#### Kejriwal's dharna continues for fifth day with no side relenting

New Delhi, Jun 15 (PTI): The tug of war between the Lieutenant Governor and the AAP government showed no signs of easing as Chief Minister Arvind Kejri-wal and his cabinet colleagues today continued their sit-in at the L-G office for the fifth day, amid intensified pro-tests by the Aam Aadmi Party and the BJP which blamed each other for

the impasse.

Kejriwal, who along with his three cabinet colleagues have been staging a sit-in at the L-G office since Monday evening, wrote a second letter to Prime Minister Narendra Modi in as many days on the issue of alleged "strike" by IAS workers and challenged him to work without the officers attending his meetings.

"How do we work like this? Can Modi ji try working like this even for a day? Can our critics kindly tell us how do we function like this? (sic)," Kejriwal tweeted after Delhi Envi-ronment Minister Imran Hussain alleged that environment secretary did not attend a meeting on pollu-

tion in the evening.

In his fresh letter to Modi, Kejriwal urged him to end IAS officers' strike so that he can attend a meeting of NITI Aayog on

Kejriwal accompanied his deputy Manish Si sodia and ministers Satyendar Jain and Gopal Rai started an indefinite sit-in at the office of Lt Governor Anil Baijal demanding that he direct IAS officers to end their "strike" and approve doorstep ration delivery scheme.

However, the IAS officers' association has maintained that no offi-

cer is on "strike".

A team of 20 doctors reached the Lt Governor Secretariat this morning to conduct health check up of Jain and Sisodia, who have been on hun-ger strike on Tuesday and Wednesday respectively, after which Kejriwal expressed apprehension that the two ministers may be forced out of there.
"Why r they planning

to take them forcefully? It is just 4 days. Both of them r fit. They r fighting for the people of Delhi (sic)," Kejriwal tweeted. Also, Sisodia released

video warning that if they are forcibly re-moved from the L-G Secretariat, they will stop drinking water too.
Sources said that the

L-G. who has been working from his residence after the sit-in by AAP ministers, has constituted three teams of doctors to examine the health of ministers.

Arecent discussion on ideas of identity teased out – a lot of the passion behind reinforcing and reasserting identities, as much as they may be about ideas of self and of belonging, are also about privileges which accrue when such claims fructify. Privileges, however, are only one step away from ingraining a sense of entitlement even instilling sloth, and that is where futures can get compromised.

Maybe the minds that should be applying themselves to finding solutions are too occupied with other pursuits or maybe because the fire in the belly is just not burning strongly enough, whatever the reason, measures aimed at securing the futures for the present and coming generations remain perennially short-term in Sikkim. We speak of employment here. Quotas, reservation and guaranteed employment are short-term measures; options put in place till such time that the 'local' workforce acquires the skills and training required for the wider opportunities available. Make these protections permanent and the policy ends up rewarding mediocrity because it stops placing a premium on excellence. Why, after all, will a 'local' work hard at becoming employable when the carrot of guaranteed placement keeps dancing in front of him/her? In fact, to do so [work hard at becoming employable] would be seen as a waste of energy by many. But this approach is self-defeating. Sikkim is growing, both, in census figures and aspirations, and the job opportunities here will never be able to keep pace. Every job opportunity that opens in Sikkim in the next five years, once it is filled, will remain occupied on an average for the next thirty years. Even if all these job openings are made available only to locals, one still looks at an increasing number of job seekers entering the job market every year. School enrolments are up and the number of graduates has been consistently rising in the State, why, despite the density of "universities" here and one proper Central University, the State is in the process of establishing a state university as well because of the overflow. Given how young the pursuit of education is in Sikkim and the manner in which the population is growing, the number of job-seekers will keep multiplying every year. The State, even after 100% reservation, will soon run out of job opportunities.

The policy makers in government and noise makers outside have to realise that the solution is not in reserving jobs in Sikkim, but grooming generations to become employable anywhere in the world. Once that happens, jobs in Sikkim will automatically go to locals and this will come bundled with pride because they would have been earned on merit and not recommendations or old laws. This cannot happen though if people are spoilt for doles. It is not suggested that jobs in Sikkim should not be reserved for locals; what is being suggested is that celebrating protectionism only grooms mediocrity. Protections exist and should be maintained as a safety net, but aspirations have to be set much higher. One way to do this would be by fixing accountability not just on those who organise skill development programmes [by checking up on how many self-employed youth emerged from the training], but also following up on the funds the government invests on students by way of free education, text books, scholarships and other aids. It would not be a bad idea to release figures on how much the State spends on an average on its youth since the time they join school to the time they graduate. When the figure stares them in the face in black & white, maybe more of the youth will be inspired to put their education to better use than demanding a job from the government. If this happens, they will inspire more to follow in their footsteps. That is the chain reaction of achievers that the State has to aim at setting off, not pampering the youth with a policy that makes them lazy.

## Jurassic World: Fallen Kingdom where new dinosaurs emerge but who are the real monsters?

In Jurassic World: Fallen Kingdom the lines between human and monster are not clear-cut. Much of the film, the fifth instal-ment of the Universal franchise, is driven by both human and dinosaur capacity for empathy, extinction and reinvention

Owen Grady (Chris Pratt) and Claire Dearing (Bryce Dallas Howard) return in another swinging tale of unpredictable and

unreasoning monsters, brought back from extinc-tion and on the rampage, leaving a trail of mindless destruction across an island on the brink of natural

But this is a more thoughtful ride through the well-crafted Spielbergian universe, founded on a solid (and enjoyably false) premise, populated with spectacular creatures and flawed humans battling it out for survival, with the predictably plucky clever kid thrown in to make sense of it all.

Claire Dearing has seen the error of her cold

corporate ways from the previous Jurassic World (2015). She has invested in a pair of sensible out-door shoes and relaunched herself as a dinosaur conservationist, living and breathing the ethical conundrum of attempting to preserve a genetically resurrected species.

Owen Grady has retreated to the woods to build a log cabin, and is still determined to win Claire over. He remains the simple but handy muscle to balance Claire's passionate intellect, though his research into the creatures proves to be of value to commercial interests.

Ieff Goldblum's character Ian Malcolm makes all too brief an appearance, providing an authoritative philosophical take on the role these creatures play in our world, against the backdrop of commercialisa-tion, senate enquiries, and unbridled consumerism.

These creatures were here before us. And if we're not careful, they're gonna be here after us," Malcolm says.

And come after us they do, as Claire and Owen

are enlisted to save the species from "re-extinction". Remember Malcolm's sage pronouncements from the original Jurassic Park (1993): "Life cannot be contained", "Life breaks free", and the now totemic "Life finds a way". These three environmentally sensitive catchphrases provide hope for survival, but for whom or what? If the Jurassic films show us anything, it is that life ultimately just wants to be left alone and not turned into an elite tourist commodity

or set of biopharmaceutical experiments.

Claire and Owen are brought back together by an imminent volcanic eruption on Isla Nublar. As a bornagain conservationist, Claire needs Owen to help rescue a Velociraptor he trained and named Blue.

Claire believes she is doing the right thing as a (presumably left-leaning) conservator of rare and en-dangered species. She can save a select few, but not all. This has caused at least one reviewer to tear up

over the fate of a particularly vulnerable herbivore THE RIGHT KIND OF LIFE FINDS A WAY

If only a few could be saved, surely a Brontosaurus would be high on the list? But then, this manifest for a new-age ark has been strategically compiled.
We preserve and save what we value, whether

it is species, money or collections. In this instance though, value is determined by strictly capitalist motivations: the black market for endangered species, part of which wishes to monetise the mon-

sters as frontline soldiers in a (vestigial) arms race.

Wheeler-dealers (one with a rather Trumpian coiffure) are gleefully hatching plans to further modify and weaponise the creatures. Meat-eating theropods as natural born killers are their favourites, with herbivores like Ankylosaurus promoted for sale as nature's "tanks".

This is no longer humans versus nature. This is nature versus human consumer culture, and we already know who is probably going to win that fight. And the real monsters are much closer to home. vare us, the humans

BUT ARE THE DINOSAURS WELL-DEPICTED? Dinosaurs have always been the stars of these mov ies. They are the reason we all go to see these films, and old favourites steal the limelight – the Tyrannosaurus and so-called Velociraptors.

As in the previous outings, the movie variety are much bigger than real Velociraptor (c. 1.5m) and lack feathers that are a feature of most well-preserved embers of their family (the dromaeosaurids).

We also get to relish once again the sight of living

Ankylosaurus, Gallimimus, Compsognathus, Stegosaurus, Brachiosaurus, Apatosaurus and Triceratops

Making their first appearance in this movie are Sinoceratops, Carnotaurus, Baryonyx, Allosaurus,

Stygimoloch and the manmade hybrid "Indoraptor". In the water we see a much overblown, chunky mosasaur with a forked tail, as recently reported in the scientific literature (if you watch very closely).

In the air we again find beefed-up pterosaurs such as Pteranodon, capable of lifting humans off the ground - pretty amazing for a beast that in life weighed up to 20kg. The real Pteranodon also did not have teeth.

The horned theropod Carnotaurus, well-preserved skin impressions associated with the almost complete fossil skeleton, so we note that the skin texture of the movie beast is accurately depicted according to the scientific evidence

Sinoceratops, a run-of-the mill horned herbivore (ceratopsian), is seen briefly, as is Baryonyx, a close relative of the terrifying Spinosaurus that starred in Jurassic Park

A feisty little Stygimoloch, a dome-headed pachycepha-losaur that loves to headbutt things (as fossil evidence sup-ports), really steals the show in one hilarious scene.

Allosaurus is a very wellknown late Jurassic dinosaur from North America, whose in many fine museum displays

around that country.

It had its moment in Australian scientific history when an anklebone thought to belong to Allosaurus was found at a site on the eastern Victorian coastline near Inverloch in 1981.

This caused great controversy as the beast was thought to be restricted to North America. Later it was shown that the anklebone likely belonged to a newly discovered Queensland Cretaceous thero-

pod dinosaur called Australovenator.
While "Indoraptor" is supposed to be a genetic concoction, it is actually reminiscent of a small Madagascan theropod called Masiakiasurus. This also had a very peculiar set of teeth protruding from its lower jaws, but was much smaller in life (about 2m).

We do see some straight, hairlike feathers on the head of "Indoraptor", bringing it more into line with what we actually know of the skin covering of these kind of dinosaurs. The film-makers have done their homework

#### SCIENCE IS THE BIG LOSER

Once again scientists are no longer seen as heroes or even used as major players in the narrative. They too succumb to the dominant market forces.

The loss of real palaeontologists – Sam Neil's Alan Grant and Laura Dern's Ellie Sattler, who had leading roles in the early movies – is a real shame, especially for kids looking for intelligent role models and exciting careers in science.

There is no clear resolution to this story, not with so much invested in the gaming spin-offs, high box office expectations, and a pending final instalment.

The show, and the cute merchandising, will go on.
It helps us to switch off from the somewhat pressing problem of extinction facing not just our own kind, but the thousands of other life forms on the brink of catastrophe caused by unbridled human consumption. We are after all in the midst of the sixth great mass extinction event.

This is a mess that humans have created, and

where science provides clear solutions to how we can in future act to avoid catastrophe, yet politicians with their eyes fixed only on immediate economic benefit routinely ignore such advice.
In the end, it's left up to us to "find a way".

## 'Stay safe': why women are enraged by advice to steer clear of violent men

his week, a man allegedly raped and murdered a young wom emerging comedian Eurydice Dixon - as she walked home from a comedy gig. 19-year-old Jaymes Todd has since been charged with one count of murder and one count of rape.

In the wake of yet another tragic but, importantly, not unavoidable loss of a woman's life, police predictably advised people to "stay safe" by engaging in a range of "protective" strategies.

The social media response was swift, with the police comments quickly denounced as yet another example of the ways in which we deflect the blame for men's violence back onto women.

So why do we keep telling wom-en to "stay safe", and why is it such a

a young age that they are responsible for avoiding the violence that men perpetrate against us. At best, this makes safety "advice" redundant.

When women don't use these routines, it's often because they are with people they trust or in familiar places making the use of such routines seem nnecessary. But unfortunately, as the statistics

on violence against women show all too clearly, those we trust are among the most likely to hurt us – feeling safe is unfortunately not the same as being safe. Some women also reject or challenge such "advice" on the basis that it is ineffective and burden-

Women also routinely experience harassment and threats in public space that remind us of the possibilities of what could happen – and cases such as the recent incident in Melbourne confirm these.

Indeed, as I walked home that night, I found myself questioning whether I should take my usual route home through the park as the twi-light dissipated into darkness, and the usual crowd of joggers slowly thinned out, my world instantly be-coming a little smaller:

What if this happens to me? Am I being reckless? If something does

happen, will it be my fault?

This highlights the impossible double-bind women face in engaging in "safety" routines: if we use them we restrict our worlds and possibilities. Often, women are positioned as "overreacting" and "hysterical" in relation to their wariness and hyper-vigilance in public places.

Yet, if we don't engage in these routines, we are positioned as being to blame for what happens to us. Fiona Vera-Gray refers to this deli-

cate balancing act as having "the right amount of panic".

While "safety" routines limit wom-en's lives, they are also paradoxical. For example, using these routines made women in my own research feel safe, enabling them to access spaces and engage in activities they perhaps otherwise would not have. They simultaneously contract and expand our possibilities for being. This presents a more complex picture – although ultimately these routines are an imposition, offering women an impoverished or partial

#### A SENSE OF CONTROL

So, why do women use these routines, and why is this type of "advice" trotted out in the aftermath of such incidents? One potential answer lies in the fact that using these strategies often fosters a sense of (mostly) false control over our worlds. This is referred to as a "be-lief in a just world" – that if we do all of the "right" things, bad things won't happen to us (and, if they do, we did not deserve them and were not to blame).

It's also very difficult to know to what extent such routines are effective. Some feminist researchers have argued that "random" acts of violence perpetrated by strangers against women in public places may be comparatively rare, precisely because women are so adept at using safety strategies and avoidance routines. This argument is almost impossible to verify. After all, how do you measure something that hasn't happened?

In other research, women encoun-

tered various forms of sexual harassment and violence regardless of wheth-er they had used different safety strategies or not. Sadly, this was also illus-trated in Eurydice Dixon's case. While police encouraged citizens to have a phone on them at all times. Eurydice had herself used this strategy, texting a friend to say that she was almost home safely. This suggests such strategies are limited in effectiveness

#### PREVENTION OR AVOIDANCE?

Even if some women are able to effectively harness "safety" strategies in some situations, this is not effective as a prevention tool. At best, it could be thought of as victimisation avoidance.

Teaching women to enact safety strategies relies on the inevitable possibility that there is a willing perpetrator out there whom we need to avoid. While safety strategies may allow indi-viduals to avoid or deflect a perpetrator, this may simply displace harm onto a more vulnerable target.

Ultimately, the focus on safekeeping

routines are problematic in that they shift responsibility for men's violence back on to women, and distract us from the difficult and long-term conversa-tions and deep-seated cultural, social, and structural changes that need to happen to truly prevent this violence from occurring in the first place.
For what it's worth, I did walk home

through the park alone in the end: a small act of feminist resistance in honour of all the women who should have made it home safely.

KALININGRAD, JUN 15 (AFP): Former World Cup semi-finalists Croatia take on African powerhouses Nigeria in the Russian exclave of Kaliningrad tomorrow in their opening Group D match that may prove a test of the organisers' anti-racism drive.

It is 20 years since Croatia surged

to the final four at France '98 with a resounding quarter-final win over favourites Germany, and fans will be buoyed by a squad brimming with attacking talent.

Nigeria, long one of African foot-

Nigeria, long one of African football's underachievers, boast several players with English Premier League pedigree, and will hope they can secure only their second win in their last 12 World Cup matches. The stage for Saturday's clash is

The stage for Saturday's clash is Kaliningrad, a thickly forested outpost of Russia wedged between Poland and Lithuania on the Baltic Sea -- a potentially challenging location for some fans to reach.

FIFA's official site showed tickets



still available 24 hours before kick-off.

Saturday will also prove a crucial test for FIFA's anti-discrimination drive, with tension running high in the build-up to the tournament over a spate of recent incidents.

Racism has plagued Russian football since clubs began purchasing foreign players after the Soviet Union collapsed in 1991. Russia's football federation was last month slapped with a 25,000-euro fine after racist chants from supporters during a friendly against France.

FIFA has instituted a three-strikes policy against any racist abuse from fans across the tournament, threatening to abandon matches if supporters ignore a stadium speaker announcement and then a pause in play.

Nigeria's Dutch-born defender Will Troost-Ekong told Britain's The Guardian newspaper last month that the players would react as one to any abuse. Croatia, appearing at their fifth

Croatia, appearing at their fifth World Cup, boast a host of world-class talent, including Real Madrid's Luka Modric, Barcelona's Ivan Rakitic and Mario Mandzukic of Juventus.

The Balkan nation lost 2-0 to Brazil in a friendly in the run-up to the tournament that marked Neymar's return to international football, before a comefrom-behind 2-1 win over Senegal on June 9.

Nigeria lost 2-1 to England at Wembley and fell to a turgid 1-0 defeat by the Czech Republic to leave their German coach Gernot Rohr plenty of selection headaches, particularly in attack.

The Super Eagles are this World Cup's youngest squad, and several Premier League regulars, including Arsenal's Alex Iwobi, Leicester's Wilfried Ndidi and Victor Moses of Chelsea will be crucial.



## Nervy Argentina seek Messi magic against Iceland

Moscow, Jun 15 (AFP): Lionel Messi's Argentina aim to put a shambolic World Cup build-up behind them and make a statement in their opening match against tournament debutants Iceland today.

The two-time champions arrived in

The two-time champions arrived in Russia dogged by poor form, injuries and controversy.

But Messi is a man on a mission as he chases his first World Cup winner's medal and will not tolerate complacency against the minnows at Moscow's Spartak stadium.

"Iceland showed they could compete with anyone at the last Euros," he said, referring to their giant-killing run at the 2016 European Championship in France. Messi was devastated by Argentina's

Messi was devastated by Argentina's loss to Germany in the 2014 World Cup final, with the agony compounded by back-to-back Copa America defeats to Chile in 2015 and 2016.

Despite his achievements with Barcelona, the five-time world player of the year is yet to win a major international tournament and time is running out as his 31st birthday looms.

He briefly retired from international football after the 2016 Copa America and has hinted he will do so permanently if the campaign in Russia ends in failure.

The Group D clash pits an Argentine side that critics say is too focused on superstar Messi against a band of grafters who pride themselves on teamwork.

should have little trouble disposing of Iceland, an island nation of 330,000 that is the smallest country to ever reach the

But the Icelanders revel in their underdog status and showed at Euro 2016 they will not be cowed on the big stage.

Spurred on by their fans' thunderous "Viking clap", they earned a 1-1 draw with

Cristiano Ronaldo's Portugal then famously dumped out England to reach the quarter-finals.

"We kept Ronaldo quite quiet so hopefully we can do the same against Messi," said Burnley winger Johann Berg Gudmundsson.

"We know we're probably going to be defending for a lot of the time and obvi-

ously he's one of the best players in the world and he can turn it on."

Iceland, ranked 17 places behind Argentina at 22nd in the world, topped their group in European qualifying with comfortable wins over Croatia, Ukraine and Turkey.

Argentina reserve goalkeeper Nahuel Guzman said the squad would do every-

thing in their power to give Messi the success he craves but they are expecting a tight match against Iceland.

"We must show patience and move the ball around to try and find space, and look to get in behind with speed," said Guzman, who plays for Mexican club Tigres.

"It will be a very tight game in which we'll also have to control our nerves." Argentina only made it to the finals courtesy of a Messi hat-trick in their final qualifier against Ecuador.

Subsequent friendlies have given cause for concern -- there was a 4-2 loss to Nigeria in November and a 6-1 humiliation by Spain in March, although Messi did not play in either match.

Argentina's final warm-up against Israel in Jerusalem was cancelled after protests from Palestinians, miring the team in controversy and leaving players short of match practice.

To further compound their problems, goalkeeper Sergio Romero and midfielder Manuel Lanzini both fell victim to late injuries.

Accusing Argentina of over-reliance on Messi may seem unfair to a team boasting the sharp attacking talents of Sergio Aguero, Paulo Dybala and Gonzalo Higuain but it is a view coach Jorge Sampaoli himself has expressed.

"He can carry the team on his shoulders," Sampaoli said of the player who scored 45 goals in 54 games for Barcelona this season.

## Trump approves tariffs on USD 50 billion worth of Chinese goods, Beijing vows to retaliate

WASHINGTON/BEIJING, JUN 15 (PTI): US President Donald Trump has approved levying of new tariffs worth USD 50 billion on Chinese exports and China today vowed to quickly retaliate, raising the possibility of a trade war between the world's two largest economies and trading partners.

The US says its tariffs on Chinese goods are in response to what it categorises as theft of intellectual property.

of intellectual property.

A formal announcement is expected to be made by the US Trade Representative later today.

Trump's approval to impose tariffs on Chinese exports followed a 90-minute meeting he had with Commerce Secretary Wilbur Ross, Treasury Secretary Steven Mnuchin and US Trade Representative Robert Lighthizer yesterday.

Reacting to Trump's latest

Reacting to Trump's latest move, China vowed to immediately retaliate. "If the US side adopts uni-

"If the US side adopts unilateral protectionist measures and damages China's interests, we will immediately react and take necessary measures to



firmly safeguard our legitimate rights and interests," said China's foreign ministry spokesman Geng Shuang during a regular news briefing in Beijing.

China had previously said it would respond to American tariffs on USD 50 billion worth of Chinese exports with retaliatory tariffs on USD 50 billion of US products such as cars. aircraft and soybeans

Trump's first announced that the US would impose trade penalties on about USD 50 billion of Chinese goods in March.

After China warned it would retaliate, Trump threatened tariffs on a further USD 100 bil-

lion of Chinese products.

In mid-May, both sides announced a cease-fire after two

rounds of trade negotiations. The countries said in a joint statement that China would "significantly increase" purchases of US agricultural and energy products to reduce the trade imbalance, a top Trump administration demand.

Ten days later, the White House abruptly said it would proceed with the tariffs.

A further round of trade talks in Beijing earlier this month failed to yield any breakthroughs.

President Trump's decision to impose fresh tariffs on China follows his recent imposition of steep tariffs on steel and aluminum imports from Canada, Mexico and the European Union on national security grounds. Those penalties have been met with consternation by world leaders, and led to a fraught G7 meeting with Canada, France, Germany, Italy, Japan and the United Kingdom last weekend.

The European Union and Canada have said they will enact retaliatory tariffs starting in July. Mexico has already retaliated with its own tariffs on US goods.

#### Swedish court finds man guilty of spying for China

COPENHAGEN, JUN 15 (AP): A Swedish court has found a man guilty of spying for China by gathering information on Tibetans who had fled to Sweden, and sentenced him to 32 months in ied.

him to 22 months in jail.

The Sodertorn District Court near Stockholm found Dorjee Gyantsan, a 49-year old Tibetan who worked for a pro-Tibetan radio station, guilty of "gross illegal intelligence activity" from July 2015 to February 2017.

Judge Daniel Eriksson said Friday the Swedish intelligence service's investigation had proven that Gyantsan "several times traveled to Poland to meet a Chinese intelligence officer" and that those meetings were "part of a comprehensive intelligence campaign aimed at people of Tibet-

Eriksson added the information "may have caused great damage to Tibetans both in Sweden and abroad." Gyantsan was arrested Feb. 26, 2017, in Sweden.

Children as young as 12 have been physically abused, detained and forcibly returned to Italy by French border guards in a breach of international standards, Oxfam has claimed. A report from the charity says children complained about being "physically and verbally abused, and detained overnight in cells without food, water or blankets and with no access to an official guardian" - all contrary to French and EU law. It says French police routinely stop unaccompanied children and put them on trains back to Italy after altering their paperwork to make them appear older, or to make it appear that they want to be sent back. They claim around 16,500 refugees and migrants, a quarter of them unaccompanied children, passed through Ventimiglia, a small town about 7km (four miles) from the French border, in the nine months to April.
