Two boys missing since 30 Jun rescued from Bakcha Forest

Two boys hailing from Naga

Two boys hailing from Naga in North Sikkim, who had gone missing since 30 Jun, 2018 from Naga, have been rescued from Bakcha Forest in North Sikkim today.

The rescue team was led by Senior Superintendent of

Police, North, KD Sangdarpa, Sub Divisional Police Officer, Mangan, Station House Officer, Mangan Police Station, staff of Phodong Police Station and Kabi Police Out Post along with Panchyat, Bakcha and villagers.

As per information, the two missing boys namely

Navin Rai [18] and Lakpa Sonam Sherpa [15] had set out for four-daylong trekking trip towards Tosha Lake, North Sikkim and had been missing since then.

The family members along with the villagers had tried to trace them in the forest for six days but could not trace the out following which they had approached the Police for help.

The search for the missing boys led to one cow herder who further informed that one of the boys had managed to reach his cow shed located in the forest. Furthermore, the other missing boy had been stranded on the other side of a

stream in the forest unable to

The boys were found in unhealthy conditions and were provided first aid by a medical team from Phodong Primary Health Centre on a priority basis. They have been referred to STNM Hospital in Gangtok.



DSA submits Sherpa Land Protection resolution to MLA DN Sherpa

 $D_{\text{sociation [DSA] has}}^{\text{enzong Sherpa Association [DSA] has}$ submitted a resolution of Sherpa Land Protection under Revenue Or-der No 1 adopted during the State level meeting of Sherpas on 06 July to Member of Legislative Assembly, DN Sherpa.

A DSA press release states that the association submitted resolution to Mr Sherpa as the association holds that it is his fundamental duty to protect the rights and interests of Sherpa community being its sole representative in SLA.

'We have made it clear to our representative that the land protection of Sherpa should be within ambit of Revenue Order No 1 and we have out rightly rejected the cabinet resolution to accommodate Sherpa by amending the Sikkim Regulation of Transfer of Land [amendment] Bill 2018.

The historical facts and documents are proof enough that Sherpas are defined within the definition of Bhutia much earlier than the introduction of Land Revenue Order No 1 in 1917. Therefore, are hopeful that representative will certainly stand in solidarity with Sherpas of Sikkim. Failing to put forward the justified argument in upcoming legislative session will be taken as betrayal to Sherpa Community by its representative," the DSA release adds.

seat reservation issue, Mr Dahal informed that after clearance from the Ministry of Law & Justice Union, Ministry of Home Affairs is expected to come up with Ordinance to accommodate the Limboo of Sikkim for provision of seat reservation in Sikkim Legislative Assembly within next two months.

He said that MHA has given a green signal and same was hinted by Chief Minister Pawan Chamling in his public meeting at Gyalshing in West Sikkim recently.

The Home Ministry has proposed an increase in the number of seats in the Sikkim Assembly from 32 to 40. The expansion will be the first since the State merged with India in 1975, he added.

seats are being increased to accommodate people from the Limboo and Tamang communities notified as the Scheduled Tribes in Sikkim in Jan 2003. Of the eight seats proposed to be increased, five will be reserved for Limboo and Tamangs. Now, Sikkim has 12 seats reserved for Bhutias and Lepchas, two for the Scheduled Castes, seat for the Sanghas and 17 general seats. As per constitutional provisions, the total number of seats for STs should be in proportion to the population," Mr Dahal added.

The seats for Bhutia

not on the basis of them being a Scheduled Tribe but as a sequel to a political agreement in 1973 between the Government of India, the then Chogyal of Sikkim and political parties, he added.

A petition was moved in the Supreme Court demanding seat reservation for Limboo and Tamangs in the Assembly and the apex court on January 4, 2016 directed the Home Ministry to take necessary action to accommodate them for their political right, it was informed.

Mr Dahal said. "SDF government is committed to provide political justice to these community with the expansion of the house from existing 32 to 40 adding that there will be amendments to the Second Schedule to the RP Act, 1950, reserving five seats for Limboo and Tamang, without disturbing the existing reservations of 12 seats of Bhutias-Lepchas, Scheduled Castes and Sangha seat."

As per the proposal mooted by the Ministry of Home Affairs said that Section 5A of the RP Act, 1951 will be amended to provide "that in case of a seat reserved for

Limboo and Tamang tribe, he and Tamang tribe specified in the Representation of Sikkim Subjects Act, 1974 and elector or an assembly constituency in the State"

Responding on the recent withdrawn notification regulating the rates of organic produces by the Agriculture & Horticulture Department, SDF publicity secretary, Avinash Yakha, stated that the concerned department should be able to stand by its decision instead of withdrawing the notification and should take action against those who tore down the rate board.

"We still doubt if people who turned out to protest the decision of the department were real farmers. It was totally politically motivated and pre-planned in which some people gets mislead," he expressed.

He stated that this initiative of the department to regulate the rates should observed at least for a week and to increase rates of required items if necessary. stated that some antiirresponsible people and elements have been working against farmers and Sikkim Organic Mission.

He also urged the committee to organize meeting every quarterly and to be more aware of all the flagship schemes under Central schemes.

Health Minister holds meet with CE, SE of Water Dept over Jorethang's water crisis

with regard to water supply problems between Health & IPR Minister, AK Ghatani, who is also the Area MLA of Salghari-Zoom

Constituency, and Chief Engineer Superintending Engineer [South/West], Water Security & Public Health Engineering Department, at his chamber today.

The issue of water crisis in Jorethang was discussed at length wherein the CE explained that out of town sources of water for Jorethang, the main source of Rothak is non functional owing to landscaping of the Nayabazaar-Legship Road due to the ongoing repair work. The three water sources namely Rungdung source, Rinzey source and Chharchharey source were functioning well but due to the monsoon season and occurrence of landslides on the upper lying areas of the three sources, there were instances of murky water being delivered to the Water Treatment Plan [WTP].

He said that the department is treating the water before supplying



it to the consumers and the water shortage faced by the public is mostly due to the breakage of the supply due to landslides at the raw water mains. The issue of installing a transformer to the WTP for pumping treated water to Gairi Gaon was also discussed whereby the Minister assured to provide all the support for installation.

The CE said that pipes for establishment at the Rothak Source have already reached the field but due to the landscaping of the road being repaired, there will be some delay till the completion of back cutting and repair work to move further about 5 kms. Till then temporarily inflow of water in the mornings and evenings for 1-2 hrs to meet the needs of the public has been provided. He also mentioned that additional man power will be deployed especially for Jorethang town.

Another issue discussed was

about the repair and rehabilitation of old existing pressure filter at RMDD area supplying water to the east bazaar area and part of Mazigaon area. The CE informed that once the old pressure

repaired the issue of water to the above mentioned areas would also be solved. The estimate of which has already been procured for approval. The Minister directed the

department and the contractor to complete these tasks as soon as possible and to enhance manpower of the department while repairing WTP and installing the transformer at the earliest. He also demanded for the map comprising the details of impacted area and directed for immediate

The Minister also contacted the PHE Minister and Secretary who in turn deputed the officials to coordinate on the matter immediately.

The meeting

concluded with assurances of expediting necessary solutions for the water issue prevalent in Jorethang.

Contribute to Social Capital

Engage, get involved and develop

Writing in 1958, influential political scientist and **VV** thinker, Edward Banfield, presented what he saw as the reason for backwardness – communities which cannot work together.

In his seminal book, "The Moral Basis of a Backward Society", he studied the reasons behind the underdevelopment of a village in the southern tip of Italy. His conclusion: "The extreme poverty and backwardness is to be explained largely by the inability of villagers to act together for their common good." His work was followed up thirty-five years later by a Harvard professor Robert Putnam who returned to the same theme and villages in 1993. In his book "Making Democracy Work: Civic Traditions in Modern Italy", he concluded that local governments work in northern Italy and fail in south Italy because northern Italians are more likely to get involved in neighbourhood activities like singing groups, football clubs, cooperatives and networks of small entrepreneurs, while the southern Italians remain aloof and uninvolved, and also backward. Both tips of Italy were governed by the same government and subject to the same policies, and yet, while one region progressed, the other refused to de velop. Banfield's central thesis was that social capital was a key ingredient to high institutional performance and the maintenance of democracy.

Surf the net or search Wikipedia and you will find gigabytes of more details on the findings encapsulated in the two tomes, but even the condensed essence presented above is convincing enough. Putnam set out to understand the conditions required for developing strong, responsive, effective representative institutions," each, a necessary building block for effective democratic expression.

Turn the mirror on Sikkim in this light and it becomes apparent that societal engagement and community participation has not achieved the spontaneity required for expressions to become free and assertions more frank and forthright. There will always be those who try and secure positions and berths for themselves, and while these aspirations are not always conspiratorial, they are never healthy either. When people distance themselves from public engagement and shy away from collective action, they end up building distrust even in an environment of democracy which should have inspired confidence.

One has often rued the absence of an active civil society in Sikkim, and if one looks at how people, by and large, have refused to engage voluntarily even in local area issues and have instead waited for someone to claim leadership role, the hollowed out building blocks of a civil society explain the absence. Even the Chief Minister has spoken often about the civil society's reluctance to engage in Sikkim, but one must realise that third-party enforcements cannot fabricate a civil society. Social capital is of value only when it is voluntary and cooperative: it is worthless when it is stage-man aged. Take the Bhanu Jayanti celebrations which will be held across the State later this week. At one level, they involve a wide swathe of people, but take away the or ganising committees [which remain same for this celebration as well as plantation drives] and the event will flounder. How many members of the Sikkimese community will be moved to make private contributions to sustain something they have grown up with if State patronage is withdrawn? There might be many who will be willing to, but few will step forward and do so. And therein lies the engagement-deficit

For much of the past 20 years, Indonesia has been held up as a model of democratic transition for other countries, particularly those with significant Muslim populations.

Indonesia's leaders like to present their nation as embodying an exem-plary path away from authoritarianism. Their form of government, they say, is tolerant yet enshrines religious practice, offering a political alternative for Muslim communities that is more palatable to the West than the failed Arab Spring and the extremist catastrophes that have engulfed the Middle East since the US intervened in Afghanistan and Iraq.

This view of Indonesia now needs rethinking. The country's hard-won advances towards liberalism and tolerance may be under threat. This nation of more than 260 million peo-ple – over 85% of them Muslim – has often been called the "smiling face of Islam", but that label may no longer

Indonesia's recent questioning of its own liberal-democratic aspirations has been accompanied by growing expressions of intolerance, including violence towards vulnerable minorities. As next year's presidential election approaches, the temptation to resort to regressive identity politics and opportunistic populism will increase, and Indonesia's departure from its post-1998 progressive tilt is likely to become more pronounced

SLIDING TOWARDS A 'NEO NEW ORDER'?

In Indonesia today, reform has stagnated. Although the democratic transition in 1998 was presented as a national consensus, this was never entirely true. It always had opponents, some of whom felt politically constrained to accept democratisation as a necessary evil but never accepted it as a final settlement.

As well as the hardliners, today include enormously wealthy oligarchs, tenacious survivors of for mer dictator Suharto's regime and elements of the armed forces. These disparate forces that together form Indonesia's revisionist and populist right have little in common and often compete with one another. However, they also create expedient allianc-es from time to time, motivated by a common desire to roll back at least some of the democratic system initiated by Reformasi, the reform era.

Together they can sometimes intimidate or outflank progressive civil-society leaders. Governments, local and national, seem uncertain about how to respond to these chal-lenges, and vacillate between inaction, opaqueness or endorsement of reactionary policies. As a result, 20 years on from Reformasi, the spirit of reform that drove democratisation seems distant. Most Indonesian champions of

civil society would agree that Reformasi ended long ago – maybe well over a decade ago – but a new label

to define what replaced it has not yet emerged. This reflects an uncertainy among many Indonesians about where their country is heading. Many prominent critics of the government helieve that while electoral democracy seems entrenched, liberal democ racy is under threat from populism, Islamism and renewed conservatism.
For them, Indonesia seems to be

sliding towards what some call the "Neo New Order". Others say this is too harsh, arguing that electoral democracy is now firmly entrenched and the critical change that marked the end of Suharto's system, the retreat of the military from government, has not been reversed.

However, it is increasingly diffi-

cult to argue that all is well with Indonesian democracy. The forthcoming elections aside, rampant corruption is perhaps Indonesia's single biggest political issue. The courageous Corruption Eradication Commission is under continual attack from politicians and police. The human rights courts are virtually defunct and rare-

The National Commission on Human Rights is ineffective; the Constitutional Court has faced its own corruption scandals; the press is con fronting increasingly prohibitive defamation laws that assist politicians and oligarchs; and civil society is under pressure from elite push-back and Islamist provocation

INDONESIA'S ALT-RIGHT: TROLLS, HACKERS AND VIGILANTES

The tensions over Islam are part of a much older struggle in Indonesia to determine who controls the interpretation of the religion, and thus religious power. However, the recent rise of conservative Islamist hardliners also resembles the rise of populism and conservative politics elsewhere in the world. Islamist conservatives

are in many ways the local equivalent of America's alt-right - and they are just as adept at online disruption and Research by State Islamic Univer-

sity Jakarta links the rise of religious intolerance among young Muslims to their increased access to the internet and social media. Indeed, Jakar-ta tweets more than any other city in the world, and Indonesians are very big users of Facebook, as well as WhatsApp, Instagram and Telegram, an encrypted-messaging service.

One of the best-known examples of online disruption involves the socalled Muslim Cyber Army, the most prominent of a number of tags adopted by Islamist trolls in Indonesia. Active across all platforms popular in Indonesia, Muslim Cyber Army mem-bers enjoy building an atmosphere of mystery, threat and self-importance, sometimes using the Guy Fawkes mask, popularised by the graphic novel and film V for Vendetta, of the hacktivist group Anonymous in their

This is deeply ironic, given the distance between their ideological objectives and the libertarian ambitions of most Western hacktivist groups. The Muslim Cyber Army does, how-ever, share a willingness to exploit online anonymity to enable criminal activity – for example, by hijacking the social media accounts of the dead

An Indonesian researcher, Damar niarto, has shown that Muslim Cyber Army trolls are highly effective, working collectively and using tools such as Twitbots to flood Twitter with coordinated messages. They target their more liberal opponents by doxing": publishing their personal information and contact details. This often triggers physical attacks from groups such as the notorious vigilante organisation Islamic Defenders Front,

or Front Pembela Islam (FPI), within a few days and, in some cases, police attention on suspicion of blasphemy.

A list of such targets went viral in

a video produced by the "Blasphemer Hunter Team". These groups have at-tacked President Joko Widodo ("Jokowi"), former Jakarta governor Basuki Tjahaja Purnama (known as "Ahok"), foreigners and LGBTI Indonesians targets they share with some prominent hardliner "buzzers", or social media opinion leaders, many of whom are keyboards for hire.

Juniarto also suggests that many of these groups have close ties to politicians and senior military figures. Certainly, social media manipulation and "fake news" hoaxes produced by Islamist groups were powerful factors in the campaign that led to Ahok's defeat in last year's Jakarta gubernatorial elections. The winner was Anies Baswedan, a protégé of former general Prabowo Subianto, Jokowi's possible rival in the 2019 presidential election.

It would be naive to think this

won't happen again in next April's crucial legislative and presidential races. During the 2014 presidential campaign, Jokowi, a Muslim, endured claims he was a closet Christian and ethnic Chinese (his detractors chose to ignore the fact that his opponent, also a Muslim, has a Christian mother and siblings).

The upcoming presidential elec-tion – which may well be a rematch between Jokowi and Prabowo, but for the first time held simultaneously with legislative elections – is expected to see the most vicious cyber cam-

North Korean leader Kim Jong-un left his historic Singapore summit with US President Donald Trump last month with a massive political victory in hand, but questions remain how this will help his isolated country in pragmatic terms.

A Japanese newspaper reported Sun-day that Kim has asked Chinese President Xi Jinping for his help in lifting the sanctions that have crippled the North Korean economy. But even if sanctions are lifted, will this be enough to improve the stan-dard of living for North Korea's impover-

ished citizens?

In recent years, Pyongyang has focused on twin policy objectives; achieving global political legitimacy, and embarking on a program of economic modernisation. The Singapore summit has arguably helped in reaching the first objective. North Korea will now be looking to achieve the second.

A POSSIBLE HIGH-SPEED FUTURE

Compared to neighbouring China and South Korea, North Korea's infrastructure is crumbling and in dire need of expansion and modernisation. For decades, the gov-ernment emphasised investment in heavy industry and weapons programs, allowing its roads, ports, rail lines and airports to fall into disrepair. North Korea's energy, water and communications systems lag



When Kim met with South Korean President Moon Jae-in in April, Moon said he would like to travel through North Korea to climb Mt. Paektu - a site of great importance in Korean folklore. Kim responded with a revealing admission that try's railways.

Kim also told Moon how the North Korean athletes who took part in the 2018 Winter Olympics in Pyeongchang were impressed by the South's high-speed rail network. This was seen by many as a likely signal that North Korea was motivated to bring its own rail network – and the rest of its infrastructure – into the 21st century.

And South Korea evidently wants to help. At the summit between the two leaders, Moon gave Kim a USB drive that laid out a vision for connecting the two Koreas through new infrastructure projects and special economic zones.

At the heart of Moon's plan would be a US\$35 billion upgrade of North Korea's rail network, including high-speed rail lines connecting Seoul, Pyongyang and other industrial zones and a retrofit of other rail lines in the North.

Moon's proposal is shrewd. The rail lines would also connect North Korea to its northern neighbours. China and Russia, and ultimately serve as a vital link be-tween the entire Korean peninsula and the rest of Asia and Europe

THE PROMISE OF MINERAL WEALTH
More importantly, the South Korean proposal goes well beyond infrastructure. It would be a catalyst for unlocking the po-tential of the North's untapped mineral reserves, which have been valued at somewhere between US\$6-10 trillion.

These reserves consist of iron, gold copper and graphite, as well as large amounts of rare earth deposits needed for production of smart phones and other high-tech gadgets made in the South.

There are also unconfirmed reports of oil

and gas deposits in North Korean waters.

However, modernising North Korea's neglected infrastructure won't come cheaply. The cost is estimated at several trillion dollars, similar to what West Germany spent to develop the East after the fall of the Berlin Wall.

The technical know-how and capacities of North Korea's labour forces will also pose huge challenges.

Already, Samsung, Hyundai, Daewoo and other corporations provide training for the North Koreans they've employed in special economic zones along the border. These giants are well-placed to rebuild the North's deteriorating infrastructure, but would need to invest much more time and oney to train the local workforce.

Whether the North accepts the South's

help remains to be seen. This could prove to be a major stumbling block.

Of course, China could step in and play

a major role. The country has built the world's longest high-speed rail network, extending some 22,000kms, in a remarkably short span of time.

Beijing has strategic interests in developing the North's rail network, as well. A future inter-Korean railway could serve as an extension of its ambitious "One Belt, One Road" infrastructure development initiative

Diver hails 'incredibly strong' Thai cave boys



MAE SAI (THAILAND), JUL 10 (AFP): A foreign diver involved in the mission to save 12 boys and their football coach from a flooded Thai cave has hailed the children as "incredibly strong", and described their treacherous

escape journey as unprecedented.
"They are getting forced to do something that no kid has ever done before. It is not in any way normal for kids to go cave diving at age 11," Ivan Karadzic, who runs a diving business in Thailand, told the BBC in an in-

terview that was published online today.

"They are diving in something considered (an) extremely hazardous environment in zero visibility, the only light that is in there is the torch light we bring our self."

The boys, aged from 11 to 16, and their 25-year-old coach, ventured into the Tham Luang cave in northern Thailand on June 23

after football practice and became trapped when heavy rains flooded the cave.

Two British divers found them nine days darkness more than four kilometres inside the cave system.

Authorities then gathered 90 divers, 50 of them foreigners, to help extract the boys out of a claustrophobic tunnel network that in some places was completely filled with water and so narrow that they could only be squeezed through.

Conditions were so dangerous that a re-

tired Thai Navy SEAL died on Friday while trying to lay out oxygen tanks underwater in a tunnel, and the rescue chief at one point dubbed the operation "Mission Impossible".

Adding to the dangers, most of the boys could not swim, and none had scuba diving

However the divers escorted eight of the boys out on Sunday and Monday, and authorities said they were aiming to extract

the remaining members of the group today. Karadzic, who the BBC reported was stationed near a difficult stretch of the cave about half-way along the escape route to replace oxygen tanks and help guide people through, said the rescue workers had feared the worst.

"We were obviously very afraid of any kind of panic from the divers," he said, add-ing he was in awe of the boys' ability to stay calm. "I cannot understand how cool these small kids are, you know? Thinking about how they've been kept in a small cave for two weeks, they haven't seen their mums Incredibly strong kids. Unbelievable almost."

UN urges probe into N. Korea waitress 'defectors'

SEOUL, JUL 10 (AFP): A dozen North Korean waitresses involved in a high-profile "defection" case two years ago did not know where they were going, the top UN human rights official on North Korea said today.

The issue has long been controversial, with Pyongyang saying the women were kidnapped from a North Korean state-run restaurant in China while Seoul insists they defected of their own free will.

Tomas Ojea Quintana, United Nations' Special Rapporteur human rights in North, told reporters he had interviewed "some" of the 12 waitresses after arriving in Seoul last week. They told him that "they were taken to the South without knowing they were coming here", he said.

Nishikori predicts Wimbledon 'war' with Djokovic

shikori became the first Japa-nese man in 23 years to reach the Wimbledon quarter-finals and then predicted a "war" with Novak Djokovic to get to the last

Nishikori, 28, overcame an arm injury to reach his first All England Club quarter-final with a 4-6, 7-6 (7/5), 7-6 (12/10), 6-1 win over Latvian qualifier Ernests Gulbis.

But having become the first Japanese man to reach the quar-ter-finals since Shuzo Matsuoka in 1995. Nishikori must now overturn a 13-2 career losing re-cord against three-time champion Djokovic on Wednesday.

"He's always like a big war for me. I always enjoy playing against him. It's always big challenge," said Nishikori.

The Japanese player has already lost twice to the former world number one this year -on clay in Madrid and Rome.

India says disappointed at UN chief's report on children and armed conflict

UNITED NATIONS, JUL 10 (PTI): India has voiced disappointment over UN chief Antonio Guterres' report on children and armed conflict, saying it includes situations that do not meet the definition of armed conflict or of threat


to international peace and security.

The Secretary General's report
on Children and Armed Conflict said children continued to be affected by incidents of violence between armed groups and the government, particularly in Chhattisgarh, Jharkhand and during tensions in Jammu and

The report added that the United Nations also continued to receive reports of the recruitment and use of children, including by the Naxalites particularly in Chhattisgarh and Iharkhand.

India's Deputy Permanent Representative to the UN Ambassador Tanmaya Lal, participating at the Security Council debate on Children and Armed Conflict here yesterday, said that the UNSC Resolution 1379 requests the Secretary General to report situations that are on the agenda of the Security Council or that may be brought to the attention of the Security Council by the Secretary General, which in his opinion threaten the maintenance of international peace and security. "In spite of the clear mandate

provided under the UNSC Resolution 1379, we are disappointed that the report of the Secretary General



threat to maintenance of international peace and security," Lal said.

He asserted that such distraction from situations that are under the mandate of the Security Council needs to be rectified and the mandate strictly

Lal said that a lot more remains to be done especially in keeping with the changing nature of armed conflicts that involves a range of non-state actors.

Terrorist entities, including

those designated by the Security Council continue to exploit children as part of their terror activities,

with impunity. Despite considerable international efforts, children are increasingly victimized both as targets as well as perpetrators of violence, he said.

He said killing, maiming, abductions as well as rape and other forms of sexual violence against children and attacks on schools and hospitals continue to be used as tactic of terror, making resolution of conflicts more challenging.
India called for

engagement with national governments concerned, especially in formulation and effective implementation of action plans for durable peace and security.

"We need to strengthen our commitment to socioeconomic reintegration of children who have been released from armed groups, greater integration of child protection provisions in peace processes as well as greater accountability for all violations against children by state and non-state actors," he said.

Lal also voiced concern about lack

of resources to implement provisions of the UNSC mandate, including the deployment of more Child Protection Advisors and to comprehensively address the connection between conflict prevention and the protection

Trump nominates conservative judge Brett **Kavanaugh for US Supreme Court**

WASHINGTON, JUL 10 (PTI): US President Donald Trump today nominated conservative Brett Kavanaugh as a Supreme Court Judge, a decision that could have far-reaching implications on everything from abortion to guns to immigration and alter the balance of the ideologically divid-

President Trump picked Justice Kavanaugh, a conservative stalwart who has deep ties to the Republican establishment, from an original list of 25 judges, which also included prominent Indian-American judge Amul Thapar.

Justice Kavanaugh's nomination has set the stage for a bruising confirmation battle as Democrats immediately vowed to oppose the President's choice of the vacancy created by 81-year-old Justice Anthony Kennedy's retirement.

Announcing Justice Kavanaugh's nom-ination in a prime-time event at the East Room of the White House, Trump described the 53-year-old from Maryland, currently a judge in the US Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit, as one with "impeccable credentials and one of the finest legal minds of our times".

The nomination battle will likely ignite a firestorm on Capitol Hill as it comes just a year after Republicans changed the rules of the Senate in order to push through the nomination of Justice Neil Gorsuch, the first nominee of Trump's presidency.

Justice Kavanaugh's nomination is President Trump's second appointment to the highest court, potentially allowing him to shape the US for a generation after he demits the White House.

Each of the nine apex court justices



holds a lifetime appointment. Judge Kavanaugh is relatively young, meaning he could serve for decades to come

His appointment will not change the ideological tilt of a court that already has a 5-4 conservative majority, but he could evertheless shift the bench further right, media reports said.

Trump's decision will have far-reaching implications for America on everything from abortion to guns to immigration.

Trump said Kavanaugh was an incredibly qualified nominee who deserved a swift confirmation and robust bipartisan support.

"Judge Kavanaugh has impeccable cre

dentials, unsurpassed qualifications, and a proven commitment to equal justice under the law. Throughout legal circles, he is considered a judge's judge, a true thought leader among his peers," he said.

Prior to becoming a judge, he served

in the George W Bush administration, first as an associate counsel and then senior associate counsel, and subsequently as assistant to the president and the staff

Replacing Justice Kennedy with a committed conservative will fundamentally al-ter the balance of the Supreme Court, The New York Times commented.

If confirmed, it would create a bloc of five conservative justices who could move the apex court further to the right.

While the Republican leadership hailed Trump's choice, Democrats vowed to oppose his nomination.

"Judge Kavanaugh should not be allowed anywhere near our nation's highest bench. Let's be clear: a vote for Kavanaugh would be a vote to rip health care from American families and deny women their constitutional right to make their own health care decisions," Democratic National Committee chair Tom Perez said.

Brett Kavanaugh represents a funda mental threat to the promise of justice and equality, which is why I am announcing that I will oppose his nomination to the Supreme Court," said Indian-origin Senator Kamala Harris.

House Judiciary Committee Member Congresswoman Pramila Jayapal said Trump was taking "swipes at vulnerable communities and hardworking families with every chance he gets".

"Brett Kavanaugh comes from a roster of extremists approved by right-wing organisations that are committed to pushing regressive agenda. This appointment is the most momentous in a generation and it will affect historic decisions made for the next half century we can't let that time be defined by partisan rulings that hurt our communities and strip away our rights," Jayapal said.

On the other hand, almost the entire Republican leadership stood solidly behind Trump on his nomination, including his bitter critic Senator John McCain.

"In selecting Judge Brett Kavanaugh to fill the vacancy left by Justice Kennedy, President Trump has chosen a nominee with impeccable credentials and a strong record of upholding the Constitution," Mc-Cain said.

Senate Majority Leader Mitch McCon-nell said Trump has made a superb choice.


Republican leaders firmly believe that Kavanaugh could be instrumental in pitching the ideological makeup of the court to the right and leaving a conservative im-print on the law for a generation. They also see the coming confirmation fight as a chance to galvanise their voters ahead of this year's mid-term elections, where the Republican party's 51-seat Senate majority is at risk.

A graduate of Yale College and Yale Law School, Kavanaugh clerked on the Supreme Court for Justice Kennedy and for judges on the Third and Ninth Circuit Courts of Appeals.

"I am deeply honoured to fill his seat in the Supreme Court," said Judge Kavana-

"My judicial philosophy is straightforward. A judge must be independent and must interpret the law, not make the law. A judge must interpret statutes as writ-ten and must interpret the Constitution as written, informed by history and tradition d precedent," he said.

Praising Trump, he said that throughout the process, he witnessed firsthand the President's appreciation for the vital role of the American judiciary.



Thai rescuers brought a ninth boy out from the Tham Luang cave this afternoon, police and navy sources said, after 18 days trapped underground. "The ninth boy is out," the police source told AFP, requesting anonymity, while a Thai navy source confirmed the boy "has been transferred from the cave entrance to the field hospital". Rescuers will today extract the remaining young footballers who have been trapped deep inside a flooded Thai cave for 18 days, the mission chief said, as heavy rains threatened their perilous escape route. The hoped-for final chapter in an ordeal that has gripped the world comes after elite foreign divers and Thai Navy SEALs escorted eight members of the "Wild Boars" football team out of the claustrophobic network of tunnels on Sunday and Monday. The boys, aged from 11 to 16, and their 25-year-old coach, ventured into the Tham Luang cave on June 23 after football practice and got caught deep inside when heavy rains caused flooding that trapped them on a muddy ledge. With rain again pounding the cave site in a mountainous region in northern Thailand on Tuesday morning, rescuers said they were aiming to bring out the remaining four boys and their coach by the evening.

UN urges probe into N. Korea waitress 'defectors'

SEOUL, JUL 10 (AFP): A dozen North Korean waitresses involved in a high-profile "defection" case two years ago did not know where they were going, the top UN human rights official on North Korea said today.

The issue has long been controversial, with Pyongyang saying the women were kidnapped from a North Korean state-run restaurant in China while Seoul insists they defected of their own free will.

In a bombshell revelation in May, the manager of the 12 waitresses said that he had lied about their final destination and blackmailed them into following him to the

Tomas Ojea Quintana, the United Nations' Special Rapporteur on human rights

in the North, told reporters he had interviewed "some" of the 12 waitresses after arriving in Seoul last week.

They told him that "they were taken to the South without knowing they were coming here", he said.

He urged the South Korean government to carry out a "thorough and independent investigation" to establish the truth of the incident as soon as possible and to "hold to account those who are responsible".

Heo Gang-il, the manager of the North Korean restaurant in Ningbo where the waitresses worked, said he had been recruited by Seoul's National Intelligence Ser-

vice (NIS) in China in 2014.
Fearing exposure in 2016, he asked his

NIS handler to arrange his defection. At the last minute the minder told him to bring his staff too.

Ojea Quintana did not say whether the women he spoke to had expressed a desire to return to the North, but said their wishes should be respected, whatever they were.
"My stance as UN Human Rights rappor-

teur is to respect decisions of the victims,"

"When I say victims, I'm implying they were subject to some kind of deceit with regard to where they were going," he added.

The South's Unification Ministry has previously said it is looking into the allegations.
