The amendment to the rules is in line with the assurance given by Chief Minister Pawan Chamling on the floor of the Legislative Assembly and public functions several times, stating that locals will not be encouraged to enter casinos or online gaming zones.

The State Government was attacked by opposition parties gent rules and restrictions on local people entering casinos and other online gaming zones.

Today. Directorate of Sikkim State Lotteries under Fi-nance, Revenue & Expenditure Department notified that the existing rules of the Sikkim Online Gaming [Regulation] Amendment Rules 2009 Rule 13 is amended under caption

'Prohibition of Entry'. Rule 13, Sub-Rule [2] says that in order to safeguard the

persons having a photo identity card, either voter identity card or Aadhaar Card, or Passport issued from outside the State of Sikkim will be permitted into the gaming zones.

The State Government has also prohibited persons below the age of 18 years and said that if licensee is in contravention of the Sub-Rules (1) & (2) of Rule 13, it will result in suspension or cancellation of the license.



troduced by Minister of State for Finance Pon Radhakrishnan, provides for punishment for fraudulent default in repayment to depositors and attachment of assets of entities engaged in such activities.

"The Bill seeks to put in place a mechanism by which the depositors can be repaid without delay by attaching the assets of the defaulting establishments," said the Statement of Objects and Reasons of the bill.

Non-banking entities are allowed to raise deposits from the public un-der various laws enacted by the central as well as

state governments. However, the ulatory framework for deposit taking activi-ties in the country is not seamless as regulators operate in well defined areas within the financial sector by regulating particular kind of entities or activities.

As there are considerable differences in state laws in protecting interest of depositors, it has become neces-sary to have a "central legislation to ensure a comprehensive ban on unregulated deposit tak-ing activity and for its ef-

fective enforcement", the bill said.

It prescribes mone tary penalty and jail term which could be extended up to 10 years for duping gullible depositors. The monetary penalty could be as high as Rs 50 crore.

The government has proposed these stringent provisions in wake of several ponzi schemes where gullible investors, mostly poor people, were defrauded of amounts running into thousands of crores of rupees. Generally. ponzi

schemes are illegal mon-ey pooling activities wherein gulible inves-tors are lured with promises of high returns on investments in a short

The bill also proposes setting up of competent authorities by state governments to ensure payment of deposits in the event of default by a deposit taking establishment.

Companies or institutions running unregulated schemes exploit existing regulatory gaps and lack of strict administrative measures to dupe poor and gullible people of their hard-earned savings.

The bill is aimed at tackling the menace of illicit deposit taking activities in the country.

the rape and murder of a minor girl in Kathua in Jammu and Kashmir and the rape of a woman in Unnao in Uttar Pradesh.

The Cabinet gave its approval to the draft bill prepared by the Home Ministry, Prasad said.

The bill stipulates stringent stringent punishment for perpetrators of rape, particularly of girls below 12 years. Death sen-tence has been provided for rapists of girls under

12 years, an official said. The minimum pun-

ishment in case of rape of women has been increased from rigorous imprisonment of seven years to 10 years, ex-tendable to life imprison-

According to the bill, in case of rape of a girl under 16 years, the min-imum punishment has been increased from 10 years to 20 years, extendable to imprisonment for rest of life, which means

jail term till the convict's "natural life".

The punishment for gang rape of a girl below 16 years will invariably be imprisonment for the rest of life of the convict, the official said.

In case of rape of a girl under 12 years, the minimum punishment will be 20 years which may go up to life in prison or death sentence. Gang rape of a girl under 12 years of age will invite the punishment of a jail term for the rest of life or death sentence.

The measure also provides for speedy investigation and trial. The investigation in all cases of rape will have to be mandatorily completed within two months, the official said. The deadline for the

completion of trial in all rape cases will be two months. A six-month time limit for the dis-posal of appeals in rape cases has also been pre-

There will also be no provision for anticipatory bail for a person accused of rape or gang rape of a girl under 16 years.

It has also been prescribed that a court has to give notice of 15 days to a public prosecutor and the representative of the victim before deciding bail applications in case of rape of a girl under 16 years of age, the official said.

LS passes bill to end no detention policy in schools

(PTI): A bill to amend the Right to Education (RTE) Act to abolish the 'no detention policy' in schools was passed in the Lok Sabha today. Replying to the de-

hate in the Lok Sahha on The Right of Children to Free and Compulsory Education (second amend-ment) Bill, 2017, Union Human Resource Development Minister Prakash Javadekar said that it will be at the discretion of the states whether to contin-ue with no detention or

The states, he said, will decide at what level and who will conduct the examination, the minister said.

"It is a broken education system. We have to rebuild our education system," he added.

Under the current provisions of the RTE Act, no student can be detained till class 8 and all students are promoted to the next grade. The minister said that

in some of the states like Sikkim, Kerala and Telangana, the students .who were studying in private schools, have come back to government schools.

"Teacher training, quality and accountabil-

ity are most important," Javadekar said.

Stating that there was no shortages of teachers, minister, however, added that the deployment of teachers was not right.

While moving the bill in the Lok Sabha, the minister said, "It is a very important legislation and a majority of state governments supported this Centre's proposal. It brings accountability in our elementary education system."
Referring

no-detention policy in the Act, the Minister said "schools have become only schools for mid-day meal as education and

learning are missing".
This bill has been analysed by the standing committee and the panel also recom-mended bringing back the concept of detention schools, the Minister added.

The policy had been rought as it was felt that compelling children to repeat a class was demotivating, often forcing them to abandon school. he said.

This Bill provides for a regular examination in classes 5 and 8 and if the child fails, he or she

shall be given additional opportunity for re-examination in two months' , Javadekar said.

Speaking on the bill, Congress MP KC Venugo pal said that the proposed legislation lacks "clarity".

"This bill needs clar-ity. It should be clarified that whether the Centre or the states will conduct the exams," Venugopal said

He also demanded a hike in the allocation for Centre's flagship programme Sarv Shiksha Abhiyaan.

Echoing similar sentiments, BJD MP Bhartruhari Mahtab said the

uniform guidelines for conducting exams and how the exams should be conducted.

Arvind Sawant of Shiv Sena and Saugat Roy of the TMC also lent support to the bill.

Sawant asked the government to focus on primary education.

Roy praised Ja-vadekar for his "non-confrontationist" approach as he supported the bill.

Children often do not study if there are no exams, he said, adding that education system is currently in a bad shape were going down due to non-detention policy.

"The education system is like an inverted pyramid and adequate focus has not been given to primary education," he said.

Supriya Sule of NCP also supported the bill and said introduction of

exams was necessary.

Prem Singh Chandu maira of Akali Dal and Sanjay Jaiswal of BIP also spoke in support of the

India' first comprehensive antitrafficking bill introduced in LS

New Delhi, Jul 18 (PTI): India' first comprehensive anti-trafficking bill seeking to deal with the crime from the point of prevention, protection and re-habilitation was introduced in the Lok Sabha today.

The Trafficking of Persons (Prevention, Protection and Rehabilitation) Bill, 2018, was introduced by Women and Child Development Minister Maneka Gandhi.

The bill was approved by the Cabinet in February and while it was hailed by many as a path breaking legislation, it had faced severe criticism from activ ists on the ground that it violated the rights of sex workers and threatened free speech and labour rights.

Besides taking up prevention, rescue and rehabilitation, it covers aggravated forms of trafficking such as forced

labour, begging and marriage.
"This bill is a resounding victory for children, women and the marchers of Bharat Yatra I thank PM @Narendra-Modi @PMOIndia for responding to de mand of 12 lakh Indians who marched for 12,000 km across 22 states to demand trafficking bill," Kailash Satyarthi tweeted minutes after the bill was

The bill provides for confidentiality of victims, witnesses and complainants and time-bound trials and repatriation of the victims.

It proposes to create institutional mechanisms at district, state and central levels. It calls for punishment ranging from 10 years of rigorous im prisonment and a fine not less than Rs one lakh.

However, various groups have pointed out that the bill does not mention terms like "sexual exploitation" or 'prostitution" and is unfavourable towards the transgender community, because they are not conclusively covered under the bill.

Currently, India uses different laws to deal with human trafficking cases depending on the facts of the case.

The police sometimes uses the Immoral Traffic Prevention Act to raid brothels and rescue' the women in it while in other cases, the Protection of Children from Sexual Offences (POCSO) is used to prosecute traffickers while in some cases labour laws are invoked

This bill, when passed will be the only legislation dealing with all form of human trafficking.

Give counselling to minor rape victim in 24 hours, Madras HC tells legal authority

CHENNAI, JUL 18 (PTI): The Madras High Court today directed the District Legal Services Authority (DLSA) to provide counselling within 24 hours to a 11-year old hearing impaired girl who was allegedly sexually

assaulted by 17 men here. The first bench comprising Chief Justice Indira Banerjee and Justice P T Asha gave the direction when a mention was made about the incident and also the

Allow Local Adaptations of Centralized Models

The top-down model needs tweaking to deliver better

Given the energy with which Sikkim is hosting programmes under the Beti Bachao, Beti Padhao scheme, it would appear that the State has a major problem when it comes to ensuring access and care for its daughters. Sikkim has many problems, some even gender related, but letting the girl child be born, survive and receive an education is not one of them. An important issue no doubt if the national scenario is taken into consideration, but in a State with no reported case of female infanticide, one might wonder at the necessity of such elaborate events and robust funding on what, let us accept it, is a redundant issue as far as Sikkim is concerned. The government agencies too realize this awkward emphasis and do, it appears, try and work around it to ensure that the earmarked funds end up coming to some use. So one has in-genious ways in which the BB-BP funds are being utilized. Or the Swachh Bharat Abhiyan obsession in what is the country's first Nirmal Rajya!

This is shared here to highlight the disconnected-

ness with which centralized planning looks out for the country. India's daughters, by and large, need saving and access to education, but that is not necessarily the case everywhere that the programme is being forcefed. In areas like Sikkim, it could have easily been ratcheted up some notches to speak more about gender equality, empowerment and rights; it could have moved beyond the unimaginatively routine official events and roped in activists and women leaders to push the envelope of gender rights a little further. But that did not happen. May be its time will come too, but this reference was made not to speak only about the BB-BP initiative, and is cited here to highlight how the pressures of implementing imported models saps ev eryone of the energy to work out local solutions for local issues. For example, while a girl-child's right to live is not threatened in Sikkim, her right to education often gets compromised; securing the best education for the daughters when a choice has to be made is quite often sidestepped. It is in this direction that Sik kim's energies need to be focused more and it would be unfortunate if the BB-BP was deployed only to reinforce an existing access to literacy. In that sense, it would helped more if centralized planning provided the overall ideology and allowed local adaptations to

Something on these lines was attempted a few years ago when Delhi announced that it was looking at releasing funds directly to the gram panchayats based on developmental agendas set up by these micro units in line with the developmental push. That said, the decentralisation process already underway in some states, including Sikkim, will achieve little if the decentralised components are not allowed the freedom to change, adapt and modulate projects and schemes to suit the needs, aspirations and ground realities of the areas they represent. Agreed, if this happens, the control that central agencies have over line organisations will weaken, but that is how things should be when one is decentralizing anyways. The parent body should decide policy and leave the implementation to the grassroots level workers who understand the severity of the problems and know which solutions will work. They are not handicapped for initiative or skill, it is only access to funds that limits their effectiveness; as does a more trusting environment which is why they are straitjacketed with guidelines and instructions. Give them the funds and an overarching policy framework to work under and see how everything that the top-down model failed to deliver can actually be rather easily achieved.

How the latest tech and some healthy activism can curb fake news

The Cambridge English dictionary defines it as "false stories that appear to the the past of the The term "fake news" has become ubiquitous be news, spread on the internet or using other media, usually created to influence political views or

As part of a global push to curb the spread of deliberate misinformation, researchers are trying to understand what drives people to share fake news and how its endorsement can propagate through a

But humans are complex social animals, and technology misses the richness of human learning and

interactions.

That's why we decided to take a different approach in our research. We used the latest techniques from artificial intelligence to study how support for -or opposition to - a piece of fake news can spread within a social network. We believe our model is more realistic than previous approaches because individuals in our model learn endogenously from their interactions with the envi-ronment and not just follow prescribed rules. Our novel approach allowed us to learn a number of new

things about how fake news is spread.

The main take away from our research is that when it comes to preventing the spread of fake news, privacy is key. It is important to keep your personal data to yourself and be cautious when providing information to large social media websites or search engines.

The most recent wave of technological innova

tions has brought us the data-centric web 2.0 and with it a number of fundamental challenges to user privacy and the integrity of news shared in social networks. But as our research shows, there's reason to be optimistic that technology, paired with a healthy dose of individual activism, might also provide solutions to the scourge of fake news

MODELLING HUMAN BEHAVIOUR

Existing literature models the spread of fake news in a social network in one of two ways.

In the first instance, you could model what hap-pens when people observe what their neighbours do and then use this information in a complicated calculation to optimally update their beliefs about

The second approach assumes that people follow a simple majority rule: everyone does what most of their neighbours do.

But both approaches have their shortcomings. They cannot mimic what happens when someone's mind is changed after several conversations or interactions.

Our research differed. We modelled humans as agents who develop their own strategies on how to update their views on a piece of news given their neighbours' actions. We then introduced an adversary that tried to spread fake news and compared how efficient the adversary was when he had

learn from their neighbours, and so on, everybody who detects and flags fake news can help prevent the spread of fake news on the network. When we modelled how the spread of fake news can be prevented, we found the single best way was to allow users to provide feedback to their friends about a piece of news they shared.

Beyond pointing out fake news, you can also praise a friend when they share a well researched and balanced piece of quality journalism. Importantly, this praise can happen even when you disagree with the conclusion or political point of view expressed in the article. Studies in human psy-

chology and reinforceme learning show that people adapt their behaviour in response to negative and positive feedback – particularly when this feedback comes from within their social circle.

The second big lesson was: keep your data to yourself.

The web 2.0 was built on the premise that companies offer free services in exchange for users' data. Billions followed the siren's call. turning Facebook. Google, Twitter, and Linke-dIn into multi-billion dollar behemoths. But as these companies grew, more and more data was collected. Some estimate that as much as 90% of all the world's data has only been

created in the past few years.

Do not give your personal information away easily or freely. Whenever possible, use tools that are fully encrypted and very little information is collected about you online. There is a more secure and more privacy-focused alternative for most applications, from search engines to messaging apps. Social media sites don't yet have privacy-focused

alternatives. Luckily the emergence of blockchain has provided a new technology that could solve the privacy-profitability paradox. Instead of having to trust Facebook to keep your data secure, you can now put it on a decentralised blockchain that was designed to operate as a trustless environment.

knowledge about the strength of other agents' beliefs compared to when he didn't.

So in a real world example, an adversary determined to spread fake news might first read your Facebook profile and see what you believe, then tailor his disinformation to try and match your beliefs to increase the likelihood that you share the fake news he sent to you.

We learnt a few new things about how fake news is spread. For example, we show that provid-ing feedback about news that's been shared means that its easier for people to detect fake news.

Our work also suggests that artificially injecting certain amount of fake news into a social network can train users to better spot fake news.

Crucially, we can also use models like ours to me up with strategies on how to curb the spread of fake news.

There are three things we have learned from this research about what everyone can do to stop fake news.

The Trump-Putin summit: A stooge at work?

There were at least six topics that Donald Trump could have forcefully raised with Russia's Vladimir Putin at Monday's so-called summit in Helsinki, Finland. Any other president would have.

First was Russian meddling in the 2016 presidential election.
Second was Russia's presence in

Third was the unlawful Russian

nexation of Crimea. Fourth was Russia's intrusion into

eastern Ukraine. Fifth was Russia's continued and ominous expressions of "concern" for Russian speakers in the Baltic states, particularly Latvia and Estonia, that

echo some of the rhetoric prior to Pu-

tin's actions in Ukraine.
Sixth was Russia's possible help to North Korea given Putin, after all, was reportedly the one who suggested Trump scrap joint U.S.-South Korea military exercises

But it's the first lost opportunity that was most astonishing. Trump didn't criticize the Russians Instead he backed Putin's laughable denials that Russia had meddled in American politics, sneering at U.S. intelligence and justice officials who beg to differ.

Trump was given plenty of ammunition to confront Putin by the remarkable set of indictments issued by Special Counsel Robert Mueller last week in his ongoing investigation into Russian involvement in the 2016 presidential elec-

The indictments contain such detailed information that they, in effect, sent a message to the Kremlin and its military intelligence

branch, the GRU, all but declaring: "We know who you are and where you live.'

'A POWERFUL TOOL'

In the hands of a legitimate president, the indictments would have been a powerful tool at such a summit. Trump's refusal to accept the information, and likely any additional information, from his own intelligence community in order to stand beside Putin and deny Russian involvement has sent the world into shock.

But not yours truly.
As an expert in U.S.-Russia relations who advised the Bill Clinton White House, I believe that what Trump did is perfectly understandable if you believe, as I have argued recently, that he's a Russian stooge.

Mounting evidence suggests his campaign was helped by Russia. Several key figures associated with him are being investigated; some of the accused are behind bars already. Russia very likely has compromising material on him. Most importantly, Trump, a man of utter venality, has been supported by Russian money for years — the only question is how much.

Trump is also a man whose brain

apparently has a disconnect.

How else can one explain him giving a recorded interview that demeaned British Prime Minister The-resa May, his hostess the following day, and then claiming it was fake news (a Russian concept)? This is not stupidity. This is brain malfunction.

So what could one have reasonably expected from Trump? After all, he sought a one-on-one with Putin, probably to seek approval for stooge duties well done, and more money — perhaps even a Trump Tower Mos-

His interpreter is to be debriefed, so we may learn the details. I would not be surprised if the Russians re-corded the exchange and release it to embarrass Trump, just as they released the transcripts and footage of his meeting with high-ranking Russian officials the day after he fired FBI

MIXED EMOTIONS

They clearly have conflicted feelings about their probable stooge, perhaps preferring to see him replaced with someone a little more stable and ef-

I also expect to hear more damage, more abject abasement on the other points that I listed.

I confess that while I am not shocked, I am surprised at the magnitude of the event. In a presidency marked by a near daily barrage of the ugly and incompetent, Monday's

summit may be one fiasco too far.

Even many of the Republicans in Congress seem to sense that Trump has entered a realm where they themselves wish not to go. The former CIA director John Brennan has called Trump's actions at this summit treasonous.

Treason is defined as aiding the enemy. Will aiding the adversary suf-fice? I would say yes. It's a fitting label for an atrocious act. No one, even anyone in his "base," can deny that he is failing to live up to his oath of office.

WHAT TO DO?

The cabinet can invoke the 25th amendment and remove him by declaring him unfit for office — not a hard case to make.

The Republicans in the House of

Representatives could screw up their nerve and draw up articles of impeachment to pass on to the Senate for a trial

We could all wait until Novem ber, hoping that the Russians will not corrupt that round of voting and pray that a Democratic Congress will do what the GOP should have done a

year ago.
Perhaps the military will give Trump a parade and remove him. After all, extraordinary violations of norms call for extraordinary remedies.

Then again, when he fully absorbs the outcry, Trump will likely just utter two dismissive words: "Fake news."

When given opportunity in a one-off game my mindset is always to win the game for team when I step on the field. While playing this game, it was the same. Also when I am put in different teams, whether I am put in India-A or in domestic cricket, it is always the same, he said.

India were restricted to 256-8 after being put into bat, and Thakur along with the rest of the bowling attack lacked penetra-tion against Root and Eoin Morgan who put on an unbeaten 186-run partnership for the

Google hit with record 4.3-bn-euro EU fine over Android

BRUSSELS, JUL 18 (AFP): European slapped Google with a huge 4.34-billion-euro fine for abusing the dominance of its Android onerating system today in the biggest antitrust penalty in the bloc's history.

EU Competition Commissioner Margrethe Vestager said the US tech giant illegally used Android's near-monopoly to boost usage of its own search engine and

The decision, which follows a three-year investigation, comes as fears of a transatlantic trade war mount due to President Donald Trump's decision to impose tariffs on European steel and aluminium ex-

"Today the commission has decided to fine Google 4.34 billion eu-ros (USD 5 billion) for breaching EU antitrust rules," Vestager told a press conference in Brus-

"Google has engaged in illegal practices to cement its dominant market position in internet search." Vestager, who has taken on a string of Silicon Valley titans as EU antitrust chief, said Google "must put an effective end to this conduct within 90 days or face penalty payments" of up to five percent of its average daily turnover.

The new sanction nearly doubles the previous record EU anti-trust fine of 2.4 billion euros, which also targeted Google, in that case for the Silicon Valley titan's shopping cor service in 2017. comparison

Google immediately said it would appeal the fine "Android has created more choice for ev-eryone, not less," Google spokesman Al Verney

"A vibrant ecosystem, rapid innovation and lower prices are clas-sic hallmarks of robust competition. We will appeal the Commission's decision." Danish former minister Vestager spoke by telephone with Google chief Sundar Pichai last night to tell him about Vestager said Goo-gle had shut out rivals by forcing major phone makers including South

Korea's Samsung and China's Huawei to pre-install its search engine Chrome Google browser, thereby freezing out rivals.

They were also made to set Google Search as the default, as a condition of licensing some Google apps. Google Search and Chrome are as a result pre-installed on the "sig-nificant majority" of de-vices sold in the EU, the European Commission

Google also prevented manufacturers from selling smartphones that run on rival operating systems based on the An droid open source code, it said.

Google finally gave "financial incentives" to manufacturers and mo-bile network operators if they pre-installed Google Search on their devices,

Google provides Android free to smartphone manufacturers and generates most of its revenue from selling adver-tisements that appear along with search results.

Under EU rules Goo-gle could have been fined up to 10 per cent of parent company Alphabet's annual revenue, which hit USD 110.9 billion in

Vestager's campaign against Silicon Valley giants in her four years as the 28-nation European Union's competition commissioner has won praise in Europe but angered Washington.

Brussels has repeat-edly targeted Google over the past decade amid concerns about the Sili-con Valley giant's dominance of internet search across Europe, where it commands about 90 per cent of the market.

As well as the Android and Google Shopping files, it also has a third investigation under way, into Google's AdSense

advert-placing business.

Women have constitutional right to enter Sabarimala temple: SC

New Delhi, Jul 18 (PTI): The Supreme Court today said women have the constitutional right to enter Sabarimala temple in Kerala and pray like men without being discriminated against.

A five-judge Constitution bench headed by Chief Justice Dipak Misra, which is hearing a peti-tion challenging the decision of the Devaswom board banning entry of women of age group 10-50 years, said that even if there was no law, the women cannot be discriminated against with regard to offering prayer in a temple.

'When a man can enter, a woman can also go. What applies to a man, applies to a woman also," the bench also comprising justices R F Nariman, A M Khanwilkar, D Y Chandrachud and Indu Malhotra

"The right to enter a temple is not dependent on a legislation. It is



said, adding that this right is en-

the Constitution.

The top court was informed by the Kerala govt that it also supage groups in the temple.

The bench then referred to the contrary affidavits of the Kerala government which had in 2015 had supported the entry of women but made a U-turn in 2017 and opposed the entry.

The counsel for the Kerala gov-

ernment said that it would go by its first affidavit and support the cause of women.

"You are changing with the changing times," the bench remarked

Senior advocate Indira Jaising, appearing for one of the interve-nors, assailed the practice and said that the ban on the entry of women of certain age groups was violative of various fundamental rights including Article 17 which deals with untouchability.

She also referred to the defini-tion of term Hindu under various

statutes and said that the women were discriminated against not on the ground of sex but because of menstruation.

Senior advocate Raju Ram-chandran, who is assisting the court as amicus curiae, supported the entry of women into the temple and said that denial of the right to entry of women was violative of fundamental rights.

The hearing on the plea filed by petitioners Indian Young Lawyers Association and others, remained inconclusive and would continue

The apex court had on October 13 last year referred the issue to a Constitution bench after framing five "significant" questions including whether the practice of banning entry of women into the temple amounted to discrimination and violated their fundamental rights under the Constitution.

16 drown, 30 missing as refugee boat sinks off north Cyprus: media

ISTANBUL, JUL 18 (AFP): Sixteen refugees were drowned and around 30 missing today after their boat sank in the Mediterranean off the north of Cyprus, Turkish state media reports said.

The boat was carrying 150 people when it went down off the village of Yeni Erenkoy in the breakaway Turkish Cyprio-t-controlled portion of the island, which is only recognised by Ankara.

Over 100 people were rescued in a joint operation by Turkish Cypriot and Turkish coast-guards after the boat sank off the village of Gialousa (Yeni Erenkoy in Turkish) on the panhandle Karpas peninsula, reports added.

Search efforts were under way to recover the missing with commercial vessels also taking part, the reports added.

Turkey's DHA news agency said that the refugees were Syrians seeking to go to Europe but this has yet to be confirmed.

Cyprus, some 160 kilometres from Syria's coast, has not seen the massive inflow of migrants experienced by Turkey, Greece and Italy although asylum applications have been rising

The island has been divided since 1974 when Turkish troops invaded and occupied the northern third of the island in response to a Greek military junta-sponsored coup.

Turkey has however been one of the hubs for refugees fleeing Syria and other trouble spots like Afghanistan and Iraq.

S Korea minister warns of fallout of US-China trade war

SEOUL, JUL 18 (AFP): South Korea's finance minister warned that an all-out trade war between the US and China would have grim implications for the country as he lowered this year's growth outlook today.

The world's 11th largest economy is expected to grow 2.9 per cent this year, lower than an earlier estimate of three per cent, Kim Dong-yeon said, citing slowing demand at home and abroad as well as rising unemployment.

The latest estimate is also lower than last year's figures, when the export-reliant economy expanded 3.1 per cent, and comes as the South's top two trading partners China and the US engage in a bitter spat that has seen them impose hefty tariffs on billions of dollars in goods.

"The economic situation down the road does not seem to be bright," Kim told reporters.

"The situation may get worse if anxiety in the international financial markets spreads due to the US-China trade dispute... and market and corporate sentiment does not improve," he said.

Overseas shipments

account for more than half of the South's economy, with more than a quarter of exports shipped to China and about 12 per cent to the US.

Kim vowed to "closely monitor international trade situations, including the US-China trade row" and announced measures to encourage job creation and spur domestic spending. US President Donald

US President Donald Trump has taken a confrontational "America First" stance on trade policy, imposing steep tariffs on steel and aluminum, which angered allies and prompted swift retaliation, as well as 25 per cent duties on USD 34 billion of Chinese goods, with more on the

way.
China has matched US tariffs dollar-for-dollar and threatened to take further measures, while US exports face retaliatory border taxes from Canada, Mexico and the European Union.

The International Monetary Fund said this week the growing trade confrontation is the "greatest near-term threat to global growth" and in the worst case could cut a half point off world GDP.

Thai cave boys leave hospital ahead of press conference

Chiang Rai, Jul 18 (AFP): Twelve boys and their football coach who survived a highly dangerous and dramatic rescue from a flooded Thai cave were discharged from hospital today ahead of a press conference where they will tell their incredible story for the first

An AFP correspondent on the scene saw the team, who were wearing football kits, board three minibuses at the hospital in northern Thailand's Chiang Rai

The footballers from the "Wild Boars" club are being discharged a day earlier than previously announced, with authorities hoping a question and answer session will satisfy -- at least temporarily -- the intense media speculation that has accompanied their epic underground ordeal.

The boys are due to return to their homes later today.

"The reason to hold this evening press conference is so media can ask them questions and after that they can go back to live their normal lives without media bothering them," Thailand's chief government spokesman Sunsern Kaewkumnerd told AFP.

Called "Sending the Wild Boars Home" and broadcast on major television channels, the session will last for about 45 minutes, Sunsern said, adding that it would be conducted in an informal style with a moderator.

The briefing will be closely monitored, with experts warning of possible long-term distress from the more than two weeks they spent trapped inside a cramped,



flooded chamber of the Tham Luang cave in northern Thailand.

The public relations department in Chiang Rai province solicited questions from news outlets in advance and they will be forwarded to psychiatrists for

screening.
Thailand's junta leader Prayut
Chan-O-Cha urged media today to
be "cautious in asking unimportant questions" that could cause
unspecified damage.

But the organisers have also set up a small makeshift football pitch at the press conference and the boys are expected to kick a ball around at the event.

Interest in the saga is unlikely to abate, with film production houses already eyeing a Hollywood treatment of the drama.

Doctors have advised families of the players, aged 11 to 16, that they should avoid letting them contact journalists for at least one

month. Though the boys and coach are said to be in good mental and physical health, they will be provided with additional psychological monitoring to detect lingering trauma.

Families of the youngsters are

eagerly awaiting the homecoming. Khameuy Promthep, the grand-mother of 13-year-old Dom, one of the boys rescued from the cave, told AFP in an interview at their family shop in Mae Sai near the

Myanmar border today that she was very excited.

"This is the happiest day of my life," she said. The daring Thai-led international effort to rescue the team captivated the world after the football team walked into the cave on June 23 and were trapped by rising floodwaters.

After nine days without a steady supply of food or water they were found emaciated and huddled in a group on a muddy

ledge by British divers several kilometres inside Tham Luang.

Rescuers debated on the best plan to bring them out but ultimately decided on a risky operation that involved diving them through waterlogged passages while they were sedated to keep them calm and carrying them out in military-grade

stretchers.

Not even the foreign cave diving specialists who took part were sure the mission would work and many expressed relief when it was all over after the final five were rescued on July 10.

Further attention was drawn to the rescue by a highly public spat between entrepreneur Elon Musk and a British caver who took part in the rescue. Tesla CEO Musk called Vernon Unsworth a "pedo" in an extraordinary social media attack, after the caving expert had ridiculed Musk's plan to recover the trapped group using a miniature submarine.

Musk today apologised to Unsworth over the slur, for which he had provided no justification or explanation. "(H)is actions against me do not justify my actions against him, and for that I apologize to Mr. Unsworth and to the companies I represent as leader," Musk wrote on Twitter. "The fault is mine and mine alone."


