedi sup-porters began to celebrate at his Union for Democracy and Social Progress party headquarters, with calendars already printed saying "Felix Tshisekedi president."

The 56-year-old Tshisekedi took over as head of Congo's most prominent opposition party in early 2018, a year after his father's death.

Some Congolese have said Tshisekedi lost support by splitting the opposition
