6 more test positive, Sikkim now has 10 active COVID cases

SAGAR CHETTRI GANGTOK, 09 JUNE:

Six new COVID-19 positive cases were detected in the State on Tuesday, taking the number of active cases in Sikkim up to 10. Only yesterday, confirmation had arrived that three patients had recovered from the virus. All the positive cases are asymptomatic and require only observation at present and not any medical intervention Health Department Director General and Secretary, Dr PT Bhutia, informs.

Of the six new cases, four are from West Sikkim and one each from South and East districts. All of them are recent returnees and were currently lodged in facility quarantine centres.

Addressing a press conference here today, Dr Bhutia informed that among the six new cases was an 18-year-old returnee from Chennai. She had arrived in the State on 30 May and was placed at the facility quarantine at CCCT, Chi-



sopani in South Sikkim.

He informed that the patient was immediately shifted to STNM Hospital last night itself. Although no one else at the facility quarantine at CCCT has tested positive, no new persons will be admitted there for now.

The Secretary also informed that a 28-yearold Siliguri returnee from East Sikkim has also tested positive. He informed that she was in Siliguri for the past two months and had returned with three others

of her family on 27 May and was lodged in the facility quarantine at HPI, Majhitar.

It is informed that she returned with 10 others in an SNT bus from Siliguri, all of whom are also in quarantine at present and while some of them have already tested negative, reports for a few other contacts are still awaited.

Dr Bhutia informed that the patient was sharing a room in the facility quarantine with three family members.

There were a total of 35

people lodged at the fa-

cility and only she has

tested positive. He added that nine others were lodged at the said quarantine centre after she was placed there and that they were also being screened for the virus.

Similarly, Secretary informed that four persons from a facility quarantine at Kyongsa in Gyalshing were detected positive for COVID-19. He detailed that a 33-yearold and her 44-year-old

husband, a 23-year-old male and a 42-year-old female from West Sikkim have tested positive

He informed that while the couple returned from Siliguri on an SNT bus from Siliguri along with one Chandigarh returnee and seven Delhi returnees, the 23-year-old travelled with seven Delhi returnees and two Uttar Pradesh returnees from Siliguri to Melli and the 42-year-old lady arrived in another STN bus.

He added that the contact tracing of all four patients was underway and that all the positive cases have been kept in isolation.

All of Sikkim's ten active cases are asymptomatic at present, the doctor informed while reassuring Sikkim that the health infrastructure was adequately prepared for every eventuality. He also appealed on the people not to panic or fall for the many irresponsible rumors in circulation.

Negligence by NBMCH in reporting positive cases, says Health Dept

Health Secretary, Dr PT Bhutia today informed that the Health Department has written to the Head of the Department of Microbiology of North Bengal Medical College & Hospital, Siliguri [NBMCH] as well as Chief Secretary, Government of West Bengal, Principal Secretary, Government of West Bengal, Secretary, Ministry of Health, New Delhi, regarding negligence in reporting COVID positive cases.

He informed that NBMCH had not immediately reported the test results of two women of South Sikkim even though they had reported the results to ICMR. Vigilant staff of IDSP of the State Health Department noticed names and registration numbers of these two women in the ICMR Portal where they

Govt announces fresh guidelines for phased reopening

Inter-district movement from 18 Jun, restaurants to resume dine-in service, gyms to open

The State Government issued fresh guidelines today for phased reopening allowing more relaxations to business establishments and public

As per the new guidelines, hotels and restaurants will be allowed to open from 10 June 2020 on 50% room/seating capacity. Restaurants will be allowed to remain

open only till 8 pm and Standard Operating Procedures as notified by the Union Health Ministry will have to be followed.

Gyms will also open from 10 June 2020 from 7 am to 6 pm on the condition that they will have only 50% occupancy at any given time. Shops have been allowed to remain open for an hour longer, from 8 am to 6 pm.

Inter-district movement of people and vehicles will resume from 18 June 2020 following odd-even rule and capacity stipulations while no vehicular movement allowed from 9pm to 7am.

Inter-state movement of goods will also be allowed for all vehicles except light transport vehicles.

India's virus count over 2.6 lakh, daily spike inching close to 10,000-mark

New Delhi, Jun 9 (PTI): A record rise in COVID-19 cases in India for the seventh consecutive day has pushed the tally to over 2.6 lakh on Tuesday, with the daily nationwide spike in coronavirus cases inching close to 10,000. The rise in cases comes at a time when the country has stepped out of a 75day coronavirus lockdown with malls, religious places and offices opening in several parts of the country under strict conditions.

Since the onset of June, the country has also been witnessing over 200 COVID-19 fatalities each day that has taken the country's death toll to 7,466. India is the fifth worst-hit nation by the COVID-19 pandemic after the US, Brazil, Russia and the UK, according to the Johns Hopkins University data. Several states like Harvana, Jammu and Kashmir, Assam, Harvana, Karnataka, Chhattisgarh and Tripura among others have been showing a spurt in cases.

A total 266 new COVID-19 fatalities and 9,987 cases have been reported in the last 24 hours till Tuesday 8 am, according to the Union Health Ministry data. The country has registered over 9,000 coronavirus infection cases for the sixth day in a row taking the country tally to 2,66,598. The number of active novel coronavirus cases stands at 1,29,917, while 1,29,214 people have recovered and one patient has migrated, according to the Health Ministry data updated till 8 am.

"Thus, 48.47 per cent patients have recovered so far," a ministry official said. According to the ICMR, a total of 49,16,116 samples have been tested as on 9 am, Tuesday, with 1,41,682 samples been tested in the last 24 hours.

Out of the total 7,466 fatalities reported till Tuesday 8 am, Maharashtra tops the tally with 3,169 deaths followed by Gujarat with 1,280 deaths, Delhi with 874, Madhya Pradesh with 414, West Bengal with 405, Tamil Nadu with 286, Uttar Pradesh with 283, Rajasthan with 246 and Telangana with 137 deaths. The death toll reached 75 in Andhra Pradesh, 64 in Karnataka and 53 in Punjab. Jammu and Kashmir has reported 45 fatalities due to the coronavirus disease, while 39 deaths have been reported from Haryana, 31 from Bihar, 16 from Kerala, 13 from Uttarakhand, nine from Odisha and seven from Jharkhand.

Himachal Pradesh and Chandigarh have registered five COVID-19 fatalities each and Assam and Chhattisgarh have recorded four deaths each so far.

Sikkim's first COVID patient has not tested negative yet: Health Secy

Health Secretary, Dr PT Bhutia, today explained that the first conducted in Mumbai it does not carry any risk COVID patient of Sikkim itself, confirmation of of transmission, Howevhas not yet tested negative although his viral load is very low.

Summit Times had earlier erroneously interpreted Dr Bhutia's Health Bulletin of 08 June to report that the first COVID patient was among the three who had tested negative on Monday.

In a press conference held today, Dr Bhutia informed that among the three who tested negative are the two women from South Sikkim whose test results had come from Siliguri after they had completed 14 days of quarantine and a returnee from Mumbai.

This third patient was one of the primary

contacts of the Mumbai returnee whose COVID positive status had been which was received only after he had boarded the SNT Bus from NJP.

While the first Mumbai returnee was found be COVID-positive on 04 June, his primary contact who had also returned from Mumbai, was found to be positive as well on 06 June. Dr Bhutia informs that this patient had developed mild symptoms and although he had tested positive, his viral load was found to have been very low even on 06 June. Yesterday came confirmation that he had overcome COVID completely.

Today the Secretary also informed that the first COVID patient of the

State is keeping in good health and although he is still positive, the viral confirmed from a test load has fallen so low that er, as a precaution he will be discharged only after he recovers completely and tests negative.

Regarding the SummitTimes report, it should be clarified that Health officials had earlier informed that the State's first COVID patient's viral load was very low three days back. So, when the Health Bulletin informed that a third person to test negative for COVID, and mentioned that his viral load was earlier very low, the inference one drew was that the Health Secretary was speaking about the first patient. Another locust attack likely in a few weeks: **Officials**

JAIPUR, JUN 9 (PTI): Centre's Locust Warning Organization will press into service 25 drones and buy 60 more vehicle-mounted insecticide spraying machines to counter the attack of locust swarms in the near future, an official said on Tuesday. Authorities are worried that millions of locusts may enter India along with monsoon winds from the Arabian Sea to destroy kharif crops.

"The locust swarms may attack in late June and early July. There is every possibility that locust swarms will come towards India from African countries along with monsoon winds rising from the Arabian Sea," K L Gurjar, Deputy Director of the Faridabad-based Locust Warning Organisation (LWO), told PTI.

He said the summer and rainy weather is favourable for locusts and they move from one place to another during this time, travelling 150 km in a day.

India faced a locust attack last month and the swarms reached Jaipur for the first time. Swarms of locusts travelled through several areas of Rajasthan, Madhya Pradesh, Maharashtra and Uttar Pradesh amid their worst invasion in

The swarms entered Rajasthan in April from Pakistan and then spread to areas across the western states, helped by strong winds.

Gurjar said the LWO is making full preparations at its level. For the first time, a team of 25 drones is being prepared to fight the locust swarm, which will be ready in a day or two. It will be used for spraying insecticides. Apart from this, the organization will get 60 more vehicle-mounted sprayers by the end of this month. State Agriculture Commissioner Dr Omprakash told PTI that the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations is predicting that grasshoppers will come so "we have made full preparations".

Around 800 tracsprayers tor-mounted were already being used, and now the district collectors have been authorized to take into service more such vehicles as per the requirement.

He said there is no dearth of resources to counter attack locust swarms. The state government has already given about Rs 6.5 crore to the districts. The department has asked for around Rs 4 crore additionally. The government has decided to purchase 100 fire fighting vehicles from the Disaster Relief Fund (SDRF), which can also be used for locust control.

In a meeting with Chief Minister Ashok Gehlot recently, State Agriculture Minister Lalchand Kataria said a large number of locust swarms could come to Rajasthan in the coming days. He said swarms are breeding in African countries.

A large number of these swarms are expected to reach Rajasthan. In such a situation, a district-wise strategy will have to be made to deal with them, Kataria said.

Vehicle disinfection bay installed at Toong check-post

MANGAN, 09 JUN [IPR]: Roads & Bridges Minister Samdup Lepcha today inaugurated a vehicle disinfection bay at Toong checkpost in North Sikkim. He was accompanied by DC-North, Tenzing T Kaleon and SP Ongmu Bhutia.

As informed by SDM-Chungthang, Subash Ghirmerey, and ASP-Chungthang LB Chettri. Chungthang sub-division had taken the initiative to install the vehicle disinfection bay.

Thermal scanning shall be done 24x7 by the health workers and all the updates will be recorded, they added

Today onwards, this innovative system will be used to sanitise all vehicles (Army and local) entering Chungthang, Lachen and Lachung. Earlier, vehicle disinfection was done manually.

It is learnt that the skeleton frame (structure) of the newly constructed vehicle disinfection bay was sponsored and prepared by Teesta Urja. Similarly, spray nozzle and pump were provided by Sikkim State Disaster Management Authority and covering plastic by the Horticulture Department, Man-

Kesang Lachungpa of Lachung Dzumsa and Cho Bandu Lachenpa provided financial assistance to procure disinfecting chemicals. The vehicle disinfection bay was officially handed over to the IC Toong check post and it will be kept operational 24x7.

Minister Lepcha mentioned that this innovative system has been installed with the aim to help the state government in its fight against the novel coronavirus pandemic. He also informed how a similar disinfection system has been installed at the Rang-Rang check post.

He requested all district officers to work in tandem with the government to ensure better results for the welfare of the people of the state.

Petrol price hiked for third day in a row

New Delhi, Jun 9 (PTI): Petrol price on Tuesday was hiked by 54 paise per litre and diesel by 58 paise a litre - the third straight daily increase in rates after oil PSUs ended an 82-day hiatus in rate revision.

Petrol price in Delhi was hiked to Rs 73.00 per litre from 72.46, while diesel rates were increased to Rs 71.17 a litre from Rs 70.59, according to a price notification of state oil marketing companies. This is the third daily increase in rates in a row. Oil companies had on Sunday restarted revising prices in line with costs, after ending an 82day hiatus.

Prices were raised by 60 paise per litre each on both petrol and diesel on Sunday as well as on Monday. In all, petrol price has gone up by Rs 1.74 per litre and diesel by Rs 1.78 a litre in three days. Oil PSUs - Indian Oil Corp (IOC), Bharat Petroleum Corp Ltd (BPCL) and Hindustan Petroleum Corp Ltd (HPCL) - had put daily price revisions on hold soon after the government on March 14, hiked excise duty on petrol and diesel by Rs 3 per litre each.

Oil companies did not pass on that excise duty hike, as well as the May 6 increase in tax on petrol by Rs 10 per litre and Rs 13 a litre hike on diesel by setting them off against the decline in retail prices that should have effected to reflect international oil rates falling to two-decade low.

International have since rebounded and oil companies having exhausted all the margin are now passing on the increase to customers, an industry official said.

Mercury rises in north India; monsoon advances further

NEW DELHI, JUN 9 (PTI): Temperatures in several places in north India, including Delhi, increased by a few notches on minimum was 27.4 degrees, the depart-Tuesday, even as the southwest mon- ment said soon further advanced into more parts

The mercury in the national capital was above the 40 degrees Celsius-mark.

The Safdarjung Observatory, which provides representative figures for the city, recorded a maximum of 40.6 degrees Celsius. On Monday, it recorded a high of 37.6 degrees Celsius.

The weather stations at Palam and Lodhi Road recorded their respective maximum temperatures at 42 and 39.9 degrees Celsius.

Humidity levels oscillated between 38 and 86 per cent in Delhi.

The maximum temperatures in Haryana and Punjab rose by a few notches but the mercury settled near or below the normal limits at most places.

Chandigarh, the common capital of the two states, recorded a high of 37.6 degrees Celsius, a notch below normal. according to the Meteorological (MeT) department here.

In Haryana, Ambala's maximum settled at 39.3 degrees Celsius, which was within the normal limits, while Karnal recorded a high of 37.4 degrees Celsius, two notches below normal.

Hisar had a hot day at 42 degrees Celsius but it was within the normal limits. Narnaul, which received light rainfall during the day, registered a high of 33.5 degrees Celsius, nine notches below normal.

Ludhiana in Punjab registered a maximum of 38.2 degrees Celsius, a notch below normal, while Patiala recorded a high of 38.7 degrees Celsius, also a notch below normal limits.

Amritsar recorded a maximum temperature of 35.2 degrees Celsius, five notches below normal limits.

The mercury continued to remain above the 40 degrees Celsius-mark in several parts of Uttar Pradesh, the MeT

Indian football domestic season to begin on August 1

New Delhi, Jun 9 (PTI): Indian football's domestic season will begin from August 1 when the transfer window opens, two months later than normal times due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

In a circular sent on Tuesday to all the state units, the AIFF said it has got clearance from the world body FIFA to hold the season from August 1. 2020 to May 31, 2021.

The summer transfer window will run from August 1 to October 31.

While the domestic transfer window normally begins in the first week of June to continue till August end, it has been pushed back to August this year due to the global health crisis.

But there was no change in the normal May 31 season ending date and thus the 2020-2021 season will be shortened by two months in view of the COVID-19 pandemic.

"Yes, we have received the circular from the AIFF stating that the domestic season will begin from August 1, 2020 and run to May 31, 2021 and it will open the summer transfer window from August 1 till October 20," the head of a state association told PTI.

"....we are pleased to

inform you that the Federation Internationale de Football Association (FIFA) has approved the amendment in All India Football Federation's (AIFF) season dates and registration period (transfer window) for 2020-21," the circular from the AIFF said. The second transfer window will be from January 1, 2021 to January 31, 2021.

ASDSO has also demanded that the state government provide sanitizers and face-masks at all educational institutions if the government decides to reopen schools and colleges in July.

"Sanitization of educational institutions and availability of sanitizers and masks should be ensured by the state government as the lives of students cannot be put up at risk," they said.

They termed the present online system of learning as praiseworthy but ineffective, citing that many students did not have access to smart phones and rural areas lacked reliable internet connectivity.

Frequent power supply disruptions in rural areas was another problem, they shared.

Another ASDSO member, Prabin Sharma stressed that the education sector was the worst hit and that the state government should come up with a specific plan to deal with the issue.

"We (students) are facing lots of problem. We find our futures dismal. We appeal to the state government to address our issues on a serious note," he said.

The highest number of confirmed cases in the country are from Maharashtra at 88,528 followed by Tamil Nadu at 33,229, Delhi at 29,943, Gujarat at 20,545, Uttar Pradesh at 10,947, Rajasthan at 10,763 and Madhya Pradesh at 9,638, according to the Health Ministry's data updated in the morning.

The number of COVID-19 cases has climbed to 8,613 in West Bengal, 5,760 in Karnataka, 5,202 in Bihar and 4,854 in Haryana.

It has risen to 4,851 in Andhra Pradesh, 4,285 in Jammu and Kashmir, 3,650 in Telangana and 2,994 in

Punjab has reported 2,663 novel coronavirus cases so far, while Assam has 2,776 cases. A total of 2,005 1,411 in Uttarakhand.

Jharkhand has registered 1,256 cases, while 1,160 cases have been reported from Chhattisgarh, 838 from Tripura, 421 from Himachal Pradesh, 330 from Goa and 317 from Chandigarh.

Manipur has 272 cases, Puducherry has 127 and Nagaland has reported 123 cases till now.

Ladakh has 103 COVID-19 cases, Arunachal Pradesh has 51, Mizoram has 42, Meghalaya 36 while Andaman and Nicobar Islands has registered 33 infections so far.

Dadar and Nagar Haveli has 22 cases, while Sikkim has reported seven cases till now.

The ministry's website said that 8,803 cases are being reassigned to states and "our figures are being reconciled with the ICMR".

State-wise distribution is subject to further verification and reconciliation, it said.

I quit Test cricket after being ignored for 2 years, says Wahab Riaz again for more than a year,"

KARACHI, JUN 9 (PTI): Dropped from PCB's central contract list reportedly for quitting Test cricket, left-arm fast bowler Wahab Riaz said he decided to stop playing the traditional format as he was being repeatedly ignored by the national selectors. Wahab who turns 35 this month, said he had not been selected in Pakistan's Test team since October, 2018 and that was the trigger behind his decision to quit the format last year.

"I played a Test in October, 2017 and then got another chance after exactly one year against Australia also in October on a flat pitch and was then dropped

he recalled in an interview. "If I can't play, it is not for me. So I was focussing on white ball cricket and felt it would be best if I focussed on T20s and ODIs," said Wahab, who has a combined total of 228 wickets from 27 Tests, 89 ODIs and 31 T20 Internationals.

The Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB) dropped Wahab, who made his Test debut in 2010 in England as well as fellow left-arm pacer Muhammad Aamir from their new central contracts list which starts next month.

The general perception is that both the pacers were punished apparently for deciding to leave Test cricket when Pakistan needed them. Wahab, who plays in most of the T20 leagues around the world, however, said playing for Pakistan was far more important for him than getting a central contract.

"I am fit and bowling well and I want to represent Pakistan in white ball cricket so my aim is to play for my country. Not getting a central contract is up to the cricket board," he said. Wahab, who attained fame after his five wickets in the 2011 World Cup semi-final against India at Mohali and then his blistering spell to Australian Shane Watson in the 2015 World Cup quarter-final, said he would continue to play cricket as long as he felt

he can contribute.

Coronavirus reaches Daman, two positive cases detected

DAMAN, Jun 9 (PTI): Two persons on Tuesday tested positive for coronavirus in the Union Territory of Daman, which was till now in green zone, officials said.

The two patients, a 41-year-old man and a four-year- old girl, both of whom arrived here from Mumbai recently, were shifted to a hospital in Marwad area of Daman, District Collector Rakesh Minhas said. "Till now, the man was kept at a govern-

ment-run quarantine facility, while the girl was home quarantined with her parents in Khariwad area. We have shifted both the patients to a hospital in Marwad," he said.

The girl's parents, whose reports came out negative, have also been shifted to the isolation ward of the hospital, the official said.

Since the 41-year-old patient was kept at the quarantine centre soon after he arrived here from Mumbai, he did not come into contact with any local, the collector said.

"We have declared Khariwad area as a containment zone after the girl's report came out positive. We have also initiated disinfection and contact-tracing in the area," he added. The Union Territory's administration recently said Daman and Diu were coronavirus-free till now due to strict implementation of the lockdown orders.

Some labs took 18 days to submit swab reports: BMC chief

MUMBAI, JUN 9 (PTI): Some laboratories in Mumbai took as many as 18 days to deliver swab reports related to coronavirus cases, BMC Commissioner I S Cha-

hal has said.

The senior IAS officer, who took over as commissioner of the Brihanmumbai Municipal Corporation (BMC) last month, said after he joined the post, he found that swab reports of April 4 were delivered on April 22.

"Some labs were committing serious crime by submitting reports 18 days later. They deserved to be punished for late reporting," Chahal told a TV channel on Monday.

The civic chief said he told such labs that inordinate delay in submitting reports of samples taken for coronavirus was not acceptable.

"I told them clearly that if you could not give me swab reports in 24 hours, you cannot function here in Mumbai. I cannot accept your

reports after 15 to 16 days...you don't chew more than you digest," Chahal said to a question.

"I could test around 3,600 (per day) in Mumbai after testing guidelines were issued by the ICMR. Due to the guidelines of carrying out tests of only symptomatic patients, the total figure of testing came down," he said.

Chahal said the civic body is going beyond the testing norms issued by the Indian Council of Medical Research (ICMR). "We have 2,500 hospitals in Mumbai.

Stop Ignoring **Domestic Violence**

Too many lives are being left scarred

The lockdown has been a major force of disruption. Yes, ■ it was inevitable and even necessary, but that should be no excuse to not make it as humane as possible. The horrors of the lakhs stranded without jobs, safety or provisions have made it to headlines and rightfully so, but what has not received enough play is how conditions have worsened for victims of domestic violence. Yes, some noise was made by agencies appointed to look out for women and children, but their engagement was superficial at best. A sustained engagement is still missed.

One does not know how bad the situation is in Sikkim but since it can be agreed that the stress and ennui of the lockdown will make those with a proclivity to turn violent on their partners or children, it opens the door to speak some about a reality which Sikkim continues to ignore. And it is not as if the monstrosity of domestic violence does not hit home often. In recent years, one may recall, a lady was allegedly beaten to death by her husband in West Sikkim. Then there was the incident in Gangtok not that many years ago when a woman was beaten so brutally by her husband through the night that she never woke up after falling unconscious. The entire neighbourhood had heard her screams, then whimpers and then silence, and still no one had intervened. A couple of years ago, a woman ended her spiral of being a victim of domestic abuse by stabbing her husband to death. That incident was a rare one, not because domestic violence is uncommon in Sikkim, but because, in this case, the accused is also a woman. There has also been a case of domestic abuse leading to suicide [alleged as a murder cover-up by the victim's brother] in one of the more crowded residential areas of Gangtok. All of these in recent years!

The case from West Sikkim also included the rare case of intervention. The cycle of violence, as per the panchayat representative who had filed a police complaint, started around two months before the death and had been reported to the police. Clearly, there was time to address the violence before it ended in a fatality. It is also safe to assume that in the Gangtok incident as well, the fatal beating was not the first time that the wife suffered violence. It is obvious that in all cases, neighbours and the elders of the society ignored the ugliness by convincing themselves that they had no 'business' getting involved because it was a 'family matter'. This hesitation to engage occasionally leads to a fatality and almost always condemns a victim to continue suffering in silence... unattended.

It is time that the government and the people collaborated to save women from abusive relationships. But domestic violence unfortunately remains blindsided in Sikkim's over-exuberance to claim that women in Sikkim are empowered and that there is no gender discrimination here. While there can be no denying that at the government policy initiative level, women have been empowered in Sikkim, the same cannot be said for the social engagement on gender issues. While women in Sikkim are not denied opportunities or equality at the policy level, the same cannot be said about how the society at large responds to gender issues and nowhere is it more disturbing than in the society's continuing disregard of women in distress. Women who stand up and say enough and seek justice and rescue might receive it, but that is an engagement with the State. Not all women in distress seek out help, their trauma and fear overpowering them. But the signs are always obvious and the beatings and abuse rarely quiet. At least the immediate neighbours and close friends are in the know, and while some might even offer comfort and advice, no one steps up to lodge an official complaint.

This response is not unique to Sikkim and domestic violence is overlooked, even excused and denied across the world. But that does not make it acceptable. It is important that organisations responsible for women's welfare and empowerment reach out wider awareness on where people can lodge complaints of domestic violence. Complaints, whether from the victim or anonymous, should fetch immediate response and the concerned agencies in turn should have trained counselors and access to police assistance to reach the victims and rescue them. There are many theories on why domestic violence is so common and what factors trigger it. One of these explanations looks at external factors in the offender's environment, such as family structure, stress and social learning. When domestic violence is ignored by everyone even when it is obvious, the perpetrator sees it as an endorsement and continues with the deviance. By putting in place systems which proactively encourage people not to ignore this abomination, at least one causative factor would have been addressed. Agreed, domestic violence is too widespread and complicated to offer any easy solutions, but a start has to be made somewhere and what is suggested above is as a good a place to begin as any.

Having trouble concentrating during the coronavirus pandemic? Neuroscience explains why

ear, anxiety, worry, lack of motivation and diffi- Γ culty concentrating — students cite all sorts of reasons for opposing distance learning. But are these excuses or real concerns? What does science say?

At the beginning of the pandemic, when universities and CEGEPs, Québec's junior colleges, were putting in place scenarios to continue teaching at a distance, students expressed their opposition by noting that the context was "not conducive to learning."

Teachers also felt that the students were "simply not willing to continue learning in such conditions." A variety of negative emotions were reported in opinion columns, letters and surveys. A petition was even circulated calling for a suspension of the winter session, which Education Minister Jean-François Roberge refused.

Students are not the only ones who have difficulty concentrating on intellectual tasks. In a column published in La Presse, Chantal Guy says that like many of her colleagues, she can't devote herself to in-depth reading.

"After a few pages, my mind wanders and just wants to go check out Dr. Arruda's damn curve," Guy wrote, referring to Horacio Arruda, the province's public health director. In short: "It's not the time that's lacking in reading, it's the concentration," she said. "People don't have the head for that."

Why do students feel they don't have the ability for studies? Recent advances in cognitive science provide insights into the links between negative emotions and cognition in tasks that require sustained intellectual investment.

A QUESTION OF THE AMYGDALA

"The heart has its reasons which reason knows not." This sentence from 17th-century philosopher Blaise Pascal sums up well the way in which western science has long separated the emotions of the "hot" universe from those of the "cold" universe in human rationality

Walter Cannon's physiological research has provided a first explanation of how emotions, especially negative emotions, take over our minds. He showed that emotion is a physiological warning system in the body, activating several structures below the cerebral cortex.

One of these structures, the amygdala, is now proving to be particularly important. The amygdala is rapidly activated in the face of threatening stimuli and allows us to learn to be wary of them. Faced with what could be a snake hidden among the branches, an animal will awaken its senses, alert its muscles and react quickly, without having the luxury of analyzing whether the slender shape is a snake or a stick.

In humans, the amygdala activates quickly and automatically in response to social stimuli loaded with negative emotions. Neuroscience research shows that people are not only highly sensitive to the emotional charge of their perceptions but they are also unable to ignore it.

For example, the emotions aroused by the sight of a snake in the grass or an untrustworthy political figure can capture our attention in spite of ourselves. ATTENTION: A LIMITED RESOURCE

One might object that for many people, fortunately, COVID-19 does not pose the same kind of threat as a snake encountered in the undergrowth. Our social systems provide us with protections that are previously unimaginable and we are much better prepared to deal with crisis situations.

And, learning situations established by educational institutions — whether in-person classes or online classes — always require that students focus their attention and consciously control their thoughts. As teachers know from experience, a great challenge while leading any lesson is keeping the attention of all students by ensuring that they remain focused on the activity at hand.

The cognitive psychologist Daniel Kahneman, a Nobel Prize winner in 2002, was among the first to propose that attention is a limited cognitive resource and that some cognitive processes require more attention than others. This is particularly the case for activities involving the conscious control of cognitive processes (such as reading or writing academic papers), involving what Kahneman calls "System 2" thinking. That requires attention and mental energy.

Limited attention capacity is also at the heart of the theories proposing that conscious and controlled cognitive processes are carried out in working memory, which is compared to a mental space capable of processing a limited amount of new in-

In working memory, attention acts as a supervisor of cognitive resource allocation and a controller of action execution. The brain circuits associated with working memory and executive functions are those of the prefrontal cortex.

WHEN EMOTION EATS AT ATTENTION

Researchers have long believed that the processing of emotions through the amygdala does not depend on the attention resources of working memory. However, evidence is accumulating in favour of the opposite hypothesis, indicating that the circuits connecting the amygdala and the prefron-

tal cortex play an important role in discriminating between relevant and irrelevant information for the current activity.

For example, emotional stimuli were found to interfere with the performance of a working memory task especially since they were not very relevant to the task. Furthermore, as the cognitive load associated with the task increased (for example, when the task required more cognitive resources), the interference of emotional stimuli not relevant to the task also increased. Thus, it would appear that the more a task requires cognitive effort and concentration, the more easily we are distracted.

Much of the extensive research on anxiety by psychologist Michael Eysenck and colleagues supports this view. They show that people who are anxious prefer to focus their attention on stimuli associated with the threat, unrelated to the task at hand. These stimuli may be internal (worrisome thoughts) or external (images perceived as threatening).

This is also the case with worry as the repeated experience of seemingly uncontrollable thoughts about possible negative events. Both anxiety and worry eat up the attention and cognitive resources of working memory, resulting in decreased cognitive performance, especially for complex tasks.

Other research indicates that feelings of mental fatigue increase when performing a task while trying not to respond to outside demands. It has been suggested that mental fatigue is a particular emotion that tells us that our mental resources are being depleted.

Overall, this research suggests that we are depleting our attention resources to avoid paying attention to irrelevant, but emotionally charged information! It is now better understood why it is so difficult — and exhausting — to avoid checking one's email while reading a scientific text, to switch from email to Facebook and from Facebook to COVID-19 news coverage, when we are concerned about the curve or death toll in seniors' homes.

EMOTION AND COGNITION ARE INSEPARABLE

Research in cognitive sciences today confirms what we know intuitively: studying requires attention, time and availability of mind. This research shows that cognitive and emotional processes are so intertwined in the brain that, for some researchers, such as Antonio Damasio, no thought is possible without emotion.

Not surprisingly, then, in a context full of messages about the dangers of the pandemic, students find it difficult to focus sustainably on their studies and most seem to lack quality time for reading or writing.

How to understand police violence: Not a case of good cop vs. bad cop

Despite numerous inquiries and commission after commission after commission into police violence over the years — many with strong recommendations for police reform — nothing changes. Why?

Universities, news media, Hollywood, politicians and economic elites continually drum into our heads that police "serve and protect" — and so goes the police motto in Toronto. This narrative of police helps to fuel the fantasy that they are necessary in their present configuration. But whom and what police protect must be asked squarely.

THICK BUREAUCRACIES

Citizens, misunderstanding that they are the ones to be protected, have demanded increased professionalization. This has mainly contributed to an already existing tendency toward a thicker and more unresponsive bureaucracy.

Police are now an unprecedented powerful cultural and political force protected by unions, the brotherhood, police services acts, increased authority, lax prosecution and a protective blanket offered by the courts. The unfettered growth of so many branches of police raises legitimate concerns that we are in a police state. Now is the time for people and

nality of the police, politicians and economic elites, given that capitalism is hardly rational. We need to pierce the bubble of ideologies that confuses the interests of the powerful as something good for all of society.

HOW TO APPLY RATIONAL THE-ORY TO THE POLICE

There is no good police versus bad police. The sociological imagination rejects personalizing explanations. Police are police; they are the states' organ of repression.

In a social order that is based on social inequality, even the most benign and friendly cop is little more than an ideological prop to make us grateful that the state can be merciful and is your friend. Black people know otherwise.

After getting past the ideological trap of good versus bad cop, the next step is to ask two fundamental questions in terms of what the police are for. Whom do the police serve? What do they protect in a colonialist and capitalist social order?

The first part of the question implies that police protect "us" from that abstract noun the state calls "crime." Incidentally, in protecting us

IMMUNITY FROM PROSECUTION This contradiction is, however, absolutely explicable. Police in the

U.S. have something called "qualified immunity" from prosecution. In Canada, similar immunity laws exist. Since the state protects its protectors, qualified immunity from prosecution is what often allows police to get away with murder - literally.

The legal justification for police violence is key to understand liberal democracies. In a capitalist social order, the principal function of police is to maintain the order of mal-distributions of private and productive property.

Without a domestic armed force, the economic, social and political power of the ruling class and elites would not be possible. The police defend the interests of the powerful, and those whose disorganization is their powerlessness. This is not unlike what American law designates Racketeer Influenced and Corrupt Organization (RICO) or, more simply, a mafia.

A RENEWAL OF DEMOCRACY

Police violence has always been the spark for the periodic bubbling over of public discontent with colonialism, capitalism, racism inherent Crown councils, courts and diminished roles for police and prisons as remedies for the problem of social inequality. Those citizens' councils must not be co-opted and turned into an iron curtain of mass surveillance.

A new basis for social order is also required, such as a guaranteed basic income and democratic socialism.

This is all uncharted territory and there will be many unintended consequences.

Defunding, which means demobilizaion, could be a problem. As is the case in contemporary Mexico, Russia and elsewhere, former police and soldiers easily turn to armed brigandage, join paramilitaries or narcos. That might not happen here.

But given the last 40 years is increasingly dystopian and corruption already a serious problem in policing, nothing is to be ruled out.

Committing sociology is not about being right. It is about a frame of mind, of being open to critical interpretations and a way of asking questions about the dense fog of ideology that besets us.

Odisha to intensify COVID-19 awareness campaign

Apart from social media, Tripathy also asked the officials to use traditional modes like TV, radio, leaflets and posters while reviewing the progress of the special awareness campaign "Mu bi Covid Yodha" (I am a Covid warrior).

"Information, Education and Communication are the key to win the fight against Covid-19 and check the possible spread of the pandemic", the chief secretary said, adding that an aware and alert community can achieve wonders in the fight against this unseen enemy.

He said Chief Minister Naveen Patnaik had cautioned the people as well as the administration that the month of June will be very challenging as more than 5 lakh Odia migrant workers have returned from different highly infected states and monsoon is also likely to onset on 10th of this month.

"The campaign will focus on spreading awareness among people on the need of social distancing, mask wearing and hand hygiene to curb the spread of the virus," said Tripathy.

He said the involvement of panchavati raj institutions have yielded good results in containing the spread of the diseases in initial phases and directed officials to set up ward committees in both rural and urban areas so that surveillance could be more effective.

He also suggested that the campaign be intensified through active involvement of women self-help groups, panchayati raj institutions, farmer producer groups and school management committees

Odisha had reported only 284 COVID-19 cases till May 9. It has now increased to 2,994. In one month the state has reported more than 2.700 cases.

Information and Public Relations secretary S K Singh said, "The camping has been launched to infuse in the people the values of self responsibility with the spirit of Ama Swasthya Ama Hatare (our health in our hand)."

50pc of Kolkata restaurants reopen with safety protocols

Around 50 per cent of the 30,000-odd eateries in Kolkata opened on Monday following the Centre's notice allowing restaurants to start functioning with all COVID-19 safety protocols in place.

About 15,000 restaurants opened with at least 6 feet distance between two tables and minimum contact with the restaurant staff during payment and ordering menus, President of Hotels and Restaurants Association of Eastern India Sudesh Poddar said.

Around 25-30 per cent of normal customer presence was reported in the eating joints on the first day, owners of several restaurants said.

"It is the first day of reopening of restaurants after over two-and-half month of lockdown. We know there would be less footfall now compared to the pre-COVID days. But it will catch up," Poddar told PTI. He said patrons are calling up restaurants

to know about timing and availability of bookings, but online delivery still outweighs the fine dining segment in almost all restaurants, an interesting feature in the past two and half months.

"I think it will take time for the people to go back to the old habits with corona scare yet to go. But we are here to assuage their misgivings with full safety measures," Poddar said.

Employees of Peter Cat and Mocambo, two iconic restaurants in the city, wore masks, face shields and gloves.

"Customers also need checking body temperature of everyone using thermal gun and making the customers sanitise even their footwear while entering. Patrons are seated on every alternate table," owners of the two restaurants Nitin Kothari said.


"Making people aware that their favourite food joints have opened is more important at this stage. We are sure the number of clients will rise in the coming days," he said.

Authorities of Awadhi cuisine restaurant, Oudh 1590 said they witnessed 25 per cent customer presence on the very first day of the re-opening.

"We feel it will go up gradually once people are more comfortable to dine out," owners Shiladitya Chaudhury and Debaditya Chaudhury said.

Seating capacity was reduced to 50 per cent while the menu is sent to the mobile phone of the customer at the entrance to wear masks. We are to ensure minimum contact, they said adding that the patrons were provided with disposable crockery and cutlery.

Wade may not engage in verbal duels with India during home Test series

MELBOURNE, JUN 9 (PTI): Australia wicket-keeper batsman Matthew Wade on Tuesday said he might stay away from sledging during this year's home Test series against India as he feels Virat Kohli and Co thrive on verbal duels and use it to their advantage. Wade has used sharp words to get into the skin of his opponents in the past, especially in the 2017 India ODI series and also during last year's Ashes.

However, the 32-yearold said he would not want to engage in verbal confrontations with Indian players as it might only spur on the visitors.

"They're a hard team, they use it (sledging) to their advantage very well. Virat is very clever the way he uses his words or his body language. So they use it as an advantage now. To be honest, I don't really want to engage too much into that," Wade told reporters via video conference.

"I know that they thrive off that energy that comes between two players. They're probably as good at doing that as anyone in the world at the moment, so it's something I might stay away from this time."

The four-Test series between India and Australia is scheduled to begin with the first game at Gabba starting December 3. The second, third and fourth Tests are slated for Adelaide Oval (Dec 11-15), Melbourne Cricket Ground (Dec 26-30) and Sydney Cricket Ground (Jan 3-7) respectively.

Wade, who played 32 Tests, 94 ODIs and 29 T20Is for Australia, said India are a fierce opponent with a bunch of good fielders.

"I have been luckily enough to play India but I haven't played them in Australia, played them twice in India which is hard work. They are a fierce team," he said.

"They are on your face, they have alert fielders which probably India haven't been renowned for in 20 year period, they are up and about all the time when you are batting.'

India's pace attack has thrived under Kohli in the last few years and Wade also pointed out that fast bowlers will be India's potent weapon in Australia.

Massive sports corruption case finally heard at Paris trial

PARIS, JUN 8 (AP): A sports corruption trial involving allegations of doping cover-ups and illicit payoffs at the top of track and field opened Monday in Paris.

In six days of hearings, the Paris court is due to hear evidence that Russian athletes paid millions of dollars to hide their suspected doping so they could compete at the Olympics in 2012 and other competitions.

Lamine Diack, who served as president of the sport's governing body for nearly 16 years, is one of the alleged recipients of the payments. Diack, 87, was present in court, wearing a white face mask.

The court briefly considered but then rejected a request from a lawyer for Papa Massata Diack, one of Lamine Diack's sons who is also a defendant in the case, that the trial be delayed because two of his other lawyers weren't able to attend the trial because of coronavirus travel restrictions.

The trial had already been delayed from January to allow the inclusion of new evidence.

Papa Massata Diack lives in Senegal, shielded from an



international arrest warrant issued by France, and did not attend Monday's hearing.

As IAAF president, Diack was one of the most influential men in Olympic sports, presiding over an era when Usain Bolt made track and field wildly popular. But Diack's legacy, and the IAAF's credibility, took a beating after he stepped down in 2015. He was arrested in France and investigators revealed accusations of athletes being squeezed for payments to cover up their doping cases.

The 86-year-old Diack is being tried for corruption, money laundering and breach of trust. Prosecutors say he directly or indirectly solicited 3.45 million euros (3.9 million) from athletes suspected by the IAAF of doping who paid to have their names cleared so they could continue competing. About two dozen Russian athletes were reportedly involved.

Prosecutors also charged Diack for involvement in a 1.5 million payment from Russia for use in electoral politics in his native Senegal. Prosecutors say the money was creamed off sponsorship and TV rights deals, negotiated with Russian officials.

Prosecutors say the money was to finance presidential and legislative election campaigns in Senegal in 2012, in exchange for slowing down

doping cases targeting Russian athletes.

Diack is also accused of having enabled his son to embezzle IAAF sponsorship revenue from Russia's VTB Bank, Chinese oil firm Sinopec and broadcaster CCTV, South Korean tech giant Samsung and

Papa Massata Diack also faces corruption, money laundering and breach of trust charges. Senegal has refused France's extradition requests for the former IAAF marketing consultant.

Lamine Diack was detained on a trip to France in 2015 and has been forbidden from leaving the country

Also being tried for corruption are a lawyer who advised Diack, Habib Cisse, and a doctor, Gabriel Dolle, who oversaw drug-testing at the IAAF and is accused of taking payments to delay doping cases. Both men were in court.

Two Russians are also on trial but were not present: Valentin Balakhnichev, a former IAAF treasurer, and Alexei Melnikov, a coach who led Russia's long-distance running program.

Premier League restart preview No 2: Aston Villa

LONDON, 09 JUN [THEGUARDIAN]: What was the situation like when the league was suspended on 13 March? Gloomy, with patches of hope. Villa slid into the relegation zone after losing their last four league matches before the shutdown, including grim defeats by Bournemouth and Southampton and a 4-0 spanking by Leicester. Constant mistakes, unfortunate injuries, a general lack of pace and widespread inconsistency gave Villa the look of a newly assembled team running out of time to get things right.

Yet they undoubtedly have quality and also have a match in hand on the teams around them thanks to their progress to March's Carabao Cup final, where, though they ultimately fell to Manchester City, they showed the sort of resilience they will need to survive.

What about now? The outlook is brightened by the return from injury of John McGinn, who was sorely missed after damaging his ankle just before Christmas. The Scot left a hole in midfield that could not be filled, not even by Danny Drinkwater. Now that Mc-Ginn is fit again Villa can look forward to an injection of dynamism and thrust. With the form of Marvelous Nakamba having been one of the positives for Villa before the suspension of the league, they can expect to be strong in the centre. Another positive was the sharpness of Mbwana Samatta, the striker whose arrival in January offset the loss to injury of Wesley. The goalkeeper Tom Heaton, however,

remains a key absentee and much will depend on the performances of his replacement. That could be Ørjan Nyland, who did well throughout the Carabao Cup campaign, or Pepe Reina, who has recovered from a harrowing case of coronavirus.

What needs to be done to have a successful end to the season? For a start, Villa need to stop conceding so many goals. That means eradicating the basic mistakes that have frequently sabotaged good work this season. It also means finding the right formula. Dean Smith had success when he switched to a back three in the new year but that proved temporary and he ended up reverting to a back four. Whatever system they use, Villa need at least one reliable central defensive partner for Tyrone Mings. Björn Engels, though hardly infallible, has looked the most likely so far. Villa will also need to improve their attacking, particularly the service from the right to Samatta and McGinn. Villa collected eight points from their previous matches this season against the 10 teams they have left to face; they will probably need more than that to survive.

Have players and staff behaved during lockdown? Mostly. But anyone who saw the photograph in March of Jack Grealish wearing one slipper and one flip-flop as he stood forlornly on a Birmingham street contemplating his damaged Range Rover and flawed judgment will be aware that the club captain let the side down by venturing outdoors just hours after publicly

calling for others to abide by lockdown. He has apologised.

Any unsung/community heroes? Not so much unsung as singing. Kortney Hause revealed his vocal talent by releasing his first single in April. The song, entitled Worth It, was not just a boon for lovers of R&B but also for the NHS, to whom he donated all proceeds from sales. "Music has been a passion and a hobby of mine for many years," he said. "It felt like the right time to do my bit and help out." Grealish, meanwhile, gave money to Birmingham Children's hospital and raised over £55,000 for the NHS by raffling off one of his Villa shirts.

Key player in the run-in? Grealish. He is not just Villa's most gifted player, he is one of the best in the league. Dismissed as an overrated bauble by people who do not pay enough attention, he is, in fact, a highly reliable and effective performer who works relentlessly and creates regularly despite constant attempts to take him down and rough him up. When he is on the pitch Villa always have a chance of scoring.

End-of-season-prediction With Grealish, Samatta and McGinn available to play together for the first time, Villa could yet fire their way to safety. They will survive. Just.

Raheem Sterling demands English football gives black managers a chance

LONDON, 09 JUN [THEGUARDIAN]: Raheem Sterling has called for English football to seize the moment and finally address its lack of black representation in positions

The Manchester City and England forward made the comments during an appearance on the BBC's flagship political programme, Newsnight, in the wake of anti-racism protests that have taken hold across the world. Advance clips had shown the 25-year-old offering his support to those who have taken to the streets in the aftermath of George Floyd's death at the hands of police in the United States, but the full interview with Emily Maitlis saw him focus on matters closer at hand.

Reflecting on his own sport, Sterling pointed a finger at the long-running disparity between the number of high-profile BAME players and the dearth of those who go on to win significant managerial, coaching or administrative jobs. Sterling cited the respective fortunes of Steven Gerrard and Frank Lampard, who have landed top roles at Rangers and Chelsea in the early stages of their management careers, as compared to equally experienced black players who have been compelled to start much lower down the ladder.

"This is a time to speak on these subjects, speak on injustice, especially in my field," said Sterling. "There's something like 500 players in the Premier

League and a third of them are black and we have no representation of us in the hierarchy, no representation of us in the coaching staffs. There's not a lot of faces that we can relate to and have conversations with. "With these protests that are



going on it's all well and good just talking, but it's time that we need to have conversations, to be able to spark debates.

"There's Steven Gerrard, your Frank Lampards, you have your Sol Campbells and you have your Ashley Coles. All had great careers, all played for England. At

the same time, they've all respectfully done their coaching badges to coach at the highest level and the two that haven't been given the right opportunities are the two black former players. "I feel like that's what's lacking here, it's not just taking the knee, it is about giving people the chance they deserve."

Sterling also feels there is a lack of representation in the game's governance, suggesting a more diverse mix is needed in the corridors of

power. Asked what would represent success for the change movement, he said: "When there's more black people in positions. When I can have someone from a black background for me to be able to go to in the FA with a problem I have within the club. These will be the times that I know that change is happening." The former Manchester United and Aston Villa striker Dwight Yorke also bemoaned his struggles in the managerial market, revealing even a hand from Sir Alex Ferguson could not help him earn a shot at another of his old clubs. He told BeIN Sports: "I've applied for the Villa job twice now. I get one response from the CEO and his response to me was I need experience.

"Where am I going to go and get experience if I'm not being given a chance? When I applied for the Villa job, I went into [Ferguson's] office and told him exactly what I was trying to do. He gave me some experience, he told me what I needed to do and I picked his brain. At the same time, he picked the phone up and rang Villa for me to give his recommendation. With his help, I still can't get an interview. That is what we are facing."

Cathay Pacific proposes USD 5 billion bailout led by government

Hong Kong, Jun 9 (AP): Financially battered Hong Kong airline Cathav Pacific Airways has proposed the government help fund a 39 billion Hong Kong dollar (USD 5 billion) recapitalization plan to help it survive the coronavirus pandemic.

Cathay Pacific said in a stock exchange filing on Tuesday that the plan calls for it to issue shares to raise more than 33 billion Hong Kong dollars (over USD 4.3 billion).

Of that total, about 20 billion Hong Kong dollars (USD 2.6 billion) would be issued to a new, government-controlled group to be called Aviation 2020.

The airline also would receive a 7.8 billion Hong Kong dollar (USD 1 billion) loan from Aviation 2020.

Cathay Pacific, one of Asia's biggest airlines, proposed the bailout as it struggles to survive the near collapse of regional travel due to the coronavirus pandemic.

"Although the situation in Europe is improving, globally it is worsening," he told reporters.

Tedros said that in countries where the situation was getting better, "the biggest threat is now complacency".

"More than six months into this pandemic, this is not the time for any country to take its foot off the pedal," he said.

COVID-19 deaths have passed 406,000 worldwide, with more than seven million infections, since the disease emerged in China late last year before sweeping the globe, subjecting billions to some form of lockdown and paralysing economies.

Governments around the world are cautiously peeling back those restrictions to resuscitate their economies while trying to avoid a resurgence of infections.

A study by Imperial College London published on Monday estimated that lockdowns prevented 3.1 million deaths in 11 European countries. Cyprus on Tuesday welcomed its first tourists after nearly three months on lockdown, with flights scheduled from Israel, Greece and Bulgaria.

Desperate to save its summer tourism season, the Mediterranean island's government has pledged to cover the medical costs of any visitor who tests positive for the coronavirus while on holiday.

Other countries have been more cautious.

The health minister in Spain, one of the hardest-hit countries in Europe, said that wearing face masks in public will be compulsory "until we permanently defeat the virus" with an effective treatment or vaccine. And Britain, which is nearing almost 50,000 suspected and confirmed deaths, has imposed a two-week quarantine for anyone coming into the country, British nationals included.

New York City -- the epicentre of America's coronavirus outbreak -- began partially reopening its shattered economy on Monday after almost three months of lock-

In Latin America, countries geared up for the worst as the outbreak escalated, with Brazil, Mexico and Peru particularly hard hit.

Brazil has the world's third-highest death toll at more than 36,000, but President Jair Bolsonaro continues to play down the impact of the virus and has urged regional officials to lift lockdown measures.

Critics are accusing Bolsonaro of playing with the figures, after his government first stopped reporting the total number of fatalities and infections, and then released conflicting data.

"Manipulating the number of dead in a pandemic is a crime," said influential columnist Miriam Leitao in newspaper Globo.

Fears in Asia that the virus may not be under control persist, with the death toll and infection rate climbing sharply in India, even as the government lifted some curbs Monday after a 10-week lockdown.

Delhi authorities warned that they expect cases in the Indian capital to shoot up almost 20 times to more than half a million in the coming weeks.

German exports down nearly a quarter in April as virus hits

BERLIN, JUN 9 (AP): German exports plunged by nearly a quarter in April compared with the previous month as coronavirus shutdowns dragged down demand, official data showed Tuesday.

The figures from the Federal Statistical Office followed data showing big drops in factory orders and industrial production in Europe's biggest economy in April, underlining expectations of a sharp economic contraction in the second quarter.

Exports dropped 24% in April, following an 11.7% decline in March the month when

European countries, including Germany, started imposing lockdowns.

year-on-year terms, exports dropped 31.1% in April, the biggest drop since records began in 1950. There were sharp drops in exports to France, Italy and the U.S. - 48.3%, 40.1% and 35.8% respectively. Exports to China, however, were down a comparatively modest 12.6%.

German imports dropped 16.5% in April compared with the previous month, following a 5% drop in March. In year-on-year terms, there was a 21.6% de-

cline in April. Germany's lockdown was less severe than those imposed in Italy, Spain and France and it never ordered factories closed, but companies did largely stop production in some areas such as the automaking sector and supply chains were disrupted.

Germany started easing restrictions on public life on April 20 and the process has gathered pace since. However, the German economy went into a recession in the first quarter, when it shrank by 2.2%, and that is expected to deepen in the current quarter.

Hong Kong leader says all should learn from year of protest



Hong Kong, Jun 9 (AP): A year on from the start of Hong Kong's anti-government protests, the leader of the semi-autonomous Chinese city said Tuesday that all sides should learn from the difficulties and challenging times over the past year. Everyone has to learn their lesson, including the Hong Kong government, Carrie Lam told reporters before a weekly meeting with advisors.

Hong Kong cannot bear that kind of chaos, and the people of Hong Kong want a stable and peaceful environment to be able to live and work here happily. Lam did not elaborate on what lessons should have been learned.

Tuesday marks the one-year anniversary of the first large-scale protest against a proposed extradition bill would have allowed people in this former British colony, which has its own legal system, to be sent to mainland China to stand trial. Organizers pegged the turnout at more than a million people, while police estimated a crowd of 240,000.

The mass protest on 9 June last year has been etched in the collective memory of Hongkongers." the Civil Human Rights Front, which organized the event, wrote in a Facebook post on Tuesday. "It also marks the beginning of our togetherness in defending our beloved city. The march through central Hong Kong was the start of a pro-democracy movement that saw protesters break into the legislative building and take to the streets every weekend for months, even after the extradition bill was withdrawn.

At times, violent clashes broke out between protesters and the police, leading to accusations of police brutality and sparking protester demands for an independent inquiry into police behavior.

Hong Kong saw a lull in protests during the corothis year, but as infections have ebbed, protesters have returned to the street to demonstrate against an imminent national security law for Hong Kong as well as a recently approved national anthem bill that makes it illegal to insult the Chinese national anthem.

Critics and protesters say that the national security law is a blow to the one country, two systems framework following the handover of Hong Kong from Britain to China in 1997, which promised the city freedoms not found on the mainland. There were calls for

protests to mark the anniversary Tuesday, both at lunchtime and in the evening, though no sizable ones had materialized by early afternoon.

China blames the protests in part on foreign intervention and is hastening to enact a national security law for Hong Kong aimed at curbing secessionist and subversive activities. Hong Kong's prob-

lems are a result of the opposition and foreign allies attempting to turn Hong Kong into an independent or semi-independent political entity and a pawn to contain China's development, Zhang Xiaoming, deputy director of the Chinese Cabinet's Hong Kong and Macao Affairs Office, said in a speech posted to the office's website Monday.

The more the bottom line of national security is consolidated, the greater the space will be for Hong Kong to leverage its advantages under 'one country, two systems,' Zhang said.

China will unswervingly protect its sovereignty and block any outside interference in Hong Kong's affairs, he said.

If sex isn't real, the lived reality of women globally is erased," Rowling tweeted. "I know and love trans people, but erasing the concept of sex removes the ability of many to meaningfully discuss their

say published to The Trevor Project. Radcliffe, who portrayed the titular character in all eight Harry Potter films, said he felt "compelled to say something at this moment" even if it meant uncomfortable press headlines pitting him against Rowling.

"I realize that certain press outlets will probably want to paint this as in-fighting between J.K. Rowling and myself, but that is really not what this is about, nor is it what's important right now," Radcliffe began.
