Five Bills tabled on the first day of Assembly Session

GANGTOK, 19 SEPT [IPR]: The first day of the Seventh Session [Part-IV] of 9th Assembly of Sikkim Legislative As-sembly saw the presentation of the Second Supplementary Demands for Grants for the financial year 2018-19. The demands were placed in the House during the Financial Business by Chief Minister Pawan Cham-ling, who also the Minister-in-Charge of Finance, Revenue & Expenditure Department, Government of Sikkim.

The Second Supplementary Demands for Grants for the financial year 2018-19 includes 20 grants and appropri-2018-19 includes which include gross additional expen-



diture of Rs. 27,992.95 lakh comprising of Rs. 20,121.89 lakh on Revenue Account and Rs. 7,871.06 lakh on Capital Account. Of this, the proposals involving net cash outgo aggregates to Rs. 26,934.40 lakh.

During the Legislative Business, five Bills were introduced in the House by the concerned Ministers-In-Charge.

Minister-In-Charge of Health Care, Human Services & Family Welfare Department, AK Ghatani, introduced the Sikkim Anti Drugs [Amendment] Bill, Bill No. 20 of 2018.

Drugs [Amendment], Bill, Bill No 20 of 2018 was framed to incorporate the principle of medical care and psychiatric treatment of addicts and to assess their condition through psychiatric or psychological evaluation. Minister-In-Charge

Forest, Environment Wildlife Management Department, Tshering Wangdi Lepcha, intro-duced the Sikkim Wildlife Protection [Amendment] Bill, Bill No. 21 of 2018. The Statement of Objects & Reasons of the Bill states that it was felt expedient to include a new condition to permit the public to chase away wildlife if it causes damage to their agricultural/ horticultural crops and if it attacks their cattle in their private land.

This amendment was prompted by reports of increased incidents of wildlife damaging crops

and attacking cattle in private lands.

Minister-In-Charge of Land Revenue & Disaster Depart-lling, also Management ment, Mr Chamling, introduced the Sikkim Regulation of Transfer of Land [Amendment] Bill, Bill No. 23 of 2018.

He also introduced the Sikkim Goods and Services Tax [Amendment] Bill, Bill No. 24 of 2018. The Statement of objects and reasons of this Bill states that the amendment was felt necessary make the functioning of the Sikkim Goods and Services Tax Act more effective, meaningful and for easier com-pliance by the taxpayer. This amendment Bill is also intended to streamline functioning of the provisions of the Act.

Similarly, ter-In-Charge Legal, Legislative & Parliamentary Affairs Department, RB Subba, introduced the Sikkim Lokayukta [Amendment] Bill, Bill No. 25 of 2018.

The Sikkim Lokayuk-ta [Amendment] Bill, Bill No 25 of 2018 proposes that provisions of Section 9 and 18 be made effective retrospectively with effect from 27 Feb, 2014 and section 37 A and the proviso to section 45 have been made effective with immediate effect. These amendments have been proposed with a view to further strengthen and streamline the

SKM claims credit for appointment of police constables solely on basis of written exam

Sikkim Krantikari Morcha party
Spokesperson, Jacob Khaling,
has claimed full credit for his party president, PS Tamang [Golay], for the appointment of 885 police constables on the basis of written examination. On behalf of the SKM party and youth of Sikkim, he also congratulated the party president for raising his voice for justice for the youth of Sikkim.

Addressing a press conference here today, Mr Khaling stated that SKM has been working as the shadow government to bring change in the State administration and provide justice to the people of

He mentioned that in a recent public meeting at Arithang under Yuksom-Tashiding constituency on 14 September, Mr Tamang demanded that the viva system for govt job appointments be abolished since this was being used by influential people to secure berths for their candidates. The SKM president had advocated appointment based solely on written examinations to guarantee fair and transparent appoint-

ments.

He expressed happiness that the issue raised by SKM president



led to the appointment of 709 male, 142 female and 34 technicians as police constables on the basis of written examination.

He also congratulated the new appointees. He added that 885 people got jobs due to the farsight-edness of Mr Tamang. He also demanded that the government provide the full salary as per the pay scale to these candidates during the training period instead of the consolidated salary of Rs 7,000.

posts were still lying vacant in Sikkim Police, Mr Khaling demanded that the government immediate-ly call a fresh examination to fill ese vacancies.

He also demanded that the government appoint all nurses who have passed written examinations in the recent hiring process for staff nurses.

Likewise, SKM ex-service front vice-president, Kado Tshering, in-formed that the recent interview of the police constable was called for total posts of 302 included 230 male, 60 female and 12 in wireless but due to voice raised by SKM president 885 got jobs instead of 302.

He asserted that extension and reemployment should be stopped immediately to provide more jobs to youth and for the promotion of junior officers and staffs. He stated that the government has again extended the service of Dr Kumar Bhandari and posted as Secretary of Animal Husbandry. 

During the question hour, Min-ister in-charge for Rural Management and Development Department, SB Subedi, responding to the query raised by Syari MLA, Kunga Nima Lepcha, said that apart from ensuring the quality of works by the departmental engineers, the quality is also checked, tested and verified from time to time by National Quality Monitors [NQM] and State Quality Monitors [SQM] appointed by the National Rural Infrastructure Development Agency [NRIDA] and State Rural Infrastructure Developm [SRIDA] respectively. To another question raised by the Syari MLA, the RMDD Minister said that the construction of drain is under progress. The department has instructed the contractor to provide drains according to the provisions in the DPR however the same was under progress and not yet completed. Since the work is new cutting road works, the same is stopped during the monsoon season. However, any damages that occur during the con-struction phase will be assessed in the joint inspection with LR&DM Department and processed for approval of the authority for damage compensation, he added.

Minister in charge for Food Security, Agriculture & Horticulture Development Department, Somnath Poudyal, while replying to the questions raised by MLA Kunga Nima Lepcha stated that the government has, a long time back, identified the issues raised regarding the rhizome rot in ginger, citrus decline in orange and Chhirkay-Phurkey in Cardamom.

The Horticulture & Cash Crops velopment Department has put in place extension workers at the District, Sub-Division, BAC and GPU Level. This extension wing organizes awareness and training

sis in the different ginger growing clusters and advocates control measures for management of ginger rhizome rot.

Organic manure, bio-pesticides, irrigation support is being provided by Department to the orange farmers. The Department is also implementing the 'Orange Rejuvenation programme' to bring back to health old, diseased and saline orchards. In addition, new plantations are taken up to replace unproductive orchards.

Likewise, on Chhirkay-phurkay diseases, the Minister respond-ed by saying that the emphasis has shifted to quality of produce rather than bulk production and hence superior quality planting materials are being distributed to the farmers to address the issue of Chhirkey-Phurkey. Simultaneously training and awareness programme are being organized by the Department on various crop

All the extension works, awareness programmes, trainings and demonstration are being done by the department by actively involv-ing Spices Board, National Organic Farming Research Institute [NOF-RI], who provide research-based inputs.

"In Sikkim, there is immense scope of employment and income generation through production and supply of quality planting material of cash Crops. The quality of planting material is most essential for increased production. Inferior quality planting material produced out of unscientific methods will only result in spread of diseases and reduction in yield. Our Local educated and unemployed youth are encouraged to take active part in creating accredited nurseries which will have tremendous impact on the livelihood status of the farmers of our State in near future," said Mr Poudyal.

Disgustingly Compromised, Inadequately Incensed

We should not stop talking about sexual abuse of children

here was an incident not very long ago, could not There was an incident not very long and have been more than five or six years back when a septuagenarian was beaten up by his nephew. When news of the incident first arrived, most people clucked at the degeneration of our times and of how age no longer commanded respect. As more details unraveled, while the sense of degeneration was reinforced, the sympathies had shifted. Apparently, the septuage narian was a pedophile, and among the victims he had preyed upon was his nephew's child. The incident had come to light when parents of other victims had come to know of the pedophile among them and had lodged a police complaint. But that was still not when he was roughed up. Apparently, the matter was settled out of court when the extended family negotiated a "settlement" and a "punishment". The pervert was to be socially ostracized by the village and the family. The nephew eventually "lost it" when the predator was allowed back into the village within a few months on the justification that he was of advanced age and "repentant"!

It is worrying that most people still not see the depravity of what had been engineered in this case until the High Court took notice. While the cops were all fine with the "compromise" arranged in the child molestation case, they did their job and picked up the nephew on assault charges. When the High Court was hearing an appeal on the assault case, it learned of the obnoxious negotiations which had gone sour and resulted in the assault. The Court then ordered the cops to investigate the original case. One does not know what happened of that investigation, but this one episode which got "outed", should have opened the can of worms that the society at large does very well to keep packed in Sikkim. After all, this cannot be the only POCSO Act case that has been compromised.

The horrors that visit victims of child abuse are too

inadequately handled by the society and its systems. Imagine the anger, frustration and hate that a victim will grow up into when s/he realizes that the perpetrator, even after being exposed and caught, was allowed to walk free without being held to account. It should worry Sikkim that the kind of subversion carried out in the case mentioned above although shocking and disturbing for some, are not necessarily rare. Criminal acts, especially offences against women and children, are more pervasive than accepted and unfortunately less prosecuted than is necessary for women and children to be made safe in this off-balance society. The criminally-inclined will continue to commit excesses because that is a tendency they have been allowed to nurture and get away with, and every time they are 'saved' from punishment, and victims refused the justice that the society owes them, the perpetrators are emboldened and the victims further smothered.

Institutions in our country are geared to instinctively circle the wagons around their own even when though it should be the victims who command all the sympathy. This attitude makes for a dangerous mix with the patriarchal instincts in which genuine sensitivity towards women and children becomes a stillborn pursuit. The incident shared here fleshes out all that is wrong with the tokenisms being paid to women and child welfare and amplify the societal failures and failure of organizations and committees specifically tasked with looking out for them. And let's accept it even the commissions tasked with looking after the welfare and interests of women and children were not born out of the society's realization to have specialist organizations for the job. These organizations are there because a central rule mandates them and because there are funds to sustain them. While this is not to suggest that such organizations are useless, but it also needs to be accepted that they not very motivated either. Otherwise, "compromise" of any offence against women or children should attract immediate ate condemnation from such organizations. But why blame the organizations when the society itself conspires against its young so often?

Given the nexus of connections which most institutions and organizations and even the society at large have become, priorities are always misplaced and reprehensive responses unleashed often. These problems cannot be corrected with more rules and more laws - what is required is wider sensitivity and a clear checklist of due processes. Since individuals are routinely failing in what is expected of them, the institu-tion should be made such that there is a prescribed code and a transparent process which needs to be fol-lowed whenever a complaint is lodged or an incident comes to light. Personal prejudices, and we are a nation which is deeply prejudiced on all issues, need to be snuffed out, and this will happen only when guidelines are detailed and digressions severely penalized. Until that happens tokenism will rule.

No matter what method is used to teach math, make it fun

 Γ here's a change coming to Ontario's elementary school math curriculum. The new provincial government says it is re-sponding to a decline of standardized test scores and plans to recommend a return to 'back-to-basics" teaching methods for mathematics teachers.

Premier Doug Ford and Minister of Edu-cation Lisa Thompson have told educators that directives for changes

will be coming within a matter of weeks. Teachers, whose lesson plans for the fall are already drawn, are possibly now scrambling to implementation of the second plants for the land are already are possibly now scrambling to implementations.

Education Quality and Accountability Office (EQAO) scores for students in Grade 6 and Grade 3 in Ontario are both down one percentage point from last year. Previous efforts, including a \$60-million initiative by the former Liberal government to improve the EQAO scores, have not worked.

WHAT ARE 'BACK-TO-BASICS' METHODS?

What exactly are "back-to-basics" teaching methods for mathematics? These traditional methods of mathematics education include an emphasis on drills, formulas and memorization. If you are old enough, then this was how you were taught mathematics in grade school. In contrast, discovery-based methods spend less time on rules and puts more emphasis on problem solving and applications.

The two methods have somewhat opposing approaches. In traditional methods, rules are taught first and then drilled into students via memorization and solving problems. In discovery methods, problems and examples come first and are abstracted to rules and formulas.

For example, in a traditional math lesson, children are told the rule that the order of multiplication of two numbers doesn't matter, and then they would work on problems related to that topic. In discovery math, children would work out examples such as 2 times 3 and 3 times 2, and then abstract this to the general case. Both approaches teach the same thing, but in different ways.

No one should be surprised by these changes after the Progressive Conservatives won a majority in the Ontario election in June. During the election campaign, Ford tweeted, "...We are going to scrap discovery math, and replace it with proven methods of teaching:"

A similar change was announced regarding Ontario's sex-ed curriculum and elementary so teachers are now required to teach a curriculum essentially dating back to 1998

WHICH OPTION IS BETTER?



There are pros and cons to both traditional and discovery methods.

My issue with the debate about the "correct" way to teach mathematics to children is the way it is phrased as a binary, either-or approach. The

1) Drill students on topics such as fractions and timetables.

2) Have children discover math rules and formulas

Neither approach in isolation does justice to math education or reflects how people learn mathematics.

Learning rules and formulas in mathematics is an essential skill, as you need a foundation from which to build. Children need to know what the product of 6 and 8 is without having to rediscover

At the same time, children gain critical prob lem-solving skills via discovery. They get to think more deeply about the subject. No one would teach language skills by only teaching grammar. You teach children the rudiments of grammar to get them speaking, reading and writing.

In my university teaching, I employ a mixture of traditional and discovery approaches. For example, in a first-year Calculus course, I introduce a formula or rule at the beginning of a lecture but spend most of the class working out examples interactively with the class so they may figure out how things work. In a more advanced, upper-year mathematics course, I state a theorem or problem, but then break up the class into smaller groups and have the students discover the proof with hints from me

A THIRD PATH: MATH SPECIALISTS

When I was in elementary school, our classes had the occasional visit from specialist teachers who focused solely on art or music. These teachers didn't perform the regular, daily instruction in classes but instead floated between classes enriching the curriculum. It was always a treat when these specialist teachers came and it also was a break from the routine of everyday instruction.

Let's imagine something like this with mathe-

teachers with a math ematics background in their university ed-ucation, or even math professors or university students with the proper training to engage with elementary school classes. I can think of plenty of fun and engaging lessons in my research area of networks for a Grade 6 class, for example. Math specialists would float between classes with the sole goal of enriching math educa-

matics education. Math specialists could be

Math specialists may assist with the teaching of core material, but more importantly, they would help coach teachers and provide lesson plans that complement the material. Their goals would be to engage students and cultivate their interest in learning mathematics.

While mathematics educators like myself might point to the positive impact of math specialists, re-search on their effectiveness is still emerging. A study funded by a National Science Foundation at Virginia Commonwealth University found that math specialists have a significant, positive impact on student achievement. Similar results were reported by the National Council of Teachers of Mathematics.

BEYOND TEST SCORES

While test scores are important, there is much more to mathematics education. Despite the declining EQAO scores, our kids aren't exactly flunking out of math in droves. The EQAO standards require a 70 per cent or better to qualify as meeting the standard, not the typical passing grade of 50 per cent.

Our children must be exposed to a rich, engaging mathematics curriculum, even if they don't become mathematicians or have anything to do with STEM (science, technology, engineering, math) directly in their adult lives. Numeracy, like literacy, is an essential skill in our modern world.

A generation with weak math skills will not be competitive to tackle the next set of challenges in our knowledge-based economy. And a dislike of math tends to pass on from one generation to the next. No child should think it makes them cool to

boast that they hate math.
While we are rethinking math education in Ontario, let's use the best of both traditional and discovery methods and add in math specialists. Done correctly, this should not only increase test scores, but also bolster student engagement.

Let's also take the time and effort to make math fun. Imagine if children were excited to learn mathematics? Isn't that what we all want?

How much plastic does it take to kill a turtle? Typically just 14 pieces

We know there is a lot of plastic in the ocean, and that turtles (and other endangered species) are eating it. It is not uncommon to find stranded dead turtles with guts full of plastic.

But we weren't really sure whether plastic eaten by turtles actually kills them, or if they just happen to have plastic inside them when they die. Another way to look at it would be to ask: how much is too much plastic for turtles?

This is a really important question. Just because there's a lot of plastic in the ocean, we can't necessarily presume that animals are dying from eating it. Even if a few animals do, that doesn't mean that every animal that eats plastic is going to die. If we can estimate how much plastic it takes to kill a turtle, we can start to answer the question of exactly how turtle populations are affected by eating plastic debris.

In our research, published today in Na-

ture Scientific Reports, we looked at nearly 1,000 turtles that had died and washed up on beaches around Australia or were found in nets. About 260 of them we ex-

amined ourselves; the others were reported to the Queensland Turtle Stranding Database. We carefully investigated why the turtles died, and for the ones we examined, we counted how many pieces of plastic they had eaten.

Some turtles died of causes that were nothing to do with plastic. They may have been killed by a boat strike, or become entangled in fishing lines or derelict nets. Turtles have even been known to die after accidentally eating a blue-ringed octopus.

Others definitely died from eating plastic, with the plastic either puncturing or blocking their gut.



One of the first meals eaten by this sea turtle post-hatchling turned out to be deadly. It died from consuming more than 20 tiny pieces of plastic, many of which were about the same size as a grain of rice.

Some turtles that were killed by things like boat strikes or fishing nets nevertheless had large amounts of plastic in their guts, despite not having been killed by eating plastic. These turtles allow us to see how much plastic an animal can eat and still be alive and functioning.

The chart below sets out this idea. If an animal

drowned in a fishing net, its chance of being killed by plastic is zero – and it falls in the lower left of the graph. If a turtle's gut was blocked by a plastic bag, its chance of being killed by plastic is 100%, and it's

The animals that were dead with plastic in their

have a chance of death due to plastic somewhere between 0 and 100% – we just don't know, and they can fall anywhere in the graph. Once we have all the animals in the plot, then we can ask whether we see an increase in the chance of death due to plastic as the amount

of plastic in an animal goes up.

We tested this idea using our turtle samples. We looked at the relationship between the likelihood of death due to plastic as de-termined by a turtle autopsy, and the number of pieces of plastic found inside the animals.

Unsurprisingly, we found that the more plastic pieces a turtle had inside it, the more likely it was to have been killed by plastic. We calculated that for an average-sized turtle (about 45cm long), eating 14 plastic items equates to a 50% chance of being fatal.

That's not to say that a turtle can eat 13 pieces of plastic without harm. Even a single piece can potentially kill a turtle. Two of the turtles we studied had eaten just one piece of plastic, which was enough to kill them. In one case, the gut was punctured, and in the other, the soft plastic had clogged the turtle's gut. Our analyses suggest that a turtle has a 22% chance of dying if it eats just one piece

of plastic. A few other factors also affected the animals' chance of being killed by plastic. Juveniles eat more debris than adults, and the rate also varies between

different turtle species. Now that we know how much is too much plastic, the next step is to apply this to global estimates of debris ingestion rates by turtles, and figure out just how much of a threat plastic is to endangered

sea turtle populations.

Assam NRC: SC orders resumption of filing of claims and objections by those left out

NEW DELHI, SEP 19 (PTI): The Supreme Court Wednes day ordered resumption of filing of claims and objections by around 40 lakh people who were left out in the draft National Register of Citizens (NRC) of Assam.

A bench of Justices Ran-jan Gogoi and R F Nariman said the process will commence on September 25 and remain open for 60 days.

"We are of the view that all that which we are required to do at this stage is to open the filing of claims and objections with regard to inclusion in the draft NRC published in July this year," the bench said.

It also made clear that the second opportunity has been granted to the citizens keeping in mind the "magnitude"



of the issue. The bench, which has now posted the matter for hearing on October 23, has sought the view of Prateek Haiela, coordinator of Assam NRC, on the stance of the central government with regard

to applicability and non-applicability of certain documents for inclusion of names in the NRC.

The final draft NRC list was published on July 30 in which names of 2.89 crore of the 3.29 crore people of 40,70,707 people did not figure in the list. Of these, 37,59,630 names have been rejected and the remaining

2,48,077 are on hold.

The apex court had on September 5, ordered that any one of the 10 of a total 15 documents provided in List-A of the claim form can be used by the claimants to prove legacy.

It had also expressed reservation over sharing with the Centre the copy of the NRC Coordinator's report on the modalities for receiving claims from those excluded in draft NRC, saying that although the Government of India was "extremely interested", the court "has to strike a balance".

The court had said that

the report with regard to preparation of the modalities of the Standard Operating Procedure for dealing with claims and objections, has been considered.

Hajela had filed the re-

port in compliance with the court's August 28 order and stated that the 10 documents of List-A could be relied upon or introduced afresh by claimant for his or her claim for inclusion in the NRC, subject to their authenticity as per the certification by the relevant issuing authority.

The 10 legacy documents

which are admissible include land documents like registered sale deed, permanent residential certificate issued from outside the State, passport and LIC insurance policy of the relevant period.

can be relied upon include any license or certificate issued by a government au-thority of the relevant period, papers showing service or employment under government or public sector undertaking, bank or post office accounts, birth certificates, educational certificate and records or processes pertaining to courts, provided they are part of a processing in a Judicial or Revenue Court.

The report had said that all these documents should be of the relevant period up to the midnight of March 24, 1971.

The list of documents to prove legacy, which were in the list-A of the claim form but were not included in the report include extract of

NRC, 1951, extract or certified copy of electoral rolls up to the midnight of March 24, 1971, Citizenship Certificate issued by competent authority, refugee registration certificate and ration cards issued by competent authority with

official seal and signature.
The first draft of the NRC for Assam was published on the intervening night of December 31 and January 1 in accordance with the top court's direction. Names of 1.9 crore people out of the 3.29 crore applicants were incorporated then.

Assam, which had faced influx of people from Ban-gladesh since the early 20th century, is the only state having an NRC which was first



Malaysia anti-graft agency arrests former leader Najib Razak

KUALA LUMPUR, SEP 19 (AP): Malaysia's anti-graft agency says it has arrested former Prime Minister Najib Razak over the multi-million-dollar looting of a state investment fund and that he will face further charges in court.

The agency says Na-jib was detained at its office on Wednesday and will be taken to court on Thursday to face the charges.

Najib was earlier charged with multiple counts of criminal breach of trust, corruption and money laundering over the scandal at the 1MDB state fund. He has plead-ed not guilty.

Naiib set up 1MDB when he took power in 2009 for the stated purpose of promoting eco-nomic development, but the fund amassed billions in debts and is being investigated in the U.S. and several other countries for alleged cross-border embezzlement and mon-ey laundering.

30 displaced Bru families return to Mizoram after 2 decades

New Delhi, Sep 19 (PTI): At least 30 Bru refugee families, who have been living in camps in Tripura for over two decades, returned to Mizoram on Wednesday as part of a Home Ministry-monitored rehabili-tation package, an official said.

The Bru families would be given a onetime financial assistance of Rs 4 lakh, a house, a monthly assistance of Rs 5,000 and free ration for two years as per the agreement signed by the representatives of the Bru refugees, the govern-ments of Mizoram and Tripura and the Centre.

"About 30 Bru (Reang) families from Tripura are going back to Mizoram after 20 years as part of central repatriation package," a senior Home Ministry official told PTI.

A total of 5,407 Bru families, who were dis-placed from Mizoram



have been living in various camps in Tripura since 1997.

The process Wednesday started after a group of the refugees walked out of the agreement signed in July alleging in-adequate compensation for their rehabilitation.

The return of 30 Bru

families were first since 1997 when around 8,000 Bru refugees have gone back to Mizoram in six batches and have been living peacefully in the

since then. The total number of Bru community members is 32,876, who belong to 5,407 families currently living in temporary camps in Tripura. The cost of the entire exercise will be Rs 435 crore till 2020-21 which will be provided by the

Home Ministry.
The Mizoram government will ensure security of all repatriated refugees who were identified and verified as per the 1997 electoral rolls

The Tripura government will ensure that Aadhaar cards are issued to all of them, a bank account is opened and up-dation of ration cards is undertaken for each of

the Bru migrant families. Eklavya residential schools, making avail-Ihum cultivation land, issuance of permanent residential and ST certificates, and a special development project for Bru families are the other measures planned for the cohesive resettlement of these families in

The central government, so far, has given Rs 348.90 crore to the Tripura government for the expenses it incurred on maintenance of the Bru familes and Rs 68.90 crore to the Mizoram government for pro-viding assistance to the 8,000 Bru refugees who had already gone back to the state.

N Korea's Kim to visit Seoul, shut missile site

SEOUL, SEP 19 (AFP): North Korea's Kim Jong Un agreed to make a historic visit to Seoul soon and close a missile testing site in front of inter-national inspectors at a summit with the South's President Moon Jae-in in Pyongyang Wednesday.

Progress on the key issue of the North's nu-clear arsenal was limited, but the two signed a document to strengthen ties between the two halves of the divided peninsula.

Building on a grow-ing rapprochement, they agreed to create a facility to hold family reunions at any time, work towards joining up road and rail links, and mount a combined bid for the 2032 Olympics.

The agreement "carries the people's fresh hope and the people's strong, flaming desire for reunification", Kim said.

His trip to Seoul would be the first by a Northern leader since the end of the 1950-53 Korean War, when hostilities ceased with an armistice rather than a peace trea-ty, leaving them technically in a state of war.

Moon added that the visit could happen this vear and would be a monumental milestone inter-Korean relations'

In their agreement, the North also agreed to "permanently close" a missile engine testing site and launch facility in Tongchang-ri "in the presence of experts from relevant nations".

Moon, who brokered Kim's historic summit with US President Donald Trump in Singapore in June, had hoped to bring fresh momentum to stalled talks between his hosts and Washing-

Whether that would happen remained un-

In Singapore Kim declared his backing for denuclearisation of the peninsula but no details were agreed. Washington and Pyongyang have since sparred over what that means and how it will be achieved.

Trump welcomed Wednesday's declaration, tweeting that Kim had "agreed to allow Nuclear inspections, subject to final negotiations" and adding: "Very exciting!" But experts were scepti-

The North -- whose ballistic missile pro-gramme is banned under UN Security Council resolutions -- has carried out several long-range rocket launches from the site, also known as Sohae, but has also used many other locations including

Pyongyang airport.

"Kim is playing this brilliantly: verify that I dismantle a single site that I no longer need any-way while I mass-produce the missiles the site helped me develop," said Vipin Narang of MIT.

Trump accuses China of meddling in US elections, China rejects charge

WASHINGTON, SEPT 19 (PTI): President Trump has escalated his tirade against China and accused it of trying to influence US mid-term elections by attacking American farmers, ranchers and industrial workers, a charge denied by Beijing.

Trump did not offer evidence to support his accusation nor did he specify whether it was the upcoming mid-term elections in November China was allegedly targeting.

"China has openly stated that they are actively trying to impact and change our election by attacking our farmers, ranchers and industrial workers because of their lovalty to me," the president tweeted

He followed up with a threat of additional tariffs, adding: There will be great and fast economic retaliation against China if our farmers, ranchers and/or industrial workers are targeted!

The accusation comes one day after China promised to take "countermeasures" against Trump's plan to impose tariffs on an additional USD 200 billion worth Chinese imports.

The new duties which take effect on September 24, will begin at 10 per cent, then rise to 25 per cent on January 1, 2019.

China responded to the latest announce ment by hiking tariffs on USD 60 billion worth of US imports. The more than 5.000 products affected include coffee, honey, and industrial chemicals, according to reports.

Reacting to Trump's accusation of election interference, Chinese Foreign Ministry spokesman Geng Shuang said, "Anyone who has some knowledge of China's diplomacy will know that we will not interfere in other countries' domestic affairs.'

"We don't want others to interfere in our domestic politics, and we will not interfere in the domestic politics of others," Geng said.

I was aware of such things (failures and success) even while growing up. That's why I don't take success to my head and failure to my heart," Ranbir added.


