SKM challenges Chamling to remove Golay from CM's post

Party goes on counteroffensive, says govt is looking into corruption allegations against former CM **SUMMIT REPORT** GANGTOK, 06 JUN:

🔼 ikkim Krantikari Mor-Ocha party spokesperson, Jacob Khaling, has challenged Sikkim Democratic Front president, former CM Pawan Chamling, to try his best to remove SKM president, PS Tamang [Golay] from the post of the Chief Minister. He remains convinced that Mr Tamang's appointment as CM was constitutionally sound and today alleged that the SDF was planning to use "money power" to have Mr Tamang removed.

Also, in a clear indication of a tit-for-tat, Mr Khaling also announced today that the SKM Government



will now begin looking into allegations of corruption against Mr Chamling.

The SKM response comes in the wake of media reports that Mr Chamling was in New Delhi to pursue legal options to challenge Mr Tamang's appointment as the Chief Minister of Sikkim.

Addressing a press conference here today, Mr Khaling alleged that Mr Chamling flexing money-power in Delhi to have Mr Tamang removed. Mr Tamang alleged that SDF was resorting to this "after having failed" to stop Mr Tamang from becoming the CM "legally and

He stated that Mr Tamang became the CM fulfilling two parame-

constitutionally."

ters - first, getting the mandate of the people of Sikkim and then getting the permission from the Governor who evaluated all constitutional and legal aspects.

Mr Khaling also let on that the SKM was going on the counter-offensive now.

"We have won our first battle with the re-

cent election and now we will take up the next challenge of taking account of the people's money and how it was pilfered in Sikkim and punish all involved in corruption. The government has already started the process of collecting details on all corrupt actions of the former CM," he said.

Will go to court if OFOJ circular is not withdrawn, threatens SDF

No violation of Model Code of Conduct, DoP under political pressure



SAGAR CHETTRI GANGTOK, 06 IUN:

Sikkim Democratic Front today threatened to go to court if the Department of Personnel does not withdraw its recent circular on the One Family One Job scheme beneficiaries within one week. The department has misinterpreted the Model Code of Conduct norms under the pressure of the SKM government, the party has said.

It may be mentioned here that the Department of Personnel [DoP] issued a circular on 31 May asking the heads of all departments to submit a list of 'One Family, One Job' recruits who reported for duty after enforcement of Model Code of Conduct on 08 March. The circular states that many departments accepted the OFOJ candidates while the Model Code of Conduct was still in force in the State. It further stated that allowing candidates to report for duty during the Model Code of Conduct violates the norms of the **Election Commission and** the concerned depart-

under the established norms of the Election Commission of India. On the same, the DoP

requested all Secretaries to immediately withhold and cancel the joining of all the candidates under OFOJ scheme along with those candidates appointed under temporary basis who have "reported for duty after the enforcement of Model Code of Conduct and list of such candidates along with their appointment orders may be forwarded to this de-

3 Front party president, former Chief Minister Pawan Chamling, has written to the Speaker seeking "immediate necessary action" against those involved in heckling him from the visitors' gallery of the Legislative Assembly on 03 June while the Assembly was in session.

The petition states, "As the leader of the opposition party, SDF and being the senior most Member of the State Assembly, the unfortunate incident which took place during the Assembly session on 03 June was highly objectionable, condemnable and against the very spirit of parliamentary democracy."

The letter highlights that the power to maintain order in the House



and upholding dignity and decorum, was vested in the Speaker on whom also rested the responsibility to "protect the rights and interest of every Member of the Assembly irrespective of their political connections or affiliation."

"As per the tradition, practice and procedure in the Assembly, the permission to attend the Assembly proceeding for the guests or visitors who are seated in the gallery of the House are provided with the recommendation of the respective Members of the House and with the due approval of the Speaker," it is added.

He insults hurled from the visitors' gallery on 03 June, Mr Chamling states were "defamatory, indeunparliamentary and totally inappropriate."

"The sole object of such illegal act committed by the said persons was to intimidate, threaten and humiliate me and the other Members of the SDF party. It is obvious that this entire act of illegality was pre-planned by the SKM party," the letter adds.

The petition points out that the entire incident was witnessed by all present in the House and must also have been recorded in the CCTV of the Assembly.





Addressing a press conference here today, SDF spokesperson, MK Subba said that government works that have already started at ground level after receiving all administrative approval can continue during the MCC period as per the MCC guidelines.

There has been no violation of the MCC, Mr Subba said further adding that the department misinterpreted the MCC norms under the pressure of the SKM government and issued the circular. On the same, he added that the OFOJ candidates had been selected before the MCC came into force.

Mr Subba also assured the beneficiaries not to worry as the party will fight for them.

Likewise, SDF spokesperson, Neeru Sewa mentioned that it was not the fault of the beneficiaries of the scheme but it was due to the delay of the departments on the appointment of the selected candidates. Agriculture Minister chairs first meeting with officials

GANGTOK, 06 JUN (IPR): Coordination meeting to welcome the Minister for FS&ADD, H&C-CDD, AHLF & VS, IPR & Printing Department, LN Sharma was held today in the Training Hall of Cooperative Department, Krishi Bhawan.

Secretary Horticulture Department, DK Bhandari in his opening remarks gave a brief overview of the problems that the Department had been facing. He threw light on the major fact that land for agriculture has been depleting for various reasons and the manpower apart from old age group have been looking for other source of employment rather than farming.

Before 18 Sept, 2011, there was this horror

In 2011, Sikkim received a new date to remember Inatural disasters by on 18 September when the strongest "homegrown" earthquake tore through the State. Close to seven years since, most Sikkimese appear to have forgotten that evening and refuse to live by any of the lessons that the temblor taught. That was perhaps expected since the State has consistently ignored such lessons. After all, before the Quake, there was the cloudburst over Gangtok on 08 June, 1997; a freak of nature of such ferocity that it claimed a total of 52 lives in and around Gangtok and parts of North Sikkim. And no, the monsoon had not arrived early in 1997, as this was technically still a pre-monsoon episode. It was unprecedented in its inundation. Met Office records reveal that on the intervening night of 08 and 09 June, Gangtok received a record rainfall of 223.8 mm. The entire month of June, once monsoon hits Gangtok, receives an average of 650.4 mm of rain. 40% of the month's quota poured out in a span of few hours twenty-one years ago!

Officially recorded as a cloudburst, this inundation was triggered right above Raj Bhavan and tested the drainage of the capital city and found it wanting right at the beginning itself. Water spilled everywhere and the copious amounts that flowed through Gangtok on the day cleaved away a building from its foundation near Zero Point along NH31A almost directly below where the cloud had supposedly "burst". A landslide rushed off from just behind Mintokgang and poured slush into a building on the Gangtok-Chandmari axis. Tathangchen suffered a sleepless night as rural houses further down were washed away and families buried alive, not only there, but also up at Chandmari. Baluwakhani suffered too. In fact, all of Gangtok suffered. It is debatable whether better drainage alone could have saved Gangtok that night. A cloudburst, after all is a ferocious event and no drain or jhora is planned with such an inundation in mind.

08 June, 1997, taught Sikkim in general and Gangtok in particular, many lessons. How well either learnt its lessons remains suspect. Take the jhoras for example. Although the deluge was too voluminous that night for Gangtok's jhoras to manage, they could still have performed better. Although many jhora training works have been undertaken since, their serviceability remains woefully limited. Cosmetic touch-ups in Gangtok defeat the purpose if the jhoras remain under-prepared further downhill. In many areas, the drains fall away from the slope of the road which leaves them collecting only dead leaves and filth with water running riot on the road.

Some genuine initiatives were also taken in the wake of 08 June, 1997. The formation of Civil Defence teams across the State is one example. Its volunteers have served their communities well and brought some coherence to the manner in which the State handles and mitigates disasters. But that group also appears to have withdrawn away from society and since the anniversary of that cataclysmic night is observed as Disaster Awareness Day in Sikkim, it might be a good idea to resuscitate this volunteer organisation.

Other efforts have fared even more poorly. A high-level technical committee was constituted in the wake of the landslides twenty years ago. It must have prepared a report too and submitted it, but no one seems to be aware of its contents, in fact, they also appear unsure of its present location. Some rules have been framed to check against future mishaps, but how judiciously they are followed and enforced is there for all to see. But that's about the administration. The monsoon is almost upon us, it is already too late to attempt anything grand, but even a quick revision of the do's and don'ts that 1997 taught the administration and the people might be of some help. At least better than just fretting and praying.

Many plant species at risk of extinction – and we're blind to danger this poses to life on Earth

Up to a million species may go extinct due to human activity according to a recent report, some within decades. We all know the mammals in trouble – polar bears, giant pandas and snow leopards – but how many of us could name an endangered plant? A 2019 report assessed 28,000 plant species and concluded that about half of them were threatened with extinction.

This failure to notice and appreciate plants has been termed "plant blindness", and it's particularly worrying because there are significantly more plant species at risk than mammals, despite the latter hogging most of our attention.

Luckily, we developed a one minute cure for plant blindness that's free and easy to do. Simply stop what you're doing and look around. Are you in a room with wood or fibreboard floorboards or furniture? Do you see wallpaper, books or tissues? These are all made from plants. Your clothes may be made from plant fibres, such as cotton and linen. Perhaps you have food, fruit juice or a glass of wine nearby. Even if you're in an office with plastic furniture, carpet tiles and wearing a polyester suit, these were made from oil generated over millions of years from plant and animal remains. Our lives are utterly dependent on plants, so why don't we see them?

LOST CONNECTIONS

Our lack of appreciation for plants is a fairly recent thing. Our history tells a very different story. The dawn of farming around 12,000 years ago was when people became obsessed with growing plants for food, changing the way we live and our planet forever. Starting with domesticating cereals such as barley, rice and wheat, humanity's increasing population and sedentary communities depended on their ability to farm, leading to entire civilisations focused on agriculture.

Industrialisation and the more recent "green revolution" in agriculture led to incredible increas-

es in cereal production and farming efficiency, allowing more people to live in cities rather than work on farms. Our agricultural success is a major reason why, for the first time in our history, most humans no longer farm, leaving people free to ignore our complete dependence on plants.

Tragically, our talent for farming has come at a huge cost to biodiversity. Right now, half of the habitable land on earth is used for agriculture, a major reason behind our current extinction crisis.

Should we care about losing the diversity of plant species, as long as we are producing enough food? Absolutely. Plants are the major food producers in most ecosystems, providing nourishment and shelter to microbes, fungi, insects and animal species which themselves play key roles in ecosystems.

While some creatures eat one type of plant – such as the bamboo-dependent giant panda – micro-organisms which live in the soil and make land fertile by recycling plant nutrients, perform better the more different plant species there are growing. Plant diversity also improves how much carbon is pulled from the atmosphere and stored in the soil – vital for mitigating climate change.

The crops that feed us may increasingly depend on the survival of other plant species. Crops are vulnerable to disease and climate change, but wild and ancient species are often resistant to diseases and can grow on poor soils and in difficult environments. These plants will have genes that could make crops disease-resistant and allow them to grow in harsher conditions with less fertiliser and pesticide. We need this invaluable genetic heritage so that more people can continue to eat well in the future.

Our health is also intimately connected with plant diversity. Just under half of all prescription medicines come directly from plants or by remaking plant chemicals. We've screened only a fraction of species for potential medicines – we don't know how many useful plant chemicals and genes remain to be discovered. Even the most overlooked

plants can be enormously important.

You might be surprised to learn that the species most studied to understand how plants work is a genus of tiny weeds called Arabidopsis. Most people have never heard of them and couldn't identify them, even though they regularly pull them from their garden. By studying Arabidopsis, scientists learned how plants know when to flower, which is being used to improve our understanding of flowering in vegetable crops – key to improving their yield. They also learned how Arabidopsis defends itself from pathogens, which could be used to make crops resistant to disease.

We can cultivate an appreciation of plants and their importance by improving access to parks, botanic gardens and forests, as well as including plant biology throughout the science curriculum in schools. But we also need to ensure there is a future for the thousands of species threatened with extinction. We need to produce more food on less land, so that natural habitats can thrive.

Plants could contribute even more to society's needs in the future. Technologies already exist for making fuels and plastic from the agricultural waste of straw, grain husks and potato peel. These alternatives sadly won't compete with cheap oil until we pay the full cost of our current lifestyles with a carbon tax. To avoid mass extinctions, we need transformative change in our politics, economics and technology to preserve and sustainably use the incredible natural resources that Earth provides.

A painless first step towards making this change is something you could do every day: our one minute cure for plant blindness. If we stop, think and appreciate how plants enrich our lives, we will learn to respect our agricultural heritage and natural habitats and better manage the tradeoffs between them.

Narcissism – and the various ways it can lead to domestically abusive relationships

Narcissism is a topic that is increasingly spoken about in today's Instagram obsessed age of self-promotion and vanity. There has also been a significant increase in studies and investigations into narcissism, and that too has brought narcissism far more into the public domain.

Any evidence of increasing self-awareness is to be welcomed. And yet, there is a danger here, because narcissism is a far more complex condition than the popular conception implies.

Popular ideas of narcissism bring to mind the Donald Trumps and Jair Bolsonaros of the world – those with a grandiose self-image, an inflated ego and feelings of entitlement to special treatment. We think of those for whom any criticism is met with anger and rage. (Think Trump's near-constant accusation of "fake news!" whenever he is challenged or criticised.) In terms of relationships, narcissists are often thought to be self-obsessed self-promotors who are interested in quickly moving from one relationship to the next.

Narcissistic behaviour also involves a lack of empathy, an exploitative attitude towards others and, paradoxically – given that it represents a clear sign that they are unable to convince themselves of their own brilliance – a burning need for peoples' attention and admiration.

Narcissism, in its medical sense, can be understood as existing along a spectrum. At the lower end, narcis-

sism is an adaptive and healthy state, one which most of us possess, and is closely linked with assertiveness and healthy self-regard. At the higher end, though, narcissism is so extreme that it is classified as a personality disorder. This affects a small percentage of the population.

But to conceive of narcissism as being an easy-to-spot personality trait, typically manifested through grandiose, male type characteristics, ignores a key side to narcissism that could go unseen. At least that is what my recent study shows. And this could influence how we think about narcissism in relationships in important ways.

COMPLICATED NARCISSISM

In conducting interviews with partners of narcissistic individuals, colleagues and I explored the motives underpinning the behaviour of narcissists. Most of the people we spoke to were approached through social media as self-perceived victims of narcissistic partners.

Before the interviews, we deliberately did not provide explicit guidance regarding the definition of narcissism as we wanted people's own views to channel their thoughts. But participants' understandings of narcissism in response to the question "In general, how would you describe a narcissist?" were carefully compared and analysed with more common clinical measures to ensure they had indeed been with a partner with narcissistic traits.

We found some manifestations that fitted the standard picture of narcissism. Narcissistic partners who

displayed these standard, grandiose features were likely to react with violence in response to threats to their self-esteem, typically when demands of entitlement, admiration and perceived authority were not met. These relationships were described by participants as swift and vicious – they charmed and disarmed, and subjected partners to abuse, often quite overtly, as a way to defend themselves against the slightest injury and ego-threatening situations.

But the picture was more complex than this. We found that many narcissists, instead of reacting with grandiose responses, reacted vulnerably. Rather than reacting with the threat of abandoning their partners, they commonly reacted with the fear of being abandoned. In other words, the violence was there, but through an act of clinging on rather than throwing away.

This suggests that relationships with more vulnerable narcissists may be more slow and insidious, and potentially more harmful. In these cases, the manifestation of narcissist characteristics was found to be more subtle, leading to sulky, passive aggressive abuse of partners in response to fears of being abandoned. **READING THE SIGNS**

What, then, are the identifiable signs that would unmask the behaviour of vulnerable narcissists? At the root of vulnerable narcissism is the profound fear of abandonment. Such individuals have a fearful attachment style, which is indicative of vulnerable narcissists' hidden entitled expectations of partners to satis-

fy their needs while fearing they will

fail to do so. This suggests that the fear of abandonment is not necessarily to do with the potential loss of the partner. Instead, it relates to the potential loss of what their partner can offer to make the narcissist feel better. Key possible indicators of vulnerable narcissism to look out for are any manipulation and covert psychological abuse that aims to inspire power and control, for instance through adopting a "victim" status to inspire sympathy in partners or to keep them in a heightened state of co-dependent anxiety.

Whereas the grandiose narcissist may become angry and then leave, the vulnerable narcissist will become angry, administer the same level and degree of abuse, but then do everything to stop their partner from leaving.

Of course, things are more subtle and complex in reality. And it's important to remember here that we're dealing with people, and that labelling should be avoided at all costs. But there needs to be a shift in how we as a society understand and approach narcissism. Because our research indicates that when narcissism is manifested in its commonly known grandiose form, it is highly damaging, but when it is masked and hidden in its vulnerable form, it can be far more painful, far more drawn out, and in some cases far more damaging.

Students' body calls off indefinite hunger strike in Nagaland Kohima, Jun 6 (PTI): An

indefinite hunger strike called by a students' body in Nagaland in support of its five-point charter of demands has been called off following the intervention of Chief Minister Neiphiu Rio, the organisers said Wednesday.

The demands included action against erring officials for alleged siphoning of Rs 1.32 crore from the state technical scholarship funds in 2014-16 and resignation of the director of technical education for not revealing the names of those involved.

On the expiry of an ultimatum seeking fulfillment of their demands served to the Technical **Education** Department on May 25, the All Nagaland College Students' Union (ANCSU) had launched the hunger strike on June 4.

An indefinite Dimapur bandh called by the same organisation from June 5 has also been postponed, ANCSU vice president Benjong Longchar and general secretary Vimeyiekho Vitso told a press conference here.

The chief minister had called the ANCSU leaders for a discussion on Wednesday following police action against the agitating students at the Secretariat on Tuesday, which was condemned by student bodies and civil societies, Longchar said.

Deputy Chief Minister Y Patton and Minister for Higher Education and Technical Education Temjen Imna Along were also present at the meeting.

Among the other demands were setting up of a nodal cell to implement the scholarship schemes in Nagaland, settlement of Kohima Science College land encroachment issue by making alternative arrangements and initiating necessary actions for the welfare of the college.

The ANCSU also demanded recruitment of 110 professors through the Nagaland Public Service Commission to fill up the vacant posts of assistant professors and an investigation into the implementation of all the 18 scholarship schemes in the state.

Longchar claimed that the state government has agreed to meet their demands immediately.

Arunachal govt taking steps to check crime, violence: Minister

ITANAGAR, IUN 6 (PTI): A road map has been drawn to initiate measures to regain Arunachal Pradesh's lost glory as the "island of peace", with involvement of all stakeholders, including community-based organisations and students, state Home Minister Bamang Felix said Thursday.

The new project -'Hamara Arunachal Abhiyan'-is aimed at reducing crime and violence in the state by taking "strict action against those trying to destabilise peace", he said.

"We will involve people from all walks of life to effectively deal with the deteriorating law and order condition in Arunachal. The 'abhiyan' will be soon kicked off by Chief Minister Pema Khandu," Felix told reporters after convening a review meeting of the state police department.

Arunachal has witnessed widespread violence over the past few months, the recent one being the May 21 militant ambush, which claimed the life of Khonsa West legislator Tirong Aboh and ten others.

In February, three people were killed and several injured in clashes over issuance



of Permanent Resident Certificates to six non-Arunachalee communities.

Felix, while addressing the press meet, said the state cabinet has sanctioned the creation of 1000 new posts of civil police officers to strengthen the existing force.

"The government has also proposed the creation of an anti-riot battalion in the state to effectively deal with the law and order situation. The idea is in the conceptual stage and we have written to the finance department for its approval. Once cleared, the other modalities will be worked out," the minis-

ter stated. The state government had last year sanctioned Rs 9.5 crore for police modernisation, and the process of procuring arms and other equipment will be completed soon, he said.

"The government will not tolerate any form of violence nor will it spare anybody trying to destabilise peace in the state," Felix added.

Among other present at Thursday's press meet were DGP SBK Singh and Commissioner Ashish Chandra Verma.

Asked about the alleged security lapses in the Khonsa massacre, Singh said, "A joint operation of the Army and the police has been launched to nab the culprits involved in Aboh's killing. We have directed the Army to seal the border with Nagaland," he added. Felix, on his part, said the government has already announced that it would hand over the case to the NIA.

The newly swornin state cabinet members, during their first sitting on Sunday night, had unanimously decided that the Aboh killing case will be handed over to the National Investigation Agency (NIA) as "thorough investigation needs to be carried out in a time-bound manner and justice be delivered expeditiously to the bereaved family members".

Five more arrested in Congress candidate murder case

BERHAMPUR (ODISHA), Jun 6 (PTI): Five more persons were arrested for their alleged involvement in the murder of Congress candidate of Aska Assembly constituency in Ganjam district, police said Thursday.

With this, as many as seven people have so far been arrested for their alleged involvement in the killing of Manoj Jena (46), Congress candidate from Aska Assembly constituency on May 22, a day before the counting of votes, police said.

Missing Army plane: Arunachal villagers saw smoke in mountain on route



ITANAGAR, JUN 6 (PTI): Residents of an Arunachal Pradesh village Thursday said they had seen thick black smoke billowing from a mountain on Monday, the day an Indian Air Force aircraft carrying 13 people went missing, prompting authorities to verify the claim.

As efforts to locate the missing plane continued, Chief Minister Pema Khandu called up deputy commissioners of Siang, West Siang, Lower Siang and Shi-Yomi districts and directed them to intensify the search operation.

The authorities of Siang and West Siang districts have formed three teams to carry out searches in as many mountain ranges on the aircraft's route, a statement from the Chief Minister's Office said here.

Three people from Tumbin village said that on Monday afternoon they had seen thick black smoke originating from a mountain towards Molo village in Siang district. "This is being verified," Director General of Police S B K Sing informed the CMO.

The Russian-origin aircraft lost contact on Monday afternoon after taking off from Jorhat in Assam for Mechuka advanced landing ground near the border with China. Mechuka is also the headquarter of Shi-Yomi district of Arunachal Pradesh.

Apex consumer commission NCDRC has directed a hospital in West Bengal and its doctor to pay Rs 3.4 lakh as compensation to the family of a 15-year old girl, who died due to delay in surgery, saying timely treatment would have increased chance of survival.

The girl was admitted to the hospital suffering from appendicular perforation and she was advised to seek treatment elsewhere.

When her father expressed inability to shift her, the doctor conducted the operation later that night, saying there was no availability of a surgical team earlier.

However, her condition deteriorated further and she was transferred to another hospital with ventilator support accompanied by the surgical team. The girl was declared dead the next day.

Observing that timely treatment would have given her a shot at life, the National Consumer Disputes Redressal Commission directed Arogya Niketan Nursing Home Village in Paschim Medinipore, West Bengal, to pay Rs 1 lakh and

I want to retire after Tokyo Olympics, says Mary Kom



New Delhi, Jun 6 (PTI): After years of speculation over her retirement, sixtime world champion MC Mary Kom on Thursday said she plans to hang her gloves after winning the elusive gold medal at the Tokyo Olympics.

The 36-year-old has been the inspiring force in Indian boxing. In her 18-year long illustrious career, she has won six World Championships, an Olympic bronze medal, and five Asian Championships.

Besides being an active and top-level boxer, she is also a sitting Rajya Sabha MP.

"After 2020 I want to

retire. So my main mission is to get a gold for India. I really really want to win (gold)," Mary Kom said on the sidelines of an event organised by Colgate. Mary Kom won the the bronze medal in the flyweight category at the 2012 London Olympics. She now aims to change the shade of her medal to gold.

"I always try my best to give a medal to the country and if possible a gold. I will be starting my preparation for the Olympic qualifiers and the World Championship. I want to win a gold medal this time."

The boxing fraternity is facing tumultuous conditions in the run up to the Olympics next year. The International Olympic Committee (IOC) has stripped the International Boxing Association (AIBA) from hosting events at the Tokyo Olympics.

The IOC has announced that it will prepare a new calendar for Olympic qualifiers be-

tween January and May next year and it may even have a re-look at the weight categories. Indian pugilists are stuck in a limbo but Mary Kom feels it is beneficial for her if the qualifiers are

held next year. "It is ac-

tually better for me I will

get more time to pre-

pare," she said.

"We are training regularly for all competitions not just the Olympics. In the World Championship, I will get to know the opponents, what their strengths and weaknesses are. Accordingly I can prepare. I will also get extra time for preparing if the qualifiers are held later."

After failing to qualify for the Rio Games, Mary Kom had changed her weight category to 48kg in December 2016 but now the pugilist from Manipur is back to competing in the 51kg.

Asked about the transition, Mary Kom said: "51kg category is not new for me. I was fighting in this category 4-5 years back. It was not continuous because I kept changing my weight."

Rohit, who has an unprecedented three double hundreds

overcast conditions. "I think in my opinion this is by far his best ODI innings because of the kind of pressure the first game brings from a World Cup point of view," Kohli said at the post-

match press conference. "And then I know, as a batsman, when you go in and a few balls bounce like that, it's not easy to gather yourself again and play in a calm manner."

According to Kohli, the best part about Rohit's innings was his composure as he was ready to curb his natural attacking instinct and put his head down and be patient.

"A lot of times batsmen tend to hit their way out of the situation. But he was very composed. He's played so many games, we expect a lot of maturity and a lot of responsibility from someone like him," he said.

"In my opinion, of all the brilliant innings I have seen him play, I think this, for me, was the top of the pile because of the way he compiled his innings and at no stage did we feel like, or he felt like he is going to throw it away," the skipper said.

Rohit hit 13 boundaries and two sixes in his 144-



others had the freedom to attack. "I think controlling the game so beautifully from one end and allowing the others to display themselves and string in small little partnerships, looking at the fact that they were only chasing 228...," he said. "Rohit played the perfect innings for that kind of a situation on that kind of a wicket against a bowling attack that was threatening to pick up wickets at any stage. So, yeah, in my opinion, by far his best knock," the skipper had no doubt.

Yuzvendra Chahal's four wickets and Kuldeep Yadav's tight spell set it up nicely for the Indian team as South Africa were restricted to 227 for nine in 50 overs.

A good start is always essential for any team and Kohli said this win over South Africa will help in creating positive vibes in the team.

"Starting off well is always an important thing and we got together nicelv as a team in the first half on the field. It is very important to create that energy and we were able to do that in the first ten and from there, we really built the game nicely and finished it off in a professional manner," he said.

However, de Villiers' omission was based on principles, Zondi said. "I pleaded with AB

de Villiers not to retire in 2018. Although there was a perception that he was picking and choosing when to play - which was not true - I did give him the option to plan and monitor his season to get him to the World Cup fresh and in a good space," Zondi said in the CSA release.

"He turned down the offer and said he was at peace with his decision to retire," he recalled.

"For Faf du Ples-



sis and Ottis Gibson to share AB's desire to be included in the squad on the day we announced our World Cup squad on April 18th was a shock to all of us. AB left a big vacuum when he retired, we had a year to find players at franchise level to fill the gap," he added.

Retirement in 2018, exactly a year before the World Cup, meant de Villiers could not fulfil the selection criteria, which included playing domestic or international cricket in the intervening months. The report stated that it was recalling the dashing batsman at the last moment would have been unfair on the players who have been performing in his absence, such as Rassie van der Dussen. Dussen made three fifties in his first four ODI innings after making his debut against Pakistan in January.

Before the cricket community trained its eyes on the World Cup, de Villiers turned out for his IPL franchise, Royal Challengers Bangalore.

Pak S&T minister now announces dates of Eid & Muharram

ISLAMABAD, JUN 6 (PTI): Pakistan's science and technology minister Fawad Chaudhry has replaced the country's clerics in announcing the dates of major Muslim festivals and the holy month of Muharram.

Chaudhry, a close aide of Prime Minister Imran Khan, on Thursday announced this year's dates for Eidul Azha and the beginning of the holy month of Muharram according to scientific evidence. He had announced the date for Eid-ul-Fitr in Pakistan last month, angering the clerics.

In a tweet, the minister said that this year, Eidul Azha will fall on Monday, August 12 while the holy month of Muharram, which marks the start of the Islamic year, will begin on Sunday, September 1.

"Now that the argument over this Eid has ended, what are the [dates] for the next two most important Islamic days, i.e., Eidul Azha and [beginning of] Muharram: According to the Hijri calendar, Eidul Azha will fall on Monday, Aug 12 while Muharram will [start] from Sunday, Sept 1," Chaudhry tweeted. The dates have been derived from the lunar calendar that was launched by the Ministry for Science and Technology last month, seeking to end the controversies over the sighting of the moon for Islamic months, Dawn newspaper reported.

The calendar, which can be accessed through Pakistan's "first official" moonsighting website as well as a mobile application, indicates scientifically determined dates for all major Islamic festivals/days for the ongoing and next years.

Putin says Russia prepared to drop START treaty

SAINT PETERSBURG, JUN 6 (AFP): President Vladimir Putin on Thursday said Russia was prepared to drop a nuclear arms control agreement with the US, known as New START, if there was a lack of interest in renewing it.

"If no-one feels like extending the agreement - New START - well, we won't do it then," Putin said at an economic forum in Saint Petersburg, referring to the Strategic Arms Reduction Treaty. "We said a hundred times that we are ready (to extend it)," Putin said, lamenting that Washington was "not conducting any talks" on the issue with Moscow.

"There is no formal negotiating process. And in 2021 everything will end." The treaty was signed by US President Barack Obama and Russian counterpart Dmitry Medvedev in Prague in 2010. The agreement, which caps the number of nuclear warheads well below Cold War limits, is set to expire in two vears' time.

Together with another agreement known as the Intermediate-Range Nuclear Forces (INF) treaty, New START is considered a centrepiece of superpower arms control.

Fiat Chrysler slams brakes on Renault merger offer

PARIS, JUN 6 (AFP): Italian-American carmaker Fiat Chrysler on Thursday withdrew its blockbuster proposal to merge with Renault, blaming political objections in Paris and sparking a war of words with French of-

Fiat Chrysler (FCA) had stunned the markets last week by proposing a "merger of equals" with the French group that would create an auto giant spanning the globe.

The plan was welcomed by analysts as one of the few deals in the auto sector that might prove a success, given the companies' complementary range of vehicles and regional markets.

The French government, which controls 15 percent of Renault, gave it a conditional green light but also warned against "haste".

In a statement issued after a board meeting Wednesday evening, FCA said it "remains firmly convinced of the compelling, transformational rationale" of its proposal, which it said was "carefully balanced to deliver substantial benefits to all parties".

"However it has be-



come clear that the political conditions in France do not currently exist for such a combination to proceed successfully," it added.

Renault, whose longstanding alliance with Japan's Nissan is in trouble, expressed its "disappointment".

Shares in the French company plunged by almost seven percent in early afternoon trades in Paris. In Milan, FCA shares also slid at the open but then recovered

to show a small gain.

The deal would have created a group worth more than 30 billion euros (34 billion) across the two companies' namesake brands as well as Alfa Romeo, Jeep, Maserati, Dacia and Lada.

Renault's board had said on Tuesday that it was studying "with interest" the FCA offer but held off on granting approval pending further deliberations.

On Wednesday, all Renault directors favoured

the merger, apart from an employee's representative affiliated with the powerful CGT union and two from Nissan who abstained, a source close to Renault said.

The two Nissan directors were said to have asked for more time to approve the deal. There was no official comment from Nissan headquarters in Tokyo.

Relations in the partnership have been under strain since the arrest in November of former

Renault and Nissan boss Carlos Ghosn, who awaits trial in Japan on charges of under-reporting his salary for years while at Nissan and using company funds for personal expenses.

French Finance Minister Bruno Le Maire said Wednesday that Renault plans to bring its own case against Ghosn after identifying 11 million euros of questionable expenses.

Le Maire had set conditions for the FCA

tieup, including no plant that of his conditions for closures and that the Renault-Nissan alliance be preserved.

Sudan denies more than 100 killed in protest crackdown

KHARTOUM, JUN 6 (AFP): Sudanese authorities admitted dozens of people were killed in a crackdown on protesters but denied doctors' claims the death toll has topped 100, as heavily armed paramilitaries guarded the tense capital.

Members of the Rapid Support Forces, who rights groups say have their origins in the Janjaweed militias of Darfur, were on the streets of Khartoum on Thursday in pick-up trucks mounted with machine guns and rocket launchers, witnesses said. It follows a raid by security forces Monday on a long-running sit-in outside the army headquarters that marked the start of a brutal crackdown on demonstrators demanding civilian rule. The Central Committee for Sudanese Doctors said Wednesday that 40 bodies had been pulled from the Nile, sending the death toll soaring to at least 108.

The committee, which is close to protesters and relies on doctors on the ground for its information, warned the figure could rise. Some life had returned to the streets of the capital on Thursday, with limited public transport operating and

only a few cars on the roads. A small number of shops and restaurants were open on the second day of the Eid al-Fitr holiday.

But there was still widespread disruption around the capital.

At Khartoum's airport relatives of travellers stayed late into the night waiting to see if their flights would arrive, following a slew of cancellations over the past few days. Internet blackouts contin-

ued to beset the city. The military ousted longtime president Omar al-Bashir in April after months of protests against his authoritarian rule, but thousands of demonstrators had remained camped out in front of the army headquarters calling for the generals to cede power to civilians.

Despite several initial breakthroughs, talks between the ruling military council that took power after Bashir's ouster and protest leaders reached a deadlock over who should head a new governing body. On Monday, security forces moved in to disperse the weekslong rally outside the army headquarters. As international condemnation mounted, the health ministry said "no more than 46" people had been killed in "recent events". The United Nations and the British embassy announced they were pulling non-essential staff from Sudan, and the United States warned its citizens to exercise "extreme caution" amid the ongoing uncertainty.

Despite the heavy presence of security forces on Khartoum's main streets, the groups that spearheaded the demonstrations against Bashir made a fresh call on Thursday for civil disobedience.

"The revolution continues and our people are victorious despite the terrorism and violence of the militias." the Sudanese Professionals Association, the group that initially launched the anti-Bashir campaign, posted on Twitter. It urged an "indefinite strike and civil disobedience," warning against calls for violence. In the northern suburb of Bahri, connecting and smaller roads in the neighbourhood were blocked by protesters putting up makeshift barricades made from rocks, bricks and tree trunks. The protesters blamed the bloody crackdown on the "militias" of the military council.

The Rapid Support Forces have been singled out by protesters.

Heavily deployed in the streets of the capital, some residents seemed wary of the paramilitaries as they moved around the streets.

RSF commander Mohamed Hamdan Dagalo, widely known as "Himediti," said he was on the side of the "revolutionaries," but warned he would not "allow chaos," referring specifically to the barricades put up in some neighbourhoods. The ruling Military Council issued a statement hitting out at the "campaign organised on social media aimed at spreading lies and fabricating accusations." It claimed the RSF "refused to carry out the orders of the former regime to expel demonstrators from the sit-in by force." The armed forces also issued a statement urging citizens to stay away from military sites, without giving a reason.

African and Western governments have been strongly supportive of the protesters but Arab governments, led by Saudi Arabia, have backed the military rulers.

The United Arab Emirates urged resumed talks to "realise the aspirations of the brotherly people of Sudan," echoing a call by its ally Saudi Arabia a day earlier.

Modi, Xi to meet next week at SCO summit: Ambassador ing that last year, our

BEIJING, JUN 6 (PTI): Prime Minister Narendra Modi will meet Chinese President Xi Jinping next week on the sidelines of the Shanghai Cooperation Organisation (SCO) Summit at Bishkek, the first meeting between the two leaders after the formation of the new government, Indian envoy Vikram Misri announced Thursday.

"In recent years, India and China have been able to build a very mature and stable relationship. The informal summit between Prime Minister di's re-election follow-Modi and President Xi in Wuhan last year was a milestone and has been instrumental in taking our relations to a new height," Misri said.

The Indian ambassador was speaking after inaugurating India's Synthite Industries' 3rd manufacturing facility at Wucheng county in Dezhou in China's Shandong province. It is worth mention-

leaders met four times on the sidelines of different multi-lateral meetings. Next week, they are again meeting in Bishkek on the sidelines of the SCO Summit," he said.

The SCO summit is due to be held on June 13-14 in the Kyrgyzstan capital. The SCO is a Chi-

na-led 8-member security bloc with India and Pakistan being admitted to the grouping in 2017.

This will be their first meeting after Moing the stunning victory of the BJP in the general elections. Xi extended his "heartfelt congratulations" to Prime Minister Modi for winning the general elections, in a rare gesture of greeting a foreign leader well before the official announcement of the results. Misri said the economic and commercial engagement between India and China constitutes a major component of the bilateral relations with bilateral trade which crossed USD 95 billion last year and is set to cross USD 100 billion this year. In December last

Prime Minister Modi met President Xi on the sidelines of the G-20 summit in Argentina and discussed joint efforts to further enhance mutual trust and friendship between the two giant neighbours. The April 27-28 Wuhan summit between Prime Minister Modi and President Xi was largely credited to have turned around the bilateral relations soured by the 73-day Doklam standoff, triggered by Chinese troops attempts to build a road close to Indian border in an area also claimed by Bhutan in 2017.

After the Wuhan summit, both the countries stepped up efforts to improve relations on different spheres including the military-to-military ties.

Shehbaz Sharif to return to Pakistan on June 8

ISLAMABAD, JUN 6 (PTI): Opposition leader in the National Assembly Shehbaz Sharif, facing corruption charges, will return to Pakistan on Saturday following a "quick visit" to London, a media report said Thursday.

Shehbaz, 67, served as the chief minister of the politically crucial Punjab province from 2013 to 2018.

He became Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz (PML-N) president after his elder brother and three-time Prime Minister Nawaz Sharif was disqualified as the par-

ty president following a Supreme Court verdict in the Elections Act 2017 case. Leader of the Opposition in the National Assembly Shehbaz will be returning to Pakistan on June 8, the Dawn newspaper reported, quoting a member of his personal

Earlier, lawyers had informed an Accountability Court that Shehbaz will return to Pakistan on June 11.

Shehbaz had announced a "quick visit" to London on April 9 after his name was removed from the no-fly list on La-

hore High Court orders. Party sources said at the time that he intended to return within 10-12 days, the report said. He faces court cases for corruption and dishonesty. In the Ashiyana hous-

ing scam, Shehbaz is accused of ordering the cancellation of a contract given to a successful bidder for the low-cost housing scheme, resulting in a loss of Rs 193 million to the national exchequer.

In the Ramzan Sugar Mills corruption case, Sharif and his son Hamza Shahbaz are accused of "fraudulently and dishonestly" causing a Rs 213 million loss to the national exchequer. Shehbaz was arrested

by the National Accountability Bureau in October 2018 and released on bail on February 14.

His brother Sharif has been serving a seven-year prison term at Kot Lakhpat Jail in Lahore since December 24, 2018 when an accountability court convicted him in one of the three corruption cases filed in the wake of the apex court's July 28, 2017 order in Panama Papers case.





I've had my self destructive heartbreak moments: Shahid Kapoor

MUMBAI, JUN 6 (PTI): Shahid Kapoor says he has gone through his share of "intense self destruction" after a heart-break and one way of overcoming negative emotions for him was to channelise them into his performances.

In his latest, "Kabir Singh", Shahid plays a surgeon who descends into self-destruction after a heartbreak.

"I've had my very intense, self destructive, heartbreak, angsty moments, where I've not been in control," Shahid told PTI.

Describing "Kabir Singh" as a phase in everyone's life, the actor says some people are "very explosive about how they're feeling" while others keep it within."

"But that feeling of falling apart, of self destruction for not being able to deal with loss... Only from great love can come great anger. He is a phase in everyone's life and that how I connected with the character."

Shahid says as an actor, he is required to channelise negative emotions, including heartbreak.

"You have to channelise all kinds of negative emotions and turn them into positive, otherwise they can take you down, heartbreak being one of them. You've to learn to channelise these energies, if you can't, you become Kabir Singh!"

The "Haider" actor says everybody breaks at some point but it's one's call to choose that to "define that moment as your permanent reality."

"The worst thing to do is to delve in self pity because it keeps you in a place way longer than you need to be. The first thing I do is to try and run away from it. I don't like to indulge in self pity, it's very dangerous." While the 38-year-old has often played dark characters, Kabir Singh is an obviously flawed man, the one with anger and territorial issues.

When asked how does he approach a character like him, Shahid says, "by not

"Kabir is the opposite. He loves so purely that he actually destroys himself in that emotion, becomes self destructive."
