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#### Health Dept team calls on Governor



#### **SUMMIT REPORT** GANGTOK, 06 JUN:

Minister of Health and Family Welfare, Dr MK accompanied Principal Secretary Health and Family Welfare Department, K Sreenivasulu and other officials today called on Governor of Sikkim, Ganga Prasad at Raj Bhavan. Principal Secretary to the Governor, SD Negi was also present on the occasion.

It was a courtesy call by the Minister and his departmental team to apprise the Governor on the recent developments following the detection of few COVID-19 positive cases in Sikkim and the operationalisation of VRDL at STNM Hospital, a Raj Bhavan press release informs.

Minister Health informed that the department has put in a strong and efficient mechanism to stop any possibility of outbreak of that Sikkim remains the safest COVID-19 in the State and is

fully prepared for the cases from among the detected Sikkimese being brought back at present. He further provided the detailed information on how people being brought from outside are being monitored at the individual level during the process of facility quarantine, testing, home quarantine and eventual release to normal life. He also mentioned about the performance and testing capability of VRDL at STNM, inaugurated recently which has given edge to the State's preparedness in its fight against the COVID-19 pandemic.

Governor expressed pleasure on the state of preparedness and the strategy that Sikkim has adopted in its battle against the pandemic. He further acknowledged the dedication and service of all frontline warriors for ensuring place at this hour of crisis.

#### India now sixth worst-hit nation by COVID-19, surpasses Italy with an infection tally of 2,36,657

New Delhi, June 6 (PTI): India went past Italy to become the sixth worst-hit nation by the COVID-19 pandemic with the country registering a record single-day spike of 9,887 cases which pushed the nationwide tally to 2,36,657

India's death toll due to COVID-19 rose to 6,642 with a record increase of 294 deaths in the 24 hours till Saturday 8 AM. India has registered over 9,000 cases for the third day in a row

India is now the sixth worstaffected nation in terms of coronavirus infection cases after the US, Brazil, Russia, Spain and the UK, according to Johns Hopkins University data

The number of active COVID-19 cases stood at 1,15,942, while 1,14,072 people have recovered and one patient has migrated, the Union Health Ministry said

"Thus, around 48.20 per cent patients have recovered so far," a senior health ministry official said

The total confirmed cases include foreigners.

Of the 294 deaths reported since Friday morning, 139 were in Maharashtra, 58 in Delhi, 35 in Gujarat, 12 each in Tamil Nadu and Uttar Pradesh, 11 in West Bengal, eight in Telangana, seven in Madhya Pradesh, five in Rajasthan, two in Andhra Pradesh and one each in Jammu and Kashmir, Odisha, Punjab Iharkhand and Uttarakhand

Of the total 6,642 fatalities, Maharashtra tops tally with 2,849 deaths followed by Gujarat with 1,190 deaths, Delhi with 708, Madhya Pradesh with 384, West Bengal with 366, Uttar Pradesh with 257, Tamil Nadu with 232, Rajasthan with 218, Telangana with 113 and Andhra Pradesh with 73 deaths

The death toll reached 57 in Karnataka and 48 in Punjab

Jammu and Kashmir has reported 36 fatalities due to the disease, Bihar has 29, Haryana has 24 deaths, Kerala has 14, Uttarakhand has 11, Odisha has eight and Jharkhand has reported seven deaths so far

Himachal Pradesh Chandigarh have registered five COVID-19 fatalities each. Assam has recorded four deaths, while Chhattisgarh has reported two deaths so far

Meghalaya and Ladakh have reported one COVID-19 fatality each, according to the ministry

According to the ministry's website, more than 70 per cent of the deaths are due to comorbidities


# 4 test positive in one day, Sikkim now has 7 COVID-patients cases

 $\mathbf{F}_{\mathsf{pos}}^{\mathsf{our}}$ positive cases of COVID-19 were reported in the state on Saturday taking the total number of Coronavirus cases here to seven. All of them are returnees.

Two women from South Sikkim and two males from East Sikkim tested positive today and questions are now being asked about the inordinate delay in results for the two women which ended up exposing others to risk of infection.

In his health bulletin posted today, Health Department General Director and Secretary, Dr PT Bhutia, informed



from South Sikkim had completed their 14-day mandatory facility quarantine and had been sent to home quarantine.

It transpires that while they were still at the facility quarantine, their swab samples were collected for RT-PCR testing which was still being done at North Bengal Medical College and Hospital in Siliguri.

The samples of the two women were in the delayed lot and the results arrived in Sikkim only today. By this time, they had already been released from the facility quarantine and sent for home quarantine.

Dr Bhutia informs that the two ladies, aged 29 and 37, were lodged in the facility quarantine at Kamrang Boys' Hostel. Meanwhile,

contact history Mumbai the returnee who had tested positive on 04 June, the other is the 21-year-old nephew of the Delhi returnee who had tested positive on 03 June. It may be recalled, that the latter had earlier tested negative in the TruNat screening test. It may be mentioned here that the TruNat screening test can return negative results up to ten days since infection. The RT-PCR test is the only definitive test for COVID-19 returning accurate tests from the moment infection itself.

### **Migrating People**

Understand why rural Sikkim wants to move to urban settings. And plan for it

There has been frequent talk of rural-urban I migration in Sikkim and efforts, on the lips and on paper, have been underway for a while now to contain it. It would be wonderful if disruptions or cessations of traditional ways of life could be stopped and people allowed environments in to pursue their ambitions and dreams in surroundings they are familiar with; but that, anyone will attest is an impossible task. Things change, and even when the change is for the "better", it requires adjustments and sacrifices, with migration being one of the options that many have to take.

Any effort to contain rural-to-urban migration would obviously require a clearer understanding of the causes. It is common to find poverty held up as the main reason prompting people to migrate to cities, a notion transmitted through the caricature renditions of the plight of the poor in mass-entertainment products. It is a believable explanation, but latest data available on migration in India does not hold up this belief. The poor are invariably temporary migrants, shipping out for temporary jobs and as seasonal labour; the more permanent migration in pursuit of opportunities is a luxury which only the better heeled and the more educated enjoy. In most cases, this is human resource which "leaves home" to study and train does so because it can afford to, and, on many occasions, never returns. And then there is the eveopening data contained in the report released by the National Sample Survey Office suggesting that a third of all Indians are migrants in their present place of residence! Though one in every three Indians is a migrant, they are not all products of rural-urban migration. Most are not escaping the "drudgery" of rural India, but are, in almost all cases, pursuing gainful employment. There is a difference. Within these are of course those who migrate for marriage [found to be the case in most 'non-local' women], or because they have been forced out either by natural disasters or "developmental" projects.

If Sikkim is serious about working on rural urban migration, it should first understand the exact, and not generalised, reasons for it. Urban amenities might be desired, but cannot by themselves be taken as reasons why people abandon villages. Chasing employment could be a reason, but migration is relatively permanent and that requires complementing opportunities and not just desires to keep rural folk in urban addresses. A data that the country prefers not to unravel, but Sikkim could do well to study and understand, is migration triggered by changes in rural settings. In many instances, land - a people's mooring to the place - is lost, and with this anchor lifted, moving away becomes an easier decision to contemplate. The loss of land could as much be due to acquisition for projects as it could be because of change in landuse patterns. If farms are no longer of a size which make them sustainable, or when the traditional crops no longer harvest on a scale that makes economic sense, a shift is necessitated. Of course, there is also the general desire of every parent to provide better education and opportunities for children if they can afford it, and these opportunities continue to be available almost exclusively in urban setting even in Sikkim. It would be desirable if these facilities could reach the villages too, but that does appear to be happening any time soon, so the pull of the urban areas will remain strong.

Urban planning will hence have to factor these realities into its projections for future years and this will require cross-disciplinary and inter-departmental coordination and planning on a scale that the State has not displayed an aptitude for thus far. Very soon, Sikkim, as the rest of the world, will also be looking at migrations forced by climate change as well and it will be advisable for the State to try and begin the processes to project possible scenarios and start adequate preparations for it. It is important to bear in mind that not all rural-urban migration can be stopped, but what can definitely be achieved is for the urban spaces to be planned better to not only accommodate 'influx', but also provide them with better basic facilities and more respectable opportunities.

### Epidemics have often led to discrimination against minorities - this time is no different

andemics are not only biological phenomena lacksquare but also social phenomena. Throughout history, pandemics have been powerful engines of social change, exposing inequalities in the distribution of health and wealth, and prompting calls for the reform of social institutions.

In this respect, the mass protests sweeping the US in the wake of the death of George Floyd can be seen as a symptom of a deeper social pathology, one that has been brought to the fore by the coronavirus pandemic and President Trump's blundering response to the health crisis sparked by COVID-19.

When Derek Chauvin was caught on video pinning George Floyd to the ground as he pleaded "I can't breathe", the image could not help but resonate with the way coronavirus has also been disproportionately choking the life out of African-Americans. As the Nigerian novelist and poet Ben Okri told the BBC: "The pandemic itself is about the very issue of breathing. I think that helped to strike a chord in people.'

Figures from the non-partisan APM Research Lab show that, on average, black Americans have been dying of coronavirus at nearly three times the rate of white Americans. In the UK, according to the Office for National Statistics, blacks are four times more likely to die from COVID-19 than white people.

The disparity may be due to several factors, including lower levels of vitamin D in BAME groups. But there is little doubt that poverty and job insecurity, coupled with the stressful living conditions of black people, who are overwhelmingly concentrated in decrepit inner-city areas, also plays a role. (In Washington DC, for instance, the death rate among blacks is six times as high as for whites.)

Harvard philosopher and activist Cornel West has said that the racial health disparities revealed by COVID is a demonstration of America's "failed social experiment". Whether or not you accept this verdict, these disparities are prompting questions about the fitness of the US public health system and America's ability to protect its most vulnerable and disadvantaged citizens from contagious diseases.

NOT THE FIRST TIME

Something very similar happened in 1849 when America was swept by cholera. Then, as today, the epidemic fell most heavily on the inhabitants of impoverished inner-city areas. In downtown Philadelphia, as Charles Rosenberg recalls in The Cholera Years, "a free couple of color" were found dead of cholera in a room measuring just four and a half by seven foot.

It was the same in the Five Points area of New York, where Irish immigrants were packed into rudimentary timber dwellings lacking running water and sanitation. The Irish bore 40% of the mortality. By contrast, wealthy

generally escaped the ravages of cholera by fleeing to the country.

In 1832, when "Asiatic cholera" first arrived in the US, Americans assumed that religious virtue and the rustic simplicity of American life would protect them from this scourge from the east. But after 1849, New Yorkers could no longer ignore the connection between cholera and poverty.

And when in 1854 the English physician John Snow demonstrated that cholera was transmitted in water, the case for sanitary reform became overwhelming. Recognising that cholera was linked to overcrowding, unhygienic housing, and poor sewerage disposal, American sanitarians pressured boards of health to provide cities with safe water systems. Later, these boards became the models for local and state public health agencies.

More often, though, epidemics are occasions for discrimination against ethnic and social groups. When New York was struck by typhus in 1892, the city's sanitary authorities blamed the outbreak on recent Jewish immigrants from Russia who had travelled in steerage and quarantined them on North Brother Island in the East River. By contrast, passengers who had travelled in the first-class sections of ships were not quarantined.

Discrimination was also the response in 1916 when cases of "infantile paralysis" erupted in New York. As I describe in my book, The Pandemic Century, the initial outbreaks of polio were centred on "Pig Town", an Italian neighbourhood in South Brooklyn. Here, recent immigrants from Naples lived in tenements surrounded by piles of stinking garbage and free-roaming pigs.

As cases of polio multiplied and the papers filled with heartbreaking accounts of dead or paralysed infants, the publicity sparked a wave of anti-Italian prejudice. While Upper East Siders fled to their homes on Long Island, heavily armed policemen patrolled roads and rail stations to prevent Italians leaving the city. Health officers went door to door in Brooklyn to enforce isolation measures and hospitalisations.

In fact, non-paralytic cases of polio had most likely been circulating under the radar in the US since 1890. According to Yale historian Naomi Rodgers, only its appearance in epidemic form in New York was "new".

**CONSPIRACY THEORIES** 

Minority groups have, for the most part, gone along with restrictions on their liberty for the sake of the health of all. Yet when the freedoms of the majority are threatened, protest and violence often ensue. During the 1832 Russian cholera epidemic, for instance, the citizens of St Petersburg gathered in Sennaya square in protest at quarantines and cordons, which they considered a plot by the educated classes to repress the poor.

Accusing sanitary inspectors of spreading the disease, they sacked the city's main cholera

New Yorkers from Protestant backgrounds hospital and called for the death of doctors, who they suspected of poisoning their wells. It was only when Czar Nicholas I appeared in the square and ordered the crowd to fall to their knees, that the rioting stopped.

> Conspiracy theories about the role of the medical profession in spreading cholera also fuelled riots in Britain. According to the historian of medicine Samuel Cohn, Britain saw 72 such riots between 1831 and 1832 with crowds "in the thousands that threatened the lives of physicians".

> The difference was that in Britain doctors were accused of using cholera as a ruse to perform dissections. This practice was known in Britain as "burking" after the 1828 scandal in Edinburgh in which William Burke and William Hare murdered sixteen people and supplied the bodies to a lecturer in anatomy at the Royal College of Surgeons.

> In the case of COVID-19, similar conspiracy theories have sparked protests by rightwing militias and anti-vaxxers convinced that coronavirus is a ruse to rob Americans of their liberties through the enforcement of social distancing measures. Perhaps the most striking feature of these protests is that the demonstrators are overwhelmingly white and unmasked. In the case of the storming of Michigan state capital in April, the militias also carried arms.

> The protests now sweeping cities across the US and in other countries have seen a similar disregard for social distancing. But by contrast, many of these protesters have been wearing masks bearing the words "I can't breathe" out of respect for the threat that coronavirus poses to their and other people's health.

> None have openly brandished guns. Despite this, they have been met with national guardsman armed with rubber bullets and egged on by a president seemingly determined to inflame the situation.

> Little wonder that in Minnesota, where black people account for a third of COVID cases despite making up 6% of the state's population, Minneapolis city council vice-president Andrea Jenkins drew a direct analogy between the violence visited on black communities by COVID and the death of George Floyd. "Until we name this virus [of racism]," she said, "we will never, ever resolve this issue."

> Unfortunately, the tragedy is that the anger being directed at police forces across the US now risks unleashing a second wave of COVID infections that could prove as destructive as the first.

### Trump's use of religion follows playbook of authoritarian-leaning leaders the world over

It was a striking moment: Donald Trump, Bible in hand, posing for photos in an apparent moment of political theater made possible by the dispersal of protesters through the use of tear gas. The president's visit to St. John's Episcopal Church, known as "the Church of the Presidents," came immediately after giving a Rose Garden speech framing himself as "your president of law and order" and threatening to send federal troops to "restore security and safety in America." The next day, Trump made another high-profile visit to a place of worship, this time Washington's St. John Paul II National Shrine.

Coming at a time of social turbulence, critics accused Trump of following authoritarian-leaning world leaders by sidling up to religion to reinforce an image as a strongman defending a particular brand of tradition. Bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Washington Mariann Budde said as much, commenting that Trump used the Bible at St. John's "as if it were a prop or an extension of his military and authoritarian position."

As a scholar who has researched the interaction of politics and faith for decades, I know how potent religion can be as a political tool.

A POWERFUL TOOL

Religion creates meaning in our lives by articulating values about how we relate to one another. But just as it can unite us, religion can also be a source of division - used to "other" people who are not of the faith and don't share the same traditions and rituals.

When enough people perceive or can be convinced – that traditional elements of the social fabric are at risk. religious signaling through the use of symbols and images can help wouldbe authoritarians cement their power. They present themselves as protectors of the faith and foes of any outsider who threatens tradition.

In Russia, this phenomenon is seen in President Vladimir Putin's forging of a strategic alliance with the Russian Orthodox Church. For his part, Putin presents himself not just as a commanding leader, but also as a devoutly religious Russian. When he appears shirtless, for example, the large cross he wears around his neck is always visible. Meanwhile, the Church promotes traditional moral values and maintains a distance from the rest of the worldwide Orthodox Christian community, thereby separating the "truly Russian" from the outsider. In their most recent collaboration, Putin and the Church proposed amendments to the Russian constitution that would enshrine Russians' faith in God, define marriage as the union of a man and a woman and, tellingly, proclaim "the great achievement of the [Russian] people in defense of the Fatherland." These changes, all of which are intended to reinforce Putin's base of support, would be jarringly nationalistic additions to the constitution.

Putin benefits from this insideroutsider dynamic in advancing his goal of restoring Russia to his vision of its past territorial glory. In justifying the Russian incursion into Crimea, Putin argued that the region had "sacral importance

for Russia, like the Temple Mount in Jerusalem for the followers of Islam and Judaism." Defending and expanding Russian territory is a much easier sell if it is framed as the defense of the holy.

RELIGIOUS IMAGERY

We see a similar dynamic in India, where Prime Minister Narendra Modi's grip on power relies in large part on his embrace of a version of Hindu nationalism that elevates Hindus as "truly Indian" insiders and singles out Muslims as outsiders.

Like Putin, Modi wraps himself in religious imagery. He makes high-profile visits to remote Hindu temples while electioneering and never wears green because of its association with Islam.

Modi's Hindu nationalism cements his popularity among devout Hindus and builds public support for anti-Muslim policies, such as stripping the only majority-Muslim state in India of its autonomy and enacting a controversial new law preventing Muslim migrants from attaining Indian citizenship.

TRUMP AS SAVIOR

Trump has stumbled in attempts to portray himself as personally devout, declining to name a favorite passage from the Bible and stating that he has never sought forgiveness from God for

Nevertheless, public opinion polls have consistently shown that white Christians comprise the core of Trump's base, although there are recent signs of a dip even among this key group.

And while it is important to note that many white Christians do not support Trump, 29% of evangelicals go so far as to say they believe he is anointed by God.

Where Trump succeeds is in presenting himself as a Christian nationalist, much as Putin and Modi style themselves as the stout defenders of their countries' dominant religions.

One way Trump achieves this end is by making statements such as this one on the campaign trail earlier this year: "We're going to win another monumental victory for faith and family, God and country, flag and freedom."

In their new book "Taking America Back for God," sociologists Andrew Whitehead and Samuel Perry contend that many of Trump's white Christian supporters see him as their longawaited savior - not just the protector of traditional religion, but also the defender of a bygone way of life.

In that imagined past, white men ruled the roost, families went to church every Sunday and outsiders knew their place. A deep-rooted desire for a return to that past may have been why Trump's Make America Great Again slogan has proved so potent. As Yale scholar Philip Gorski has argued, that phrase can be interpreted to mean "making white Christianity culturally dominant again."

As such, we should not be surprised that in the current moment of crisis Trump is attempting to use religion to reinforce differences between his supporters and his opponents. Like Putin, he is posing as the defender of a particular version of a glorious past. And echoing Modi, he is doing this by building support through the denigration of the

# MLB players say teams 'depriving America of baseball games'

NEW YORK, JUN (AP): Players accused teams of "depriving America of baseball games" as part of a money fight set off by the coronavirus pandemic and raised the possibility baseball Commissioner Rob Manfred might push ahead with a shortened season over the union's objection. Bruce

Meyer, the union's chief negotiator, sent a letter to Deputy Commissioner Dan Friday Halem on threatening that attempt without an agreement could lead players block any attempt to expand the playoffs and deny consent to neutral-site games in

the postseason. "The league's cynical tactic depriving America of baseball games in furtherance of their demand for unwarranted salary concessions shortsighted and troubling," Meyer

wrote. "Meanwhile, other leagues are moving forward with their plans for resumption."

Meyer's letter was first reported by The Athletic, and a copy was obtained by The Associated Press.

Major League Baseball made its initial economic proposal on May 26, offering an 82game regular season



schedule and sliding scale of cuts beyond the prorated shares of salaries the sides agreed to on

March 26. Players responded Sunday with a 114game regular season schedule running through October and no additional cuts. Each player would get about 70% of his original salary under the union's plan and roughly 22-47% under MLB's proposal, including USD 200 million tied to the postseason

being completed. "We are disappointed that you are purportedly shutting down negotiations after making one proposal demanding over USD 800 million in further pay cuts," Meyer wrote.

#### When Galileo underwent quarantine!

NEW DELHI, JUN 6 (PTI): Italian astronomerphysicist Galileo Galilei had some torrid time in the 1630s - he was in poor health, faced a house arrest and a trial due to a controversial book and also had to undergo quarantine for almost a month because of the raging plague then, recounts a new book.

"Galileo and the Science Deniers" is a historical biography on the life of Galileo by astrophysicist Mario Livio which gives a glimpse into the life of a "man who was intellectually radical and well ahead of his

Galileo's journey as a scientist started in 1583, when he dropped out of medical school and began to study mathematics. By 1590, he already had the audacity to criticise Aristotle's teachings on motion, according to which things moved because of a built-in About 13 years later, following a series of

ingenious experiments with inclined planes and pendulums, he formulated the very first "laws of motion" concerning free-fall, even though he would not publish those until 1638. But Galileo's several bold statements put

him on a collision course with the Catholic Church and he was eventually pronounced "vehemently suspected of heresy" on June 22, 1633. "Overall, if we examine the record

of Galileo's life in terms of his personal contentment, it traces something like an inverted-U shape, with a pronounced peak somewhere shortly after his numerous astronomical discoveries, followed by a fairly steep fall," writes Livio. In spite of his personal disagreements

with some orthodox church dicta, as late as May 18, 1630, Galileo was still received in Rome as an honoured guest by Pope Urban VIII, and he left Rome under the impression that the Pope had approved the printing of his book "Dialogue on the Two Chief World Systems", after only a few minor corrections and a change of title.

Overestimating the strength his friendship with the Pope underestimating the fragility of the delicate psychological and political position of the Pope at that turbulent post-Reformation era, Galileo continued to believe that reason would prevail, says Livio.

"In the preface to the book Galileo purported to discuss the Earth's motion merely as a 'mathematical caprice', the text itself had a very different flavour. In fact, Galileo taunted and derided those who still refused to accept the Copernican view in which the Earth revolved around the Sun," the book, published by Simon & Schuster, says.

For Galileo, however, the publication of the "Dialogo" (as the book is commonly referred to), marked the beginning of the end (of his life, not of his fame), says Livio.

"He was examined by the inquisition in 1633, pronounced a suspected heretic, forced to recant his Copernican ideas, and eventually placed under house arrest.

The 'Dialogo' was put on the Vatican's Index of Prohibited Books, where it remained until 1835," he writes. Left with no option despite his failing health, "Galileo departed for Rome on January 20, 1633, but because of the raging plague, he had to be quarantined before crossing from Tuscany into the Papal States, a stop which turned out to be painfully long and unpleasant", he says.

"Consequently, he arrived to Rome only on February 12th, fortunately to the comfort and warm hospitality in the home of Tuscan Ambassador Francesco Niccolini and his wife."

After meeting with a few Church officials for advice in the first few days, in the following weeks, Galileo barely left the house, since Cardinal Francesco Barberini advised him against socialising, for fear that it 'could cause harm and prejudice', Livio writes.

And then he faced trial. Galileo died in 1642 at his villa in Arcetri near Florence, after having been blind and bed-ridden for a while.

Livio says Galileo's story may be more relevant today than ever before.

# French forces kill leader of Al-Qaeda in the Islamic Maghreb

France said its Islamists, forces have killed in 2007 the leader of Al-Oaeda in the Islamic Maghreb, in a blow to the group behind a string of deadly attacks across the troubled Sahel region.

Abdelmalek Droukdel killed on Thursday northern Mali near the Algerian border, where the has bases from which it has carried out attacks and abductions of Westerners in sub-Saharan Sahel zone, Defence Minister Florence Parly said Friday.

"Many close associates" of Algerian commanded who affiliate several jihadist groups across the lawless region -- were also "neutralised", she added.

Al-Qaeda in the Islamic Maghreb emerged (AOIM) from a group started in the late 1990s by radical Algerian flow through porous

2007 pledged allegiance to Osama Bin Laden's Al-Qaeda network.

The group claimed has responsibility for attacks numerous troops and civilians across the Sahel, including a 2016 attack on an upmarket hotel and restaurant in Burkina Faso, which killed 30 people, mainly Westerners.

The death Droukdel -once regarded as Algeria's enemy number one -- could leave AQIM in disarray, French military sources suggested.

France has deployed more than 5,000 troops to combat jihadist groups in the region -- a largely lawless expanse stretching over Burkina Faso, Chad, Mauritania Mali, and Niger, where drugs and arms borders.

Northern Mali is the site of frequent clashes between rival armed groups, as well as a haven for jihadist activity.

According to the UN, Droukdel was an explosives expert and manufactured devices that killed hundreds of civilians in attacks on public places.

#### North Korea threatens to shut liaison office with South

JUN (AP): North Korea threatened permanently shut liaison office with South Korea as it continued to condemn its rival for failing to prevent activists sending anti-North Korean leaflets across the border.

The statement by North Korea's ruling Workers' Party on Friday came a day after the powerful sister of leader Kim Jong Un said her country would end a military agreement reached with South Korea in 2018 to reduce tensions if Seoul fails to stop the activists.

Kim Yo Jong also said North Korea permanently shut the liaison office and a joint factory park the border town of Kaesong, which have been symbols reconciliation between the two countries.


