Vinesh eyeing to make up for Rio disappointment in Tokyo

New Delhi, Sep 23 (PTI): An Olympic berth already secured, World championship bronze medallist wrestler Vinesh Phogat says she has unfinished business to attend to in 2020 Tokyo.

The fear of 2016 Rio Olympics injury still playing on her mind, Vinesh on Monday said she is eyeing to complete her bout in next year's Tokyo Olympics.

One of India's biggest medal prospects at the Rio Olympics, Vinesh's campaign ended in agony in the quarterfinals of the women's 48kg freestyle category after suffering a career-threatening knee injury. "Hopefully in Tokyo I will play the entire six minutes of a bout. A lot was left out for me to achieve in Rio. I was not able to play my entire match. There are a lot of things going in my mind regarding the Olympics," Vinesh said on the sidelines of the launch of Zee Kushti Dangal.

"So whatever the results, whether I lose or win I want to complete my six minutes. When I do that whatever questions I have in my mind right now will be cleared," she added. However since then, the 25-year-old has made a strong comeback, winning golds in the Commonwealth Games and Asian Games last year in the 50kg category. In the-recently concluded World Championships, the star wrestler qualified for the 2020 Olympics before winning the bronze medal in the 53kg.

Relieved to have sealed an Olympic berth, Vinesh said the injury in Rio motivated her to make a strong comeback.

"After my injury in Rio I never thought I'd be able to go back to the Olympics. Somewhere in my mind I felt incomplete. That feeling always kept on driving me to do better. I am very stubborn, I motivated myself to do better and that is why I am going to the Olympics," she said. Vinesh, who was earlier competing in the 50kg category but switched to 53kg early this year, said the shift has been beneficial for her.

"The change in weight category has has been advantageous for me. I have won back-to-back medals," she said. Vinesh had grabbed a gold each in the 53kg class in Grand Prix of Spain and Yasar Dogu. Asked about the competition at the Olympics, Vinesh said playing at home, the Japanese wrestlers will be top contenders.

"I feel everyone is strong in the 53kg category. Japan, of course, is the powerhouse and will also have the home advantage.

Sikkim missing Santosh Trophy "darkest day for Sikkim football," says Bhaichung

GANGTOK, 23 SEPT:

Cikkim not participating in Santosh Trophy 2019-20 was the "darkest day" for Sikkim football, said former Indian football team skipper, Bhaichung Bhutia today.

Speaking to media persons here at Paljor Stadium, Bhaichung highlighted that Santosh Trophy was the biggest platform for footballers in Indian football so the absence of Sikkim team in this season of the tournament has affected the future of many young footballers.

Sikkim was placed in group-B of East Zone along with Chhattisgarh and Jharkhand for the qualifying round at Kolkata and was scheduled to play against Chhattisgarh in its first qualifying match today.

The State team did not participate in the tournament because a majority of the shortlisted players decided to boycott it to protest what they saw as Sikkim Football Association's casual approach on the matter.

According to the payers, not enough time was given to prepare for the tournament and selection of the team members was not done

following proper process

Sikkim has its second qualifying match against Jharkhand on 27 September.

"It [the conflict between players and SFA] was a very small issue and could have been resolved easily but unfortunately because of the ego of a few individuals, it became a big issue," Bhaichung rued.

That said, he admitted that Sikkim football and Sikkim Football Association were facing a crisis and needed to be reorganized and infused with some professionalism.

In this endeavor, clubs, players, referees, football fans and Sports department have to work together, he added.

"But that is still not an excuse for players to not play Santosh Trophy. No doubt SFA has issues but that is not reason enough. Santosh Trophy is the biggest tournament any footballer in Sikkim can play in as part of the State team and it has given platform to so many players from Sikkim in the past," he said.

Bhaichung mentioned that a player like the current Indian football team skipper, Sunil Chhetri, was initially playing football for a small club in Delhi

but after being spotted at Santosh Trophy, he was picked up by Kolkata giant, Mohun Bagan.

"Even I was just playing for East Bengal but after playing in Santosh Trophy tournament I got noticed and got selected for the Indian national team," he said.

He mentioned that lots of young players wanted to play the tournament but were denied the chance this season.

Bhaichung mentioned that the qualifying round of East Zone is going on in Kolkata this time which has the attention of media and around 20 professional clubs. He added that media and professional clubs are going to be looking for talented footballers.

He said that some players wanted to undergo long training camps before going for the tournament and SFA was willing to provide a 10-day coaching camp for the State team.

"You do not refuse to take part in a tournament because you did not get a one-month camp. That is not fair as coaching camps are decided by associations," he said.

He informed that West Bengal participates in tournaments without any camp and even Manipur plays with week-long coaching camps.

"I don't think it would be fair for players to demand a one-month camp or 20-day camp as it has to be decided by the association and coaching staff," he said. He mentioned that AIFF will now penalize the State association for not playing in the Santosh Trophy.

Sporting brand Vector-X sponsors the kits of the State team and has done so for the last three years.

"This year we were supposed to renew our contract but since we missed Santosh Trophy we may face challenges and difficulties in renewing the contract," he said.

Bhaichung also said that SFA's decision to ban Sikkim Aakraman FC from the premier league was not fair.

"You can ban players and officials who manhandled the referee but not the entire team," he said.

On a police case being filed against Aakraman, he said that taking the matter to the police was uncalled for and what happens in the field should remain there.

One wrong step after another is killing football in Sikkim, he said.

Delhi govt to sell onions at cheaper rates



NEW DELHI, SEP 23 (PTI): Delhi Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal on Monday said his government is procuring onions and will sell them at cheaper prices in fair price shops and mobile vans.

Kejriwal said the AAP government will offer relief to consumers troubled by the soaring price of onions.

"The government is buying onions and the sale is expected to begin in 10 days. The price of this onion will be Rs 24 per kg. The government will sell onions through all fair price shops and mobile vans," he said.

According to a gov-

ernment official, onions are currently available in Delhi at Rs 60-70 per kg in the retail market.

Retail onion prices rose to Rs 57 per kg in Delhi, Rs 56 per kg in Mumbai, Rs 48 per kg in Kolkata and Rs 34 per kg in Chennai last week. The prices were quoted at Rs 60 per kg in Gurgaon and Jammu during the same period, according to data maintained by the consumer affairs ministry.

However, trade data showed retail onion prices skyrocketing to Rs 70-80 per kg towards the end of the last week from Rs 50-60 per kg in the previous week.

NEW DELHI, SEP 23 (PTI): The 2021 census will be conducted through a mobile phone application, moving away from traditional pen and paper to give Digital India a boost, Union Home Minister Amit Shah said on Monday. The mammoth nationwide exercise will be carried out in 16 languages and at a cost of Rs 12,000 crore, he said after laying the foundation stone of a new building of the Registrar General of India and Census Commissioner here.

The census will have its reference date as March 1, 2021, but for snow-bound Jammu and Kashmir, Himachal Pradesh and Uttarakhand it will be October 1, 2020, Shah said.

"Census data will be collected through a mobile app. This is for the first time that the mobile app will be used for the census exercise. India will be moving from the pen and paper census to digital data, which will be a big revolution in the country's census exercise," he said.

Referring to the 2021 census, he said the data will help in future planning of the country, especially for development initiatives and welfare schemes, and it will be a 'Jan Bhagidari' (people's participation) exercise.

the census data could be used for future planning, development initiatives and welfare schemes. The utilisation of census data is multi-dimensional and will be a significant contribution to the nation's progress," Shah said. The home minister also said the census will help in demarcating boundaries of municipal wards, assemblies and Lok Sabha constituencies.

He appealed to census officials to carry out the exercise sincerely as this is an opportunity for them to do 'Punya' (holy deed), which will help in nation building.

Earlier the government used to do welfare schemes on a piecemeal basis and no comprehensive planning was done by previous governments, Shah said. "The whole approach was changed when Narendra Modi became prime minister in 2014. The approach has been changed completely, the thinking has been changed. Goals have been set to completely eradicate the problems," he said.

The home minister said on the basis of the 2011 Census, the Modi government had planned 22 welfare schemes related to electricity connection to every home, gas connections, construction of roads, houses for the poor, toilets, bank accounts and opening of bank branches among others. He cited the example of the government's flagship 'Ujjwala' scheme of providing free LPG connection to poor families, saying it has been successful as the scheme was prepared on the basis of the 2011 census data. "By 2022, there will not be a family which will not have gas connection," he said.

2021 census data

Shah also said the 2011 census reflected the poor sex ratio of male and female in some states. That is why the programme of 'Beti Bachao, Beti Padhao' was launched, he said.

"Under this scheme, the Haryana government has done so much work in the last five years that the state's sex ratio is now among the best in the country," he said.

The home minister said India's population is 17.5 per cent of the world's total population while the geographical area is just 2.4 per cent of the total geographical area of the world.

"So, naturally, India has limited natural resources in comparison to the population. Therefore, to fill up this gap of inequality, we will have to work hard," he said.

Shah also said the data for the National Population Register (NPR), a list of usual residents of the country, will also be collected along with the census exercise. Officials said the NPR could be the basis for a pan-India version of Assam's National Register of Citizens (NRC).

217 dengue cases in Delhi; 304 of malaria New Delhi, Sep 23 (PTI):

Nearly 50 fresh cases of dengue have been reported in the national capital over the last one week, taking the total number of people affected by the vector-borne disease to 217, according to a municipal report released on Monday.

The number of malaria cases recorded till September 21 stands at 304, it said.

As many as 150 malaria cases were recorded in September, 56 in August, 54 in July, 35 in June, eight in May and one in April.

Of the total 217 dengue cases, 125 were recorded in September, 52 in August, 18 in July, 11 in June, and rest between January and May, according to the South Delhi Municipal Corporation (SDMC), which tabulates the data on vector-borne diseases in the city.

This is by far the maximum number of malaria and dengue cases recorded in any month this year.

Malaria cases have outstripped those of dengue in Delhi for the past several weeks.

According to the report, at least 74 cases of chikungunya have also been reported this year.

Last year, 2,798 dengue cases and four deaths were recorded by the SDMC.

Both the Delhi government and local bodies have been making efforts to raise awareness on precautions to ensure that there is no breeding of mosquito larvae around them.

The AAP government has started an anti-dengue campaign '10Hafte, 10Baje, 10Minute' urging people to inspect their house for any standing water.

The campaign from September 1 and November 15 to combat dengue has garnered support from several personalities, including cricket legend Kapil Dev, many Bollywood actors and well-known journalists.

During a press conference on Sunday, Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal had said, "In five years, the number of dengue cases reported have come down by 80 per cent. We have tried to reduce it even further. This year, fortunately, there is no spike in it and it is because all people have come together, from the Delhi government to the Centre and the MCD".

Dengue mosquito larvae breed in clear, standing water while those of malaria mosquito thrive even in dirty water.

Doctors have advised people to take precautions and ensure that there is no breeding of mosquito larvae around them. They have urged people to wear fullsleeves clothes and use mosquito nets.

- The Sikkim Municipalities Act 2007 was introduced in March 2007 for setting up of Urban Local Bodies in the state. The ULBs in the State were formed in the year 2010-11.
- Sikkim follows a three tier structure for urban local bodies namely Municipal Corporation, Municipal Council and Nagar Panchayats.
- Sikkim has a total of 7 ULBs, of which one is Municipal Corporation, 3 are Municipal Council and 3 are Nagar Panchayats.
- Only 6 functions out of 18 have been transferred to ULBs. Steps should be taken to devolve the remaining functions to ULBs.

92 pc cut in fire licence fees in West Bengal

KOLKATA, SEP 23 (PTI): The West Bengal government on Monday decided to slash fire licence fees by 92 per cent, state finance minister Amit Mitra said. The minister said the state government created four categories where fire licences are required and slashed the fees uniformly across the categories, he said.

this mechanism," Mitra said. The minister said the move will help businessmen of the MSME sector.

"There will be a uniform reduction of 92 per cent in all the four categories," he told reporters. The first category in-

cludes residential buildings, educational institutes, art galleries, dharmashalas and libraries. In 2017, the fire licence fee in these cases was Rs 53.80 per square metre of floor area. Now, it was made Rs 4.35 per square metre.

In the second category which includes hospitals, research centres, guest houses and nursing homes,

the fee was Rs 80.70 per square metre of floor area. It was reduced to Rs 6.52 per square metre, the minister said. Mitra said licence fee for ports, airports, shopping malls, offices and markets which comprise the third category was Rs 107.60 per square metre of floor area in 2017. The government decided to bring it down to Rs 8.07 per square metres.

In the fourth category comes the outlets of hazardous substances such as fireworks and the fee was Rs 161.40 per square metre. It was reduced to Rs 13.05 per square metre of the floor, he said.

15th Finance Commission meets PRIs

New Delhi, 23 Sept (PIB): The 15th Finance Commission team headed by Chairman NK Singh along with its members and senior officials met today with representatives of the Panchayati Raj Institutions (PRIs) of Sikkim.

The Commission noted that the State has transferred all 29 functions listed in the 11th schedule of the Constitution to Rural Local Bodies.

Sikkim has a total of 189 PRIs, of which 185 are Gram Panchayats and 4 are Zila Parishads.

According to Pr. AG Sikkim, following are the issues pertaining to accounting of PRIs-

- Transfer of functions to PRIs were not completed in full. (However, State Government has informed that they have devolved all functions to PRIs)
- New Accounting Format issued by Ministry of Panchayati Raj, Government of India in consultation with CAG was adopted since April 2010. However, accounts were not maintained in New Accounting Format. System of certification has not been introduced in the State, as yet.

Requirements of Panchayat Raj Institutions in Sikkim as highlighted to the Commission, include -

- RLBs in Sikkim earn no revenues on their own. State government may help the local bodies to use innovative methods like market fees, parking space etc for improving the own revenues.
- Property Tax Board has not been set up by State Government yet. This should be immediately set up to explore and enhance own

As the boy could not provide any information about his family, SHO Sudhir Sadotra produced him before the Juvenile Justice Board in Samba which handed him over to the Child Welfare Committee, the official said.

He said the boy was admitted in the Bal Ashram run by the Social Welfare Department at R S Pura in Jammu for better nourishment. "The strenuous joint efforts of police, the Child Welfare Committee, Samba and Bal Ashram finally managed to locate the address of the missing boy and the police station concerned in Delhi was contacted," the official said.

9 killed in bus-minibus collision in Assam

Man lynched, two injured over cow slaughter suspicion in Jharkhand

KHUNTI, SEP 23 (PTI): A differently-abled man was killed and two others were seriously injured when a mob allegedly thrashed them on suspicion of slaughtering their gherao after Sub-dia cow, in Jharkhand's visional Police Officer Khunti district, police Rushabh Jha assured said on Monday

The incident happened after local residents allegedly saw Kalantus Barla, Fagu Kacchap and Phillip Horo with the carcass of a cow near a river at Jaltanga village on Sunday and beat them up, a police officer said.

While Barla died on the way to the hospital, Kacchap and Horo are being treated at the Rajendra Institute of Medical Sciences in Ranchi, the officer said.

Police said five persons have been detained for questioning in connection with the incident, following which villagers gheraoed Karra police station on Sunday demanding their release.

The villagers ended them that the detained persons would be released if they were found innocent.

DIG Amol Venukat Homkar told PTI, "Five persons have been detained and preliminary investigation has found their involvement in the incident. The process of identification is on."

During inspection of the spot, police did not find any carcass but there was evidence that the persons were beaten up by the mob, Homkar said. However, no arrests have been made so far, he added.

Criminal complaint against Bihar Minister, three others

Divided in Suspicion

Anyone can deal in whispers, it takes leaders to deliver coherence

Ttis worrying how discussions on communalism **L**continue to remain in circulation and of how often different sections and groups keep crying wolf, painting monsters only they see and hyperventilating over threats only they perceive. After all, into how many slivers can a population of barely 6 lakh people be divided? Of course, with some sections, the divisions are a simple twoway process of "us" and "them", and that is a disturbing condition to suffer because that reduces every disagreement into an attack, every counter argument into an attempt to deny or subvert.

To begin with, let us not deny that divisions exist within the Sikkimese society. That much is natural, but what has also been exceptionally reassuring about the State is that the privately held prejudices have not been allowed by the people to pour out in public displays of communal posturing; at least not a scale that causes any more damage than hurt feelings. The State, despite some close calls, has never suffered a communal clash. Its politics and several politicians have often succumbed to communalism, but the people have performed much better. The politics of social engineering, of stitching together winning vote-bank combinations have also been tried, and have, thankfully failed as well in Sikkim.

But, if people are resistant to communal confrontations, why is the bogey raised so often in Sikkim? Perhaps because it is an easy divide to hack away at and experience elsewhere has shown that the people's defenses eventually crumble in the face of persistent communal scare-mongering. Given that everyone belongs to some community or the other, it is an accepted fact that people are also inherently communal, at least in as much as having a soft corner, if not hate, is concerned. Also, because we are social animals, this inherent communal streak seldom develops into paranoia or gets directed against other communities because in a small place like Sikkim everyone needs everyone else. This conditioning of social grooming, however, gets stressed when the leader of a pack smells blood - the possibility of making an issue emotive and convincing a people that they are threatened. Few things move off the counter faster than a fabricated conspiracy theory. The more dramatic the fabrication, the more looming is the threat perception. Years of shepherding a disinterested public has honed the skills of these leaders and they are only aided by the blunted perspicacity of the people. People share the blame of allowing space for such voices which keep growing in belligerence because no one holds them to account.

One must realise that India has perhaps the best, most detailed Constitution at hand for the protection of its minorities. Ironically, the minorities still feel perpetually threatened in our country. It is unlikely that any minority was ever threatened as a state policy in the past; it was the majority they feared. As time passed, this suspicion fermented into animosity and now teeters on the brink of hatred. When one weighs in the current environment where hate crimes result often from the not so subtle nudging from the new powers in Delhi, one shudders to think what madness still awaits the country. In that light, one is almost relieved that the ultra-nationalist brigade has rediscovered an enemy in Pakistan because that just might keep their paws off the victims back home. But, like always, we digress here. One needs to ask who allowed such hate and such suspicions to get so normal? Surely not the people, because they are too preoccupied with aam-aadmi concerns. It's the leaders who failed us. This deduction holds as true for Sikkim as it does for the nation.

Those claiming to represent communities started becoming instigators instead of counselors. These leaders forget that democracy offers people the right to self-determination, the right to negotiate, the right to harmonise. Instead, they allowed their supporters only the options of complaint, bickering and suspicion. Someone who speaks for a community should bridge the communication gap between communities. Anyone can deal in whispers, but it takes a leader to represent a cause and mediate.

Howdy Modi in Houston: Why Narendra Modi puts so much effort into wooing the diaspora

With President Donald Trump as his "warm up act", India's Prime Minister Narendra Modi addressed a rally of 50,000 members of the Indian diaspora at Houston's NRG Stadium on September 22.

Dubbed Howdy, Modi!, the event kicks off a busy week in the US for Modi, with no fewer than 40 meetings to attend. Apart from bilateral talks with Trump, he is due to speak at the UN General Assembly, attend a celebration of the 150th anniversary of Mahatma Gandhi's birth, and appear at the UN's Climate Action Summit. Modi will also collect a "global goalkeeper" award from the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation for his government's Swachch Bharat or "Clean India" initiative.

It is the Howdy, Modi event that will attract attention, however, and not just because of the praise Modi and Trump heaped upon each other. Few leaders hold these kinds of events when they travel. But Modi has a long history of speaking to gatherings of the Indian diaspora when travelling overseas.

In 2014, after the landslide election win that first brought his government to power, he appeared before a crowd of 18,000 at Madison Square Garden in New York, and then at another gathering, attended by a similar number, at the AllPhones Arena in the Olympic Park in Sydney, Australia. A year later, Modi was joined by his British counterpart David Cameron in front of an estimated 60,000 members of the Indian diaspora at Wembley Stadium in London.

CAMPAIGN MODI

Gatherings like Howdy, Modi are effectively campaign rallies, albeit organised abroad and involving people who, for the most part, cannot vote in India's elections. They are organised by Modi's Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP), working with diaspora civil society groups, and not primarily by officials from the local embassies or consulates. They allow Modi to be seen by viewers back home in as positive a light as possible, fêted by an overwhelmingly supportive crowd made up of people whom ordinary Indians would consider savvy and successful. In this way, such events are part of Modi's broader, ongoing effort to consolidate his position as the most dominant Indian politician of his era.

There is, however, more to these events than just public relations. In recent years, India's elections have become colossally expensive. In 2014, an estimated US\$5 billion was spent by the candidates. In 2019, some estimate that figure grew to at least US\$7 billion. Modi's Hindu nationalist BJP almost certainly accounted for the majority of the spending. Prior to the poll, it had reportedly amassed a considerable war chest.

A sizeable proportion of this money came from big corporations and some from ordinary BJP members and supporters in India. But it's likely that a significant amount came from the Indian diaspora, despite the fact that many cannot vote in India, either because they are no longer citizens or, if they are, because they were unable to travel back home to cast their ballot, as they must do under current electoral law.

The Delhi High Court found that both the BJP and the opposition Congress Party accepted foreign donations, including from foreign-based companies, prior to the 2014 elections. Since then, the Modi government legislated both to make it harder to trace the sources of campaign financing and to make it easier for foreign individuals and entities to donate money. Rallies such as Howdy, Modi are designed to thank past

donors and to solicit future contributions, rather than to appeal for diaspora votes.

UNITING THE DIASPORA

These events also serve as instruments of political consolidation. India's diaspora is as heterogeneous as India. And abroad, people of Indian origin and Indian citizens often coalesce into groups that reflect regional, linguistic, caste and religious identities, as well as national, "Indian" organisations. These sub-national groups help preserve those identities, but arguably also weaken the diaspora as a political force. Forging India lobbies in places such as the US that might influence governments on New Delhi's behalf is hard under such

The BJP uses events like Howdy, Modi to try to address that problem, as a focal point around which various smaller groups can gather. The prime minister's Twitter feed made that clear, posting video of Modi meeting the representatives of particular communities, such as the Shia Muslim Dawoodi Bohras, the Kashmiri Pandits, and local Sikhs. It is telling too that the organisers managed to attract sponsorship for Howdy, Modi from more than six hundred diaspora groups from across the US.

Since 2014, the India diaspora has been one of Modi's biggest supporters, politically and financially. Whether this backing will persist through his second term will be a key test. As India's economy began to falter in 2017, some thought that the diaspora would grow disillusioned, and withdraw their backing. During the recent election campaign, however, there were no signs of a mass defection from the cause, with diaspora Indians continuing to contribute time as well as money to ensure Modi's BJP were returned to office.

came out to a Christian counselor during a therapy session in 2001 when I was 14. He convinced me to engage in conversion therapy, a pseudoscientific practice to change an individual's sexual orientation based in the assumption that such behaviors are "unnatural." He produced an article describing a talk at that year's American Psychological Association conference that indicated the therapy worked.

This painful experience encouraged me, when I started my scientific career, to examine queerness in biology

THE QUEER COMMUNITY, 25 MIL-LION YEARS (OR MORE) IN THE MAKING

Understanding how complex human relationships developed requires a complete picture of our social behavior during evolution. I believe leaving out important behaviors, like same-sex sexual behavior, can bias the models we use to explain social evolution.

Many researchers have postulated how queer behaviors, like same-sex sexual behavior, may have developed or how they are expressed. Recently, scientists at the Broad Institute of Harvard and MIT published a paper suggesting a genetic component to same-sex sexual behavior expression in modern humans.

However, no studies provide an argument of when queer behavior may have arisen during humans' evolution. Such research would push

tered during my youth, that queerness is a modern aberration.

A new paper I was the principal researcher on, published in the Archives of Sexual Behavior, argues that queer behavior appeared well before humans.

My paper relies on a systematic review of published literature to lay out a relationship between the loss of a gene called TRPC2 and same-sex sexual behavior.

No modern humans carry a working copy of the TRPC2 gene. TRPC2 was functional in a primate-like animal 65 million years ago. This animal would evolve into two lineages. One branch would lead to new world monkeys and another to old world monkeys and apes. The ancestor of new world monkeys never lost the TRPC2 gene. However, the primate-like ancestor of humans and our closest primate relatives - apes and old world monkeys - lost function of TRPC2 some time between 23-40 million years ago.

New world monkeys do not, or very rarely, display same-sex sexual behavior. However, same-sex sexual behavior is routinely expressed by individuals in virtually all primate species that did not receive a functional TRPC2 from their ancestor.

One way to test this hypothesis would involve removing TRPC2 from animals with an intact gene and observing how their behavior changes. Fortunately, this experiment has been done and, indeed, loss of TRPC2 induces same-sex sexual behavior in mice.

I find it interesting that same-sex

back against the assertions I encounsexual behavior is also common in TRPC2. Still, the ability to express other animal groups that have lost TRPC2 such as bats and whales.

> In my article, co-authored with Cynthia Jordan and Marc Breedlove, I suggest that TRPC2 gene loss introduced queer behavior into our evolution. I connect the loss of TCRP2 to published changes in the nervous system of primates and the emergence of same-sex sexual behavior and have examined this connection in the brains of mice in which TRPC2 has been disabled.

> As part of my own research, I utilized mice lacking TRPC2 and showed that their unique behaviors are accompanied by altered cell populations in the brain. A fascinating finding given TRPC2 expression lies outside the central nervous system. Perhaps these changes to neural pathways in the brain contribute to same-sex sexual behavior in mice. It is fascinating to imagine similar changes may have occurred in the brains of human ancestors after they lost TRPC2, allowing the same behavior.

Importantly, TRPC2 is not a "gay" gene - the largest population without the gene are heterosexuals. TRPC2 loss presents one possible origin for same-sex sexual behavior: the time point when it first appeared during our evolution. In the absence of TRPC2, species appear to have more diversity in sexual partners, which certainly shaped the evolution of primate sexuality. This leads me to hypothesize that same-sex sexual behavior is expressed by some humans in part because our ancestors lost

same-sex sexual behavior represents only a small step toward developing the complex human identities that exist today.

QUEER IN SCIENCE

When I first heard of the TRPC2 knockout mice in 2009 and that no human has the gene, I was immediately captivated.

While studies have shown that the environment in STEM fields can be homophobic and transphobic, I was persistent and found supportive mentors. I started working with Emily Taylor and Christy Strand examining hormones, the brain and behavior. I felt drawn to the field of sex differences and I joined a graduate neuroscience program to study them with Cynthia Jordan and Marc Breedlove.

I introduced TRPC2 knockout mice to the Breedlove/Jordan lab for neuroscience research. While investigating previous work on these mice, I examined the information through the lens of my own queer experiences and needs. Eventually, I produced my argument on the origin of same-sex sexual behavior in human ancestry, which led to the recently published paper in the journal Archives of Sexual Behavior.

Some queer individuals may find this study affirms their experiences and I hope to continue supporting the queer community in my future career by addressing our unique health concerns through translational research.

UK travel giant Thomas Cook collapses, stranding tourists

LONDON, SEP 23 (AFP): British travel group Thomas Cook on Monday declared bankruptcy after failing to reach a lastditch rescue deal, triggering the UK's biggest repatriation since World War II to bring back stranded passengers.

The 178-year-old operator had been desperately seeking 200 million pounds (USD 250 million, 227 million euros) from private investors to save it from collapse.

"Despite considerable efforts, those discussions have not resulted in agreement between the company's stakeholders and proposed new money providers," Thomas Cook said in a statement.

"The company's board has therefore concluded that it had no choice but to take steps to enter into compulsory liquidation with immediate effect." The government said it had hired planes to fly home an estimated 150,000 holidaymakers to the UK, in an operation starting on Monday.

and the cancellation of all its flights, Transport Secretary Grant Shapps has announced that the government and UK Civil Aviation Authority has hired dozens of charter planes to fly customers home free of charge," a separate statement said, describing it as the largest repatriation in peacetime history.

"All customers curabroad with Thomas Cook who are booked to return to the UK over the next two weeks will be brought home as close as possible to their booked return date." Thomas Cook chief executive Peter Fankhauser called it a "deeply sad day". "It is a matter of profound regret to me and the rest of the board that we were not successful," he said.

"This marks a deeply sad day for the company which pioneered package holidays and made travel possible for millions of people around the world," he added in the group's statement. The firm's creditors held a marathon meeting on Sunday to try and work out a deal, followed by a meeting of the board of directors.

Reports said a collapse of the group would mean the repatriation of 600,000 tourists, including around 150,000 seeking government help returning to the UK.

Two years ago, the collapse of Monarch Airlines prompted the British government to take emergency action to return 110,000 stranded passengers, costing taxpayers some 60 million pounds on hiring planes.

As well as the grounding of its planes, Thomas Cook has been forced to shut travel agencies, leaving the group's 22,000 global employees -- 9,000 of whom are in Britain -- out of a job.

Holidaymakers had already reported problems, with guests at a ho-

tel in Tunisia owed money by Thomas Cook being asked for extra money before being allowed to leave, according to a tourist interviewed by AFP. Chinese peer Fosun, which was already the biggest shareholder in Thomas Cook, agreed last month to inject 450 million pounds into the business as part of an initial 900 million pounds rescue package.

In return, the Hong Kong-listed conglomerate acquired a 75 per cent stake in Thomas Cook's tour operating division and 25 per cent of its airline unit. Thomas Cook in May revealed that firsthalf losses widened on a major write-down, caused in part by Brexit uncertainty that delayed summer holiday bookings.

The group, which has around 600 stores across the UK, has also come under pressure from fierce online competition.

Cabinet Thomas Cook created the travel firm in 1841 to carry temperance supporters by train between British cities.



"It is all open out here with no shed to protect us from rains," he said.

Not all vendors, however, are unhappy. Many said the new



Panghal counts on strenuous training to win medal at Tokyo **Olympics**

AMIT KUMAR DAS NEW DELHI, SEPT 23 (PTI): World Championships' silver medal-winning boxer Amit Panghal reckons securing an Olympic spot at next year's Asian qualifiers will be a tough task but vowed to leave no stone unturned in his quest for glory at the Tokyo Games. Panghal (52kg), an Asian Games and Asian Championships gold-medallist, became the first Indian male boxer to win a silver at the World Championship, which concluded in Ekaterinburg, Russia on Saturday.

The 23-year-old Indian Armyman said he was sure of a podium finish after putting in the hard yards ahead of the prestigious tournament.

"It is a great feeling to win this medal. Given the preparation that I had, I was confident that I won't return without a medal. No Indian boxer has gone beyond the bronze, so I wanted to do something different, change the colour of the medal," Panghal told PTI after returning to the country here on Monday.

"I want to keep repeating what is working for me and keep improving on my weaknesses. I want to practice so much, put in so much effort in my training that I not only return with a medal but also change the colour of the medal at Tokyo," he added referring to bronze medal won by Vijender Singh back in 2008.

The world championships in Russia no longer have Olympic qualifier status after the International Olympic Committee (IOC) suspended the International Boxing Association (AIBA) from conducting the event in the 2020 Tokyo Games.

"At least 3-4 of us would have qualified if World Championships were still the Olympic qualifiers. It would have been a big achievement. Now the Asian Olympic qualifiers is the next big tournament for us. All the focus will be on that," said Panghal.

The Olympic qualifiers will start in February next year with the Asia/ Oceania zone qualifiers in China.

"For us who are in the lower weight category, the level of competition at Asian qualifiers is same as world championships. Most of the Asian boxers win medal at the Olympics or World Championships. So it will be tough," Panghal said.

"Of course, the World qualifiers will be tougher as US and European boxers will also participate."

Panghal, who had shifted to the 52kg category after a stellar run in the 49kg division, said he needs to work on his strength and power.

"I will work on my strength and stamina. We will improve as we inch towards the qualifiers. We have to held on to our top form, we can't effort to let it slip a bit till the Olympics."

Talking about his next assignment, Panghal said: "I am participating at the World Military Games next month. Also I will compete at the Indian Boxing League.

N'Golo Kanté is Chelsea's dynamic allrounder in a team lacking structure

I I ow much can be $\mathbf{\Pi}$ expected of a single player? That N'Golo Kanté is an exceptional footballer is no revelation but there is still something remarkable about the fact that the best holding midfielder in the world has become a totemic Roy of the Rovers figure at Chelsea. There he is darting across his own box to stifle a Liverpool attack. There he is slipping a pass in to the edge of the box and looking for a return. And there he is, drifting in from the right and finding the top corner with an ungainly but nonetheless precise finish. He is their alpha and their omega, their beginning and their end. He is all things to all men and by that means he might save some games - but not this one. Kanté was exception-

al against Liverpool, in the second half a blur, the force driving Chelsea forward. Only one Chelsea player made more tackles than him, only one more interceptions than him, only one had more shots than him and nobody completed more dribbles than him. He has, against expectations, transformed himself into a complete midfielder.

But seeing him play like that it is impossible not to feel a certain ambivalence. Why is he having to do this? Ultimately, for all that it fits football's love of narrative and its continuing obsession with individuals, Roy of



the Rovers football is for comics. Steven Gerrard pulled off more implausible feats than was reasonable and gave defining performances in the finals of the FA Cup and Champions League but, as his time at Liverpool showed, that is no way to mount a consistent challenge in the league.

Chelsea had a supremely gifted holding midfielder, somebody who had been instrumental to two title wins with two different sides and had then lifted the World Cup, but opted to bring in a very different player who operated in his position to satisfy the demands of Maurizio Sarri. The result has been Kanté operating in a more advanced position that has forced him to learn new tricks.

Profoundly gifted and

diligent as he is, he has. He may have skewed one chance wide from the edge of the box on Sunday but he then scored with a little scuttle infield and precise shot into the top corner. But, remarkable as that strike was, it was only his 15th league goal in a career now in its eighth season of regular senior football.

Since Chelsea signed Jorginho their transfer ban has made it harder for them to rectify the situation. And so the issue persists: Jorginho, frail and neat, playing his cerebral passes and looking a little bewildered by the tumult around him, Kanté charging forward rather than controlling the area just in front of the defensive line as he used to.

With Kanté in the side from the start for only the third time this season, Chelsea looked a little more secure than they have done, less vulnerable to attacks through that central area. But still, it is hard to avoid the conclusion that fielding him and Jorginho together creates needless complications.

That Liverpool's two goals here came from free-kicks, following the concession to a freekick against Valencia last Tuesday makes defending from set-plays a specific and immediate concern. The first was a ferocious drive from Trent Alexander-Arnold but it was noticeable that Jorginho, whose job was to charge down the taker after it had been laid off, ended up making himself as small as possible. Defending, it is fair to say, does not come naturally to him.

To criticise Frank Lampard for that is perhaps a little unfair. The issues of personnel predate him and are a result of Chelsea's piecemeal approach to recruitment. But conceding 16 goals in eight games this season is a problem that requires urgent attention.

Kanté is clearly a large part of the solution but he cannot be all the solution. An all-round performance such as he produced on Sunday, particularly in the second half, is a paradoxical kind of excellence. On the one hand a display as remorseless and intelligent as that must be admired; on the other the fact that it was necessary, perhaps even that it was possible, speaks of profound structural

Tuchel must curb hype after Neymar completes PSG's perfect week

DSG must act as if they've achieved nothing despite a pitch-perfect week.

"If anyone asks if we are going to win the Champions League, I'm leaving." Thomas Tuchel's opening line at Wednesday night's post-match presser was said in jest, but he may have unwittingly stumbled upon the right idea. The 3-0 drubbing of Real Madrid was a high water mark for the German's reign so far, but the club have been here before. On those occasions the 6-1 'remontada' at the Camp Nou and the soul destroying exit to Manchester United, which L'Équipe's front page called "even worse", eventually arrived to humiliate PSG. As Sunday night's encounter with Lyon underlined, simply managing this latest heightening of expectations could be pivotal to Tuchel's success.

Two years ago this week, PSG opened their home European campaign with a landmark three-goal victory, with Bayern Munich roundly beaten at the Parc des Princes. In Kvlian Mbappé's first truly sparkling display for the club, David Alaba was terrorised, a Munich team including Robert Lewandowski, Thomas Müller, Thiago Alcântara, Arturo Vidal and James Rodríguez were easily dispatched and, soon afterwards, Bayern manager Carlo Ancelotti was sacked. It was the first high profile outing for 'MCN' and the performance showed, many thought, that PSG had finally arrived as a Champions League force.

Goalkeeper Alphonse Areola said the win represented "our true level" while Mbappé put in an 'XXL performance' according to L'Équipe. This week L'Équipe again got rather excited. 'Dance with angels' and 'Paris were angelic' were the sports daily's headlines in reference to Angel Di María's man-of-thematch display. Tuchel spoke of "a very complete performance". PSG were outstanding in both games, but it is hard to ignore that the opposition were not of the standard one might expect.

Two years ago, as Ancelotti's Bayern reign faltered, his more relaxed style – devoid of the rigour and discipline Bayern players were accustomed to under Pep Guardiola - produced draws with Wolfsburg and Hertha Berlin alongside a defeat to Hoffenheim in the club's first five Bundesliga games. Madrid meanwhile, led by a barely fit Eden Hazard on his first competitive start for the club, continue to search for balance and spark following Zinedine Zidane's return. Neither win, although suitably impressive, was quite the flag planting, coming of age, usurping of champions story that the French media wanted them to be.

That cloying desire to be accepted, to be taken seriously, to be seen as equals by Europe's established elite has consumed the club and French press more and more after every eventual disaster. It is their greatest issue; beyond endemic mental frailty, fractious squad dynamics and often pandering to their biggest stars. PSG are the clingy, needy members of the group who try way too hard. That is not to say they have not slowly improved of late. Tuchel has made at least marginal gains in those areas, while the win over Real can be added to last season's group-stage victory against the eventual champions, Liverpool, and professional displays in the first leg at Old Trafford as well as in two draws with Napoli, as demonstrations of rising to the big occasions. But in truth these are mere steps, and small ones at that.

A turgid encounter with Lyon on Sunday night, usually a bombastic affair, was another sign PSG remain deeply flawed. Despite being enhanced on paper by swapping Presnel Kimpembe and an unfit Mauro Icardi for Abdou Diallo and Neymar for a game that Tuchel said was like "another Champions League match", PSG were solid but lacked fluency and, for 87 minutes, any inspiration. Much as they were against Strasbourg last Saturday. But, just like that eventual 1-0 win, Neymar's individual brilliance snatched three points PSG scarcely deserved. An outrageous injury-time bicycle kick winner last week preceded some lightning quick feet and an even sharper shot that caught Lyon goalkeeper Anthony Lopes cold to fizz into his far corner and win the latest game.

Fixing can't be totally controlled, greed has no cure: Gavaskar



NEW DELHI, SEP 23 (PTI): Former India captain Sunil Gavaskar feels it is difficult to completely get rid of match-fixing in cricket as there will always be an odd person swaved by greed, which cannot be cured.

Gavaskar's comments came in the wake of accusations that players and officials of the Tamil Nadu Premier League (TNPL) have been involved in match-fixing. An investigation is currently underway in the matter.

"Greed is a thing which no amount of education, guidance, seminars with anti-corruption guys is going to help. Greed is something that is human," Gavaskar was quoted as saying by 'Cricbuzz' website.

Gavaskar reportedly made this comments at an event in Bengaluru.

"The best of societies, the most developed of societies still have criminals. In cricket also you will always have the odd person who will be swayed by greed. (It) could be some other reason that might force him to do something. That's something I don't think you can totally control," he added. The batting legend, however, asserted that it is no longer possible for the wrongdoers to get away with it.

"I would imagine sometimes the circumstances make a player think 'I can get away with it'. But you can't get away. Because it is so covered by television, every little aspect... you will be exposed as having done something wrong," he said. (AP): Israel's president wrapped up his second and final day of crucial talks to find a new prime minister and a way out of political deadlock, after meeting Monday with the smaller parties elected in last week's vote.

After hearing the recommendations from the remaining party for who should head a government, President Reuven Rivlin must now select the candidate he deems most able to form a stable coalition. He is set to make his decision by Wednesday.

post-election The consultations are usually a formality, but the largely ceremonial president is now playing a key role after an almost tied election result.

"There is one thing that the people are largely united over and that is the desire that there won't be third elections," Rivlin said.

The smaller parties' recommendations were split between Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu and Blue and White's Benny Gantz.

That would suggest that, coming out of the talks, Netanyahu holds a



small edge over Gantz.

Rivlin will likely pick the candidate with the most recommendations who will then have 28 days to try to cobble together a government.

If the first candidate chosen fails within that time, the second is given the opportunity. If he too doesn't manage, the country could head to a third, unprecedented election.

In Rivlin's first round of talks on Sunday, the Joint Arab List threw its support behind Gantz, the first time the Arab parties had recommended a candidate since 1992, saying it was doing so in a bid to topple Netanyahu, whose anti-Arab rhetoric has infuriated and offended Arabs in Israel during

his decade in power. The backing promised to give Gantz a slight edge in support.

But on Monday, the Joint Arab List said it was withdrawing some of its members' recommendations for Gantz, trimming his support to below Netanyahu's.

Last week's peat election produced no clear winner, with Blue and White receiving 33 seats in Israel's 120-member parliament and Netanyahu's Likud garnering 31 seats.

Both sides fell short of the majority needed to form a government and therefore must seek the support of other parties.

Neither party can form a coalition without the eight seats won by firebrand former Defense Minister Avigdor

Lieberman, who on Sunday declined to endorse either candidate prime minister.

Lieberman pushed Gantz and Netanyahu to agree to sit with him in a broad, secular unity government, and both have agreed in theory but disagree over who should head it.

Trudeau returns to campaign with promise of lower taxes

MONTREAL, SEP 23 (AFP): Canadian Prime Minister Justin Trudeau resumed his re-election campaign on Sunday with a promise to lower taxes, but once again had to apologise for a photo showing him in blackface makeup.

Trudeau, 47, was already under fire for an ethics lapse and other controversies, and the decades-old photos and videos that resurfaced last week of him engaging in activities he has acknowledged as "racist" dealt a fresh blow to his chances.

After taking Saturday off, Trudeau travelled to Brampton on Sunday, in the central province of Ontario, where he announced two concrete measures aimed at wooing middle-class voters, the main targets of both his Liberal party and opposition Conservatives in the October 21 elections. If he is reelected, Trudeau said middle-class Canadians would not pay taxes on the first 15,000 Canadian dollars (USD 11,300) they earn.

He also promised to cut Canadian cell phone plan costs, which he called "among the most expensive in the G7", by 25 per cent. These two

His main opponent, Conservative Andrew Scheer, has also promised his government would "put money back into Canadians' pockets". The opposition has heavily criticised Trudeau, who as prime minister has presented himself as a champion of multiculturalism and a fighter of racism and discrimination. Accused of hypocrisy, Trudeau has apologised for the imag-

measures would "put es, blaming the costume choice on youthful ignorance. According to multiple opinion polls published this weekend in Canadian media outlets, the Conservatives appear to have taken a slight lead over Trudeau's Liberals since the scandal.

Although the two parties were neck-andneck at the start of the campaign, the Nanos Institute on Sunday tipped in favour of the opposition, with 35.5 per cent of Canadians saying they would vote for the Conservatives, versus 32.9 per cent for the Liberals.

Results from the same poll, however, show Trudeau remains the top choice to become the next prime minister, with 31.5 per cent of Canadians favouring him compared to 29.2 per cent for his main opponent.

Public broadcaster CBC's poll aggregator also showed a spread of 34.6 per cent for the Conservatives versus 32.9 per cent for the Liberals, while a Forum Research study conducted after the images surfaced and published Sunday by the Toronto Star puts the two main parties on equal footing at 33 per cent each.

Afghan officials: 24 civilians killed in anti-Taliban raid

KABUL, SEP 23 (AP): At least 24 civilians were killed Monday during a raid conducted by Afghan special forces on Taliban hideouts in the southern Helmand province, provincial officials said. Abdul Majed Akhund, deputy provincial councilman, said that initial reports showed 24 civilians were killed, but the number "possibly would rise" when a final toll was available. Attahullah Afghan. head of the provincial council, said the majority of dead were women and children who were at a wedding ceremony in Musa Qala district.

He added that 12 other people were wounded.

There were conflicting reports on the numbers of killed and wounded from different sources as the area is under Taliban control. According to Afghan, there were two separate raids in different areas of Musa Qala.

The first operation killed six foreign fighters, while the second raid "mistakenly" hit civilians, he said. Akhund said authorities are investigating reports civilians attending a wedding died in the raid Sunday night in Musa Qala. Omar Zwak, the provincial governor's spokesman, said 14 insurgents including six foreigners were killed during the raid. They were investigating reports of civilian casualties. This comes as earlier a drone attack in eastern Afghanistan's Nangarhar province blamed on US forces killed at least 16 and wounded tens of others, most of them civilians.

The US forces in Afghanistan said they carried out a strike in eastern Nangarhar targeting Islamic State positions. The violence has further rattled the country as it prepares for national elections later this month.

Modi to articulate India's plans for renewable energy, other climate action proposals at UN Summit

UNITED NATIONS, SEP 23 (PTI): Prime Minister Narendra Modi is expected to articulate his government's ambitions on renewable energy and make a call for a coalition for disaster resilient infrastructure at UN Secretary General Antonio Guterres' High-Level Climate Action Summit on Monday.

Modi is among the first set of speakers at the Summit's opening ceremony, a highly significant gesture given that only those Heads of State, Government and Ministers are invited to speak at the summit who will have any positive development to announce on climate action. India's important role and contribution to global climate action efforts have been underlined by the fact that Modi is the fourth speaker at the Summit, after Guterres, New Zealand Prime Minister Jacinda Ardern and President of Marshall Islands Hilda Heine. German Chancellor Angela Merkel will speak after Modi.

India's Permanent Representative to the UN Ambassador Syed Akbaruddin told PTI here that India's approach to climate action is multifaceted because anything that we do has an impact, which is global in nature.

He said the Indian Prime Minister could articulate his ambition towards renewable energy as well as propose a coalition of nations for disaster resistant infrastructure, similar to India's leadership of the International Solar Alliance.

So we are not looking at one area, one segment, we are looking at certainly renewable energy because energy is a key component. Also we are an energy-thirsty country so our needs of energy are huge and renewables are increasingly going to play a key role in that. What PM Modi will perhaps articulate is his ambition for renewables in the future beyond what was promised in 2015, Akbaruddin said.

The Paris Climate Agreement was signed in 2015 and aims to strengthen the global response to the threat of climate change by keeping a global temperature rise this century well below 2 degrees Celsius above pre-industrial levels and to pursue efforts to limit the temperature increase even further to 1.5 degrees Celsius. Modi



of 4GW and the country has set a target of adding 100 GW of solar power by 2022.

Guterres, while speaking to a select group of journalists at a special luncheon last week, said that in the Climate Action Summit only those Heads of State and Government and members of coalitions will speak who come with positive steps. So there is a kind of a ticket. You can speak only if you have come to announce something positive, he said.

Guterres said while the UN is not making judgments about climate action efforts by nations, he asked them if they are ready to announce a positive development at the summit before inviting them to speak at it.

If you have positive things to announce, you will be given the floor (at the Climate Action Summit). That was the criteria.

Those who are ready to increase their efforts, we want them to speak. Those that do not want to increase their efforts, have nothing to announce, they can speak in other meetings, Guterres said.

It is noteworthy that only around 63 nations have been invited to speak at the summit. The US, Brazil and Japan are not speaking at the high-level event.

Akbaruddin further said that India is expected to talk about the Coalition for Disaster Resilient Infrastructure, a group of about 30 plus countries that will work towards common goals of having infrastructure, which is resilient to climate and disaster. India is working with countries like the UK and small island states like Fiji and Maldives who face problems of climatic nature. "So (In-

has said that India has a capacity dia) will bring to the table this coalition as a tangible demonstration of our willingness to work in partnerships, he said.

> Akbaruddin added that India has the ability to convene people or countries that are not only geographically different but economically diverse as well. India, a member of the G-20, has many friends who are developing countries.

> So what we intend to do is to leverage that ability to work across the board and to bring to the table a group of countries who are ready to address issues of infrastructure. Whenever there is a cataclysmic climate event, infrastructure gets undermined and overwhelmed very quickly, and it becomes very difficult for developing countries or countries who do not have economic wherewithal to address these, he said.

> Further, India is expected to address issues about water preservation and sustainable use of energy by the transport sector.

> India is a water stress country and efforts we will do about preservation of water, how we will try and address water related issues is another major aspect, he said.

> Akbaruddin further said that transport and heavy transport are key users of energy and India will see how it can address the challenges and make them more sustainable.

There are a whole host of issues that we will address in a holistic manner, but all will be tangible, very action-oriented and will be focused, he said.

The Climate Action Summit will see leaders make national statements, followed by statements of coalitions and national statements again.

US emphasises diplomacy in standoff with Iran

WASHINGTON, SEP 23 (AFP): The United States said Sunday it will make its case against Iran at the United Nations this week, insisting it wants to give diplomacy "every opportunity to succeed" in the wake of a devastating attack on a vital Saudi oil complex. Setting the stage for President Donald Trump's address to the annual UN General Assembly on Tuesday, Secretary of State Mike Pompeo put aside threats of US military retaliation against Iran for the attack.

"President Trump and I both want to give diplomacy every opportunity to succeed," Pompeo said in an interview with ABC's "This Week".

"Our administration's taking this on in a serious way and we are working diligently to see that this has a diplomatic outcome," he said. "But make no mistake about it, if we are unsuccessful in that and Iran continues to strike out in this way, I am confident that President Trump will make the decisions necessary to achieve our objectives." The United States has accused Tehran of carrying out the sneak air attacks that set aflame Saudi Arabia's Abgaig plant and the Khurais oil field on September 14, knocking out half the kingdom's oil production.

Pompeo called it "one of the largest attacks on the global energy supply in history". But despite initial warnings by Trump that US forces were "locked and loaded", the US president quickly softened his rhetoric, brushing off Republican hawks who warned that the absence of a forceful response would be read as weakness in Tehran. Trump

has so far ordered stepped up sanctions against Iran and a relatively modest deployment of US troops to the Gulf, primarily focussed on defensive missions like air and missile defense.

On Fox News, Pompeo said the administration was "deeply aware of the risks" of a miscalculation leading to conflagration in the tinderbox region.

"It's why we want to resolve this in a way that doesn't resort to kinetic action if it's at all possible to achieve that," he said. On Sunday, before leaving the White House on a trip to Texas, Trump once again left open the possibility of an unscheduled meeting on the sidelines of the UN General Assembly with

Iranian President Hassan Rouhani. "Nothing is ever off the table, completely, but I have no intention of meeting with Iran and that doesn't mean it doesn't happen," Trump said. "I'm a very flexible person, but we have no intention. It's not set up."

When asked if there would be any discussions between Pompeo or another American representative with the Iranian delegation at the UN General Assembly, a high-ranking American official said there was "nothing planned".


