## Failure to consult opposition has delayed LT Assembly seats, SKM claims

## SAGAR CHETTRI GANGTOK, 12 DEC:

A high-level delegation of Sikkim Krantikari Morcha party recently met the Union Ministers in New Delhi on inclusion of eleven left out communities of Sikkim in the list of Scheduled Tribes and to grant of seats to Lim-boo and Tamang in the State Assembly.

The 10-member SKM delegation discussed and submitted an eight-page memorandum along with supporting documents with the request to introduce and pass bills in the upcoming Parliamentary session for the inclusion of eleven left out commu-nities of Sikkim in the list of Scheduled Tribes and to grant seats to Limboo and Tamang in the State Assembly.

Addressing a press conference on Tuesday, SKM senior vice-presi-dent, TN Sharma, who was a member in the delegation to New Delhi, informed that the delega-tion met the Union Minister for Tribal Affairs, Jual Oram and Union Minister of State for Home Affairs, Kiren Rijiju, on these demands of the State. He informed that the delegation had a brief discussion on these issues with Central Ministers and submitted a memorandum on the same.

He added that cop-

ies of the memorandum have also been posted to the Prime Minister's Office and office of the Union Minister for Home

### Assembly election results: Most exit polls failed to get it right

NEW DELHI, DEC 12 Most exit polls to predict the failed massive mandate that the Congress got in Chhattisgarh, but got their forecast of a tight finish in neighbouring Madhya Pradesh right.

In Rajasthan and Tel-angana, the exit polls got the winner right but failed to gauge the level of the victory margins for the assembly elections for which the votes were counted on Tuesday.

They predicted a clear win for the Con-gress in Rajasthan, but when the results were out, the party could not achieve the magic figure

on its own, getting 99 of 199 seats, just shy of the majority mark.

In Telangana, it was landslide victory for the Telangana Rashtriya Samiti, which got 88 of the 119 constituencies, leaving the Congress trailing

far behind with 19.

In the northeastern state of Mizoram, where the Congress was ousted from power, the regional Mizo National Front performed much better than the exit poll prediction, bagging 26 of 40 seats.

In Madhya Pradesh where the results went down to the wire with the Congress getting 114 seats, just two short of a simple

majority in the 230-member assembly, and the BJP 109 -- ABP News predicted a clear defeat for the BIP (94 seats) and victory for the Congress (126).

While Republic TV-Jan Ki Baat gave 108-128 seats to the BJP and 95-115 to the Congress, In-dia Today-Axis said the saffron party could win 102-120 seats as against 104-122 for the Congress.

The Times Now-CNX exit poll predicted a major-ity for the BJP in MP with 126 seats and gave the Con-

gress a tally of 89 seats.

In Chhattisgarh, the BJP was reduced to 15 seats while the Congress bagged 68 seats in the

90-member seat. The Ajit Jogi-led Jan-ta Congress Chhattisgarh and the BSP alliance together bagged seven seats. Quite in contrast to

the declared results, the ABP and the Times Now-CNX exit polls predicted victory for the BJP. Though India Today-Axis said the Congress would triumph, it did not get its numbers right. Times Now-CNX gave

a simple majority to the BJP in Chhattisgarh, saying it may win 46 seats while the opposition Congress may bag 35 seats.
ABP News said the BJP may get up to 52 seats against 35 of the Congress.

The India Today-Axis predicted that the Congress would end Chief Minister Raman Singh's 15-year reign by winning anywhere between 55-65 seats. The BJP, it said, may be reduced to 21-31 seats

All the exit polls said the alliance of former chief minister Ajit Jogi's home late. Janta Congress Chhattisgarh (Jogi) and the BSP may win between three and eight seats, which may help him to emerge as a king-maker in the event of a hung house. This was fairly accurate with the BSP getting two seats and the

## Dam Safety Bill in Lok Sabha

NEW DELHI, DEC 12 (PTI): The government Wednesday introduced the Dam Safety Bill in the Lok Sabha, a legislation which will help states and Union Territories adopt uniform procedures to ensure safety of reservoirs. The bill also provides for surveillance, inspection, operation and maintenance of specified dams to prevent dam fail-ure-related disasters. The bill provides for establishment of the National Dam Safety Authority (NDSA) as a regulatory body which shall discharge functions to implement the policy, guidelines and standards for dam safety in the country.

The legislation also pro-

vides for constitution of a State Committee on Dam Safety (SCDS) by the state nment that will ensure proper surveillance, inspection, operation and maintenance of all specified dams in that state and ensure their safe functioning.

Sikkim Senior Women's Cricket Team is play-ing Senior Women's One Day League 2018-19 for the first time in the history of Indian domestic cricket along with the other North-eastern States, Bihar, Puducherry and Ut-tarakhand in the plate division.

So far. Sikkim has played 5 matches out of 8 in the league. After registering the first victory in their fourth match with 216 runs against Mizoram at Cuttack, Sikkim has also recorded their second win today against Bihar at Ravenshaw University Ground 2, Cuttack with 78 runs. Sikkim earns 4 Point(s) with this win and is standing with 8 Point(s) in the point table.

Sikkim won the toss and elected to bat first but Bihar restricted the home side to 176 runs of 49.1 overs. Cap-



tain Archana Das (82). Ananya Upendran (26), Tshering Ongmu Lepcha (20) and Privanka Acharya (13) helped Sikkim reach this score. In the Second Innings Sikkim showed brilliant bowling and bowled out Bihar for 98 runs in 35.5 overs. Priyanka Acharya

took 5 wickets. Archana Das 2 wickets and Ananya Upendran, Dichen Ongmu Lepcha and Munnu Hangma Limboo took 1 wicket each. After Dichen Ong-mu Lepcha, Priyanka Acharya has become the second woman player to have a 5 wicket haul in a One Day Match.

are not provided before the 2019 election.
Likewise, SKM Vice-President, Anand Lama, stated that contradictory statements recently given by Lok Sabha MP, PD Rai, points towards the ruling party's lack of confidence on seat reservation. SKM spokesperson, Jacob Khaling, stated that being a part of NDA, SDF government should press the Centre to place these bills in the upcoming Parliamen-tary session otherwise it has no right to alliance with the NDA. He further demanded that SDF government should give justice to Limboo and Tamang and eleven left out commu-nities. SKM also said that it is ready to extend its support f the SDF government is serious on these issues.





## Congratulations on Starting 25!

#### SDF and its Govt should now take stock, celebrate and plan ahead

The Sikkim Democratic Front Government of pletes 24 years in office today and begins its present in order because government. 25th. Congratulations are in order because governments rarely last this long, anywhere. It is not yet clear how the government plans to celebrate this milestone, but expect it to elaborate, given that elections are now round the corner. Even without the latter countdown, this should always have been a significant occasion. The party and its government deserve congratulations, because to be fair, twenty-five years of peaceful reign is something that not even the monarchy enjoyed in Sikkim.

The Namgyal dynasty, ever since its inception, was either hounded by incursions by ambitious and martial neighbours or troubled by durbar conspiracies and later by the high-handed British and an over-bearing India. Democracy did not guarantee smooth sailing for governments either. Let's start with the first term – LD Kazi was running on an extension in 1979 when the notorious Bill of 1979 rearranging the seat reservation system got tabled and the man who heralded democracy into Sikkim, found his near absolute majority in the Assembly reduced to a minority. In the over five years that he was in office, political exigencies saw him switch his alignment to three parties and still he had to eventually leave office not on the expiry of his term but through a resignation. The next Chief Minister, Nar Bahadur Bhandari, even though he was CM for three terms, went through three political parties during his fourteen year rule. He started off with Sikkim Janata Party in 1979, merged with the Congress mid-way, was removed in 1984 and returned with Sikkim Sangram Parishad in 1984. He went through politically trying times which eventually cost him his government in 1994 when he was evicted from power with six months still left to his term. When the SDF was voted into power in 1994, it arrived to a history of frequently shifting political fortunes; and now, it sits in the unique position of the longest serving government currently in office anywhere in the country. It commands recognition for having survived this long, and governments in our country don't stay around for this long any more. In contrast, SDF has sustained rather well, not only surviving minor hiccups without things getting out of hand, but has also, in 2014, battled through and emerged victorious from what was arguably its toughest electoral battle vet.

That said, while celebrations and back-slapping are expected and even recommended for anniversaries, the party and its government owe the State and its people an honest exercise in self-appraisal. The party arrived into power in 1994 on the promise of change and succeeded remarkably in running with the same plank even in Elections 2009 when it undertook a major revamp and presented more new candidates for the people than had debuted in the Assembly in SDF colours in 1994. The elections of 2014 were about securing the developmental model crafted by the SDF, and yet again, despite a bitter campaign, the people returned it to power. Unfortunately, where the party should have been more grateful for having majority support even in its fifth straight election at a time when electorates tire in less than five years elsewhere, the party snubbed the verdict with a self-goal by sulking when it should have exulted. Precious time was lost, and this was unfortunate because the fifth term has been one of effusive recognition of Sikkim's programmes and missions by Delhi, and had the mood been more open and mature, these could have been leverage much better. What the party should also recognize is that while dissidence and rebellion are neither new to politics nor to the SDF, the present term has been noticeably without any hemorrhaging in the party ranks, save very minor dissidence.

When the party appraises its Government, it should pay special attention to its latest term in office. The continuing endorsement of the people was obviously in expectation of more radical changes. The politicians know best what the people aspire for, so they should know what is expected of them. The party and the government should also take some tips from what is happening at the national and international levels. Many see the changes all over the world as people and their governments veering towards the extreme Right. This is only partly correct, and can also be seen as a sign of the people fed up with status quo and willing to even suffer for Change even from established agencies.

This Government Formation Day, the party and its government should revisit the promise it made to the people in 1994 through to 2014 and decide how it has delivered on it. The present Government is only mid-way through its term, an honest appraisal and course-correction, if required, is what not only the people of Sikkim, but also a government that has been at the helm for 22 years now, deserves.

## Those designer babies everyone is freaking out about - it's not likely to happen

hen Adam Nash was still an embryo, living in a dish in the lab, scientists tested his DNA to make sure it was free of Fanconi anemia, the rare inherited blood disease from which his sister Molly suffered. They also checked his DNA for a marker that would reveal whether he shared the same tissue type. Molly needed a donor match for stem cell therapy, and her parents were determined to find one. Adam was conceived so the stem cells in his umbilical cord could be the lifesaving treatment for his sister.

Adam Nash is considered to be the first design-

er baby, born in 2000 using in vitro fertilizaton with pre-implantation genetic diagnosis, a technique used to choose desired characteristics. The media covered the story with empathy for the parents' motives but not without reminding the reader that

'eye color, athletic ability, beauty, intelligence, height, stopping a propensity towards obesity, guaranteeing freedom from certain mental and physical illness-es, all of these could in the future be available to parents deciding

to have a designer baby."

The designer babies have thus been called the "future-weshould-not-want" for each new reproductive technology or intervention. But the babies never came and are nowhere close. I am not surprised.

I study the prediction of complex diseases and human traits that result from interactions between multiple genes and lifestyle factors. This research shows that geneticists cannot read the genetic code and know who will be above average in intelligence and athleticism. Such traits and diseases that result from multiple genes and lifestyle factors cannot be predicted using just DNA, and cannot be designed. Not now. And very unlikely ever

#### DESIGNER BABIES ARE NEXT

The inevitable rise of designer babies was proclaimed in 1978 after the birth of Louise Brown, the first IVF baby, as the next step toward "a brave world where parents can select their child's gender and traits." The same situation occurred in 1994 when a 59-year-old British woman stretched the limits of nature by giving birth to twins using donated eggs that were implanted in her womb at a fertility clinic in Italy.

The response was the same in 1999, when a fertility clinic in Fairfax, Virginia, offered sex selection of embryos to screen against diseases that only happen in boys. In 2013, when 23andMe was granted a patent for a tool that predicts the likeli-hood of traits in babies based on DNA of two parents, the question of patenting designer babies was raised. In 2016, when the U.K. permitted a woman to donate her healthy mitochondria to a couple using IVF to conceive a child, raising the number of parents to three, fears of unnatural children rose again. Last month, when Genomic Prediction, a

New Jersey company, announced its DNA screening panel for embryos would also assess the risk for complex diseases such as Type 2 diabetes and heart disease that are caused by multiple genes, fears of engineering babies with high IQ or athletic prowess emerged.

The same issues arose on Nov. 26 when He Iiankui reported at the Second International Summit on Human Genome Editing in Hong Kong that he had successfully edited the DNA of twin baby girls

born last month.

The designer baby doom scenarios have not evolved with the technology. It's been the same story for decades. It's the same "desirable" traits and the same assumption that parents want to select these traits if technology allowed. But no one seems to be questioning whether these traits are solely a product of our genes such that they can be

selected or edited in embryos.

Wondering about designer babies was under-

standable in the early days, but repetition of these supposed fears now suggests lack of understand-ing of how DNA, and the genes they encode, work. DESIGNING FAVORABLE TRAITS

#### IN BABIES IS NOT SIMPLE

Although there are exceptions, DNA generally differs between people in two ways: There are DNA mutations and DNA variations.

Mutations cause rare diseases like Huntington's disease and cystic fibrosis, which are caused by a single gene. Mutations in the BRCA genes substantially increase the risk of breast and ovarian cancer. Selecting embryos that do not have these mutations removes the entire or main cause of disea en who don't have BRCA mutations can still develop breast cancer through other causes, like all womer

Variations are changes in the genetic code that are more common than mutations and associated with common traits and diseases. DNA variants increase the likelihood that you may have a trait or develop a disease but do not determine or cause it. Association means that in several large study populations, a DNA variant was more frequent among people with the trait than those without, often only

slightly more frequent.

These variants don't determine a trait, but increase its likelihood by interacting with other DNA variants and nongenetic influences such as upbringing, lifestyle and environment. To design such traits in embryos would require multiple DNA

changes in multiple genes and orchestrating or controlling relevant environment and lifestyle influences too.

Let's compare it to driving a car. DNA mutations are like the flat tires and the failing brakes: tech-nical problems that make driving problematic, no matter where you drive. DNA variations are like the color and the type of car, or other features of the car that may affect the driving experience and even might create problems over time. For exam ple, a convertible is a delight when driving on Hol-lywood's Sunset Boulevard on a breezy summer evening, but cruel when crossing a high mountain pass in midwinter. Whether features of the car are an asset or a liability depends on the context and that context might change — they are never ideal

#### ANOTHER HURDLE

Most DNA mutations do nothing else other than cause the disease, but DNA variations may play a

role in many diseases and traits. Take variations in the MC1R "red hair" gene, which not only increases the chance that your child will have red hair, but also increases their risk of skin cancer. Or variations in the OCA2 and HERC2 "eye color" genes that are also associated with the risk of various cancers, Parkinson's and Alzheimer's disease. To be sure, these are statistical associations, reported in the scientific literature, some may be confirmed; others may not. But the message is clear: Editing DNA variations for "de-

sirable" traits may have adverse consequences, in-

cluding many that scientists don't know about yet. We can see this in the analysis of He Jiankui's gene-edited babies. By trying to make the babies resistant to HIV, He might have greatly increased susceptibility to infections by West Nile virus or

To be sure, even though complex traits such as intelligence, athletics and musicality cannot be selected or designed, there will be opportunists who will try to offer these traits, even if totally pre-mature and unsupported by science. Like Stephen Hsu, the co-founder of Genomic Prediction who said about his offer to test embryos for polygenic risk, the risk of a disease based on multiple genes, I think people are going to demand that. If we don't do it, some other company will." And also He said: "There will be someone, somewhere, who is doing this. If it's not me, it's someone else." People need to be protected against this irresponsible and unethical use of DNA testing and editing. Science brought incredible progress in repro-

ductive technology, but didn't bring designer ba-bies one step closer. The creation of designer babies is not limited by technology, but by biology: The origins of common traits and diseases are too complex and intertwined to modify the DNA without introducing unwanted effects.

## How new media platforms have become powerful across Africa

Online platforms have become an important site for political and social engagement. On the one hand they have been praised for their progressive characteristics. This is because they of-fer great organising potential, enhance political accountability and disrupt old media practices that tend to exclude less

powerful voices from important social and political discussions.

On the other hand, they have invited notes of cautioun. This is because new media platforms embolden and even midwife bullies, ethnic jingoists, and nationalist radicals who are a threat to social cohesion.

Both points of view have merit. New

media platforms can be powerful forces for democracy and also a space for dangerous, sectarian and divisive ideas. A number of governments seem to be exploiting these fears in a bid to control these platforms.

These attempts are likely to become a lot more commonplace across Africa. Uganda, Kenya, Tanzania, Zambia and Gambia have already passed laws that tarcambia have aiready passed laws that tar-get social media users specifically. Some of these laws criminalise free speech online, while others have made the use of social media too expensive for users. Nevertheless, new media platforms are increasingly being used. Their im-portance on the political landscape cont

portance on the political landscape can't be over-emphasised. This is because they have allowed people excluded from public communication to articulate their fears and desires in a way that wasn't previously possible. The widespread use

of applications such as Twitter, Facebook and WhatsApp has been particularly in-strumental in including a broad range of

## oublic discussions. YOUR HEADING HERE

Rather than rely on the mainstream press to cover important political stories, citizens are able to discuss issues in the digital space. When their stories go viral the mainstream media then begins to cover them as important news items.

Twitter in particular has become a useful political tool for many. And Iwitter's standard vernaculars such as hashtags and memes have also been cre-atively appropriated to reflect local inflections. Humour, local languages, and

The fact that participants are also ole to "tag" their leaders further means that authority is confronted directly. And a poor person living in an informal settlement is now able to confront the head of state with just as much authority as anyone else. These small victories

These platforms have also enabled users to link local issues with inter-national concerns to give them global currency and legitimacy. In Kenya for example, an anti-rape campaign which coalesced around #JusticeForKemunto could be seamlessly linked to the [#Me-Too movement], a similar rebuke and articulation of anger against sexual vio-

#### GOVERNMENT CONTROL

The shift from legacy media has not been accidental. A number of African governments still exert enormous control over the media sector. The is because the state remains the single largest advertiser in the media in sub-Saharan Africa, and so can influence coverage and con-

In some countries, presidents and high-level politicians even own media

This is why the digital space is so important. The emergence of a relatively new structure of communication – which is amorphous, unrestrained, and largely unaffected by state control - has meant there are new ways of holding governments to account.

But their popularity has drawn negative reactions from some governments.

CRACKING DOWN

CRACKING DOWN

Some are now employing digitally savvy state operatives to counter opposition discourses online.

Others have gone further by enforcing regulations to control online discourse through punitive laws and taxation.

In Tanzania for example, digital content producers – including bloggers – are required to get yearly licences which cost \$900 dollars. In Uganda, data bundles are now much more expensive with a \$0.05 levy charged per day. And Zambia plans to introduce similar measures.

Other countries have been a lot

more brazen in their efforts to clamp down on free online speech. Cameroon, Egypt, and Ethiopia, for example, have regularly shut down the internet. Users considered too critical of the government are routinely arrested, threatened or even jailed.

FAKE NEWS
This is not to say that new media platforms are entirely without problems.
Social media has been used to create and disseminate fake news. This has contributed to a dangerous regime of misinformation that has undermined democratic processes in a number of African countries.

This was the case during Kenya's

2017 general elections when the ruling 2017 general elections when the ruling jubilee party employed Cambridge Ana-lytica, a UK-based public relations com-pany, to boost its electoral prospects. The company was later accused of pop-ulating social media and using bots to

create and circulate fake news.

Similarly, in South Africa, both the ruling African National Congress and the opposition Democratic Alliance were reported to have used social media

west reported to have used social media to spread fake news to besmirch oppo-nents during municipal elections. These trends reflect the fact that fake news, misinformation and disinformation have infected the continent's body politic, which is a da

FUTURE THREATS
It's however safe to say that new media platforms are now firmly part of Africa's public culture and any attempt to stop, frustrate or undermine their signifi-

cance in public life is bound to fail.

However, the creative use to which they are put must be constructive and progressive. For example, in countries where collective political organisation and expression is increasingly being undermined by the state – such as Tanzania – instances of self-expression through new media form important pockets of resistance. These pockets, when viewed col-lectively, can help focus attention on state repression and excesses.

## SC to hear Indigo Airlines challenging Meghalaya HC order to make Umroi airport operational

NEW DELHI, DEC 12 Indigo Wednesday moved the Supreme Court challeng-ing the Meghalaya High Court direction to all commercial operators and the Ministry of Civil Aviation to urgently take a decision to start flights from Umroi airport, 30 km from capital Shillong.
The apex court was

told that the high court on its own had last week taken up the matter and asked the Director General of Civil Aviation, Sec-retary, Ministry of Civil Aviation and Airport Authority of India Chairman to hold a meeting within a week on the issue of making the airport operational.

Senior advocate Mukul Rohatgi, appear-ing for the Indigo Airmentioned the petition before a bench headed by Chief Justice Ranjan Gogoi, which agreed to give it an urgent Ranian hearing on Thursday.

The bench, also comprising Justices S K Kaul and K M Joseph, was told that the airport was not ready for landing of big aircraft and does not have fire-fighting

'The operation can't

start," Rohatgi submitted before the bench.

The high court on December 7 had directed that the exercise for taking decision to make operational the airport has to be completed within seven days and had posted the matter for further hearing on December 14.

Besides Indigo, other operators were also represented by their advocates before the high court.

The brief hearing also witnessed lighter mo-ments when the bench told Rohatgi that he will now be identified as as Indigo's counsel.

'You will have tremendous disadvantage," the CJI said indicating there would be lot of requests to him.

When Rohatgi mentioned the matter, the CJI asked him "Who are you?"

He replied "I am In-

digo."

"We are always going to remember you are Indigo. You may have tremendous disadvantage since you are Indigo," Justice Gogoi said evoking quick response from Rohtagi that "I will get it fixed if there are difficulties".

The draft NRC was published on July 30 in which names of 2.89 crore of the 3.29 crore people were included The names of 40.70.707 people did not figure in the list. Of these, 37,59,630 names have been rejected and the remaining 2,48,077 are on

Earlier, the apex court had allowed the use of five more documents by claimants for the draft Assam NRC, saying the premise "better to exclude genuine per-son than to include a wrongful person" can't be accepted.

It had over-ruled the objections of state NRC coordinator Prateek Hajela that the documents to be relied upon to stake claim such as refugee registration certificate and ration card can be forged.

The claimants for draft Assam NRC can now stake claim with the help of total 15 documents provided in List-A of the claim form.

The ten legacy documents which were made admissible include land documents like registered sale deed, perma-nent residential certificate issued from outside the State, passport and LIC insurance policy of the relevant period.

The first draft of the NRC for Assam was published on the intervening night of December 31 and January 1 in accordance with the top court's direction. Names of 1.9 crore people out of the 3.29 crore applicants were incorporated then.

Assam, which had faced influx of people from Bangladesh since the early 20th century, is the only state to have an NRC, first prepared in 1951.

## **England shock Argentina 3-2 to** move into World Cup semi-finals



BHUBANESWAR, DEC 12. (PTI): England stunned Olympic champions Argentina 3-2 to book their place in the semi-finals of the 14th men's Hock-ey World Cup here on Wednesday.

England, who conceded the lead in the 17th minute, staged a superb come back to make their third successive semi-final appearance in the history of the tournament. England scored three field goals through Barry Middle-ton (27th minute), Will Calnan (45th) and Harry Martin (49th), while Gonzalo Peillat (17th, 48th) struck both the goals for the losers at the Kalinga Stadium.

Argentina, the bronze medallist in 2014, had themselves to blame for the defeat as they missed chances galore and got into panic mode after conceding the third goal.

Both Argentina and England were levelled 1-1 till 45th minutes but three goals in the

last quarter changed the whole scenario. Will Calnan made it 2-1 for England before

Peillat drew parity in the 48th minute.

But a minute lat-er Martin shocked the Los Leones with a field strike to hand England the decisive lead.

Earlier, realising that

Luke Taylor's effort from the resultant set piece earned them another penalty corner im-mediately but Argentina defended stoutly to keep

# 'Life saver' Alisson, Salah strike take Liverpool into last 16

LIVERPOOL, DEC 12 (AFP): Goalkeeper Alisson Becker was labelled a "life saver" by Liverpool manager Jurgen Klopp manager jurgen Klopp for a last-gasp save that secured a 1-0 win over Napoli at Anfield and progress to the last 16 of the Champions League on Tuesday.

Mohamed Salah's stunning solo effort put the hosts in front 11 minutes before half-time, but Liverpool were nearly made to pay for their profligacy in missing a series of second-half chances.

Alisson had harebeen tested until the Brazilian number one spread himself brilliantly to deny Arkadiusz Milik a dramatic stoppage-time equaliser and go a long way to justifying the then-world record 67-million (85 million) fee for a goalkeeper Liv-

erpool paid Roma in July. "If I knew Alisson was this good -- I would have paid double," joked Klopp.
"The goal Mo scored,

what a goal! And the save Ali made (was) unbelievable. It was of course a life saver tonight." Despite losing all three of their away games in Group C, three home wins at fortress Anfield were enough to see Liverpool through to the knockout stage on goals scored over the Italians second place behind ris Saint-Germain, who won 4-1 away to Red Star Belgrade to secure top spot.

"I'm still full of adrenaline, I could feel it in bubbles," added Klopp.

"This game was just amazing. The boys played with their whole heart on the pitch." Liverpool's charge to the Champions League final last season was spear-headed by Salah's 44goal season.

And after signalling his return to top form by scoring a hat-trick in a 4-0 win at Bournemouth on Saturday that sent Liverpool to the top of the Premier League, Salah's 13th goal of the campaign relegated Napoli to the Europa Leagi in the new year despite losing for the first time in

Europe this season.

"It's a real shame our efforts haven't been rewarded," said Napoli coach Carlo Ancelotti.

"We have no regrets. Overall the group of players have done extremely well, we took it down to the wire.
"You can't expect to

come to Liverpool and create 10 really good chances, we had one or





two and didn't have the

luck to take one of them." The outcome could have been very different if Virgil van Dijk had been sent off rather than just shown a yellow card that will keep him out of the first leg of Liv-erpool's last-16 tie for a dangerous lunge on Dries Mertens after just 15 minutes.

Had Liverpool conceded they would have had to win by two goals due to their 1-0 defeat in Naples, and the hosts failed to cash in on their dominance of the early stages of the second half and avoid a nervy ending.

Salah pulled his shot into the side-netting with a far better angle from the one he scored, while

Milner and Van Dijk sent long-range efforts flying just wide of the target.

Ospina made acrobatic saves to keep out Salah and Mane once more before Mane failed to hit the target with two glorious chances to Klopp's dismay.

Napoli should have levelled 12 minutes from time when Jose Maria Callejon spooned over a glorious chance at the back post.

But their best oppor-tunity came at the death only for Alisson to stand tall to keep a 12th clean sheet in 22 appearances and ensure Liverpool live to fight another day in the Champions League this season.

## **UN honours Indian startup which recycles** floral waste from temples to clean Ganga

KATOWICE (POLAND), DEC 12 (PTI): An Indian startup which works to clean up the mighty river Ganga by recycling thousands of tonnes of floral waste from temples has been honoured by the UN here.

Pradesh-based 'HelpUsGreen' has come up with the world's first profitable solution to the monumental temple waste problem: 'flowercy-cling', a UN document said, ng the initiative.

As many as 1,260 women have been supported through the startup to date and 19 children whose mothers used to work as manual going to school, it said.

The startup collects 8.4 tonnes of floral waste



from temples in Uttar Pradesh on a daily basis. These sacred flowers are handcrafted into charcoal-free incense, vermicompost and biodegradable packaging material through its 'flowercycling' techmaterial through nology. Women collect floral-waste daily from

temples. The waste is up-cycled to produce organic fertilisers, natural incense, and biodegrad-

able packaging material.

The Indian initiative along with other game-changing initia-tives from 13 other countries were honoured as winners of the United Nations Climate Action Award at a special cere-mony at the UN Climate Change Conference (COP 24) in Katowice on Tues-

day. "These activities shine a light on scalable climate action around the world. They are proof that climate action isn't only possible, it is innovative, it is exciting, and it makes a real difference," said Patricia Espinosa, Executive Secretary of

the UN Climate Change.
According to the UN,
11,060 metric tonnes of temple-waste has been flowercycled to date by the women working with the Indian initiave

As much as 110 met-ric tonnes of chemical pesticides that enter the river through temple waste have been offset, the income of 73 manual scavenger families has increased at least six-fold and 365 families have been impacted by it through increased living standards and stable in-

come, it said.

Across the country, people bring flowers to temples daily as gifts to the tune of more than 800 million metric tonnes per year.

These flowers thrown into the river Gan ga and India's other sacred rivers, a beautiful religious ritual that is having an un-fortunate effect.

As the flowers rot, they fill the rivers with waste, dumping toxins like arsenic, lead and cadmium from pesticides, thus causing pollution and enormous levels of water-borne diseases.

## North and South Korean soldiers enter each other's territory



SEOUL, DEC 12 (AFP): Soldiers from North and South Korea crossed into each other's territory peacefully for the first time on Wednesday, Seoul said, as they began checking the dismantlement of guard posts in the Demilitarized Zone.

The North invaded the South in 1950, trig-gering the Korean War, and Seoul went on to change hands four times as Pyongyang's Chi-nese-backed forces and the US-led UN troops supporting the South fought their way up and down the peninsula and back again.

The conflict ended in an armistice in 1953, leaving the two technically still in a state of war, but a rapid reconciliation has taken place this year.

The South's President Moon Jae-in and Kim Jong Un, leader of the nuclear-armed North, agreed to remove a limited number of guard posts along their heav-ily-fortified frontier at a September summit in Pyongyang, among other measures.

North Korea blew up 10 of its facilities in November, while the South tore 10 down on its own side using excavators.

South Korean in-spectors visited each of the guard posts on the North's side on Wednesday to make sure they had been dismantled and all firearms and troops removed Seoul's defence ministry said.

North Korean inspectors carried out the same process at the South's bunkers in the afternoon, it added.

Video footage showed armed South Korean soldiers shaking hands with North Korean personnel at the military demarcathe DMZ, before crossing to the other side

Led by the North Koreans, the Southerners walked along a path where the North's guard posts had once stood, soldiers from both sides taking photos and filming the process

as they chatted.
"This marks the first time since the division time since the division that the soldiers of the North and South... are peacefully crossing the military demarcation line," the ministry said in a statement.

The North is known to have more guard posts which include both surface structures and underground elements -and according to Yonhap news agency it now has around 150 in the DMZ, with the South having about 50.

Despite its name, the area around the DMZ is one of the most fortified places on earth, replete with minefields barbed-wire fences.

But under the plans to ease tensions agreed in Pyongyang, the two Koreas have demilitarised the border truce village of Panmunjom, leaving it manned by 35 unarmed personnel from each side.

Officially called the Joint Security Area (JSA), the enclave is the only spot along the 250-kilo-metre (155-mile) frontier where soldiers from the two Koreas and the US-led UN Command

Stand face to face.

The dovish Moon has pursued a policy of engagement with the North, in increasing contrast to Washington, which injects pressure which insists pressure should be maintained on Pyongyang until it denuclearises. (

## Huawei executive gets bail in case rattling China ties requesting bail.

VANCOUVER, DEC 12 (AFP): A Canadian court has granted bail to a top Chinese telecom company executive wanted in the United States, as diplomatic tensions turned to the detention of a former Canadian diplomat in Beijing.

Meng Wanzhou, the

chief financial officer of Huawei, was released on USD 7.5 million bail on Tuesday in a case that has rattled relations between China, the United States and Canada.

Meng, who faces a
US extradition bid on charges related to al-leged violations of Iran sanctions, was also ordered to surrender her passport and will be subjected to electronic

monitoring.
"The risk of (Meng's) non-attendance in court can be reduced to an acceptable level by imposing the bail conditions proposed by her coun-sel," a judge in Vancouver said, prompting the courtroom packed with her supporters to erupt

in cheers.

Meng, who later left in a black SUV, will be allowed to stay at a lux-ury home owned by her husband, Liu Xiaozong,

in Vancouver. Her December 1 arrest in Vancouver has shaken China's rela-tions with Canada and the United States, and



STRASBOURG (FRANCE), DEC 12 (AFP): A fugitive gunman who opened fire on Christmas shoppers at a market in Strasbourg, eastern France, shouted "Allahu akbar" (God is greatest) during his killing spree, French offi-cials said Wednesday as anti-terror police joined a giant manhunt.

The attack took place Tuesday night around 8 pm (1900 GMT) in the heart of the medieval city as the market was closing, leaving two dead and 13 injured.

Witnesses said the susoect, a 29-year-old Strasbourg native identified as Cherif C., cried "Allahu Akbar" as he opened fire with a handgun and stabbed ti-terror prosecutor Remy Heitz said Wednesday. The man, who was on

a watchlist for suspected religious extremists, had

already been sentenced

27 times in France, Germany and Switzerland for crimes including violence and robbery.
Four people connect-

ed to him were detained in Strasbourg night, he added. The man was flagged

by French security forces in 2015 as a possible extremist while in prison, after he "called for practising a rad-ical form of religion," deputy interior minister Laurent Nunez told France Inter radio Wednesday.

## **Using Laxmi Agarwal as lens to tell larger story** on acid violence in India: Meghna Gulzar

New Delhi, Dec 11 (PTI): Filmmaker Meghna Gulzar, who is set to direct a film on acid attack survivor Laxmi Agarwal, says the movie is an attempt to explore a larger story on acid violence in the country through the real life subject.

Deepika Padukone will be playing the lead role in the film, which marks the actor's first stint into production.

Meghna says Laxmi's case is the most revealing example of how India's law, medicine and administration machinery came together for justice.

"In the film with Deepika on acid

violence, I'm using Laxmi Agarwal as a subject because she is the most known acid fighter. Plus her case and her story has been the most relevant in terms of where legislation on acid violence, medical advancement, compensation for victims and things like that was concerned

"There was a whole socio-medi-cal and legal impact that her case had. Therefore, I am using her as a lens to tell a larger story on acid violence in India because even though acid is banned and the sale of acid is regulated in our country as of five years now, we still have acid attacks. It is still the simplest thing to get in a 'kirana' store in a tier-3 city,' the director told PTI in an interview.

In 2005, while Laxmi was waiting at a bus stop in Delhi, she was attacked by an assailant, a man twice her age, known to her family and an unlikely suitor

whose advances she had declined.

The film will showcase her journey in the time after her attack spanning a decade, a significant part of the story is the game-changing PIL in the Supreme Court which inspired the amendment on acid laws in 2013.

Meghna is not new to recreating real life stories on the big screen, having made "Talvar", a critically-acclaimed film on 2008 Aarushi-Hemraj twin murders of Noida and this year's "Raazi". which is based on a book inspired by a

real-life account of a female spy. The director has another project that will delve into the life of Field Marshal Sam Manekshaw but it is a not a biopic.

"The film on Field Marshal Manekshaw is not a biopic. I'm looking at the man. his life and his times," she says adding with a heavy sigh, "I'm way over my head over here (the story)".

Meghna does not like being called a female filmmaker but says the concept of "male gaze" is relevant in cinema.

She says every story has to be told from a certain perspective: case in point her film "Talvar", which, she believes, required a male gaze.

"And I was a woman telling the sto-

ry. It's the most masculine film I've ever made, there's no room for emotion. There's one female character in that movie which is Konkona and the girl who comes only for a few seconds at the end of the film.

"Everything was about male gaze so even when you're staging a scene you've to go into the mind of all the different male characters. How would they stand,

how would they react, how would they react to each other. What would their response be, what would their posture be?'

Meghna says she was careful in not taking sides with the story that became a tabloid fodder.

And yet she wanted to give it a moral

"With 'Talvar', I said, 'I'm being objective. I'm telling you both sides of the story but when I put that video footage at the end of the film which showed the only time that the girl was alive. That was my moral compass that I was leaving you with, that okay this is actually what happened, these two people died,

"If you want your story to be grey, there will be no moral compass. If you want to give a very definite take to the audience that they can go home with, at the end of your film, you will have a moral compass, and that moral compass could be any device. Sometimes the audience finds a moral compass that you didn't even realise you placed and that's the beauty of it," she added.

## **Queen's 'Bohemian Rhapsody' most**streamed song from 20th century

Queen's "Bohemian Rhapsody" has become the world's most-streamed song from the 20th century, four decades after the number was first recorded.

The single, which inspired the title of the recent Rami Malek-starrer Freddie Mercury biopic, is also the moststreamed classic rock song of all time, a release on the official page of the British rock band

said quoting Universal Music Group.

The original song and official video for Bohemian Rhapsody, taken from the group's 1975 album "A Night at the Opera", has surpassed 1.6 billion streams globally across all major streaming services.

"So the River of Rock Music has metamorphosed into streams! Very happy that our music is still flowing to the max!," Brian May, Queen's guitarist, and a founding member said.

"Bohemian Rhapsody" is considered one of the greatest songs ever recorded. In 2004, the song was inducted into the Grammy Hall of Fame and Freddie Mercury's vocal performance was named by the read-



ers of Rolling Stone magazine as the best in rock history.

The streaming success can also be contributed to the popularity of the film, which has become the highest grossing music biopic in history. Malek has been hailed universally for his empathic portrayal of Mercury, who died in 1991 of bronchial pneumonia resulting from AIDS.

Malek in an interview with PTI ahead of the film's release in India, said he had never worked so hard on anything because he wanted to honour Mercury and een's musical legacy.
"I am honoured to be the person to contribute to

Freddie's story and be a tiny part of Queen's legacy. The ability to bring it to a new generation is special and I am very fortunate to be a part of it.

"I have never worked this hard as on this to honour a human being. I probably asked for too many takes because I did not want to lie awake at night thinking 'I did not do everything that I could while I was on the set'. I pushed myself to the absolute limit," Malek had said.
