campaign for prevention of cervical cancer covered school going girls [both from government and pri-vate school] as well as out of school girls between the age group of 09-14 years in the entire State.

A press release from the Health Department informs that 96.67% coverage has been achieved



in the campaign and there have been no reports of any serious/severe Adverse Events Following Immunization [AEFI].

The vaccination campaign was well accepted by the beneficiaries and community as a whole, the release states.

The Department has

informed that all girls who received the first dose of HPV vaccine will be giv-en the second dose of the vaccine in a similar cam-paign to be held after six months tentatively during the month of Feb in 2019.

Human Resource Development Department has strongly refuted the statement of Hamro Sikkim Party leader and former Minister, KN Upreti, wherein he had said that Sikkim is not said that Sikkim is not fully literate as declared by the Chief Minister during his Independence Day address.

In a press release, HRDD has clarified that Sikkim has been declared a fully literate State and this may not be construed as cent percent literate.

"The parameters for declaring fully literate State is that population below 05 years and above 55 years are excluded. Floating population is not included. Therefore, the net population in the age group of 05-55 years is taken into account to assess a fully literate State. Further, Sikkim today has a literacy rate of 96.72%. This figure is also subject to fluctuation as it might come down or go up. Sik-kim, therefore, has been declared as 'fully literate' State," the release adds.

### NDRF launches biggest-ever operation in flood-hit Kerala; 58 teams deputed

DELHI, AUG 18 (PTI): The NDRF has evac ated over 10,000 people from the heavy rains and flood waters affected areas of Kerala till now as it said it has launched its biggest-ever relief and rescue operation in the country till date.

The deadliest deluge in Kerala in close to a century has claimed 194

lives since August 8.
A total of 58 teams of the force have been deputed to work in Kerala out of which 55 are work-ing on ground. Three teams are on their way, a spokesperson for the National Disaster Response Force (NDRF) said.

The force has intensified its rescue and relief

#### Drug Related

The battle cannot be won top-down, wider collaborations are required

 $\mathbf{D}^{\mathrm{rug}}$  busts form a staple of the diet of newspaper consumers in Sikkim. A substantial drug haul on a chance routine inspection at the check-posts is a rou-

Prescription drugs continue to be the preferred substances of abuse even though more hardcore "drugs" are also obviously being peddled. The former is in much higher circulation and continues to remain the more pressing concern for Sikkim due to its easy availability and deep percolation among the youth. In fact, because the peddling of these prescription drugs was not covered under the then laws against "drugs", like the Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substance Act, the Sikkim Government framed the Sikkim Anti-Drugs Act in the year 2006.

SADA was envisioned as a law to strengthen the hands of the law enforcement agencies in their effort to curtail the supply and peddling of these substances. Until SADA came about, a peddler could not even be kept locked up overnight since the pre-SADA laws, even on conviction, delivered only a minor fine as punishment... not even a slap on the wrists. All that the confiscation of big hauls at the check-posts succeeded in achieving was pushing up the street price of the pre-scription drugs of abuse because the peddlers would try to make up for profits lost to seized consignments. When SADA arrived, peddlers faced a jail-term and stiff punishments. In its original form, SADA tried to make a clear differentiation between peddlers and addicts and also took on a social responsibility by working in rehabilitation of addicts into sections of the law In the ten years that SADA has been around, however, more people than anyone could have imagined to be peddlers have been convicted and it will not come as a surprise if some addicts have also become history-sheeters as peddlers.

The nature of addiction, however, is such that there

is a very fine line dividing peddlers from addicts and it is not rare for the latter to sometimes crossover to the peddling business to finance their addictions. The original draft of SADA appeared to understand these nuances. Unfortunately, in the past slightly over a decade, it has become only a policing tool and has lost all its more humane aspects. It would however be wrong to blame the police for this Frankenstein. Like the State's drug problem, even SADA becoming so much lesser than what it had potential for, is because the society continues to fail its young. It is worrying that the only agency involved in the battle against drugs is the Police. Cops are responsible for law & order and invariably treat the people who come to them or whom they chase down, as victims or criminals. Substance abuse, unfortunately, is not as black & white as the police is trained to see cases. It is for the grev areas to be addressed with empathy and long-term impact that one needs the society at large to step up. Social organizations need to have a more involved presence in the efforts against addiction. One should read more about counseling and awareness sessions than drugbusts and arrests.

No, the cops should not stop what they are doing, but that cannot be the only thing Sikkim is doing to address the problem of substance abuse. Addiction cannot be solved by locking up all the peddlers and addicts. Sikkim should have understood that by now because ten years since a specialist law was brought in to address a Sikkim-specific drug problems, there has not been any dip in either addiction levels or peddling or the cost that addiction extracts from families, homes and the State.

And all this failure because the social engagement, the wider collaborations and the community feeling required to build more resolute defences against substances of abuse have not be created. And again, the only effort towards course correction is coming from the State Government again, as was announced by the Chief Minister recently when he shared that the government will be looking out with more empathy towards addicts. This announcement is welcome, but what is still missing is the people's engagement...

### Aretha Franklin: sublime soul diva whose voice inspired the civil rights movement

is no coincidence that two of Aretha Frank lin's celebrated contemporaries who travelled to Detroit to see the singer in the last stages of her illness were Stevie Wonder and Jesse Jackson. It is hard to overestimate Franklin's importance to both music and the civil rights movement – and the presence of one of music's greatest figures alongside Martin Luther King Jr's right-hand man at her bedside in the final days of her life is a fitting tribute to one of the true greats of Black American

Aretha Franklin was the "Queen of Soul". One

of the bestselling recording artists of all time, she became famous in the 1960s as a singer with a uniquely expressive voice possessing great passion and control. Her hit songs in the late 1960s tapped into the spirit of the civil rights movement while her hit cover (and gendered re-authoring) of Otis Redding's Respect was an anthem of black female empow-

The first woman to be inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame in 1987, Franklin's voice was declared one of Michigan's important "natural resources" two years before. She won 18 Grammy Awards including the Lifetime Achievement Award (in 1994) and presided over a rich recorded musical legacy preserved in 42 studio albums, 131 singles, six live albums and more. Her iconic performances and productions came to define the term "soul music" in the 20th century, setting the standard for black female vocal excellence.

GOSPEL ORIGINS
The daughter of celebrity Detroit minister CL Franklin. Franklin was born in Memphis in 1942 and raised in Detroit,

starting her singing career in the choir at her fa ther's New Bethel Baptist Church. She belonged to a generation of African American artists who mi-grated from the south during a time when segregation and Iim Crow law was still in effect, who then went on to participate in mainstream American

Her deep connection to the southern freedom movement was familial and spiritual as well as mu-sical – her father was actively involved with Democratic party politics and the civil rights movement.
Politicians and activists – along with many of the gospel superstars of the day – were a fixture in the family home. As a result, Franklin received formative musical mentoring from stars such as Dinah Washington and Mahalia Jackson in addition to inheriting a strong commitment to social justice. She was to support progressive politics throughout her

For people stuck in political struggles for equality and respect, Franklin's voice came to articulate the collective emotion, frustration, strength and depth of their experiences. Her voice rang out at historical political milestones - at the 1968 Democratic party convention in Chicago that shortly followed the assassinations of Martin Luther King Ir and Robert F Kennedy, and at the inauguration of the first African American president Barack Obama in 2009. She also performed at pre-inauguration concerts for Democratic party presidents Jimmy

debut for Atlantic, I Never Loved a Man the Way I Love You, was certified gold in the same year of its release. Her work with Wexler at Muscle Shoals during this period spawned many well-known hits such as Chain of Fools, (You Make Me Feel Like) A Natural Woman, Respect, and I Say A Little Prayer. GREAT INTERPRETER

While she recorded and performed her own compositions from time to time (hit 1968 single and feminist anthem Think is an original song of hers). Franklin earned a great part of her fame as a unique interpreter of other people's songs. Through gospel-influenced musical rearrangement, and her striking changes to melodic content, she effectively re-authored material written by others, asserting a sense of creative ownership through spirited and

dynamic vocal performance.

Franklin often altered the context of the existing lyric through her inflection and emphasis or by introducing call and answer interplay with her back-ground singers. These voices of sister-ly support were often provided by her very own siblings, Erma and Carolyn Franklin or The Sweet Inspirations (a girl group founded by Cissy Houston and Lee Warwick, the mothers of Whitney and Dionne). Using these techniques, as she did with Respect, lyrics could be repositioned to reflect the black female perspective. Another later example of this can be found in her interpretation of the Rolling Stones' Jumpin' Jack Flash in 1986, which was used as the theme tune for the Whoopi Goldberg film of the same name.

Music culture owes Franklin a debt for bringing ecstatic pentecostal fervour to popular music, pushing the expressive boundaries of the contemporary singing voice. She was one of the first true great divas of soul (alongside Diana Ross) – fusing gospel and African American spiritual music traditions with the blues,

pop and R&B to create the template of vocal ex-pressiveness and authenticity that artists aspire to still. In doing so she set the stage for the technical

virtuosity of Whitney Houston and Mariah Carey. A fierce musical talent not only in sensitive and dynamic vocal interpretation but also as a skilled pianist and arranger, Franklin demanded respect from us. And because of her many great artistic and cultural achievements, it will forever be given.

Inspired to follow in the footsteps of Sam Cooke, Franklin began her solo singing career in 1960 per-forming on the gospel circuit and signing a record deal with Columbia Records. Her first secular albums in the early 1960s blended R&B styles with pop and jazz and achieved only modest success. It wasn't until her move to Atlantic records and a deliberate return to gospel music stylings in 1967 that Franklin made her commercial breakthrough.

### Why war evolved to be a man's game and why that's only now changing

One pattern characterises every war that's ever been fought. Frontline fighting in warfare is primarily and often almost exclusively a male activity. From a numbers perspective, bigger armies obviously have greater chances of success in battles. Why then, are half of a community's potential warriors (the women) usually absent from the battlefield?

Previous hypotheses have suggested that this is the result of fundamental biological differences between the sexes. But our new study, published in Proceedings B, finds that none of these differences ful-ly explain why women have almost never one to war, and nor are they needed to do so. Instead, this state of affairs might have more to do with chance

Some researchers have proposed that since men are on average stronger, taller, and faster than women, they are simply more effective in winning battles. Others have suggested that this pattern occurs because the costs of warfare are lower for men, as the risks of dying or being injured are offset by the opportunity to obtain more sexual partners in case of victory. This isn't true for women because they can only produce a limited number of offspring and so there's little or no evolutionary

advantage to obtaining more partners.
Others still have argued the answer can be found in the fact that females in groups of ancestral great apes and hu-mans were more likely to migrate. This supposedly means that women are less genetically related to their social group than men, and so are less keen to risk their lives for their communities.

Granted, these hypotheses all sug-

gest plausible reasons why more men than women participate in wars. But they fall short on explaining why the fighting is almost always done by men. We set out to answer this question,

the evolution of male and female participation in warfare, building on some of our previous work in this area. Our model looks at the consequences of going to war on a person's fitness, and for the fitness of their genetic relatives, to work out the probability that a person will join in the fighting

#### MODELLING THE EVOLUTION

OF WARFARE

Before investigating each of the pro-posed explanations in detail, we decided we should better understand the simplest case where there are no sex differences. We designed a model that looked at men and women as two identical groups, and didn't take account

reason why men might be more likely to fight, over many generations the in-centives for men to join in would grow until warfare became an almost exclu-

sively male practice.

But as our hypothetical model worked on the basis that men and women were identical, for every potential evolutionary trajectory that led to exclusively male warfare, there would be another that led to exclusively female warfare. Whether male-only war or female-only war evolved in our model depended only on the initial question of which sex was more likely

to go to war to start with.

So, if both outcomes are equally



of the sexes' different characteristics when working out the probability of an individual joining in a war. To our surrise, we found that exclusively male arfare could still evolve in this case.

Instead, our model showed that

what was important was how many members of a person's sex were al-ready taking part in warfare at any given point, and how that affected sexual competition for mates with other people of the same sex. For example, if lots of men are already fighting, then the risks to an individual man would be lower and the potential rewards higher, but the there would be much less incentive for a woman to take part.

This evolutionary pressure means

plausible, why is warfare in fact almost exclusively male? Our study also suggests that male competition over mates and resources – an aspect of what biologists call sexual selection – might have caused men to evolve to be generally more aggressive than women. This was probably enough to make men more likely to go to war from the outset. And our model explains why this would ultimately lead to male-only war parties. Greater physical strength, together with lower costs and higher genetic links to the rest of the group, may have

then helped reinforce this pattern.

But initial conditions could have – in theory – been different. Had women been naturally more aggressive, they

we would now live in a world of Amazon-like female-only wars. Interesting ly, this is the case in some other anima societies that engage in inter-group conflicts. In spotted hyenas, for example, only females attack other packs. THE PAST AND THE

#### **FUTURE OF WAR**

One implication of our study is that past ecological conditions can have very long-lasting effects. The evolution of men as the more aggressive of the sexes led to a pattern of male-domi-nated warfare that was unlikely to be altered by changing technological or ecological forces

Consider the role of weapons, for example. When warfare initially evolved, men were likely more aggressive and might have been more effective at fighting, because primitive weapons relied on brute force. As a result, they went on to become the war ring sex. Later, inventions such as the bow and arrow made physical sex differences in strength less important. In more recent times, further technological advances have effectively equalised men and women in their ability to fight opponents. But, as male-only war has already evolved, these technological changes have little or no impact. Only initial conditions matter.

As such, this long-lasting effect of ancestral behavioural differences might help explain why women's pres-ence in the armed forces today is still limited. Yet, perhaps culture is now having a greater role, at least partially overriding the biological basis for exclusively male warfare. The countries that have opened military combat roles to women in response to chang-ing attitudes, and the recent reports of Kurdish women fighting Islamic State

are testaments to that.

#### IIT Kharagpur to set up Re-Water Research Center

KOLKATA, Aug 18 (PTI): The IIT Kharagpur will set up a Re-Water Research Center, seed-funded by two alumni members to replenish and rejuvenate water resources, a statement issued by the institute said today

The move is to tackle the challenge of resolving two burning issues faced by urban India sewage disposal and access to clean potable water, it said on the 68th Foundation Day of the premier institution.

"The scarcity of water for drinking and domestic use is becoming acute and will only worsen in the coming years. On the other hand, urban areas are witnessing massive sewage problems. The idea of linking these two crises and coming up with one viable solution is challenging," one of the alumni mem bers Aneesh Reddy said.

The 'Aditya Choubey Center for Re-Water Re search' would be networking with govern-ment bodies to take up this technology and the process and meet the water challenge in various cities, Reddy said.

The institute is setting up an on-campus plant which will convert 1.35 million litre of sewage water from the hostels to 1.2 million litre of potable water, on a daily basis.

The pilot plant is expected to be ready by March 2019.

"We will

quality assurance tests demonstrating the suitability of the technology treatment of sewage and the suitability of the treated water for consumption and infuse confidence among all agencies and the public at large related to water supply, treatment," faculty at the Department of Civil Engineering Prof M M Ghangrekar, who will be heading this project, said.

#### WB woman gets 2 months in jail for false sexual assault charae

Clubbed in pool B. India will face their toughest test in the league stage against Korea on August 25. They play Kazakhstan on August 21 and conclude the Pool engagement with a clash against Thailand on August 27.

UN chief 'saddened' over destruction caused by Kerala flood

UNITED NATIONS, AUG 18 (PTI): UN chief Antonio Guterres has expressed sadness over the flooding and extensive damage and displacement caused in rain-battered Kerala.

Kerala is witnessing the worst flooding in 100 years. About 80 dams overflowed and more than 300 lives have been lost. Over 3.14 lakh people have been moved to relief camps.

"Our humanitarian colleagues as well as the country team in India have been following the have been following the recent floods very close-ly. The United Nations is of course saddened by the loss of life, destruc-tion and displacement caused by floods in India," Stephane Dujarric, the UN Secretary-Generals spokesperson, told reporters here vesterday.

When asked if the UN been asked for help in In-dia in the Kerala floods, he said the world body has not received any direct request from the Indian Government for aid.

"As you know, India has quite a well-operated machinery to deal with natural disasters but of course our country team I was in touch with our Resident Coordinator Resident Coordinator today they're following closely and they're in touch with partners on the ground," he said.

#### 6.0 quake shakes Costa Rica near Panama; no major damage

SAN JOSE, AUG 18 (AP): A strong earthquake shook southern Costa Rica near the border with Panama, toppling items from store shelves and knocking out power in places, but there were no immediate reports of injuries or major damage.

The US Geological Survey reported that the quake that occurred last evening had a magnitude of 6.0 and struck at 5:22 pm local time at a depth of about 12 miles (19 kilometers).

Its epicentre was about 12 miles (19 kilo-meters) north of the town of Golfito.

Ellerv Ouesada. journalist with Channel 9 in Palmar Norte, near the epicenter, told The Associated Press that it was felt strongly in the region.

"We have reports that in Puerto Iimenez the power was out and some power poles toppled," Quesada said by phone, adding that aftershocks were felt in the minutes afterward.

The USGS recorded at least one subsequent tem-blor of magnitude 4.9. Photos circulating on

social media showed shattered wine bottles and other products lying on shop floors in Palmar Norte.

Costa Rica's National System for Monitoring Tsunamis ruled out a tsunami alert.

In neighboring Pana-ma, civil defense officials said via Twitter that the quake was felt strongly in the border provinces of Chiriqui and Bocas del Toro there were no imme-

diate reports of damage.

### Imran Khan - A cricketer who struggled for 22 years to become Pakistan's PM

ISLAMABAD, AUG 18 (PTI): Cricketer-turned politician Imran Khan struggled for 22 years to fulfil his dream of becoming Pakistan's Prime Minister to transform the corruption affected country into an Islamic welfare state.

Khan took oath as Pa-

kistan's 22nd Prime Minister after leading his Paki-stan Tehreek-e-Insaf party (PTI) to the victory in the ons and subseque ly proving his majority in the National Assembly

The 65-year-old flamboyant former captain, described as one of Pakistan's greatest cricketers who transformed his shaky team into champi-ons in the 1992 Cricket World Cup, emerged as an inspiring leader in politics too.

The Oxford-educat-

ed Pasthun launched Tehreek-e-Insaf, which means the movement for justice, in 1996, but struggled to break the dominance of the Pa-



kistan Muslim League (PML-N) and Peoples Party Pakistan (PPP) - the two main political parties that dominated Pakistan's political scene when the powerful military was not ruling the country.

Khan became a Memof Parliament in the 2002 elections. He was again elected to the National Assembly in the 2013 elections, when his party emerged as the second largest in the country by popular vote.

One year after elections, in May 2014, Khan alleged that the polls were rigged in favour of the ruling Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz led by then prime minister Nawaz Sharif.

In August 2014, Khan led a rally of his sup-porters from Lahore to Islamabad, demanding Sharif's resignation and investigation into alleged electoral fraud.

Within a month. Khan entered into an alliance with influential

Pakistani-origin Canadian cleric Tahir-ul-Qadri with both pressing for dismissal of the Sharif government. The lent protests ended after Khan and Oadiri entered into an agreement with the Sharif government to set up a judicial commission to probe the allegations of poll rigging.

During his campaign in the 2018 elections, Khan promised to crackdown on corrup-tion, enact anti-poverty programmes, improve healthcare and education an Islamic welfare state.

Khan, who is believed to have the backing of the powerful military, has vowed to make a 'Naya Pa-kistan' which would be an Islamic welfare state. He believes the "most viable" policy to ensure peace in the region was to cooperate with India, including on the Kashmir issue.

His party has pre-pared a 100-day plan to meet serious economic and administrative woes faced by the country. In his victory speech

last month Khan said he was ready to improve Pakistan's ties with India and his government would like the leaders of the two sides to resolve all disputes, including the "core issue" of Kashmir, through talks.

Khan also said that he wants balanced relations between Pakistan and America which should be mutually beneficial, not one sided. Additionally, Khan said he and his party wanted stronger ties with both Iran and Saudi Arabia - the two rival powers in the Middle East.

As a politician, Khan's vision is to turn Pakistan into a just society, based on humane values, by creating an independent and honest judiciary that will uphold democracy. protect human rights and ensure the rule of law and, by promoting a merit based system that provides equal opportunity to all, according to Khan's profile on his party's website.

Khan once to uted as Pakistan's most eligible bachelor for his rugged Pathani good looks, married thrice. His previous two marriages ended in divorce.

His first marriage was with Jemima Goldsmith, daughter of a British billionaire, in 1995, which lasted 9 years. Khan has two sons from her. His second marriage with TV anchor Reham Khan in 2015 ended after a brief 10 months

Early this year, Khan married for the third time. This time with his 'spiritual guide" Bushra Maneka.

Khan was born in Mianwali in 1952 to Ikramullah Khan Niazi and Shaukat Khanum. His father descended from the Pashtun (Pathan) Niazi tribe of the Shermankhel clan, his family is settled in Lahore, however, he still considers his background Pathan as per his

autobiography.

He attended Aitchison College in Lahore and the Royal Grammar School Worcester in England. In 1972, he enrolled in Keble College, Oxford where he studied philosophy, politics and

economics, graduating with honours in 1975. Khan played Test cricket for Pakistan between 1971 and 1992, and was captain of the national team when they won the World Cup in 1992.

### Saudi Arabia prepares for the annual Muslim hajj pilgrimage

MECCA, Aug 18 (AP): Saudi Arabia is preparing to host the annual hajj pilgrimage beginning Sunday, as over 1.6 million Muslim faithful from abroad have arrived in the ultraconservative kingdom

The pilgrimage represents one of the five pillars of Islam and is re quired of all able-bodied Muslims once in their life. In recent weeks, the faithful have arrived in Mecca from across the world, all chanting "Labayk Allahuma Labayk," or "Here I am, God, answering your call. Here I am."

The hajj offers pilgrims an opportunity to feel closer to God amid the Muslim world's many challenges, including the threat of extremists in the Mideast after the Islamic State group was beaten back in Iraq and Syria and the plight of Myanmar's Muslim Rohingya minority.

"My feeling is inde-

scribable to perform the hajj," said Imad Abdel-Raheem, an Egyptian pilgrim.

"I also want to pray for all Muslim countries for them to live free in all places, in Palestine and in Burma, in all places, in Afghanistan and in India."

Men attending the hajj

dress in only terrycloth, seamless white garments meant to represent uni-ty among Muslims and equality before God. Wommakeup and nail polish to a state of humility

Since arriving, many have circled the cube-shaped Kaaba in Mecca Islam's holiest site. The Kaaba represents the metaphorical house of God and the oneness of God in Islam. Observant Muslims around the world face toward the Kaaba during their five daily prayers. Muslims believe the

hajj retraces the footsteps of the Prophet Muham-mad, as well as those of the prophets Ibrahim and Ismail Abraham and Ishmael in the Bible.

After prayers in Mecca, pilgrims will head to rea called Mount Arafat on Monday, where the Prophet Muhammad delivered his final sermon. From there, pilgrims will head to an area called Muzdalifa, picking up pebbles along the way for a symbolic stoning of the devil and a casting away of sins that takes place in the Mina valley for three days.

At the hajj's end, male pilgrims will shave their hair and women will cut a lock of hair in a sign of re-newal for completing the pilgrimage. Around the world, Muslims will mark the end of hajj with a cele-bration called Eid al-Adha. The holiday, remem-

bering Ibrahim's willing ness to sacrifice his son, sees Muslims slaughter sheep and cattle, distrib-uting the meat to the poor. While a holy, once-in-

a-lifetime experience for pilgrims, the hajj is by no means an easy journey. The temperature in Mecca and Mina will be around 42 degrees Celsius (107 degrees Fahrenheit). Pilgrims walk between 5 to

15 kilometers a day.

Long lines and even longer waits can strain even the most patient as they weave through the throngs of people. For Saudi Arabia, the

hajj is the biggest logistical challenge the kingdom fac-es. Its ruling Al Saud family stakes its legitimacy in part on its management the holiest sites in Islam. art on its management of

King Salman's official title is the "Custodian of the Two Holy Mosques," at Mecca and Medina. Other Saudi kings, and the Ottoman rulers of the Hijaz region before them, all have adopted the honorary title The kingdom has spent billions of dollars of its vast oil revenues on security and safety measures, particularly in Mina, where some of the hajj's deadliest inci-dents have occurred.

The worst in recorded history took place only three years ago. On Sept. 24, 2015, a stampede and crush of pilgrims in Mina killed at least 2,426 people, according to an Associated Press count. The official Saudi toll of

769 people killed and 934 injured has not changed since only two days after ward. The kingdom has never addressed the discrepancy, nor has it released results of an investiga tion authorities promised to conduct over the disaster.

Meanwhile, Saudi Arabia also faces threats from al-Qaida militants and a local faction of the Islamic


