As part of climate

change adaptation and rec-ognizing the urgent need for ensuring water security, RM&DD conceptualised the Dhara Vikas initiative to revive the State's drving lakes. springs and streams back in 2008. The core thrust of Dhara Vikas is to catch the surface runoff water and use it to recharge groundwater sources.

The initiative was launched under the centrally sponsored MGNRE-GA with technical support from other government agencies and organisa-tions like WWF – India, People's Science Institute, Dehradun, Advanced Center for Water Resources Development & Management [ACWADAM], Pune and Centre for Advance Computing [CDAC], Pune. The initiative focuses on the drought prone

Gram Panchavats South and West districts. It has helped to revive more than 60 springs and revived two dried-up lakes to its natural state and de-concretised hill top lakes and converted into recharge structures.

Till date 630 hectares of technically identified recharge areas has been covered with recharge intervention. More than 2500 springs have been mapped in GIS platform and developed an an-droid based Spring Data management system. The RM&D Depart-ment is currently work-

ing on hydrological decision support software in collaboration with CDAC Pune under the super-vision of IIT Delhi. The department has initiated intensive research inves-tigation to understand the hydro-geological characteristics of aquifer system in the Mid Hills in collaboration with CDAC Pune and Geologists from University of Pune

Nepal to maintain close ties with India, China while pursuing independent foreign policy: Oli KIM VARMA

BEIJING, JUN 23 (PTI): Nepal can serve as a bridge between India and China. Prime Minister K P Oli has said, insisting that his country will maintain close ties with the two neighbours while pursuing independent foreign policy.

Oli, who is here on a five-day visit, held talks with President Xi Jinping and Premier Li Keqiang, following which a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) was signed to build a railway link connecting Tibet with Kathmandu, along with 14 cooperative documents.

In an interview to China's state-run Global Times. Oli said since the formation of his government, Nepal has intensified engagements with both neighbours

"We have made it clear that we pursue an inde-pendent foreign policy and a balanced outlook in the conduct of international relations," he said.

"In foreign policy conduct, our two neighbours naturally receive top priority and with both of them, our relations are broad, comprehensive and multi-faceted," Oli said.

Asked whether Nepal will be the "land of the competition" or "bridge of cooperation" between China and India, Oli said Nepal has remained a sovereign and independent nation throughout history.

"We are firmly committed to not allowing our territory to be used against the sovereign interests of our neighbours. We have the resolve to maintain this and we naturally expect similar assurance from our neighbours," he said.

Given this policy percept, "I see a good prospect of cooperation among our three countries," he said.

The young should be taught more about the two lost years of India's democratic journey

ot too many recall the date 26 June, 1975, any Not too many recall the task 20 juile, 1 over the next two years. For the record, on 26 June 1975, the then Prime Minister of India, Indira Gandhi, clamped Emergency on the nation. Fundamental Rights were suspended, newspapers censored and journalists hauled to jail along with perhaps the entire Opposition. Midnight raids became common and Tihar was packed to the gills. Emergency apologists suggest that for once the trains ran on time and government officials actually worked. Fact remains that the two years of Emergency were times when India ran as a dictatorship and no matter how efficient the officers became at that time, it was a period which went against everything that democracy stands for Everything that the idea of India was based on was suppressed. The concept did not go down well with the people and they voted not only Indira's INC out of power but also refused the original Mrs. G a berth in the Lok Sabha. It is another matter that the same peo ple voted her back into power in 1979.

But that argument we keep for another day.
The Emergency is something that the generation in schools and colleges at present does not even know about. This blind-spotting of the tumultuous two years in the history of Indian democracy is perhaps as unfair as the actual Emergency itself. Every generation should know what can happen if citizens of a democracy stop caring and refuse to engage or stay informed and collaborate. One does not expect the horrors of the Emergency to be taught in schools, but even the mainstream media is failing in its job with mere tokenism on the topic. This is perhaps because the media houses, save perhaps Indian Express and The Statesman, keeled over to official pressure at the time. This is a skeleton that everyone wants to keep locked. Media comprised just of newspapers and radio at the time and both were largely compromised and/ or capitulated. One sees the TV news channels remember the Emergency anniversary nowadays but that is more for Congress-bashing than anything else, because most of them sidestep the eerie parallels that one senses in governance nowadays with its obsession with centralizing everything and deploying nationalism to suppress voices and justify oppression.

So yes, the Emergency remains a largely forgotten chapter. But that is wrong. Young Indians need to know what happened from 1975 to 1977. They have to understand the situation that led to the Emergency so that they can recognise the signs when a repeat is being tried. And a repeat will not necessary follow the same playbook, but will deliver the same results. The young also need to know of the popular movement which finally overcame the draconian imposition so that they can emulate the same when required. The past, we should realise, is not something to pride over or feel ashamed about, it is something to learn from, India, and for that matter even Sikkim, prefers to ignore the uncomfortable bits. India ignores the Partition Riots and the Emergency and Sikkim dodges real discussion on the Merger or, for that matter, even questions of identity, rights and responsibilities.

This attitude should change.

One needs to look back into the past again, not for critiques and allegations, but, as mentioned earlier, to be better prepared. That said, it is important to bear in mind that the past needs to be learnt from, not mindlessly celebrated. It is important for Sikkim to bear in mind that if memories become more important than dreams, it will stop moving forward and start regressing..

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As the US leaves the UN Human Rights Council, it may leave more damage in its wake

Ambassador to the United Nations Nikki Haley and US Secretary of State Mike Pompeo have announced the US was withdrawing from the

UN Human Rights Council ("HRC").

In doing so, they claimed the council was a roadblock to genuine global human rights protection. This move by the Trump administration has been anticipated for some time. In a sense, the elephant has left the room. But in doing so, the elephant has belled the cat on a number of serious issues regarding the HRC.

Is the United States' decision sound in terms of international human rights protection? Is it one that Australia, an HRC member from 2018-2020, should follow?

WHAT IS THE HUMAN RIGHTS COUNCIL?

The UN Human Rights Council was establ 2006 to replace the UN Commission on Human Rights, which ran from 1947 to 2006. By the time of its demise, the commission was criticised from

all sides for being overly politicised.

The HRC's 47 seats are divided between the five official UN regions in the following way: Africa (13): Asia (13): Latin America and the Caribbean (8); Western Europe and Other (7); Eastern Europe (6). The US (and Australia) is in the Western Eu-

rope and Other Group, known as WEOG.

One-third of the council is elected each year by the UN General Assembly, and members serve three-year terms. No member may serve more than two consecutive terms. A member can also be suspended from the council in a vote of two-thirds of the UN General Assembly: Libya was suspended in 2011 after Muammar Gaddafi's crackdown on Arab Spring protesters and armed dissidents. No other member has been suspended.

The HRC meets three times

a year for a total of around ten weeks. Its 38th session has just begun. It also meets for one-day special sessions at the initiative of one-third of its members. It has so far held 28 special sessions.

The HRC's functions include the drafting and adoption of new human rights standards, as arose in its first year with the adoption of new treaties dealing with the rights of people with a disability and the scourge of enforced disap-pearances, as well as the adoption of the Declaration on the Rights of

Indigenous Peoples in 2007.
The HRC also authorises independent investigations into particular human rights issues, either thematic (dealing with a human rights issue such as torture or LGBTI rights) or, more contro-versially, focused on a particular

state. At the time of writing, there are 46 thematic nandates and 12 country mandates for these "special rapporteurs".

It has one major new function compared to its predecessor, the Universal Periodic Review ("UPR"), whereby the human rights record of every UN member is reviewed by the HRC (as well as all other "observer" nations) every five years.

The US' grievances against the HRC arise with

regard to the human rights records of its members, and its politicised character. Its key red line con-cern seems to be the HRC's "unconscionable" and "chronic bias" against Israel (to quote from this morning's press conference). These issues are examined in turn below.

HRC MEMBERSHIP

Membership criteria as they stand are very soft: candidates commit to the highest standards of human rights, and states should take into account a nominee's human rights record when voting. Both of these rules are basically unenforceable.

Human rights criteria were mooted as prerequisites for membership when the HRC was created. However, the UN's nearly 200 members could not agree on substantive criteria, as they have very different views on human rights. The US, for exa wanted only "democratic nations" to be eligible. Such a criterion would have led to debates over the meaning of "democracy", and would seem to prioritise civil and political rights over economic, social and cultural ones. A focus on the implementation of economic and social rights might have led to the exclusion from eligibility of the US itself

In any case, the "measurement" and respec-tive ranking of human rights records across states is contentious. While comparisons between two states may lead to easy conclusions over which one is better or worse, it is a fraught exercise across the entirety of the UN membership.

Procedural criteria, such as a nation's record on ratification of human rights treaties, would be more objective. However, such criteria might have led to the exclusion of the two most powerful countries in the world – the US and China, which have both failed to ratify crucial treaties. Realpolitik indicates that such an outcome is very unlikely.

In the press conference, Haley and Pompeo

cried the presence of human rights abusers on the council, including China, Cuba, Venezuela and the Democratic Republic of the Congo. Consternation has also commonly been expressed over the common presence of Saudi Arabia and Russia on the HRC. Certainly, none of those states is remotely close to upholding the highest standards of human rights. Haley and Pompeo went further, claiming that these states manipulate the HRC to shield abusers and target blameless states in its resolutions.

So how bad is the HRC membership? Freedom House is a non-government organisation (NGO) that rates states as "free", "partly free", or "not free", according to certain civil and political rights criteria, such as press freedom. While Freedom House's methodology is assailable, I will use its rankings in assessing the current HRC, as the US itself historically uses them in making certain policy choices.

According to its 2018 rankings, the HRC of 2018 contains 21 "free" states, 12 "partly free", and 14 "non-free".

2018 is in fact one of the worst years in terms of the numbers of non-free HRC members. Nevertheless, free states always outnumber unfree states on the HRC, and can easily pass or block any resolution with the cooperation of just a few partly free

states, if they vote together.

Any problem with "bad" resolutions on the HRC arises not from a preponderance of bad states, but from bloc voting within regions, like-minded groups and alliances

THE PHENOMENON OF CLEAN SLATES

Nevertheless, one can still fairly criticise the HRC for containing 14 non-free states. How do such

A major problem for HRC elections is the issue of "clean slates", whereby the number of candidates presented by a UN region correlates exactly to the number of seats it is scheduled to have elected at any particular time. For example, a region might put forward only two candidates for two seats. In such circumstances, the various candidates' election seems to be a fait accompli. This phenomenon

Unfortunately, states will generally vote in favour of their national interests rather than human rights interests if the two should clash. Pompeo inadvertently admitted that this morning, when he praised Haley by saying that she always put "Amer ican interests first".

Politicisation inevitably leads to the manifesta-tion of political biases. The most notorious HRC bias concerns Israel. It seems that the US' biggest complaint over the HRC, and the "red line" that has led to its withdrawal, is the HRC's treatment of Israel. ISRAEL AND THE HRC

The HRC is biased against Israel. It has aimed a disproportionate number of resolutions against that country. The HRC's regular agenda of ten items contains only one item that focuses on a particular state, that state being Israel.

Its special rapporteur mandate stands until the occupation is over, so its renewal is automatic rather than the subject of periodic debate, as is the case with other mandates. The mandate-holder investigates its actions rather than those of the Palestinian authorities, whose abuses are largely ignored.

Israel has been the subject of more special sessions than any other state (more than a quarter of the 28 sessions). Having said that, it was the subject of the first three special sessions in 2006, and four of the first six, so the "hit rate" of 4 out of 22 is less stark since then.

Why is the HRC preoccupied with Israel? For a start, Israel has committed serious human rights abuses that are worthy of the HRC's condemnation. It is absurd for Pompeo to have implicitly suggested that Israel has "committed no offence". Any HRC bias does not mean that the substance of its criticisms is wrong. The recent killings of Palestinian protesters, targeted killings, illegal settlements, forced evictions, war crimes, the Gaza blockade and, most fundamentally, an ongoing occupation of
Palestine that has lasted for more

than 50 years, will cause critics to proliferate.

Nevertheless, that does not ex-

plain the HRC's disproportionate attention to one country, given the scale of human rights abuses by other states that receive far less attention.

Ardent supporters of Israel of

ten contend that the bias is driven by anti-Semitism. While such a motivation cannot be dismissed, there are other reasons that seem likely to be driving this phenome-non. The equation of "anti-Israel" with "anti-Semitic" is simplistic.

Israel has many enemies among UN states. Some have never accepted Israel's right to exist, believing that it was established illegitimately on Arab (Palestinian) land. Indeed, the Organisation of Islamic Cooperation was set up in

1969 to unite Muslim states after the 1967 war in which Israel seized the occupied territories, so op-position to Israel has been an article of faith since its inception. The OIC routinely brings as much diplomatic pressure to bear on Israel as possible. As OIC states straddle the two biggest UN groupings, Africa and Asia, they can rely on significant bloc

Solidarity for support in their initiatives.

The racial element, whereby the Jewish State of Israel illegally occupies lands populated by Arabs in the occupied territories, attracts the ire of developing states, which have historical grievances regarding racial oppression. Yet other instances of racial tension – such as the oppression of the Tibetans, the Kurds, the West Papuans, the Tamils or the Chechens - fail to attract the same HRC scrutiny.

One difference is that Israel's occupation of the Palestinian Territories is not recognised as legitimate by any other state, unlike for example China's sovereignty over Tibet or Indonesia's sovereignty over West Papua.

Indeed, increasing numbers of states have diplomatically recognised the occupied territories as the State of Palestine, and the UN General Assembly voted in 2012 to recognise Palestine as a

Occupation also allows states to feel safe in attacking Israel without being too hypocritical. While human rights abuses are sadly common, the status of "occupier" is rare. Indeed, Israel is sometimes seen as a remnant of colonialism, and its actions certainly breach the right of self-determination en shrined in the UN Charter.

However, Israel is not the only occupier. Mo-rocco has long annexed the [Western Sahara], yet the global silence on that situation is deafening in

comparison.

Israel is also seen as a surrogate for the West, particularly the US. Given that Israel is almost always defended within the UN by the US, and is of-ten defended by much of WEOG, the question of "Israel-bashing" has become part of a greater North/ South divide in the UN. Anti-American states such as Cuba, Venezuela, Ecuador and Russia see Israel as a US surrogate in the Middle East, and exploit the issue accordingly.

Bias against Israel is matched by biased dis-

plays of support for Israel by its allies, such as the US and Australia. For example, the US instinctively presumed that the recent border killings were



of clean slates was what Pompeo was referring to when he said that some states were elected by a rigged, collusive process.

Yet clean slates are a problem with all of the UN regions. The US itself was initially elected to the HRC on a clean slate in 2009. Australia was elected to the HRC on a WEOG clean slate in 2017, due to France's belated withdrawal of its candidature

Genuine elections do occur when open slates are presented by regions. This is how Russia was rejected in 2016, an unprecedented and humiliating blow that probably led to Russia's failure to even stand for election in 2017. Other serious human rights abusers, such as Azerbaijan, Sri Lanka and Belarus, have failed to gain seats in similar circumstances.

Although states are elected on a regional basis, each member must still attain the majority of votes in the general assembly in order to be elected. There remains a possibility that an unacceptable candidate will simply not reach that threshold, even in the case of a clean slate.

That possibility has in the past led to the late replacement of controversial candidates, such as Syria's replacement by Kuwait in 2011. This author eagerly awaits the day when the General Assembly finally flexes its muscle by refusing to elect an en tire clean slate, thus depriving a region of a seat for a year. Such an outcome, in the absence of a relevant reform, is one way to dissuade future clean slates.

Finally, while states – particularly WEOG countries – might rail against the awful records of other members, those sentiments might not be reflected in their actual voting. After all, voting is by secret ballot. For example, given that Saudi Arabia is a key US geopolitical ally, it seems likely that the US (and even Australia) has voted for it on occasion. Certainly, the UK seems to have done so.

The US is correct that membership criteria should be revisited. Certain obstacles could be put in the way of the worst abusers, such as compulsory open slates, public voting (which might help prevent UK votes for Saudi Arabia), and a requirement that an eligible state must allow visits by all special rapporteurs

POLITICISATION OF THE HRC

As the HRC's members are representatives of their governments, the HRC is a highly politicised body, like its predecessor. State governments are political constructs, so any institution made up of government representatives is inevitably political too.

Belonging in Shillong

Last year, someone came up to me in a very deserted beach in Puri and asked if I was from Shillong. I wish I could've said, "Yes, I am from Shillong" but I only said, I lived there for a while. Apparently, it was my "I love shillong" tote that caught his attention as the stranger tried



making connections far away from

In recent days, Shillong has been making news for all the wrong reasons. The showdown between the Khasis and the Mazhabi Sikhs were to ignite communal tension, create insecurity for all non-Khasis and bring back sour memories of tribal-nontribal conflicts that has plagued the state. There is indeed a long history of Khasi skirmishes with the "outsider" Bengalis, Ne-

palis, Biharis and now the Mazhabi Sikhs; even though these commu-nities have been living in Shillong since or before colonial times. Interestingly there are those who have made home to Shillong in the last couple of decades and do not necessarily get in "conflict" with the Khasis because the tribal solidarity

puts a strong front in their belonging to Shillong. I know of Nepali

families from Shillong who have sold their old homes to buy new ones in Siliguri and I also know of Mizo families who have constructed houses in Shillong in recent days.

So when does Shillong welcome you and when does it reject you? My experience of Shillong has been a very welcoming one. Riding up NH40 listening to Michael Learns to Rock and feeling the cool in the air as we ascend the hills is an exercise I covet. It is also a reminder that I am going to a place that does not exist anywhere in the world.

I arrived in Shillong as a student

keen to study the cultures of the region. I was overwhelmed I had classmates from ten plus tribes in a class of 28 students. I spent long hours in the library but was soaking in the sights and sounds of this city too. I went to rock concerts, autumn festivals and was in Polo grounds



when Shillong drummed its way into Guinness Book of World Records. I fell in love in Shillong sunsets and its kong shop

food. I bought my first fancy phone (Motorola Razr) through which I could check email in Shillong although it got stolen at the Guwahati train station. But I always enjoyed when I would reach Guwahati and people would ask "where from?" because I could the finally say "from

is almost natural. It is a bond I share with most of my friends in Shillong who are not necessarily Khasis nor are they from Shillong; but we are the "Shillong friends". We have spent most of our adult lives here and feel that sense of belongingness to Shillong. But could we ever belong to Shillong? The Khasis would probably be quick to strip us off our belongingness to Shillong but there are nooks and corners of the city that belong to us and vice versa. We know no other place in the world better than we know Shillong. But in claiming belongingness to this controversial city, I am reminded what my friend in Shillong always says, belonging at the end of the day

Walking down Police Bazar on any given day, Shillong does not necessarily separate you as the outsider or the insider. It allows you to be someone or anyone from Shillong. That's why incidences like the Khasi-Sikh conflict is initially difficult to

digest but not new. It is a reminder of the stark truth; we do not belong to Shillong; no one besides the Khasis have claim to Shillong (not even the Garos even though the Chief Minister of the state is a Garo).

So for people like myself, I have that luxury to come in and out of my belonging to Shillong but for the Bengalis, Nepalis, Biharis and the Mazhabi Sikhs who have lived there all their life, they have very less claim to this city and it is no myth that they still struggle to find belongingness in Shillong.

CBI to probe killings of 2 journalists in Tripura: CM Biplab

AGARTALA, JUN 23 (PTI): The Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) has agreed to take over investigations into the killings of two journalists in Tripura last year, Chief Minister Biplab Kumar Deb has said.

Bhowmik Santanu who worked for a local television channel, was killed when he went to cover a road blockade agitation in the Mandwai area of West Tripura district on September 21 last year.

Another journalist, Sudip Dutta Bhowmik, a crime reporter with a vernacular newspaper, was killed inside the head-quarters of the Tripura State Rifles' (TSR) 2nd battalion at RK Nagar in the same district on November 20 last year.

The trial in the Sudip Dutta Bhowmik case in the Additional District and Sessions Judge Court was stopped following orders from the Tripura High Court.

The state Special Inve Investigating Team (SIT) had probed the killing and filed a charge sheet. It also investigated the Santanu Bhowmik case, but hasn't filed a charge sheet vet.

The CBI has decided to take over the investigations into the cases, Biplab Kumar Deb said.

Deb told reporters late last night that the state cabinet had sent separate proposals to the

Centre to probe the two cases to ensure justice to the affected families.

"Today, we feel re-lieved as the CBI is going to investigate both the cases. With this, the BIP-IPFT government has fulfilled yet another promise made in the party's vision docu-ment," he said. CBI sleuths would

investigate the cases to ensure justice to the two families. The government had taken positive steps so that the media could work with full freedom in Tripura, he said.

Deb said the govern-ment had already taken steps for a steep hike in pension for accredited journalists -- from Rs 1 000 to Rs 10 000 -and providing financial assistance to the ailing scribes.

Law Minister Ratan

Lal Nath said democracy turns fragile "when the media is not free to perform its duty".

"As the BJP's state unit president, Biplab Kumar Deb had promised a CBI probe into the two cases if the party was voted to power. Today, the promise has been fulfilled," he added.

The Agartala Press Club and other journal-ists' bodies, which had staged protests in the capital town demanding a CBI probe into the killings, have welcomed the

tions in and around the city and most of them had suspended classes from June 20 to 22, an association member said.

He had also said, while the notification would come into ef-fect for state-aided, and state-run schools, the government also would request private schools,

and 2012) have been blithely dismissed by Australia as an exercise of Israel's right to self-defence. But a legitimate case of self-defence can still result in an illegal use of excessive, indiscriminate or unnecessary force.
Regardless of its causes, the HRC's per-

ceived bias against Israel is counterproductive. It provides Israel with a ready-made argument to reject even legitimate condemnation, thus providing cover for human rights abuses. Indeed, claims of bias (within and outside the UN) have become a dominant part of the Middle East narrative on both sides, detracting from a focus on the actions of the actual protagonists. It has facilitated Israel's progressive disillusionment with and disengagement from the UN, and now, the disengagement of the US. It reduces the HRC's credibility and opens it up to charges of hypocrisy. None of these outcomes is useful for those who sincerely wish for improvements in human rights for all in Israel and the Palestinian occupied territories.

Finally, the biggest problem with the focus on Israel is the corresponding lack of focus on other serious human rights situa-tions. While it is impossible to demand or expect that a political body, or even an apolitical one, should achieve perfect balance in its human rights focuses, it is fair to expect that such focuses not be way out of balance.

THE US AND HUMAN RIGHTS

Haley and Pompeo reassured us that the US will continue to play a leadership role in human rights, despite its withdrawal from the HRC. And certainly, the US' role on the HRC was in many ways positive. For example, it took the lead in addressing impunity in Sri Lanka. The WEOG group suffers from some dysfunctionality on the part of EU states, which generally seek a common position. Strong non-EU voices are important in this regard.

Yet the US is as political as other players on the HRC. Just as some states instinctively oppose Israel, the US instinctively supports it. Neither position is principled. The US has also protected other allies, such as Bahrain. Outside the HRC, US President Donald

Trump is not a credible leader on human rights. He seems to have an affinity with leaders with horrible records, such as the Philippines' Rodrigo Duterte. Most recently, he responded to comments about North Korea's human rights record, which is possibly the worst in the world, by praising the "tal-ented" Kim Jong-un.

And of course, the US has long had its own serious human rights problems, which are too numerous to mention, but which include torture and the highest proportion of incarceration in the world. Its recent decision to separate migrant children from their parents and intern them reflects its status as the only country in the world that has failed to ratify the Convention on the Rights of the Child.

Furthermore, it is nonsense for Pompeo suggest that the HRC had sought to infringe on US sovereignty. This betrays a serious misunderstanding of the concept of sov-ereignty, indicating that it dictates immunity from criticism. It does not.

IS THE COUNCIL SALVAGEABLE?

The US is correct to note there are major deficiencies in the current HRC. Is its response therefore the correct one? If so, that would seem to indicate that Australia should also quit the HRC. It is very unlikely that Australia will do so. The HRC is the peak global intergov-

ernmental human rights body, which may represent the world of today, warts and all. The battle for universal human rights observance will not be won by adopting an "us and them" mentality, which excludes signifi-cant numbers of countries in the world from "the human rights club". Such a solution is

more likely to lead to balkanised human rights discussions, and possible competing institutions inside and outside the UN.

The HRC must remain a forum where non-ce-minded states, and civil society, can talk to each other, and occasionally cross divides to make important human rights decisions. Furthermore, the HRC is meant to be a

political body. Other parts of the UN human rights machinery are made up of indepen-dent human rights experts, and accordingly take a more impartial approach than the HRC. While their human rights findings are more credible, it also seems that states generally take their findings less seriously.

States tend to care more about what their peers think than what human rights experts might think. Hence, human rights would suffer in the absence of a relevant in-tergovernmental global body.

Despite its flaws, the HRC does make decisions that benefit human rights, even in the face of political lobbying by members with scurrilous motives. For example, a special rapporteur was appointed to investigate Iran (after the application of US pressure), and it remains in place, despite that influential country's forceful efforts to dismantle the mandate. A special rapporteur on LGBTI rights was appointed in 2016, despite fierce opposition from the OIC and homophobic states, due to an alliance of developed and developing states, and civil society.

The HRC will continue to be an imper-

fect institution for as long as the UN is made up of states with imperfect human rights records. However, the council still can and must be improved. But the worst way to achieve that goal is by just walking away.

Salah has been photo-graphed smiling and clasping hands with Kadyrov during the tournament.

Egypt crashed out of the World Cup after losing to Russia 3-1 on Tuesday, with Salah returning to action for the first time in three weeks following a shoulder injury but unable to save his team. The Egyptians play their final match against Saudi Arabia on Monday.

Kadyrov said that at "a

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Several killed in blast at Ethiopian PM's rally

(AFP): Several people were killed today in a blast at new Ethiopi-an Prime Minister Abiy Ahmed's first rally in the capital attended by tens of thousands of people,

state media reported.

Abiy had just wrapped up his speech in the heart of Addis Ababa when the explosion went off, sending panicked crowds towards the stage as the prime minis-

ently safe and sound.
"All the casualties are martyrs of love and peace," Abiy was quoted as saying by state-affili-ated Fana Broadcasting Corporate. The cause of the blast was unknown and further details on the casualties were not immediately available.

It was Abiy's first

The blast was followed by indiscriminate gunfire from Boko Haram jihadists lurking in the dark, said Mustapha Muhammad, a civilian militia leader in the area. Tungushe resident Umara Kyari, who gave similar casualty toll, said the attackers torched eight thatched houses and three vehicles before stealing about 100 cows. Its nine-year armed violence to establish a hardline Islamic state in remote northeastern Nigeria has killed more than 20,000 people.

Five migrants die, nearly 200 rescued off Libya

TRIPOLI, JUN 23 (AFP): Five migrants died and nearly 200 were rescued off the coast of Libya while trying to cross the Mediterranean to Europe in two boats, the Libyan

navy said today.
Three children and nine women were among 94 migrants rescued yesterday when their in-flatable dinghy sank 12 nautical miles from Gaabulli, east of the capital Tripoli.

Five migrants -- from Sudan, Nigeria, Chad and Egypt -- aboard the same vessel lost their lives, said navy spokesman Ayoub Kacem. Another 91 migrants travelling in another boat were rescued in the same area, the spokesman said. A total of 900 mi-

grants have been intercepted or rescued by the Libyan navy since Wednesday as depar-tures pick up due to favourable weather. Usually in such cases the migrants are taken to detention centres pending repatriation.

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EU leaders to hold mini-migration summit as crisis festers

European Union leaders tomorrow will try to find common ground for tackling migrants arriving on Europe's shores in search of better lives - a growing political crisis threatening to undermine the entire EU project.

The leaders of about 16 countries - more than half the 28-nation bloc will take part in what is being billed as "informal talks" in Brussels, ahead of a full EU summit on June 28-29, where migration will top the agenda.

German Chancellor Angela Merkel said yesterday that the meeting involves "talking with particularly affected nations about all problems connected with migration." She said the hope is to see if "we can reach bi-



al agreements to better solve certain problems."

The arrival of more

than one million people in 2015, most fleeing conflict in Syria and Iraq, exposed glaring defi-

ciencies in EU migrant reception capacities and asylum laws. It has fueled tensions among member states, and anti-migrant parties have won votes by fomenting public fears

of foreigners

At the heart of the problem lie deep divisions over who should take responsibility for arriving migrants - often Mediterranean countries like Italy, Greece and increasingly Spain - how

quired to accommodate them, and what should be done to help those EU countries hardest hit.

The problem was crystalised last week in a row between Italy's new populist govern-ment, Malta and France over who should take responsibility for 630 people rescued from the Mediterranean Sea off the coast of Libya, the main departure point for people trying to reach Europe.


Like everything to do with migrants in Europe lately, even this meeting is proving controversial. What started as talks between half a dozen leaders now involves at least 16, as others demanded to take part. Four countries in Eastern Europe the Czech Republic, Hungary, Poland and Slovakia refuse to attend.

Referring to hasty arrangements and a domestic crisis over migration policies within Merkel's coalition gov-ernment, the fervently anti-migrant Hungarian prime minister, Viktor Orban, said: "We un-

derstand that countries

cal difficulties, but this can't result in pan-Euro-pean confusion." "This pean confusion." "This is an open invitation. Nobody is excluded, everybody is invited. Nobody is forced to attend either," said Alexander Winterstein, spokesman for the European Com-mission, where the talks will take place.

With plans to reform Europe's asylum laws bogged down, EU leaders will in coming days affirm their intention to stop migrants leaving north African shores by paying countries like Algeria, Egypt, Libya, Morocco and Tunisia to hold people until their eligibility for asylum can be established.

They announced their engagement in the Times last year and are expected


to marry at Wardhill Castle.
