SPCC opposes Citizenship Amendment Bill at AICC high level meet

Sikkim Pradesh Congress Committee [SPCC] has expressed its opposition to the Citizenship Amendment Bill during a high level committee meeting of the All India Congress Committee (AICC) held in Guwahati on 06 Nov, 2019.

The meeting led by former Union Minister and Rajya Sabha MP, Jairam Ramesh was held to gather opinions of the north-eastern states on the Citizenship Amendment Bill (CAB) and National Register of Citizens (NRC).

As per a press release, SPCC said that National Register of Citizens is welcome here if it ensures to safeguard the future of the original Sikkimese as guaranteed by the provisions of Article 371F of the constitution. Anything otherwise would be futile and against the conditions of the merger, it added.

The SPCC delegation had president, Bharat Basnet, working president, Dr Dipendra Gurung, treasurer, Karma Tashi Bhutia and ST cell chairman, Aita Singh Tamang.

Expressing its opposition to CAB, the SPCC delegation stated that its

outcome would adversely affect Sikkim and its people due to the very reason that the provisions of Article 371F have not been followed in letter and spirit, leaving the Sikkimese Bhutias, Lepchas and Nepalis vulnerable to the threats of further influx.

The major brunt of population influx due to CAB is expected to be borne by Sikkim, due to its geographical proximity with Northern West Bengal and Bangladesh, according to SPCC.

"The recently ousted Sikkim Democratic Front party had supported CAB in the Lok Sabha and the present Sikkim Krantikari Morcha government has promised to request the central government not to implement CAB in Sikkim. This only reflects their willingness to change their stand whenever the chances to serve their vested interests arise," the SPCC delegates said.

They highlighted that unchecked influx has reduced the ethnic communities of Bhutia, Lepcha and Nepali to a minority. They further accused regional political parties of using Article 371F to gain public support and

Conference-cum-International Buyer Seller Meet begins

The Agricultural and Processed Food **▲** Products Export Development Authority, 'APEDA' under the Ministry of Commerce and Industry, Government of India, jointly with the Government of Sikkim and Indian Chamber of Commerce organized the first Conference cum International Buyer Seller Meet for organic products from 21-22 Nov, 2019 in Gangtok, to showcase the strength of North East Region (NER) and Sikkim in particular, in its effort to open the export window for Sikkim organic products.

The event was inaugurated by Agriculture Minister, Loknath Sharma, in the presence of other dignitaries.

A total of 17 buyers from 13 countries viz., France, Switzerland, UAE, Saudi Arabia, Qatar, Singapore, Thailand, Malaysia, Vietnam, Indonesia, Japan, Nepal and Bangladesh, 25 major exporters and 28 FPOs/FPCs from Sikkim participated.

As per a press release, Importers/Buy-



ers spoke about their business, commodities of interest and promised to explore import of NER specific organic produce.

Exhibition stalls were set up to display a wide array of organic products viz., cherry pepper, kiwi, mandarin orange, buckwheat, tea, black pepper, large cardamom, ginger, turmeric etc. to promote the organic products of Sikkim by APEDA, Govt. of Sikkim, the FPOs/FPCs and various other agencies.

In his inaugural speech, Minister Sharma mentioned that agriculture is one of the priority sectors for the government of Sikkim with the primary focus to generate more income for farmers in the state, for which, the state government is making necessary efforts for value addition and processing and is optimistic that the buyer seller meet will create huge demand in the international market.

He also requested the international

buyers to develop long term relationship with the FPOs/FPCs and progressive farmers. Further, he stressed on the fact that robust supply chain is the need of the hour to connect the consumers with the farmers, for which 28 FPOs have been formed in Sikkim to promote organic farming and value chain development focussing on turmeric, cardamom, and ginger with clear need for developing food processing units and cold storages in the state along with effective marketing strategies and investments.

Principal Secretary, Agriculture & Horticulture Departments, R Telang, informed that the state is focussing on developing food processing industries to promote processed foods and value addition from the state, which will also reduce logistic costs and bring more profit to the farmers of the state.

Pragya Thakur nominated to key committee on defence

New Delhi, Nov 21 (PTI): Controversial BJP MP Pragya Thakur and threetime chief minister of the erstwhile state of Jammu and Kashmir Farooq Abdullah, who is detained under the stringent PSA, have been named to the 21-member joint consultative committee of parliament on defence.

Defence Minister Rajnath Singh will be chairing the committee, which will comprise 12 members from Lok Sabha and 9 from Rajya Sabha.

Thakur, a first-time MP from Bhopal, is an accused in the 2008 Malegaon blasts case, and is currently out on bail. She is facing trial for multiple charges under the Unlawful Activities (Prevention) Act.

Minister of State for Defence Shripad Yesso Naik, BJP's J P Nadda and NCP leader Sharad Pawar are also members of the panel, according to a notification issued by the Ministry of Parliamentary Affairs.

Abdullah was placed under house arrested on August 5 after the Centre announced the withdrawal of the special status of Jammu and Kashmir, besides bifurcating it into two union territories. The Lok Sabha MP from Srinagar Parliamentary seat was slapped with the controversial Public Safety Act on September 17. Thakur's nomination to the panel has triggered a political row as Congress attacked the government, saying it was unfortunate for the country that an MP accused of "spreading terror" has been nominated as member of a defence-related committee.

"Modi has not been able to forgive her from the heart' but she has been given the responsibility on important issues such as the country's defence. That is why if there is Modi, anything is possible," tweeted Congress spokesperson Randeep Singh Surjewala.

The Bombay High Court granted Thakur bail on health grounds in April 2017 after the NIA dropped charges against her under the Maharashtra Control of Organised Crime Act. The consultative committee also includes TMC's Sougata Roy and DMK's A Raja. Besides the 21 MPs, the committee also has Arjun Ram Meghwal and V Muraleedharan, both junior ministers for parliamentary affairs, as its ex-officio members.

Thakur, the Bhopal MP, has often hogged headlines for her controversial statements.

She stoked a controversy when she claimed that Mahatma Gandhi's assassin Nathuram Godse was a "patriot". Though she apologised for the remark, Prime Minister Narendra Modi said that he would never forgive Thakur for the comment. The MP was issued a show-cause notice by BIP ahead of the 2019 general election.

She previously earned the opposition ire when she claimed that then Maharashtra ATS chief Hemant Karkare was killed in the 26/11 Mumbai terror attacks due to her "curse".



Unnoticed Worries

Social concerns remain real and immediate

nother year is drawing to a close and although there was not much that happened by way of natural calamities and a lot transpired by way of political realignments, social concerns remained entrenched as the real problem areas of Sikkim. As one looks back at the year past, one cannot help but realize that not enough is being done to address social challenges which were amplified through 2019.

Reports about suicides come so often that this newspaper has decided not to carry them as individual news items anymore for fear of making the suicidal among the Sikkimese think it to be "normal", making their decision to hang the noose that much easier. The frequency of news-reports about suicides had also become so regular that the society at large appears to have grown inure to it. Ditto for substance abuse and the crackdown on substances of abuse. Apparently, these don't trigger deeper enquiries any more, and only sometimes fuel an online rant. Sexual offences also continue to haunt, and of late, worryingly, there has been a noticeable increase in this horror visiting minors, in most cases at places that we are supposed to secure for them their homes and our schools.

The incidents were spread across Sikkim, drug busts, suicides and sexual offences occurring in West and South Sikkim as frequently as they do in East or North Sikkim. By now, it is clear to all in Sikkim that crimes, all crimes including those against children, are not specific to any area or profile and have infiltrated every strata of society and region. It is a worrying scenario, but what is even more disturbing is the continuing absence of earnest social or governmental involvement in addressing these situations. At the end of another eventful year, it needs to be admitted that the Sikkimese society has failed itself miserably.

Addiction continues to convert more people at still younger ages, corruption refuses to contain itself and suicide remains an option that many continue to take. Much as some would want us to believe, these are not problems erupting out of poor governance, they are ills that a poor social fabric foments. There have been few, very few, instances where people have come together to further a collective cause, the manner in which individuals and their organisations came together for earthquake relief being one such case in point. But the wave of humanity appears to have crested in the wake of the earthquake and then collapsed back to the routine. There have been too many indications of a disinterested society more comfortable at sweeping its responsibilities under the carpet than address. ing issues and solving them. Violence against minors and the disturbing number of suicides are too obviously disturbing and frequent to escape notice any more, and yet, with alarming facility, these distressing signals remain ignored.

The lethargy one often associates with the bureaucracy, it stands proven, is as acute among the people who should make up the civil society and Sikkim remains the poorer for it. Every initiative that should have come from the people has come from the government instead. This does not always work, because if the people themselves are not motivated enough or concerned enough, then mere legislations are of little help. The present times are times of change, rapid change, and unless the society remains involved in this change, monitoring and moulding it, it will soon realise that they have mutated into something ugly when they could have metamorphosed into something much prettier. With our vacuity, we also cripple the chances of an improved future for the coming generations. That will be a guilt difficult to live down...

So You Want to be an Autocrat? Here's the 10-Point Checklist

and dynamic social movements in Lebanon, Hong Kong and across Europe and Latin America. Scholars say countries across the globe are ex-

periencing a rise in autocratic rule, with declines in democratic ideals and practice. Autocratic rule - also known as authoritarianism - is when one leader or political party exercises complete power to govern a country and its people.

The year 2008 was when democracy peaked, according to a prominent democracy advocacy group,

Freedom House. That's when the world had the highest percentage ever of fully "free countries," at 46.1%. That declined to 44.1% in 2018, though full or partial democracy is still the most common form of governance.

Definitions of democracy vary. All citizens in a democracy have the ability to vote in elections, which should be free and fair. Independent media, freedom of speech and assembly and the rule of law feature in most contemporary perceptions of democracy.

Democratic declines are most notable in the regions with the world's largest concentration of democracies. That includes Europe, North America and Latin America.

One example: The United States in 2018 was rated a "flawed democracy," dropping from 21st to 25th place among 167 countries and territories.

In the old days, autocrats often came to or retained power through military coups and violent crackdowns. Now the shift from democracy to autocracy is slower and less obvious. While control over security forces remains essential in the autocratic playbook, overt strong-arm tactics aren't. **TOP 10 LIST**

I spent more than 15 years with the United Nations, where I advised governments and democracy advocates on how to strengthen the rule of law, human rights and democratic governance. I'm now a scholar of international law.

I've learned that today's leaders with authoritarian tendencies aren't just interested in using brute force to rise to power.

They are smarter, more resilient and can adjust their methods to take account of new developments, like modern technologies and a globalized economy. Here are some of the newest tactics used by would-be authoritarians:

1. EXTEND EXECUTIVE POWER

The mainstay of today's authoritarianism is strengthening your power while simultaneously weakening government institutions, such as parliaments and judiciaries, that provide checks and

The key is to use legal means that ultimately give democratic legitimacy to the power grab. Extreme forms of this include abolishing presidential term limits, which was done in China; and regressive constitutional reforms to expand presidential power, like in Turkey.

2. REPRESS DISSENT AND CITIZEN EFFORTS TO HOLD GOVERNMENT ACCOUNTABLE

Restrictions on funding and other bureaucratic limitations silence the ability of the people to hold accountable those in power. More than 50 countries have passed laws that stifle citizen groups. Democracies have also jumped on this bandwagon. Limitations on permits for public protest, de-

tention of protesters and excessive use of force to break up demonstrations are frequently used tools. 3. CAPTURE ELITE SUPPORT AND, WHEN NEED-**ED, DEMONIZE THEM TOO**

Economic growth and prosperity are critical to retaining elite or oligarchical support for autocratic leaders. Whether through state-owned businesses, media conglomerates or more sophisticated connections between governments and free-market corporations, money and politics, translated into government favors for the rich, can be a toxic mix for democracy.

Ironically, popular distaste with elite corrup-

have found cleverer ways to tilt the playing field in their favor. These new tactics include hampering media access, gerrymandering, changing election and voter eligibility rules and placing allies on electoral commissions. 8. PLAY THE EMERGENCY CARD

Some autocratic leaders continue to use traditional strong-arm tactics, like declaring states of emergency, to enable further repression.

Since 2001, using the threat of terrorism or organized crime has played well for furthering autocratic rule. President Rodrigo Duterte's drug war, which seems to have resulted in thousands dead in the Philippines, is one illustration.



tion is so high that modern autocratic populists, such as President Jair Bolsonaro in Brazil, have even risen to power on anti-corruption promises.

4. APPEAL TO POPULISM AND NATIONALISM

Most would-be autocratic leaders today exploit existing tensions within complex societies in order to solidify their support. In many places, fears of migrants and refugees have fueled resurgent nationalism, driving policies like U.K.'s Brexit. In India, religiously based nationalism has maintained the power of Prime Minister Narendra Modi.

Blaming external forces for a country's problems, such as Hungarian leader Viktor Orban's demonization of George Soros, a Hungarian-born philanthropist who supports democracy-building, is also common.

5. CONTROL INFORMATION AT HOME; MISIN-FORM ABROAD

While propaganda and state-owned media is not new, control of modern technology and information has become a key battleground.

China has developed sophisticated technologies to censor and prevent the circulation of unwanted information and to track individuals in society.

Russia is at the vanguard of state media control at home while generating misinformation abroad. Many smaller countries have used internet blackouts to block organizing and communicating by social movements.

6. CRIPPLE THE OPPOSITION

Damaging the opposition parties, while not completely destroying them, is now essential. Infiltrating parties, co-opting members and using pure scare tactics are some possible actions in the autocrat's playbook. This serves the purpose of retaining a target for pseudo-political competition while also stymieing the potential for new, more democratic forces to gain traction.

7. COVERT ELECTION MANIPULATION

Mostly gone are the days of vote-rigging and vote-buying as a path to power. Would-be autocrats

Since an attempted coup in 2016 up until 2018, for example, Turkey was under a state of emergency which enabled President Recep Tayyip Erdogan to jail and persecute academics, government officials, media and human rights advocates.

9. EXTEND YOUR MODEL AND INFLUENCE

Today's autocratic rulers are not keeping to themselves. Using the international stage and their growing economic prowess, countries like China are spreading their influence through funding initiatives such as the Belt and Road to build infrastructure across Asia to Europe. They're hiring professional consultants to advise and lobby foreign capitals for policies that reinforce their power. **10. LEARN AND SHARE**

Characterized as "autocratic learning" by scholars, national authorities from Russia, China, Iran, Venezuela, Belarus, Syria and other places are developing and exchanging models for containing threats of social movements and the so-called "color revolutions."

International meetings and intergovernmental clubs can provide a platform for exchange. For example, Prime Minister Hun Sen of Cambodia has successfully rallied neighbor governments to help oppress opposition to his rule using the regional organization ASEAN. Government officials in Malaysia recently blocked Cambodian opposition members from returning to their country via Malaysia.

DIRECTION UNKNOWN

Some experts claim the world is at a "tipping point" where decreasing faith in democracy will drive the dominance of autocracy globally.

The social movements of today inspire some hope that civil society - a key ingredient for democracy – though under pressure, is fighting the trend.

Nonetheless, strengthening democracy across the globe will prove impossible if even the most established democracies today fall prey to the tactics of would-be autocrats.

Mobile access won't fix the digital divide. Fixed-line is needed too

Mobile services have had an important and positive impact on developing countries where they are the main means of connecting to the internet. However, mobile services have capacity constraints. They use limited radio frequency spectrum, which means that mobile data typically has usage limits. They also have high prices per unit (per gigabyte), which results in lower use per connection.

Fixed-line broadband, on the other hand, has significantly lower prices per unit. It is often offered on an uncapped or unlimited basis, and therefore has higher usage per connection. This enables a wider range of services. Fixed lines are expensive to roll out, but these costs are falling.

So a question arises: is mobile enough for developing countries like South Africa?

It's an important question because there is a substantial "digital divide" between countries, as well as within countries like South Africa. This difference in access to digital technology also exists between households that have access to the internet at home, and those that do not.

In a recent paper we looked at the question of substitution between fixed and mobile broadband services. Our results show that having a computer and access to an internet connection at work or school are at least as important in driving

mobile data prices.

Our findings suggest that relying solely on mobile networks to bridge the "digital divide" is not enough. Policymakers and regulators should consider ways of expanding access to computers and internet at work and schools, together with expanding access to fixed-line broadband.

THE DIGITAL DIVIDE

Overall, only 10% of households in South Africa report having access to the internet at home. This compares to almost 50% across developing countries. But even the low average internet access in South Africa masks important regional disparities.

In the Western Cape, for example, 26% of households have internet access at home, compared to 2% in Limpopo. This suggests that access to the internet in South Africa is very low overall, and highly skewed, reflecting the extreme levels of inequality.

In our paper, we show that access to the means of using the internet, such as owning a computer, plays an important role in household choices of fixed or mobile data services. Where a household has a computer, fixed and mobile are less likely to be substitutes.

Our research shows that if fixedline coverage was expanded to the entire population and computers were available to all, fixed-line broadband penetration would increase significantly by 9.6 percentage points, while mobile broadband penetration would increase by half of a percentage point.

This is consistent with the pos-

broadband penetration as reducing itive relationship we observe between having a computer and home internet access across countries (see Figure 2).

> Our results also corroborate survey evidence in South Africa and other countries that identifies the high cost or lack of equipment, such as computers, as being a barrier to using the internet at home. The price of subscribing to a service plays less of a role.

> We also show that when consumers access the internet at work or school they are less likely to see fixed and mobile data services as substitutes. Having an internet connection at work or school would add an additional 5.7 percentage points to fixedline broadband penetration, and 3 percentage points to mobile broadband penetration. This is over and above the effect of expanding fixedline coverage and providing households with computers.

> This may be due to "learning effects" where users of high-speed internet at work and school learn applications for high-speed internet at home.

In addition, being employed, and being self-employed in particular, makes fixed and mobile data services weaker substitutes. Unemployment in South Africa is currently 38.5%. At higher levels of employment and particularly self-employment, more fixed-line services will be needed.

This is important in view of a recent study. The study shows that the expansion of high-speed internet access in African countries, including South Africa, results not only in greater employment but also in greater productivity.

IMPLICATIONS

These results have several implications for regulators and policymakers in developing countries, particularly in Africa. Regulators have so far focused largely on interventions in respect of mobile data services. But our findings suggest that this is not enough to expand access to

broadband. Firstly, it is important to stimulate demand for broadband services. This can be done by providing the tools, such as computers, for using such services. Furthermore, our results suggest that ensuring individuals have access to the internet at work and educational facilities would likely increase broadband adoption.

Secondly, our findings show that, for large groups of consumers, fixed and mobile complement one another. This means that greater fixed-line broadband adoption leads to greater mobile data adoption, and vice versa. The number of consumers that see fixed and mobile data as complements is greater at higher levels of employment and self-employment. It is also higher among those who have more access to computers and greater connectivity at work and at schools.

This suggests that relying solely on mobile networks to bridge the digital divide is not enough.

PM should talk to experts, pol parties to tide over economic crisis: Mamata

MURSHIDABAD (WB), Nov 21 (PTI): Opposing the Centre's decision to hive off and disinvest shares in several PSUs, West Bengal Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee on Thursday said Prime Minister Narendra Modi should talk to experts and all political parties to tide over the economic crisis.

She asserted that shoring up funds by selling off government stake in central public sector firms (CPSUs) could only provide temporary respite.

"The Centre should look for a permanent solution instead of advocating stopgap measures. Unless there is economic stability, such measures cannot be the solution," Banerjee told newspersons here.

While an elected government should be allowed to work independently, "it should also seek opinion of all other parties" on issues affecting the country, the Trinamool Congress (TMC) supremo noted.

"I feel the prime minister should talk to experts in the country and hold an all-party meeting to overcome the crisis,"



she added. "Tomorrow Bangladesh Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina will be coming to the city to watch the day and night India-Bangladesh cricket test match. Apart from being present at the grounds during the inauguration and felicitation programme, we (Hasina and herself) will also have a one on one courtsey meeting at 6 PM tomorrow," Banerjee said.

According to sources in the Bangladesh Prime Minister's office, both the leaders will be present during the match and the felicitation ceremony.

Hasina and Banerjee share a very cordial relation and have mutual respect for each other, the sources said.

The Bangladesh premier will watch the day and night cricket test match between India and Bangladesh in Kolkata on Friday, the ministry of external affairs had said on Thursday.

The agenda of the meeting was not disclosed neither by the CMO nor by the Bangladesh Prime Minister's office. It is also not known whether the issue of Teesta water agreement that both New Delhi and Dhaka are keen to seal since September 2011, will be discussed by the two leaders.

Banerjee, who is a

Rose Valley ponzi scam: ED conducts search operations

KOLKATA, NOV 21 (PTI): **Enforcement Directorate** sleuths on Thursday conducted search operations in the residential premises of a Rose Valley officer and in the apartment of the wife of its chairman Gautam Kundu, who is now in jail in connection with the ponzi scheme scam, sources in the investigating agency said.

The search operations were conducted in New Town and in upscale South City, a shopping and residential complex, in Kolkata, the sources said.

The ED has been probing the collapse of the chit fund firm Rose nearly Rs 12,000 crore from the general public luring them with abnormally high returns and subsequently failing to deliver.

"This is a routine process in the course of the investigation", the sources said adding the search operations were conducted at the Rose Valley officer's residence in New Town and the flat of Subhra Kundu, the company chairman's wife, in South City.

During the probe several Trinamool Congress leaders had been interrogated and jailed. The leaders included TMC

Valley which collected MP Sudip Bandopadhyay and MLA Tapas Pal. They were granted bail by Odisha High Court as both of them were taken for further questioning to Odisha.



Content with one fight every 5-6 months: Vijender



New Delhi, Nov 21 (PTI): Gearing up for his 12th professional bout in four years, Indian boxing star Vijender Singh on Thursday said he is content with his progress in the circuit despite the fight schedule not being particularly busy.

The 34-year-old, who is undefeated so far, will square off against Ghana's two-time former Commonwealth super middle-weight (76kg) champion Charles Adamu in Dubai on Friday.

Adamu is eight years older to him.

"I don't expect him to put up too much of a challenge because I have noticed he is slower than me. So, despite his experience, I think I will have the edge," Vijender told PTI from Dubai on the eve of the 10-round clash. "So I am relaxed, nothing to wor-

ry there," he added.

Adamu comes into the contest with an experience of 47 bouts, of which he has won 33 (26 knockouts). The Ghanian is also an Olympian and won a bronze medal for his country in the 1998 Commonwealth Games in Kuala Lumpur.

Given that he wasn't particularly worried about how things might pan out on Friday, Vijender spoke of his future plans.

"I will probably be fighting in India next and people can expect that to be a big one. Obviously I can't give out the full details for now," he said.

His most recent fight was in July, when he made his debut in the USA after being signed by Hall of Famer Bob Arum's Top Rank Promotions. He didn't compete at all in 2018 and his last

appearance in front of home fans was back in December 2017 in Jaipur.

"Once in five-six months suits me just fine because I also need to spend time with my family. It's already been two months since I have been with my wife and children and it is difficult for me to manage beyond that," said the former Olympic bronze-medallist.

The six-footer from Haryana also said that he would be fighting in the US too but before all that is Friday's showdown, the one for which he has prepared by sparring a little bit more than usual.

"I have actually taken quite a beating during those sessions. Hopefully, that would mean lesser work when I compete because I will be already battle-hardened," he quipped.

France are getting serious again – but will they end a decade of decline?

PARIS, 21 NOV [THEGUARDIAN]: The appointment of Shaun Edwards as defence coach shows France are getting serious again. No country has won more Six Nations titles in the professional era than Les Bleus, tied on seven with England, even though their last success was in 2010. Since then, they have tended to bumble along in the bottom half of the table, absent away and not too often in at home. Their last victory at Twickenham in the championship was 2005, in Cardiff it was 2010 and they have not won in Dublin in the tournament

Bernard Laporte, who as a coach enjoyed success in the Six Nations, tried in his capacity as the president of the French Rugby Federation to secure a non-Frenchman to succeed Jacques Brunel as head coach after the World Cup: he had in mind Joe Schmidt and Warren Gatland, but he needed the approval of clubs for the unprecedented move and failed.

So he turned to Raphaël Ibañez, who as a player at Wasps worked under Edwards, and appointed him manager with Fabien Galthié taking over from Brunel. Although given Galthié was part of the management team in the World Cup he was effectively in place six months earlier than advertised. As the hosts of the 2023 World Cup, Laporte expects France to be contenders, much as they were in 2007 when the country first staged the event and he was in his final year as the national side's head coach.

They reached the semi-finals at that tournament when they tried to impersonate England and went down to the real thing having lost to Argentina in Paris and defeated New Zealand in Cardiff on the way there. It was classic France, up one week and way down the next, but at least they had a shape to them.

They have meandered since then, inconsistency in selection reflected in performances at a time when Wales and Ireland, followed by England, brought in coaches from overseas.

This year's Six Nations reflected their decline this decade, blowing a 16-point interval lead in Cardiff before stunning the crowd at Twickenham with their defensive ineptitude having opted not to pick a specialist full-back. They were 26-0 down in Dublin before scoring two late tries and victories over Scotland and Italy took them to fourth, but again a country with one of the highest playing populations in the world game failed to muster a challenge for the title.

France have lacked coherence this decade, moments of brilliance unable to compensate for the lack of an identity. Even with Galthié in harness, if not nominally in charge, the World Cup campaign exposed their nature, 17 points ahead in the first-half against Argentina and Tonga only to be hanging on at the end to win both matches by two. They were 12-0 up against Wales in the quarter-final only to fail to score a point in the second half, not helped by a mindless act of foul play by Sébastien Vahaamahina.

The second row's elbow on Aaron Wainwright highlighted the self-destructive nature of a side that has long forgotten how to win tournaments: sloppy mistakes let Tonga and Wales back into matches they should have been shut out of and a failure to exert control when it is needed is perhaps a consequence of the way they have messed about at outside-half this decade and regularly been rudderless. In the words of the song, every time they get to the final piece they start disassembling.

They only won one second half in the World Cup, against the United States after a late flurry. The aggregate score in that period against Argentina, Tonga and

Wales was 9-42 compared to 56-20 in the first period. It suggests a lack of conditioning, but the problem appears to be as much mental as physical. Edwards will help change that: language should not be an issue because no one will fail to understand the meaning of his

icy stare.

France are 10-1 to win the Six Nations, behind the odds-on favourites, England, Ireland and Wales. They start with the beaten World Cup finalists on the first Sunday in February in Paris. They have lost on the opening weekend for the last three years, the last two despite home advantage, and the new regime will not have had an autumn campaign to bed in.

If Galthié masters selection, an area which separates the best coaches from the rest, France will become a force again. Who he goes for at outside-half will offer a guide: Romain Ntamack was the preferred choice in the position during the World Cup, but he was in the midfield on Friday night at Kingsholm when Toulouse, after gifting Gloucester two tries in the opening half in the manner of the national side, dominated in the second half.

The variety of Camille Lopez's kicking undid Harlequins at Clermont Auvergne the following day while that evening Matthieu Jalibert kicked 20 points for Bordeaux-Begles in their victory over Wasps and tormented them with his running game. He won his solitary cap as a 19-year old at the start of the 2018 Six Nations only for injury to return him to relative obscurity.

France's last Six Nations title came in the year that Toulouse won the Champions Cup for the fourth time. They have not appeared in a final since or even enjoyed a home quarter-final. As the club rises again, Les Bleus' souffle is being prepared with a new recipe; England will be the first to find out if it is half-baked.

Kohli says pink ball feels like heavy hockey ball, braces up for fielding challenges

The pink ball feels like a "heavy hockey ball" to
Virat Kohli, who is extremely wary of the challenges its weight, hardness and colour could pose while fielding.

Indian cricket will finally embrace the pink revolution when Kohli's formidable team lock horns with a deflated Bangladesh in their maiden Day/Night Test starting here on Friday.

"One thing that surprised me was the fielding sessions. In the slips balls hit so hard it almost felt like a heavy hockey ball, all those synthetic ball that we're used to play with in the younger days," Kohli said on the eve of the match.

"It's purely because of the extra glaze on the ball, it is definitely much more harder. For some reason it felt heavy and even the throws took a lot more effort than the red colour to reach the wicketkeeper."

India had their first brush with the SG pink ball after they wrapped up the opening Test inside three days in Indore.

India had a session under lights at the Eden Gardens on Wednesday.

"I think during the

day, high catches will be very difficult. With the red or white ball you have the idea of when the ball reaches you but with the pink ball if you don't look at it your palms are gone.

"Fielding session for me was far more challenging. People are going to be surprised how challenging pink ball can be."



Visibility in twilight has also been cited as one of the biggest challenges the historic match could pose. "Not having a great visibility and the ability to pick that colour makes it even more difficult. The decision making has to be very precise like the idea of off stumps. Even when we practised yesterday we felt as if the ball is far but it hits you very quickly.

"The extra glaze of the ball is making it travel faster. It hits the hand hard. It should excite everyone. Sometime you have to change the template. I think we have to be very precise and our skills will be tested in this Test."

Since the first Day/ Night Test between Australia and New Zealand in 2015, 11 matches have been played under lights, but in Indian conditions the dew could play a more influential role, according to Kohli.

"That is one difference in playing day-night

Test in India compared to any other country. Apart from that I don't really feel there is any major difference. Dew is something which is definitely going to be a factor in India in the late last session. "We spoke to the match referee yesterday. You can't really predict how much mopping or cleaning of the dew is required at what stage, you never know when the dew is going to arrive.

"He (match referee) had the same discussion that we'll have to play it as it comes and manage it in the best way possible. That's the only change I see." According to the skipper, the pink ball will do a lot more away from India.

"Obviously the pitches and how much the Kookaboora does is a different ball game altogether. I think the pink ball will do a lot more in foreign conditions than it would in India, probably in the second and third sessions as well.

Hong Kong campus stalemate as US bill sets up China clash

dwindling core of hard-**A**line protesters held their ground on Thursday at a Hong Kong university besieged for days by police, as the US passed a bill lauding the city's pro-democracy movement, setting up a likely clash between Washington and Beijing.

China did not immediately respond to the passage in Washington of the Hong Kong Human Rights and Democracv Act, which voices strong support for the "democratic aspirations of the Hong Kong people." But China had already threatened retaliation if the bill is signed into law by President Donald Trump, and state-run media warned Thursday the legislation would not prevent Beijing from intervening forcefully to stop the "mess" gripping the financial hub.

"Some may expect this to deter Beijing. Such thinking is naive," the Global Times said. "If we take this US bill seriously and shrink from tackling riots, Hong Kong will suffer from an accelerated collapse of the rule of law and be erased from the modern world." Hong Kong's benchmark stock index fell 1.5 percent, leading Asian markets lower over fears



that Congress's move could throw a spanner into the delicate US-China effort to reach a trade deal between the world's two largest economies.

Exhausted protesters draped in gold and silver medical blankets periodically trickled from the now-quiet campus of Hong Kong Polytechnic University (PolyU), which days earlier saw fiery clashes between police and protesters armed with bows, arrows and Molotov cocktails. The former president, who will function as Prime Minister of the caretaker cabinet until the general election, is expected to be sworn in at 1 pm before assuming office at around 3 pm, it added.

Rajapaksa was appointed the prime minister on October 26, 2018 by the then President Maithripala Sirisena. who sacked Wickremesinghe in a controversial move that plunged the country into an unprecedented constitutional crisis.

Australian PM denies climate link as smoke chokes Sydney

SYDNEY, Nov 21 (AFP): Australia's Prime Minister on Thursday denied his climate policies had caused unprecedented bushfires ravaging the country and insisted his government was doing enough to tackle global warming.

As blazes that have scorched swathes of countryside continued to spread and the country's largest city was cloaked in hazardous smoke, conservative leader Scott Morrison defended his climate record, saying Australia was "doing our bit".

His comments came after weeks spent refusing to speak about the link between climate change and deadly fires described by the emergency services as unprecedented in number and scale for the early bushfire season.

"The suggestion that any way shape or form that Australia -accounting for 1.3 percent of the world's emissions... are impacting directly on specific fire events, whether it is here or anywhere else in the world, that doesn't bear up to credible scientific evidence," he told ABC radio. As more people in the southeast of the country were told to evacuate their homes and schoolchildren in Sydney were again forced to play indoors, Morrison dismissed mounting calls for action.

Australia, he said, was "doing our bit as part of the response to climate change" and sought to frame the issue as a global concern.

Scientists, former fire chiefs and residents touched by bushfires have all drawn the link between this season's more intense fires and climate change.

Drought, unseasonably hot, dry and windy conditions have fuelled the unprecedented blazes. Scientists believe many of those factors are made worse by rising global temperatures.

On Thursday bushfires burned across every region of Australia with residents in Victoria warned to leave high-risk areas and officials in New South Wales reporting more than 600 homes have been destroyed in recent weeks.

Morrison is facing calls to cut greenhouse gas emissions and rapidly transition to renewable energy -- a sensitive debate in light of Australia's lucrative mining industry.

Australia has committed to globally agreed climate targets to help limit warming, but its emissions continue to rise and targets are only being met with the use of some creative carbon accounting -- using credits gained in past decades.

While Australia's burning of fossil fuels accounts for only a fraction of global emissions, coal dug up Down Under and burned around the world makes the country a major emissions exporter.

Devastating fires along the country's east coast have claimed six lives since mid-October.

Now the fire danger has moved into states further south, with a so-called "Code Red" -- the highest possible fire risk in Victoria -- being declared in the state's northwest for the first time in a decade.

"What that means is that if we see fires in those areas they will be fast-moving, they will be unpredictable, they will be uncontrollable," emergency management commissioner Andrew Crisp said.

Country Fire Authority chief Steve Warrington told people living in rural areas to leave for the safety of cities.

"We are saying, 'do not be there, do not be there when a fire occurs, because you will not survive if you are there'," he said. "There is a good chance if a fire occurs that your home will be destroyed."

The fire danger was also elevated to "severe" in the island state of Tasmania off mainland Australia's southeastern coast, where a total fire ban was declared.

For the second time in three days, smoke from bushfires blanketed Sydney, Australia's biggest city and an area that is home to more than five million people, sending air quality plummeting to hazardous levels.

In South Australia, the state capital Adelaide was also shrouded in bushfire smoke and residents were being told to stay indoors for health reasons.

More than 110 fires are still burning in worst-hit New South Wales and neighbouring Queensland, while in South Australia more than 40 fires broke out during catastrophic fire conditions Wednesday.

The country is bracing for challenging fire conditions to continue throughout the Southern Hemisphere summer.

Pope Francis kicks off Asia tour with Buddhist temple visit

BANGKOK, NOV 21 (AFP): Pope Francis will visit one of Thailand's famed gilded temples Thursday to meet the supreme Buddhist patriarch, on the first full day of his Asian tour aimed at promoting religious harmony. The 82-year-old pontiff is on his first visit to Buddhist majority Thailand, where he will spend four days before setting off to Japan.

His packed schedule a day after touching down in Bangkok includes a meeting with the king and the prime minister before leading an evening mass expected to draw tens of thousands of people from across Thailand, where just over 0.5 per cent of the population is Catholic.

He also has an appointment with the Buddhist Supreme Patriarch at the glittering gold Ratchabophit temple in Thailand's historic old quarter, built 150 years ago by Thailand's former king mixing traditional and gothic styles.

It is a highly symbolic visit for the head of the world's 1.3 billion Catholics, who carries a message of peace, reliclear disarmament on his sweep through Asia. "Pope Francis always respects other religions, always treats his counterparts with respect... that's why he would like to pay respect to the leader" of the Buddhist faith in Thailand, said Chainarong Monthienvichienchai, who helped with some of the visit planning.

Before arriving, Francis praised the Southeast Asian country as a "multi-ethnic nation", and hoped his trip would strengthen the Catholic community's bonds of friendship with "many Buddhist brothers and sisters".

Earlier Thursday the Pope was met by Thailand's Prime Minister Prayut Cha-O-Cha at government house for a red carpet welcome with dozens of top officials.

He was accompanied by his cousin Sister Ana Rosa, who has lived in Thailand for decades and will be accompanying the pontiff as a translator.

In a speech to civil society, officials and diplomats, he said the visit with the patriarch was "a sign of the importance

gious tolerance and nu- and urgency of promoting friendship and interreligious dialogue". The Pope's trip to Thailand is the first papal trip to the country since pope John Paul II visited in 1984.

It coincides with the 350th anniversary of the first Catholic missionaries who established the "Mission de Siam" in the late 17th century.

Pope Francis arrived Wednesday in the Thai capital where he was greeted by cheering worshippers who lined the streets hoping for a glimpse of the Catholic leader in his motorcade.

He heads to Japan on Saturday, where he will visit Hiroshima and Nagasaki, two cities devastated when the US dropped atomic bombs at the end of World War II in 1945.

The pope, who years ago had hoped to be a missionary in Japan, has made strong calls for the ban of the "immoral" use of nuclear weapons.

Since Francis' election six years ago, he has made two trips to Asia, visiting the Philippines and Sri Lanka in 2014, followed by Myanmar and Bangladesh in 2017.

Online fundraiser for bushfire-hit koalas tops Aus\$1 mn

An online fundraiser for koalas injured in devastating bushfires topped Aus\$1 million (\$680,000) on Thursday, making it Australia's biggest campaign on the GoFundMe platform this year.

Deadly bushfires have ravaged swathes of eastern Australia, and wildlife carers estimate the blazes have killed hundreds of koalas this month in New South Wales state alone.

A crowdfunding page set up by the Port Macquarie Koala Hospital to provide automatic water drinking stations for wild koalas soared past Aus\$1 million, with donations

from more than 20,000 people from countries including the United States, France and England.

The wildlife charity's "Help Thirsty Koalas Devastated by Recent Fires" drive, which had an initial goal of just Aus\$25,000, got more donations than any other campaign in Australia this year, GoFundMe said, and is the second-biggest since the platform launched Down Under in 2016. It is one of 700 bushfire-related fundraisers launched on the platform in the past 10 days, which to date have raised a combined total of Aus\$2 million.

The next-biggest has raised Aus\$60,000 to support firefighters and

people impacted by the blazes, which have killed six people, razed hundreds of homes and scorched about 1.5 million hectares (3.7 million acres) of land since October. The koala hospital,

some four hours north of Sydney, has rescued 31 koalas from the scorched bush in recent

weeks, and said it had been "overwhelmed by the kindness, good wishes and support from the Australian and international community".

It plans to use the excess funds to deliver koala drinking stations to other parts of the state, purchase a water-carrying vehicle to replenish the stations, and to establish a koala breeding programme.

With more than 1.3 million hectares (3.2 million acres) of land scorched in the state, the fires have also destroyed large tracts of the tree-dwelling marsupial's habitat.






