With regard to the charge of negligence against District Hospital Namchi on the death of a newborn on 21 Jun, the Department of Health Care, Health Services & Family Welfare has issued a press release today with clari-fications on the case.

As per the release. Eden Bhutia [23], wife of Dawa Pintso Bhutia, hailing from Kewzing in South Sikkim had been admitted at District Hospital Namchi on 21 Jun at 9.15 a.m with complaints of pain in the abdomen.

On examination, it was noted that the patient was in early labor and accordingly was admitted for safe conferment with advice of regular monitoring. Her vitals were normal and fetal heart sound was regular. However, she had not done recent investigations including ultrasonography which were advised to her by the Gynaecologist treating treating Gynaecologist on 19 Jun. Laboratory In-vestigations as required were sent on admission.

The progress of la-bor was monitored and the lady delivered a still born child at 3.56 p.m on the same day. There were two loops of cord around the neck with thick me-conium staining. The on-duty Medical Officer was called by the nurses who had conducted the delivery to assess the

Accordingly, CPR was given even though no heart sounds were audi-ble and no pulse palpable. The baby showed no signs of life in spite of all resuscitation measures and was thereafter declared still born.

Rise of Indian money in Swiss banks not surprising: Yechury

DELHI, JUN 29 (PTI): Taking a dig at Prime Minister Narendra Modi, CPI(M) leader Sitaram Yechury today said while Indian money in Swiss banks rose by 50 per cent in 2017, the Centre wrote off the corporate world's unpaid loans worth lakhs of crores and allowed them to flee after looting public money.

The CPI(M) general secretary said the prime minister had no intention to honour the promises

"Indian money in Swiss banks rises 50% to over Rs 7,000 crore in 2017: a fraction of Indian Black Money in Switzerland. Modi govt writes off lakhs of crores of unpaid loans of crony corpo-rates, businessmen flee India after looting public money under his watch; this data is no surprise," Yechury tweeted.

From falsifying histo-ry to making new promises, 'Jumlaman' has no time or intention to redepositing Rs 15 lakh in each bank account to making rupee stronger to doubling farmers' in-come, he has only insult-ed & humiliated us Indians #BlackDays, he said. According to the offi-

cial annual data released by the Swiss National Bank (SNB), the central banking authority of the Alnine nation money parked by Indians in Swiss banks rose over 50 ner cent to CHF 1 01 hilyear downward trend amid India's clampdown on suspected black money stashed there.

In comparison, the total funds held by all foreign clients of Swiss banks rose about 3 per cent to CHF 1.46 trillion or about Rs 100 lakh crore in 2017, it said.

The surge in Indian money held with Swiss banks comes as a surprise given India's continuing clampdown on suspected black money

WB govt raises retirement age of nurses to 62 years

Kolkata, Jun 29 (PTI): West Bengal government today decided to raise the superannuation age for nurses working state-run hospitals from 60 years to 62 years, a senior official said.

The state government also decided to raise the age bar from 39 years to 45 years for employing nurses on contractual basis, he said.

The state-run hospitals which have around 84,000 beds require around 50,000 nurses to provide necessary medical assistance, the official added.

IMPHAL, JUN 29 (PTI): Union Minister Kiren Rijuju arrived here today on a two-day official visit to review security measures in Manipur and other northeastern states, offi-cials said.

The Union Minister of State for Home Affairs told reporters that the on-going peace talk between the Centre and the NSCN-IM and its framework agreement will not affect neighbouring states of

Nagaland. Tripura Chief Minister Biplab Kumar Deb also arrived here. Deb said Tripura had historical rela-tionship with Manipur.

Landslides after monsoon rains; 4 dead in Arunachal, road blockage hits Amarnath yatra

NEW DELHI, Jun 29 (PTI): Rains lashed several parts of the country triggering landslides in some hill states, which killed at least four ITBP personnel in Arunachal Pradesh and affected the Amarnath pilgrimage in Jammu and Kashmir, as monsoon covered the entire length and breadth of India two weeks ahead of its schedule.

Evening showers in the national capital caused the humidity level to shoot up to 90 per cent even as the mercury settled at a notch below normal. The monsoon winds blew away the dust from Delhi air and the city breathed

the cleanest air in nearly a year, authorities said.

The Air Quality Index (AQI) value for the capital was a "satisfactory" 83 today. It touched this level on Wednesday after the heavy pre-monsoon showers, according the Central Pollution Control Board data.

An Air Quality Index (AQI) between 0-50 is considered "Good", 51-100 "Satisfactory", 101-200 "Moderate", 201-300 "Poor", 301-400 "Very Poor", and 401-500

He further asked the community to analyze what Sikkim has become and the rich value it has added to their lives with an increase in business volume and reaping the "democracy dividend" the State now offers

"The value of Gangtok has in creased by approximately 5000 which is evident from the GSDP increase recorded. Business volume has increased. Space/Site Salami system for shops has been introduced. Stay Longer With Seasonal Concerns

Understand climate change, make conservation a habit

The monsoon has been severe in the included creamand as it paused and stalled and then swept through central and western India. Assam and other states of the NE were already wading through floods, even as North India was blistering as it waited for the rains to arrive. Summer holidays were extended into monsoon season because it was too hot to be safe for children to be outdoors. The rains have now arrived all over the country, but that is still no guarantee that they will stay despite projections that monsoon will be normal this year. Of course, the Met officials insist that these are cyclical events and that it is too early to ring alarm bells, but should the rains fail mainland India, agriculture will fail as well. Yes, living in a region which has seen a very wet start to the monsoons, this scenario appears almost unbelievable, but in these times of climate change, it is a very likely scenario. But what will eventually get the Delhi media buzzing will be the power cuts that become routine once the hydel projects find no hydro to power supply to the metro cities and the industries or are too inundated by silt and flood-spill to keep the turbines turning. At present, national media is busy with flooding city streets and that can be misleading, because it is not really too much rain that is causing the flooding but too much unplanned expansion that is clogging everything up. Agriculture and farmer woes continue to receive token references, and monsoon and drought continue to remain urban situations for most media. That said, should the season continue playing in extremes, at least it will make news, some of which might even be insightful and detailed.

In these times of climate change, it is important the media reports more on climate patterns. This is important for India because the impact of climate change will be compounded by the over-exploitation of natural resources which has already taken place. Take for example, the Assam floods. Some years ago, the head-lines screamed that it was the worst in a decade, and since then, every flood has been the worst in a decade and every summer the hottest in recorded history. As for the floods, it is uncertain whether the rainfall has been the heaviest in 10 years. Get the point, it is not always the worst flood just because it was the heaviest monsoon. Other factors make things worse. Assam then realized the ineffectiveness of its dyke-building exercise to combat floods. These embankments are now crumbling away and unleashing heavier damage than what a more gradual rise in water levels would have claimed. Then there is also the toying with nature aspect in which the embankments end up raising the river-bed by keeping silt trapped and settled in the river, and also robbing the flood plains of their usual quota of alluvial silt which have made them so fertile. Assam is now talking of bringing in interdisciplinary experts to help the State understand Brahmaputra better. They would also be well advised to invest in reliable advance warning systems instead of trying to fight the river. It should also look into the factors which could be contributing to more intensive floods of late. And this is something [the intensity, not the flooding that even Sikkim could do well to look into in more detail. The monsoon has been average at best for Sikkim this season. Surface run-off has consistently increased in the recent past much to the chagrin of farmers living around or below the urban slopes. Even a strong drizzle has the jhoras around Gangtok running big and roads turning into rapids. Most of the rainfall that the Gangtok hill receives nowadays follows the quickest course to empty into the Rani Khola. Gangtokians might not notice it, but the few farmers who still hold on to paddy terraces below town are feeling it. The barely month-old monsoon in Sikkim has been only slightly higher than normal for this period. Speak to the farmers around the Capital and they will counter that the rains have not been that good this year. For reference they will point out some of the terraces in their land holdings which are still not very wet even though paddy planting season has arrived. Asar ko Pandra Gatey [the 15th day of the month of Asar as per Vikram Sambad calendar], the date traditionally held as ideal for planting paddy, was on Friday and not all fields have got paddy planted. Although the skies have opened up, water has not been percolating enough, emptying out instead into drains and out into

Farmers here will also inform those interested that the village springs which used to start flowing with the first rains and remain in strength at least a month into winters, are now spewing water only in fits and starts - flowing big when it rains and drying up if it does not rain for even two days. This is not because of climate change, it is because of human disruption of the catchment areas. This might hold true for rural Sikkim as well, which is why the spring rejuvenation programme underway in the State needs to be guaranteed effective monitoring and flawless delivery. These are more important than awards. It will be through efforts like this that Sikkim will cushion the more damaging effects of urbanisation and also the impact of climate change. Conservation is more important now.

Recep Tayyip Erdoğan, the political giant with a cane

June 24, Turkish citizens voted in presidential and parliamentary snap elections, with a huge turnout. As expected, Recep Tayyip Erdoğan was elected president while his Islamo-na-tionalist bloc allies – the Justice and Development Party and the Nationalist Movement Party (MHP) – obtained a parliamentary majority.

While both victories were won by narrow margins, Erdogan took 52.5% of the vote, coming out well ahead of his opponents. The main opposition candidate, Muharrem Ince, obtained 31%, followed by the leader of new centrist party, Meral Akşener, with 7.3%, and pro-Kurdish leftist leader Selahattin Demirtaş, who received 8.4%. Erdoğan thus consolidated his rule further and now stands a better chance to implement his vision of a conservative Turkish state and society. In

this regard one might argue that the Turkish state and society will be more nationalis-

PRAISAL TO CRITICISM Enjoying the Western sup-port for his first two terms, . Erdoğan has been criticised by western scholars for its fre-quent use of less-than-democratic socio-political practices since 2011 and especially af-ter the Gezi Protests. BIASED MEDIA

Even if voters had a genuine choice in Turkey's most recent elections, the preliminary report from the Organisation for Security and Cooperation in Europe (OSCE) indicated that they weren't entirely fair: 'Incumbent president and ruling party enjoying an undue advantage, including in excessive coverage by government-affiliated public and private media out-

Indeed, an overwhelming 90% of media, including state-run agencies, supported Erdoğan and allo-cated extremely limited time and space to opposition

Interestingly, Muharrem Ince, the main opponent of Erdoğan, was given relatively more opportunities while Meral Akşener was deprived of media visibility. Perhaps, it had to do with Ince's being a more fitting opponent for the leadership style of President

Erdoğan who likes to play into social fault lines.

The leaders of the opposition parties declared no significant objection about the freedom of election. However, OCSE observers remarked that the incumbent president and the AKP members used "pressure on and intimidation of contestants and supporters [which] contributed to an atmosphere of fear and raise concerns about their equality of opportunity and ability to campaign in a fair and free atmosphere".

One candidate. Selahattin Demirtas, campaigned from prison, where he has been held for almost 20 months for alleged terrorist activities.

Some OSCE observers indicated that they were concerned about their personal well-being and felt threatened from time to time. Furthermore, a delegation from the French Communist Party, including a senator, was arrested while trying to observe par-liamentary and presidential polls on Sunday. While

A NEW ORDER FOR THE "NEW TURKEY"

Turkey's new political regime centres around a strong president who can pick his vice-president and cabinet members from outside the Parliament. He will be able to decide on major issues such as the budgets of state institutions, foreign policy and secu-rity matters, all without having to consult with the

However, the current configuration of seats in the Parliament indicates that Erdoğan will enjoy this new authority only as long as he remains within the political framework set by his major ally, the Nation-alist Movement Party (MHP), since Erdoğan's own (AKP) failed to obtain a parliamentary majority on its own. This alliance turns Erdoğan into a political giant that needs a cane to walk.

AN ELECTION OF MULTIPLE WINNERS

So is Erdoğan really the winner here? The surprising success of the National-

ist Movement Party (MHP), which took home 11% of the votes tells another story. Led by Devlet Bahçeli, the MHP will have a huge leverage on major decisions and force the AKP to lean toward a less Is lamist and more nationalist direction.

On the other side of the political spectrum, 30% of the Turkish votes trusted the populist social-democrat Muharrem İnce. The nominee of the main opposition party (CHP), Ince succeeded in bringing millions together in three ma-jor cities; İstanbul, İzmir and Ankara.

Ince ran his campaign as the "people's candidate" and managed to get 5% more vote than the established base of CHP. He has now in-

spired the opposition with hope and the party could attract new supporters.

Meral Akşener, leader of Good Party (İP) and the

only woman candidate, obtained 43 seats in the Parliament with 10% of the votes, establishing herself in a good position. Akşener picked up a significant number of her supporters from Erdoğan's AKP, indicating the possibility further success. Finally, Selahattin Demirtas, the imprisoned leader of pro-Kurd-ish and leftist Peoples' Democracy Party, maintained a moderate discourse and won 67 seats in the Parliament. This increase of seats marked a threshold not only for Kurds but also for left-leaning liberals. Overall, this election indicated that democracy in

its procedural sense is established in Turkey with all its deficits. How it plays out in terms of basic rights and freedoms in the coming period has yet to be seen. The Achilles' heel for Erdoğan, however, is going to be the economy.

Urban 'forests' can store almost as much carbon as tropical rainforests

 \mathbf{M} ost people would never think of London as a forest. Yet there are actually more trees in London than people. And now, new work by re-searchers at University College London shows that pockets of this urban jungle store as much carbon per hectare as tropical rainforests.

More than half of the world's

population lives in cities, and urban trees are critical to human health and well-being. Trees provide shade, mit-igate floods, absorb carbon dioxide (CO₂), filter air pollution and provide habitats for hirds mammals and other The ecosystem services pro rided by London's trees - that is, the benefits residents gain from the environment's natural processes – recently valued at £130m a year.

This may equate to less than £20 $\,$ a vear per tree, but the real value may

be much higher, given how hard it is to quantify the wider benefits of trees and how long they live. The cost of replacing a large, mature tree is many tens of thousands of pounds, and replacing it with one or more small saplings means you won't see the equivalent net benefit for many decades after.

THE TROUBLE WITH

MEASURING TREES
Trees absorb CO₂ during photo synthesis, which is then metabolised and turned into organic matter that makes up nearly half of their overall mass. Urban trees are particularly effective

cated so close to sources such as fossil fuel-burning transport and industrial

activity.

This carbon storage potential is an extremely important aspect of their value, but is very hard to quantify. A 120-year-old London plane tree can be 30 metres tall and weigh 40 tonnes or more, and some of the carbon in its tissues will have originated from Vic-torian coal fires.

Measuring the height of a tall tree

is difficult, because it's rarely clear exactly where the topmost point is; estimating its mass is even harder. Typically, tree mass is estimated by comparing the diameter of the trunk or the height of the tree to the mass of similar trees (ideally the same species), which have been cut down and weighed in the past. This process relies on the assumption that trees of a certain species have a clear size-to-mass ratio.

But a fascinating property of trees

on their environment. So inferring the mass of urban trees from their non-urban counterparts introduces large un-

LIDAR OVER LONDON

The UCL team use a combination of cutting-edge ground-based and airborne laser scanning techniques, to measure the biomass of urban trees much more accurately. Lidar (which stands for light detection and ranging) sends out hundreds of thousands of pulses of laser light every second and measures the time taken for reflected energy to return from objects up to

hundreds of metres away.

When mounted on a tripod on a city street, lidar builds up a millime-tre accurate 3D picture of everything it "sees", including trees. The team are using lidar methods, which they pio-neered to measure some of the world's largest trees, and applying them to trees in the university's local London Borough of Camden.

The UCL team used publicly available airborne lidar data collected by the UK Environment Agency, in con-junction with their ground measurements, to estimate biomass of all the 85,000 trees across Camden. These lidar measurements help to quantify the differences between urban and non-urban trees, allowing scientists to come up with a formula predicting the difference in size-to-mass ratio, and thus measuring the mass of urban

and thus measuring the mass of urban trees more accurately.

The findings show that Camden has a median carbon density of around 50 tonnes of carbon per hectare (t/ha), rising to 380 t/ha in spots such as Hampstead Heath and Highgate Cemetery - that's equivalent to values seen in temporate and tropical minforcets. in temperate and tropical rainforests. Camden also has a high carbon density, compared to other cities in Europe and elsewhere. For example, Barcelona and Berlin have mean carbon densities of 7.3

and 11.2 t/ha respectively; ma-jor cities in the US have values of 7.7 t/ha and in China the equiva-

lent figure is 21.3 t/ha A STORY TO TELL

According to WHO, drinking arsenic-rich wa-ter over a long period results in various health hazards such as cancer of skin, bladder, kidney and lung.

the NGO that introduced the concept of "Sulabh Sauchalya" in the country decades ago, introduced the 'Sulabh Jal' project.

The 'Sulabh Jal' project converts contaminat ed pond water into safe drinking water that can be sold at only 50 paise per litre in villages and nearby cities of the country, the project in-charge said.

In the innovative model, water is taken from a river or a pond, it goes through various stages of purification, Sarkar added. "This is the first time

in the world that we have succeeded in producing pure drinking water at a very nominal cost and villagers may get direct henefit" Pathak said adding it is being sold at 50 paise a litre after including other costs like distribution and storing.

Arunachal govt hands over student's death case to CBI



ITANAGAR, JUN 29 (PTI): The Arunachal Pradesh government has conceded the demands of various students' organizations that sought a CBI probe into a nine-monthold case of a student's death in Tawang district and handed over the case

to the central agency. Toko Yame, a Class
XII student of Government Higher Secondary School in Tawang, went missing under mysterious circumstances on September 16 following scuffle between boys of his school and that of Jawahar Navodaya Vidyalava (INV).

His bruised and semi-decomposed body was found a week later on September 23 at Biga waterfall, near JNV, in the district.

A special investiga-tion team, formed to probe the case, had arrested 20 people in connection with the case. They were later granted bail by the court.

In a statement issued yesterday, the home de-partment said the "seriousness and sensitiveness nature" of the matter prompted the state government to hand over the case to the Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI).

Call to quash Citizenship Amendment Bill grows louder in Assam

GUWAHATI, JUN 29 (PTI): The brewing discontent against the Citizenship (Amendment) Bill, 2016 surfaced yet various organisations, including a student ' again in Assam today as including a students' union, took to the streets here, urging the government to accord constitutional safeguards to the indigenous people.

The north-east region is not a "dumping ground" for illegal Bangladeshis, Bhattacharva said.

"Assam Chief Minister Sarbananda Sonowal had been saying that people of the state should have faith in the government, but we are worried as the existence of tribal people here has come under

threat," he stated. The bill, introduced in the Lok Sabha to amend the Citizenship Act 1955, proposes to make illegal migrants of six communities -- Hindus, Sikhs, Buddhists, Jains, Parsis and Christians -- eligible for Indian citizenship after six years of residence in the country.

The central govern-ment should initiate a bilateral dialogue with the Bangladeshi government to ensure deportation of Bangaldeshis, who have been putting up illegally in the region, he said.

"It is high time the debate over the controversial Citizenship Bill is put to rest. The Centre should introduce con-

Upset with newspaper, gunman kills 5 in newsroom shooting in US

WASHINGTON, JUN 29 (PTI): A white gunman long-standing grudge against a newspa-per in the US city of Annapolis blasted his way through its newsroom with a shotgun and smoke grenades, killing at least five people, mostly jour-nalists, in what police called a "targeted attack"


The shooting at the Capital Gazette newspaper in Annapolis, Mary-land, nearly 50 km from Washington, that also injured three others, is said to be one of the worst at-tacks on the media in decades in the US.

The shooter identified as Jarrod Warren Ramos, 38, has been arrested and is being charged with five counts

of first-degree murder.

Ramos had previous ly filed a defamation suit gainst the newspaper in 2012, court records show

China declines to comment on FATF placing Pak on 'grey list'; praises its counter-terror effort

KJM VARMA Beijing, Jun 29 (PTI):

China today declined to comment on Pakistan being placed on the grey list for failing to curb anti-terror financing by the Financial Action Task Force, but heaped customary praise on its clo ally, saying the world should recognise "enor-mous efforts and sacrifices" made by Islamabad to

combat terrorism.

In a blow to Pakistan, global financial watchdog FATF placed it on the grey list for failing to curb anti-terror financing despite Islamabad submitting a 26-point action plan and launching a concerted diplomatic effort to avert the decision.

"We will not make

comment on the decision of the task force. But we understand Pakistan has made enormous efforts for the counter-terrorism and made great sacrific-es," Chinese Foreign Ministry spokesman Lu Kang said at a media briefing the FATF's decision.

"The international community should view this in an objective and just way. The international community should give more support and recognition to Pakistan." he said

Lu said Pakistan's effort in counter-terrorism has not only won recog-nition from China, but also from many countries around the world.

We always believe Pakistan government and people have made enormous efforts and sacrifice on counter-terrorism, and the international community should fully recognise this." he said, reiterating China's oft repeated stand praising Pakistan's record on

He said Pakistan in his recent years has tak-en positive measures to enhance financial regulation, combat terrorism financing and made very important progress.

"We hope all relevant parties can view the efforts made by Pakistan in objective way instead of accusing and pressuring Pakistan, China and Pakistan have an all-weather strategic cooperative part-nership, and China is willing to enhance cooperation on counter-terrorism with Pakistan," he said.

The placement Pakistan on the grey list of the FATF could hurt Pakistan's economy as well as its international standing.

Pakistan had tried hard to avoid being added to a list of countries deemed non-compliant with anti-money laundering and terrorist financing rules.

The FATF is an in-

ter-governmental body established in 1989 to combat money laundering, terrorist financing and oth-er related threats to the integrity of the international ncial system.

EU leaders seal migration deal after marathon talks

BRUSSELS, Jun 29 (AFP): EU leaders clinched a hardwon migration deal during all-night talks today that It-aly's hardline new premier said meant his country was "no longer alone" in shoul-dering the responsibility for migrants.

Italian Prime Minister Giuseppe Conte, who heads a month-old anti-immigration govern-ment, had vetoed joint conclusions for the entire agenda of the summit in Brussels until his demands were finally met before dawn.

Italy has turned away a series of migrant boats in recent weeks, spark-ing a fresh political row three years after the bloc faced its biggest ever migration crisis.

"Today Italy is no longer alone. We are sat-isfied," Conte, a former law professor who until recently was a virtual political unknown, told

reporters following nine hours of talks described as "virulent".

The 28 leaders agreed to consider setting up "disembarkation plat-forms" outside the bloc. most likely in north Africa, in a bid to discourage migrants boarding EU-bound smuggler boats.

Member countries could also set up migrant processing centres -- but only on a voluntary basis -- to determine whether they returned home as economic migrants or admitted as refugees in willing states.

The leaders also offered a concession to German Chancellor Angela Merkel, who faces a rebellion from within her own coalition government, with moves to stop migrants registered in Italy and other EU countries from moving to

Merkel welcomed the

deal, but acknowledged the hard work needed with some hard choices left for later

"I am optimistic after today that we can now really continue to work although we have a lot to do, even bridging the dif-

ferent views," Merkel said.
She had earlier
warned that "migration could end up determin-ing Europe's destiny" if it failed to reach an agree-The summit conclu-

sions called on member countries to take "all necessary" steps to stop migrants initially arriving in countries such as Italy and Greece from moving

on to Germany.

After allowing more than one million asylum seekers into Germany since 2015, Merkel faces an end-of-month deadline from her own interi-or minister to seal pacts to curb so-called secondary migration.

Italy's stance has re-vived political tensions in the EU, despite the fact that arrivals have dipped by 96 percent since the peak of Europe's migra-tion crisis in 2015, and sparked warnings that authoritarian move-ments will take advantage of any failure to tackle migration.

Conte came to Brus-

sels emboldened by the announcement of an up-coming visit to US President Donald Trump, who has hailed Rome's tough stance, and who himself blocked the conclusions of a recent G7 leaders meeting on trade.

The Italian govern-ment demanded "concrete action" from other countries to help in the same way that they had after it refused to admit the rescue ships Aquari-us, which docked later in Spain, and Lifeline, which

went to Malta.

EU President Donald Tusk issued a fresh warning on the need for action on migration to stave off rising populism and authoritarianism that "the stakes are high and time is short".

"Some may think I am too tough in my proposals on migration, but trust me, if we don't agree on them, then you'll see some really tough proposals from some really tough guys," the former Polish premier added.

But the leaders failed to agree on long-stalled plans to overhaul the bloc's asylum rules, which say that migrants must be dealt with by the first country in which they arrive.

The plans include a permanent scheme to share migrants arriving in Italy and Greece around all other EU countries.

Former countries in Eastern Europe, particularly the authoritarian governments of Hungary and Poland, im-

placably oppose the plan. Brexit was meanwhile largely relegated to the sidelines of this summit, with British Prime Minister Theresa May set to update leaders after admitting the need to make "faster" progress as she arrived at the venue.

EU leaders are ex-pected on Friday to say that talks, which have stalled on the issue of the Irish border, are running out of time to get a deal.

But in a light-hearted bid to ease tensions, Belgian premier Charles Michel surprised May with a gift of a Belgian football shirt.

A World Cup clash between Belgium and England coincided with summit last night. Belgium won 1-0.
